DISMISSAL OF SIR FRANCIS AGLEN IS BLAMED ON JAPS

Harvey Myers Sentenced By Hillsborough Judge Today For Violation Of Florida Statutes On Anti-Gambling

Defendant To File An Appeal Shortly

Jockey And Kennel Clubs In Tampa Winding Up Affairs This Week, Says Dispatch

TAMPA, Fla., Feb. 1.—(INS)—Criminal Judge W. R. Putney today sentenced Harvey Myers, president of the defunct West Coast Jockey Club to serve one year in the county jail for violation of the state anti-gambling laws at Tampa down last winter. The court denied a motion for a new trial.

Sir Francis was dismissed by the Pekin government when he declined to collect new sur-taxes. British officials today stated that Sir Francis had no authority under the existing mandate to collect sur-taxes. A new mandate from the powers was needed before he could take this step, it was said, and Japan had objected to the granting of such a mandate.

The government as yet has made no protest against the dismissal of Sir Francis.

Although the government has taken no action yet on the protest of the Pekin government against the dispatch of British troops to China, it is understood the matter will be aired at an early cabin meeting.

China's protest to the League of Nations has caused some irritation here but no worry, as it is the British opinion that the League will support its action in sending troops on the grounds that they were necessary to protect British life and property.

The note of protest from Wellington Koo "ignores facts," said a semi-official statement today, and "what happened at Hankow and Kiukiang is considered as sufficient answer to the protest."

The foreign office added today that the negotiations with Eugene Chen were too delicate for comment at present.

Hungary To Make No Governmental Change For 5 Years, Is Claim

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—(INS)—The Hungarians have decided to make no changes in their country partly by force and partly by birthright.

If the Hungarians control the country, they will be expected to make a new order of things as quickly as possible.

The first step will be to get a western power to establish relations with China as soon as possible.
