Mayors Say NYC Aid Severest MIAMI BEACH (AP) - Virtually without exception, the nation's mayors are confident that no other

city will seek the sort of federal aid which President Ford has proposed for New York. Interviews with more than a dozen mayors at the annual convention of the National League of Cities here showed two reasons for the officials' belief.

First, they say no city would willingly surrender as much control over its finances to state or federal governments as New York has been forced to yield. Second, in their view, no other city's financial problems are so severe, particularly because other cities have not borrowed to meet operating expenses to the extent that

Reagan also flatly ruled out the possibility that he would launch a third party campaign for the presidency. Appearing on ABC-TV's "Issues and Answers" program Sunday, the former California governor repeated his pledge not to criticize Ford or do anything to divide the Republican party.

Trooper Who Shot Wrong

Man Relieved Of Patrol Duty TALLAHASSEE (AP) - A Florida Highway

Patrol trooper who shot and killed a man he mistakenly thought was driving a stolen car was relieved of duty Patrol commander Eldridge Beach said trooper Robert

Rennie Jr. would remain on the payroll but would not report for duty while the Orange County Sheriff's office investigates the Saturday killing of Frank D. Booth, 50, of Titusville, head of the Brevard County emergency employment office. "We're going to relieve him of his duties until the com-

pletion of the investigation, which is routine," Beach said. Booth was shot after stopping his car on the side of the road while driving to the airport at Orlando to fly to Massachusetts for the funeral of his father, Frank D.

NYC's Problems Alert Cities

MIAMI BEACH (AP) - New York Mayor Abraham D. Beame said today that his city's financial problems have reawakened the nation to the problems of all American cities.

The Democratic mayor told nearly 3,000 mayors, city council members and other municipal officials at the National League of Cities' annual convention, "Our crisis has served to expand the national dialogue about the many problems besetting cities of all sizes and has reawakened a sense of urgency in dealing with them." In his prepared remarks, Beame told the audience that he hoped prompt passage of President Ford's loan program for New York would enable his city to re-enter

The law does not require financial reporting until a candidate declares his candidacy.

MIAMI (AP) - Before sunrise Last Christmas inorning, William Driggers climbed out of bed, stuck a pillow under the belt of his Santa Clause costume and drove to the home of a little boy he'd never met just to wake him up

Driggers, 40, is a Santa who makes housecalls. He goes to private homes, hospitals and other institutions, sometimes taking along his 10-year-old daughter, Susan, as Santa's elf.

"I enjoy making kids happy," Driggers says. "It's rewarding to see them smile. I try to get as much information as possible on a child before I go so that I can really talk to him."

Driggers, who works for a public relations firm, says he charges clients who can pay just enough to cover transportation and "something for my time."

Hurricane Trend Weakening MIAMI (AP) - Despite the killer hurricane E oise, the

1975 Atlantic season continued a trend that has seen fewer and weaker hurricanes than in the past, the head of the National Hurricane Center says. "In the past few years, there hasn't been a super

hurricane, but we don't know when the lull will end," Neil Frank said as the season officially closed Sunday after spawning six hurricanes and two other named storms. Frank said the season kept up the pattern of the past four or five years where the major storms formed in the Gulf of Mexico instead of coming to life in the deep tropics and strengthening in a race across the Atlantic.

Ronald Reagan has made it official. He is a candidate for the Republican nomination for president in 1976. That's bad news for President Ford. It doesn't help an incumbent president to be opposed for renomination in the primaries. In 1952, Harry Truman pulled out after Estes Kefauver did well in the New Hampshire primary. In 1968, Lyndon Johnson pulled out after Eugene McCarthy did well in that large retail chain.

Mr. Ford is more vulnerable than your average president because he fell into the White House by appointment and has never conducted a national campaign.

Reagan is more formidable than your average challenger and must not be underrated as a campaigner. His campaigns of 1966 and 1970 for the governorship of California were models of the campaigning art. He can charm the electorate with his star status, a lopsided grin and the fastest quip in the West.

And this time Reagan is not playing the role he played in 1968, when he refused to admit he was running for president until the Republican convention had begun in Miami Beach. That was a less-than-candid performance, and as it turned out it did Reagan's political reputation no credit.

This time the former governor is going all out. The Ford strategy was to discourage the Reagan candidacy.
