

Texas U. Player Seeks Letters In Four Major Sports

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 19. — Tall Frank Guess, a blond 180-pounder, is going to be a busy young man for the next four or five months as he seeks letters in three major sports at the University of Texas.

He probably would have made it four but freshmen didn't become eligible for the varsity in the Southwest Conference until after the regular football season. Guess did get to play in the Cotton Bowl game, and if what he did was a fair sample, there's little doubt that he would have made his numeral on the gridiron.

The Army may prevent the university from having its first four-letterman in history.

The 18-year-old Guess, a physical education major, is in the Army Enlisted Reserve and will probably be called to the service this Spring. He may go before completing basketball, baseball and track.

Frank is considered by Freshman Coach Clyde Littlefield as the best football prospect at Texas since the days of Harrison Stafford. For those who may not have heard of Stafford, well, this fellow was the greatest blocker

ever to bounce a would-be tackle in the Southwest Conference. Guess already is a mighty punter and in addition can pass well, and is a shifty runner. His cut-back is something to see.

Littlefield, who has been watching athletes come and go at Texas for 23 years, compares Guess to some of the best men he ever coached, including Frank's hometown hero, Stafford. Both of them are products of Wharton, Tex.

"He's a fine boy to coach," Littlefield declared. "He reminds you of Bohn Hilliard (Texas' great halfback of the early thirties) the way he listens to what you have to tell him."

Guess already is out for the varsity basketball team and has been impressive with his ball-handling. He plays guards.

The next big question after basketball will be whether he'll be allowed to participate in both track and baseball, as he wishes.

These sports overlap and it takes a hard worker to stand up under both training programs.

If he does try for baseball, it will be as an outfielder. He was a snail-pot player at Wharton and attended the St. Louis Cardinal school at Houston when 14. He hits either from right or left, admits his left-handed hitting is more consistent but that he cuts harder from the right.

As a track man he is a jumper, and also throws the javelin and discus in high school, he reached 4 feet 1 1/2 inches in the high jump.

On The Spot

NEW YORK, Jan. 19. — Some of our baseball players are going to be exposed to higher learning this Spring. At one time this would have been cause for fretting, but no longer. Most of them have already caught education to a more or less degree.

Besides, they're just "passing through" these colleges. The Boston Red Sox are hooked at Tufts College, the Phila at Swarthmore, and the Yankees at Asbury Park, N. J., high school. Cincinnati and Indianapolis are considering Indiana University, and Brooklyn hopes to use the Yale cage.

Such a happenstance isn't as serious as it would have been in the days of Cap Anson or John McGraw. In fact, it isn't what it used to be. The universities would have balked, but quick. For in its early days, baseball was a rosy sport played largely by rowdies. Players were not permitted in the better hotels and respectable citizens probably lost caste if they were seen gabbling with performers. Colleges were definitely out of bounds for ball players.

The picture has changed in the last decade or so. Perhaps 50 percent of today's major leaguers are college men. And baseball is big business. Today's players are in baseball because they can earn a better living there than in any other occupation. Big money attracts them more than their love of the game. Some use baseball as a means to accumulate funds to stake them to a start in a profession.

Probably the best educated players baseball ever boasted was Moe Berg, the Red Sox catcher. Moe had degrees from several universities, including a foreign institution, was a lawyer and could speak seven languages, including Sanskrit. Monte Weaver, who pitched for Washington some years ago, was a university professor. Lou Gehrig had a degree from Columbia. Joe Gordon, last year's most valuable player in the American league, studied at the University of Oregon.

While the ball clubs won't require a helping hand from the professor of Greek or economics, they might well borrow the services of the coaches at the various colleges. Here are some suggestions:

1. The track coaches could be used to teach slowfoots to get off to a racing start, toward first base or to employ a vim in their trots around the field while conditioning their legs. (Brooklyn hired Percy Beard, the crack sprinter and hurdler, one Spring to add speed to its base runners.)
2. The physical education director could supervise gymnasiums or setting up exercises (as the late Artie McGovern did for the Dodgers two years ago).
3. Football coaches might teach players the body block or the stiff arm to make them more efficient in bringing in second base and breaking up attempted double play peps.
4. Basketball coaches might demonstrate tricky pivots to enable players to elude their pursuers on run downs between bases.
5. Education tutors could improve the players' delivery of language and give them more polish in their discussions with arbiters.

Of course, I will readily take bets that none of the major league managers will avail themselves of these suggestions. However, there's no harm done. This advice didn't cost them anything.

Kentucky Derby Will Be Run As Usual This Year

LOUISVILLE, Jan. 19. (AP)—The Sixty-ninth Kentucky Derby will be run here May 1 and the winner will get a major part of the usual \$75,000 purse, a gold cup and the traditional wreath of roses but the crowd likely will be made up of street-car riding residents of this area.

Col. Matt J. Winn, the Derby impresario at Churchill Downs,

said yesterday "unless the government bans horse racing, which is quite unlikely, the Derby will be run on the scheduled date, even if only two horses go to the post and even if the crowd does not exceed a half dozen persons."

The crowd undoubtedly will be affected by such war-time restrictions as gasoline rationing, curtailment of civilian travel on trains and planes and the ban against use of taxis and extra buses to transport fans to sports events. However, Louisville and its neighboring communities in Kentucky, Indiana and Ohio have a population well in excess of 500,000 and most everybody in

Japanese Reported To Be Facing Bad Shortage Of Ships

Allied Vessels Destroyed At Least 445 Enemy Naval Merchant Ships

NEW YORK, Jan. 20. (AP)—Aside from the hard going in New Guinea, on Guadalcanal and in Burma, Japan was reported facing serious shortage of ships. Slashing steadily away at Japan's vital and long-extended supply lines, Allied submarines and warships and planes have destroyed at least 445 Japanese naval and merchant ships, and reports from Axis sources indicate the Japanese are facing a serious shipping shortage.

On another side, an official spokesman here and in London Tuesday emphasized the gravity of Allied ship losses to Axis under which have sunk at least 627 United Nations and neutral merchantmen in western Atlantic waters since America entered the war.

A United States Navy Department spokesman and British deputy prime minister, Clement Attlee, both said the submarine menace is far from licked, and that complex anti-submarine defenses are increasingly necessary.

An unofficial United Press compilation of western Atlantic sinkings reached 827 with Navy disclosure that two more British ships were blasted to bottom last month in the South Atlantic—the favorite Axis hunting ground in recent months.

The Navy spokesman said everything possible is being done to cut losses but as things stand "we're not winning the battle of transportation" and Axis raiders, still "going to town" off the South American coast.

He said the convoy system employed along the Atlantic seaboard and in the Gulf and Caribbean has forced the merchant fleet to move southward but that such operations "take more ships than we can muster."

Even shipping lanes are long and many, he said, "while out ships are not enough."

Even convoys are vulnerable, he said, and many cargo ships still are "knocked out" and the guns of protecting escort vessels.

He said if the Allies are able to "stymie" the raiders in the South Atlantic as effectively as we have from Canada to Trinidad, then we'll start winning the battle of transportation. As it stands now, we are not.

Attlee, in a House of Commons speech, described the U-boat menace as of the first magnitude and said there unfortunately is "no short, simple way of defeating it."

Selective Service To Keep Men On Farms

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. —The Selective Service Bureau of the War Relocation Commission last night announced a far-reaching liberalization of agricultural deferment requirements to keep workers on the farms.

Henceforth local draft boards will be guided by "new criteria" which include liberalized application of the "war unit" production standard and adds to the list of essential crops for which farm workers may be deferred.

A "unit," for example, is one acre, or 80 feet lot cattle, or an acre of beans, or 80 acres of wheat—products deemed essential in the war food program.

Growers must farm—to win deferment—have been required to produce 10 units. Under the new plan, a few as little as required.

Fruit Packing Plants Essential Fuel Users

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (AP)—Fruit packing plants and processing industries have been ruled essential users of petroleum products by the Petroleum Administration.

The Petroleum Administration has ruled that such plants are essential because of their contribution to the war effort.

The ruling applies to all states and territories.

Kiwians Meet To Celebrate Club's Founding

"Whistling Willie" Is Presented Deeds To Home By Spencer

Commemoration of the founding of Kiwanis observed today by Kiwanians at their luncheon at the Hotel Mayfair was featured by three outstanding talks. An outline of present social and economic problems confronting this section by Mayor Edward Higgins, a talk on spiritual idealism of Kiwanis by Capt. T. W. Lawton, and a presentation talk by C. W. Spencer before handing to "Whistling Willie" Williams negro entrepreneur, tax receipts, cancelled checkbooks and clear title to his home made possible by gifts of Mayor Edward Higgins, and donations of Sanford citizens in response to a campaign initiated by Mr. Spencer, and sponsored by The Herald.

Introducing Mayor Higgins, Charles Lee reported the address of Mayor Higgins, who said that the coming of the Kiwanians to the Sanford Naval Air Station "that Sanford was the friendliest town in Florida."

"I think the friendliness of Sanford is not universally accepted," said Mayor Higgins, "and with the coming of the Kiwanians here, we have had a further demonstration of our friendliness in mass."

With the coming and going at the rate of 200 to 300 a month, we must remember that the impression that we leave with those men going to be a most lasting one and it is an advantage of our town that is that they carry in their heads a picture of Sanford," he added.

"I hope that the Kiwanians will represent a cross-section of humanity, as characteristic as that represented by the Kiwanians here in a 12 block area in the city," Mayor Higgins added.

He was gratified that in connection with the Kiwanians there had been no trouble from the north point of view since their coming.

Mayor Higgins also stated that copies of the forthcoming presentation of the Kiwanian will be distributed free to men of the Air Station, and that for those who would like to read the book free postage will be furnished by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Supt. T. W. Lawton in his talk emphasized the spiritual idealism of Kiwanis, and reviewing the work of the organization since its founding. He stressed the value of moral development of the individual members in adhering to these principles.

He told of the spiritual value of the individual giving, and that when people are obedient to be in trouble.

"A Kiwanian never passes by on the other side," he said.

Mr. Lawton drew attention to the results of Kiwanian donations, citing cases of club feet straightening, and of improved eyesight of persons aided by Kiwanian sponsored treatment, and told of the joy brought to many by club donations at Christmas time.

"He didn't muddle his face."

Chilean Relations With Axis Severed

SANTIAGO, Chile, Jan. 20. (AP)—The Chilean Senate in a private session approved President Juan Antonio Rios' decision to break relations with the Axis, informed political sources reported last night.

These sources said it was understood all the leading political parties—Conservative, Liberal, Radical, Socialist, Democratic, and Communist—were in favor of the move.

A majority of the cabinet members accompanied Foreign Minister Jose Joaquin Fernandez to the Senate in a move that took an hour detailing the government's position. Members of the Chamber of Deputies also attended an early session from woodwork.
