TAMPA, Fla., Feb. 1.—(INS)—  
Criminal Judge W. R. Pette-way  
today sentenced Harvey Myers,  
president of the defunct West  
Coast Jockey Club to serve one  
year in the county jail for violation  
of the state anti-gambling laws at  
Tampa Downs last winter. The  
court denied a motion for a new  
trial.

Myers is ill at his home at Cov-  
ington, Ky. He was represented by  
attorneys Palmer, Dickinson and  
Shurley. Only one of 40 accused  
in the case was brought to trial  
attorneys asked the judge to fine,  
not to imprison Myers because of  
his poor health.

It was stated Myers was only the  
nominal head of the club. Three  
thousand dollar super-dense bond  
was posted to permit Myers to re-  
main at liberty pending the out-  
come of an appeal to the Supreme  
Court.

The Jockey and Kennel Clubs of-  
ficials are winding up their affairs,  
and paying off their employees  
this week. Solicitor R. E. L. Chan-  
ney indicated he would not press  
criminal charges against the jock-  
eys unless the track is re-  
opened. Owners of horses and dogs  
are moving to other tracks today.

Clearwater and Safety Harbor.

## WIFE DID NOT KISS HIM, SAYS E. W. BROWNING

She Promised And Promised  
But All I Got Was Prom-  
ise," Declares "Daddy" On  
The Stand At White Plains

Spent Much Money On  
Wife, Mate, 52, Says

Charges Of Cruelty Denied  
By Plaintiff Who Says He  
Was Always Considerate

COURT HOUSE, WHITE  
PLAINS, N. Y., Feb. 1.—Edward  
W. "Daddy" Browning, elderly  
New York City millionaire, was a  
"helpless" husband during his an-  
nual married life with sixteen-  
year-old "Teaches" Heenan Brown-  
ing, he testified on the witness  
stand at the trial of his separation  
suit today.

"She repeatedly repudiated me,"  
"Daddy" said in a plaintiff's de-  
claration. "She promised and prom-  
ised but all I got was promise. She  
said she would love me if I bought her  
lots of pretty things. I did but  
still she did not love me."

"Daddy" talked with a low drawl  
in his voice and he seemed to be  
nervous. He repeatedly stroked  
his hair and at times his voice al-  
most choked.

Q—Tell us when you met Fran-  
ces Heenan Browning?  
A—At the McAlpin Hotel. I  
had just been to a dance at the  
Plaza and wanted to stay there for  
half an hour. I met my wife at  
the dance and we danced together.  
She gave me her telephone num-  
ber and said I could call.

Q—How did you meet her?  
A—I was introduced to her.  
Q—When did you next see her?  
A—Ten days or so later.  
Q—What did she tell you when  
you first met her?  
A—She told me she was 23  
years old. Then her age came  
down to 20. When I sent my  
manager to see her mother, Mrs.  
Heenan told him Frances was not  
quite sixteen years old.

"Daddy" testified that shortly  
after he met "Teaches" she want-  
ed him to get her a job.  
"But," he continued, "I thought  
she ought to go to school as I  
gave her \$300 to go to school."

Q—Did she use the money to go  
to school?  
A—She did not. She took the  
\$300 and bought clothes with it.  
Dorothy Ten Years Old  
Mack then asked Browning how  
old his adopted daughter, Dor-  
othy Sunshine Browning, is.  
"Ten years old," replied "Dad-  
dy."

Q—Is she legally adopted?  
A—No.  
The questioning then switched  
to the acid burning of "Teaches"  
who was mysteriously burned with  
an acid concoction last spring while  
she was sleeping in her home one  
morning.

"I was notified by her mother  
that she was burned. She called  
me over the telephone at my of-  
fice," said Browning. "I rushed to  
her home. When I got there I was  
taken into the room. I looked at  
her and said: 'My, she is badly  
burned.' So I went to a drug store  
and got some soothing ointment.  
When I got back doctor Herman  
was there."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—(INS)—  
The Democrats launched another  
drive in the Senate this afternoon  
for the enactment of tax reduction  
legislation at the present session.

With an initiative, the dem-  
ocrats called behind the Harri-  
son resolution expressing the  
"sense of the Senate" that "perma-  
nent tax legislation shall be en-  
acted at the present session of the  
Senate for sufficient reduction of tax-  
ation to absorb the surplus now in the  
treasury."

Harri-son said that if the res-  
olution were rejected, the dem-  
ocrats would "speak every day" on  
the necessity for tax reduction.

Mrs. Ross, who is visiting Flor-

of The Herald that as each day  
passed in Florida, new wonders

state could not be equaled. "Your  
winter climate is superb and re-  
minds me of the summers in Wy-  
oming. I can realize that the  
winter visitor to the people of  
Florida, is similar to our summer

## BRISTLING BATTLES OF BARE FIST DAYS (MY LIFE STORY) Jack McAuliffe

After Harry Force challenged him, Dempsey went to John Shanley and raised \$500, the side bet demanded. Money was scarce and that \$500 seemed as large as \$5000 today.

Dempsey was a strict trainer and worked every day as a rooper. Although a champion, his family would not let him idle like the prominent stars of today.

There were no special arrangements. I acted as his second and on Sept. 3, 1883, we climbed into a cab after sneaking an old towel and bucket out of the house. Neither of us spoke about the fight during the long ride down to Coney Island.

I have been in the dressing rooms of champions in recent years and it amuses me to think of what these old timers went through. Take two boys at Madison Square Garden going on for a six-round prelim. Why, they have a manager and about five seconds and yards of tape. Their faces are greased. They sniff salts, swallow stimulants and have gaudy robes and fancy tights. They go in a well-lighted arena to a well-padded ring preceded by two cops.

Dempsey and I arrived at Coney Island and found the ring pitched on the sand under the old Brighton elevated line, torn down since then. It was after midnight there, but we waited until nearly daybreak before word was given it was safe to proceed. Frank Stevenson was the referee.

The fight went 30 rounds and Dempsey hammered the daylights out of Force. The look-out sounded "Police!" shortly after it was all over and we all scattered for home.

My part as a second was merely to get down on my other leg and make a seat out of my other leg on which he would sit. I would hand him a towel but there was no stunt like towel swinging.

The strategy was based on the principle of wearing down or blinding an opponent. It was suicide to lead to the head with bare knuckles as they would be smashed. They could also fracture on the elbow so the boys played for the body and waited for an opening.

Dempsey beat Force by fainting him off guard. He punched to the body with his left hand. Force doubled up and leaned over instinctively to relieve the pain. His jaw was exposed. What! And Dempsey troosed with his deadly right and it was all over.
