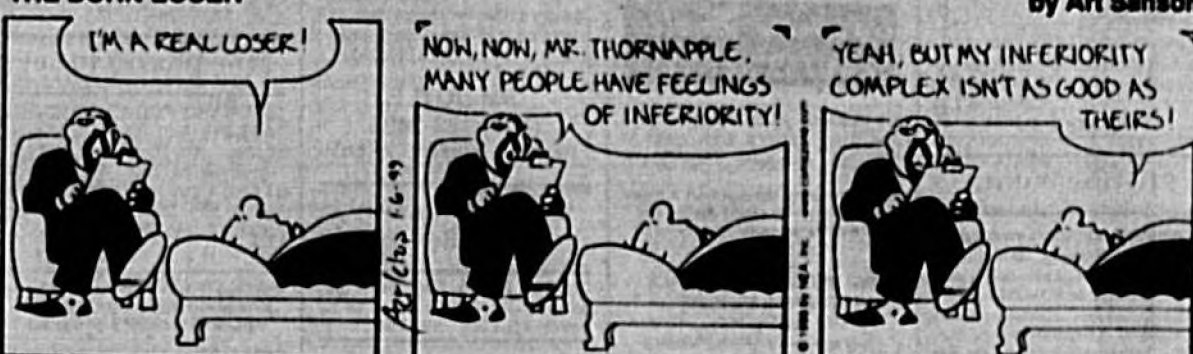

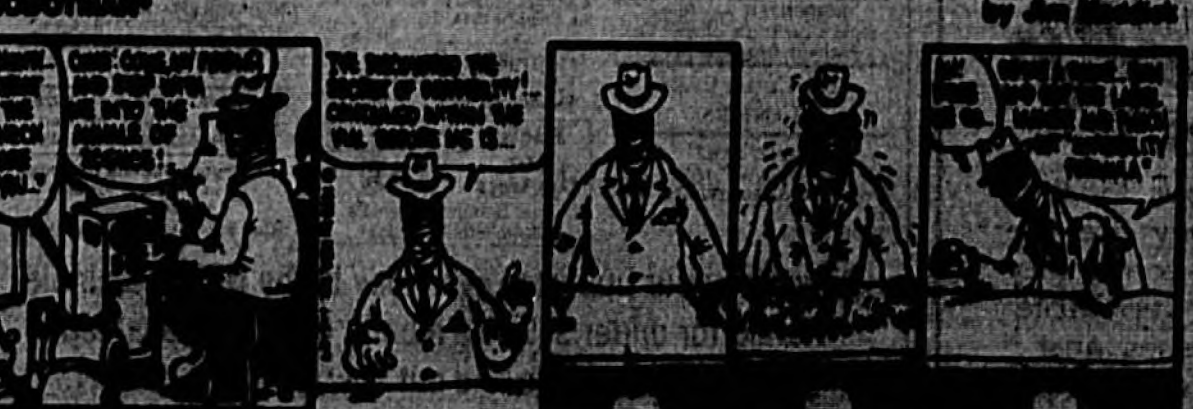

Preventing Alzheimer's disease

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is there anything I can do to avoid getting Alzheimer's disease? My grandmother died of it and I'm scared silly.

DEAR READER: There really isn't any proven way to avoid Alzheimer's disease, although some reports have indicated that estrogen therapy in women and vitamin E supplements (in both sexes) may exert a protective effect. Recently, Dr. Robert Friedland, associate professor of neurology at the Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine in Cleveland, performed a study showing that exercise throughout life may protect some patients against this dreaded affliction. The investigators showed that jogging, biking, golf, weight training, ice skating, tennis, swimming and racquetball were beneficial. Dr. Friedland hypothesized that regular exercise "enhances the metabolic activity of nerve cells in the appropriate brain regions." Although these findings must be confirmed in a larger study, they are intriguing. Of course, regular exercise is known to benefit all of the major organ systems in the body; if the Alzheimer's link is also proven, so much the better.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 21-year-old woman with an embarrassing problem. I have a pilonidal cyst that keeps getting infected. Although my doctor prescribes antibiotics when necessary, my symptoms are recurring more frequently, usually about four times a month. I have a small hole near my tailbone, which drains thick pus and causes pain. My doctor says that in her experience, surgery is the only cure. However, the surgeon she referred me to told me that the incision would be about three inches long and would extend more than an inch deep. Should I get a second opinion?

DEAR READER: Don't waste your time and money. Have the surgery. Pilonidal cysts are congenital malformations of the skin over the lower spine, which failed to fuse during embryonic development, leaving you with an open hole in the area of the coccyx. Bacteria readily enter this defect and set up infection that is chronic. The only sure cure is an operation to remove the infected material, which lies deep in the tie-

surgeon, but I believe that his conclusions would be identical to those of your present physician and her consultant.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Is there anything I can take to treat premature ejaculation? I'm only 22 and nothing has helped, even behavioral therapy.

DEAR READER: An article in the Journal of Urology (Vol. 159, 1998) showed that the use of the prescription antidepressant Anafanil was an effective remedy for premature ejaculation. Ask your doctor to consider prescribing this drug.

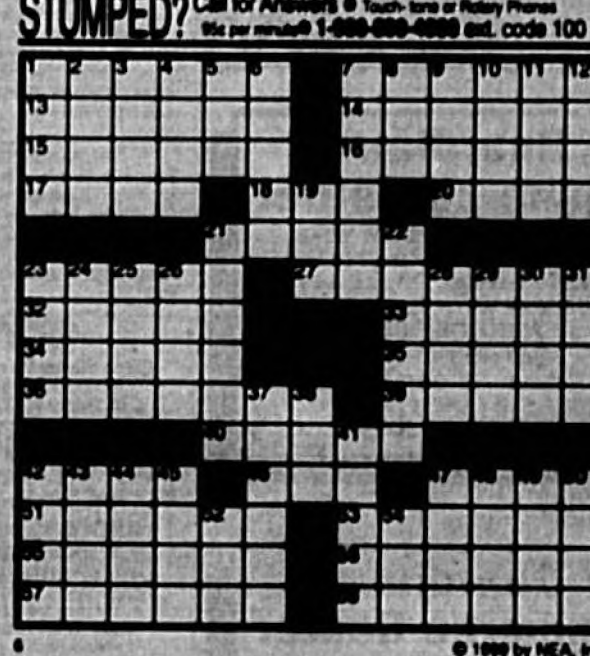

WIN AT BRIDGE

Is it infallible?

In no-trump, when you have only one top-trick stopper in the suit led (usually the ace, but perhaps the king if your right-hand opponent wins trick one with the ace), apply the Rule of Seven. Subtract from seven the combined number of cards you have in that suit in your hand and the dummy's. Then, hold up for that number of rounds.

Is it perfect? No! Ignore it when you know the opening lead is from a four-card suit, or when you are more frightened of a switch to another suit. In other of these cases, it is usually best to grab the first trick and go about your business.

Well, with respect to this deal, is that true a hint? Against three no-trump, West leads the spade four. Do you win trick one? Why?

Note West's lead, the spade four, not the queen. Against no-trump, it is usually best to lead low from Q-J-x-x. Lead the queen only if the higher spot is the nine or 10 (or you know partner is long in the suit).

South has seven top tricks. Yet once the diamond ace is out of the way, four more tricks open up.

The Rule of Seven tells declarer to hold up the spade ace for two rounds. (Seven minus five equals two.) However, here, that should be two. An observant East will switch to the heart king at trick two, setting up five tricks (one spade, three hearts and one diamond) for the defense.

What was West's lead? The spade four. And declarer can see the two and three. So if you assume that West is a reliable citizen, he has led from a four-card suit. With the spades splitting 4-4, match trick one and lead a top diamond.

These activities are involved in the use of HOME funds for the delivery of safe and decent housing units to eligible owner-occupied/renter-occupied very low, low and moderate-income residents. a. HOME Housing Rehabilitation b. Tenant Based Rental Assistance c. CHDO Purchases/Rehabilitation/Resort Program

- 3. These activities are involved in the use of EBP funds for the delivery of emergency/transitional/permanent shelter, outreach and homeless prevention assessment activities. Also, to provide counseling and outreach programs. a. Homeless Prevention b. Rescue Outreach Mission c. SafeHome of Seminole

It has been determined that these projects and activities will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment. Accordingly, Seminole County will not prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969. Such a statement will not be provided for the following reasons:

- 1. Seminole County amended in fiscal year 1998-99 its Consolidated Plans for fiscal years 1998/1999 and 2001/2001 to complete an activity under Public Facility Activities (City of Sanford) which will be used by low and moderate income residents of Seminole County.
- 2. Seminole County currently has HUD revised an Environmental Assessment (EA), dated October 31, 1987 for the CDBG, EBP and HOME programs within the County designated target areas and on the following designated activities: a. Housing Rehabilitation b. Emergency Housing Programs c. Parking and Drainage Improvements d. Water and Sanitary Sewer Improvements e. Clearance and Retention f. Land Acquisition g. Public Facilities

The County has reevaluated its original Environmental Assessment (EA) and it has determined that the environment will not be impacted by the proposed 1998-99 activities. The proposed activities will conform to all Federal, State and local Land Development Laws and Authorities, including the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended. An Environmental Review Report on the proposed activities is on file in the County's Community Development Office. Record documents the environmental review of the proposed activities and more fully sets forth the reasons why an EA is not required.

This environmental review record is on file and is available for public examination and copying upon request in writing, at Room 2001 of the Seminole County Services Building, 1101 East First Street, Sanford, Florida 32771, from January 6, 1999 through January 19, 1999, except on legal holidays. The current environmental record of such activities are prepared to be conducted prior to the request for the release of Federal funds.

Within the course of fiscal year 1998-99, environmental reviews will be made for activities with uncompleted bills such as housing related activities, activities having an emergency need and/or activities having any situation creating environmental conditions, or creation of a new set of environmental conditions. The Environmental Review will consist of a review of the state-by-state and a committee of environmental officials that will work in tandem with a review of the environmental impact on each activity selected, as described in 24 CFR 58, Environmental Review Procedures for the CDBG and Housing Development Grant Programs.

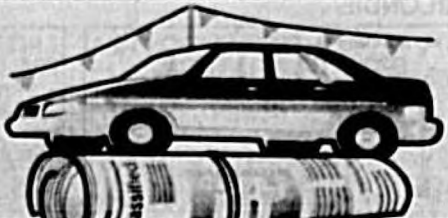

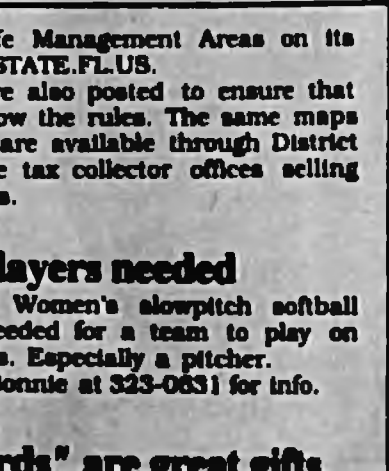

Miami, and Vinnie Testaverde, lost to someone back in the 80's, Florida was blow out by Nebraska and FSU this year.

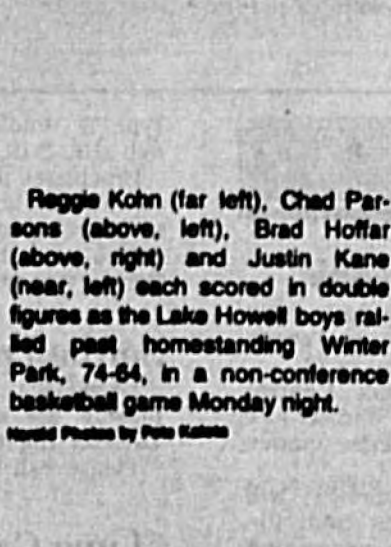
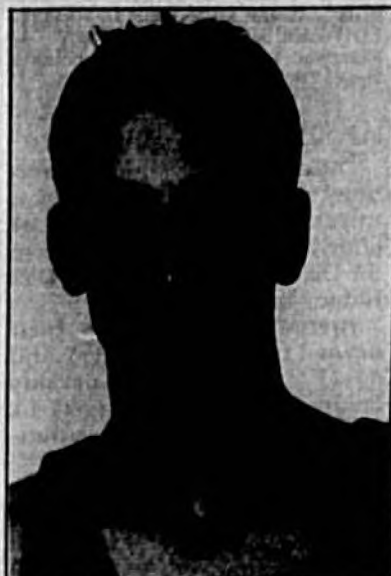
Get ready prep fans it's time for the Winter Sports season to get interesting.

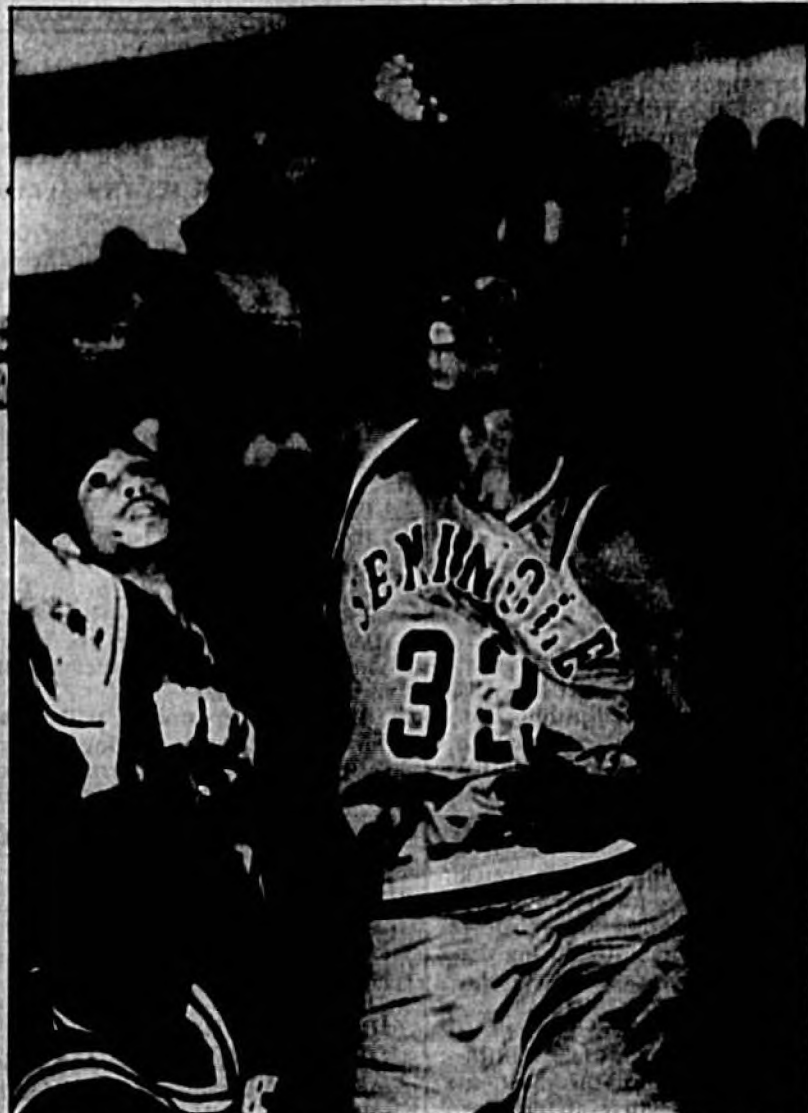

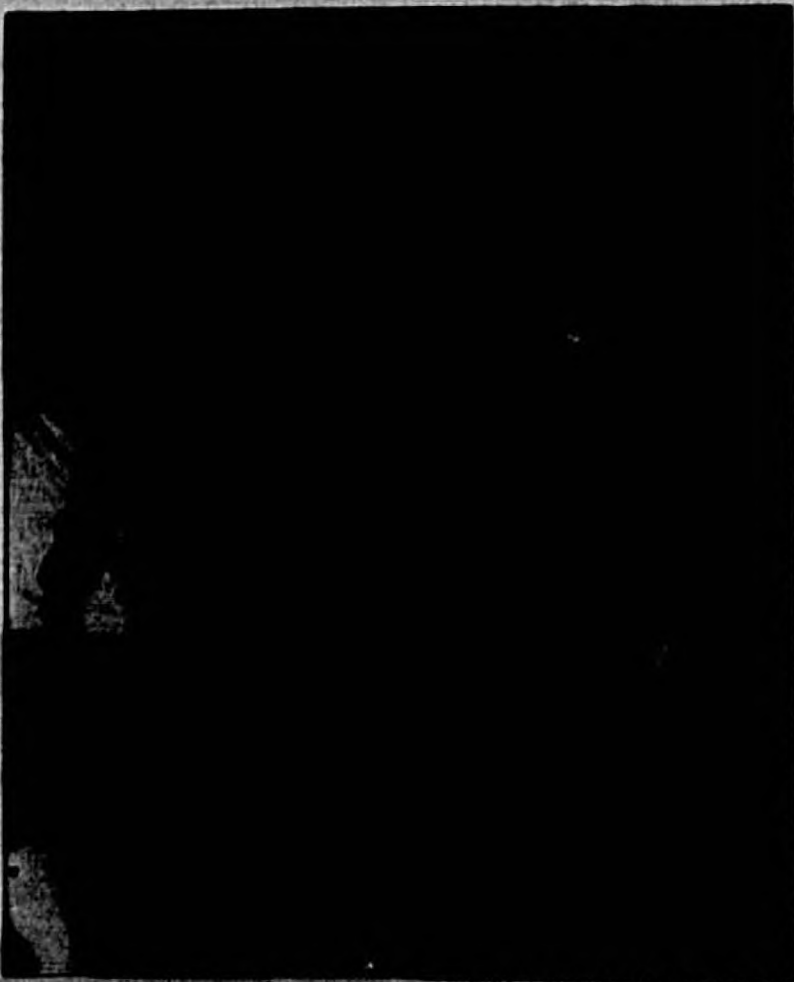

Center for Birds of Prey releases 200th bald eagle

WINTER PARK - Florida Audubon Society's Center for Birds of Prey will reach an important benchmark, as it released its 200th Bald Eagle back into the Florida sky. The release came only a day after the nation celebrated the 25th anniversary of the Endangered Species Act, one of the most effective pieces of legislation that has helped to protect the Bald Eagle and many struggling species and sub-species.

In Florida, Bald Eagles hit their low in 1962 with only 251 nesting pairs. Today, Florida boasts the largest population of Bald Eagles in the continental United States, with nearly 1,000 nesting pairs. Audubon's Center for Birds of Prey aided an increasing Bald Eagle population during recovery, by rehabilitating and reintroducing eagles back into the landscape.

"Now, more than ever, Audubon's experience in the eagle business is needed," said Resce Collins, Florida Audubon vice president and center director. "It took us 14 years to release our first hundred Bald Eagles, and only five more years to reach number 200," she said. Collins noted that other factors also played a role in this steep increase of releases: the increase in numbers of eagles, as well as the fact that more eagles are now found in urban areas, making them more vulnerable to collisions with cars and powerlines, accidental poisonings and shootings.

Lucky number 200 is an adult eagle nicknamed 'Stewart', who was recovered on a greenhouse roof in Oakland in Orange County. Although it remains unclear how he acquired his injuries, when found, Stewart was in mild shock, had blood in his throat, was weak in his right shoulder and capable of only short flights. After 2-1/2 weeks of treatment at the center, Stewart had recovered from his injuries and was ready for release.

Bob Lamb, vice president of Walt Disney World's Animal Kingdom, released the eagle near its recovery site. Disney is leading an effort to build the flight barn as part of Project Wingspread, a \$2 million project to enhance treatment of birds of prey and the education of Florida's citizens. The flight barn is a critical part of

The ultimate *Book of Arguments - 1,000 years, 1,000 people: Ranking the Men and Women Who Shaped the Millennium* - has scholars and historians at odds.

Who's to say whether Michelangelo was as important as Leonardo da Vinci or if Elizabeth I was the most significant woman of the millennium?

The top ten on the list are: Johannes Gutenberg, Christopher Columbus, Martin Luther, Galileo Galilei, William Shakespeare, Isaac Newton, Charles Darwin, Thomas Aquinas, Leonardo da Vinci and Ludwig van Beethoven.

Elizabeth I, who shaped the British Empire, was No. 31. In all, less than 15 percent of the 1,000 on the list are women.

"I can't believe they left out Oprah," joked Prof. Dick Crepeau, the History Chair at the University of Central Florida. Crepeau found the list more amusing than scholastic. "I'd drop Columbus on the list, and move up Newton and Darwin."

Any serious ranking of those who shaped the millennium would require study and comparisons of the fields and periods of the principals, Crepeau said. "If Beethoven and Bach are in the top 35, why isn't Mozart? And where is Henry Ford?"

The book starts with Gutenberg (No. 1) and his printing press and ends with pop artist Andy Warhol (No. 1000) and his silk screens. *Playboy founder Hugh Hefner* is No. 937 and Dr. Sues No. 998. Martin Luther King is No. 56, Marie Curie No. 75 and Joan of Arc No. 83.

Oprah didn't make the list and neither did Princess Diana, "who charmed the world but died too soon for lasting influence," according to the authors.

The problem the authors had with Oprah was that didn't believe her fame had moved out of America and that she was just a practitioner and not the one who invented the genre of talk television. "At the end of the millennium, she is the richest black woman in America and more powerful than the president," they conceded.

John F. Kennedy's legacy was defined as a "frat boy image and a presidency cut short." He missed the list. Jackie Onassis also missed the list.

Louis Armstrong was No. 322, Elvis Presley No. 352 and George Gerahwin No. 857 on the list. Frank Sinatra did not make the list nor did Nancy Sinatra. Bob Dylan was No. 888.

Adolph Hitler, the millennium's most evil, was No. 20 on the list. Genghis Khan was No. 43. Joseph Stalin wasn't evil enough?

Prof. Crepeau said he expected a bevy of millennium lists. "About the time the 17th comes out, people will be exhausted by the whole process," he said. "There's just so far you can go with this stuff."

We're sorry John Glenn wasn't reserved a space, too. Neil Armstrong is No. 696 and Yuri Gagarin is No. 499. Surely, Glenn could have orbited with the millennium's best.

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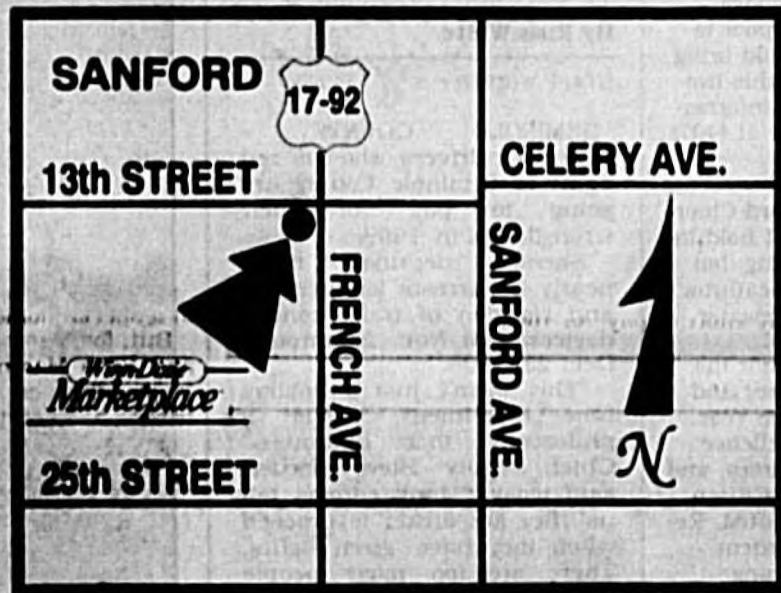

ful deal. But, when the chamber asks the commission to underwrite costs after the fact, that's a problem."

The \$5,000 request to the downtown CRA was based on an estimate by Florida Power & Lighting, Rose said. He said he did not learn the bill from FPL and Sanford Electric came to \$9,748 until after the \$5,000 had been approved by the CRA. Rose notified Sanford City Manager Tony VanDerworp of the total expense in a letter dated Dec. 11.

"I appreciate everything the city has done," Rose said. "I understand they are the stewards of the taxpayers. Their point was that they're tired of bailing everything out. This was not that issue. This lighting is an improvement to the city's infrastructure. Better downtown lighting is one reason the CRA was formed in the first place. I was not asking

them to bail me out."

VanDerworp said there was not enough time to get commission approval for the funds before the festival.

Larry Strickler, vice-chairman of the downtown CRA, said the CRA unanimously approved the funding so the festival would be able to install the infrastructure for metered commercial power at the festival's site of Palmetto Avenue and Sanford Avenue, rather than renting 20-25 generators.

Strickler said he considers the festival a success, and that Sanford is "lucky" to have Rose as the director of the chamber.

"The Heritage Festival would never have happened without Ron (Rose)," Strickler said. "On the shoe-string budget the chamber had, a lot of commissioners were surprised the festival went so well. I think Sanford needs more events like this to stimulate the downtown, maybe four or five per year."

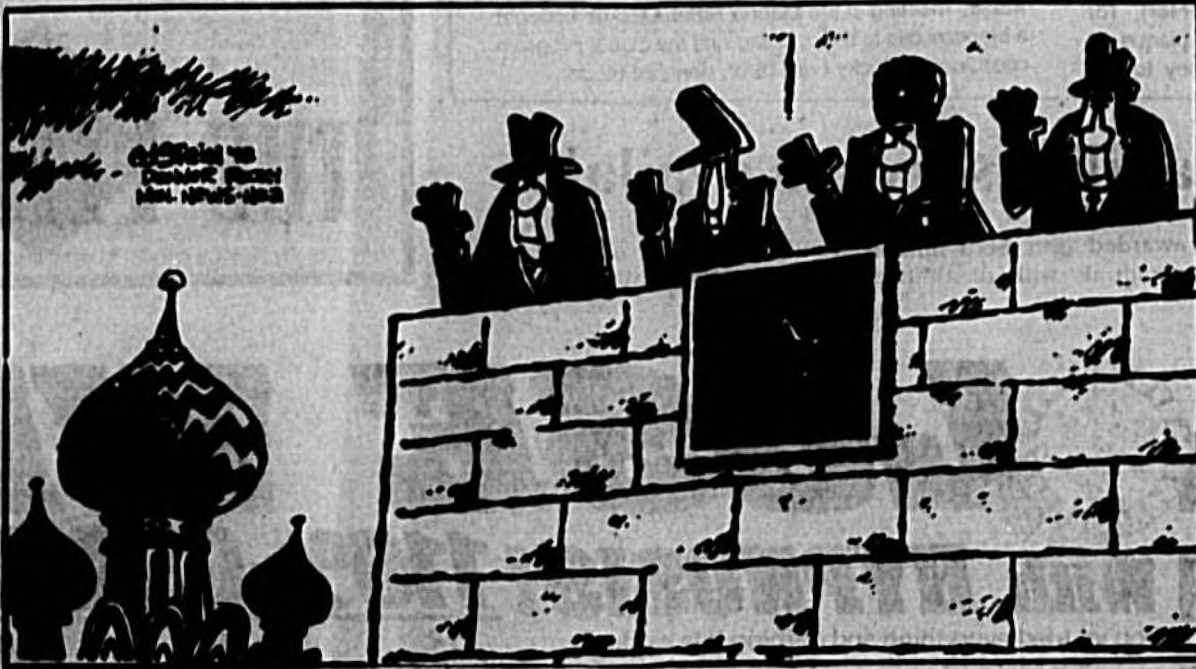

\$3,500.

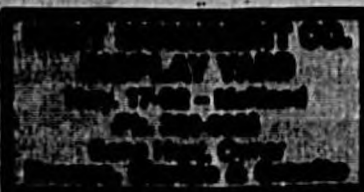

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Businesses lend a helping hand to chamber

SANFORD - Local businesses are volunteering to help the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce pay debts from the Heritage Festival held in November 1998.

The chamber is fielding calls from local businesses concerned about the more than

\$17,000 debt the chamber incurred from the Heritage Festival, now \$18,500 after the city commission agreed to pay \$5,000 last Monday.

The commission agreed to pay a portion of a \$9,748 electrical hook up expense from the festival. The city has also paid \$6,600 for other related festival costs.

"We are very grateful for everything the city has done for

us," said Ron Rose, executive director of the chamber. "I want to make that very clear."

Tory Russel of Russel Premium Finance agreed to donate \$1,000 at a fund raising meeting Tuesday, and Linda Johnson of William Howard Jewelers will donate \$300. Chamber members are writing letters and making phone calls for other donations, Rose said.

"We've been getting calls from

people who want to donate money," Rose said. "Our chamber is not in financial devastation. It's a hardship for us to fund what we thought the city would pay, but our doors are not about to close."

A Community Redevelopment Agency for Sanford's downtown and waterfront approved paying \$5,000 for electrical hookup on Nov. 4. Dale said only the commission has the authority to

approve city funding, not the CRA.

"The issue was why should taxpayers pay twice as much as what the CRA had approved," Dale said.

"The commission was taken by surprise. We had already paid for \$5,600 in in-kind costs. Nobody knew about this additional \$10,000. The festival was great, it was a wonderful

Run a red light? You are being watched

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Aggressive drivers who run red lights in Seminole County are going to pay for their wrongdoing in 1999.

Sheriff's deputies made nearly 400 arrests for speeding and violation of traffic control devices from Nov. 27 through Dec. 23, 1998.

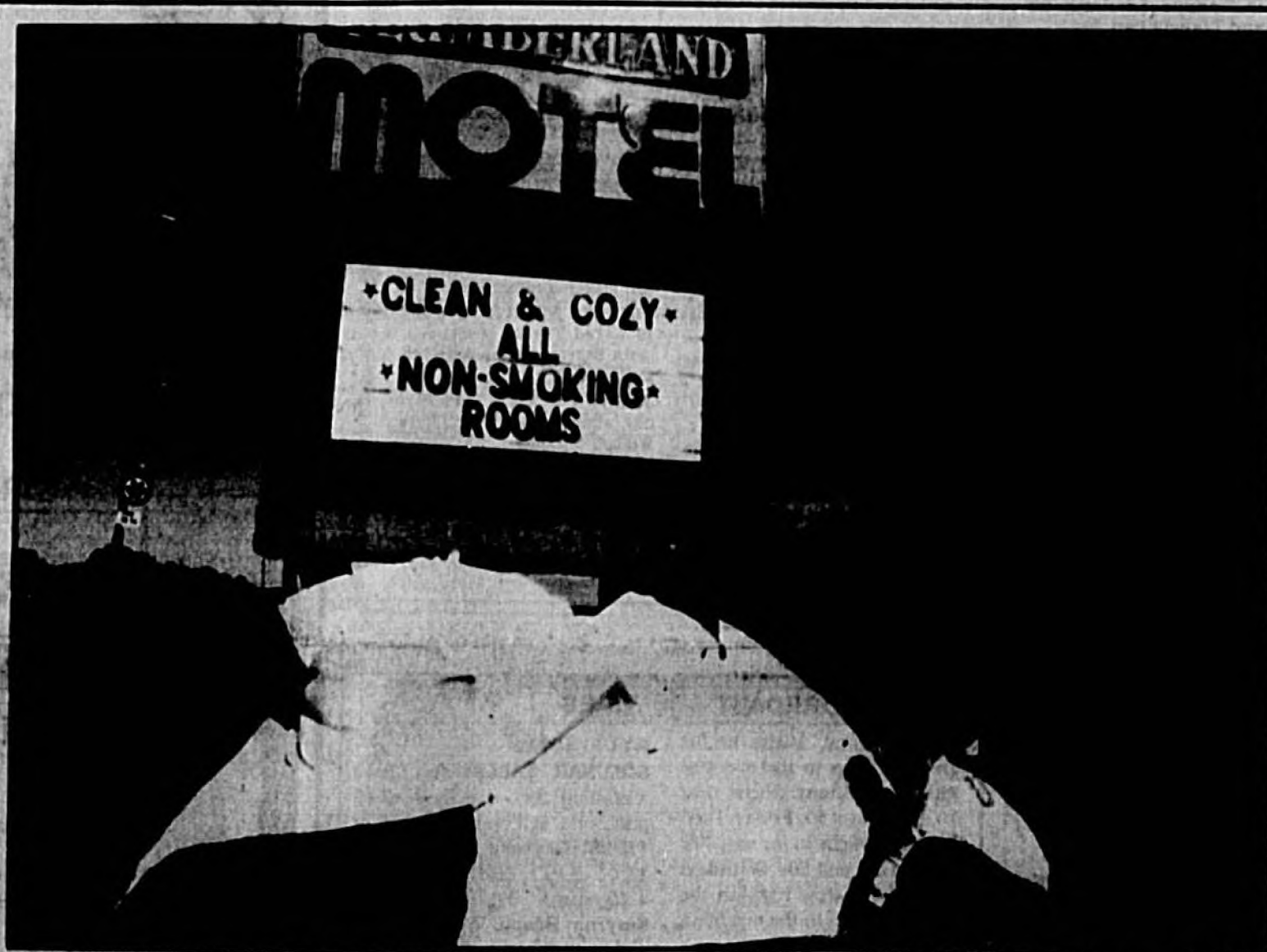
"This wasn't just a holiday time experiment. It is a philosophy that continues," Chief Deputy Steve Harriott said today. "Many citizens tell us they are afraid to proceed when they have green lights. There are too many people running the red lights. Sometimes three or four cars fail to stop."

The sheriff's office is working with each of the law enforcement agencies in the county and with the Florida Highway Patrol to make the roads safer. The situation has worsened as the amount of traffic increases and drivers get more aggressive.

"It's as if there is a big race and each driver wants to be in the lead," Harriott said. "Drivers are changing lanes erratically and trying to stay ahead of the next car. They dodge in and out to get a better position and they just keep on going even though a light has changed."

The sheriff's office identified a dozen of the most dangerous intersections in the county - areas where there have been a number of serious accidents. Monitoring these intersections lead to 189 VTCD citations (running red lights) in one month.

"Aggressive driving of this sort has not only caused accidents. Please see Drivers, Page 2A

Airport reports record revenues

SANFORD - The Sanford Airport Authority reported an 8-percent report last week for the period ending Sept. 30, showing a net income of \$210,000.

This year's revenues include the highest ground transportation and airfield revenues in the history of the airport. The airport made \$441,544 in ground transport revenues, and \$412,150 in airfield revenues. About 60 percent of the airport's revenues come from 67 million passengers last fiscal year, or 68 million.

The challenge for the airport, said Sanford Mayor Larry Sells, is to continue to grow and offset the loss of Sanford's Alameda to the Seminole County Airport. More than 20

percent of the customers at the airport were from Alameda, according to airport officials.

"Our revenues are under control," Sells said. "Finally, we're in a good spot. We're on our way to the future. February is how the loss of Alameda should be, and how we can offset it."

Operating revenues at the airport were just less than \$2.4 million, down from \$2.6 million the previous year. Operating expenses for the airport were \$2.2 million, or 92 percent of the previous year.

Operating revenues include the airport's share of the state's 2001-02 fiscal year. Airport officials say the state's share of the airport's operating revenues is set to increase to \$1.5 million in 2001-02.
