Counterfeit Gang Is Broken Up With Arrest Of Several

NEW YORK, Jan. 11. (A.P.)—After striking a new blow at a gang described as an offshoot of "Lupo the Wolf" notorious counterfeit gang of a decade ago, police and Wall Street sleuths concentrated yesterday on a hunt for a printing plant they said loaded the country with \$5,000,000 in bogus stock.

The arrest of six additional men on forgery charges was announced by police, bringing the total to eight. But authorities want the presses, plates and tools with which the certificates were manufactured so cleverly that only microscope betrayed their worthlessness.

Trapped by policemen who traced as shady brokers and spent large sums making a last attempt, eight men are alleged to have signed confessions.

Although the stock, much of it simulated General Motors securities, appeared in brokers' offices over the country, the men are accused specifically of negotiating a loan for \$50,000 from Gustaf Kohn & Co., lower Broadway brokers, on \$50,000 in bogus stock.

Among the spurious certificates distributed was counterfeit Brockway Manhattan Transit Co. stock. Police revealed that Walter Pruski, 50, a Fifth Avenue broker, was committed suicide Jan. 4, after passing 100 forged shares of this concern's stock.

Salvatore Giordano, 46, who was a restaurateur, was arrested as the kingpin of the police said he had served 10 years in Alabama penitentiary for counterfeiting \$5 bills.

Hidden under a cushion in the home of Philip Marzullo, one of the prisoners, police found boxes of the General Motors securities.

WEEK EXPECTED TO BRING FORTH O.P. ASPIRANTS

Light Anticipated On
Whether Fight Will
Be Made On Hoover

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10. — (A.P.)—Budding presidential candidates in the Republican and Democratic camps will bloom or fade this week—the coming out week for the 1932 campaign.

Whether an open campaign against the renomination of President Hoover is to be made depends on a large extent on a decision expected momentarily from Senator William Johnson, of California.

The restless state of North Dakota with a law requiring filing of candidates in the presidential primary before Jan. 22 is forcing the issue in both parties.

Senator Johnson is being urged by a combination of anti-Hoover Republicans and independents to enter no party this primary but all others.

The North Dakota call will be taken by friends of Governor Roosevelt of New York to put him formally into the contest within the next seven days.

Whether Governor Ritchie, of Maryland, the other avowed Democratic candidate, will test strength with Roosevelt in this northwest agrarian area is regarded as problematical.

Unless Johnson goes into the North Dakota race, Joseph I. France, a former Maryland senator, is expected to be the only likely contestant against Hoover there.

Washington is still buzzing over the unexpected decision of Charles G. Dawes to resign in the early spring as ambassador to Great Britain. His friends do not expect Dawes to get into any primary campaign against the President.

Pointing to the general's deep sense of loyalty, they do understand, however, that he has very definitely put away from the Hoover administration at a time and in a manner which gives the party no cause for complaint.

Wanted new name at the nominating convention.

The Roosevelt boom to be set off by a call from the Democratic committee of North Dakota is to be carried forward by a move to place him in the Pennsylvania primary. In that state there is a strong suspicion of a show-down between the New York and Maryland governors.

Elsewhere also is to go into the New Hampshire primary in March—the opening contest of the campaign. However, there is every indication the Roosevelt group will stay out of "favorite son" states, including Ohio, Missouri, Oklahoma, Maryland and Virginia.

The anti-Hoover movement in the Republican organization has very definitely come to the crossroads. Senator Norris, of Nebraska, a leader of the western Republican independents in opposition to the President, has declined to go into a Republican convention fight against the President.

The veteran Norris, who bolted the Republican presidential ticket of 1920, is known to have turned down requests that he go into the North Dakota primary as well as others. He is counseling his advocates, however, to be ready for a third party. If the Republicans renominate Hoover and the Democrats pick a man not to the liking of the "progressives."

Senator Borah, of Idaho, another leader of the western Republican independents, also has been much discussed as a presidential candidate and has been urged to go into the race. He, too, is talking.

Governor Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, has been talking a lot with the Senate Republican independents and they have been weighing him as a candidate, but there are indications he has not been called into the northwestern states.

There is no doubt at the capital after Saturday's meeting of the Democratic national committee of a definite break between the Roosevelt and the party organization headed by William Raskob and Alfred E. Smith.

Raskob's firm, unequivocal denial of a newspaper story speaking of a "Smith-Raskob-Shouse" machine in opposition to Roosevelt was accepted. It was also understood, though that Raskob was speaking to the Roosevelt group when he refused to this, "propaganda."

If the organization Alfred E. Smith stands out against the nomination of Governor Roosevelt it is expected he will have considerable influence, whether or not he enters the campaign himself.

TWO MARINES KILLED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. — (A.P.)—Two marines were killed today when the stolen automobile in which they were attempting to escape from a Washington police car crashed into a tree.

The stolen car was a 1931 Ford sedan, owned by Charles E. Smith, of the city.

Flood Refugees Are Returning To Damaged Houses

GLENDORA, Miss., Jan. 11. — (A.P.)—Aided by the Red Cross, saddened refugees were returning home today to recondition their dwellings in the wake of this delta cotton country's greatest flood disaster.

No further rise was reported in the valley of the mad Tallahatchie River and its tributaries, a valley which only a month ago was flowering in agriculture, but now buried in mud and water.

The Red Cross of the delta cities reported yesterday that boats hastily built by plantation owners and others loaned by the valley's cities, were adequate for transport of clothes, food and medical supplies.

Few refugees came into the high cities yesterday while an army of them pushed back through the inland flood lake to their homes where waters were gradually receding.

State convicts who have labored weeks, went back to Parchman prison farm, the refugees now of sufficient strength to keep the levees banked.
