New Record Book Will Be Required For '52 Olympics

Over 5,700 Athletes Participate For All-Time Figure

HELSINKI (AP)—The 1952 Olympic Games became history today and the historians are going to need a whole new book to take care of this gigantic sports carnival.

The games which ended in the Finnish twilight Sunday were bigger and better in every way than any of those of the previous 14 modern Olympics.

More people took part. More countries entered. They lasted longer. More went on. Performances were amazing. There was a minimum of incidents.

The late Baron Pierre de Coubertin, a French scholar who conceived the idea of reviving the games of ancient Greece, would have been proud of the show.

Soviet Russia competed for the first time. Germany and Japan were back for the first time since World War II.

In all, 70 nations sent 5,789 athletes to this clean, attractive city—more than 1,800 above any previous entry.

Forty-nine of the 70 countries broke into the unofficial scoring column which recorded the first six places. Their totals varied from 614 for the United States down to one made by Singapore for a sixth in featherweight weightlifting.

Russia presented an extremely well balanced team and scored 55 points, second to the United States.

The U. S. won out Saturday, the final full day of competition, and added four more points Sunday in the team section of the five disciplines, the show jumping climax of the equestrian competition.

This event brought France its sixth gold medal of the games, in the individual section, and Great Britain its first, in the team division.

Authorities Puzzled By Red Rally Fizzle

BERLIN (AP)—West Berlin authorities expressed puzzlement today at the fizzle of a loudly advertised "peace and unity" demonstration of the Communist Free German Youth.

The FDJ had announced that young storm troopers would demonstrate Sunday at two points along the French sector, at an area bordering the American sector, at Potsdamer Platz and, 1000 yards from the British sector's Jungfernhelm Park.

Instead of all this only 2,000 of the blueshirts turned out in all, scattered demonstrations near the sector borders, carrying their blue banners and chanting Communist songs. West Berlin police, who had been mobilized and armed for an eventuality, reported only two minor incidents in which 8 blueshirts were taken into custody.

ADMIRAL JOY TAKES OVER

ANNAPOLIS (AP)—Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, a veteran of Pacific fighting and fiftieth Korean peace talks, became 37th superintendent of the U. S. Naval Academy today. Guns roared over the Severn River as Joy relieved Vice Adm. Harry W. Hill as head of the academy and commandant of the Severn River Naval Command.

NORWAY'S KING HONORED

OSLO (AP)—A state banquet tonight for 80-year-old King Haakon VII ends a two-day national holiday celebration in which thousands of Norwegians enthusiastically displayed their affection for Europe's oldest reigning monarch.

Steady rain Sunday failed to dampen the cheers of the king's subjects who lined the capital's main boulevard to watch him pass in a military parade. He rode in the downpour in an open car and later spoke at the city hall to a crowd of 50,000.

Visiting royalty—King Gustav VI Adolf of Sweden, Queen Mother Alexandra of Denmark and Prince George of Greece—joined in the tribute to Haakon. The Duke of Edinburgh, husband of Britain's Queen Elizabeth II, was expected to arrive in time for tonight's banquet.

He said the Negro has enough votes to control the outcome of the Nov. 4 election and "just will not go to the polls at all" unless pledged an "acceptable" platform.

Powell has a date, within the next 10 days, to discuss civil rights with Stevenson and his vice-presidential running mate, Sen. John J. Sparkman of Alabama.

Sen. A. S. (Mike) Monroney of Oklahoma said Sunday night he sees no Democratic Party disension arising from Sparkman's nomination. When asked on an NBC television program whether the nomination might alienate Negroes and northern liberals, Monroney replied:

"Only one or two Negro leaders have disagreed with the nomination of Sparkman. Northern liberals will appreciate that Sparkman has literally taken his life in his hands to be a liberal."

Civil rights was also the topic of a statement issued in Washington by 16 Republican leaders, among them several key backers of Eisenhower.

The statement said the 16 interpreted the GOP civil rights plank in mean that "FEPC (Fair Employment Practices Commission) with enforcement powers and similar laws will be accelerated by a Republican victory."

The Democrats' 1948 civil rights plank, strong for an FEPC which would enforce decisions on job discrimination against Negroes and other minorities, caused the Southern revolt then. It was carefully worded this time by platform drafters trying to seal the North-South rift.

The 1952 Republican civil rights plank endorses "federal legislation to further just and equitable treatment in the area of discriminatory employment practices."

Democratic standard-bearer Stevenson and Sparkman, meanwhile, turned their attention to another issue, foreign policy.

Stevenson messages Ohio Democrats, in convention at Columbus, that "bitter division" among Republicans over foreign policy has the GOP "split down the center."

In a Richmond, Va., radio broadcast Sunday, Sparkman said the nation's prime task is cementing a free-world wall against the march of Communism. The program is doing well, he said, and perhaps in two years may be far enough along to permit an "appreciable" cut in taxes.

Privately, chieftains of both major parties credited Stevenson with making a smart move in establishing his headquarters at Springfield. They said this will aid his apparent effort to separate his campaign from President Truman's administration.

Mossadegh Given Initial Okey For Unlimited Powers

TEHRAN (AP)—The Iranian Senate today gave initial approval to a bill granting Premier Mohammad Mossadegh unlimited powers with a free hand for six months.

But the upper house offered an expected opposition to a government bill ordering confiscation of the personal wealth and property of Ahmed Qavam, who was forced out of the premiership two weeks ago by wildly demonstrating Mossadegh followers.

The lawmakers passed the confiscation bill without trouble on its first of three readings. On the second reading, however, only three of 20 senators present stood up to signify approval.

The bill then was sent to a Senate commission for possible revision.

The legislation calls for Qavam's fortune—estimated by some lawmakers at 300 million rials (about 10 million dollars)—to be divided among the survivors of persons killed in the street fighting which resulted in his overthrow. More than 20 police and soldiers reportedly died in the clashes.

Five million rials (about \$160,000) would be set aside for Qavam's wife and 10-year-old son.

Qavam's whereabouts have been unknown since Mossadegh swept to power July 21. One current rumor is that Qavam already has fled the country.

The bill to give Mossadegh power in rule by decree was quick approved Sunday in the lower house of Parliament (the Majlis). All but one or two of the 68 deputies present voted to affirm the far-reaching measure when it came up for a standing vote on its third and final reading.

Final Senate approval appeared almost certain.

Then the aged premier will have a free hand to govern by decree and push through a drastic program he says is needed to ease the country through its present economic crisis. Iran has been headed for bankruptcy since her great British-run oil industry was nationalized last year and production fizzled out.

Mossadegh has said his reform program will include sweeping new taxes, banking controls, work projects and resumption of oil production. As yet, however, he has given no details of his plans. A possible military cutdown also is in the offing.

In Sunday's debate, Majlis deputies loudly demanded anew the ouster of American military and nuclear aid mission in Iran. One deputy, Mostafaei Damavandi, charged that U. S. officers here to supervise the American military aid program only provided propaganda for the United States and an excuse for retaliation against Iran by Russia. He shouted for the Americans to be expelled.

Damavandi complained that the U. S. Point Four program of technical aid for agriculture had not brought in the millions which were promised. And he suggested that irrigation wells being dug under American supervision actually were being placed in strategic places to supply water for American soldiers in case of war.

Hitch-Hiking Sergeant Finds Self Piloting Jet As Pilot Passes Out

WITH U. S. FIFTH AIR FORCE, Korea (AP)—A hitch-hiking Air Force sergeant on his first jet plane ride recently found himself piloting the swift two-seat craft when he flew the ship for nearly 30 minutes after the engine failed.

The sergeant had to take over the controls of the T-33 jet when the pilot passed out from lack of oxygen, the Air Force said today.

He flew the training ship until the engine quit. He then maneuvered it carefully down to a level where the pilot regained consciousness.

Sgt. Charles E. Hill, 31, Parker, Okla., never had been in a jet until he hitchhiked a ride from Korea to Japan in the T-33 flown by Lt. Robert W. MacDuff, veteran aerial reconnaissance pilot from Avondale, Ariz.

They were buzzing along at 500 miles an hour 27,000 feet up when MacDuff asked Hill to hold the auxiliary control stick in the rear seat while the pilot worked a navigational problem.

"All I knew was that if you push forward on the stick you go down and if you pull back you go up," said Hill. "I held it in the course the pilot was flying."

The pilot's head nodded forward occasionally as if he were checking his map. Then it bobbed back as if he were looking up to check instruments. Hill didn't realize that the pilot was undergoing convulsions caused by oxygen starvation and was unconscious. "The oxygen gauge showed plenty of pressure," Hill said.

But when MacDuff failed to answer over the radio Hill got worried. He watched the stick to attract attention. When that failed he realized he had just become pilot of a 300-mile-an-hour jet.

"I made a right turn and followed the coast of Japan. I knew that most of the Japanese cities are on the ocean and I figured that was the best way of finding an airfield."

"Then the jet engine quit. "That scared me," Hill said. But he maintained control and by trial and error determined the slowest possible rate of descent. He picked a course over land and decided to ride the plane down.

Hill says he realized that if the pilot did not regain consciousness by the time the plane reached 19,000 feet, it would mean he probably had died of oxygen starvation and the only course left was to "roll her over and stop out."

At about 17,000 feet MacDuff came to. But Hill had to read the instruments for him because the blackout had blurred his vision.

The pilot took over and got the engine restarted at 6,000 feet. Then he called a radio direction finding station to steer him to the nearest base.

"I was a bit worried about the landing," Hill says, "because MacDuff still couldn't see clearly and I had to read the airspeed to him as the way down. I did manage one of the slickest landings I ever saw. We had only a few minutes fuel left."

Rural Common Sense

By SPIES JOHNSON
From the standpoint of acreage, corn is one of Florida's most important crops. From the standpoint of needed food and feed supplies, again corn is one of the state's top field products.
Florida farmers grow around 700,000 acres of corn every year. Tifton still do not average as high as they do in some other areas, but Florida's average corn yields have increased markedly in recent years. Florida farmers are trying to produce more corn to give them more feed for their animals.
But when it comes to saving that which has been produced, the story isn't quite so good. Losses to weevils, rats, disease and other causes run entirely too high.
Better methods of treating, harvesting, drying and storing corn would materially reduce the tremendous losses which now occur on farms.
Of course, not all Florida corn is "hogged off" as feed which the hog harvest. Cattle are turned into some corn fields also. Here the best possibility is to grow corn that will resist infestation and will not easily fall to the ground and rot.
Where corn is harvested, however, it should be harvested early to get ahead of the weevils and rats. The recently developed picker-sheller, which picks and shells corn in the field, returning husks and cobs in the field, gives promise for use in the South.
Drying the early picked corn with heated, forced air costs only 3 or 4 cents a bushel and permits safe storage. Dry, cool corn is a poor host to insects. Plans are available for drying systems which can be constructed on farms.
Metal bins are excellent places to store corn. They offer good protection against weather, rodents and insects. Where weevils are present, fumigation should be used to control them.

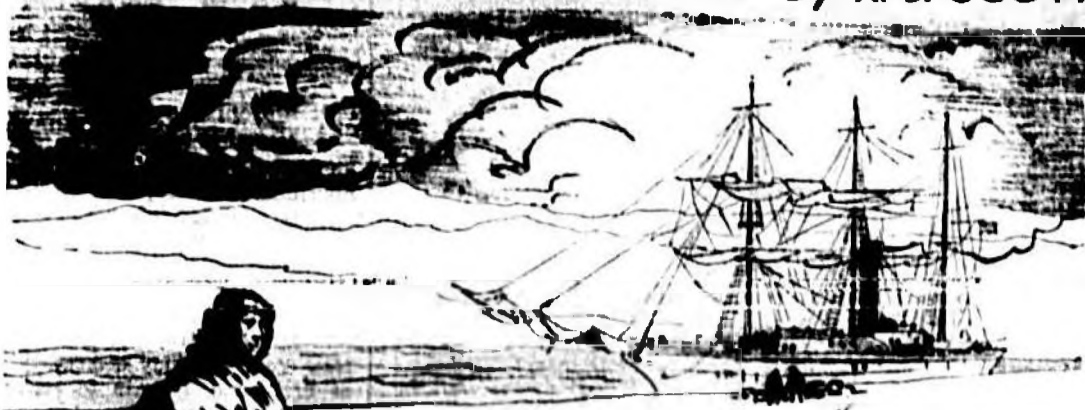

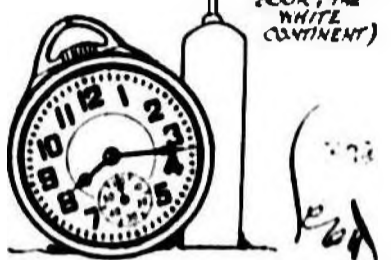

Commie Trouble In Korea Election Is Being Anticipated

By STAN CARTER PUSAN, Korea (AP) — South Korean police and troops have been alerted for possible Communist guerrilla interference Tuesday in the republic's first popular election of a president and vice president.

Senegambian Rhee, 77, the nation's first president, is considered certain to be returned to office. Originally the president was elected by the National Assembly.

There has been no campaign speech since he is the only name widely known to the bulk of the voters, his three opponents are given little chance of winning.

There are nine aspirants for vice president. Six are classed as Rhee supporters but Rhee has endorsed no one.

After the election ballot boxes will be sealed and taken underground to county election committee in 103 places.

Counting will begin Thursday but fairly complete returns are not expected until Friday.

Another Meet Is Slated By Board Of Fish Estate

Mr. Wilson added that prospects for Sanford's proposed hospital, which is provided for in the will of the late Bert Fish, are brighter than ever before.

He said that the board pledged every effort to secure the funds necessary to build the hospital. He added that the position of the trustees on this point was "quite emphatic".

In referring to the next meeting of the board, Mr. Wilson said he did not know the exact date but he expected that the trustees would meet before the dedication of the DeLand hospital on Sept. 28.

He said that there are several matters which the board had to handle before the hospital opened and that it was expected to open immediately after the dedication.

Mr. Wilson further revealed that it had been announced at the board meeting that Congress has appropriated \$110,000 of the \$274,000 which has been allocated by the Florida Improvement Commission toward the construction of the Sanford hospital.

This announcement, he said, was an added spur to hopes for the early construction of the hospital. A drawing of the project will be displayed in a store window in the downtown business area within a few weeks, he said, and he added that he believed the people of Sanford would be very much pleased with the design of the building.

The drawing is being prepared under the direction of Melvin Meek, architect for the proposed hospital, which is expected to cost \$760,000.

Hollyhead To Go Tampa ACL Office

LINE HEADS FOR HOME NEW YORK

— The new French liner Flandre, her maiden days dogged by hard luck, headed for home today prepared for any possible new troubles.

The 20,300-ton passenger liner, biggest built in France since World War II, left New York Sunday night on the return leg of her maiden voyage two days, seven hours and 40 minutes late.

Fifty-one of her scheduled passengers had given up their space by the time the Flandre sailed.

French line officials said the delays were to prepare the ship against any mishaps like those which harassed the vessel on its maiden crossing here.

The Flandre was delayed at sea by a boiler failure, and at quarantine here by a power failure that left her anchor dangling.

SEEKS McMAHON'S SEAT NEW YORK

— Peace talks began today in an effort to head off a threatened New York Central Railroad strike east of Buffalo, N. Y.

Agents of four railroad brotherhoods shrugged off reporters' questions as they walked in a closed session with New York Central officials. Nor would spokesmen for the railroad say anything.

A meeting was held in the office of Lawrence W. Hornig, vice president in charge of personnel and public relations for the New York Central.

Permits were obtained by W. L. Holcomb to erect two pre-fabricated frame type houses in Pinehurst, one for \$8,000, and the other for \$7,000.

U. S. Liner Arrives In New York Hours Ahead Of Its Rival

NEW YORK (AP)—The superliner United States, trans-Atlantic speed record holder, docked today hours ahead of the British liner Queen Elizabeth on their first simultaneous crossing, but the skipper of the American ship insisted there was no race.

"The woman's race, we just raced away from her," said Commander Harry Manning, master of the United States.

The Queen Elizabeth left Cherbourg Thursday morning, a half an hour before the United States sailed from LeHavre. The next day, the United States overtook the British ship at Bishop's Rock, near the tip of Cornwall, England.

The United States sailed into New York Harbor at 1:55 a. m., EST, today, just a few minutes more than four days after she passed the liner Elizabeth.

Bishop's Rock and Ambrose Light are considered the markers for trans-Atlantic records. The United States set marks for crossings in both directions on her maiden voyage last month. Her westward crossing time for the trip completed today—her second—was about 12 hours off her east-west pace and 14 off her east-east record.

GEN. BOATNER PROMOTED TOKYO

— Brig. Gen. Haydon L. (Bull) Boatner, who tamed rebellious Communist war prisoners and brought peace to fiery Koje Island, today was promoted to major general.

Gen. Mark Clark, Far East Supreme commander, in a statement hailed Boatner's performance in restoring order on Koje, the rocky island off South Korea where red captives staged bloody riots and kidnaped one Koje commandeer.

Boatner now is in charge of all prisoner camps in Korea.

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ORDER RETURNS MONTREAL

— Order returned slowly to Montreal's Bordeaux Jail today, replacing the upheaval and riot that held away during the week end.

Most of the 500 prisoners who broke out of their cells Friday night were back behind bars, leaving a trail of violence and destruction behind them. Their cell doors were repaired and reinforced with extra locks.

While on the loose, the prisoners set a score of fires and clashed with police and guards in a series of skirmishes. At least a dozen convicts were injured.

CAN HUNT PHEASANTS TALLAHASSEE

— Pheasant hunting will be legal in Florida from now on. But there aren't any wild pheasants in the state.

The State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission today decided to throw out its ban on the shooting of pheasants.

Commission Chairman Cecil Webb said it appeared useless to ban the shooting of game that isn't here anyway.

Assistant Director O. Earl Frye told the commission lifting of the ban would permit the raising and shooting of pheasants on private game preserves.

Four Killed In Plane Fall At Miami Airport

All Aboard 2-Engine Aircraft, Including 2 Teen-age Boys, Die In 200-Foot Dive

MIAMI (AP)—Four persons, including two teen-age boys, were killed Monday night when a C-46 twin-engine airplane dived 200 feet to earth at the Miami International Airport.

All aboard were killed. They were the pilot, Capt. Robert E. Smith, 29, Miami; John Norman Goodman, 26, co-pilot, formerly of Vincennes, Ind.; Thomas Slaughter, 15, and his brother, Glenn, 13, Orlando.

Smith and Goodman are pilots for Resort Air Lines, Inc., Miami. The boys were the sons of another Resort Air Lines pilot, Capt. Dixie Walker.

Goodman's brother, Benny Goodman, is personnel director for the charter airline. The coincidence of names at first caused an erroneous report that Goodman was the brother of the Orchestra Leader Benny Goodman.

The plane was the personal property of H. Paul Weaver, president of Resort Air Lines, Inc., a non-scheduled line operating out of Miami. It was being flown here after overhauling at Burbank, Cal., with a stop at San Antonio, Tex. Upon approaching Miami at 11:21 p. m. EST, Smith radioed the field's control tower that he had no aileron control, which governs the ascent and descent of planes.

Witnesses said the plane came over the field 20 minutes later, swooped in for a landing, then zoomed up several hundred feet before plunging in earth, nose first.

Fire fighting equipment was at the scene and the flames were quickly extinguished. Airport authorities said all four occupants died on impact. The plane overturned on striking the ground.

Smith was president of All-American Airways, Inc., a charter line operating out of Miami. A spokesman for Resort Air Lines said the two boys were picked up in San Antonio and were step-sons of Capt. Dixie Walker, a Resort Airlines pilot.
