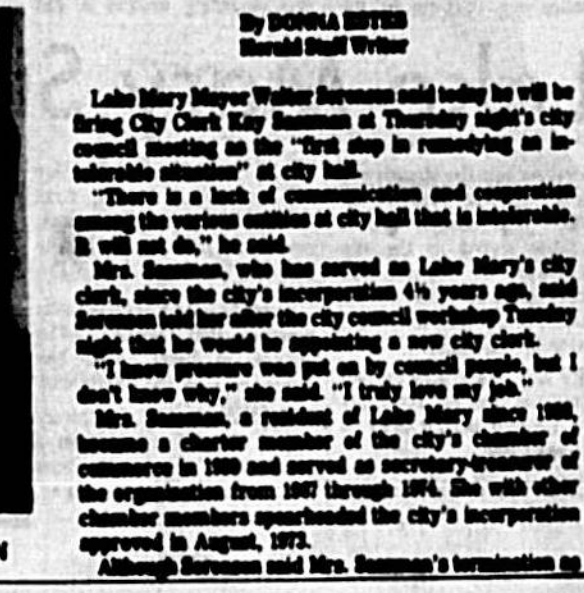
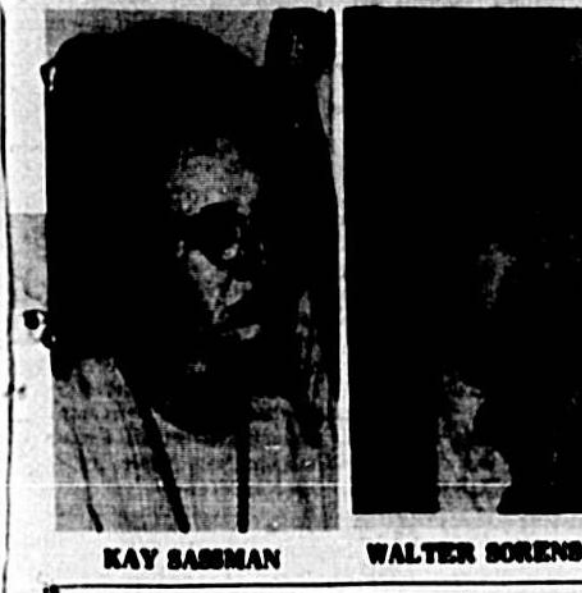

Lake Mary Mayor Walter Sorenson said today he will be firing City Clerk Kay Samman on Thursday night's city council meeting as the "first step in remedying an intolerable situation" at city hall.

There is a lack of communication and cooperation among the various offices of city hall that is intolerable, Sorenson said.

Mrs. Samman, who has served as Lake Mary's city clerk since the city's incorporation 4 1/2 years ago, said she had been looking for a new city clerk.

"I have pressure was put on by council people, but I don't know why," she said. "I truly love my job."

Mrs. Sorenson, a resident of Lake Mary since 1974, became a charter member of the city's chamber of commerce in 1978 and served as secretary-treasurer of the organization from 1979 through 1981. She with other chamber members spearheaded the city's incorporation approved in August, 1973.

Although Sorenson said Mrs. Samman's termination as

city clerk is a "first step in remedying the intolerable situation at city hall," he added that he has "a specific goal of remedying other employees in need of the same."

He said, "It is not solely my job," when questioned about whether the city council members had questioned the action against Mrs. Samman. He said however, that most of the council is in favor of the firing of the clerk and that he would be informing them today.

Sorenson said he will be naming an interim city clerk Thursday night while the city searches for a permanent clerk. "We're not accepting applications and reviewing them," he said.

"But," he added, "I do not believe that anyone here we are going to find anyone as dedicated to Lake Mary as Kay Samman is."

Mrs. Sorenson's current salary is \$28,000 per year. The clerk said today she does not know what she will do. "I have served the community to the best of my ability," she said. "I don't know how the situation will be after Thursday night."

Sense On The Dollar

The staggering U.S. dollar straightened up immediately when our government moved into the international currency market with a remedy called intervention.

By offering to take its currency off the hands of foreign banks, a government can bid up its value. Intervention is a familiar technique. The decision of the U.S. Treasury and Federal Reserve to go to the rescue of the dollar followed a classic formula with predictable results. So the significance of what happened is not in the stronger showing of the dollar but in the suggestion that the Carter administration is finally recognizing the gravity of the problem which is producing the dollar's decline.

By resorting to intervention, the administration appeared to be following economic, and achieved what the textbook grammar. We trust it is reading further in the text. What causes the value of a commodity to fall in the first place? Oversupply.

The current rescue operation will mean nothing for the long-term health of our currency unless the United States resolves to keep it from flooding the market.

Thus the actions of the Federal Reserve Board on Jan. 6, raising the basic interest rate of our central bank, brought a second show of strength when dollar transactions resumed in Europe on Jan. 9.

A lightning of credit is a signal that the U.S. government is willing to go beyond intervention to help the dollar.

The dollar's problem does not lie on the foreign exchange, where the symptoms are appearing, but here at home—in fiscal and monetary policies that are too expansive, and in our utter failure to reverse our heavy imports of oil which are sending our abundant dollars overseas in ever-increasing amounts.

We can't read the minds of the money-changers whose flight from the dollar precipitated the recent stop decline, but we can put ourselves in their shoes. They have seen the U.S. money supply reach its fastest growth rate in memory during 1977.

They have seen evidence of confusion and indecision on economic policy by the President and his advisers, capped by the replacement of Arthur F. Burns, the Federal Reserve's most ardent spokesman for a conservative monetary policy.

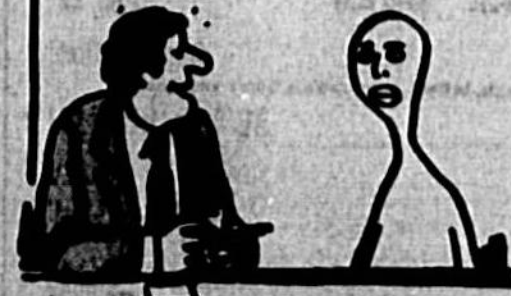
They have seen the Congress hold time and again at the hand decisions of an emergency policy that would effectively curb our appetite for foreign oil. They have seen Americans living high off the hog in terms of energy and credit, with no sign that we are about to change. Small wonder that they should get nervous about their dollar accounts as they closed their books for 1977.

The administration's decision for a \$30 billion intervention on behalf of the dollar presumably was made before Mr. Carter took his foreign tour, but by design or coincidence it was announced while he was abroad.

No doubt it was welcomed, especially in oil-exporting countries like Saudi Arabia, with their swollen accounts of cheapened dollars, and in Western Europe, which is worried that the international trade and monetary system will come apart if the basic currency, the dollar, keeps going the way it's been going, deterring import and export markets.

But the intervention will have brought no more than a pause in a situation that continues to deteriorate if Mr. Carter does not return to domestic affairs with a better perception of why that step became necessary. Confidence in the dollar will rise with a buoyancy of its own when the United States steps going around in circles in the search for responsible economic and energy policies. This is a task of leadership for the Carter administration, but the result will determine whether the American dollar regains its historic strength and deserves to remain the leading currency of the Western world.

Alexander pointed out that the commission could control the port by approving specific appropriations and expenditures on a "line-item" basis.

Muriel To Senate Seat?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Muriel Humphrey may be asked to take her husband's seat in the Senate until a special election can be held to choose a successor, Washington sources said today.

Sen. Gen. Rudy Perpich reportedly is considering asking Mrs. Humphrey to take the interim appointment, but has not yet raised the subject with her, the sources said. They said he probably would wait a "decisive interval" of perhaps two to three weeks before making the suggestion, said last Friday at his Waverly, Minn., home after a long fight with cancer. He was buried Monday.

The question of his successor is "not exactly a subject you raise at a funeral," one source observed.

It was unclear whether Mrs. Humphrey would be receptive to such an offer. She recently has been treated for angina, a painful heart ailment, and her own health might be a factor in her willingness to serve even a short time in the Senate.

Minnesota state law now requires a vacant Senate seat to be filled only through a governor's appointment with no provision for a special election. But Minnesota political sources indicated there probably will be legislation this year to mandate special elections for vacant Senate seats—the same practice followed for those vacancies.

If the law passes, both U.S. Senate seats probably would be at stake in the general election next November.

Perpich reportedly thinks Mrs. Humphrey would be an ideal "caretaker"—a person with no political ambitions who would not want the Senate job for long nor be interested in seeking re-election.

Humphrey was returned to the Senate by an overwhelming margin in the fall of 1970, and nearly five years remain of that term.

Another factor in Perpich's hopes to name Mrs. Humphrey to the Senate is the lack of another likely Democratic candidate for the job. Perpich has repeatedly said he will never go to Washington; the only other potential Democrat who might be interested, Attorney General Warren Spanner, wants and is virtually assured of getting a federal judgeship.

A New Lingo

The skateboarder who has captivated young people in this country for the last few years has brought with it its own particular jargon — along with a proliferation of broken arms and sprained knees.

Skaters can "shoot the tube," "carve the lip" and do "fly-aeris" and "tail tags" to their hearts' content without being heard.

While the beginners may end up "eating the wall" or "rigging out" (taking a spill), more often than not, protective knee and elbow pads, gloves and helmets usually prevent serious injury.

"Hot" (accidentally) skaters with their "hot board" and "hot wheels" like to try "bulleting serious" (skating to the top of the lip on the way, fly out and make a "360").

To do a 360 the skater spins around standing on the tail of the board at a 90 degree angle.

"Carving the wall" is when the skater goes up the wall and down the side, while "carving the lip" is skateboarding around the rim of the wall on two wheels.

A 180 off the lip or "one wheeler" is when the skater goes up the wall and stands the board up on one wheel in the dirt at a 180 degree angle before descending.

In a "top slide" or "lip slide," the skater goes up over the top of the wall and goes into a four-wheel slide with two of the wheels on top and two on the wall.

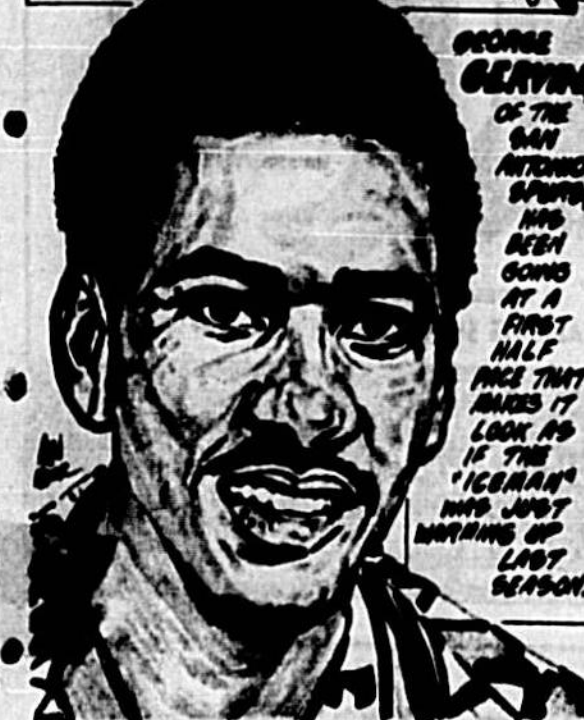

Currently paid \$18 weekly, Seaman said Mrs. Major's salary will be increased to \$133 weekly, the same amount currently paid to Mrs. Seaman. The mayor said that, although he is not formally not qualified for the permanent position, he is looking for someone with a "semi-administrative background and with experience in some kind of government."

Mrs. Seaman said Wednesday that Seaman told her after a Tuesday night workshop meeting that he would not "I think this should stand as a warning to other employees at city hall to shape up or ship out."

conflict and could rule objectively in the matter. Two attorneys names had been submitted Wednesday night for consideration—Julian of the law firm of Shumway, Davis and Mcintosh, who is Longwood city attorney, by Daniels and Howard Marsee of the Orlando law firm of Pitts, Ross, Kubacki and Rumberger of Orlando, by Pelletier. Marsee had formerly been county attorney. Tom Freeman, the Hattaway attorney, said that Julian's law firm has "over the years represented us on different occasions. I bring it up in all fairness to the council," he said.

The majority of council agreed that questions in writing would be submitted to Julian. And Daniels said that among the questions submitted should be whether the city's subdivision ordinance requires that

Affirmative Action Plan Delay Sought

Seminole County will seek a two-week delay in the Jan. 31 deadline for submitting an affirmative action plan to the federal government. Roger Newswander, county administrator, said he would contact federal officials today.

He said the delay is needed due to a busy work schedule next week for his staff and the county commission. Several major items are scheduled for commission consideration Tuesday, according to Newswander. He said the commission will take action on the merger of Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA) and the Seminole County Industrial Development Authority (SCIDA). Also on the commission's agenda Tuesday is a decision on the purchase of the old district school board office and the Hummel building. In addition, the commission is slated to deliver its legislative package to the local delegation one week from today.

The affirmative action plan must be approved by the department of labor for the county to continue receiving \$7.46 million in Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) funds. Ron Thames, personnel director, said federal officials here "just indicated that exactly what happens is as if the Jan. 31 deadline is not met." However, Newswander offered some speculation on that topic. "I would imagine we would have the CETA people down here trying to determine if there has been a breach of good faith and possibly freezing funds," if the delay is not approved, said Newswander.
