

### Hoffa Backs Up After Challenge From Own Men

WASHINGTON (UPI) — James R. Hoffa appeared today to be losing the iron grip he has held on the leadership of the 1.5 million-member Teamsters Union.

The beleaguered Teamsters boss has cut himself off — at least temporarily — from further use of union funds to pay his heavy legal bills. He made the move after his right to have the union pay his legal bills was challenged by other Teamsters officials.

In labor circles this challenge to Hoffa was regarded as one of the strongest threats to his leadership in many years.

Hoffa, who has been convicted of jury tampering and sentenced to eight years in prison, is now on trial in Chicago on charges of defrauding labor-management trustees of a Teamsters pension fund.

Teamsters vice president John J. O'Rourke had demanded that the international union stop paying Hoffa's legal expenses until its 15-man executive board can decide whether this conforms with federal law.

Hoffa ordered the suspension of legal payments until a legal expert unconnected with the union can review the matter and decide. The expert has not yet been chosen.

### Miami Stripper's Poetic License Not Enough

MIAMI (UPI) — It was all right for her to strip to the waist in a bar, bosomy waitress Merry Elder told a judge: "I have an entertainer's license."

The pretty blonde, who said she models brassieres as a sideline, had been haled before Justice of the Peace Hugh Duval on charges of lewd and lascivious conduct, using obscene language and serving drinks while still a minor.

State beverage agents testified they arrested Miss Elder at a North Miami bar last month after she stood beneath a spotlight, "took off her blouse and shook," all the while shouting obscenities at customers.

"It was all part of my act" and permissible "under an entertainer's license, like a poetic license, you know," Miss Elder explained to Duval. "I'm a poor man's Belle Barth."

Belle Barth, someone offered, was an entertainer specializing in "blue" routines. Asked her age, Miss Elder told Duval, "I'm 23."

"She's 19," agents said. Duval dismissed the liquor count and dropped the vagrancy charge, but he bound her over to criminal court on the lewdness charges.

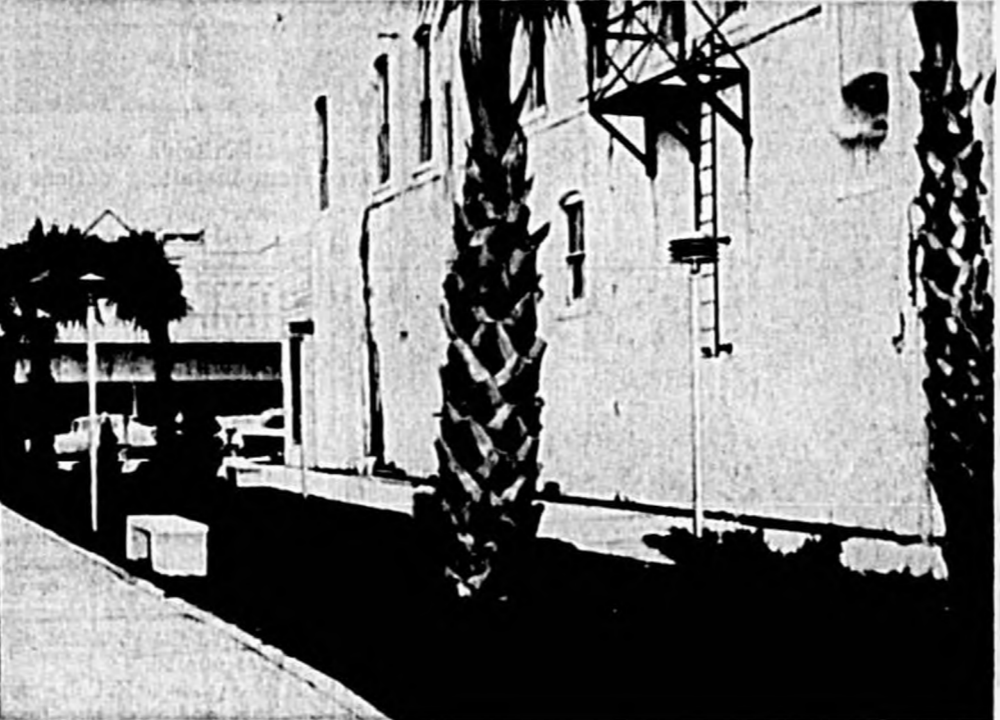

## Altamonte Fire Volunteer Takes Over As Chief

A volunteer fireman volunteered to take over the helm of the Altamonte Springs Volunteer Fire Department and he was accepted by the Town Council Wednesday night.

The new fire chief is Howard Willoughby who cited the urgent need "as I see it" for a positive reorganization of the department.

Altamonte Springs has been plagued with fire department troubles for the past several weeks. Resignations and threats of resignations have besieged the council and as of last night the city was without a fire chief.

Mayor Lawrence Swofford noted the city has "had a real problem; lots of chiefs but no Indians. The main thing is organization."

He assured Chief Willoughby he would have "a free hand from the mayor's office."

The chief emphasized such reorganization would "take time, but I'm willing to learn." He recalled his background as a fireman and told the council he has not had top level management of a department.

He was appointed with unanimous consent of the council.

Town Atty. Joe Davis was authorized to write to the IHFA telling it of the council's position.

South Seminole communities had considered getting funds from IHFA to draw up plans for a natural gas system to serve that area.

## Citrus Men Fight Tariff Slash

WASHINGTON (UPI) — American citrus industry officials met with U. S. trade negotiator Christian A. Herter Wednesday, seeking his support to block proposed reductions in citrus tariffs.

Industry officials told Herter, the President's special representative for trade negotiations, that U. S. citrus producers have nothing to gain from a tariff reduction, but a great deal to lose.

## Bryan Seen In Area Day Child Disappeared

ST. PETERSBURG (UPI) — Police Chief Harold G. Smith announced today that the body of 7-year-old Lewis (Hackle) Wilson has been found a few miles south of Venice.

The boy had been missing since March 23.

Official reports said that Joseph Francis Bryan Jr., captured in New Orleans Tuesday and accused as the kidnaper of one child and the killer of another, had been seen in St. Petersburg on the same day.

Sarasota County Sheriff Ross E. Boyer said Bryan also was "definitely placed" in the Venice area on March 24.

Bryan was captured in New Orleans with an 8-year-old boy he is charged with abducting from his Tennessee home. He also is accused of kidnapping a 10-year-old South Carolina boy in February.

The latter's skeleton was found March 31 at Hallandale, near Miami.

The Wilson boy last was seen about two blocks from his home as he returned from school. He was the son of a St. Petersburg fireman.

Today's search was centered in an area where a man identified as Bryan called for assistance March 24 to get his car pulled free from sand.

Authorities in New Orleans are questioning Bryan about the disappearance of the Wilson boy.

Boyer said Bryan was positively identified by the service station attendant who pulled his car out of the sand. The attendant said there was no boy with Bryan at the time.

Boyer said Bryan purchased a tire and tube from the service station, using a stolen credit card.

The search was centered six-tenths of a mile south of the intersection of State Road 775 and U. S. 41 south of Venice.

An agent in Tampa said FBI agents in West Virginia found a 1959 Buick that was traced to Bryan. They also discovered he was using a stolen credit card.

The FBI began to follow his trail by the purchases he made with the credit card.

This led first to St. Petersburg, where Bryan made a purchase March 23, the day the Wilson boy vanished.

Further reports showed purchases at Venice, Port Meyers, Punta Gorda and several other cities on March 24 and 25.

## Shoot-To-Kill Order Sought

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — Secretary General Thant today was reported under increasing pressure to authorize the United Nations peace force in Cyprus to shoot to kill to prevent major violence on the Mediterranean island.

Informed sources said Thant, though he is alarmed at the continued fighting on Cyprus, is reluctant to issue orders for the peace force to start shooting for fear of exceeding his mandate in the crisis.

## Constable Held

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant today suspended Okaloosa County Constable Allyn B. Broxson from office on grounds he had been arrested on charges of theft of government property.

## High Promises Watchdog For State's Money

Miami Mayor Robert King High promised today to create a public advocate if elected governor to sit in on all state spending sessions on behalf of the people.

"The people will know where their tax monies are going, and why," he said.

High, concentrating on populous Dade County, his home, said his main goals will be improving the state's education system, finding new ways to attract industry, and creating the public advocate's post, which he described as "a people's lobbyist."

Sen. Scott Kelly of Lakeland, touring Dade and Broward counties, promised to have Interstate Highway I-95 completed "even if I have to go to court to get it done."

"Regardless of what commitments the present administration has made with the bondholders of the toll roads, they will be completed during my term," he said.

Sen. John Matthews Jr. of Jacksonville, his voice showing the strain of less than three hours sleep, took his campaign to the University of Florida, hitting at the "wild promises" of some of his opponents and again singling out Fred O. Dickinson of West Palm Beach for special comment.

"I have made only one promise in this campaign," Matthews said. "That is the promise to exert every talent I have toward bringing Florida good government."

Matthews drew barbs from Rep. Fred Karl of Daytona Beach, who inferred in talks at St. Petersburg that he is tired of "Senator Matthews running on my program."

Dickinson campaigned in the Florida Keys Wednesday, slamming Karl for "low-level" tactics in saying Dickinson opposed extension of Interstate Highway 95 down the entire east coast of the state.

Mayor Hayden Burns of Jacksonville was in Broward County Wednesday, defending the Duval County school system against attacks and saying whatever its faults are the main fault "is in the failure of the state to provide adequate taxation" to finance school needs.

He said the state's tax structure "is as archaic as the Constitution," and that both need revising.

## Sanford Native Ends Navy Career At NAS

Cdr. H. A. (Speed) Moreland, a native of Sanford who devoted 20 years to Naval Aviation, today retired after nearly five years of service at the Sanford Naval Air Station.

He was piped over the side in traditional Navy style during brief ceremonies in front of the station's administration building. Eight fellow officers formed a double "sideboy" column, saluting the Commander as he passed by his mates for the last time.

Earlier he had reviewed the assembled staff officers and enlisted personnel in company with Capt. James O. Mayo, Commander Heavy Attack Wing One.

For the past year Cdr. Moreland served as Readiness Officer of Heavy Attack Wing One, the staff's third ranking position. He served two tours each with Heavy Attack Squadron Three (VAH-3) and VAH-7 plus an additional tour with the Wing staff.

During the 10th Annual Bombing Derby at NAS Sanford in March, Moreland was publicly commended by Capt. Mayo for his contributions to the development and testing of many airborne weapons systems and for his "wise counsel and effective action" in helping to introduce the new RA-5C Vigilante into use with Sanford-based units.

The commendation concluded: "Well done, Commander Moreland. Go in peace with the greatest prize of all, the eternal high regard of your fellow men."

Moreland, 38, attended schools in Sanford and was graduated from Seminole High in 1943 after playing on the Seminoles' football team. In the fall he entered Naval flight training, commencing a career that was to span and include service in the development of jet aviation for U. S. carrier air forces.

In 1948 he married a Sanford girl, Camille Patton. The couple and their three children, James 13, Michele 12 and Richard 5, have resided at their current Celery Avenue address since 1959.

The Naval officer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Moreland Sr., live at 1110 Palmetto Avenue.

"Retirement" plans for Commander Moreland include a position with a Winter Park securities brokers.

If these statements are as old as the hills, let us venerate their age, not their logic. Generally, the man who defends every man's right to his opinion has never had one. He owns a pet collection of cliches, some inherited hisses and a home-grown thickheadedness. An opinion is a conclusion you reach after a fair study of evidence FOR and evidence AGAINST. So what our friend is really saying is: "Every man has a right to his own whatever-comes-into-his-head." The fallacy is trying to palm this off as opinion.

The worried mother-in-law sets out to prove that her son-in-law will make a poor father. She does make a good point: he is an awful carpenter. But she doesn't prove the point she is trying to make. Poor Algeron came before all the school trouble. Everyone knows that a cause always comes before an effect, but you can't say that everything that precedes the effect is its cause. It's like saying in a political essay: "There was no dope traffic in this town till Mayor Allgood took office," or "We never had a tornado here until coffee-vending machines were introduced."

Try this one out. You hear it every day in the week. "Every man has a right to a living wage." Does he? Think again. Shouldn't that statement be "every man has a right TO EARN a living wage" or "Every FULLY EMPLOYED man has a right to a living wage."?

Here's a real beauty. "This is a free country, so I have a right to do what I darn well please." The teacher in the first grade tried to get through to this fellow when he raised his hand to ask, "Can I leave the room?" The teacher said what they all say: "You can, but you may not." The teacher was trying to get across the difference between ABILITY and RIGHT. Now you have to straighten out your friend and tell him that, free country or not, he is ABLE to do what he darn well pleases; he has a RIGHT to do only what the law, morals and convention darn well please. In all such statements (and they will appear in the most respectable writing with somewhat more sophistica-

tion), ask yourself two questions: What does he say he's proving? What is he really proving?

There are other everyday gems of illogic that few ever detect. Let's try more. "This paper is losing patience with those doctors who oppose water fluoridation in the face of the testimony of so many experts." Looks harmless, but it's what is called the "vicious circle." In calling some men "experts" the writer is ASSUMING the good of fluoridation—because they are no experts if fluoridation is not all they say it is. The writer is assuming as proved exactly what he's trying to prove.

Somewhat along the same line, but a different fallacy, is the pretty cued who reinforces her case against capital punishment by quoting Marlon Brando and Steve Allen. She would be just as logical if she asked Dr. Albert Schweitzer to make the final selection of this year's top 10 pop tunes. Schweitzer is as much of a hep cat as Brando is a criminologist. No man is an authority once he leaves his field.

In critical reading learn to examine and question general statements, especially the sacred cows most people utter. (You should have read this column in 63 seconds.) (NEXT: Some Silly Thinking.)

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Labor Department has bad news for President Johnson's advancement of women campaign—too many men.

The word is that men are expected to provide tougher competition for women seeking jobs in the decade ahead. In fact, many of the men are going to be looking for work in professions that women have long dominated. School teachers, social workers and librarians, for example.

At the same time, the girls are making only small and insignificant gains in the types of jobs traditionally held by their husbands: engineers, accountants and physicians.

Labor Department experts say this is so "despite the publicity given the growing acceptance of women in the occupations once reserved exclusively for men."

They didn't say how to solve the problems this poses for Johnson, who wants to emphasize the importance of women in government.

Private employers are said

to prefer men because women are always leaving to get married, have babies and raise their children. The President's own job offers get turned down for the same reasons sometimes.

Besides, the Labor Department study says, women rarely plan a lifetime career because they expect and hope to get married. Almost all of them do. Finally, some bosses just do not like to have women around.

The figures indicate there will be plenty of college-trained women available during the 1970s. Women now receive two out of every five college degrees awarded in the United States. There will be about 3 million working women with a sheepskin by 1975 — an increase of 800,000.

But the number of men with college training is expected to climb even more — up by 2 million to 7 million during the next 11 years.

Pay is another problem for the college girl. The Labor Department says she earns "considerably less" than her male counterpart in the same job.

For example, a typical male doctor earned \$14,784 in 1959 but his female counterpart took in just \$6,562. Among authors, editors and reporters the typical man was paid \$7,151; the woman in the field got \$3,172.

### FBI Studies Bryan's Activities

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — FBI agents sought today to link Joseph Francis Bryan Jr., accused of kidnaping a Tennessee boy, with the disappearance of other children.

Bryan, a former mental patient, was being held in \$150,000 bond on charges of kidnaping eight-year-old Dennis Burke of Humboldt, Tenn., who has been returned unharmed to his parents.

But another of Bryan's alleged victims, 10-year-old John David Robison of Mount Pleasant, S. C., was found dead in a mangrove swamp near Hallandale March 31. The boy disappeared Feb. 27 as he rode his bicycle near Mount Pleasant.

Bryan, 25, and a sandy-haired native of New Jersey and former convict in Nevada, was taken chained and sullen before U. S. Commissioner Fritz Windhorst here Wednesday.

He asked for an attorney and Windhorst gave him until Monday to get one. His bond was continued at \$150,000.

The FBI said it is investigating possible links between Bryan and other missing boys, specifically the disappearance

of Lewis (Hackie) Wilson, seven, in St. Petersburg, and eight-year-old David Wulff in Willingboro, N. Y. The FBI was also interested in another report that placed a small boy with Bryan in Theodore, Ala., after the Robison child's death.

The 4-0 win for San Francisco was their first shutout of the year elevating Mays' batting average for the season, 11 games so far, to .488, tops in the National League.

## Dodger-Giant Pay TV Set For Fast Start On Coast

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Without good attractions, how can you persuade home television sports viewers to pay for what they get now for nothing?

And without home viewers to pay for them, how are you going to get the good attractions?

It's like the old puzzle, "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?"

"I think we have it licked," said Harold Weissman, assistant director of sports for Subscription Television, Inc. "We have the Dodgers and the Giants and will have about 24,000 home sets wired for pay in Los Angeles and San Francisco—two of the hottest baseball cities in the country, by the time we are ready to go on the air in July.

"And we're not going to hurt the live gate," he added defensively, "there or anywhere else. We're just an extension of the regular box office, and we're going to fatten it, not bleed it to death."

STV has a 15-year deal with the world champions and the Giants—hard five-year contracts with two five-year options. Both clubs own stock and share in the proceeds from the viewers.

"We have that other necessary ingredient, too—money," continued Weissman. "Last fall we issued \$21 million in stock—and it was subscribed in less than a week. An electronics firm and one that specializes in billing are part of our setup so we are certain to have mechanical facilities."

STV operates on a little electronic gadget about the size of a cigar box which has three dials — one for each channel they will use. The gadget can be installed on any home set for \$10. After that, the subscriber pays \$1 a week for maintenance and approximately general admission cost for each sports event he tunes in. The first 65,000 subscribers in each area will pay only \$5 for installation and the maintenance fee will be waived for 32 weeks for them.

STV will telecast home games between the Dodgers and Giants. The clubs are committed to free television on away-from-home games this year. After that there will be nothing on free television.

"We can make 5,000 new installations a month in Los Angeles," said Weissman, "and perhaps 7,500 in San Francisco, because homes are more concentrated. Within 3 years we hope to have two-thirds of all the homes in the two cities set up for STV."

Walter O'Malley, Grand Panjandrum of the Dodgers, agrees completely with the belief that home pay television will help, rather than hurt, the box office.

"I have figures to show that radio, because it was more or less a leaser and didn't give the listener the whole aspect of the game—helped build patronage. I also have figures to show that free television eliminated a

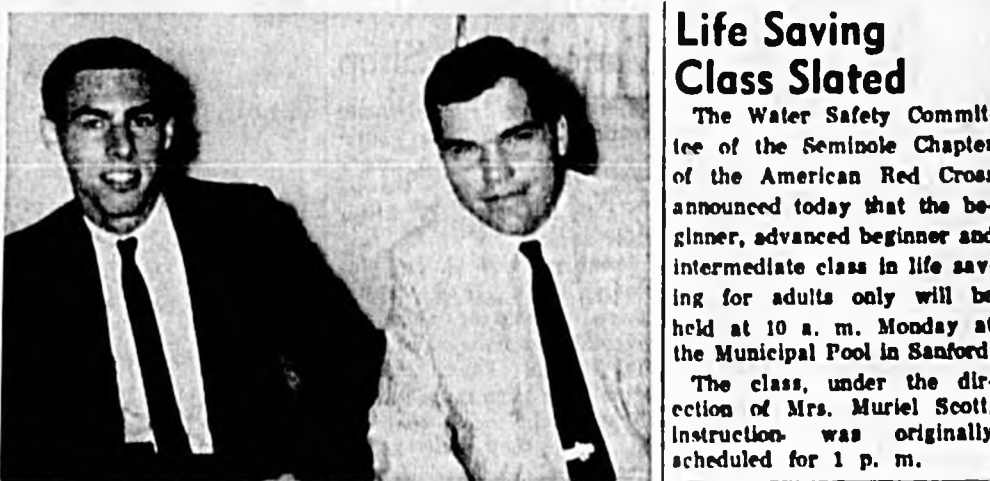
