15th Animated Magazine Given At Woman's Club

The pages of the magazine that "mild" of the artist force of the United States might have had to be immobilized in this hemisphere had the Latin American countries been unfriendly and unco-operative in the war effort was pointed out by Herbert Ricketts, native of Peru and now attending Rollins College who introduced the Animated Magazine's theme, "Latin America" with an interesting talk about his country's topography, history and customs.

The basis of a new world solidarity he pointed out was the will of the people to achieve it. He urged that radio stations in this country give more attention to the needs of this hemisphere by giving more program relating to Latin American nations, and suggested that people here should read more about South America and its people. He told of how South American exports had been of great aid to the war effort, also of how control of air lines by Nazis and Fascists of Germany was badly broken on that continent.

Miss Laura Molina of the Spanish-Department of Rollins College told of the beauties of her native Mexico, especially Mexico City located on a plateau 8,000 feet above sea level, and ringed by high mountains. Coming from such an altitude to the low elevation of Florida gave her a kind of altitude sickness, she declared.

She told of the modern up-to-date life in that city of nearly 2,000,000 people with its impressive governmental palace, city hall, beautiful residential districts, golf courses and country clubs. Earthquakes were not frequent, she pointed out, but added that little damage was done by reason of the soft subsoil which cushioned the shocks. She described the national sport of bull-fighting, and the crowds that attended in the large arenas.

The two Rollins speakers were presented through co-operation of Professor Fred Hanna, head of the Rollins department of international relations, and Mrs. R. L. Dean of the Rollins faculty who helped in planning the program.

Lieut. (jg) R. F. Berry, USNR, of the Sanford Naval Air Station, said that his first experience with the Red Cross overseas was in "cold, misty, foggy England" at Liverpool where he was directed to a comfortable hotel, served with food and coffee, given writing materials and added that his folks back home were notified he had arrived safely.

In London, he said, 15 hotels were maintained by the Red Cross service men's clubs, with rooms at 50 cents a night, and meals, American style, at 25 cents. He also told of Red Cross service in marshalling areas. Upon his return to this country, problems confronting him and his companions such as getting to their station to report, securing hotel accommodations, transporting luggage, etc., were all taken care of by the Red Cross. He urged his listeners to contribute to the current Red Cross drive.

A group of girls of the Spanish Class of Seminole High School sang Mexican songs, with Roberta Evans accompanying. The group included the Misses Mildred Robson, Audrey Bach, Martha Page, Shirley Cameron, Dorothy Morrison and Catherine Clark. Mrs. Ruth Jackson, musical director, was unable to be present, being busy rehearsing a student play.

Mrs. G. T. Botzger, with Mrs. George Touhy, accompanying, sang two solos which were heartily applauded. The numbers were "The Swallow" and "A Perfect

Prayer."

Members of the Woman's Club contributed to an exhibit of Mexican paintings, glass, pottery, rugs and baskets. Cadet Sgt. Simon Dingfelder of the Student Military Training Corps, of Seminole High School, flanked by color guards Cadet Cpl. Billy Chapman and Pvt. Bobby Pullin, bore the colors for the salute to the flag at the start of the program, which was concluded by the singing of the National Anthem.

Following the program a social hour was enjoyed and refreshments were served.

Almost 100 per cent of the bombs, shells, grenades, rockets and mines produced for the U.S. armament forces last year were manufactured by 60 contractor-operated plants of the Army Ordnance Department.

Roosevelt Says Next World War Is Up To U. S.

There can be no middle ground here. We shall have to take the responsibility for world collaboration, or we shall have to bear the responsibility for another world conflict."

Yalta, he told the attentive, oft-cheering legislators, fanned out before him as he talked from a red plush chair in the House of Representatives, was a bright start toward the better world of the future.

Historic Turning Point
A turning point, he called it, in American history.

Any next to come—Mr. Roosevelt emphasized its importance as carrying the hopes and fears of generations to come—will be the San Francisco conference of the United Nations.

He made, in his speech which was broadcast over all networks, a plea for unity in working toward peace.

"World peace is not a party question—any more than is military victory," Mr. Roosevelt said. "The same consecration to the cause of peace will be expected by every patriotic American and every human soul overseas."

Applause went up from all over the House when he departed the speaker's platform.

Mark: "Republicans want peace just as much as Democrats."

Internal comment afterward was varied. Chairman Bloom (D-N.Y.) of the House Foreign Affairs Committee called it a "truly magnificent speech" pointing toward "a just and lasting peace."

Representative Knutson (R-Minn.) on the other hand, called it "an attempt to sell a bill of goods without opening the wrapper" and Senator McCarran (D-Nev.) expressed regret he hadn't learned more about Russian intentions toward Japan.

Representative Murray called the speech "thoughtful and thought provoking." Democratic floor leaders in both House and Senate were as enthusiastic as Bloom.

"This time," Mr. Roosevelt said, "we shall not make the mistake of waiting until the end of the war to set up the machinery of peace."

And in noting that Republicans as well as Democrats have been selected as delegates to the San Francisco conference on chartering a world peace organization, he declared:

"I am well aware of the constitutional fact—as are all the United Nations—that this charter must be approved by two-thirds of the Senate of the United States."

BIBLE VERSE FOR TODAY

TO BE HAPPY AND GRAFTED INTO ETERNAL LIFE IT IS NOT ENOUGH JUST TO MAKE A PUBLIC DECLARATION OF INTELLECTUAL BELIEF, YOU MUST MAKE GOD YOUR DWELLING PLACE AND ACCEPT THE DIVINE INTO YOUR OWN LIFE: Abide in me and I'll in you.—John 15:4.

John L. Lewis apparently has decided to do his bit for the war effort by calling a coal strike.

It's no use for the Allies to worry about what to do with Hitler when the war is over. That problem, we feel sure, will resolve itself.

Raymond Moley says the nationwide midnight curfew is a fool conservation, not a fuel conservation, measure. The idea is to get people to go to bed in time to get up the next morning.

The government's debt limit has been boosted to \$300,000,000. The interest on that sum of money at 4 percent would be \$12,000,000. Of course the interest rate isn't 4 percent. We believe it averages somewhere between 2 and 3 percent. But even at that the interest amounts to over \$4,000,000 a year, enough to pay all the expenses of government, including interest, during any one of the prosperous years of the late twenties.

The American Red Cross, one organization on which there is unanimous agreement that it is doing a good job all over the world, has launched its campaign in Sanford to raise \$17,000. That is a lot of money, as Red Cross quotas in this county have gone in the past, but it can be raised and should be. Everyone should contribute to the Red Cross, more than ever before, since the need is so much greater.

The United States has extended a new lend-lease credit of over \$1 billion dollars to France whose leader, Charles de Gaulle, refused recently to meet with President Roosevelt, so miffed was he over his failure to be invited to the Big Three conference. Two and one-half billion dollars should go a long way toward smoothing things over but we doubt if permanent friendship is ever produced that way.

President Roosevelt apparently realizes that Henry Wallace is not competent to handle large sums of money since he signed the George bill divorcing the lending agencies from the Commerce Department, or it may be the President realized that the vast majority of Congress does not think him competent and knew if he would have Wallace in his cabinet, at all it would have to be in a sinecure. Well, that suits us. We imagine Wallace can handle the Commerce Department, stripped of its lending agencies, since it has no pigs to plow under.

The lower East Coast has shipped 1,639 carloads of celery this season, as compared with only 1,052 from the Sanford area. When we first came to Sanford about twenty years ago Sanford shipped three-fourths of all the celery raised in Florida, two-thirds of all that produced in the United States. We still produce as much, or more, celery than we did then, but other producing areas have been developed and Sanford celery is far behind. That doesn't produce "more regulation of other kinds" now than it did then and there is much to be diversified. Sanford has also progressed further toward tourist entertainment, the industry which we give most Florida cities their remarkable growth.

We have come a long way since a few years ago when The Herald used to run classified ads (free of charge) for anyone looking for a job and they constituted the majority of the ads we had. Nowadays everybody is trying to find somebody else to work for. But a great many people continue to need the services of those who only a few years ago were asking, "Sanford, can you spare a dime?" now laugh at you if you ask them to work.

Work or Fight

Now that Sanford's farmlands are bright green with luscious celery and the wash houses are running full blast, Sanford farmers are coming face to face with the problem which has been plaguing business men all year—the manpower shortage. Our farmers simply cannot get enough help to cut their celery, wash it and pack it, and get it off to a market where there is strong demand, and there is grave danger that much of it may be left to rot in the fields.

Not there isn't enough labor here to meet the situation. There is, but many people don't want to work. They don't have to work, they have enough money already to get by on, they are getting money from the government, they have relatives who are working at fabulous salaries who send them money from time to time, or they can make enough money themselves in three days to last the rest of the week. These are the ones who are really causing the farmers the most trouble, those who work three days and rest four.

Well, there are a lot of people who are not making the most of their opportunities these days. There are a lot of men who for one reason or another are not working regularly. There are a lot of women who used to work, because they had to, who have quit working now that they don't have to, and just when they could be making so much more than ever before. There are a lot of boys, "teen age boys," we believe they are called, who are adding to the delinquency problem, simply because they are not busy at something worthwhile that would keep them out of trouble.

Because so many people don't have to work, and won't work if they don't have to, the so-called "work or fight" bill has been introduced in Congress. They are planning to enact a federal law requiring every man to work or join the Army. And there are stiff penalties of fines and imprisonment, for anyone quitting his job, laying down on the job or being late to work. Who would ever have thought that in free America, while the nation is fighting for its life against two powerful enemies, men would have to be jailed for refusing to work?

Some, however, are thinking about the future. They are making hay while the sun shines. They are working hard to get food and war materials to the fighting lines and to maintain essential services on the home front. Most of them are getting bigger salaries or wages than they ever did before, to be sure, but they are earning it. And they're laying some aside for a rainy day and they are making a place for themselves in the business life of the community for that period of readjustment when the war is over.

They'll be the ones who have the jobs and the good wages, they and the returning service men, in the years to come, and those who don't want to work now, well they won't have to. They'll be trying to explain why the world owes them a living.

Russia and Japan

April, 1945, will be an interesting date to watch. The Russian-Japanese treaty, whereby each country promised to be neutral during the other's wars, will then be four years old. Made for five years, it provides for an advance notice of a year in case either country decided not to renew. If this notice is not given, the treaty is automatically renewed for five years more.

The treaty, though not logical, has been useful to both Russia and Japan. Both countries, up to their necks in war, have been heartily glad not to have to take on another formidable enemy. So a member of the Axis and a member of the United Nations have kept peace fairly well throughout all the fury of the present conflict.

What will happen in April? Japan is not likely to make any aggressive move. Russia, with the German war nearing completion, may feel safer about tackling the Japanese. Or she may reason that Japan would never give warning before making an attack. Pearl Harbor and the Russo-Japanese war of 1904-5 show that. Therefore she would be foolish to give the Japanese a chance to prepare for war. In that case the five-year treaty may be renewed, but its renewal will not necessarily mean anything. Dropping the treaty, however, would mean much.

control of the whole area between the Mass and the Iller. Vanguards of the Red army drove ahead to isolate Hünneburg in the Polish Corridor and struck close to the Baltic city of Königsberg. In East Prussia the Germans told of a tremendous new assault launched against Königsberg.

American troops yesterday captured Muenchen-Gladbach—first great Ruhr district city to fall to the Allies—and battled into Trier as the U. S. First Army overran four towns east of the Erft River and entered the near approaches of Cologne along a seven-mile front.

The rail metropolis of Muenchen-Gladbach, with a pre-war population of 127,000 fell to Lieut. Gen. Simpson's Ninth Army assault forces in a two-day battle hidden behind a security news blackout.

Ninth Army spearheads were battling only four miles from the suburbs of Duesseldorf, another great center of the vast Ruhr industrial area upon which much of Germany's war effort depended.

Lieut. Gen. Hodges' First Army tanks and assault troops captured Berghelm, Jahndorf, Qualtrath and Horrem and pushed the Germans almost out of Moerath, reducing what was described as "disorganized" German defenses immediately in front of Cologne.

Cologne Besieged

The siege of Cologne was forming rapidly along an arching battlefront extending north from Moerath, six miles away, to a point northwest of Berghelm, 10 miles northwest of the city.

At some points American armor and assault troops fought more than two miles through fortified mine pits and quarries on which the Germans based their defense of the ancient industrial and cathedral city. Field dispatches said the battle blazed through deep mud and rain.

MacArthur Raises U. S. Flag On Corregidor

western Philippines in a bold amphibious operation which has already won them a valuable harbor and two airbases. Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced yesterday.

The invasion was a complete surprise, and MacArthur announced that American forces already had seized control of the island.

Forty-first Infantry Division troops made two landings midway along the east coast of 245-mile long Palawan at Puerto Princesa, the island's capital, with light losses.

They quickly seized Puerto Princesa, the land-locked harbor, one of the finest in the Philippines, and seized two nearby air fields, one with a 5,000-foot runway.

Japs Flee Inland

Japanese troops retreated to the high ground inland.

The invasion put the American forces on the fifth ranking Philippine island and only 230 miles north of Borneo. It promised them complete aerial domination of the South China Sea, Japan's supply lifeline to southeast Asia at its narrowest stretch 600 miles east of French Indo-China. It gave MacArthur a front of 45 miles facing the South China Sea from Palawan north to the Lingayen Gulf area of Luzon.

Quickly pushing ashore against only feeble resistance from an astonished garrison, the infantryman captured Puerto Princesa, a capital of 11,000 people with its prominent and impressive white government buildings and its T-shaped 445-foot wharf.

A secondary objective was Iwahig, a town of 1,500, five miles west of Puerto Princesa on the west side of the harbor.

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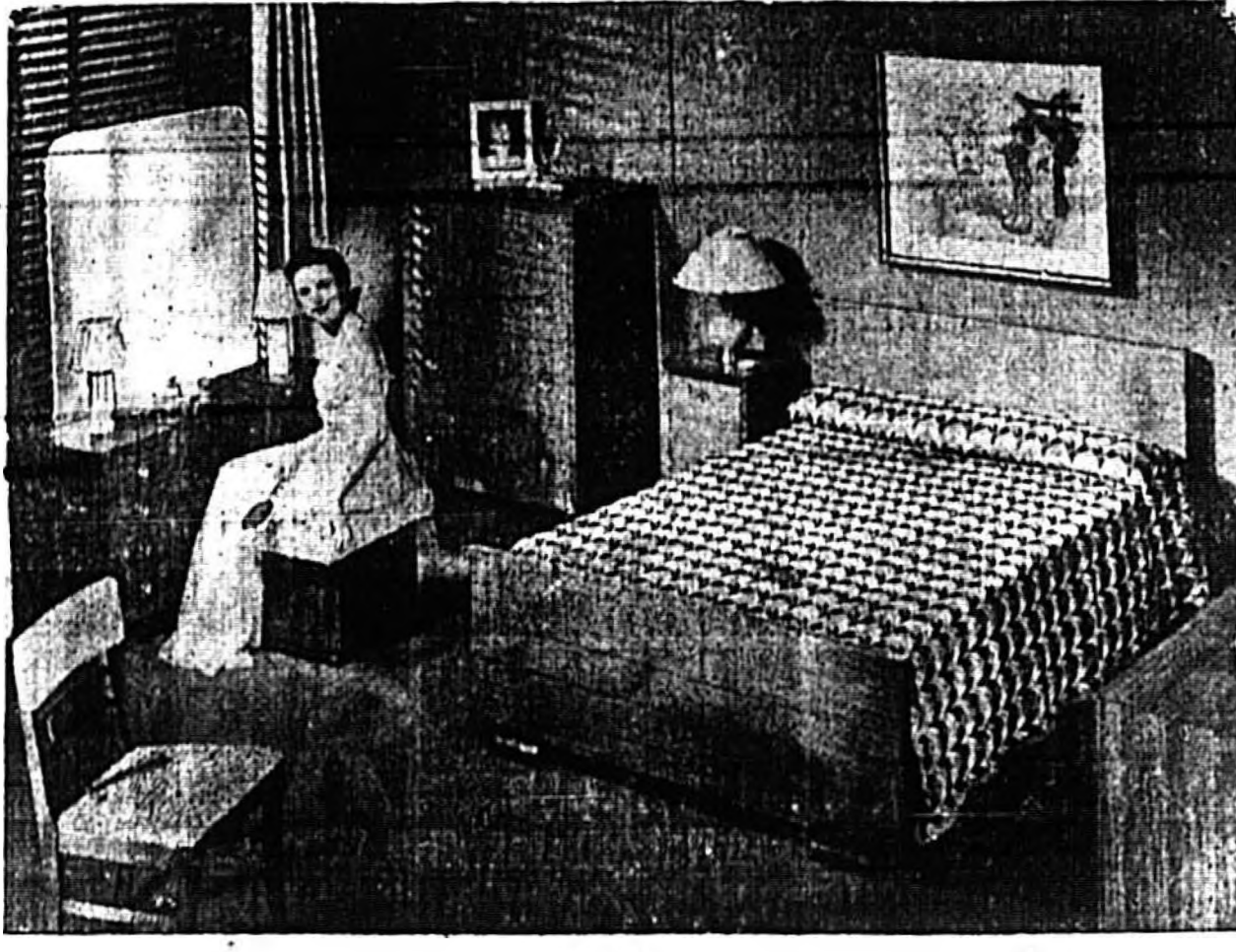
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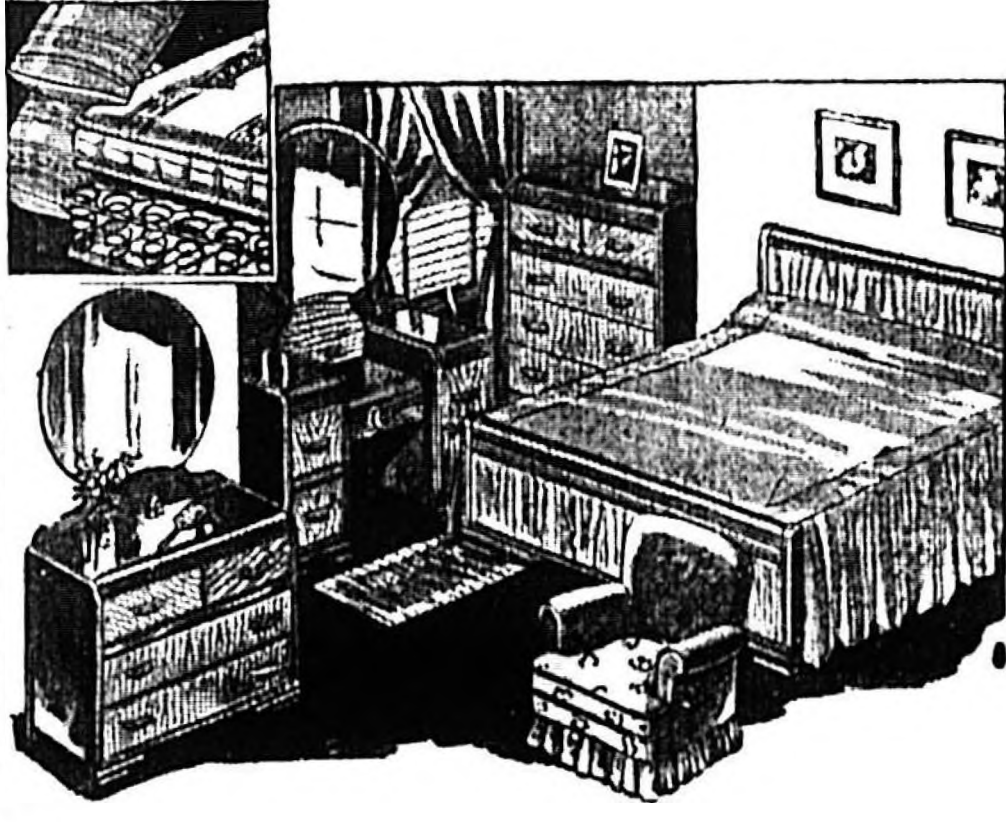

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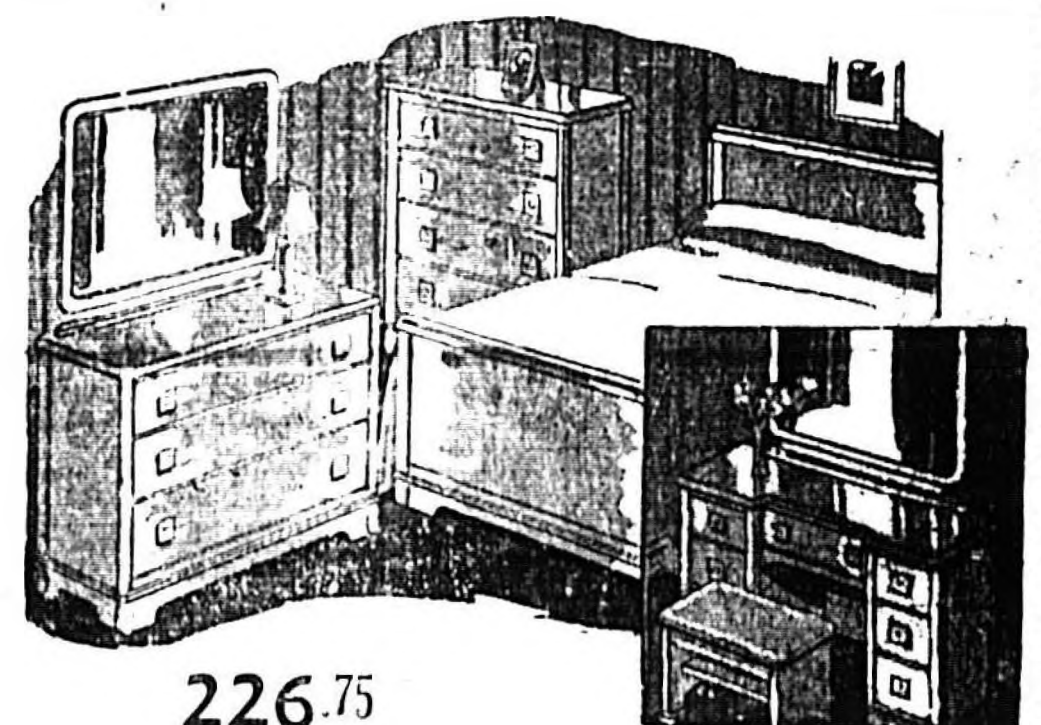

Japs Continue To Give Lives For Hirohito

Two Casualties Now Reported At 12,864 As Futile Banzai Attacks Take Toll

Hopeless counter-attacks and Filipino Guerrillas added new thousands to the Japanese dead on Iwo Island and the Philippines as the increasing tempo of the American air onslaught forced Japan to close its primary schools on Formosa and organize Tokyo students into fire brigades.

Ten Superfortresses raided Tokyo on the heels of the big raid Sunday. Resistance stiffened on Iwo but the Japanese dead mounted to 12,864. Thousands of other Japanese were killed by Philippine guerrillas on northeastern Luzon.

General MacArthur reported the young Yanks have seized two more Philippine islands—Ticao, and Burias—off the southern tip of Luzon. Severe Japanese losses also were reported from Burma as the British closed in on Mandalay. Air raids on Formosa were stepped up and all types of bombers were attacking the air docks, causing the China coast.

Small local advances have been made by Marines on Iwo Jima against stiffening Japanese resistance. Adm. Chester W. Nimitz announced.

By March 3 a total of 12,864 Japanese dead had been counted by the slowly advancing Marine of the Third, Fourth and Fifth Divisions.

The enemy organized a counter-attack in the Fifth Marine Sector.

Lt. Col. Campbell Given Bronze Star At Liberator Base

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE LIBERATOR SQUADRON, England, Mar. 5, (Special)—Lieut. Col. William G. Campbell, 2118 Sanford Avenue, Sanford, Florida, has been awarded the bronze star for gallant achievement in the performance of outstanding services as commanding officer of the air corps sub-depot unit at this B-24 Liberator heavy bomber base in England.

In this capacity, Lieut. Col. Campbell has been responsible since 1943 for the repairing of aircraft and the damage modification of bombers coming from the United States, the supply of replacement and maintenance parts, and furnishing of such materials as aviation gasoline.

Under Col. Campbell's constant supervision, the sub-depot has established a record of rapid repair of serious battle and accident damage. Recently a B-24 made a nose landing in this field, completely demolishing the front part of the plane so that it was declared salvage. An entire nose-section from another crashed airplane was obtained and substituted for the worthless one, with the result that the bomber returned to its squadron in an operational condition in two weeks. A P-47 Thunderbolt which cracked up at the runway end, was also declared salvage, but sub-depot engineers rebuilt it so efficiently that it is now flying again. A P-51 Mustang had an accident tearing off its landing gear, buckling the left wing, and smashing the propeller and engine. Col. Campbell had it rebuilt and returned to combat with its original group within eleven days. A liaison airplane crashed and burned out only its framework and part of the engine. It was completely rebuilt by the sub-depot and is now in use.

Col. Campbell, whose air corps supply section has a record of 125 days without an airplane grounded for lack of parts, has been praised by bombardment squadron engineering officers for his fine spirit of cooperation. On conclusion of a recent technical (Continued on Page Two)

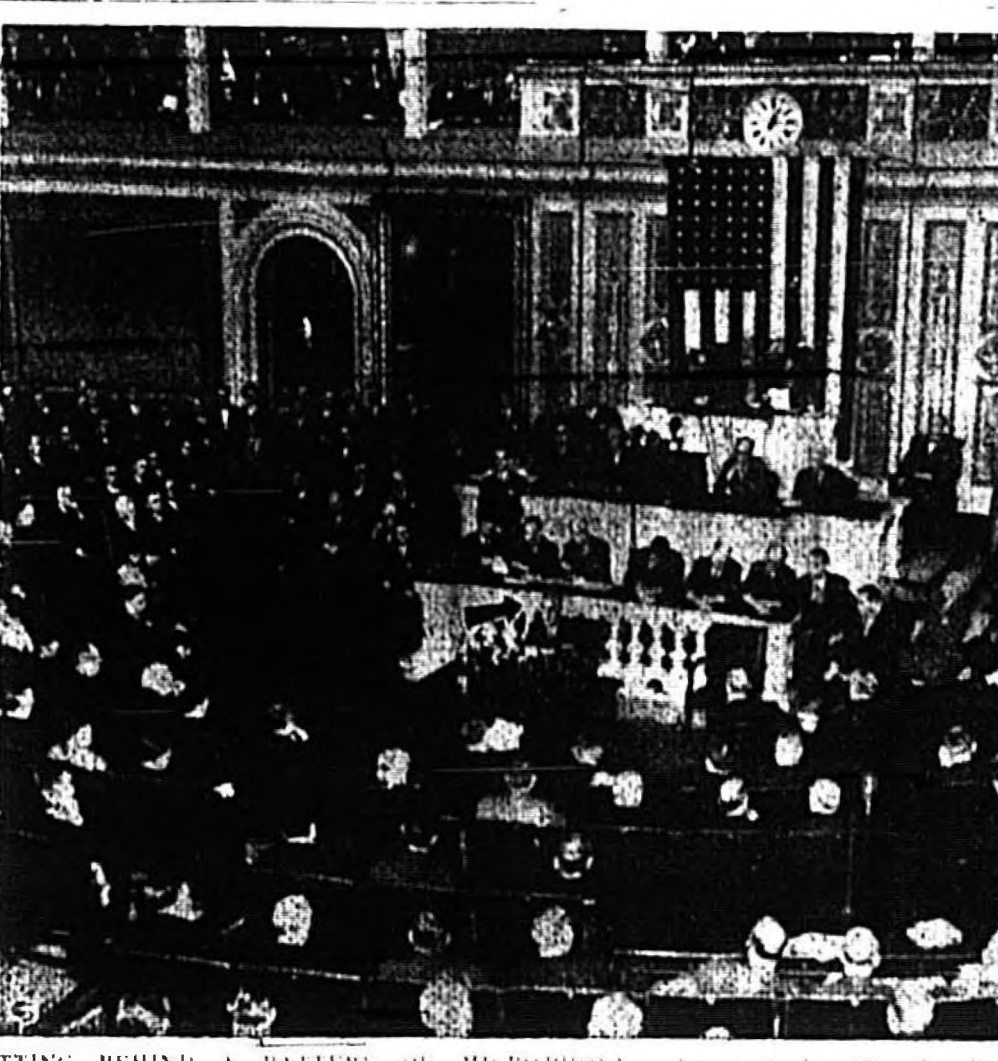
