Two die in swimming incidents

SANFORD = A 30 year-old Sanford man revived after almost drowning in a Santord motel swimming pool Saturday, then died after he was admitted to Central Florida Resjongal Hospital In-Sanford, police said today.

In another Saturday incident, a 4-year-old Sanford boy drowned in an Orange County lake

In the motel incident, Eddie Engene Mackey, 30. 1206 W. 11th St., was swimming to his wife underwater at Caesar's Place Motel, U.S. Highway 17/92. Sanford at about 13 p.m. Saturday Police Chief Steven Harriett said Mackey reportedly stopped midway across the pool, and two bystanders pulled him from the water.

He appeared to have drowned and Sanford Fire Department rescue workers arrived to revive him-Mackey was transported to the hospital where he was conscious and talking Harriett said. Mackey

was admitted to the hospital, and Harriett said on Sunday morning police were notified by hospital officials that he had died,

The cause and time of death will be determined in a scheduled autopsy. Harriett said. The autopsywill show if Mackey was under the influence of alcohol or other substances at the time of death.

Mackey was a lifelong resident of Sanford and worked for Construction Components Industry of Sanford. He is survived by his wife Gayle, a son-Glen and a daughter Toritseju.

In the other incident, 4 year old Antonio Moure. 3088 Truman St., Sanford, drown Saturday in Lake Fairview. Orange County sherill's

City may convert old city hall to history museum

LAKE MARY - Prospects appear to be better than ever that Lake Mary will be able to repoyate the old city hall building at 158 North Country Club Road with state money.

A new request for as much as \$95,000 will be forwarded to the state Division of Historical Resources by June 15.

"We requested \$95,000 last year," said Associate City Planner Mark Reggentin, "but out of 121 projects statewide, for which money was sought, only 60 were selected. and most of them were for rural projects. This year we stand a much better chance of getting the money."

The state has annually earmarked between \$10 million and \$11 million for preservation and renovation of historical sites. The money is disbursed on a regional basis, according to the requests submitted from around the state.

"The old city hall is the only historical building in Lake Mary still in public hands." Reggentin said. "We plan to use the money to rehabilitate the old structure and continue its use for public service, but also to turn it into a historical museum." Built during the 1920s, the building served for many years as the headquarters of the Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce. Organizations for youth, seniors and others still use the building, as do city boards and the city commission.

Lake Mary Mayor Dick Fess, who attended the Florida League of Cities Legislative Action Day in Tallahassee last week, paid a visit to the State Historical Commission to discuss the grant application, and reported that he was optimistic for this year's grant approval.

"One big need at the present time is to obtain letters of support for this restoration project from not only clubs, groups and organizations, but from individuals. especially those who are knowledgeable about the historical aspects of the building and Lake Mary itself," Reggentin said.

Coast Guard aids sailor

MIAMI - A U.S. Coast Guard helicopter airlifted an ailing Cuban sailor from a fishing trawler in the Atlantic Ocean and was taken to a hospital in the Bahamas Sunday.

The international rescue effort began when the Cuban crew of the 353-foot trawler Rio Toa called the Bahamas Air-Sea Rescue Association Sunday morning. They said a 34-year-old man on board was suffering from abdominal pains, vomiting, cramps and fever.

The vessel was near Great Abaco Island in the Bahamas, about 200 miles east of Miami, and wasn't due to reach the nearest hospital in Freeport until about 10 p.m. Sunday.

The crew asked the Bahamians to airlift the sailor to the hospital, but the Bahamians did not have any helicopters with the necessary hoisting equipment. Petty Officer Veronica Cady

After sending a jet to check the ship's position and talk to the crew, the rescuers quickly cut through the red tape.

A Coast Guard helicopter lowred a rescue basket down to the trawler and hoisted the sick man aboard.

Conch Mayor offers to help Soviets

KEY WEST - Key West celebrated the eighth anniversary of its "secession" from the United States with parties, parades and an attempt at establishing diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union.

The three-day Conch Republic Independence Celebration ended Sunday. It honored the 1982 "Insurrection" that occurred when the U.S. Border Patrol erected a roadblock on the only highway in and out of the Keys, to search cars for illegal aliens and drugs. The roadblock created long, creeping lines of traffic and angered carloads of visitors.

On April 23, 1982, Key West officials satirically declared their secession from the Union, then applied for foreign aid and called for a celebration.

Presiding over the ceremonies was Prime Minister and Key West Mayor Tony Tarracino, who sent a letter to Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev offering the city's assistance in establishing freedom.

Second Medfly spraying begun

MIAMI - Helicopters for the second time sprayed the chemical malathion over the same northwest Miami area at dawn Sunday where Mediterranean fruit flies were found two weeks ago.

The Florida Department of Agriculture used two helicopters to spray the 16-square-mile area near Miami International Airport, where the Medflies were found. Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner ordered four sprayings in the area to protect the state's \$1.4 billion citrus industry.

Medflies lay their eggs in citrus, mango and other tropical fruit and is a perennial problem in Florida. State officials battled similar outbreaks in Tampa in 1981, and in south Florida in 1984, 1985 and 1987, Two more sprayings are scheduled for May 13th and 20th.

Workers also are trapping medflies and hope to thwart their attempts to breed by releasing about 35 million sterile

St far, 12 medflies have been found in south Florida. including one in Broward County.

Plane crash kills 14

GUATEMALA CITY - A Miami-bound DC-6 cargo airplane crashed in a heavily populated area of Guatemala City Saturday, killing at least 15 people including the plane's three American crewmen, authorities said.

The four-engine, propeller-driven DC 6, apparently owned by the Miami-based Aerial Transit Co. and leased to a Central American air transport company, crashed at about 3 p.m. local time, destroying two houses and sending a mushroom-shaped cloud of smoke into the sky.

Carlos Rodolfo Dighero Espinoza, flight operations officer for Guatemala's Civil Aeronautics agency, said the plane was carrying clothing and vegetables to Miami and crashed shortly after takeoff from Aurora International Airport in the southern flank of the capital.

Dighero Espinoza said the cause of the crash was not known. It also was not known how many of the victims were aboard

the plane and how many were on the ground. A spokesman at the city morgue said 15 people died and at least 20 were injured. A 6-year-old boy was among the victims. many of whom were in their homes at the time of the crash.

Dighero Espinoza identified the three Americans as pilot Joseph Babody, co-pilot J. Theodore and flight engineer Dalias White. Their ages and hometowns were not immediately available.

Three-quarters of the plane disintegrated upon impact, leaving only the burnedtail section looking like a broken cross encrusted in two houses that suffered the brunt of the crash.

Prisons accused of price-gauging

TALLAHASSEE - A House member has filed legislation requiring Florida's prison industries to enter competitive bids for state printing contracts amid complaints of price-gouging by PRIDE, Inc.

The \$67-million prison enterprise, founded in 1981 by Clearwater Drug Store magnate Jack Eckerd, is exempt from competitive bidding. State agencies are required to buy PRIDE products ranging from furniture to meat to printed materials.

Critics said they support PRIDE's goal of giving meaningful work and training to inmates, but complain the taxpayers are paying too much for PRIDE products, The Sid Martin, D-Hawthorn, who offered an Gainesville Sun reported Sunday.

We feel there have been some gross inequities there," said Tom Perrin, owner of awaiting floor debate.

Better Business Forms of Tallahassee. "If we're going to give money to PRIDE through other agencies, the public ought to know

PRIDE is also exempt from the state public records law - another reason it should have to enter competitive bids.

"If PRIDE is required to bid on all (printing) contracts, our sales volume would be reduced by \$2.3 million," said John Knobloch, a PRIDE senior vice president, and 80 inmates would lose work.

"We're not going to roll over and play dead," said Guy Spearman, a heavy-hitting lobbyists hired by PRIDE.

The critics have won the support of Rep. amendment to require PRIDE to enter bids on state printing contracts. The bill is

A staff analysis for the House Government Operations Committee found numerous examples where state agencies spent signifleantly more for PRIDE products.

For example, the Department of Education spent \$31,435 for one printing job from PRIDE which could have been done by a private firm for \$8,400 less. The Department of Labor paid \$8,278 for a job white a private vendor quoted a price of \$4,427 PRIDE did another job for Labor for \$3,055 while a private vendor quoted \$1,124.

The biggest spender for printing was the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, which spent \$4 million in 1989, \$2 million of it in non-bid contracts with

PRIDE gross revenues of \$67.3 million for 1989 compared to \$57.3 million for the previous year.

Noted environmentalists urged to conserve here

VERO BEACH - A couple known internationly for their conservation work in Africa are planning an oceanside development that environmentalists said could threaten or destroy rare vegetation near a turtle nesting site.

Geoffrey and Jorie Kent, wealthy British adventurers who co-developed the Windsor Polo and Beach Club north of Wabasso Beach in Indian River County, are famous for their polo matches featuring Prince Charles.

They regularly organize fund-raisers for Friends of Conservation, an organization that has raised more than \$1 million to fight poaching and save resources in Kenya's Masai Mara Game Reserve.

"It is in Florida that they have an opportunity to do important conservation work by not developing (beachfront) property they own," said Marydele Donnelly, spokeswoman for the Center for Marine Conservation. "But this is not happening.

Donnelly said the Windsor development will threat ... a stretch of rare coastal vegetation near the nesting ground of 25 percent of the world's endangered loggerhead turtles. It also will destroy part of an irreplaceable native coastal hardwood hammock

that lies west of the ocean dunes. Donnelly said.

Donnelly and others want Congress and Florida to buy nearly 11 miles of private beachfront property, merge it with nearly nine miles of publicly owned oceanfront land and trun it into a wildlife refuge.

Jim Anthony, Windsor president and spokesman for the Kents, said the development not only meets but exceeds the state's and county's strict habitatprotection laws.

The 412-acre Windsor site stretching from the Indian River to the Atlantic Ocean. Although zoned for nearly 1.700 units, including multi-story condos. Anthony said the project would contain only about 300 units, with 30 to 40 single-family homes on oceanfront land Highway A1A.

Beyond complying with setback restrictions keeping homes away from the dunes and promising to comply with laws prohibiting lights on the beach during the May-to-October turtle nesting season. Warning: Amorous gators on the prowl

GAINESVILLE - Wildlife officers are warning residents to be on the alert for amorous, thirsty and stressed-out alligators prowling canals and lakes in residential areas.

"This is the onset of the courtship and mating season and that means alligators are more active." said Lindsey Hord, a biologist with the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission's Alligator Management Program.

The gator mating season, from April to June is traditionally its most active. The alligators are expected to be even more visible than usual this year because many of their traditional wilderness habitats have dried up during a 21-month drought. That has forced them to seek out new bodies of water closer to residential areas.

In addition, "the drying up of Lake Okeechobee

and the Everglades has created a lot of stress among gators because they're so packed together," in the few areas where there is water, Hord said

About 1 million alligators occupy 6.7 million acres of alligator habitat in the state. Florida's Nusiance Alligator Program generally receives about 8,000 complaints a year involving gators that wander into recreational or residential areas. This year, there could be as many as 1,000 more because of the drought, said wildlife biologist Dennis David.

Wildlife officers cautioned that there is no cause for panic. But they urged people to use common sense and avoid feeding alligators or swimming in areas where gators have been sighted.

They also cautioned people to keep children and pets away from waterways, especially at night when alligators are most active.





FDA's long count

Earlier this year, independent surveys conducted by both the Wall Street Journal and Ralph Nader's Center for Science in the Public Interest concluded that much of the nation's milk supply was tainted with sulfadrugs and other antibiotics used to treat dairy cows. The levels of contamination were very low - nowhere near enough to pose an urgent danger to public health - but the Food and Drug Administration immediately launched its own test survey.

At the time, the FDA's forthright response seemed the best way to head off another food panic among consumers. And it certainly marked a big improvement over what many critics have condemned as past attempts by the agency's administrators to Ignore concerns over sulfa contamination that have been raised by milk producers as well as consumer groups.

By February, the FDA investigators were back with the results, testifying to Congress that their sampling in 14 cities nationwide had "found no residues of any antibiotics, including sulfa drugs...or other potentially dangerous drugs." But now, under prodding from a government operation subcommittee in the House of Representatives, the FDA has issued a new press release in which it modifies those findings a wee bit: Instead of finding no residues, the agency now concedes that it found antibiotics in 83 percent of the milk tested.

FDA officials explain the discrepancy by saying that they didn't find any of those containinants at levels above what the federal government considers dangerous for human health. But that was never the Issue. Neither Nader, nor the Wall Street Journal, nor any of the other interest groups who have been urging stricter controls on these contaminants for years, have ever suggested that people are likely to die or get sick from

But there is a problem that many medical scientists agree the FDA needs to address. Repeated exposure to low levels of these antibiotics may build up an immunity among milk drinkers that would make them harder to treat in case they later came down with a serious infection from some other cause. At least one of the sulfa drugs involved has been identified as a potential carcinogen. And what many in the dairy industry feel is most important is that the only way that that particular drug could be getting into the milk supply is through misuse by some dairy owners or their veterinarians.

The industry wants to crack down on those bad actors. The FDA, by undercutting its own credibility in this way, isn't helping.



recently. I have frequently been asked to discuss the impact of the end of the Cold War on the Republican Party for on conservatism, which is the worldview that currently dominates the party). A lot of liberals are apparently telling each other that "anti-communism was the glue that held the conservative movement together." and that communism's collapse will therefore cause the movement to fall apart, with gratifying damage to the unity and prospects of the GOP.

Unfortunately the major premise of that syllogism is false. It is not anti-communism but anti-liberalism that has bonded together the great coalition called "the conservative movement": the traditionalists, the moderate libertarians, the Cold Warriors, the neoconservatives, the religious right. As long as liberalism remains viable, or at least visible — in the Democratic Party, in the colleges and universities, and in the major media - the coalition that brought it low will have good reason to survive.

There are, however, a couple of relatively new issues that create stresses within the coalition. One is environmentalism; the other is abortion. Just now the environmentalists are having everything their own way, and the cost of their ozone over the South agenda is seldom considered at all. Even some . Pole, or the preservation of the spotted owl, _ primaries, for pro-abortion candidates.

Before long. Americans will notice they are paying more for their cars, because the environmentalists have managed to lobby through Congress hugely expensive limitations on emissions. 
makes it necessary for their children to go without Christmas presents this year.

Hidden costs of reunification

BERLIN — On June 2, 1989, Chris Geoffroy, a young East German, tried to escape over the Berlin Wall to freedom in West Berlin. He paid a very high price for what he was seeking: East German border guards shot and killed him.

On a recent Saturday morning, Luther Schmidt, another young East German, decided he too wanted to visit West Berlin. He also was on a search - for a used Twisted Sister CD at the flea market at Winterfeldplatz. Schmidt, however, succeeded in his quest, and the price he paid — about \$2 for a round-trip subway ticket and the same for the used CD - was quite reasonable.

A year ago, traveling from East to West Berlin involved either months of red tape or risking one's life. Today, the only requirement for crossing is a quick check of identity papers to prove that you are German.

The dateline on this column is no error: In the minds of many Berliners, there really is no East and West anymore, only Germany. Reunification is considered to be a done deal. It is now up to the politicians to work out the

However, some of those details may prove difficult, and there is much fear - and even anger - among both West and East Berliners. One of East Berlin's largest supermarkets is the Kauthalle on Wisbyer Strasse. On its shelves today are oranges from Greece, produce from Italy, cheeses from West Germany and Coke from the bottler in West Berlin, Six months ago.

this bounty would have been impossible. However, most shoppers must pass up these products - their prices are astronomical to the average East Berliner who makes about 1,200 East German marks a month (about \$140 on

"You would have to be crazy to pay these kinds of prices." said Anna-Margaret Vogt, a young mother shopping with her two young children. But she relented and bought a six-pack of Coke, which her kids

see advertised constantly on West Berlin television.

East Germans have grown used to a subsidized lifestyle. There might not have been much choice, but at least the basics were affordable. East Berliners look at the prices of newly arrived goods and worry that this is the wave of the future.

"How will we ever survive?" wonders Anna. speaking not only of potentially higher prices. but of the chimination of East Germany's child-care system that frees up young mothers.

This apprehension is increased by fears that reunification means the East's inefficient, unprofitable and highly subsidized industries will be shut down. A population that has known only guaranteed jobs for the past 40 years would suddenly find itself looking for work. A recent study by the Germany Economy Institute predicts that 1.5 million East Germans will be out-of-work by the time the dust settles.

If a recently announced deal between IFA -East Germany's state auto company - and Volkswagen is any

indication, East German workers have much to worry about. Under the deal, VW will pour \$3 billion into modernizing IFA plants to produce VW Polos. but it is likely the IFA's oversized work force, which now stands at 215,000. will be cut by at least 100,000.

Many East Germans worry that reunification will actually the absorption of East Germany by West Germany, A recent poll showed

that, by a ratio of 4-to-1. East Germans believe they will have little political influence in a reunified Germany. They see themselves as potential second-class citizens with Western industry viewing them merely as a source of cheap

Many young West Germans do view their Eastern cousins exactly that way, and that also causes fear.

"I think this process (reunification) is maybe moving too quickly," says Peter Volker, a West Berlin student. "Young people here have worked very hard to be ready to find good jobs. I am afraid that those jobs are no longer going to be here and are going to move East.

Among older West Germans, East Germans are generally looked down upon as lazy and willing to be supported by a socialist system. By most measures, productivity of the average East German worker is less than half his Western counterpart.

Many West Germans worry that the cost of reunification will be too high. There will be enormous inflationary pressure caused by the buyout of East German currency. The result is

likely to be soaring interest rates. Another worry is that, after reunification, virtually the entire population of East Germany will be classified as living below the official poverty level. This would make them eligible for government assistance at a cost of billions annually.

Haiti needs U.S. commitment now

WASHINGTON - The U.S. government is about to hang a fledgling democracy out to dry in the hot Caribbean sun. Haiti has lost track of the coups that have driven its chaotic government in recent years. With each coup, new hopes for democracy are raised and then dashed again. The most recent coup came in March when President Prosper Avril was overthrown. Now, if the State Department and Congress con-

balk on sen-

Ld to Haiti at this critical juncture. the nation will be pushed further back from the brink of democracy. Alvin Adams, the U.S. ambassador to Haiti, can take much of the credit for getting Haiti to that brink. Five months ago. Adams arrived in Haiti and gave a speech in Creole at the airport. He told the assembled throng that "the loaded donkey cannot stop or it will collapse," meaning that Haiti must go forward with democ-



election when

its economy is in a shambles.

racy. The Haitians cheered. Now they have taken to calling Adams "Bourik Chaje," the loaded donkey.

Adams' appeal was lost on Avril, who tried to have him sent back to the United States. As it turned out, Adams has outlasted Avril.

The new president, Ertha Pascal-Trouillot, vowed to hold free elections as soon as possible. But Haiti has found it impossible to organize an election when its economy is in a

In the meantime, Congress and the State Department are quibbling over how much to give Haiti in its hour of need. Supporters of Halti say the country needs \$30 million. Opponents say \$10 million will do. No one is following the debate more closely than Adams. He knows Haiti is walking a tightrope with no help from the outside. Haitian hardliners who supported Avril and "Baby Doc" Duvalier before him, have rattled the government. They are reportedly responsible for a recent hijacking and airplane fire at Port Au Prince Airport. The terrorist strikes effectively cut Haiti off from the outside world, as airlines cut scheduled service to Haiti. At a recent meeting with Pascal-Troulliet, Adams tried to urge the timid novice to get a grip on her government. But she wanted to know who would protect her and her family from her enemies. She is a widow who lives with her 14-year-old daughter. Adams' reputation is still golden in Halti. but the longer it takes for help to arrive from the United States, the more hollow his calls for democracy will sound.

Adams uses the pulpit better than any of his predecessors in Haiti. One of his lirst speeches was in City Soleil, a slum. In unbroken Creole, Adams told the poor Haitians how important democracy is for

A key Haitian source told our associate Jim Lynch that it was the first time many Hattians were convinced that the United States was on their side. America's unwise backing of the despotic Duvalier regimes had left Haitians in doubt, and had helped to turn Haiti into the poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere. Adams is a seasoned trouble-shooter who

has the respect of the State Department. He can be tossed into the worst of circumstances and turn the situation around. But this time he can't do it alone.

The Soviets have rejected the idea that a united Germany should be part of NATO. But the West Germans believe, in the end, that Mikhail Gorbachev will give in For the sake of European stability, it would be better for the Germanys to join NATO only temporarily.

High-powered boat races held on inland waterways draws disapproval from Judith Vallee, executive director of the Save the Manatee Club.

"I'm never crazy about a powerboat race in an area where manatees are located," she said, noting that there are probably anywhere from 70 to 150 of the animals traversing the waterways from Lake Monroe to just porth of Blue Springs State Park. Yes, there are manatees there and yes, there could be a problem with holding boat races on Lake Monroe. I would hope that the Fish and Wildlife Service would recommend that future events of this type be held offshore (on ocean courses).

The U.S. Coast Guard is the agency that holds the power to approve or disapprove of powerboat races. Once it receives a formal request, the Coast Guard in turn contacts the Fish and Wildlife Service, who conducts a biological study of the area in question to determine the impact of such an even* on wildlife. Results of that study are then returned to the Coast Guard and it is a major factor in deciding whether the races may or may not be held.

In the case of the Sanford races, the Fish and Wildlife Service issued an opinion to the Coast Guard that contains a number of detailed stipulations for boat racing on Lake Monroe.

No one, including race promoters or any other person in an "official" capacity, may attempt to physically remove or verbally harass the animal in any form. Violation of this stipulation will result in criminal

prosecution, Turner said. Turner, like Vallee, doesn't see the point in conducting powerboat races on Inland waterways. "Races in general are a real

threat to this species," he said. The manatee is a species already in serious trouble. Florido is the animal's last bastian of hope and recent numbers indicate that the animal is losing its battle to survive.

Through April 24, 124 manatees have been found dead in state waters, according to Beth Beeler, an environmental expert with the Department of Natural Resources.

That number indicates another record year of manatee fatalities might be in the making. Last year, 166 manatee deaths established a new state record. Fifty of the deaths were directly attributable to the animals being struck by boats or

Of the 124 deaths recorded thus far this year, 21 have been blamed on boaters.

These figures are just too high. says Vallee, whose most vivid recollection of Lake Monroe is that of finding a dead manatee

"Whenever I hear someone mention Lake Monroe, the first thing I think of is that one of the manatees in our adoption program was found dead there a few years ago," she said.

Hostage's father blames Rushdle

LONDON - The father of a British journalist held hostage in Lebanon blamed author Salman Rushdie for his son's continued captivity in an interview with a British newspaper published Sunday.

Patrick McCarthy told the Mail on Sunday that if Rushdie's book. "The Satante Verses," which fundamentalist Muslims consider blasphemous, had not been published his son John

The book caused a break in relations between Iran and Britain after Iran's spiritual leader Ayatoliah Ruholfah Khomeint said Muslims had a duty to kill the author. Rushdie has since been in hiding.

Pope to meet Salinas in Mexico

MEXICO CITY - Pope John Paul II's meeting Monday with President Carlos Salinas de Gortari represents warming relations between the Roman Catholic Church and Mexico, but there was no indication that official diplomatic ties would be established.

Millions turned out Sunday to welcome John Paul on his second visit to Mexico, including Salinas, who called the head of the Catholic Church "a friend of Mexico."

John Paul, on an eight-day, 14-city tour of Mexico, was scheduled to talk with Salinas Monday at the presidential

Prison fire kills 33 inmates

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina - Nearly three dozen prisoners housed in a special wing because of their good behavior were killed in a penitentiary fire that quarreling inmates may have started, authorities said.

The Olmos Penitentiary, 35 miles south of Buenos Aires, released the names of 33 dead. Another 11 were reported injured, two of them in grave condition.

The prison warden, Prefect Maj. Julio Barroso, said Sunday the blaze that began in the good-conduct wing Saturday night was the result of "a quarrel between inmates, and testimony to this effect has been given to Judge Antonio Nadina." the official investigating the origin of the fire.

Barroso also said the fire was started after a prison guard was "assaulted" during a count of the prisoners Saturday night.

Baker happy with Polish-German talks

WARSAW, Poland - U.S. Secretary of State James Baker said Sunday that Polish Prime Minister Tadeusz Mazowiecki was satisfied with Poland's inclusion in July's round of German reunification talks, which will deal with the issue of the Polish-German border.

During his five-hour official visit Baker briefed Polish leaders on the outcome of Saturday's German reunification talks in Bonn, and invited Polish Foreign Minister Krzysztof Skubiszewski to attend the third round of talks in July in Paris. He left for home later in the day.

Bush plots strategy on deficit

WASHINGTON - With his stand against higher taxes appearing as vulnerable as ever. President Bush won agreement from top congressional leaders Sunday evening to move toward bipartisan negotiations on the budget.

After an informal 90-minute meeting in the family quarters of the White House, House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., said the stage may be set for "a process" of negotiations on cutting the deficit in 1994 and perhaps beyond.

And although the discussions skirted specific issues in the budget debate, he and Senate Democratic leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, said "the assumption" in the meeting was that all issues - including taxes - would be negotiable.

Billed as an unstructured give and take without fixed agenda or objectives, the White House meeting held the potential for leading - through tone if not substance - to a new push for a bipartisan solution to the deficit conundrum.

Gorbachev rebukes Latvian vote

MOSCOW - Negotiations with Latvia over its declaration of independence "are out of the question," Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev was quoted as saying in a conversation with the Baltic republic's Communist Party boss.

The official Tass news agency reported Sunday that Latvian Communist Party boss Alfreds Rubiks, in a TV speech Saturday, said Gorbachev had telephoned and asked 5im to convey to the Latvian people his dissatisfaction with the independence proclamation approved Friday by the republic's

Mandela: End race-based group rights

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — Black leader Nelson Mandela urged President Frederik de Klerk to abandon his ideological embrace of "group rights" in a post-apartheid South Africa, warning any race-based concepts would be unacceptable to the black majority.

Mandela, joining other African National Congress leaders at a rally Sunday in Soweto to celebrate a successful end to last week's talks with the government, said the ANC would flatly reject minority protection on the basis of race.

"We can never accept the concept of group rights," Man-dela told a crowd of 30,000 at a soccer stadium in the satellite city southwest of Johannesburg. affirming the ANC's demand for one-man, one-vote on a common voters roll.

"I hope to have several discussions with (de Klerk) before the two delegations sit down again, and one of the things I'm going to urge on him is to abandon the concept of group rights, or minority rights, without any reservation.

"At a time when we want to move away from all forms of racialism, we do not want discussions which have started so well to be bedevtled by any solution which is based on race. He must not bring this issue to any conference between the ANC and the government,"

De Klerk, vowing to prevent a "suicide" agreement for the white minority, has rejected majority rule in a post-apartheid constitution and insisted on "power sharing" in a charter that ensures minority interests.

Hostage families seek goodwill

ARLINGTON, Va. - Family members of hostages kidnapped in Lebanon urged Israel to make the next move in an effort to get their loved ones released from captivity.

Speaking at a news conference Sunday to honor his release after 44 months of captivity, former hostage Frank Reed urged the Bush administration to negotiate with the kidnappers holding six Americans hostage.

"Let's stop talking about all this geopolitical erap," said Reed, whose anger appeared to give strength to his weakened body. "We have an absolute duty to negotiate and not to throw geopolitical slogans around about anti-terrorism."

Reed previously has spoken publicly about his anger that fellow hostages Terry Anderson, Thomas Sutherland, Brian Keenan and John McCarthy are still being held.

Anderson's sister, Peggy Say, said she personally asked Israel, through its ambassador to the United States. Moshe Arad, to release Moslemfundamentalist cleric Sheik Abdul Karim Obeid and hundreds of Shitte prisoners being Leid in Israeli prisons.

"(Arad) was sympathetic," said Say, whose brother has begun his sixth year in captivity. "Buthe said he was used to dealing with governments. I'm a middle-aged housewife and I've never pretended to be anything else.

But Say found support for her cause from Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynthan, D-N.Y., who represents a large constituency of Israel's supporters.

"Any nation that wishes to be treated as a law-abiding nation must show respect for the [international] laws to which it is bound," Moynihan said. "That applies to Israel. They cannot hold hostages. We hope they hear us."

On ABC's "This Week with David Brinkley. Iran's U.N. ambassador, Kamal Kharazzi, said-"the easiest gesture" for the United States to take to win the release of the remaining slx American hostages in Lebanou would be to persuade Israel to free the Shiite prisoners and use its influence with the Christian Phalangists to locate the four frontairs missing in Lebanon

In the absence of such action, he said, "We cannot do invilling more because no demands of the Lebanese people have been met."

President Bush has steadfastly refused to openly negotiate with hostage takers, preferring instead to offer countries like fran — which have influence over the kidnappers - more subtle promises of goodwill."

Bush also has encouraged the release of "all hostages," presumably including Obeid, who was abducted by Israeli commandos in July, and hundreds of Shitte prisoners held in Israeli jails.

Reed, speaking in detail for the first time since his release, described beatings and torment he suffered while blindfolded almost constantly and chained to a radiator.

Reed, 57, of Malden, Mass., said being held hostage was worse than being a prisoner sen-

"Prisoners have a sentence. What we were faced with was endless time," said Reed, who was released from captivity last Monday. "Prisoners have visitors, exercise. We had none of those things. I have been been lying on my back for 3 1/4 years, chained to a wall or a radiator.

"We slept on a very thin foam rubber mattress." he said. "We were blindfolded 24 hours a day. We slept with our blindfolds. If we had any collateral with our kidnappers, we didn't want to lose it by letting them secour eyes.

Reed said he was suffering from severe anemia. vitamin deficiency and a weight loss of 50 pounds.

high jump while at Lake Howell last year, has cleared 6.4 in a meet and 6.5 practice. The Oviedo school record is 6-6, set by Brian Wilson


But Melgard, who was a high jumper himself in high school, is gearing Goins for competition beyond the state meet.

The New York Knicks pulled off an escape even Harry Houdini would be proud of. Akin to being blindfolded, shackeled and

immersed upside-down in a water tank, New York completed its death-defying playoff stunt Sunday with an improbable series-clinching 121-114 triumph over the Boston Celtics, overcoming a 2-0 game deficit in the opening round of the Eastern Conference playoffs.

The Knicks, who received 31 points from Patrick Ewing and 26 points and 17 rebounds from Charles Oakley, will play the defending NBA champion Detroit Pistons in the Eastern Conference semifinal beginning Tuesday night in

In the opening round of the Western Conference, the Phoenix Suns eliminated the Utah Jazz in their best-of-five series by snatching the deciding game 104-102, gaining a berth in the conference semifinals against the Los Angeles Lakers. Game 1 in the best-of-seven series is scheduled for Tuesday night in Los Angeles.

The Knicks became only the third team in playoff history to capture a five-game series after losing the first two games. The only other teams to recover from such a deficit were the Fort Wayne Pistons over St. Louis in 1956 and the Golden State Warriors over Utah in 1987.

"It may have only been done twice, but it was done today," said Oakley.

"They came back and played their best basketball of season," said Boston Coach Jimmy Rodgers, "Timing is everything,"

After dropping the first two games, New York shook off every hindrance that threatened its survival. The Knicks, who were written off by local media, overeame exceptional odds in ousting their Atlantic Division rivals. Consider this: To advance, the Knicks had to

defeat the Celtics at the Boston Garden, where they have been losers 26 consecutive times. Not only haven't they beaten the Celtics in Boston since Feb. 29, 1984, the Knicks also had

to overcome a 16-game playoff losing streak on the Celties' home court. And after suffering a 157-128 trouncing in

Game 2 on the parquet floor, what hope could the breathless Knicks have for victory on enemy territory?

Just ask Kenny Walker.

"What better opportunity than to go to Boston Garden losing 26 in a row?" said Walker, "We're still breathing, we're still alive. It doesn't get any better than this."



It once was good enough to dream of being a professional athlete, not for the dollars and cents, but because being a proball player was the closest thing D being a god that we could imagine.


Now, multimillion dollar contracts have had impact on young athletes, choosing one sport over another because of the better potential salaries.

Bromeliads grown for their exotic air

Few families in the plant kingdom surpass bromeliads with their wide variation in size. shape, flowers and foliage color. Most species are grown for their tropical foliage and exotic shapes, but also for their outstanding flowers or inflorescences. Bromeliads are adapted to the conditions found in the home, require little care and can make excellent houseplants.

Bromeliads are members of the pineapple family Bromeliaceae, a family native to the American tropics. The two most widely known members of this family are the pineapple and

In their native habitat, some promellads grow in full sun. When cultivated, bromeliads others in light shade and some levels while species with soft. green, thin leaves need moderate to heavy shade. Usually a window with a southern, eastern or western exposure is satisfactory for bromeliads, but most species should not be exposed to

the direct rays of the sun.

A good fertilization program will ensure excellent bromellads. A water soluble fertilizer with a cases. balanced ratio such as a 20-20-20 applied at half strength once per month is recommended.

Outside or on a patio, watering bromeliads is a simple matter. Most bromellads have a rosette of leaves that form a "vase" at the base that traps water. All there is to it is to keep these "cups" filled with water and refill when low or empty.

Indoor care is a little different. Watering in the "cups" can tend to rot the bromeliad in interior environments. over a long period of time and growers are always interested in any method to induce flowering. Researchers have discovered that ethylene gas given off by ripening apples will cause initiation of flowers in bromeliads. You can start flowering by placing a ripe apple and your bromeliad in a polyethylene bag. tying it up and leaving it covered for four days before removing. However, this method is not always successful for homeowners. Commercially, ethylene gas is used to initiate flowers as it is

tunately, the apples don't produce enough of the gas in most

Bromeliads are bothered by few diseases or insects. Copper fungicides and oil based spray are toxic to bromeliads so do not use these products on yours. Insect pests like scale and mealy bugs can be controlled with Malathion or Cygon. Plants should be dipped or sprayed outside. Be sure to empty the "cups" and flush with water so the pesticide doesn't sit in them and cause damage.




