FLORIDA PRISON FARM EARNS BIG SUM DURING MAY

Report Of Superintendent J. S. Flicht Shows Farm Products And Labor Of Prisoners Was Equal to Sum Of \$25,355.29

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., July 5.—(AP)—The state penitentiary, at Raiford, earned \$25,355.29 from farm products and the labor of the men and women of the prison during the month of May, Superintendent J. C. Flicht reported to the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions.

Improvements, maintenance and food, during the same period, cost the state \$22,751.43, Superintendent Flicht stated, leaving \$7,416.14 paid out during May to operate the farm.

The money paid out included payrolls, discharge fees, office expenses and improvements made to the building and equipment.

The money taken in during the month consisted of \$5,252.89 from

the shirt factory; \$7,987.99 from the dairy, poultry yards, cattle and other farm products.

The improvements made with prison labor, Mr. Flicht reported, amounted to \$8,368.32. The average cost for food and tobacco per prisoner was 24 and a fraction cents.

During the month of May, the prison received 99 male and 3 female prisoners from the counties and sent 55 male prisoners out to camps of the state road department. In the five months, ending May 31, according to the superintendent, 12 escaped from the farm and 5 were recaptured; 212 were placed on the roads, and four electrocuted, or were on the electrocution "waiting list."

STEWARTS WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON.—The United States treasury is all smiles. Joseph Caillaux is France's finance minister again. Secretary Mellon and Minister Caillaux speak the same language.

One speaks English and the other speaks French, to be sure, but they get together on the financial language. Inasmuch as they have extremely important financial business to transact—the French war debt—it is of the utmost importance for them to understand each other fully.

M. Caillaux, it will be recalled, was in this country some months ago in connection with the war debt and he and Secretary Mellon got on together admirably. The agreement they reached failed to hold water, it is true, but that was due to outside influences. So far as those two were concerned, they could have come to terms. Both, practical financiers, each gets the other's viewpoint.

THE difficulty in conducting financial negotiation between such men as Secretary Mellon, for example, and Henri Doremer, French ambassador, lies in the fact that the former is a professional financier, the latter only an amateur.

The one's angle is that of a banker. The other's is that of a theorist.

United States secretaries of the treasury generally are theoreticians, too, but it happens that the present one is personally in the financial business—or, throughout most of his life, always has been.

The same is true of M. Caillaux. Caillaux is not a rich man, but riches are reckoned in America.


