Thieves using Tunisian coins to get quarters from vending machines

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has taken two reports within the past week regarding larceny-theft of money from vending machines.

In one case, a victim reported losing \$233 in quarters from a vending machine. Apparently, thieves are substituting coins from another nation, and then using the coin return mechanism to get U.S. quarters. The coins are roughly the same size and weight as a U.S. quarter.

According to investigators' research, the coins appear to be a five-millime Tunisia coin that is being substituted. According to the victim, there have been other instances involving vending machines on Interstates 4, 75 and 95 and the total loss could be \$3,000.

Residents oppose new apartments

SANFORD — Residents of the Sanora subdivision plan to speak out against an apartment complex that developers hope to build on Airport Boulevard.

The 336-unit, three-story project is adjacent to a block of single-family homes near the subdivision's clubhouse. Some residents don't want any apartments built on the property.

"We don't want it, we don't want it, we

don't want it. Is that clear enough?" said Libby Barker, who has lived in Sanora for 22 years.

Other residents are resigned to the fact that the property will be developed. They just want a say in how it occurs.

"It's inevitable that they are going to

build apartments," said Rick Gardner, whose property is next to the proposed project. "I can live with that. But the plan they want to do is about three stories of apartments right next to my property line. That would be a disgrace, and I'm going to fight it."

Gardner is one of several Sanora residents who plan to attend the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission Thursday night. He hopes to convince P&Z members to reduce the apartments to two stories, at least where the complex abuts single-family residential.

"It seems reasonable to me," Gardner said.

City planners made the same recommendation, but an attorney for the property

Area officials discuss water supply during Central Florida summit

Seminole County elected officials journeyed Thursday to the Orange County Convention Center to take part in the first Central Florida water summit designed to address area water supply challenges and solutions.

Louis C. Murray Jr., chief of hydrologic studies at the U.S. Geological Survey in Altamonte Springs, and Hal Wilkening, the St. Johns Water District director of resource management, helped alert officials from seven different counties to specific water concerns.

In the last 50 years, the Upper Florida Aquifer has declined five to 10 feet in West Seminole County, according to Murray. Some of the largest dips have come in the Orange County area. From the 50s to the early 90s, Murray said the cities of Orlando and Winter Park alone have increased pumped gallons of water from the aquifer by ten-fold.

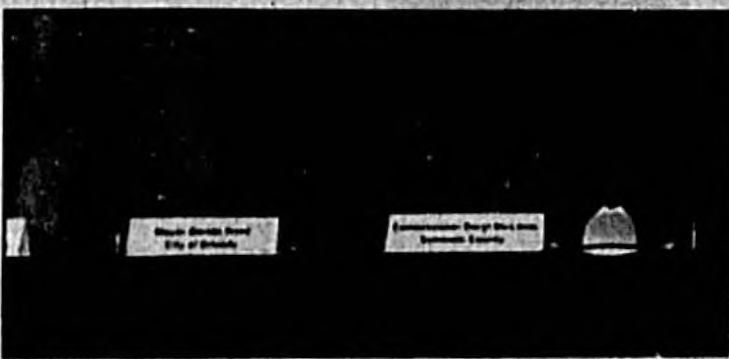
Increased pumping from the aquifer not only furthers exhausting the resource, but it also effects spring flow, lakes' water levels and wetlands' hydro periods. He also stated the aquifer has contracted more chloride and unwanted minerals in the past years. In Seminole County, areas around Oviedo have seen the biggest increase with Chloride infiltration.

"Land use changes and ground water withdrawals have affected the quantity and quality of water resources," Murray said.

Wilkening said that by 2020 aquifer pumping would have to increase by 65 percent to meet demands. That could cause the aquifer to drop another couple of feet in the Sanford area and five to 10 feet in Orlando.

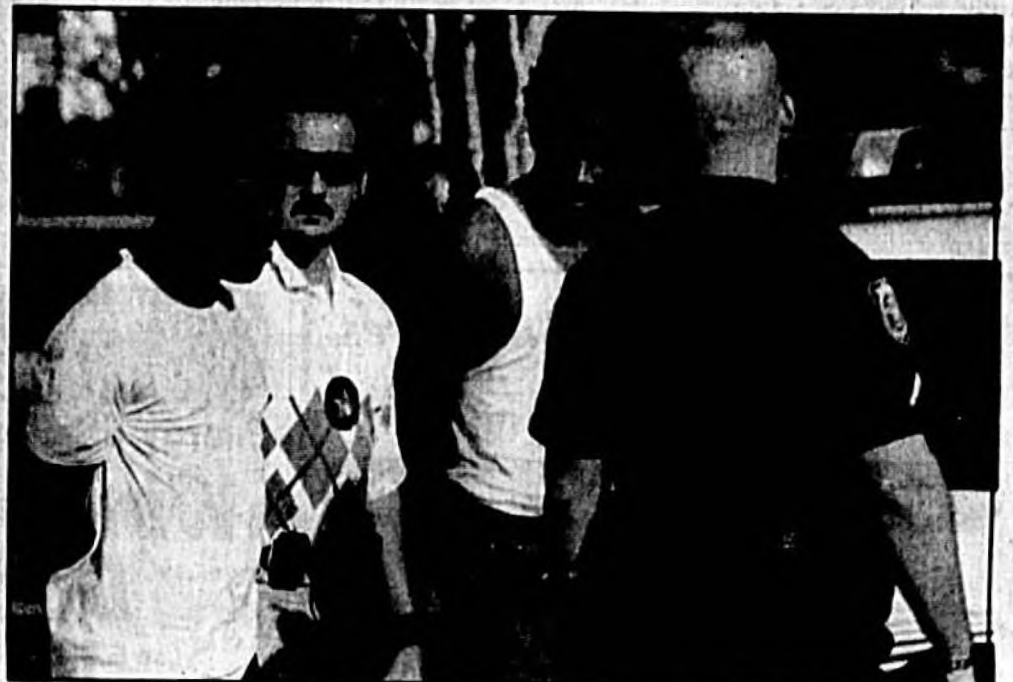
"The aquifer can meet a good portion of that need, but not all those needs can be met without harmful effects to lakes, wetlands and springs," he said. "We want to make sure our lakes in

LAKE MARY — Four men were arrested Tuesday after an incident at Lake Mary High School.

Seminole County Sheriff's Office deputies were advised by a student Sunday that an unidentified male had threatened to "bring some heat after school."

As the school day wound down Tuesday at Lake Mary High School, Resource Officer Carl Tipton, who was aware of the threat, noticed a suspicious truck behind the row of parked buses. Boxing the truck in between his patrol car and the buses,

Lake Mary Preparatory begins Phase II

LAKE MARY — The Griffins are growing.

Lake Mary Preparatory School faculty and staff officially marked the beginning of Phase II in the facility's construction plan Thursday during a ground breaking ceremony. Once finished, the second phase in the school's building process will include a 22,000 square foot elementary building and sports complex.

"If you ask any of our faculty and staff, they will say they have been waiting for this for two years," Pouneh Alcott said. "We've experienced tremendous

growth during the last few years."

Lake Mary Preparatory, with the Griffin as its mascot, is one of seven campuses worldwide operated by Learning Unlimited International Schools, a not for profit organization founded by Alcott and her husband, Bill, in 1976. Five campuses are in Ohio, while an international campus is located in St. Maarten, Netherlands Antilles.

Lake Mary Preparatory School, located on Rantoul Lane next to the city's Sports Complex, opened in 1999. Initial construction included a 45,000 square foot building containing classrooms, laboratories for science,

computer and art, instrumental and vocal rooms, a library/media center, a regulation sized gymnasium, a performance stage, lunchroom, administrative offices and a soccer field.

Initial enrollment was 200 students in grades Pre-K through 10. Today, enrollment has increased to 500 students, and the school added the 11th grade during the 2000/01 school year.

Due to the facility's rapid rate of growth, the faculty and staff decided to accelerate the school's expansion plans. According to Alcott, the school anticipates a growth rate of 30 percent by the

Be a good neighbor

The Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission has the opportunity to make Sanford a better place Thursday night when it considers a proposal for the Groves At Sanford, a 336-unit apartment complex on Airport Boulevard. No one denies that the property owners have the right, as well as the proper zoning, to pursue their project.

But rights come with responsibilities, and the Groves' developers have a duty to minimize the effects of their project on homeowners in the Sanora subdivision. To date, they don't appear to be interested in being good neighbors. The developers and their representatives continue to insist on providing a minimal buffer zone for three-story apartments adjacent to a quite neighborhood of single-family homes.

The Planning and Zoning Commission should require the developers to increase the buffer zone to 50 feet (they want 15) and put the building setback at 100 feet. Furthermore, P&Z members should deny any three-story apartment buildings next to single-family homes. Three stories is too high, too intrusive for Krider Road residents, many who have lived in the neighborhood for more than a decade.

It's a reasonable compromise. In preliminary site plans, there are three buildings adjacent to single-family homes. If those are reduced to two-story buildings, it still leaves the development with about 300 units.

Of course, commissioners should prepare themselves for the inevitable battle cry of the developer: "We need more units to make the numbers work!" Tough! If the project won't work by following the rules and being a good neighbor, the developers should find a different way to make money. Commissioners are under no obligation to grant variances solely because of financial concerns. They themselves have a duty to base their decisions on what is best for the entire community. The

A solution that both Sanora residents and the developer could live with is achievable. Residents are open to discussions, but so far the development team has not scheduled a meeting, though they're scrambling to put together a last-minute dog and pony show before Thursday's P&Z meeting.

Unless there is a change of heart by the property owners, the Planning and Zoning Commission must force the Groves at Sanford to be the good neighbors they don't want to be.

Snow reminds us to remember vets

To the editor:

City board members need more training

On Jan. 17, I attended a hearing before the city of Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission. The purpose of the hearing was for the Commission to decide on a "Conditional use request for wholesale and storage of non-venomous reptiles at 210 and 212 Sanford Avenue."

This location is a little more than one block south of what is generally considered the "peaceful downtown" where people can leisurely stroll by antique shops. My business faces 2nd Street and borders the alleyway behind the Sanford Avenue location.

For several months, I and other businesses have been plagued by waste water that is used to clean the reptile cages. The waste accumulates on the parking area, runs down the alley, across a public sidewalk and into a storm drain that feeds into the St. Johns River. In addition, occupants of the building where the pet store is located have reported snakes showing up in their offices and in areas surrounding the building. One mail carrier reported seeing a boa constrictor and neighboring homes have reported snakes. There were also reports of dead animals in nearby dumpsters.

The business owner of J.P. Pets did not obtain an occupational license from the city or Seminole County even though he has occupied the facility since September.

I was stunned when it became apparent that I was the only person at the hearing to speak out against this issue. I provided photos of the parking and alley areas where the animal cages were being washed. I also provided photos of some of the loose snakes.

What blew my mind was that the P&Z commission voted to approve a conditional use that allows this business to continue at this location for another year, provided they adhere to a few regulations now imposed. The business owner has broken every zoning

and licensing regulation imposed by the city.

A few months ago, I was visited at my business by a member of the city code enforcement. She left me with a list of what constitutes "strict" code violations. Among them was the requirement that I had to obtain permission from the Sanford Historic Preservation Board in order to paint the front of my business. It was white, and I wanted to paint it white. I went to City Hall and obtained their signature and approval. This is the way it should work. What I don't understand is why code enforcement was

not able to deal with severe code violations practically next door to me.
At the hearing, not one member of the commission asked the city staff to explain their justification for recommending approval of a conditional use permit. I don't believe the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission as a whole can operate in the best interest of the city of Sanford and its taxpayers. This is not their fault. I do not blame them, nor do I blame the current City Commission or City Management. The problem, in my opinion, has evolved by trying to balance services against available monies while holding the line on taxes. Members of this commission and other boards are appointed to their role as non-compensated volunteers. They receive no training on what their duties and responsibilities are and they are not held accountable to anyone for their decisions. They act on recommendations of paid city staff members who they traditionally hold in trust as having researched the matter, both legally and in the best interest of the city. In addition, the Florida Sunshine Law, although valid, restricts their ability to research or discuss a problem at hand until it is before them

in a hearing.
The matter before them on Jan. 17 was one of the most blatant examples of noncompliance they will ever experience. Except for chairman Mike Skat, who voted against this proposal, everyone else voted for the approval. People who sit on these commissions or boards must realize they can vote their own convictions. They can vote against city staff recommendations. They can vehemently oppose other members of the board if they choose.

As a minimum, every member of a board like Planning and Zoning should receive at least eight hours of training before hearing an issue. This training should include, among other factors, their duties and responsibilities (including the Sunshine Law), some technical orientation to the process they are deciding on and examples of the effects of their potential decisions. They should also be sworn in before a public gathering, such as a meeting of the City Commission, to impress upon everyone the significance of their appointment. If they are not adequately able to understand and deal with the issues before them, our system of control is seriously weakened. How are they ever going to be able to say not to a petitioner when it is warranted if they are conditioned to respond strictly to the limited input of city staff?

It is time for the city of Sanford to fix this problem. Some of those I have discussed this with suggest our county boards need this training, as well. If we don't fix this problem, we'll have more snakes and lizards running our streets. How about anacondas? They fall into the category approved as non-venomous reptiles. Forty-footers shouldn't be a problem, should they?

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Debt frets: If you throw a party and everybody comes only to have the show canceled, do you still have to pay for it? Apparently not if you're the Downtown Business Association.

The crane operator for the DBA's laser show in December has called city officials complaining that he has not been paid. He also can't get DBA diva Sara Jacobson to return his calls.

The show was canceled because of high winds. The crane operator was wary of hoisting a five-story movie screen in 25 mph winds. That didn't sit well with Jacobson, who thought the operator should have thrown caution to the wind, literally.

Jacobson said the laser show people have agreed to come back for another show and not charge DBA for the Christmas event. She expects the same from the Sorrento-based crane operator. Don't count on it. He wants his \$1,300. Guess for now, he'll have to settle for Sara's gracious charm.



The eyes have it: Expect the Sanford firefighters union to approve a new contract with the city. The vote is Feb. 8, and the firefighters are generally pleased with the contract. The biggest concern was over a pay scale compression issue. That seems to have been worked out.

Contempt of court: Whether arguing over who hires the general master or jockeying for position to supervise law clerks, Seminole County judges have a history of trivial infighting.

That may change if the judicial circuit's top dog has his way.

Bruce Jacobus took over in July 2001 as the 18th Circuit's Chief Judge and gave the Seminole judges six months to put their bickering on the back burner. The quibbling didn't stop so Jacobus dropped the hammer last week.

He was spurred to action after the Orlando paper published a column by Jim Toner. Judge Alan Dickey sent Toner a letter indicating that "a majority (if not all) of the judges" would prefer to stay in downtown Sanford rather than move to a new courthouse at Five Points in the city's southern tip.

While insiders say Dickey's view is popular, it is by no means unanimous. Furthermore, Seminole judges rarely speak with one voice — whether they agree or not — and some were irritated by Dickey's presumption to speak for the group. Some remarks began circulating throughout the courthouse, at which point Jacobus delivered a blistering rebuke to the judges' petty politics.

Behind closed doors, the Chief Judge reminded Seminole jurists of the low esteem in which they're viewed throughout the state, primarily because of their quarrelsome ways. Jacobus put the group on notice: Shape up and begin working together or prepare to face his wrath.

Several in the know said it was about time the judges received a "verbal spanking."

"Good for him," a source said. "There's too much maneuvering on the minutiae."

This is the digital age? Speaking of the new courthouse, there's a dirty little secret no one wants to admit. More than one courthouse fly has buzzed the Clock about the real reason behind the cramped quarters. The space crunch has more to do with paperwork than people. There's plenty of courtroom space but not nearly enough room to house the growing mountain of records generated by residents doing business — voluntarily or otherwise — at the courthouse.

All those judgments, marriages, divorces, traffic tickets, et. al. must be kept, but with advances in technology, you'd think those records would be filed electronically rather than in bulky cabinets. Granted, purchasing the technology to record and store those files electronically is costly, but it's got to be cheaper than the \$48 million taxpayers are shelling out for a new courthouse.

Actually the campaign to relocate the courthouse to Five Points from downtown Sanford has at least 40 years of history. The original Clock keeper, former Herald Editor Larry Vershel, reported extensively in 1966 on the South Seminole Jaycees' effort to force the courthouse move to Five Points. Problem was, Five Points was three miles south of the city limits of Sanford, the county seat.

The Jaycees argued that the courthouse should be centrally located, which begs the question: Why have county politicians expended so much energy over the years to fight geography battles in the state's third smallest county? North to south, Seminole County is about 15 miles wide. It's not much bigger east to west.

James Gilbert Hubbard, 45, and Brenda, 43, both of Jacksonville, face charges of grand theft, possession of stolen merchandise and drug charges.

They were booked into the Orange County Jail, since they were captured there.

Truants Beware

Seminole County deputies assigned to Juvenile Crime Enforcement and Intervention just concluded three days of enhanced truancy enforcement, which resulted in 42 students being taken to the Juvenile Assessment Center last week. The Seminole County School District was a partner in this effort.

Deputies went to suspected hangouts for truants, as well as the homes of kids who chronically skip school. The students were taken to the STAY area at the Juvenile Assessment Center, where they sat in a classroom until their parents or guardians could come to pick them up.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has noticed a correlation between juvenile crime and skipping school, such as daytime burglaries and other undesirable behavior, and is taking efforts to prevent it.

Lewd and Lascivious

A Wekiva area man is in custody for lewd and lascivious exhibition in the presence of a child and an adult. He's identified as 22-year-old Kevin Ryan Powell. He was residing at a relative's house on Holderness Drive in Longwood at the time of his arrest Thursday. On Wednesday, the Seminole County Sheriff's Office received a third party complaint that there was a man who has been exposing himself to children who walk to and from school at nearby Wekiva Elementary.

A deputy did surveillance Wednesday and witnessed the suspect pacing back and forth in his yard when the children passed by after school, but did not see the suspect expose himself to children. Later in the day, however, the sheriff's office received a call from a woman who lives near a jogging path in the neighborhood.

She reported to deputies that a man was doing lewd things on the path, and she, her 14-year-old daughter and 1-year-old child witnessed it. Deputies responded and found the suspect walking on the jogging path, not far from the victims' residence. Powell was taken into custody and positively identified by the adult and 14-year-old victims. He would later make statements that he allegedly exposed himself to the adult victim, as a prank.

He is now in the John E. Polk Correctional Facility held on a \$10,000 bond.

For better or worse, Sanford experiencing huge growth in new apartment complexes

SANFORD — Depending on who you talk to, Sanford has too many apartment complexes or not enough.

No doubt apartments are attracting a lot of attention in recent months as new complexes are built on State Road 46 and Rinehart Road. According to estimates provided by the city's planning department, 3,800 apartment units have been proposed, built or are under construction since 1998. Assuming two people live in each apartment, that's a 20 percent increase in Sanford's population.

"Sanford was this stifled little city, a backwater county seat. Now it has exploded with growth," said Rick Gardner.

Gardner lives in the Sanora subdivision next to the proposed 336-unit Groves at Sanford. He intends to argue that the Groves should construct smaller buildings and provide greater buffer zones, but says development is inevitable.

"Growth is good. I don't have a problem with that. I look at the number of apartments, however, and say, 'Who's moving into all

those places,'" Gardner said. "I don't know anything about apartments, but I'm having a hard time accepting that we need that many apartment complexes."

Mike Skat, chairman of the city's Planning and Zoning Commission, doesn't understand the apartment boom, either.

"Do we need another apartment complex?" Skat asked. "We've got a lot already. In my opinion we're maxed out. At some point you have to ask yourself if we're not getting way ahead of the curve in terms of school capacity and infrastructure."

Jay Marder gets paid to make sure those issues don't present insurmountable problems for Sanford. As the city's director of planning and engineering, Marder has watched the community grow. He notes that while apartment construction has increased in recent years, it's not out of line with other commercial and residential development.

"This is a natural thing for a growing region like Central Florida," Marder said.

He also points out that Sanford's population has grown by 800 to 1,200 people per year for more than a decade. While the

number of apartment units has ballooned, Marder said the actual population has continued a steady increase.

"As far as population spikes, we're not seeing it," Marder said. "It takes a while before these apartment complexes are up to capacity. You can look at the active electrical meters being serviced and get a pretty good idea of how many people are in the city. Those numbers indicate the city has been rolling along on a substantial population growth for 10 years. There are no spikes in those numbers."

Skat brings up another point, too. While apartment construction increased during the last 36 months, the city has rezoned very little property to allow the complexes. Most of the property was zoned for apartments years ago.

"The thing you have to remember is the city can't deny someone the use of their property," Skat said. "Regardless of whether I think we have enough apartments, the city will continue to have multi-family development because that zoning already exists."

The city's responsibility, Skat said, is to ensure apartments — or any other development project —

do not negatively effect surrounding property owners.

"If it is zoned for a certain use, then that use needs to follow the rules regarding density, heights

and setbacks, especially when it abuts single-family residential," Skat said. "When a new development comes in, our goal as a city should be to try and preserve the

nature of the existing land uses as much as possible. Things are going to change, no doubt about it, but I think you have to minimize the effect."

owners, Clayton Investors Ltd. and CWC Investors Ltd., said there are no plans to scale back the project.

"We've considered it internally, but we're still going forward with the three-story plan," Meredith Harper. "The property owner needs to achieve the unit count to make the project feasible."

Harper said the developer doesn't intend change the buffer zone to 50 feet as required by an ordinance passed in December.

"We had already applied for the site plan and we're exceeding the old standards," Harper said. "The buffer requirement is 10 feet, and we're at 15. We're also exceeding the landscape requirements."

Jay Marder, the city's direc-

tor of planning and engineering disagrees with Harper that the new ordinance doesn't apply. Ordinance 3690, which staff began working on last fall, requires larger buffer zones and building setbacks, as well as more landscaping for multi-family housing developments next to single family homes. He said because site plans have not been approved, the new ordinance could apply.

"P&Z has the final decision, and they could require the developer meet the new ordinance," Marder said.

Barker said she thinks the city should require the stricter regulations.

"I visualize these apartments towering over the neighborhood," Barker said. "It's horrible for someone to have their privacy invaded like that."

Her next-door neighbor, Patti Torres, agrees. Both women say the recent building boom in Sanford has been positive. They would rather the apartments not be built but admit they sometimes suffer from a "not-in-my-back-yard" syndrome.

"We've got the GreeneWay, we've got the airport, and we've got the new bowling alley. Life was good," Torres said. "Now we're going to have to look straight up at these tall apartment buildings. I think it stinks."

"This is a neighborhood where people move in and stay," Barker added. Her family was one of the first on the block in 1980. "We're a little spoiled I guess. We want to have our cake and eat it, too, icing included."

This region continue to be lakes."

He estimates a 100 to 200 million gallons a day will be needed from other sources to meet the expected demand. However, several water conservation strategies could mitigate some of the aquifer impact. He cited an increased use of reclaimed water, artificial aquifer recharge and wetland augmentation — putting water in lakes and wetlands to offset pumping — as several solutions.

"Reclaimed water is now a commodity," Wilkening said.

Summit attendee Sanford Commissioner Art Woodruff agreed with Wilkinson and said the city recently doubled the cost of reclaimed water.

"We increased it (reclaimed water price) because we were almost giving it away for free," Woodruff said.

Sanford currently provides reclaimed water to many areas of the city, and disperses some of the water over citrus crops in Geneva. Murray said dispersing the reclaimed water over citrus crops as proven to be beneficial in recharging the aquifer.

Finding additional water supplies to fulfill future demands is complex and expensive. Wilkening unveiled one of the water district's ideas of how to eliminate shortages. The plan included a desalination plant and several surface water refining plants including a plant on Lake Monroe that would clean the lake's water and pump it to Volusia and Seminole counties. The cost of the total project is estimated at \$1 billion.

"Being a part of the St Johns River puts us right in the middle," Woodruff said.

A discussion, conducted by summit organizer Orange County Chairman Rich Crotty, included a panel of Seminole County Commissioner Daryl McLain, Orlando Mayor Glenda Hood, Lake County Commissioner Robert Poole, Brevard County Commissioner Nancy Higgs and Volusia County Water Alliance Commissioner George Burden.

McLain said the county would continue to push its efforts for water conservation. He cited two such ventures, one with Orange County and Oviedo to bring

reclaimed water to the area, and another with Sanford and the St. Johns Water Management District on an experimental plant near Lake Monroe to purify the lake's water for potable uses. He questioned if the larger, regional solutions will be financially feasible and reasonably priced for consumers.

"Seminole's motto is we're the natural choice and water is a big part of that choice," he said. "We've got to protect to the people and make sure their wells don't dry up."

At the close of the summit, Crotty announced the panel will meet again in February and several more times more in the future — in hopes of developing an East Central Florida Water Agenda by November. The agenda will clarify objectives and goals plus a plan to meet them, Crotty said. An annual review, or Agenda Report Card, will determine how well Seminole, Volusia, Orange, Osceola, Lake, Polk and Brevard counties are proceeding with the agenda.

"If the effort is organized sensibly we can succeed," he said.

With a projected overall growth of 400 percent within the first five years of operation, the school has plenty of room to expand. Currently the school's campus is on 23 acres of land but has access to an additional 24 acres.

Tipton approached the vehicle. As he moved closer, witnesses said one man ran past him jumping into the truck bed as it sped off — crashing through a decorated wooden fence.

"It was like something out of a movie," Tipton exclaimed to fellow deputies as he recounted the incident.

The white Dodge truck escaped the school grounds and pursuing deputies because knocking down a fence does not warrant a high-speed chase, said sheriff's office

spokesman Steve Olson. Shortly after breaking off the chase, a bystander advised deputies he followed the truck and observed four black males abandon the vehicle at 635 Primera Boulevard.

With the truck in hand, authorities learned that it was reported stolen. Deputies established a perimeter around Lake Mary's newest business district with the help of a helicopter, Lake Mary police and a Sanford police K-9 unit. An off-duty Orange County Sheriff's Office deputy also became involved as he spotted three of the

four suspects running out of the nearby woods.

OCSO Deputy Matt Chase, of Lake Mary, said he was dropping his daughter off at a Primera Boulevard orthodontist office when he stopped to talk to several of his Seminole County Sheriff's Office deputy friends patrolling the area.

"I decided to stay in the (orthodontist) parking lot to make sure everything was OK," Chase said after his friends advised him of the situation. "Low and behold, that's when one of the bad guys popped

up."

Running out of the woods, the three suspects tried to hide in an unfinished business office at 910 Williston Place. A cardiology office occupies the building's downstairs, but the second story was still being worked on as two workers observed the three suspects run up the stairwell seeking cover.

"I was coming out here to see if it was OK for the patients when a deputy told me to go back inside and lock the door," said Judy Walker, an employee of the Cardiovascular Center, formerly

Sanford Cardiology Associates.

From inside the structure, deputies arrested Jimmy Franklin, 20, William Carr Jr., 19, and Anthony Cofield, 19, all of Sanford. Tipton responded and identified Carr as the driver of the truck, which he personally knew from the school football team, according to police.

The fourth subject, Terrance Jackson, 19, of Sanford, was caught shortly afterward as he was found hiding underneath a vehicle in the Seimerns' parking lot on Primera Boulevard.

Though deputies are not sure if the four men are connected to the "bring some heat" threat made on Sunday, the sheriff's office did charge Carr with grand theft of a motor vehicle, fleeing police with disregard of others safety, reckless driving, probation violation and driving with a suspended license. Deputies charged the other three suspects with trespassing of a conveyance. Lake Mary police additionally charged the three males found inside the building with burglary to an occupied structure and resisting officers.

SCC men grab second place in M-FC

OCALA — It's taken awhile, but the Seminole Community College men's basketball team is finally playing up to potential.

Wednesday night at Central Florida Community College in Ocala the Raiders picked up a huge Mid-Florida Conference road victory, using a big second half to defeat the Patriots, 74-71.

The victory got SCC over the .500 mark overall, 12-11, since early in the season, but more importantly, raised the Raiders' mark

to 3-1 in the conference, just a game behind M-FC leading Daytona Beach Community College (3-0) which had the night off.

"They worked their butts off tonight," said SCC head coach Stan Cromartie. "They are finally starting to get it and now they have confidence that they can win."

The Raiders wrap up the first half of the M-FC schedule tonight (Saturday) at home and it's important that they come ready to play. A win will lock down at least second place in the conference and could lead to a tie for first as Daytona Beach, the only M-FC team to beat SCC, must face a 17-5

Florida Community College at Jacksonville team that is 3-1 and still seething from a double overtime loss to the Raiders on Saturday.

SCC will be facing a St. Johns River Community College team that picked up its first conference victory of the season Wednesday night, defeating Santa Fe Community College, 82-74, at Tuten Gymnasium in Palatka.

The Vikings (9-13 overall, 1-3 in M-FC) trailed by as many as 14 points in the second half, but outscored the Saints 44-22

SCC women unbeaten in M-FC

OCALA — When in doubt, go inside.

With its 11-game Mid-Florida Conference winning streak in jeopardy Wednesday night, the Seminole Community College women's basketball team went to the old-time power game.

Trailing by two points at halftime, 29-27, and getting virtually nothing from its guards, the Raiders started going to its two post players, 6-foot-5 Yelena Leuchanka and 6-foot Brandt Davis. And the results worked out spectacularly as the duo combined for 27 second half points as the visitors pulled out a 70-63 victory over nationally ranked Central Florida Community College in Ocala.

The victory was the seventh in a row for SCC (14-8), but more importantly was its 12th straight win in the Mid-Florida Conference, fourth in a row this season, and leaves the Raiders atop the conference at 4-0 at the mid-point in the season.

"I was beginning to wonder if I was wrong in playing the difficult schedule that we had in the first half," said SCC head coach Ken Patrick of the pre-conference schedule that saw the team go to the Panhandle on three consecutive weekends and also play in tough tournaments in Ocala and Daytona. "But now it looks like it was a good move. It's amazing that we could win 12 games in a row in a conference this strong. The pressure to keep the streak going is starting to mount."

The Patriots (19-4), ranked No. 7 in the nation, fell into at least third place in the M-FC with a 2-2

record. Daytona Beach Community College only has one loss, at home to SCC, but has an important game against twice-conference beaten Florida Community College at Jacksonville tonight. A loss by DBCC would give the Raiders a solid two-game lead with four to play and drop the other 'Big 3' into a second place tie. Santa Fe Community College is still winless.

SCC's next game will be on the road Wednesday in Gainesville against Santa Fe. The game will be the 6 p.m. opener of a women's/men's doubleheader. The Raider and Saints men will play at 8 p.m.

SCC will return home next Saturday (February 9th) to host nationally ranked Daytona Beach at 6 p.m. The Raider and Falcon men will also follow that game at 8 p.m. at the SCC Health and Physical Education Center. Admission is free.

Kristi Jones shot lights out for CFCC in the opening half, hitting three three-pointers and scoring 11 points as the Patriots built the halftime lead.

The Raiders, meanwhile, were struggling, only making 2-of-11 three-point attempts and 11 of 27 field goal tries overall. The poor outside shooting showed also in the fact that SCC only got to the free throw line four times in the first 20 minutes, making three.

But things changed after halftime as the Raider guards got the ball inside to Davis, a sophomore from Bushnell who missed the first half of the season with a separated shoulder, and the freshman Leuchanka, who appears to be shoo-in for All-America honors.

line as he led the visitors back to a 37-33 halftime deficit to a 10-point lead, 69-59, with 2:55 remaining.

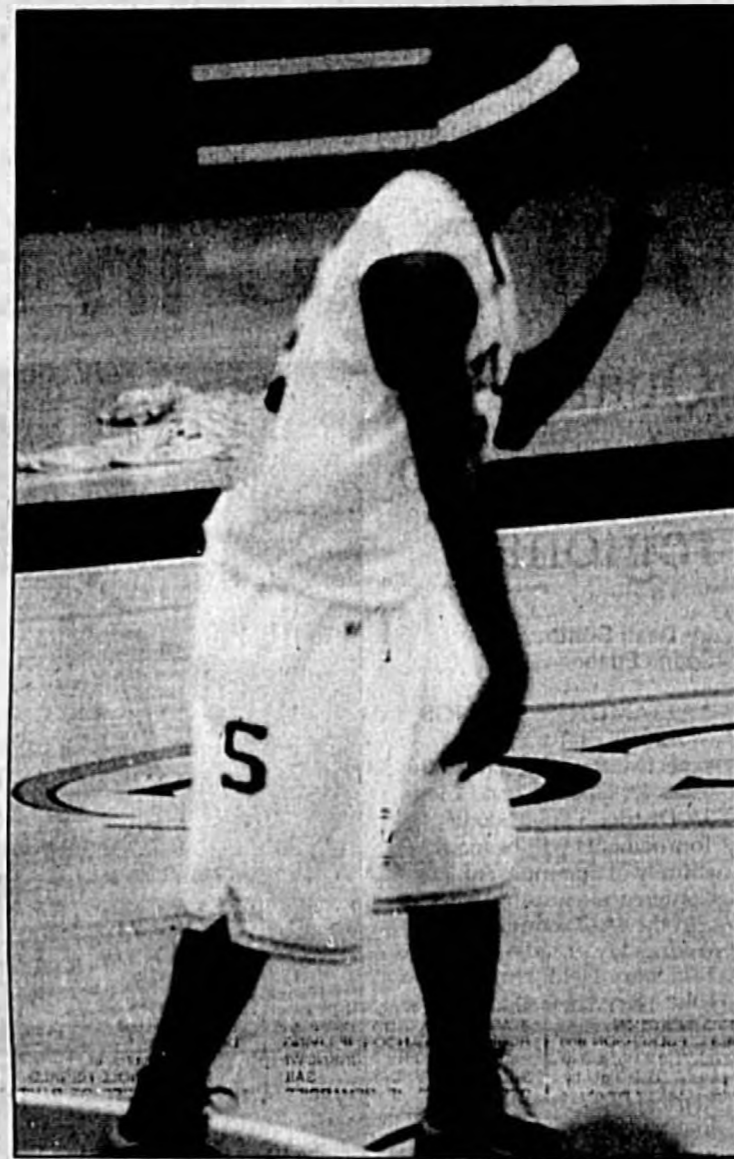
The sophomore also had a game-high seven assists to go along with four rebounds and a steal.

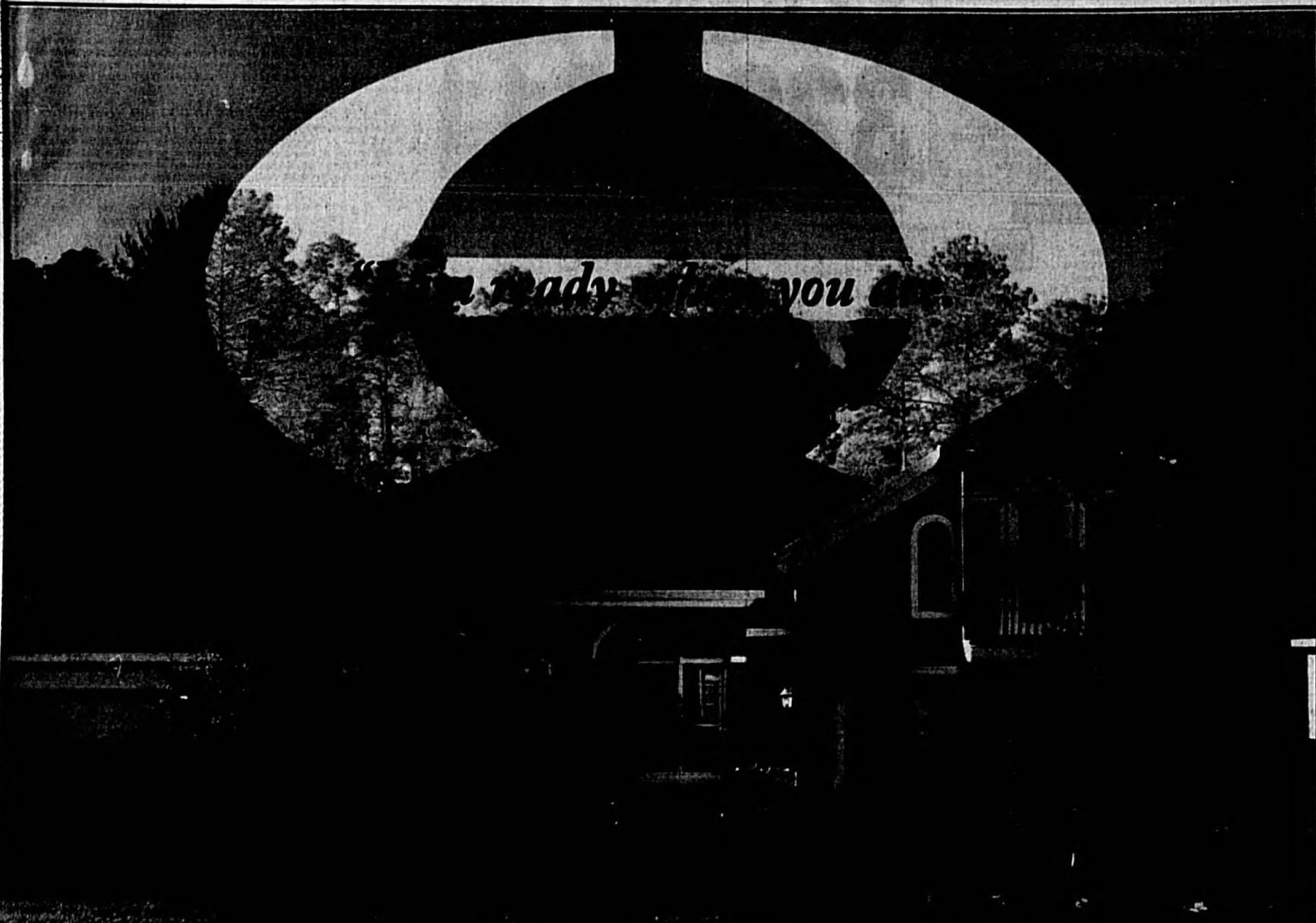

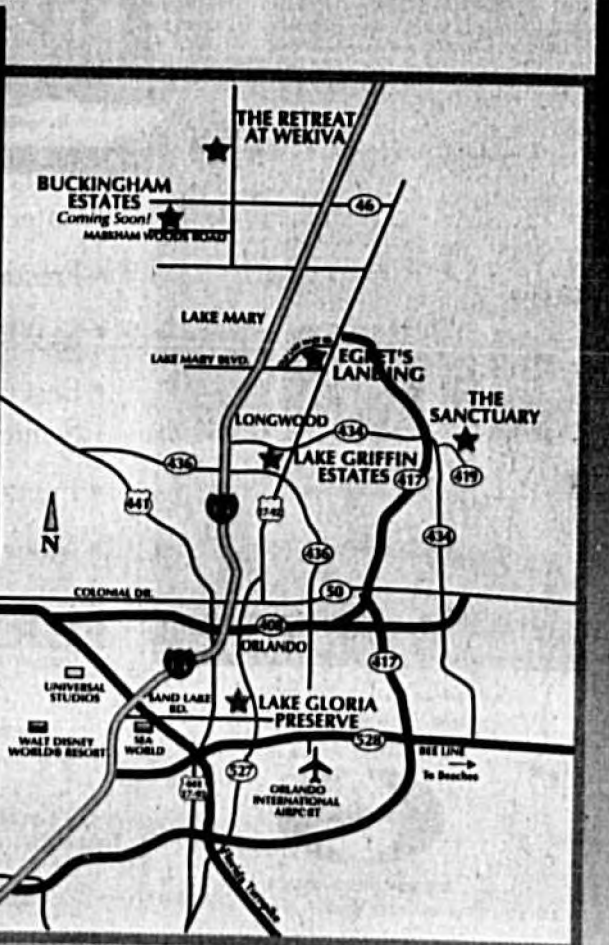

n't always been an option for motorists. Almost as old as the car itself, the first license plates contained only numbers and were made with a porcelain finish. By the 1920s, many states began to issue embossed metal plates made of tin steel or aluminum with numbers stamped into them, which is similar to today's production method.

In the 1980s, Florida began issuing specialty and personalized license plates — an option to the standard plate. As long as a motorist is willing to pay an additional fee, the possible combinations of plate design and lettering are infinite.

Specialty plates range from the manatee, the most popular, to the numerous universities and colleges in Florida. There

are 51 different types of plates, not including the plate with the orange.

The list of letter and number combinations are endless. As long as the message is not obscene or vulgar, under eight letters and not already taken, it's available.

The cost of specialty plates, which are fund-raisers for various organizations, vary

depending on the particular cause. Most are around \$20 in addition to the regular registration tax. Personalized plates cost an additional \$25 when it is ordered and \$12 extra for each year it is issued.

Applications for personalized license plates and a list of specialty plates can be obtained at the Seminole County Tax Collector's Office, located in

the Seminole County Services Building, 1101 E. 1st Street, in Sanford.

As for why people pay the additional costs for a personalized plate, Cara said there is a simple reason.

"If it is something you want bad enough, you will pay a little bit more," Cara said. "It also keeps things from getting dull."

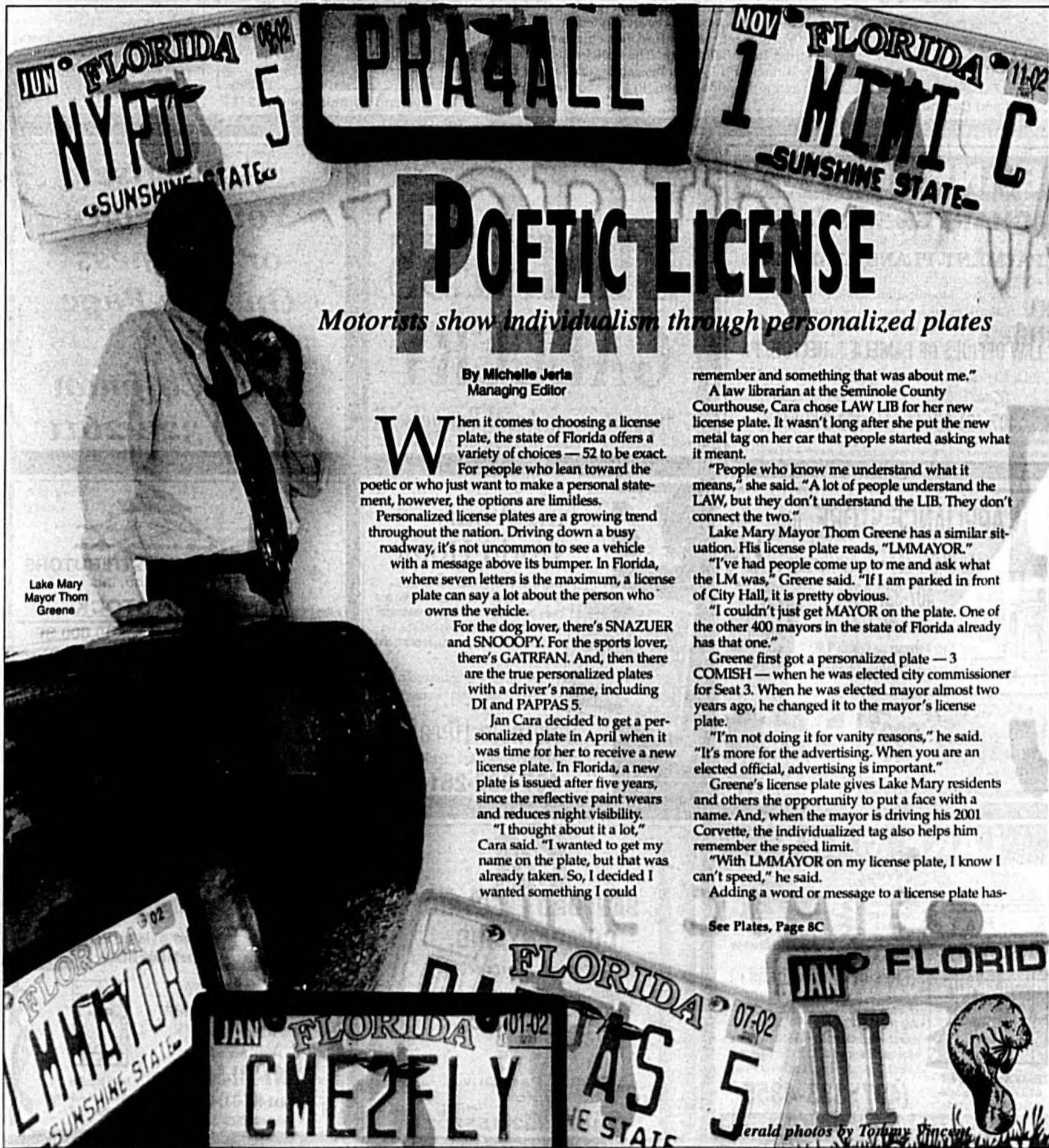

POETIC LICENSE

Motorists show individualism through personalized plates

When it comes to choosing a license plate, the state of Florida offers a variety of choices — 52 to be exact. For people who lean toward the poetic or who just want to make a personal statement, however, the options are limitless.

Personalized license plates are a growing trend throughout the nation. Driving down a busy roadway, it's not uncommon to see a vehicle with a message above its bumper. In Florida, where seven letters is the maximum, a license plate can say a lot about the person who owns the vehicle.

For the dog lover, there's SNAZUER and SNOOPY. For the sports lover, there's GATRFAN. And, then there are the true personalized plates with a driver's name, including DI and PAPPAS 5.

Jan Cara decided to get a personalized plate in April when it was time for her to receive a new license plate. In Florida, a new plate is issued after five years, since the reflective paint wears and reduces night visibility.

"I thought about it a lot," Cara said. "I wanted to get my name on the plate, but that was already taken. So, I decided I wanted something I could

remember and something that was about me."

A law librarian at the Seminole County Courthouse, Cara chose LAW LIB for her new license plate. It wasn't long after she put the new metal tag on her car that people started asking what it meant.

"People who know me understand what it means," she said. "A lot of people understand the LAW, but they don't understand the LIB. They don't connect the two."

Lake Mary Mayor Thom Greene has a similar situation. His license plate reads, "LMMAYOR."

"I've had people come up to me and ask what the LM was," Greene said. "If I am parked in front of City Hall, it is pretty obvious."

"I couldn't just get MAYOR on the plate. One of the other 400 mayors in the state of Florida already has that one."

Greene first got a personalized plate — 3 COMISH — when he was elected city commissioner for Seat 3. When he was elected mayor almost two years ago, he changed it to the mayor's license plate.

"I'm not doing it for vanity reasons," he said. "It's more for the advertising. When you are an elected official, advertising is important."

Greene's license plate gives Lake Mary residents and others the opportunity to put a face with a name. And, when the mayor is driving his 2001 Corvette, the individualized tag also helps him remember the speed limit.

"With LMMAYOR on my license plate, I know I can't speed," he said.

Adding a word or message to a license plate has-

Anise: A curious and tolerant North American plant

There are two North American anise species — yellow anise, a north central Florida native, and Florida anise, which ranges from coastal Florida to Louisiana. Both belong to the genus *Illicium* that includes a cousin from Asia, *I. anisatum*, from which the anise flavoring is extracted commercially.

Given its southern origin, anise is surprisingly hardy and can tolerate winter temperatures as low as 10 degrees.

Yellow Anise

Yellow anise (*I. parviflorum*) is known by many names including Japanese, Star and Ocala anise. Yellow anise is grown for its foliage, rather than

its flowers.

The word *parviflorum* means "small flowered." The tree can grow up to 25 feet, but usually only grows 10 to 12 feet tall and 4 to 8 feet wide. The leaves are simple, leathery, about 4 inches long, with an olive-green color and with a distinct anise aroma when crushed.

The dime-sized, drooping, bell-shaped, yellow flowers have a faint anise fragrance. They emerge in June, but tend to be hidden under new foliage.

Yellow anise is one of our most adaptable plants. It tolerates shade and sun, moist and dry soils. In full sun, it is an upright, tightly growing shrub with erect leaves ranging in color

from yellow to olive green. Dense shade promotes a relaxed habit with medium to dark green leaves and fewer blossoms. Yellow anise responds to shearing and training.

Florida Anise

Though generally a large shrub, Florida anise (*I. floridanum*), also known as purple anise, can become a small tree. Florida anise's native range is from the panhandle to Louisiana, but it does well in Central Florida and tolerates cold to well below freezing. The tree grows to 10 feet tall and 6 to 8 feet wide. Florida anise has showy, deep red, star-shaped flowers up to 2 inches wide that appear in late March or early April.

There are also pink and white varieties. The flowers have 20 to

30 tepals (a word used to describe a flower that have undifferentiated calyx and corolla) and dangle in clusters from branch tips. They also produce an unusual scent that can be detected up to 15 feet away. Large, ridged, disc-shaped fruits that are decorative in their own right follow the flowers.

Florida anise can be grown in shade or full sun. Water requirements will be higher in sun.

Care and Culture

In the wild, anise tends to grow better in humus-rich, neutral to slightly acid soil. They'll also grow in clay soils. Yellow anise is somewhat more adaptable than Florida anise but is provided with adequate organic material and water to establish both will do well in sandy soils.

Anise is hardy and has evolved into a virtually pest-free plant rarely sustaining insect damage, may present mite and scale problems, but none of these problems is considered serious. It is virtually disease free, but drought-stressed plants may develop leaf spots. Anise can be propagated by seeds, branch tip cuttings, and root sprouts. Plant any time in central Florida. Add organic mulch to the planting hole and as a top dressing around the plant. Apply 6-12-12 or 10-10-10 fertilizer in spring and early fall.
