Pretty Things for the Housewife

Dresser Set of Embroidered Linen



Heavy white linen for cotton in certain weaves embroidered with light colored floss make simple and elegant dresser sets that will delight the heart of the neat housewife. These sets consist of dresser scarf and pincushion cover usually, but glove and handkerchief cases may be made to match and added to them.

The scarf is a length of the linen having scalloped edges buttonhole stitched with light colored floss. A scroll and flower pattern is embroidered at each end and at the center of the scarf, on one side.

A small oblong pincushion is covered with two pieces of linen, one smaller than the other, as shown in the picture. These are buttonholes stitched in scalloped about the edges and extend are worked in them. A scroll and flower pattern is embroidered in the smaller piece. They are joined by narrow satin ribbon threaded through the eyelets and tied in little bows.

BRICK ROADS MADE OVER IN SEMINOLE

NEW BRICK ARE BEING SHIPPED BY THE MANUFACTURERS TO MAKE GOOD

The bricks for the rejuvenation of the Seminole county roads are being shipped here and hauled out to the various sections of the main roads and wherever the brick are bad and the road needs relaying, which is considerable the new bricks will be laid.

Hankinson & Hagler, the contractors and manufacturers of the paving bricks are under an indemnity bond of \$75,000 to make good all the bricks that have gone to pieces on the roads and they will also have to keep the roads in condition for a period of five years which will be a sufficient test of the wearing qualities of the new brick.
