SPRINGFIELD, III. (A)-Gov. Adlal Stevenson sharply denied today that he was a "caplive" presidential candidate of the liberal Americana for Democratic

### Rural Common Sense By BPUDS JOHNSON

From the standpoint of acreage, corn is one of Florida's most important crops. From the stand point of needed food and feed sunplies, again corn is one of the state's top field products.

Florida farmers grow around (a) 700,000 acres of corn every year. Yields still do not average us high ss they do in some other areas, but Plorida's average corn yields have increased markedly in recent years. Florida farmers are trying to produce more corn to give them more feed for their animals. Rut when it comes to saving

that which has been produced, the story isu's quite so good. Losses to weevils, rats, disease and other causes run entirely too high. Better methods of treating, harvesting, drying and storing corn would materially reduce the tremendous losses which now occur on farms.

Of course, not all Florida corn is harvested by man. Much of it is "hogged off" as feed which the hogs harvest. Cattle are turned into some corn fields also. Here the best possibility is to grow corn that will resist infestation and will not easily fail to the ground and rot.

Metal bins are excellent places to store curn. They offer good pro-tection against weather, rodents and insects. Where weevils are present, fumigation should be used o control them.
