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Charter change receives final approval

SANFORD - The decision to change the city's form of government will now be decided by voters.

In another split vote, Commission approved on second reading an ordinance that proposes a change in the city's charter. transforming the system of government from its current city manager-commission structure to a strong-mayor form of govern-ment. It will now be up to the voters, who will head to the polls on March 4, whether the change will be adopted.

Mayor Brady Lessard proposed the char-

During Monday's meeting, several residents spoke out against the change, including Henry Sweet. As a former member of a

city Charter Review Committee, he questioned why another committee wasn't established to study the proposed change in gov-

"I felt compelled to express my feelings about the way you are bringing this about" Sweet said. "It has problems in it. This should have gone through Charter Review."

Other residents expressed their concerns about the time between Commission's approval of the ordinance and the March election. They feel there isn't enough time to inform citizens about the referendum or to decide on specifics for the new form of gov-

Christmas trees become fire hazard after holiday

The Seminole County Fire Department is urging residents to dispose of Christmas trees imme-

diately after the holiday.

According to Fire Chief Terry L. Schenk, without fail, the most flammable object inside the home this time of year are Christmas trees. Most trees will last for a few months inside a home if watered

After the holiday season of 2001, the first department acquired a few different types of Christmas trees to see exactly how fast one would flare up. On average, with-in 10 to 20 seconds of coming in contact with a heating source, each Christmas tree was completely engulfed by fire. In a normal room, that would mean heavy smoke, temperatures reach-ing 250 degrees and flames within 30 seconds. The explosion of fire

and smoke is too fast to allow a homeowner time needed to get a fire extinguisher or call the fire

department.
The first rule of tree disposal – never put the tree or branches in a fireplace or wood burning stove. The fire could extend beyond the fire line could extend beyond the fireplace or stove and leave your home in ashes. Using your tree as much could help your garden grow. You can either grind the entire tree into small pieces (tree chippers are available for rent at equipment rental stores), or cut off the main branches of the tree and reserve the trunk for use as firewood. Tree branches make light mulch that won't compact when wet - the way denser organic mulches do.

It only takes seconds for a tree to destroy a home. If your Christmas tree shows signs of being dry, dispose of it immediate-

Local reservists prepare for deployment

deployment. According to Specialist Thomas Kielbasa of the Department of Military Affairs, Florida National Guard, Public Affairs Office in St. Augustine, these reservists have been called to active duty in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

The Bravo Company, 2nd Battalion, 124th Infantry Regiment, are smong more than 1,200 reservists throughout Florida who received alert orders on Dec. 16 and were given mobilization

orders Thursday. The soldlers gathering in Sanford make up the 2nd Battallon, headquar-tered in Orlando. Along with the 3rd Battalion, headquartered in Panama City, these soldiers are part of the 53rd Separate Brigade in Tampa, the largest major command for a National Guard unit.

"The Florida National Guard is Imbedded in the community," said Kielbasa. "This will affect families and employers in communities throughout Florida."

According to Kielbasa, no specific dates or routes can be given, but all soldiers must report to Fort Stewart in Georgia for final mobiliza-tion no later than Jan. 5. At that time, the soldiers will receive additional briefings, training and review of

records. "These soldiers were at Fort Stewart this summer," said Specialist Kielbasa. "They are very well trained

and very skilled." According to federal law, reservists can be on active duty for as long as one year. However, the president can lengthen that time as need-

"We're preparing for the worse as far as length of time we will be gone," said Capt. Hank Bolduc of Sanford.

"We are prepared to go wherever they want us to." According to Specialist Kielbasa, this is the largest mobilization of the Florida Army National Guard since World War II and the first time for federal activation since World War II.

Mayoral move?: Speaking of best dressed, the Sharp Dressed Man, aka Thom Greene, may have more than a passing interest in what happens with the city of Sanford's upcoming referendum on a strong mayor form of gov-

Greene is the mayor of Lake Mary, but he has strong ties to the Celery City. His law office is on 1st Street across from Fort Mellon Park and he lived in Sanford for a time. At a holiday open house for Community National Bank, Greene was asked about the ongoing Sanford debate. He smiled and said, "Maybe I'll run."

Was he joking? Probably. He was more serious about what it will take to attract good candidates should the city adopt a form of government which requires the mayor to run the city. For starters, he believes the salary has to be at least in the low six-figures. Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard, who proposed the strong mayor form of government, has suggested the salary should be in the neighborhood of \$75,000 a year. Any higher, Lessard says, and the city runs the risk of making job about the money rather than public service.

The city of Sanford has nearly 500 employces, and Greene points out that top managers operating that size company in the private sector earn well more than \$75,000. Sanford City Manager Tony VanDerworp earns about \$110,000 annually. A strong mayor would per-form the functions of a city manager, so Greene's argument is not without merit.

Where will the salary be set? That's something commissioners will determine in the coming month, but I'm betting it will be closer to \$75,000 than \$100,000.



run the same story all over again.



'Publish What You Pay' one way to help

Last summer, hundreds of Nigerian women staged a striking protest at big petroleum compa-nies located in their coun-

try's oil-rich southern delta. The women, desperately poor despite the oil resources of their region, blocked the gates of corporate compounds and threatened to take off their clothes if ChevronTexaco and Royal Dutch/Shell didn't fund local development initiatives.

Sure, it sounds like a "Saturday Night Live" skit. But the threat of public nudity worked.

The speciacle of women as old as 90 stripping off their clothes would have embarrassed corpo-rate executives (and cursed them, according to local tradition), so to fend it off they agreed to employ more local people, invest in infrastructure such as electric power lines, and help the villagers start fish farms and other agricultural

However, the success of that one protest hardly eliminates the poverty that is endemic to so

many resource-rich but undeveloped countries. While multinational oil and mining companies
pay billions to assorted

Third World generals and presidents-for-life, the presidents-for-life, the money rarely buys schools or hospitals or highways. Instead, it is siphoned off to corrupt politicians' private, off-shore accounts. By some estimates, the late Nigerian strongman Sani Abacha, who died in 1998, stole \$3 billion during his five years in power. And five years in power. And Nigeria remains impover-ished despite its peirole-

That's why a campaign called "Publish What You Pay" is so important. Backed by philanthropist George Soros and several international human rights and ald groups, the campaign insists that oil and mining companies disclare the payments they make to national governments for the

rights to natural resources. At the very load, affluent nations can pressure Third World dictators to spend the money on development.

President Bush ought to lend

his influence to the cause. While the president has lately taken to claiming support for human rights around the world — he often cites Saddam Hussein's use of chemical weapons "against his own people"
— he has done little to boost democracy and development in poor countries.

That is especially true of Africa. President Bush has given AIDS funding short shrift and has barely troubled himself with slavery in the Sudan, the thuggery of Zimbabwe's dictator Robert Mugabe or civil wars throughout West Africa. While South African officials hoped to raise the profile of their country with a visit from Bush in January, the White House has announced that the president, citing a possible war with Iraq, has canceled his planned trip to

If President Bush is serious about stressing human rights — and not just using the cause to win support for toppling Saddam — he should put his considerable influence behind the "Publish What You Pay" campaign. As a former Texas oilman, the president would bring an extra credi-

bility to the cause. It won't be an easy campaign to win. Multinational companies don't want to change because they find it easy to do business with dictators. As long as tyrants are paid off, they don't demand environmental protections or health and safety regulations. And they put their armies to work protect- .

put their armies to work protecting corporate interests.

Dictators in resource-rich countries will also resist. The last thing they want is to have to disclose the riches they have looted. While few of them go to great lengths to conceal their theft, they haven't been subjected to the indignity of having actual numbers publicized, either.

But President Bush has remarkable personal appeal at the

remarkable personal appeal at the moment — political capital that he ought to be willing to use to do some good in the world. The Publish What You Pay" campaign presents a chanculto battle tyran-ny and oppression without sending American soldiers as war, mid Compared in Iraq, this one is a

A nation of servants

The newest thing in the "Park" cities, Vice President Cheney's old neighborhood, is "wrapping rooms." Friends tell me that some people are glassing-in small porches or even building small additions to big homes for permanent space filled with worktables, rolls of wrapping paper, cutters, ribbons and all that.

It seems that social sea-Il seems that social seasons never end anymore among the rich. Folks in plush enclaves of Dallas, particularly Highland Park (that's where the Cheneys lived in his oil days) and the better parts of University Park, are well beyond killer kitchens and Roman baths. Now entertainment, stifts and one-upsmanship are an Reeves gifts and one-upsmanship are an everyday thing, and strivers judge each other not by clothes alone, or

personal trainers, or wine cellars, but by how they wrap little things from Neiman Marcus or Saks. They seem to be beyond New York, too. At least I have never heard of wrapping rooms in Manhattan or Scarsdale, though it is very possible I am living in the wrong part of town. During Christmas party season, my teenage daughter answered an RSVP-seeking call from someone who asked, Are you the social secretary?" That, I think, is as far as things have gone in the East. People have full- or part-time secretaries who handle invitations, food, flowers and all

This is no small thing. The rich are doing their duty is this era of trickle-down economics. In the days leading up to Christmas, the news, print and electronic, was full of patriotic messages chiding us all, rich and poor alike, to spend all we could earn or borrow from Visa or Mastercard (at Malia rates of 20percent-and-more interest). An out-fit called ShopperTrak, using Department of Commerce and point-of-sales statistics, was widely cited, reminding us that we were not spending enough. The country might go into recession if we continued to hold onto our dollars.

Suddenly, it seems, the American economy is not about production, ingenuity and trade Consumption above all is our new charge. Remember the good old days when they used to yell at us that we weren't saving enough and the Japanese were - to give

American industry and banks and such enough money to invest in research and the future? Our betters

were concerned that we would be reduced to a nation flipping hamburg-ers for each other.

Now all we have to do is spend — and then everything will be OK. Easy.

Investment now, at least in the reign of Bush, is about cutting taxes on the rich, who will, presumably, then hire us as wrappers, trainers, secretaries, drivers, nannies and dog-

washers and -walkers. The money to pay us — which we must spend immediately - will come from eliminating or cutting the taxes on high incomes, investments, dividends, and the estates of what the president's father, former president George H.W. Bush, liked to call the "investing classes."


The rest of us can be a nation of servants. Actually, In this new age, we will be less than servants. The code of old-time servitude meant that the more marginal classes were sort of adopted by the rich, provided with some security in terms of medical care and old age. That has changed. You're on your own, buddy! The new servers are, more often than not, independent contractors - "independent contractors" is usually a cuphemism for "no benefits" — who are, more often than not, paid in cash. Many in the investing classes hate government interference in the workplace, but demand government responsibility for the health and maintenance of the serving class.

So, the way it works is this: Lower taxes on the rich free up the money to hire the poor to run their errands and tone their bodies, and the marginal classes have second and third serving-job opportunities. And if the serving classes spend and spend and borrow and borrow which, of course, is exactly what the new Bush administration is doing - the whole thing looks pretty good for a while. A while, however, ends when the new ser-vants become old folks with health problems and personal debts they

can't pay.

The Way We Were: The Sanford men of World War II

Many more men from Sanford were leaving for the war during April through May of 1942. The Sanford Naval Air Station was being built and service-

men began arriving. The civilian population in Sanford was beginning to cope with rationing, blackouts and other inconveniences while they collected scrap metal. Ordinary life went on, though touched by war in business, politics and organizations. So much was happening during this time period

that it will take two columns to bring it to you. Again, this comes from Peter Schaal's "Sanford During the World War II Years 1936-45".

Beginnings of Sanford NAS On April 3, 1942, Hubbard Company poured limerock for two 4,000 foot runways at the airport. Walt and Sinclair Construction Company and Beicher Oil Company were awarded contracts to build at the air base at \$4,350 cost.

On April 24, the headline on the Herald read, "Navy Gets Sanford Airport"/ The story states that \$5 million would be spent by the navy, and between 1,200 and 1,500 enlisted men plus 150 officers would be at the base which would be used for pilot training. The air-port would be deeded to the Navy for \$1 per year, the Navy to keep

the site for the duration of the war or as long as needed. Then it would be deeded back to the city

for \$1. Should additional land be needed, the Navy would purchase it and this land would also go back to the

On May 1, county schools were ready for registration for sugar coupon books. Each book held 28 stamps. The first four were good for one pound each, with other value quotas to be decided later. no book was to be issued to anyone with over six pounds on

Sugar rationing became effec-tive May 12 at 2:30 p.m. Around the county, 22,017 persons signed up for sugar coupon books. Automobile dealer Emmett Hunt volunteered to work with dealers and junk yards in collecting junk for reuse

The Draft Board said that men, ge 35-44 may be drafted in May. Men 45 to 65 years of age were registered for possible defense

Ten miles of Daytona Beach were closed in May as trucks picked up debris and bodies from ships sunk off shore by sub-marines.

The Registration Superintendent said there were 6,500 eligible voters in the county in 16 precincts, two of which were in Sanford. There were 2,900 white and 113 black fresholders.

On May 5, the hospital bond issue on the primary ballot carried 1,076 to 308, but was lost as not enough people voted.





Florida Agriculture Commissioner Charles Bronson has announced the establishment of two quarantine zones in Orange County, effective immediately, due to the presence of citrus canker.

quarantine zones, The approximately three square miles in the northeast part of the county, and 6.5 square miles in the southwest, are being established following a series of posi-

While these are the first two finds in Orange County, to date, 1,187 residential trees on 374 properties have been destroyed with the homeowners' coopera-

According to Liz Compton with the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, there have been no sightings of citrus canker in Seminole County.

"We don't have the manpow-

tive residential citrus canker finds in July and September, she said, "but the USDA has 2002. what they call the "Sentinel Survey", in which they pick out highly questionable areas, and check them on a regular basis." "Basically," she continued,

"in areas such as Seminole County, the inspections are not as heavy as elsewhere, where the problem is suspected, but they are mainly concentrating on grapefruit, which appears to be most susceptible."

Right now, there are citrus canker quarantines in areas of

DeSoto and Highlands counties.
The Sun City Center in Hillsborough County and the Additional information about Palmetto area of Manatee citrus canker quarantine zones County have been under quarantine for the past two years, and the quarantine has now been lifted after completion of

their eradication programs.

Warnings to the two new Orange County areas have been issued on how to dispose of their citrus, including not giving any to friends or neighbors, trees during wet periods, and several other suggestions.

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

25th when the Raiders will host Central Florida Community College from Ocala as part of a men-women Mid-Florida Conference doubleheader.


The SCC Health and Physical Education Center will be hopping on Sunday and Monday, as the women will host the SCC Classic.

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
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
