

Prune before flower buds set

Pruning is the selective re-moval of plant parts, mainly shoots and branches to improve health, control growth or promote flowering, fruiting or appearance. Pruning is a common maintenance prac-tice used to remove dead, dying, or damaged wood. Dis-cased or insect-infested branches are usually removed rather than sprayed with chemicals to control the problem. Selective pruning can be used to produce a thin

or thick canopy.

When to prune: Trees and shrubs can be lightly pruned anytime. Prune spring-flowering plants, such as flowering plants, such as azaleas, camellias, Indian hawthorn, redbud, wisteria, and dogwoods, in late spring after flowering, but before the flower buds set for the next season. Azaleas for example, form flower buds in July for the following year's blooms. Pruning or pinching between the end of the blooming period and the late spring riod and the late spring would not reduce the number of flower buds set. Pinching the new shoots on azaless anytime from several weeks after they begin elongating through May will encourage lateral branching. If pruning or pinching occurs between July and just before blooming during next year's spring, it would remove flower buds and therefore reduce the number of flowers, but will not affect the general health

that produce flowers on current season's growth such as abelia, hibiscus, rose, oleander, allamanda, cassia, crepe myrtle, princess-flower, and myrtle, princess-flower, and bottle brush, are usually pruned while dormant or just before the spring growth flush. Developing shoots can be pinched to encourage lateral branching which will increase the number of flowers per plant. Moderate to severe pruning may encourage production of fewer but larger blossoms, it is best to prune blossoms. It is best to prune trees late in the dormant season or several weeks following a growth flush. Trees sprout excessively and are easily damaged when pruned dur-ing active shoot elongation. The worst time to prune is when leaves are forming. Do not prune trees that are un-

der stress.

Pruning techniques: Plants are pruned by either heading back or thinning. Heading back is the selective cutting of terminal ends of twigs or young branches back to an

promotes the growth of new shoots and leaves. Thinning is the complete removal of branches back to lateral branches or the main trunk. or as in the case of shrubs with several trunks, a complete removal of some of the trunks. This technique is used mainly on shrubs to control size while maintaining a natural appearance.

Root pruning: Root pruning can be used to slow plant growth, producing a more compact plant. Prune one half of the root system, wait 4 to 6 weeks, and then prune the other half. Root pruning should be schedule so roots will be watered thoroughly to keep the soil moist for 4 to 6 weeks following root pruning.

Pruning to increase flower and fruit else: Larger fruit can be produced by selectively removing flowers or de-veloping fruits. Those re-maining will be larger, Light pruning helps to maintain more flowers and fruits on the tree. Severe pruning on plants, which flower on current season's growth such as crepe myrtle, will produce fewer but larger flower clusters. However, pinching new vegetative growth during the growing season will induce the production of lateral shoots and also the number of blooms. Removing seed heads on crepe myrtle, for instance,

process in preparing eagles and other raptors for release. Audubon's Center for Birds of Prey admitted fifty-one Bald Eagles in 1998, 46 percent coming from the central Flor-

ida counties of Lake, Osceola, Orange, Seminole and Volusia. Twenty-one eagle injuries were the result of human impacts (car accident, territory fight, electrocution, toxin or

litter); eighteen resulted from trauma (unknown origin, frac-tures, physical injuries); ten resulted from disease or natural causes (avian pox, storm, tornado, premature fledge); and two were the result of gunshot wounds.

Florida Audubon also spear-heads a program which util-izes citizen stewards to monitor active eagle's nests in 35 counties through the state. Audubon's EagleWatch is im-

portant in identifying the loca-tion of active nests, documenting urban activity, and assisting in management plans. This year, Eagle Watch will be utilizing 221 volunteers assigned to 232 nests.

Gutenberg or Gallileo? Copernicus or Columbus? Beethoven or Bach? Shakespeare or Einstein? Thomas Acquinas or Francis of Assist?

The ultimate Book of Arguments - 1,000 years, 1,000 people: Ranking the Men and Women Who Shaped the Millennium - has scholars and historians at odds.

Who's to say whether Michelangelo was as important as Leonardo da Vinci or if Elizabeth I was the most significant woman of the millennium?

The top ten on the list are: Johannes Gutenberg. Christopher Columbus, Martin Luther, Galileo Galilei, William Shakespeare, Isaac Newton, Charles Darwin, Thomas Aquinas, Leonardo da Vinci and Ludwig can Beethoven.

Elizabeth I, who shaped the British Empire, was No. 31. In all, less than 15 percent of the 1,000 on the list are women.

"I can't believe they left out Oprah," joked Prof. Dick Crepeau, the History Chair at the University of Central Florida. Crepeau found the list more amusing than scholastic. Td drop Columbus on the list, and move up Newton and

Any serious ranking of those who shaped the millennium would require study and comparisons of the fields and periods of the principals, Crepeau said. "If Beethoven and Bach are in the top 35, why isn't Mozart? And where is Henry Ford?"

The book starts with Gutenberg (No. 1) and his printing press and cases is No. 937 and Dr. Suess No. No. 56. Marie Curie No. 75

and Joan of Arc No. 83. Oprah didn't make the list and neither did Princess Diana, "who charmed the world but died too soon for lasting influence," according

The problem the authors had with Oprah was that didn't believe her fame had moved out of America and that she was just a practitioner and not the one who invented the genre of talk television. "At the end of the millennium, she is the richest black woman in America and more powerful than the president," they

conceded. John F. Kennedy's legacy was defined as a "frat boy image and a presidency cut short." He missed the list. Jackie Onassis also missed

the list. Louis Armstrong was No. 322, Elvis Prealey No. 352 and George Gerahwin No. 857 on the list. Frank Sinatra did not make the list nor did Nancy Sinatra. Bob Dylan was

No. 888. Adolph Hitler, the millennium's most evil, was No. 20 on the list. Genghis Khan was No. 43. Joseph Stalin wasn't evil enough?

Prof. Crepeau said he expected a bevy of millennium lists, "About the time the 17th comes out, people will be exhausted by the whole process," he said. "There's just so far you can go

Center for Birds of Prey releases 200th bald eagle

WINTER PARK - Florida Audubon Society's Center for Birds of Prey will reached an important benchmark, as it released its 200th Bald Eagle back into the Florida sky. The release came only a day after the nation celebrated the 25th anniversary of the Endangered Species Act, one of the most effective pieces of legislation that has helped to pretect the Bald Eagle and many struggling species and sub-species.

In Florida, Bald Eagles hit their low in 1962 with only 251 nesting pairs. Today, Florida boasts the largest population of Bald Eagles in the continental United States, with nearly 1,000 nesting pairs. Audubon's Center for Birds of Prey aided an increasing Bald Eagle population during recovery, by rehabilitating and reintroducing eagles back into the landscape.

"Now, more than ever, Audubon's experience in the eagle business is needed," said Resce Collins, Florida Audubon vice president and center director. "It took us 14 years to release our first hundred Bald Eagles, and only five more years to reach number 200," she said. Collins noted that other factors also played a role in this steep increase of releases: the increase in numbers of eagles, as well as the fact that more eagles are now found in urban areas, making them more vulnerable to collisions with cars and

powerlines, accidental poisonings and shootings.

Lucky number 200 is an adult eagle nicknamed 'Stewart', who was recovered on a greenhouse roof in Oakland in Orange County. Although it remains unclear how he acquired his injuries, when found, Stewart was in mild shock, had blood in this throat, was weak in his right shoulder and capable of only short flights. After 2-1/2 weeks of treatment at the center, Stewart had recovered from his injuries and was ready for release.

Bob Lamb, vice president of Walt Disney World's Animal Kingdom, released the eagle near its recovery site. Disney is leading an effort to build the flight barn as part of Project Wingspread, a \$2 million project to enhance treatment of birds of prey and the education of Florida's citizens. 



ful deal. But, when the chamber asks the commission to underwrite costs after the fact, that's a problem."

The \$5,000 request to the downtown CRA was based on an estimate by Florida Power & Lighting, Rose said. He said he did not learn the bill from FP&L and Sanford Electric came to \$9,748 until after the \$5,000 had been approved by the CRA. Rose notified Sanford City Manager Tony VanDerworp of the total expense in a letter dated Dec. 11.

"I appreciate everything the city has done," Rose said. "I understand they are the stewards of the taxpayers. Their point was that they're tired of bailing everything out. This was not that issue. This lighting is an improvement to the city's infrastructure. Better downtown lighting is one reason the CRA was formed in the first place. I was not asking them to ball me out."

VanDerworp said there was not enough time to get commission approval for the funds before the festival.

Larry Strickler, vice-chairman of the downtown CRA, said the CRA unanimously approved the funding so the festival would be able to install the infrastructure for metered commercial power at the festival's site of Palmetto Avenue and Sanford Avenue, rather than renting 20-25 gen-

Strickler said he considers the festival a success, and that Sanford is "lucky" to have Rose as the director of the chamber.

The Heritage Festival would never have happened without Ron (Rose)," Strickler said. "On the shoe-string budget the chamber had, a lot of commissioners were surprised the festival went so well. I think Sanford needs more events like this to stimulate the downtown, maybe four or five per year."

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


