#### Spring cleaning

Spring cleaning is being taken outdoors this Saturday when thousands of volunteers around north-central Florida are scheduled to pull trash from the St. Johns River during the 1997 St. Johns River Celebration.

From the river's marshy headwaters west of Vero Beach, through Sanford, to downtown Jacksonville, it is expected to be the largest one-day river cleanup.

"This monster-sized volunteer effort will remove much of the trash that threatens the health of the river and the plants and animals that call it home," said William Segal, chairman of the St. Johns River Water Management District's Governing Board.

Despite a driving rain last year, close to 5,000 volunteers collected nearly 300,000 pounds of garbage out of the river. This year, possibly 10,000 volunteers are expected to be on hand.

Cleanups in 15 Florida counties and two neighboring Georgia counties are scheduled from 8 a.m. to noon tomorrow.

Olde Lake Mary Days, to be held Saturday, March 22, at Lake Mary City Hall and the Frank Evans Center, offers plenty of things for the whole family to do.

## Who's directing cop, fire chiefs?

**SANFORD** - Mayor Larry Dale has scheduled for discussion by Sanford commissioners Monday what he considers a lack of direction given by the city to the fire and police chiefs.

In a memo to members of the commission, Dale cites the city charter which requires the appointment of a city manager to be the chief administrative officer of the city, and shall direct and supervise the administration of all departments with the exception of the two chief positions.

Last year, the city made a move toward allowing the city manager to also supervise the police and fire chiefs, but the matter required a change in the city charter. The proposal was placed on the November general election ballot and the citizens voted it down 54.1 percent to 45.9 percent.

The citizens of Sanford made it plain in November's referendum

## Lake Mary to add 3 building inspectors

**LAKE MARY** - New construction requires various code inspections to assure structural, electrical and other matters of integrity are maintained. The City of Lake Mary however, appears to be growing at such a rate that inspections are lagging behind.

During a commission work session Thursday afternoon, it was noted that the seven inspectors presently working for the city, four in the building division and three in the planning division, are being used to the maximum, yet construction inspections which have previously been accomplished in

three days to a week, are getting further and further behind.

A request has been submitted now, asking for three additional personnel in the Community Development Department.

During discussion of the request, City Senior Planner Matt West was asked to report on the building situation in the city, at the present time as well as in the future. West, starting with plans recently approved and waiting permits and going through future planned developments, went on to listing residential and commercial construction projects which may have made any growing city envious.

He reported that while construction

To close, here's a birthday the likes of which we have never reported thus far. Today is the

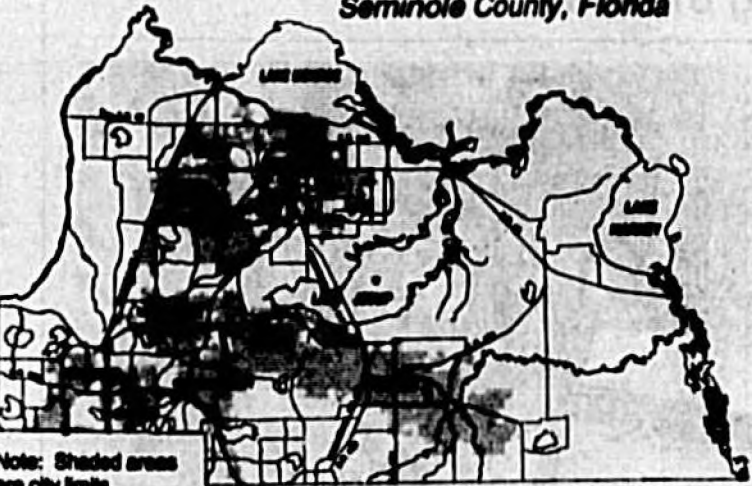
future anniversary of the birth of a man born in Riverside, Iowa.

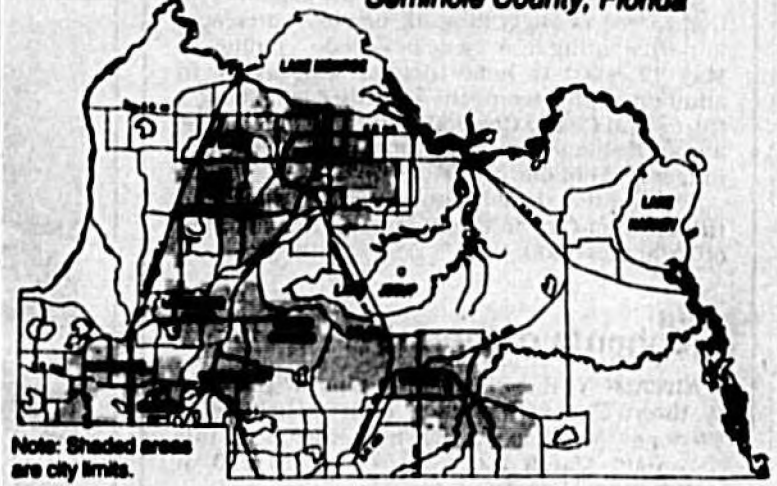

tion values in fiscal year 1986 were \$38.4 million, and \$58.85 million for fiscal year 1988, the city has already recorded \$58.85 million in the first five months of the present fiscal year, October 1986 through February, 1987.

"It's the biggest building boom this city has ever seen," West said.

Lake Mary Building Official Phil McMahan told the commissioners that he was beginning to feel concerned that the inspections were done as well as they should be, with the department being pushed for time. He said many new construction projects are involved in time limitations which require inspections at a much more rapid pace.

Regarding obtaining new

personnel however, McMahan explained that in past years, almost anyone could be hired as an inspector, and be given training which would suffice. "Now people need extensive training and have to pass exams before they can become an inspector," he said.

"Even so," he continued, "there is the matter of several types of inspections, and unless inspectors are cross-trained, they couldn't do everything required." He said that especially holds true in cases where persons who might be able to handle building inspections, would not be allowed to undertake electrical inspections.

"I'm concerned about the quality of our inspections because of the overload on our present personnel," City Manager Litton said. "We have been promising people inspections

then we can't fulfill the promise, and this doesn't look good for the city."

Commissioner Thom Greene said he was concerned about what may happen down the road. "Say in five years," he said, "will we still need these additional people, or will we be hiring people now only to have to let them go in the future."

Litton responded that the city had already been using additional personnel through part timers or contractual help. "We have needed these people for quite some time," he said, "but I imagine we'll be needing these additional inspectors for a number of years at least."

Commissioner Gary Brender said he is always concerned about problems of this type, and was all in favor of the request.

"It's critical and important

that we do this right," said Mayor David Mealer. "We have to be realistic in this matter. We can't put the burden of delay on contractors and developers. I'm also in favor of this request."

McMahan estimated that the future for the city will see possibly \$102 million in new construction, with the city to perhaps obtain \$1 million in building fees.

West added that there could possibly be an additional \$480,000 in other fees obtained by the city through the inspection and code processes.

With the general consensus of the commissioners to pursue the matter, Litton was instructed to prepare the proper ordinance and bring it back before a formal commission meeting for public hearing, further discussion, and possible approval.

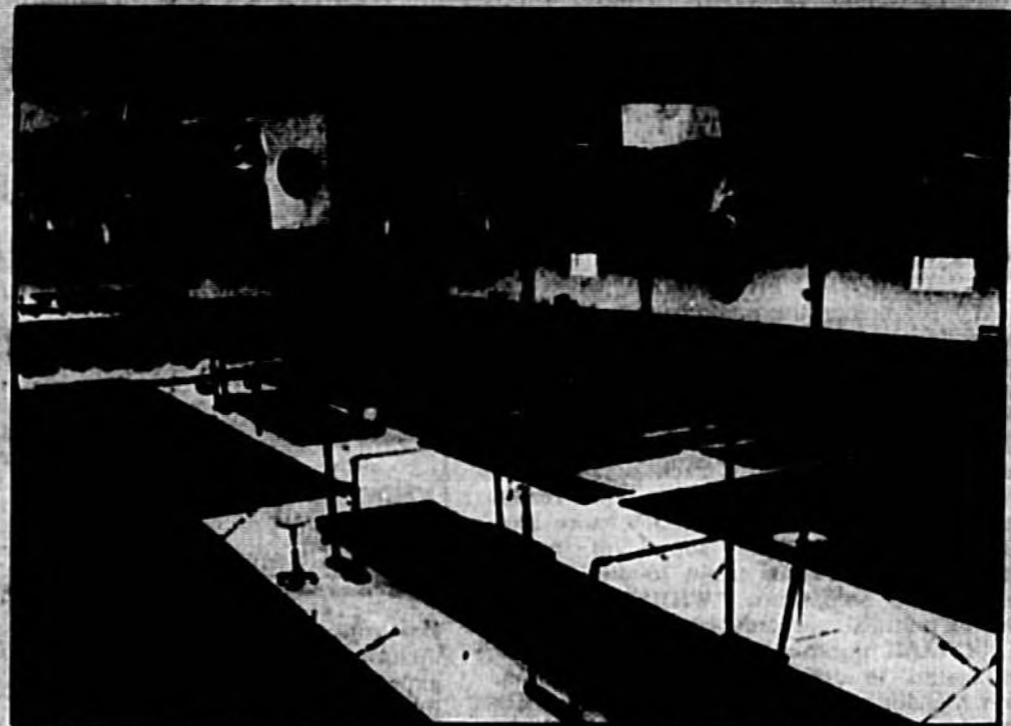

## Kaiser is qualified through experience to lead county

Does it really matter that Seminole County Manager Gary Kaiser does not have a master's degree?

Would having it make him a better chief executive?

Would you as a citizen feel safer and surer about government? We don't think so.

After all, if that were the rule for heads of operations with massive budgets, Bill Gates, who dropped out of Harvard before earning a bachelor's degree, wouldn't run Microsoft. Edgar Bronfman wouldn't run Seagrams and Ray Kroc would have never run McDonalds.

Gary Kaiser has served the county 24 years as a cop, firefighter, fire chief and Public Safety Director. He earned the respect of others in government and the public. Almost everyone agrees he is indeed a fine man for the county.

Unless Kaiser is some sort of a Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde character - which everyone surely would have known by now - he deserves support not suspicions, as he leads Seminole County into the 21st Century.

It is well and good that county commissioners Grant Maloy and Dick Van Der Weide voiced their opinions that their fellow commissioners - Randy Morris, Win Adams and Daryl McLain may have jumped the gun appointing Kaiser as the permanent manager. Maloy and Van Der Weide are elected officials, and entitled to voice their feelings

and convictions. That's part of why government in a free society works; opinions lead to debate and better decisions.

At the same time, Morris, Adams and McLain are entitled to what they believe - and it's obvious they believe in Gary Kaiser. The vote was, 3-2, and the vote should stand.

Elected school board member Bob Goff, who disagrees, has written a personal editorial which is carried on this page saying the political fortunes of Morris, Adams and McLain "surely seem to be a bit dimmer after this fiasco."

We don't agree. The county attorney opined that Kaiser's experience met the qualifications to hold the office without a master's degree. That opinion was sought by Morris prior to offering Kaiser the job.

Has Mr. Goff not observed that School Superintendent Paul J. Hagerty and Chairman Sandy Robinson are among Mr. Kaiser's biggest supporters? In a letter to Mr. Kaiser upon his appointment, they wrote: "Certainly, no one is better qualified for this important position, and we are looking forward to working with you on any future endeavors we may encounter."

Our recommendation is to give Mr. Kaiser all the room he needs. If, in a year's time, there's sufficient reason to remove him from the post, all it takes is a majority vote by the Board of Commissioners.

Right now, we believe he's the man for the job.

that they do not want the police and fire chiefs to answer to the city manager," Dale wrote. "They, in fact, want these chiefs to answer directly to the city commission. It is my firm belief that our citizens did this, not to have less control, but to have more control. Let us meet our responsibility and give continuous direction and supervision to our police chief and fire chief," he said.

In the past, one member of the city commission has been designated as liaison with the police and fire departments. The commissioner was to act as a communicator between the departments and the city.

"It is my belief that the liaison commissioner, and not created as a glorified do-boy by trying to the commission the desires of the chief," Dale writes. "The chief is a grown man who is capable of appearing before the commission with his own requests. No, I believe the liaison commissioner was created to provide continuous direction and supervision of these policies and procedures as established by the city commission."

Dale questions, "Would you consider eliminating the city manager position and allowing all other departments to function without direction and supervision? Of course, the answer to that is 'no.' Why then do we think this of the police and fire departments?"

Dale says the need is to first establish the policies, goals and objectives of the police and fire departments. He proposes that the policies and directives must come from the commission, not the department.

"Then we must establish a procedure that allows us to give direction and supervision to these chiefs on a continuous basis," Dale concluded. "It is our charge, and our citizens demand it of us."

The mayor's proposals are scheduled to be discussed Monday afternoon, during an early commission work session, scheduled to begin at 3:30 in the city manager's conference room of Sanford City Hall.

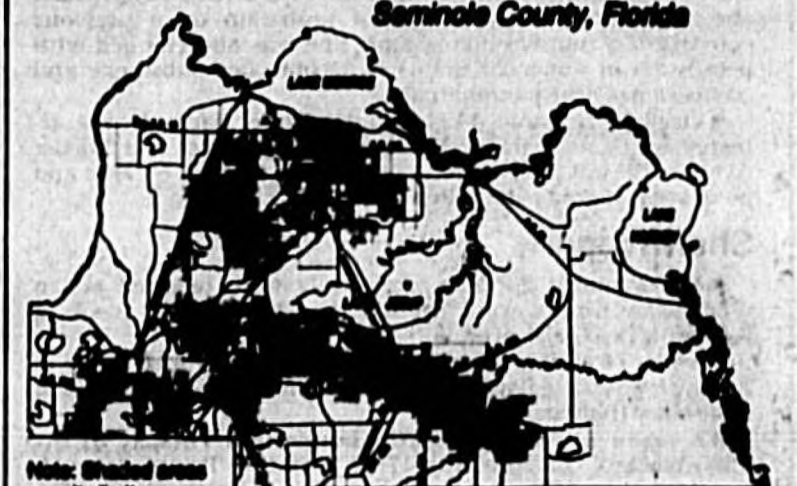

# Liar, Liar is good...trust me



Carey comes out Monday and I am not doing predictions. Put away the handkerchiefs and tissues; I have good reasons. Since I have not seen four out of the five candidates for best picture it would hardly be fair to predict. But since I have seen one, I can only say: "Go Frazier". Well, on to this week's cinematic entries:

**Liar, Liar (PG-13):**  
He doesn't speak with his glove on. He doesn't leave any riddles. And he doesn't give away free cable or turn into a wild, green-faced super hero either. He is rather normal...if that is possible for Jim Carrey. His latest comedy, *Liar, Liar*, highlights a very dapper Carrey as a slick, clever lawyer who has to go one day without having to tell a lie.

Carrey is Fletcher Reede, a lawyer looking for his chance to become partner in his firm. Reede's main talent is lying. In fact, he is too good at it. Reede can't separate the office from his personal life and it has affected the relationship between he and his son, Max. Fletcher's ex-wife, Audrey, blames the fact that Fletcher treats their son in such a manner but she also knows what he means to the boy.

On Max's fifth birthday, Fletcher stands his son up once again. The boy sulks over his birthday cake as he ponders why his father keeps giving him empty promises. When he blows the candles out, he makes a wish that his father could go one day without lying. Magically, Max gets his wish which causes Fletcher big trouble.

What was once Fletcher's biggest asset -- his mouth -- is now his greatest fault as he tries to survive 24 hours without losing his job or his family who are on their way to heaven to start a new life with Audrey's new husband.

Written by Paul Guay and Stephen Mazur (*The Little Rascals*), *Liar, Liar* contains many scenes for Carrey's faithful but it also contains warm family scenes and a fair share of emotional moments that almost seem Capra-esque. There is one scene, however, that defies the laws of plausibility and it comes off as not only unbelievable but also hokey. I rather not say which scene it is but audiences will

know.  
Carrey is Carrey. No person will go hungry in this production. For those who need a certain recovery from the Cable Guy -- hey, I had it! -- The new *Liar, Liar* will be it. My main criticism with Carrey is that he maybe goes too over the top with his performances. But when the gentle, more emotional scenes come up, Carrey is on task. It will be interesting--almost satirical--to see Carrey in his first dramatic piece. This is, of course, Carrey's movie, but he has some strong supporters in Maura Tierney (TV's *NewsRadio*, *Private Fear*), who plays ex-wife Audrey, Justin Cooper, who plays Max, Jennifer Tilly (Sound), who plays an adulterous client, Cary Elwes (Tarsier), who plays Audrey's boyfriend, Amanda Donohoe (TV's *L.A. Law*), as Fletcher's sexy colleague, and Swales Kurtz (Chen Ruth), as a rival lawyer.

The concept of a lawyer being under-handed and untrustworthy is nothing new. The main character of *Liar, Liar* thrives on the fib. Supplemented by Carrey's comedianist comedy, the delight of the film is watching the main character's transition from a consummate liar into a trust-worthy family man. *Liar, Liar* is a good movie...trust me.

**Smilla's Sense of Snow (R):** This movie is cold! Not in a bad sense mind you. It is set in winter and a lot of the film's scenes are in Greenland, the largest island in the world, which has two-thirds of its land covered under a permanent ice cap. Perhaps even more cold than the settings is the film's villains, and protagonist Smilla Jeppesen is going to exploit their evil even if it kills her.

*Smilla's Sense of Snow* is a well written, it-toughly engaging thriller about a beautiful scientist that constructed a self-made wall in which she buries herself deep in her work. Only the lucky may penetrate it but only by her desire. One of those few is a six-year old Greenland Inuit boy. Smilla builds a strong relationship -- almost, momentary -- with the boy whose father was killed in a mining "accident" and whose mother has drowned herself in alcohol over since. The boy ends up dead after a suspicious "drop" off a building. Smilla knows it was murder but to her knowledge who would want to kill the boy. Her pursuit of the murderer takes her into a world of corporate cover-ups involving a shady mining company and its interest in a new energy source that is lodged somewhere under the Greenland ice banks.

*Smilla's Sense of Snow* is directed by Bille August (*Pelle the Conqueror*) from a novel by Danish Peter Hoeg called *Miss Smilla's Feeling for Snow*.

The radiant Julia Ormond (*Legends of the Fall*, *Sabrina*) is so eye-catching at times that male audience members might not concentrate on her performance. But her acting does bring the fantasy back to reality. She has a strong performance and, I would say, her best to date. It has an intensity that sets herself apart from the other actors in the film. That is quite an accomplishment since she works with the likes of Gabriel Byrne (*The Usual Suspects*), who plays Smilla's mysterious love interest, Robert Harris (Hightower), who plays the greedy scientist that heads the mining company, and mining character actor Robert Loggia, who plays Smilla's rich father. Ormond establishes herself with this performance as one of the movie's leading ladies.

*Smilla's Sense of Snow* is a smart thriller and even though the film is in cold settings it is a hot pick. It is being distributed under Fox Searchlight, which is a subsidiary of 20th Century Fox, meaning that the film will not have a wide distribution. This is not a video movie.



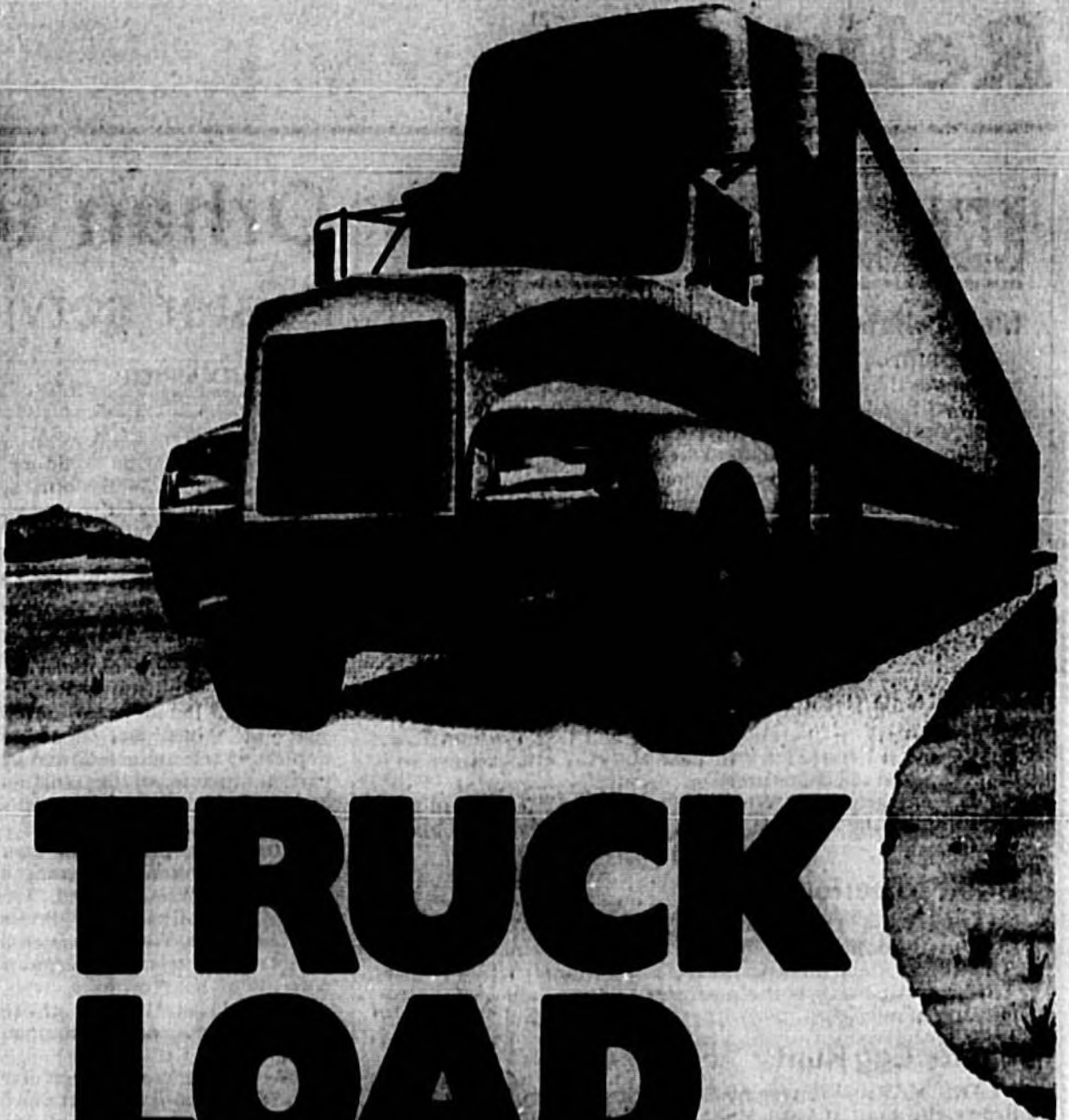
Jim Carrey and Justin Cooper star in *Liar, Liar* as a father and son learning about honesty and life.

August has a strong thriller sensibility. As I mentioned earlier, this movie is cold! It feels dark and cold as a good thriller should. August does not compromise anything to achieve his noirish tone. There is never a boring moment in *Smilla*. August keeps the action moving at a crisp, fast pace. August's direction is an homage to all the good thrillers and makes you appreciate the craft of making thrillers even more.

The script is by Ann Biderman who wrote the script for one of the worst movies of 1986, *Copycat*. She more than makes up for that travesty with her translation of Hoeg's novel here. Biderman's script does use some standard thriller devices like the stock "a car is following" scene. These conventional items are of little significance when weighed against the overall product. Biderman is a good screenwriter that should not be judged by one bad script.

# Pastor speaks on the function of marriage

The cover of Time magazine (Jan. 20, 1992) raised the question: "Why are men and women different?"

We really need no extensive in-depth research to affirm the validity of that question. However, said Time, "new studies show (men and women) were born that way." Time's study reveals that boys like sports cars, fire trucks and Lincoln logs, whereas girls prefer, more often, dolls, and kitchen toys.

In the 1970s the "feminist revolution" spoke of inborn differences as taboo in a modern age. Thus, there has been an effort by some people to destroy differences by labeling them "sexism." Said they - once sexism was abolished, the world would become a perfectly equitable, androgynous place. I assume they would add - except for a few anatomical details!

Anne Moir, in her book, *Brain Sex: The Real Difference Between Men and Women*, details empirical evidence for innate differences between sexes. Moir became interested in the subject while studying genetics at Oxford University. Her study revealed that in the atmosphere of the feminist movement in the 70s - scientists downplayed their discoveries of differences. Moir's research further revealed that men and women are only equal in their common membership of the same species - "humankind." "To maintain... (that they) are same in aptitude, skill, behavior is to build a society based on biological and scientific lie." Therefore, we have the presupposition that the sexes are different because their brains are different. The brain being the administrative

and emotional organ of life is differently constructed in men and women. It follows that the brain processes information in a different way, which results in different perceptions, priorities and behaviors.

As well, during the past decade, medical people, psychologists, sociologists and scientists conclude that the sexes are different, and that there is a startling asymmetry!

### CREATED EQUAL IN WORTH - BUT WITH DIFFERENT ROLES

God created man and woman in - maleness and femaleness, which identifies their respective roles:

*A man by virtue of his manhood is called to lead for God.*

*A woman by virtue of her womanhood is called to help for God.*

In this, God gave a perfect relationship:

*Man as "head" willingly providing for her.*

*Woman willingly submitting to him.*

Sin came into the picture. The distorted views of "male chauvinism" and "women's liberation" became at war with one another. Radical distortions erupted in all history. For example: the Roman statesman, Cato, stated in the second century B.C. - "If you catch your wife in infidelity - you can kill her, without trial. But if she were to catch you, she would not venture to touch you with her finger. She has no rights."

Today's society is infiltrated with a philosophy of no structure, no restraints, no roles and no limits. This absence of fulfilled roles brings us to where we have come today with the majority of marriages not working and not lasting. It also delineates a freedom of exercise and

express "self desire." This is antithetical to the divine created structure of marriage.

Marriage is a discipline not something that just happens! This discipline is spelled out in the Biblical passage of Ephesians 5. In this passage, we find an astounding unity with radical sacrificial love on the part of the husband. Verse 25 states: "Husbands love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it."

Question: Give your life for your wife? This delivers a punch which flattens many men, because they have missed their role. This love is a

love even unto death! For the husband, marriage is a call to die - "die to self." A man who misses this does not come close to the love for which he is called! This is a masculine thing for it takes a strong man to die!

This unity and sacrifice continues in the role of the wife investing herself in her husband. She is likened to the church - "as the church is subject unto Christ, so let the wives be to their husbands in everything." (Ephesians 5:24).

Both roles are of the highest importance and worth as they exemplify the Bride (Church) and the Bridegroom (Christ) in rich harmony and unity!

Think about that!

Selkaly tears up ex-mates as Magic rally past Warriors

Talk about a doozy of a hangover. Three days and two quarters after blowing a 10-point lead with a minute left in regulation in a loss to Atlanta, the Orlando Magic still hadn't recovered.

Fortunately, they were playing The Team That The Flyers Forgot, the Golden State Warriors, and were able to pull out a 100-96 win last night at the Orlando Arena.

The game was tied at 96 with 15 seconds remaining when Dennis Scott hit a wide open three-pointer to give Orlando the lead for good.

Except for a strong first half from center Rony Selkaly, the Magic showed all the effects of a team unable to recover from what Orlando coach Richie Adubato called his most crushing defeat ever.

"In the first half we allowed them to do whatever they wanted offensively," Adubato said. "We only had 15 rebounds in the first half so we obviously weren't playing very hard. That's not the way to win

games." Golden State came in coming off a crushing loss of its own one night after blowing a big lead and losing to the Miami Heat in overtime, so there were two teams playing under similar situations.

Adubato admitted he hadn't quite gotten over the Atlanta loss yet.

"It took about 100 years to get from Monday to tonight," Adubato said. "I was really anxious for the jump ball tonight."

Selkaly came out as if he were the only player sharing the same feelings. Selkaly left Golden State under ugly circumstances after refusing to report to camp last fall and his former teammates got revenge in a win at San Jose two weeks ago, holding Selkaly to only six points.

Last night was a different story as Selkaly scored 15 points in the first quarter on his way to 28. He pounded the boards, swatted shots and dominated the player he re-

placed, Magic legend Felton Spencer (one game in an Orlando uniform), all night long.

When Spencer say, their replacements Todd Fuller and former Florida Gator Andrew DeClerq totaled 10 personal fouls and two points in a combined 24 minutes.

"Rony was ready," Adubato said. "He asked me if he could play all 48 minutes before the game."

"I would have played 53 minutes if it went overtime," Selkaly added.

That's how it looked for most of the fourth quarter before Scott hit his three-pointer. Penny Hardaway had the ball on the left wing and started to drive before he saw Scott without a Warrior in sight.

Scott said it was time to get rid of the peaky Warriors. "Normally I don't make shots when I'm wide open so I just said let's knock it down and get out of here," Scott said. "We have a fight tonight."

It would have been a depressing flight if the Magic hadn't picked up their game in the second half. The Warriors (25-42) may be struggling and at the end of a nightmare road trip, but they led 56-45 at the half, dominating the boards on both ends.

Finally, the Magic made a run. Trailing 70-64, Orlando went on 9-3 tear, capped off on a three-pointer from Gerald Wilkins to tie it at 73.

The lead went back and forth and a highlight reel dunk from Latrell Sprewell put the Warriors up 81-87.

Hardaway countered with a three but Golden State maintained the lead on its next possession when DeClerq tipped in a Sprewell miss. Hardaway again tied the score and, after another Sprewell miss, Scott hit his three-pointer to give Orlando its first lead since early in the fourth quarter.

# Tips to handle foods safely

Since perishable foods like meat, poultry and eggs can be the source of bacteria that cause foodborne illness, they must be carefully handled. Follow these tips for safe handling.

**Buying Ham or Lamb**  
There are a variety of hams on the market today, so it is important to read the label to know how to handle and cook whatever you buy.

For example, some canned hams are shelf-stable meaning they do not need to be refrigerated, but some canned hams do need to be refrigerated.

Most lamb purchased for Easter is labeled "spring lamb" or "genuine spring lamb". The term "spring" does not necessarily refer to the season the lamb was born, but to its age (less than a year old) at the time it is sent to market.

When purchased, lamb is covered with a papery whitish membrane called the fell, which should be removed before cooking as it tends to make the flavor of the meat strong.

**Cooking Ham, Lamb and Brisket**

All meat and poultry should

be cooked in an oven set at no lower than 325 degrees F. Lower temperatures may not kill bacteria present in the food.

Another important factor in keeping food safe is thorough cooking. All perishable foods must reach an internal temperature high enough to kill bacteria.

**Handling Leftovers**

All perishable foods should be refrigerated as soon as your meal is over, but no longer than two hours after removal from the refrigerator or oven.

For ham and lamb, carve the remaining meat off the bone and store it in small shallow containers in the refrigerator or freeze for later use.

**The Egg Issue**

Raw eggs like raw meat and

poultry, may be contaminated with foodborne bacteria. *Salmonella enteritidis* is of particular concern.

Consumers should avoid eating raw eggs or foods containing them. Raw and cooked eggs should remain refrigerated at all times. How does this affect your Easter celebration?

**Eggs for an Easter Egg Hunt**

Hard-cooked eggs for an egg hunt must be prepared with care to prevent cracking the shells. If the shells are cracked, bacteria from your hands could seep through the shells, contaminating the inside. The eggs should be hidden in places that are protected from dirt, pets and other sources of bacteria. The total time for hiding and hunting eggs should not exceed two hours. The "found" eggs must be re-refrigerated until they are eaten.

**Raw Egg Frosting for a "Bunny Cake"**

Many recipes for bunny-shaped cakes call for using a raw egg white in the frosting. But any time raw egg whites are eaten, there is the risk of salmonella food poisoning.

It's probably wise to find a frosting recipe that uses hot syrup and egg white. If the egg white mixture reaches 160 degrees F on a thermometer, it should be safe.

You may also be able to use a pasteurized powdered meringue available where cake decorating supplies are sold.

"As our knowledge of food safety expands, it is reassuring to know that traditional recipes can be updated, resulting in meals that are both safe and delicious", said USDA's Conley.

Now, you can start working on the solution. But, first, let's look at why this addiction cycle keeps repeating itself in families until somebody like you comes along and says, "Enough Already!"

Families with alcoholic members will likely produce children who end up either abusing alcohol or who won't drink at all. This is because the kids are forced to develop ways to cope with the problem.

While an addict and codependent outwardly appear to be opposites; in reality, they are very similar. They both live on illusions. Alcoholics pretend they can escape from emotional pain or problems through alcohol, and codependents pretend that they can stop the pain if they can keep the alcoholic from drinking. When kids from

these families start to choose a mate, they are attracted to their counterpart.

A codependent chooses an addict; an addict chooses a codependent. None of this happens on a conscious level; it's at that gut level of emotion which is MUCH harder to determine and control.

So, now you know why you have the problem. Get going on the solution. Private counseling is good if you can afford it or have insurance. Also, there are support groups for codependents. Find one and stay in it at least a year before you let yourself become dependent on a serious relationship. People like you renew my faith in future generations.

# New law helps telemarketing fraud victims

DEAR ABBY: When I read the letter from "Lost in the Desert," the elderly woman who had been taken to the cleaners by slick telemarketers and was afraid to tell her husband, I was saddened. I would like to offer her, and others like her,

some hope. I recently attended the National Association of Attorneys General (NAAG) Winter Meeting, which had as one of its themes, "Warning Elder Consumers About the Dangers of Telemarketing Fraud: Don't Fall for a Telephone Line."

Attorneys general throughout the country are aware of the problem and have worked together to enact fraudulent telemarketers. NAAG was one of the moving forces behind the recent passage of a federal law that allows states to prosecute telemarketers who call across state lines.

The New Mexico attorney general's office, like many other state's attorney's offices, has a Consumer Protection Division that can use the force of the law to recover the money gained through deceptive tele-

marketing scams. Our own office, in a state with a population of about 1.5 million, has recovered hundreds of thousands of dollars for victims of telemarketing scams.

People who have been taken advantage of by telemarketers should contact their state attorney general's office to find out where they can go for recourse. I would also like to

encourage them to remember that it's never too late to be a savvy consumer.

**Is alcohol intake excessive?**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My hard-working, 40-year-old construction-worker husband is also hard-drinking. Every night, 265 days a year, he consumes three to four beers. Although he doesn't get drunk, he falls asleep on the couch after dinner. I think that he is an alcoholic and that the beer is ruining his health, but he denies it. Do you have any suggestions?

**DEAR READER:** Leave him alone. If you're a regular reader of this column, you know that I'm quick to diagnose alcoholism — or, at least, unhealthy drinking patterns — when I receive letters that clearly describe alcohol abuse. Your husband is not, in my opinion, an alcoholic.

Three or four beers a day is an amount that his liver should be able to handle without untoward health consequences. I'm sure your husband works hard and falls asleep because he is tired. Yes, the beer may relax him, but he does not seem to be abusing his drinking.

Of course, some teetotalers might argue that his drinking is excessive, especially if it makes him abusive, but speaking strictly from a medical standpoint, his alcohol intake is relatively moderate.

As you can imagine, I would quickly change my tone if he upped his consumption to a six-pack or more, or if he sneaked extra "pops" of which you are unaware. But, based on the estimate you provide, I believe that he is in no danger.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Because of a severely underactive thyroid gland, I was prescribed Synthroid. My doctor said that I should have an annual thyroid blood test to check the effectiveness of this medicine. I'm not sure I need this. Is the long-term use of Synthroid dangerous?

**DEAR READER:** On the contrary, it may, in fact, be life-saving. If your thyroid gland is not producing enough hormone, you will eventually develop serious health consequences, such as lassitude, heart disease and possible intellectual impairment.

However, supplemental hormone pills replace the hormone you are lacking, thereby preventing the dangerous consequences of hypothyroidism. In order to judge the proper replacement dose, your doctor will need to order periodic blood tests of thyroid function.

While he is adjusting the dose to achieve an optimal balance, you should have blood tests every month or so. However, once you are on a proper maintenance dosage schedule,

you'll need to be tested only about once or twice a year.

Synthroid and other thyroid supplements are completely harmless when taken indefinitely, as they must be. Follow your doctor's instructions.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Because I have what my urologist calls "scar tissue" in my penis, I cannot have relations. He suggested an implant. Is it safe? Painful?

**DEAR READER:** For some men, penile implants are a blessing, particularly when other treatments for impotence have been ineffective. During a relatively simple operation, a urologist places cylinders in the penile shaft. Before having inter-

course, men expand the cylinders by pumping water into them from a small reservoir beneath the abdominal skin. The technique is safe, the cylinders are painless, and — I'm told by satisfied customers — the results are usually quite satisfactory. Return to your urologist for further explanation and advice.

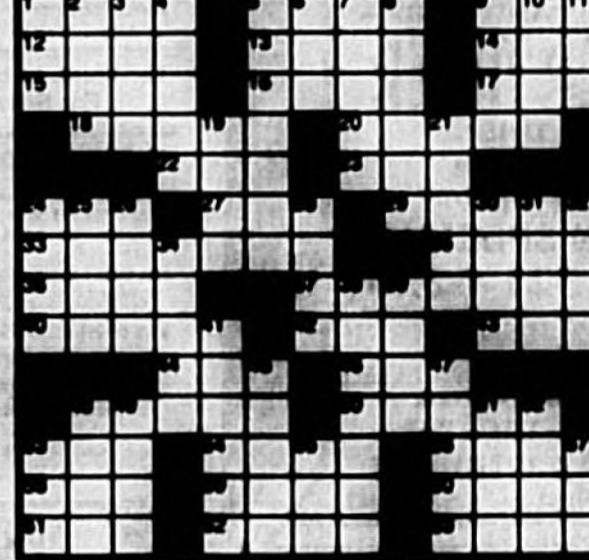

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**One time, turn this way**

By Phillip Alder

Plato was a forward-thinking fellow. For example, he pointed out that democracy is "a charming form of government, full of variety and disorder, and dispensing a sort of equality to equals and unequals alike."

Bridge offers a lot of variety. It is possible to be faced with two apparently identical situations, but the winning play in each is different. Today's and tomorrow's deals will give you a flavor of this.

In three no-trump, declarer had only six top tricks: one spade, two hearts, two diamonds and one club. Clearly, the spade finesse would have to work. And if diamonds were 3-3 and clubs 4-4, declarer could get home that way. However, that was well against the

odds: a priori, an 11.8 percent chance. So, South ducked the first club, won West's club-10 continuation, entered dummy with a heart to the king, and called for the spade queen.

Now East fell from grace, covering with the king. Declarer won with the ace and played a spade to dummy's eight. When that finesse worked, South led a diamond to his ace and played another spade, claiming that the 10 appeared from West. Declarer's nine tricks were four spades, two hearts, two diamonds and one club.

If East had only played a low spade under dummy's queen, the contract would have died. There is a reliable principle: If declarer leads an honor to take a finesse, cover the last of his touching honors, and only then when it might gain your side a trick.

Here, you don't cover dummy's queen, but you do cover the jack, the last of the touching honors.
