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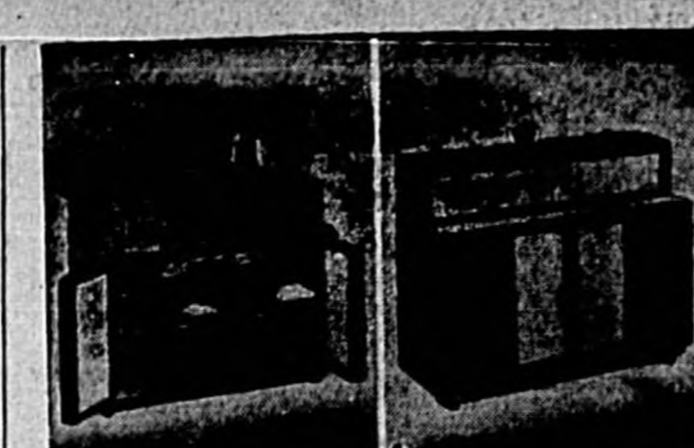

### Navy Recruiters Enlisting Men For Gasparilla Day

Lieutenant Commander M. E. Smith, Navy Recruiting Officer in Charge of the Florida District announced today that the U. S. Navy would again this year help defend the City of Tampa against the "invasion" by "Jose Gaspar" when he and his pirate crew invade the city on Feb. 4 at the opening of the Gasparilla Festival. Each year, on the first Monday in February, the City of Tampa is invaded by the pirates of Jose Gaspar and to date the city has always been "captured". Tampa will remain, as always, under the

strong hand of these pirates for one full week during the Gasparilla Festival. History reveals that this pirate and his crew were "done-in" by the U.S. Navy back in the days when real pirates used the ports and coves along the Florida coast. Last year the Navy was called upon to assist the citizens of Tampa to repel this annual attack but as always Jose Gaspar was victorious. Once again this year the Navy has answered the call, and on February 4th some 70 Navy recruits will be sworn into the Navy at the height of the festivities and will help oppose the pirate onslaught. The men being sworn into the Navy on that day will be

comprised of a group of selected young Floridians who will represent the entire state. Upon completion of their activities in Tampa they will leave on a special train for the Great Lakes Naval Training Center. All the men in this special company will stay together during their initial basic training. Lieutenant Commander Smith said, "because we must limit the number which can take part in this special company the men qualified will of course have to pass all entrance requirements and from then it will be a 'first come, first go' basis". He added, "if there are more than 70 qualified men who want to take part in this special recruit Company, the remainder will be able to go to Tampa and take part in this big event but will not be able to be an official member of the "Navy's Gasparilla Successor Company".

### Two-Car Collision Yesterday Sends Women To Hospital

A two car collision sent two women to hospitals yesterday afternoon as their cars crashed at the intersection of Mellonville Ave. and 25th St.

A 1955 Plymouth sedan, traveling west on 25th St., apparently ran a red stop light and crashed into a 1949 Ford sedan, twisting it into and over the curb on Mellonville Ave.

The car going west on 25th St., driven by Willie Mae Pringle, 28-year-old Negro housewife whose address was given as Fifth St. in Midway, came to a stop nearly under the traffic signal at the intersection.

The Ford, driven by Verna Harriette Donahue of 708 W. 3rd St. was thrown over the curb.

Willie Mae Pringle was taken to Seminole Memorial Hospital suffering from internal injuries and a 13-year-old boy, Albert Pringle, was treated for bruised knees and head.

Verna Harriette Donahue, 32-year-old bookkeeper employed by the Sanford Naval Air Station, was taken to the Sanford NAB Hospital and treated for a bruised head and shoulder.

The accident, investigated by Capt. Arnold Williams and Lt. Joe Hickson, was caused by running the stop sign, according to their report.

Willie Mae Pringle has been charged with running a stop sign.

An accident this morning on 25th at Summerlin Ave. caused little damage when a truck hauling furniture from Quincy to Titusville went out of control and crashed into a ditch.

Damage was minor to the truck and furniture, according to a report made by Leo Rock, officer of the Sanford Police Department, who investigated. The truck was driven by Robert Strung Jr., 27-year-old Negro truck driver, and owned by Selmo Bradley of Quincy.

### Three Youngsters' Bodies Recovered From Frigid River

CRANFORD, N. J. — Grapplers recovered the body of Richard Johnson, 9, today from the frigid Rahway River a block from where the frozen corpse of his younger sister and another boy were found last night.

Richard's body was found at 8:55 a. m. by searchers who had resumed grappling the river after daybreak. The river ice has been a death trap for other youngsters in the past.

The frozen bodies of Richard's sister, Martha and Philip Harrington Jr., both 7, were found by a search party near where two other children drowned in 1952 and 1948.

The children's rigid bodies, their arms outstretched for aid, were hooked with grappling irons under the South Avenue Bridge, a quarter mile upstream from Droecher's Mill Dam.

The dam has been one of the community's winter play spots for children for years. Two-year-old Joseph Behan plunged through the ice of the river and drowned March 27, 1952. Peter Shoukimas, 5, had drowned in a similar accident Jan. 14, 1948.

The township had ordered a study of how to prevent further mishaps after the drownings but no action had been taken.

Floyd Palmer, president of the Jaycees in 1955 here in Sanford, took part in the original discus-

sions at the forming of the statewide body. The discussions and organization of the group took place in the former Seminole Cafe on South Park Ave. where the local meetings were held.

According to an issue of The Sanford Herald on that date, Saturday, May 23, 1955, the delegates met in the Circuit Court Room and later formed the organization at the Seminole Cafe.

Delegates to the convention and organization of the statewide club were entertained during the afternoon at the golf club and at a baseball game.

The Rev. E. D. Brownlee gave the invocation at the meeting here and Judge Ernest Housholder was the principal speaker.

### Bill To Abolish Fee System Okayed For Legislature

KEY WEST — A bill to abolish the controversial fee system and put county sheriffs' departments on a budget and salary basis tops the program of bills approved by the Florida Sheriffs Assn. for the 1957 Legislature.

The association in executive session here Wednesday endorsed a 16-point legislative program to be submitted to the Legislature this spring.

The perennial fee system bill has always proved a storm center in past legislatures.

A bill to require registration of all criminals in the state and another to amend conspiracy laws and increase the penalty for serious crimes were also approved by the sheriffs.

The sheriffs also will ask passage of measures authorizing use of radar as legal evidence in speeding arrests and the use of drunkometers as evidence in traffic violations.

### Price: Top Priority Promised

WASHINGTON — Rep. Melvin Price (D-Ill.) charged today that the administration has slowed development of atomic aircraft after promising the project "high priority."

Price is chairman of the atomic energy research and development subcommittee.

"I am going to make inquiries," he said, "to see why there has been this change in policy after our committee was assured over a year ago that the project would have high priority and would be pushed."

Defense Department sources confirmed that development of an aircraft to carry an atomic engine has been cut back.

Price said efforts to develop the power plant itself have been curtailed.

Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission reported last year that a land-based nuclear power plant was being tested at the aircraft engine test center in Idaho.

But Price said the whole program has been slowed to the point where not all of the money appropriated for it last year has yet been allocated.

"This is a matter of great discouragement to this committee," Price said. He added that if development of atomic submarines had followed a similar course, "the Nautilus would not be plying the seas today."

Panama sources attributed the slowness as lack of respect and development funds resulting from higher priority given to missile development.

There was a time some years ago when it looked as though an atom-driven plane might take the air some time in 1958. Now there seems little likelihood that this will happen before 1962 or 1963. The military attitude was said to be that the point is not merely to get a nuclear-propelled plane aloft but to develop a practical long-range bomber.

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower's agency chiefs began trying today to talk a dubious Congress into boosting mortgage interest rates to 5 per cent on GI housing.

NEW YORK — Leading psychiatrists and legal experts felt assured today that George Jackson, the captured "mad bomber of Manhattan," will be adjudged insane and committed to a mental hospital, for his admitted planting of 34 home-made pipe bombs since 1940.

LAKELAND — A subcommittee of Florida Citrus Mutual meets here today to discuss the State Supreme Court's decision stopping the Plant Board from filing the "pull and treat" method to fight spreading decline.

WASHINGTON — Congressional budget cutters of both parties began searching today for places to trim President Eisenhower's record \$71.3 billion spending program for the new fiscal year.

Heralded by its own distinctive highpitched whine, the first A3D Skywarrior jet bomber is expected to land at NAS Sanford today.

### Free World Nations Today View Atomic Retaliation Threat

LONDON — Nations of the free world today viewed the Soviet Union's "atomic retaliation" warning as Moscow's reply to the Eisenhower Doctrine for the Middle East. All agreed it can not be ignored.

The Communist Party newspaper Pravda said Wednesday the United States may turn the Middle East and the Far East into "hotbeds of atomic warfare" by carrying out reported plans to establish atom armed American units in Turkey, Iran, Japan and Okinawa.

The official Soviet Tass news agency immediately picked up the charge where Pravda left off, and warned U. S. allies they might become the first victims of any atomic war. It specifically singled out for warning Britain, France, West Germany, Italy, Turkey, Iran and Japan.

But in Washington, President Eisenhower left open the question of whether U. S. forces might be forced to fight aggression in the Middle East.

He said a final decision has not been reached, although he proposed "doctrine" promises to use force if necessary.

"Chuck" McBralne will cross the nation in approximately five hours. Third Crewman on the delivery flight Aviation Machinists Mate First Class John Richards, also of Sanford. Although other squadrons of Heavy Attack Wing ONE are already operating the Skywarrior, VAH-9 is the first Sanford-based squadron to receive delivery of the new twin-jet bomber.

The largest and most powerful carrier-based airplane ever built, the Douglas A3D Skywarrior joined the fleet on March 30, 1956. It is produced for the U. S. Navy at El Segundo, Calif. where it was designed and developed.

Although designed as an atom-bomber, the three-place A3D is very versatile and can be used for many other missions. Its arrangement is such that it can carry almost any weapon in the Navy's arsenal.

Powered by two J37 Pratt and Whitney turbo-jet engines, the Skywarrior flies at high subsonic speeds and at altitudes above 50,000 miles.

The 70,000 pound A3D is small in comparison with other airplanes in its class, having a span of only 72½ feet. It can takeoff from many existing carriers, including those of the new Forrestal Class, either by catapult or by a deck take-off using JATO bottles.

The first production model made its initial flight Sept. 16, 1953, from Los Angeles International Airport.

The capabilities of the sweep-wing bomber were demonstrated Aug. 1, 1954 when the first assembly line jet force if necessary.

### Two Counties Working Together On Theft Case

"We're confident that our prisoner is involved in the taking of gas cylinders," Deputy Sheriff H. Smart and Rodney Young said this morning at the Seminole County jail following the questioning of James Robert Johnson who earlier this week admitted the breaking and entering of a number of places in southeast Seminole County.

"Those involved are being questioned about numerous other thefts in both Orange and Seminole Counties," the two deputies said.

Johnson has already been involved in the breaking and entering of a Hubbard Construction Company tool truck, they said this morning as the investigation continued.

Deputy Sheriff Young has been assigned to the case by Sheriff Dave Starr of Orange County and Deputy Sheriff H. Smart is investigating the Sanford case by getting for Sheriff Luther Hobbs of Seminole County.

"The two counties are cooperating to the fullest extent in breaking this case," Smart said this morning at the Seminole County jail.

Smart and Young this morning said that "the investigations have revealed that the operation of the prisoner in Central Florida are far bigger and more widespread than at first anticipated."

Involved so far is the pilfering of tools, equipment, motors, accessories, gasoline, gas cylinders and many other items which are wearing themselves together in completing our investigation.

Smart, on the arrest of Johnson and two others who were also apprehended in the southeast Seminole County thefts and breaking and entering, said that other arrests are expected in the very near future.

### Power Assn. Seeks Study Of Recent Oil Price Increase

WASHINGTON — The American Public Power Assn. today called for federal investigation of recent oil price increases to determine whether price controls should be enacted.

The association said the investigation also should determine whether the price increase involved collusion among oil producers.

The association, representing utility companies, sent copies of a resolution calling for the investigation to President Eisenhower and a number of congressional committees.

Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) announced Wednesday his Senate anti-monopoly subcommittee plans to begin an investigation into oil and gasoline price hikes "very soon."

### Information For Veterans

Here are authoritative answers from the Veterans Administration to four questions of interest to former servicemen and their families:  
**Q.** May I get a GI business loan to buy an automobile? I need it to get to and from my place of business.  
**A.** A GI business loan for this purpose would be prohibited by law. Veterans may obtain GI loans for automobiles only if they are essential in carrying on their business.  
**Q.** I forgot to pay my GI insurance premium last month, and my policy lapsed. How may I get it back? I have a term policy.  
**A.** You may reinstate your GI policy by paying two monthly premiums, one for the 31-day grace period during which you were covered and the other for the current month. If you reinstate within three months of the date of lapse, you need merely submit a statement that you are in as good health as you were when the policy lapsed. Otherwise, you will be required to take a physical examination. Also, the policy must be reinstated before its term expires.  
**Q.** I want to train under the Korean GI Bill, but I am not sure what course I would like to take. How do I go about applying for VA vocational counseling?  
**A.** On the application form for Korean GI training, you will find a section that asks whether you want vocational counseling. Simply check that section. VA then will schedule you for vocational counseling.  
**Q.** I hold Korean GI term insurance. Will I get a yearly dividend, the same as my brother who is a World War II veteran and holds a World War II policy?  
**A.** No. Under the law, your Korean GI term insurance is non-participating. It does not pay dividends. However, premiums on this type of insurance generally are lower than World War II GI premiums.

With outdoor air conditioning, New England could give the lie to Mark Twain's old saw about New England climate: "If you don't like the weather here, wait a minute."  
Our hero of the moment is only 21, which is pretty close to the average age of the framers of the Constitution. His name is Gilbert Edwards. He is building, in Fort Lauderdale, a housing development intended for retired older folks.  
Informed sources have reported that it gets hot in Florida in the summer. According to word that has heeded up north, Edwards has in the works for his development a three-acre garden, lushly landscaped with tropical plants and cucumber-cool with air conditioning.  
The plan is to have majestic palm trees swaying around the premises. In each tree, but camouflaged among the fronds, will be big air conditioning units. Each will be of sufficient horsepower to chill a 60-foot-diameter area around each tree.  
The plan is to keep the outdoors around there cooled to 70 degrees during the hot weather. Ideal for beach sitting. In the interest of intact and whole skulls, the palm trees will be kept denuded of coconuts.  
Who says the pioneer spirit is dead? If this isn't a breakthrough on several fronts — including a weather front—I've never heard of one.  
As you know, they've already brought water to the edge of the ocean in Florida—with swimming pools right on the beaches. Now how about moving the pools into the ocean itself. How's that for an idea?  
And let's get some sun lamps under those palms, so people sitting outdoors in the air-cooled shade can get some sunrays. Now we're talking. Edison move over—er, maybe, roll over.  
Don't sit under that coconut tree with anyone else but me!

### Oversleeping Is As Bad For You As Overeating

WHETHER you're a night owl or an early bird, you need your sleep. And if you're in good health, mental and physical, you don't have to take sleeping pills to get it!  
How much sleep you need and when you should get it, of course, is an individual problem. There are some guidelines, however, for you can get too much sleep just as easily as you can get too little.  
**Comfortable Position**  
It doesn't matter whether you sleep on your back, abdomen or side. You'll sleep just as soundly in any position, although you may find one more comfortable than others.  
Generally, your sleep isn't quite as sound as you may think. You'll be oblivious to it, but you'll probably be partially awake for about half a minute each hour.  
Most likely you'll toss about, shifting your position anywhere from 30 to 40 times a night. The more you shift, you can readily see, the less sound will be your sleep.  
**For Healthy Life**  
Inability to sleep soundly, no matter how irritable and cross it may make you, will not cause any chronic disease. A few restless nights, however, might easily reduce your efficiency. You mentally and physically. You need a healthy life to live a normal, healthy life.  
**Mental Exhaustion**  
Mental exhaustion, however, is another matter. I'll discuss this in a later article.  
If you want an unusual amount of sleep, I think your trouble probably may be sluggish digestion and lack of exercise.  
You suburban commuters might do well to walk to and from the railroad station each day instead of having your wife drive you those few blocks. You'll probably sleep better if you do—and your wife probably can sleep a little later.  
**COMMON SENSE ANSWER**  
Q. P. Will you please tell me the best remedy for phlebotomy?  
A. Answer: Treatment of phlebotomy consists in removing the worms by frequent washings of the infected region. The use of various drugs, given by mouth, under the direction of a physician, also is possible.  
The person infected with phlebotomy should have his fingernails cut short, wear underpants at night, and wash his hands before eating and after going to the toilet.

Arriving at the headquarters building, drivers in both motorcades will park their cars if they and their passengers desire to join in the dedication ceremonies.



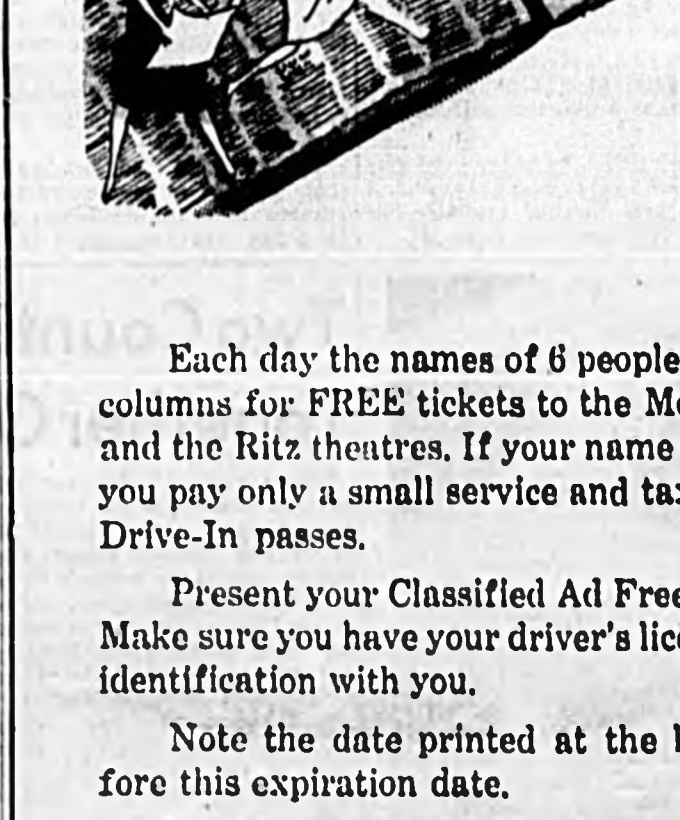

### Are Peaceful Slumbers A Matter Of Habit?

A GOOD night's sleep might simply be a matter of habit. Unconsciously you build up to peaceful slumber through your regular night-time routine, but a break in this routine might mean the difference between restful sleep and a night of fretful tossing and turning.  
As Dr. Henry Dantsig explains in "Blue Print for Health," getting ready for bedtime may be part of a conditioned reflex or a complex which establishes a nightly pattern. Your routines become habits. Without them, you might not sleep well.  
**Scheduled Train**  
Even though you're not aware that you're sleepy, the rumble of a scheduled train or the blowing of a factory whistle might be the signal for you to retire.  
Dr. Dantsig advises that you follow your usual routines, since breaking them might give you the feeling that you have forgotten something. This feeling, as you well know, is apt to disturb your sleep.  
**Complete Train**  
If you're in the habit of checking the doors to see if they are locked, making sure the gas jets on the kitchen range are off and going to the basement to bank the furnace each evening, be sure you complete each task before retiring.  
If you men customarily shave before you go to bed, don't let it go till morning. You're apt to worry all night about this additional chore facing you upon arising.  
You women who usually put up your hair, and make certain cosmetic preparations before going to bed, should follow this routine nightly.  
**Accustomed Routine**  
Reading your newspaper or listening to a particular news broadcast might be part of your routine.  
Raising the refrigerator might be a habit, too. This, within reason, is all right. The type of food or drink taken before bedtime is not too important. Medically, there is no reason for not eating or drinking before retiring.  
But don't overeat. Gorging yourself can give you indigestion, and that can prevent a good night's sleep.  
If you habitually "count sheep" in order to get to sleep, it's probably a good idea to continue. Even the practice of self-hypnosis or auto-suggestion should be continued if it is successful.  
The important thing to remember is to do the things you usually do.

The meters are being installed for parallel parking, the first of the conversion from angle to parallel parking in Sanford.

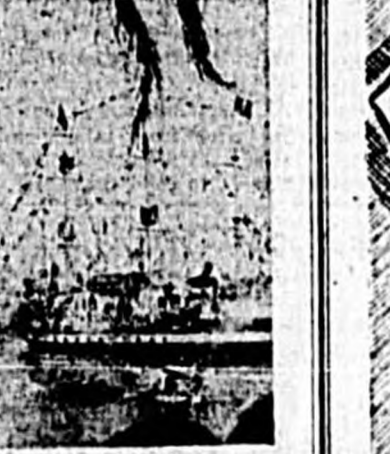
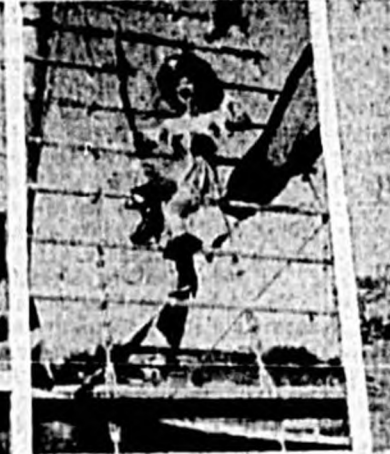

Farm housing loans are repayable over periods up to 33 years at four per cent interest, and are security by a mortgage on the farm.

# Remember Hungry People Abroad When 'Eating Chicken' On Weekdays

Whatever became of chicken on Sunday? This is not an entirely frivolous question, though one need not be unduly solemn about it, either.

A big chicken dinner at about two o'clock in the afternoon used to be almost as much a part of Sunday as going to church. Though the custom still has its devoted adherents, it is not as nearly universal as it once was in this country. Why?

One reason is that fewer families raise chickens in the backyard as a source of supply for the table. Therefore, they are as likely to grace that table with ham or roast beef. Another reason, a much more significant one, is that a fairly lavish dinner is no longer the novelty it was among many middle class families years ago.

America still has its poor, but the great bulk of us are eating better than ever before. The custom of having rather plain food

during the week and a much more elaborate meal on Sunday is rapidly dwindling. That is so because many families are now able to afford chicken or turkey or a substantial cut of meat not only on Sunday, but several times a week.

This is something to be grateful for. It also ought to make us all more sympathetic to those millions abroad who never once in their lives enjoy the kind of meal that has become everyday fare in the United States.

## Obey Traffic Rules

The ever increasing number of fatal accidents is causing worry.

Many people are heard to say they don't go joy riding any more because of danger on the highways. They use their cars for routine needs.

People are wondering, we know, how the problem of traffic accidents can be more effectively dealt with. It appears now that in the year 1956 we will see a figure of 40,000 or more as the number of fatal accidents, as well as hundreds of thousands of persons injured.

Who is responsible? In most accidents the responsibility can be placed on drunken drivers, those who fail to yield the right of way, speed demons who lose control of their cars and others who contribute to fatal accidents in other ways like careless pedestrians.

A newspaper put on a campaign in one of the nation's large cities that made a lot of red faces.

Staff photographers took candid shots all over town. They photographed hundreds of thousands of automobiles being driven in violation of stop signs or red lights. They took pictures of pedestrians walking in the face of luminous "Don't Walk" signs. They recorded on film, pedestrians darting out from behind parked cars, persons doing an open-field running act across a heavily traveled street and motorists violating rules at school zones.

Pages of pictures showing traffic violations were published. Well known as well as lesser known people were shown jeopardizing their own lives or the lives of others.

Motorists and pedestrians must obey the rules if they want to live. Each person should appoint himself a traffic officer to discipline his own actions. The accident toll CAN be reduced and SHOULD be.

Then too, there is the problem of getting the picture of just exactly what is happening at the scene of accidents.

It is a well known fact that one cannot learn of the dangers lurking around the corner unless it is made known.

We believe that every accident should be reported—a word picture given of the surroundings, a photograph of the accident, and the on-the-scene findings of the investigating officer—not a studied solution that might come from diagram, analyses and consultations. It is on the scene where the accident occurs and it is from there that the news story should be written.

News reporters are better hands at telling the story of "what happened" in events of this nature—police officers are better hands at digging out the details for the prosecution of their case.

Fifty per cent of the traffic accidents could be prevented if the truth were made in cold black type where motorists could read of "what may have happened to them" if they had been there at the moment.

## Psychiatric Treatment

Consulting a psychiatrist has become fashionable again in some circles. The question of need for psychiatric treatment is not necessarily the test; it is often a matter of doing what one's friends do.

This might be written off as a fairly harmless diversion, except for one or two unfortunate facts. Undue emphasis on psychiatry tends to build it up in the public eye as a sort of mental snake remedy that will cure everything. Psychiatrists are the first to dispute this exaggerated notion. Further, if enough people run to the psychiatrist for treatment of their mental hang-nails and scratches, those really in need of mental therapy will be deprived of it.

The reason for this is that there are not nearly enough psychiatrists to provide adequate care ever for the three-quarters of a million Americans who are sick in mental hospitals, let alone for millions of others who suffer to some extent from neuroses. By the same token, we would not have enough surgeons if we besought them to take care of every cut and bruise.

There are many community resources—nurses, ministers, family physicians, teachers, welfare workers and others—to deal effectively with what one psychiatrist calls "the minor discomforts of living."

Let the psychiatrists treat those who are suffering from genuine mental illness.

# Chief Tells Of Russian Strength

GOLDSBORO, N.C. (AP) — Air Force Chief of Staff Nathan F. Twining has warned against underestimating Russia's industrial and military might.

Twining said it is imperative that America recognize Russia's capacity to build modern weapons as "the basis for a very real and up-to-date threat against us."

"We must not forget that the Reds developed atomic weapons and nuclear weapons in about half the time we estimated," he said. "They are moving modern bombers from the rawing board through production lines in less time than it takes the United States to carry out a similar design-production cycle."

"During my recent visit to Moscow," Twining added, "I saw new Soviet aircraft we had never seen before. Presumably these were some of their newest aircraft."

"We must weigh the results they are getting. We have clear evidence of Soviet industrial and military might. These are the roots of the danger we face today."

Twining also revealed the United States is testing a new super-sonic bomber, the B58, and that newer and faster interceptor planes, equipped with "far more effective weapons," are being received now.

He said that over-all, the Tactical Air Command is developing "a terrific striking punch with the addition of atomic weapons, capable of a sudden, close-in retaliation from overseas bases."

Twining expressed content with President Eisenhower's budget message, commenting that he is "convinced" the recommendations for defense expenditures "provide a wise and reasonable degree of protection for the nation."

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# W. German Political Weight Grows

West Germany importance in the European political set-up is growing rapidly. It is being suggested that West Germany will be regarded before long as the strongest power on the Western European continent.

The latest evidence of this increased importance is the report that a German, Lt. Gen. Hans Spidel, is to be named commander-in-chief of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization ground forces in the Central European Zone.

In that capacity, Spidel would command American, British and French, as well as German, troops in that part of Western Europe which would be the first line in event of a war with Soviet Russia.

It is reported also that both President Theodor Heuss and Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will make state visits to Washington this spring.

Prestige Growing The prestige of West Germany has been growing steadily for a long time. Under Adenauer, the country has risen from utter prostration after the destruction of World War II to solid prosperity. Its 50

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# Mid-East Getting Plenty 'Doctrines'

The Middle East is certainly getting plenty of "doctrines." First came the Eisenhower Doctrine, aimed at combating any Communist aggression in the Middle East.

Soviet Russia and Communist China retorted with the Bulganin-Chou doctrine, the expressed purpose of which is to prevent aggression or interference in the affairs of Middle Eastern countries by the United States.

Now we have the Egyptian-Saudi Arabian-Syrian-Jordanian doctrine, which says that these Arab countries will not permit themselves to become a "sphere of influence" for any foreign power.

It looks, too, as if the four Moslem members of the so-called Baghdad alliance may work a doctrine of their own, fitting in with the Eisenhower Doctrine. The Eisenhower doctrine, which Congress now is considering, was

worked out hastily as the result of the recent unsuccessful British-French invasion of the Suez Canal Zone.

It actually stems, however, from Russia's interference in Middle Eastern affairs, which started in a big way when President General Abdel Nasser of Egypt decided to turn to the Communist countries for arms.

Under the Eisenhower Doctrine the United States will use force if necessary to combat Communist aggression in the Middle East and would put some money into the countries concerned to make them less likely victims of Soviet ambitions.

What the doctrine really comes down to, as regards the use of American forces, is the theoretical situation in which one of the Arab countries—not any Middle Eastern country—came under Communist rule and attacked another Arab country. The country which came under attack would then have to ask the United States for help.

Beds Formulate Doctrine In Moscow last week, Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin and Chinese Red Premier Chou En-lai came up with their own doctrine.

Bulganin and Chou denounced the Eisenhower Doctrine as a plot to "suppress the movement for national independence" in the Middle East.

Soviet Russia and Red China, under their doctrine, are "ready to continue rendering the necessary support to the peoples of the Near and Middle East so as to prevent aggression and interference in the affairs of the countries of this area."

Finally, Nasser, King Saud of Saudi Arabia, Premier Sabri El-Asall of Syria and King Hussein of Jordan met in Cairo to adopt their own doctrine.

Support the Doctrine They announced Saturday night that the Arab countries, under their doctrine, were perfectly able to take care of their own affairs without the interference of any big power.

Turkey, Iraq, Iran and Pakistan announced Monday in Ankara, the Turkish capital, that they fully support the Eisenhower Doctrine. They indicated that they

## Growing spurts Often Bring Emotional Upsets

THE ages between five and nineteen are the healthiest years of life. Fewer Americans die during this period than at any other time. And each decade the record gets better and better.

Far from it. It's during this time that most children encounter their real emotional problems, even though you are apt to take them lightly.

One of their chief concerns will be their growth. And you've got to understand how they feel in order to help them.

Youngsters begin their adolescent spurts at various ages. Girls generally begin this quick growing period earlier than boys. If a girl becomes gawky at the age of 10 or 11 she is likely to become very self-conscious.

She'll be lonely about her size, worry about her complexion and probably cry very readily. Ridicule from other boys and girls is a frequent hazard at this tender age. Her tears are the least ridiculous of all and give her sympathy without being too obvious about it.

And don't think that an early spurt doesn't present problems for a boy, too. His voice will break just at the wrong times and he'll seem to be all legs and arms. A faint blush of a coming manhood will probably appear on his lip.

All of these things are of deep concern to a youngster. They should be of concern to you, too.

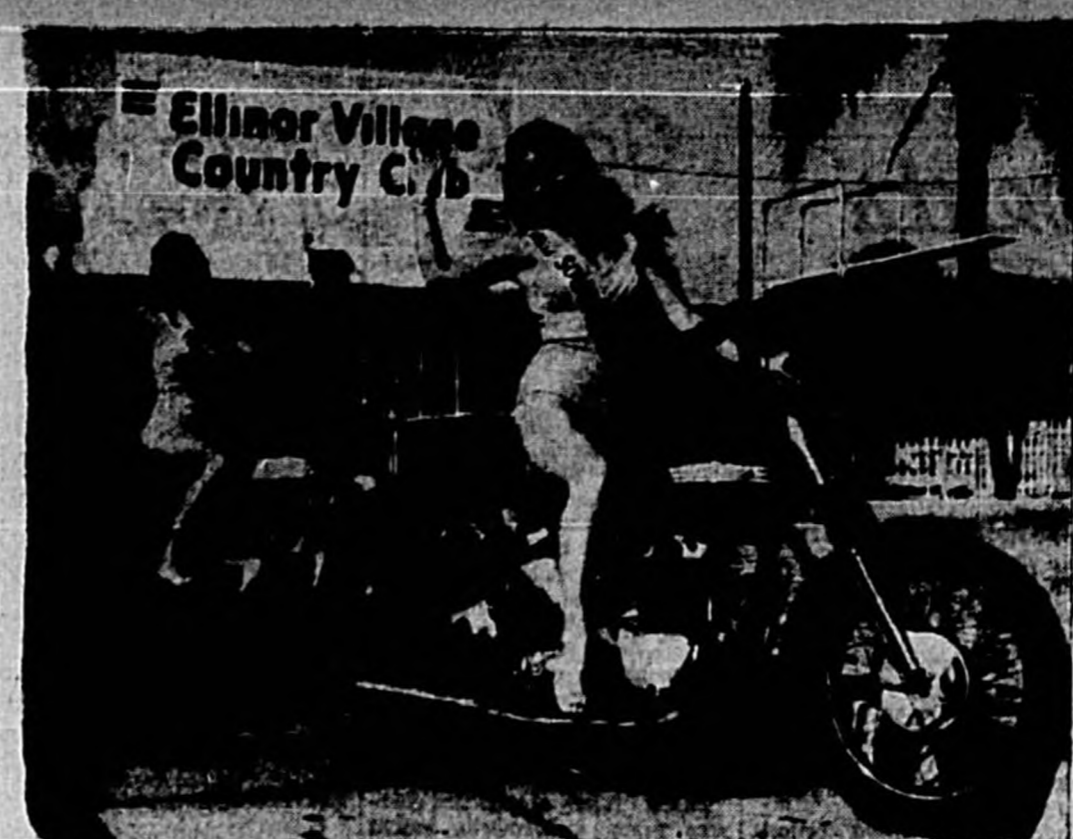

**Monaco's Heir Will Be 'Dual National'**

WASHINGTON — Greece Kelly's baby will be an American citizen as well as a citizen of Monaco, the State Department has ruled.  
The ruling was contrary to a declaration by Prince Ranier III that the child will be "uniquely" Monagasque.  
The Department itself listed a couple of provisions with which the Heir of Ranier and his wife must comply in order to maintain American citizenship.  
**Dual National**  
The ruling was sent to U. S. Consul General Luis Thompson at Nice, France, who had requested it. It said the child will be what is known as a "dual national."  
Thompson requested the opinion because he is the nearest U. S. diplomatic representative to Monaco. This country does not have a representative in the tiny nation.  
"The consul general was advised that since the mother is an American the child will be an American," a State Department spokesman said.  
The spokesman said U. S. law is explicit on the citizenship of a child born to an American citizen abroad. It provides that the child will be an American if the American parent had lived in the United States at least 10 years, five of them after the age of 14.  
This section clearly applies to children born to Grace Kelly and Prince Ranier the spokesman said.  
**Must Come To U. S.**  
The law also says that a child who is an American under this section of the law will lose his U. S. citizenship unless he comes to the United States before reaching the age of 23 and remains for at least five years.  
Such a child loses U. S. citizenship if he "has voluntarily sought or claimed benefits of the nationality of any foreign state" or if he lives continuously for three years in the foreign state after reaching 23.  
In the latter instance he may retain citizenship if he takes an oath of allegiance to the United States before a diplomatic or consular officer.

He has asked for a full scale investigation of the fuel oil industry to make sure they aren't taking advantage of the news stories to hike their prices unnecessarily. Florida's electric power, industrial power, and home heating, is about 90 per cent dependent on fuel oil imports. His idea is to stop profiteering. He is sure there is plenty of oil in Texas. Wants to prevent Florida buyers from being gouged.  
**MONEY FOR FLORIDA**—The new budget is 1163 pages thick. But, in it are these Public Works items for Florida: Intracoastal Waterway, (East Coast) \$1,150,000.

St. Augustine Harbor, \$600,000. Tampa Harbor, \$2,250,000; Central and Southern Florida Flood Control, \$5,500,000.  
**PROFITABLE TRIP**—Here last week for help from Congress man Bob Sikes were Wallace Shelter, State Representative for Florida on the National Rural Electric Association and Leon Weaver, Manager of the Talquin Electric Cooperative, both of Quincy. When they left town they had a loan for \$1,450,000 to build 175 miles of additional distribution line in West Florida, bringing electric service to 1137 new consumers.  
**WHAT HAPPENED?** When the House committee assignments were finally made the name of Bill Cramer, Florida's lone Republican, turned up on two major committees. The only Republican in the House to be so placed. He's on Public Works and Judiciary. Looks like he is still the darling of the Republican party.  
**WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICT**—Congressman Jim Haley is behind a move to organize a new Flood Control District on Florida's West Coast. The area would cover the watersheds of four rivers which rise in Polk County; the Alafia, the Manatee, the Peace and the Myakka. First step is getting the Florida State

Legislature to setup the District. Haley says, then Federal aid can be sought.  
**YOU TOO, JUDGE**—Congressman Billy Matthews has asked the Congress to set up rules limiting the political activity of members of the Supreme Court. He thinks they shouldn't be permitted to run for public office within two years after leaving the Court and while they are still members they should be subject to the Hatch Act.  
**ROAD PLAN**—Three Florida Congressmen have banded together to get some additional road money. Their proposal would make the road from Tampa to Miami a part of the National Highway and Defense system. This would mean that Florida would get a bigger cut out of that 101 billion dollar road building fund. The three men working on it are: Congressmen Jim Haley, Dante Pascell, and Paul Rogers. Before it's over the whole delegation probably will be in on it.  
**MORE ENGINEERS**—Senator Smathers made national headlines with his proposal for training more scientists. He has introduced a bill that would give special scientific scholarships to children of veterans. The money would come from investing a part of the \$75 million worth of confiscated enemy pro-

## Espionage Conspiracy Brought Against Three

### FBI Makes Arrests

NEW YORK (AP)—FBI agents arrested three persons today on charges they conspired to commit espionage for the Soviet Union. One was arrested while planning to slip out of the country.

The Justice Department in Washington announced the arrests.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover identified those arrested as Jack Soble, 53; Myra Soble, 52; and Jacob Albam, 64. The oblates are married.

The FBI said investigation in the case dates back 13 years when the bureau began scrutinizing the activities of Yassili Zubilin, who reportedly once was a general in the NKVD, the Russian secret police. Zubilin, after serving as third secretary of the Soviet embassy in Washington, returned to Russia in 1944.

Soble, a naturalized citizen, long has been involved in Soviet intelligence activity, the FBI said, and at one time had other Soviet agents under his supervision in the United States.

Planned to Leave  
He was arrested as he was making plans to leave the country after previous attempts had been thwarted through his failure to obtain a passport, the FBI said.

Soble entered the United States in October 1941, under the name of Abramov Sobolevich. He had a visa issued in Kobe, Japan.

He became a naturalized American citizen in 1947 in New York City.

The FBI said he made frequent trips abroad until in recent years the State Department refused to give him a passport.

Soble's wife, whom he married in 1927, arrived in the United States from Japan a month before he did in 1941. She also became a naturalized citizen in New York in 1947.

Came Here in 1947  
Albam was placed in a labor force by the Germans in 1942 when they took over Lithuania. He entered the United States in 1947 on a visitor's visa.

He returned to Europe the next year and then reentered the country as the husband of an American citizen. He filed application (Continued on Page 9)

## Group To Study, Plan Combined County Drive

### Two Stratojets Collide In Flight; 3 Crewmen Found

HOMESTEAD (AP)—Two B-17 Stratojet bombers collided in flight south of Cuba Thursday night and three of the six missing crewmen were picked up on a raft today.

The Homestead Air Force Base reported a second raft was also spotted by search craft but it was not determined immediately if any survivors were aboard it.

Six men were aboard the two planes, three in each, and all had been listed as missing and presumed dead.

Maj. R. W. Bryant, public information officer, said the three survivors "seemed to be in good condition" according to reports he received from the Coast Guard. He said they were being taken to hospital for routine checkups, but he did not know where.

The planes, based at Homestead, collided in the air south of the Isle of Pines below Cuba. Each plane carried three crewmen.

All of the fliers had wives and children living off the base near Miami.

Rescue craft from the Air Force, Navy and Coast Guard converged early today on the crash area to begin the search for possible survivors.

With six organizations represented at last night's meeting held at the Sanford City Hall to discuss a proposed United Drive, a committee was formed to start studying a combined drive for Seminole County.

John Krider, Manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce headed the meeting last night as increasing interest was shown in the possibilities of reducing the number of solicitations for funds.

The Salvation Army, Red Cross, USO, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Mental Health Association and other organizations representatives attended last night's discussion meeting.

Only opposition to the combined United Fund drive came from the Seminole County Tuberculosis and Health Association and the Florida Heart Association. Representatives stated that they "could not participate."

Miss Sally Eastwood, Associate Director of the United Community Services in Orlando spoke at length on the problems of organizing.

Captain Robert W. Jackson told the group that the Sanford Naval Air Station Combined Charities Drive could not participate and contribute to local funds unless organizations were members of a

United Fund or some similar organized drive.

Local civic clubs were well represented at last night's meeting with the Rotary Club, Kiwanis Club, Pilot Club, Business and Professional Women, Seminole County Jaycees, Merchants Association, and Chamber of Commerce sending delegates to take part in the discussions.

Giving the history of United Chest drives, Miss Eastwood factually explained the organization, how they should meet their problems, and what should be expected.

"I urge that you consider being countywide," she said.

In answer to questions from both the Red Cross and Salvation Army, Miss Eastwood pointed out that each organization would set its own budget and make a contract. "There is an agreement signed," she said.

However, she pointed out "If you're going into this with a lot of enthusiasm it will be a success; if halfhearted, it won't."

Captain Jackson pointed out "The U. S. Government has emphasized the point that unless there is a United agency we cannot support them." "We won't be able to give a (Continued on Page 9)

## Countywide Planning, Zoning Looms In Sight

Countywide planning and zoning looms highly possible following a special meeting yesterday of the Board of Seminole County Commissioners to discuss with the County Zoning Commission the problems with which they are confronted.

Also present at the meeting were City Manager Warren E. Knowles and Planning and Zoning Board Chairman Bob Brown.

Knowles suggested the possibilities of a cooperative program of Planning and Zoning inasmuch as the problems of the City were the problems of the county as well as the problems of the County. "As the community grows," Knowles told the commissioners and the County Zoning Commission, "the fringe areas extend on into the county, so it is the concern of the City that proper planning and zoning become a program of the county."

"There is no telling where the growth will extend," he said.

County Zoning Commission chairman Raymond Ball said "The south end of the county is growing so fast now the county can't keep up with the expansion."

The problem mainly concerning the county now, as it was revealed at yesterday's meeting, surrounds the acquiring of proper legislation to allow countywide planning and zoning. Present legislation confines the county to an expenditure of \$6,000 a year and within 500 feet of highways and county roads.

The Seminole County Zoning Commission will now formulate a legislative bill, in cooperation with City Manager Warren E. Knowles, for presentation to the Board of County Commissioners and the legislative delegation.

City Manager Knowles appealed to the group to consider the possibilities of a cooperative program of planning and zoning.

Commander Lewis D. Tamny, USN, accompanied by his wife and their six children, arrived on board the Sanford Naval Air Station today where he will become Executive Officer upon relieving Commander J.
