School bus tips over in accident, students not hurt

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Two separate accidents in Altamonte Springs this morning sent to area hospitals a 17-year old girl, and the driver of a truck, who hit a school bus carrying handicapped students to Lake Mary High School.

Both accidents occurred at the corner of Jamestown and Montgomery Road at about 7 a.m. No one in the school bus was injured, police said.

The two Lake Mary High students in the bus were able to attend school today, according to Mike Nelson, spokesman for the Altamonte Springs police. The school bus flipped onto its side after being struck by a truck. The driver of the truck was taken to Florida Hospital with injuries that do not appear to be serious, police said.

In a separate accident, Carla

Logan, 17, who was the passenger the other truck struck at the intersection was airlifted to Orlando Regional Medical Center with head lacerations, police said.

Logan, who was the passenger in the truck that police said had the right-of-way on a green light, traveling south on Jamestown, is in stable condition, according to Joe Brown, hospital spokesman. The truck could not stop, as a car turned left on Jamestown from Montgomery Road, with a green light but not a green arrow.

Both accidents are still being investigated. Police had not released the names of anyone involved in the accident as of 10 a.m.

The intersection of Jamestown and Montgomery Roads was temporarily shut down while police and rescue workers attended to the accidents.

"That's a busy road," said Nelson of the four-lane Montgomery Road. "It's a dangerous intersection."

Audubon Society releases Kite

MAITLAND - A young Swallow-tailed Kite that was rescued and brought to the Audubon's Center for Birds of Prey last August has been released back to the wild.

The Kite, found off State Road 40 near Ormond Beach with a fractured wing, is the fourth Swallow-tailed Kite to be released by the Maitland Center, which also treats other birds of prey including eagles, hawks, owls and osprey.

The Kite was released last week on Lake Disston in Flagler County.

In Seminole County, Swallow-tailed Kites can be spotted in Wekiva State Park.

"One time I did see 15 at the park," Carol Gilliland, a certified veterinary technician with the Florida Audubon Society, said. "This is the time of year to see them, too."

The Kites reside in Florida from February through September, then leave for South America for the winter. Environmentalists said that while the injured kite's recovery was

swift, it was too late for the bird to join the rest of the communal flock to begin the 5,000-mile journey back to Brazil.

The Kite has been fitted with a Fish and Wildlife Service band.

Swallow-tailed Kited disperse north through Florida and to South Carolina where they breed in pair. Nesting occurs by the end of June and July. By August, the birds congregate in South Florida before migrating south in large numbers.

The bird grows to 22 to 24 inches in length with a wingspan reaching 50 inches. Its wings, rump, back and tail are black, while its head and underparts are white. There is an iridescent shoulder patch on the back side of the wing web, which is only visible from above.

The Swallow-tailed Kite, with its deeply-forked tail which grows almost twice as long as its body, is not well designed for captivity.

"These Kites are acrobatic and powerful in flight while chasing dragonflies and other

Museum makes National Register of Historic Places

SANFORD - Seminole County's "Old Folks Home" from 1926 to 1964 - now the Museum of Seminole County History - has made history one more time.

The pebble dash stucco building on Bush Boulevard is now listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

The Florida National Register Review Board notified the Seminole Historical Society and the County Board of Commissioners that it had unanimously recommended the listing.

This was just the news Museum Specialist Helen Jacobs wanted to hear. "We're doing everything we can to make the place more appealing for our guests," she said Thursday. "Being in the National Register is the ultimate honor."

Jacobs said that more than 1,500 people visited the museum in 1998, experiencing exhibits that depict the county's rich history - including all the data on the building itself.

"When the county began its Park House or Farm in 1926, as many as 36 of the indigent or disadvantaged lived in the building," she said. "There was a little garden, orange trees, pigs and cows and a chicken coop. A full-time superintendent also lived in the home."

Jacobs said that nurses and cooks worked at the home.

Rachel Lee, she said, was the most famous nurse who worked at the place - her name appearing frequently in the county's history.

"The building was the first to be erected on 62 acres of land at what became known as the Five-Points Complex. Jacobs said that a convict camp was soon located there, also. It sat on a lot that is now the Juvenile Assessment Center.

The "Old Folks Home" became an agriculture extension

facility in 1964, and the county museum in 1980. In the last two years, the county commission approved funds to restore the building. "We are extremely indebted to the commission," Jacobs said.

The museum is open Tuesday through Friday from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Jacobs said that efforts are being made to have volunteers show the museum on weekend beginning this fall.

School board unveils calendar

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Seminole County school board members Tuesday adopted 3-2 a school calendar without a fall break.

The week-long break was a residual perk which many teachers and some parents lobbied to keep in place, but a "late-as-possible start date" in August swung the vote in favor of Calendar "A."

Vice chairwoman Sandy Robinson and board member Jeanne Morris cast the two dissenting votes.

The calendar also allows for a teacher workday at the end of each 9-week period; Wednesday prior to Thanksgiving as a non-attendance day; a 2-week minimum Win-

ter vacation; a 2-week minimum Spring vacation; end of first semester prior to Winter break; and end the year as early as possible.

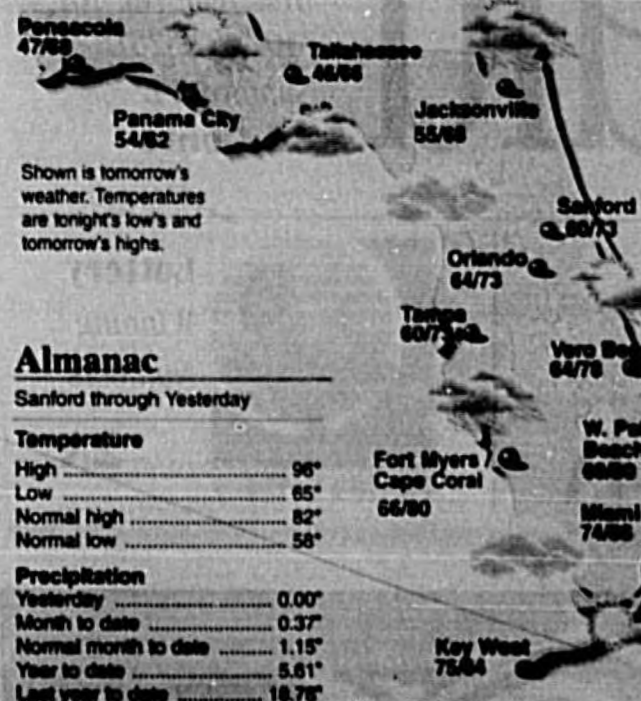
Under this plan, students will attend from Aug. 7 to May 30, 1999. Students will be out on various teacher and administrative workdays and for weekday holidays on (Sept. 29), Thanksgiving (Nov. 22-24), Winter Vacation (Dec. 21 - Jan. 5), Martin Luther King's Birthday (Jan. 15), President's Day (Feb. 19), Spring Break (Mar. 12-16) and Memorial Day (May 28). Students must attend school a total of 180 days.

In other business, the board approved unanimously the purchase of 28 new cars for \$359,772, from Don Reid. Please see Calendar, Page 3A

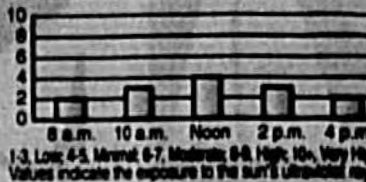

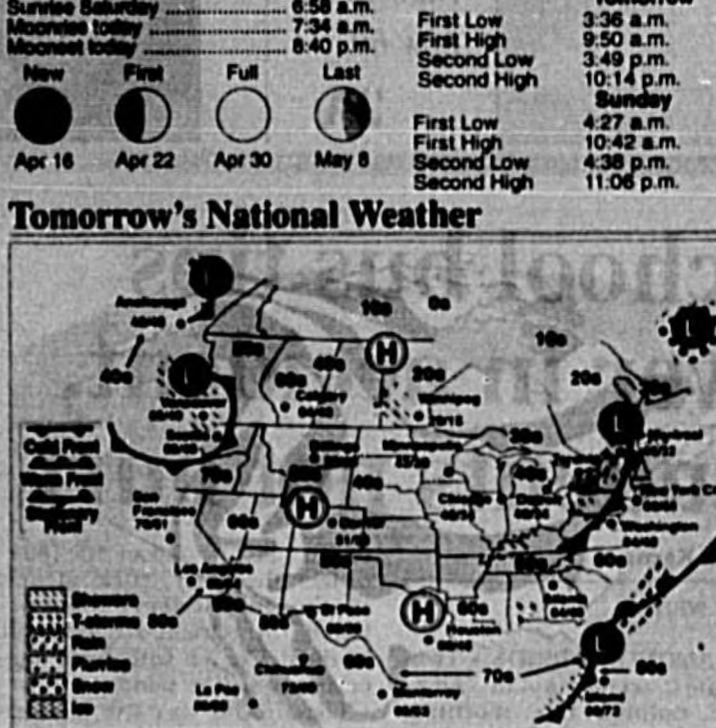

Ford for use in summertime driver's education programs.

The vehicles were traditionally used for an entire school year and then resold to the original dealer. As of this year, "driver's ed" is only taught in summer, which the district's director of purchasing, Don Nicholas, said, "made it difficult to strike a deal for a such a short time." The cars are bid to resell back to the dealer, costing the district \$850 each to use, or \$23,800.

"We have been working on receiving bids for six weeks now." Although they sent 27 Requests for Proposals, only

Don Reid Ford's fleet dealership responded.

The 28 1999 Ford Contour LX models will cost \$12,850 each to purchase, to be sold back to the dealer at \$12,000 each, for a total of \$336,000. The Fords are 2-liter, 4-cylinder, automatics with air conditioner, AM/FM radio, power windows, locks, brakes and steering, full wheel covers and body-side molding.

The board members did not approve, however, a proposal by Progressive Insurance to underwrite the purchase of 12 of the 28 cars, reducing the cost to the district by \$10,188.

prey," Reese Collins, Director of the Mattland Center and Vice President of Florida Audubon Society, said. "In captivity, their deeply forked tail is a challenge to maintain."

The Seminole Indians revered the Swallow-tailed Kite, calling the blue patch the window to the Creator, Collins said.

"Through this window, it is said, the creator views our world, and so these birds are thought to be messengers between the world above and the world below," Collins said.

In the United States, the principal threat to kites is the rapid loss of habitat.

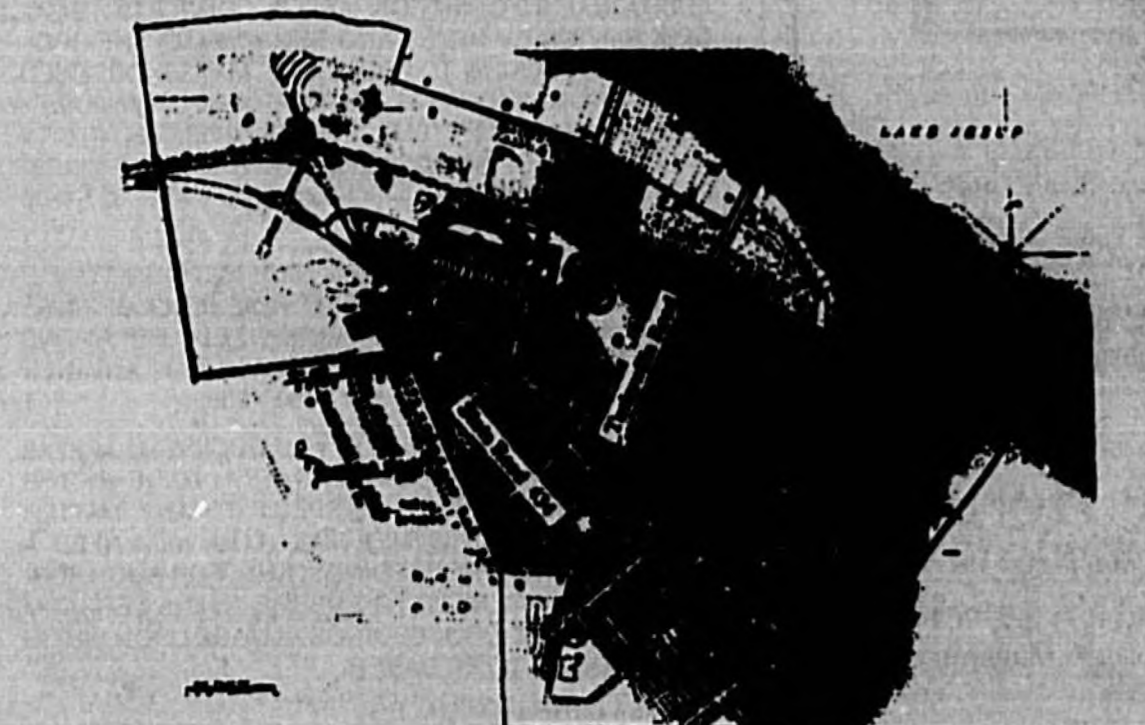
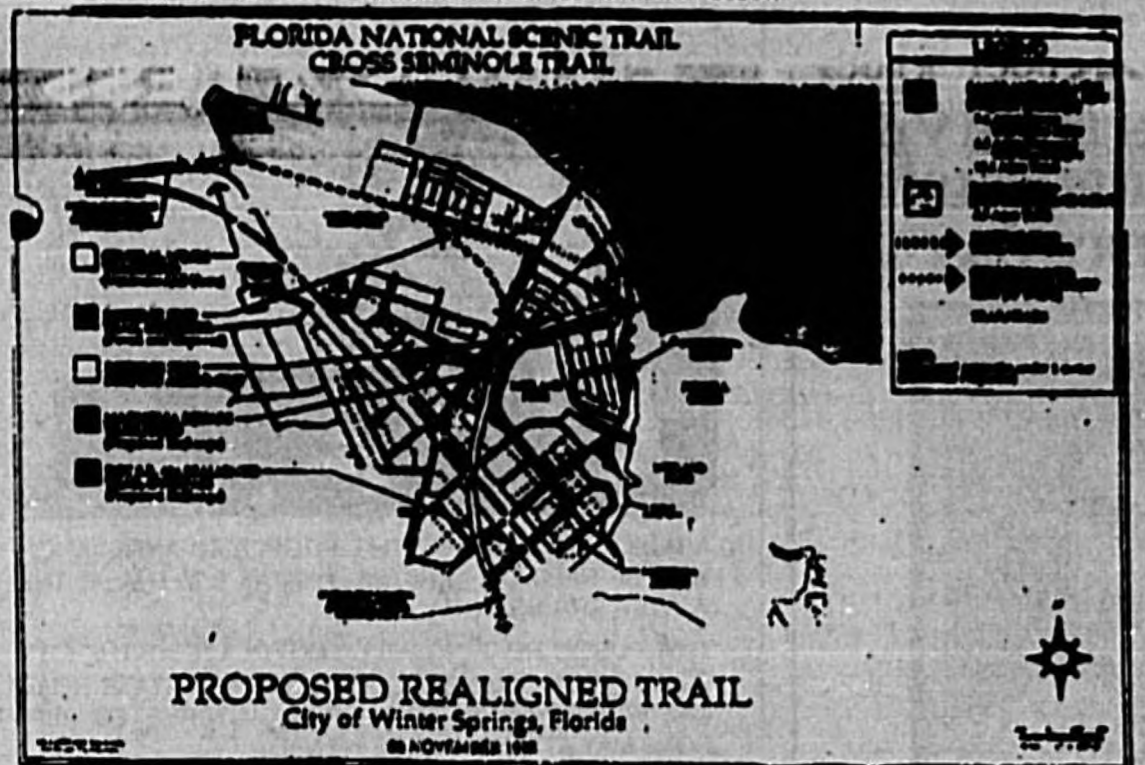

Lessons last a lifetime

Those were the days when a bad boy was a kid who carried matches in his pocket. Or skipped school.

That was Jack Donovan's weakness. Going to school was never on his list of "things to do." Consequently, he spent a lot of time in Miss Kerr's office.

Mary Kerr was our high school principal. Those of us who grew up under her stern and watchful eye developed a vivid sense of right and wrong - a sense of what was expected of us. If we did wrong - if we failed to live up to what was expected of us - we faced the prospect of ending up in Miss Kerr's office.

When that happened (and it happened to me once), it wasn't all that bad. But we left her office with a sense that the wrong we had done had not gone unnoticed and that it was not expected to continue.

Miss Kerr stood tall in our eyes. She was tall physically and tall in character, and standing in the shadow of her presence, we grew taller too.

If Jack Donovan didn't hold the record for most times called into Miss Kerr's office, he certainly was a leading contender for the honor. In the years since, I have often wondered whether we couldn't attribute at least part of Jack's success in later life to all those hours he was privileged to spend in Miss Kerr's company.

Strangely, Jack was never seen in her office in the spring, that season of school year when Huck Finn types could be counted on to lose their way to school. But spring was baseball season and Jack loved baseball. He was a star hitter and center fielder on the high school nine. If he wanted to play on the team, he had to have his eligibility card signed each week by his all his teachers. That meant showing up for class.

It was the only strategy ever devised by anybody to get Jack to go to school with any regularity.

Jack could win a popularity contest wherever he went. He charmed everybody - except my mother. Jack and I were best friends during our high school years but my mother would always tell me, "Don't hang around that Donovan boy. He'll never amount to anything."

Well, he grew up to be the mayor of the city where we lived and later was an executive with a big public utility while my mother's pride and joy grew up to be a humble newspaper reporter.

In later years, I would often remind my mother of that, and we would have a good laugh. I reminded her of it again the day when the word came out that Jack's happy heart had given out. We were both sad.

Jack and Miss Kerr had remained affectionate friends through the years. Their paths crossed often when they lived in the same city. He was an adult then and he ruled City Hall, but she was always "Miss Kerr" to him.

I still like to think of them - this delightful Peck's Bad Boy and the women of austere and regal dignity in the principal's office who was both his adversary and friend. When it was no longer necessary to be his adversary, she remained his devoted friend for life.

Sometimes we see things not by their true light but in contrast. On the way to the Easter Sunrise Service at Oaklawn Cemetery a couple of weeks ago I passed trees in their spring leafage. Once there, I passed by beautiful beds of flowers. But I did not see them clearly until the sun began to rise and I saw them in their true colors.

To fully appreciate the beauty of Easter, we need to see it in contrast with the ugliness of Good Friday and the mystery of Holy Saturday. On Good Friday (which comes from the Old English form of the word "God's Friday") we see all the horror that man's sin can produce. We see the political greed of the Pharisees

who feared the loss of their own status should a new Jewish king ascend to the throne of David. We see the cowardice and confusion of Pontius Pilate, who was afraid to take a stand for fear that the Pharisees would report him to his Roman superiors as a supporter of rebels and terrorists. We see the bloodlust of the crowds whose lives were so empty that a public execution had all the excitement of a modern sporting event. We see the pain of Jesus dying on the cross with all the human suffering that goes with it.

We don't know too much of what happened on Holy Saturday. We now that Jesus lay in the tomb, and back home his family and disciples attempted to adjust to the

death of one who only six days before had ridden triumphantly into Jerusalem. But we do know what happened on Easter Sunday.

The first day that happened was that Pilate's guards were frightened into a dead faint when they found that they were not alone at the tomb but in the presence of one of God's angels who not only rolled back the stone door from the tomb but sat on it! Then, the angel proclaimed the great truth to Jesus' mother and Mary Magdalene that Jesus, who was dead on Friday, was now alive on Sunday and would live forevermore.

What a contrast! From ugliness to beauty, from cowardice to victory, from death to life. The dead Jesus

was now the live Christ and would be forever and ever. God had triumphed over the grave.

Sometimes we fail to see the power of the living Christ. We cast about for solutions in the darkness of the tomb but find none because the stones of sin still cover the door which blocks our way to Christ.

What is sin? It's attempting to depend only on our own wits to find solutions, no matter how rational they seem to be. The Pharisees had a rational solution: eliminate the source of their problem. Pilate had a very rational solution to his problem: pass the responsibility for deciding Jesus' fate and Barabbas' fate on to the Pharisees and the mob. It made "perfect" sense but the were the wrong solutions. They were the rational solutions of men, not the spiritual solutions of God.

The stone cannot be rolled aside by our own efforts. It's too heavy and our sins sap our strength. But when we trust that God will open the door he sends his angels to reveal his

light to us. Not only is the stone rolled away, but his angels make sure it will not roll back. They sit on it.

The events of his times contributed to Jesus' death in the same way that those of our time contribute to our fear and confusion. But the message of Easter is that by practicing our faith in Him we realize that the events of history are overcome by the God whose controls these events and brings us to his gift of everlasting life.

Jesus is risen; He is risen indeed!

Prayer: O God, who is the same yesterday, today, and tomorrow, help us to recognize those sins which keep us from knowing the way to power found only in their Lord, Jesus Christ, and then to overcome them with that power. Amen.

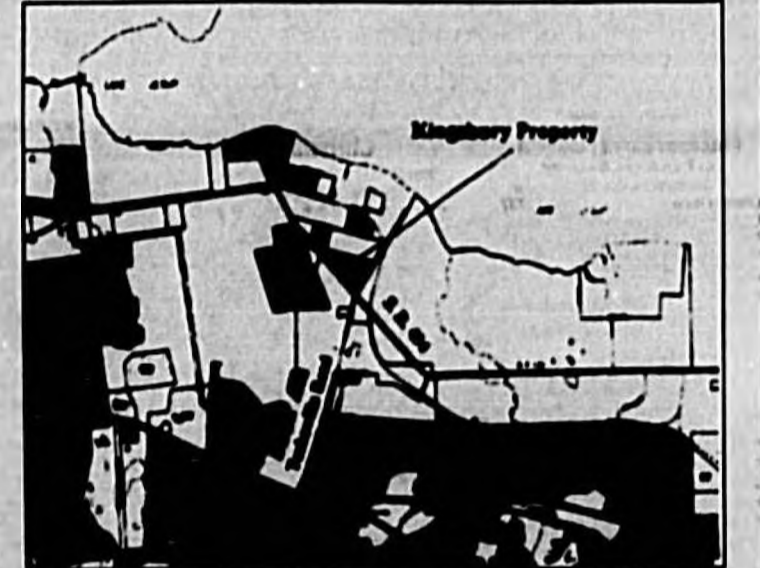

Twenty-one million baby-boom women will reach menopause in the next 10 years. They will be faced with options that were not necessarily available to their mothers: hormone replacement therapy, nutritional supplements, and strategies for letting nature take its own course.

Until the results of current studies are made available in the coming years, women who go through menopause will lack full information about the ultimate risks and benefits of hormone treatments.

Still, it is possible to design a sensible postmenopausal health-protection plan. First, have your doctor assess your risk for heart disease, osteoporosis and breast cancer. Then discuss your options. Whichever you select, realize that you can, and should, reassess your decision as the years pass.

The decision for or against taking estrogen is more problematic than before. For years, research suggested that hormone replacement therapy protected against heart disease, the top killer of elderly women, but that it



promoted breast cancer. Recent studies showed different results.

All of this has left medical types scratching their heads. But there is currently a study in progress, the Women's Health Initiative, that will show the results of long-term effects of replacement hormones on 27,000 healthy postmenopausal women. However, results won't be in until at least 2005.

For now, women and their doctors must decide what to do based on less complete information. To help provide women with a road map through menopause and beyond, we pored over the research and offer the following suggestions:

— Hormones at first. Most women can safely take hormones to relieve temporary symptoms like hot flashes. The added risk of breast cancer is minimal when hormones are taken for a year or two. If you decide to stop taking hormones, your doctor should cut the dosage gradually — stopping cold turkey will itself trigger hot flashes.

Be aware, though, that once you stop taking hormones, the protection they give your bones and heart declines and eventually disappears.

— Hormones for life. For most healthy women, it is safe to start taking hormones immediately after menopause and continue indefinitely. The exceptions: women at high risk for breast cancer or blood clots. All women who make this choice should examine their breasts, and have mammograms and checkups regularly.

— Hormones only in old age. Studies have shown that it is never too late to start on hormones; they can benefit bone and cholesterol at age 75 as they do at age 55. In fact, there may be more point in taking them when you

are older. The average age for a first heart attack in women is 74; for hip fracture, about 80.

Therefore, some doctors are recommending that healthy women take hormones for symptom relief in their early 50s, if needed, then stop. During the years that follow, women should be checked regularly for osteoporosis and unhealthy cholesterol levels. When women are 65 or so, they can resume taking hormones and have protection by the age when they need it most, without running the risk of breast cancer.

— No hormones. Some women, especially those at low risk for heart or bone disease, don't feel a need to take drugs to treat what is, after all, a normal stage of life. There are many ways to prevent disease besides hormone therapy — for example, stopping smoking, eating a healthy diet, and being physically active. Together, exercise and quitting smoking have more impact than estrogen on fractures and heart disease.

WIN AT BRIDGE

Stick to the book

By Phillip Alder

If you stick to textbook bids and play, I guesstimate you will get some 80 percent of deals correct. However, some players — even experts — try to be clever, and end up losing tricks they should have won.

That applies to this deal, but the declarer still had to read the cards well. Sitting West, what would you lead against three no-trump?

This layout arose during the match between France and Sweden at the 1995 European Championships, held in Vilamoura, Portugal.

The French North declared one no-trump, winning exactly seven tricks.

At the other table, Mats Niland for Sweden opened with one no-trump, showing 14-16 points. His partner, Bjorn Fallenius, jumped straight to game. Now the French West got overty

imaginative. You or I would have selected the diamond nine, surely defeating the contract. However, West wanted to lead a major because North hadn't used Stayman. So, he chose the bizarre-looking heart six.

Declarer did well, calling for dummy's queen. East would have done better to duck, retaining communication with his partner, but he covered with the king. After winning the third round of hearts in hand, Niland successfully finessed the club 10. West won the next club lead with his ace and exited with a club.

As West hadn't cashed the 13th heart, it was clear he had led from a three-card suit. So, he had surely begun with 3-3-4-3 distribution. (With 4-3-3-3, he would have led a spade.) So, Niland continued with the ace, king and another spade. This established nine hard-earned tricks from three spades, one heart, two diamonds and three clubs.

ASK DR. GOTT

Is repeated cardioversion needed?

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 66-year-old man with atrial fibrillation. I take Coumadin, atenolol, Altace and lanoxin. I have had electrical cardioversion twice, with no success. Now my cardiologist wants to "zap" me a third time. I feel perfectly normal and would like to avoid the procedure, because I've read that this treatment does not lead to improvement in heart function if the fibrillation has been present for years, as mine has. Your thoughts?

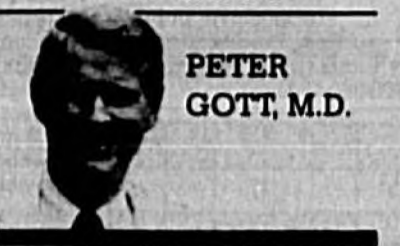
DEAR READER: Atrial fibrillation is an erratic heartbeat. Usually, this produces no symptoms or health consequences, unless the pulse is very rapid. Atrial fibrillation is often associated with thyroid problems, heart disease and disorders of the cardiac valves. However, in many patients, no cause can be discovered.

People with fibrillation are at higher risk for stroke. This is the reason your cardiologist has prescribed Coumadin to prevent blood clots — also, the atenolol and lanoxin should maintain your pulse in the normal range (60 to 100 beats per minute). I'm not sure of the role Altace is playing.

Now, to the issue of cardioversion. During this procedure, which is per-

formed under general anesthesia, a DC countershock is delivered to your heart through paddles placed on your chest. If the technique is successful, the heart momentarily stops beating, and then resumes contracting in a regular fashion. Unfortunately, this normal beat often degenerates back into fibrillation hours or days later.

So far, you have had two cardioversions. I do not believe that you need a third.

To begin with, another procedure may not produce long-lasting effects. What then? Do you undergo a fourth, fifth or sixth cardioversion? This seems excessive to me.

risk must be factored into the equation.

Third, the medicines you are taking appear to have the problem of stroke and rapid pulse under control. You feel well, and no untoward consequences have appeared. Why rock the boat?

Last, as you stated, chronic atrial fibrillation does not affect either health or longevity — you're 66 and, with proper medical management, should have many more years of productive, independent living. Therefore, I agree with your preference. Were I in your shoes, I'd forego the procedure and continue the medication.

In all fairness, I should acknowledge that I am neither your doctor nor a cardiologist. Consequently, you should discuss your decision with your various doctors. Nonetheless, based on the "generic" information you supplied, I feel confident in recommending a less aggressive approach.
