Senators Predict No New Tax Levy Before Election

Possible Adverse Decision On AAA May Not Alter Position

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Some congressional leaders expressed the opinion today that the administration may not ask for new taxes next session even if the Supreme Court declares the Adminstration indicated some time ago that new taxes would be sought if the AAA were defeated, and that treasury experts will be prepared to suggest plans for raising the \$500,000,000 estimated needed to pay farmers under existing production control contracts.

But several senators, including McElroy of Oregon, Republican

leader, and Democrats who would not be quoted by name, said they would wager a new tax bill will be avoided, at least until after the 1936 elections. Experts said only two ways are left to raise half a billion—general sales tax and higher levies on small incomes. Both are unpopular.
