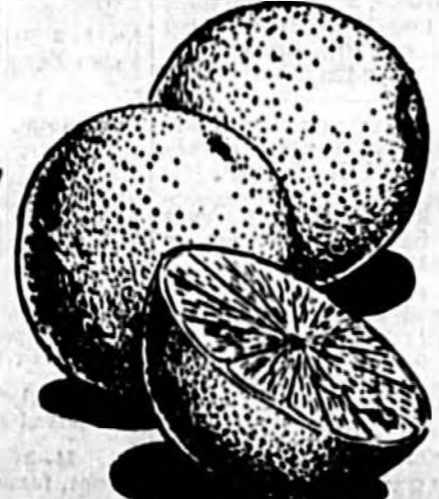

Russ Shot Down Plane With 17, U. S. Charges

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States charged today that Russian fighters deliberately shot down an unarmed American transport last September.

It added, in effect, that Soviet Deputy Premier Anastas I. Mikoyan lied about the incident during his recent visit here.

The State Department released a batch of transcripts, photographs and documents to back up its charge that the plane, which crashed in flames over Soviet Armenia on Sept. 2, was shot down deliberately.

They included what the department described as the transcript of an intercepted radio conversation among the Soviet fighter pilots as they shot down the four-engine plane and watched it crash in flames.

Also released were photographs and translations of two articles from Soviet Aviation, the official Russian air force newspaper, describing the "attack" on the "enemy" and identifying four Russian fighter pilots who took part.

One of the articles reported that an unidentified Soviet general met the pilots after the attack and "shook their hands warmly and thanked them for their successful execution of the mission."

Previous reports had said the unarmed American plane, with 17

men aboard, had crashed after it was intercepted by Soviet fighters near the Turkish-Soviet border and escorted into Soviet Armenia. The Russians had acknowledged finding the wreckage, but had denied that the plane was shot down.

Later, the Russians turned over six bodies to American authorities and said they had no information about the other 11 men who were aboard.

Four Seminole County officials plan to ask the State Legislature for a \$2,400 annual raise.

According to the annual financial report, released in The Herald last Friday, each of the four now draw a salary of \$9,000.

The legal notice, signed by all four, says "Notice is hereby given that we, the undersigned county officials of Seminole County, intend to apply to the 1959 session of the Legislature of the State of Florida for the passage of a local act providing for the undersigned county officials to be allowed maximum compensation of \$11,400 per annum for our official duties, and said act providing for an effective and retroactive date."

The notice did not say what proposed retroactive date the proposed bill will ask.

Passage of the measure would require action of the three members of the local legislative delegation, Sen. Doug Stenstrom and Reps. Mack Cleveland Jr. and Gordon Frederick.

Ike Asks Stronger 'Mixing' Law

Mayfair Reports Theft Of \$18,000 In Jewelry

Two robberies within three hours netted thieves an estimated \$18,000 in jewelry and furs at the Mayfair Inn yesterday.

Police first were summoned to the hotel at 4:30 p. m. when Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Knapp discovered a trunk in their room had been pried open.

At 7:00 p. m., Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Lichtenstein, also guests of the hotel, reported the theft of a large quantity of jewelry from a green leather box on their dresser.

Value of the Knapp's possessions was set at a total of \$3,000, including a dark mink stole valued at \$800. Jewelry stolen included rings, pearl necklaces and bracelets, in three boxes. The lock was picked on the wardrobe trunk, and the drawer containing the jewelry pried open.

Mr. and Mrs. Lichtenstein estimated the value of jewelry stolen at \$15,000. The list included a diamond wedding band with baguette, a five and one-half karat emerald cut diamond ring, a gold wristwatch with diamonds, and other bracelets, pins and earrings set with precious stones.

Frank Mebane Jr., manager of the hotel, reported the thefts to local police. Complete descriptions of jewelry and furs have been given to the Sheriff's Department and the Orlando Police Department.

Another jewel theft had been reported earlier in the day at the Mt. Plymouth hotel, a scant 15 miles away. Lt. Joe Hickson of the Sanford Police has been assigned to the case.

5 Americans Freed By East Germany

HEIDELBERG, Germany (UPI)—Five American soldiers held by the East German Communists were released today.

U. S. Army in Europe headquarters announced the men were turned over to American officials near Herzshagen. Their release was arranged by the American and East German Red Cross organizations, an Army spokesman said.

Men released are Lt. Richard Mackin, of Washington, D. C.; 804 Kenneth G. Carlson, of San Leandro, Calif.; Pvt. Elwyn E. Bell, of Hill City, Kan.; and Pvt. James W. Hayes, of Baltimore, Md.

The fifth was believed to be Pvt. Melvin Hampton, of the 6th Infantry unit in Berlin.

Release of the Americans was negotiated by Robert Wilson, director of the American Red Cross in Europe, in talks with Ludwig Werner, president of the East German Red Cross.

The Red Cross organizations were asked to negotiate because the United States does not recognize the Communist East German government and will not deal with it.

Man, 94, Requests 'Speedy' Divorce

Graves, who rented the laundry at the Naval Air Station, was treated at the dispensary and released.

Charged with failure to have his vehicle under control was Ronald Wimpey, 32, also of DeLand. Graves' automobile was knocked across the intersection by the blow.

Combined damages were estimated at \$600 by Sgt. Leo Rock of the Sanford Police. The accident occurred at 8:22 a. m.

Sen. Cross Blasts Parent 'Option' As 'Just Subterfuge'

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—State Sen. J. Emory Cross of Gainesville has attacked the parent option plan for preventing school integration in Florida.

Although most legislators have endorsed the plan, Cross declared Wednesday that the plan wouldn't work.

He called it a "subterfuge" and said the only way to make sure that segregation is maintained is to close the schools.

Anybody who says otherwise is fooling the people, he said.

The plan was advanced by Atty. Gen. Richard Erwin and School Supt. Thomas D. Batley, and is being mailed to all legislators to try to line up their support before the 1959 session convenes.

In general, the plan would permit parents to withdraw their children from an integrated school and receive a state subsidy of about \$240 a year to educate him privately.

Sen. Doyle E. Carlton, Wauchope, H. H. Hair of Live Oak, and S. C. Clark of Monticello, said they would vote for the plan. But Carlton and Rep. W. C. Herrell of Dale said they would insist that no state subsidy be paid directly to the parent.

Cross protested, however, that the "question is not closed or open schools."

"It is integration or segregation and if we want segregation, we must have the courage to fight for it."

"I would rather have a generation of uneducated, courageous, moral people than a generation of educated, morally-degenerated cowards."

Nikita Denounces, Invites President

MOSCOW (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today invited President Eisenhower to Moscow as a step toward bringing the two nations together and ending the threat of nuclear war.

Khrushchev extended the invitation in a speech in which he also denounced Eisenhower and his administration for ignoring the "thaw" in the East-West cold war.

"Should the President decide to come to our country he would be met with sincere hospitality by our government and the Soviet people."

"A visit of this kind would undoubtedly be useful to both countries and would meet with the approval of the peoples of the U. S. A. and the Soviet Union," Khrushchev said in the speech before the 21st congress of the Soviet Communist Party.

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Seven-Point Plan Given To Congress

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower asked Congress today in a seven-point civil rights program for stronger federal power to punish anyone using threats or violence to obstruct court-ordered school integration.

His program, designed to make "equal protection of laws... a reality for all," also would authorize temporary aid to states and localities cooperating in carrying out school integration.

It would allow the Federal Bureau of Investigation to crack down harder in school and church bombing cases.

In urging that school integration be made a federal offense, Eisenhower said: "There have been instances where extremists have attempted by mob violence and other concerted threats of violence to obstruct the accomplishment of the objectives in school desegregation."

He said present provisions for punishing obstruction and contempt aren't strong enough.

The President asked:

1. Legislation to make force or threats of force to obstruct court orders in school desegregation cases a federal offense.
2. Greater authority for the FBI in investigating destruction of schools or churches.
3. Power for the attorney general to inspect federal election records and to require that such records be maintained "for a reasonable period of time."
4. "A temporary program of financial and technical aid to state and local agencies to assist them in making the necessary adjustments required by school desegregation decisions."
5. Legislation to authorize temporary provisions for educating children of military personnel when public schools are closed because of integration orders.
6. That Congress consider setting up a permanent "commission on equal job opportunity under government contracts."
7. A two-year extension of the Civil Rights Commission.

Vanguard To Spin For 2,000 Years

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Navy's 325-pound Vanguard satellite will spin around the earth for 2,000 years, instead of the some 200 years previously forecast.

Rear Adm. John T. Hayward, Navy research chief, predicted the greatly increased life span for the grapefruit-sized satellite in testimony Wednesday before the House Space Committee. He gave no reason for the increase.

Tampa Is Chosen By Big Industry

SAVANNAH (UPI)—Southern Nitrogen Co. Inc. has announced plans to construct a new three-million dollar plant in Tampa.

When completed, the plant will employ about 100 persons and will have a payroll of \$500,000 a year. It will be located on a 25-acre tract about six miles east of downtown Tampa.

Legislators Seek Answer To Mixing

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI)—Gov. J. Lindsay Almond, with the prospect of court-ordered school integration hanging over a third city, assigned the task of finding new ways to maintain segregation today to a 40-member legislative commission.

"It is my fervent, fervent hope that working together we can evolve a solution which will be to the best interests of Virginia and all her people," Almond said.

Wind-Fed Fires Raze 50 County Acres

Three raging forest fires destroyed an estimated 50 acres of Seminole County timber yesterday.

Whipped by high winds, small blazes turned woods into an inferno within minutes. Winds were steady at 30-40 miles per hour, Forest Service crews said.

The first fire was discovered at 4 p. m. on the Country Club Road at New Upsale. Rangers said that the fire was burning faster than suppression crews could operate.

Two Forest Service crews, the Lake Mary Volunteer Fire Department and one landowner crew were able to bring the blaze under control.

Carl McWhorter directed the landowner crew.

The fire, which was slowed by a small creek and a pasture, was caused by careless brush burning, Rangers said.

Residents in the Lake Jessup area were alarmed last night when the skies turned red with flames and smoke, as a huge fire began to rage shortly after 6 p. m.

Acreage behind the residence of George Mickey was turned to ash as flames climbed into large pines and oaks. Rangers dug a trench around the Mickey house, and

brought the fire under control around 9 p. m. Sparks and flames were blown several hundred feet into the air as the high winds continued.

Forest Service crews also answered a call at the Wekiva River, just south of Highway 46, at the same time, where they suppressed a fast-moving brush fire. Three crews were sent to the Lake Jessup area. The fire was stopped at the Sanford Ave. extension.

County Ranger Bob Gray said this morning that cooperation from residents "is mandatory in preventing this wasteful destruction."

this year, new taxes or increases in present levies are possible or probable and in some cases certain.

In almost all states where governors have submitted budgets for the coming fiscal year or biennium, their budgets are higher than the last ones and many are at all-time highs. The same upward trend is expected in those still to come. An exception is Kansas.

Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York and Edmund G. Brown of California — the new governors of the two biggest states — each has given his Legislature a record budget in excess of two billion dollars for the next fiscal year.

Rockefeller's included a fat tax package to raise \$277,000,000 and Brown asked for tax increases totaling \$236,000,000.

In Michigan, Gov. G. Mennen Williams is beset by a financial crisis so severe that state universities were borrowing from banks, which have now shut off further credit. He has asked for 140 million dollars a year of new revenue. Michigan expects to have a deficit of 110 million dollars by July 1.

The Indiana Legislature received its first billion dollar budget this year for the coming biennium but it can be handled with no new tax increases on top of those enacted two years ago. Virginia moved into the billion dollar budget class last year.

In New Jersey, Gov. Robert B. Meyner also presented a record budget but said it could be balanced without a tax increase.

Illinois and Pennsylvania legislators will receive budgets in the neighborhood of two billion dollars for the next biennium. Both are expected to include proposals to increase the take from state sales taxes. Gov. David L. Lawrence of Pennsylvania thinks his state will need about 400 million dollars in new revenue for the two-year period.

New or increased state income taxes, higher and/or broader sales taxes and increased excises on liquor and tobacco are the most widely proposed measures for raising new revenue. Like the federal government, 10

states already withhold income taxes from paychecks. Rockefeller's and Williams' tax programs call for withholding taxes in New York and Michigan. The same proposals are getting attention in Minnesota and Massachusetts where the Legislatures have rejected them in past years, and in North Carolina and South Carolina.

Massachusetts is in trouble too with a 33 million dollar deficit expected this fiscal year. Gov. Foster Furcolo wants a withholding system to collect state income taxes and a new but limited sales tax of 3 per cent.

Other states where new or revised sales taxes in some form are getting attention include Arizona, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio,

Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Vermont and Washington. Some Minnesota legislators want to levy a sales tax, but Gov. Orville L. Freeman wants to raise income taxes and excises on liquor and tobacco.

Maryland taxpayers got their bad news last year — a double dose of it. The state income tax was increased by 50 per cent, effective in 1954, and the sales tax was jumped from 2 per cent to 3 per cent, effective this January 1.

Other states in which changes in income taxes are being considered include Alabama, Colorado, Idaho, South Carolina and Wisconsin. A new income tax may be proposed in Rhode Island, which now has a sales tax.

Green To Have Voice In Assessment Level

The assessment level of Seminole County property apparently will be set in accordance with the state's wishes. Mrs. Mary Earle Walker, tax assessor, yesterday said that she had agreed to make no commitments on assessments until after she had conferred with State Comptroller Ray Green. She said Green had requested that she make no statements on assessment levels until after "planned conferences."

Mrs. Walker said further that the conferences with Green will be held as soon as "sufficient facts are available" from the current reappraisal program, being conducted by Dowling & Co.

The tax assessor said she planned to attend the Feb. 12 meeting with the County Commission and the School Board. John Krider, Commission chairman, said the meeting had been called to discuss assessments.

Just what effect Mrs. Walker's statements will have on the proposed meeting remains to be seen. After adopting a resolution asking for a 75 per cent level in assessments at its Tuesday meeting, it is reasonable to assume that the Commission might ask Mrs. Walker for an answer to this proposal.

It has been made clear that Gov. LeRoy Collins and Green plan to have a great deal to say about property assessments, if the assessments are too low. This was emphasized in statements and by adoption of a tax manual.

Green told The Herald that the goal of the current drive is uniform assessment in all Florida counties. Assessment levels now range from 25 per cent in many to 100 per cent in Palm Beach County. Officials, therefore, have tough sledding ahead, unless tax assessors over the state are to be told what assessment level to set.

The higher the assessment level, the more property which will be included on tax rolls. Conversely, the higher the assessment level, the lower the millage (actual tax rate).

The constitution requires that the assessment level be 100 per cent of "full cash value." Only one of Florida's 67 counties complies, however.

Since Green requested that no assessment level be set until he gave his views on the matter, he has the next move.

Examples Of Service

Washington See-Saw

HOW TO CHOOSE? — Since the memory of such things, it has been a rule that entrance to West Point or Annapolis has been by Congressional appointment. Then came the new Air Force Academy. The Air Force set up rules of its own. The members of Congress could recommend a given number of applicants, but the final selection was to be made by the Air Force. This system has proved to be more democratic and has given many men with ability, but without political friends, an opportunity to enter the Academy. After watching the Air Force system work for the past several years, West Point and Annapolis are trying to break the old tradition. They are trying to talk the Congressmen into giving up their right to make the final appointments. Instead, the Army and Navy would like the Congressmen to present a list of eligible men and let the military make the final selection.

The idea has much merit, but when the suggestion hit the desk of Florida's Congressman Dante Fascell, it hit an immovable rock. And for good reason. As we have written in earlier stories, Fascell set up his own system of selective appointments when he came to Congress and he feels his plan is better than that proposed by the heads of the Army and Navy Academies. Fascell's selections are made by a board of local citizens who screen, examine, interview and otherwise study each candidate. Fascell has always followed their recommendations.

To show how well his group of citizens function, Fascell points out that last year when this local selection board recommended one principal applicant and five alternates, the men rated so highly that all were eventually chosen for the Naval Academy. Fascell has written to Lt. Gen. Garrison H. Davidson, Superintendent of West Point, and suggested that his plan be set up Nation-wide.

Any change of this kind will be slow taking place. Although some Congressmen consider the appointment of cadets a bother and a nuisance, others guard this privilege carefully and will be stubborn about giving it up. Also, even though Fascell might have the best system in the world for selecting young men, you can be sure that the Army and the Navy will be so proud of their own methods that they are not likely to give in to somebody else's way of thinking.

Too Late To Classify

While I might have a personal preference or two that which appeals to me might not interest the other fellow in the least. So many things enter into it that nobody in his right mind would attempt to point out any spot and call it "best."

My advice to anyone interested in locating here is to urge them to visit the state and look over all sections. We all have varied likes and dislikes. Some folks want a home on or near the water, others prefer inland locations.

Large metropolitan cities appeal to some folks while others would prefer a quiet country or farm. Those who enjoy the bright lights, the hustle and bustle of the big city, dog and horse racing, and similar activities wouldn't be happy stuck off in the backwoods.

If I were considering locating a permanent home somewhere I would want to know about the civic, social, and political life of the community. What kind of neighbors would I have, what about churches, schools, civic improvements and so on.

I wouldn't be swayed too much by literature received from real estate promoters or chambers of

commerce. They deal more or less in generalities. The best way to learn all about a community is to spend some time there and get acquainted with it first hand.

If this is not possible the next best thing is to subscribe to the local newspaper and study it from day to day or week to week. You can depend on the local paper to give you a true picture of everyday life as you would experience it if you were actually living in the town.

The local paper takes you to the churches and civic clubs, acquaints you with the actions of the city and county officials. Through it you meet the butcher, the baker and candlestick maker as well as the beggar and thief. It reflects the good and the bad. Read any local newspaper for six months or more and you will have the clearest picture of any community it is possible to obtain for it takes you everywhere from the parks and playgrounds to the police court and the slums.

It pictures the outstanding advantages of the community, explains its lack and need, predicts its future and faithfully reflects the thinking and activities of its citizens.

Washington Calling

WASHINGTON — Behind a great deal of loudly dramatic and undeniably important maneuvering over Senate filibuster rules and so on, the opposing forces are marshaling for the quiet, real, "gut" battle of the new Congress.

This is the battle of the budget. It is dull, yes; but it is the payoff. President Eisenhower is represented as determined to hold Federal spending for the new fiscal year, which opens next July 1, to around \$77,000,000,000. This is a figure of conservatism—and even of retrenchment. It reflects the President's sharp turn, late in his Administration, toward the old-fashioned rather than the liberal Republican view he used to lead.

As is usually so in the bread-and-butter issues, the coming struggle is bipartisan rather than strictly between the two parties. The greatest single force on the President's side — if he goes through with his resolve to hold down Federal spending — will be the powerful right-wing Virginia Democrat, Senator Harry Flood Byrd. Byrd has the great virtue of really meaning it when he clamors for economizing.

Those who will contest with the President, on this that or the other item of spending, are more numerous than those who will totally defend his budget. The anti-budget group will include a probable majority of the Democrats in both Houses and practically all the liberal or modern Republicans.

But, though the higher-budget forces have more people, the President and his backers have much more power — if they will seize it and use it. Congress, by the Constitution of course, puts on the taxes and controls the size of the appropriations. Nevertheless, any administration, any time, can always refuse to spend, even if Congress has made all provisions for spending. What is the outlook, then?

Perhaps even more importantly, a true Herbert Hoover Republican, Lewis Strauss, has ascended to the Cabinet since the last Congress. Mr. Strauss left the chairmanship of the Atomic Energy Commission to become Secretary of Commerce. He succeeded Sinclair Weeks of Massachusetts who, though certainly no burning liberal, was neither so able nor so determined an economist as Strauss.

Indeed, Strauss — an old and unapologetic associate of Mr. Hoover and the first absolutely authentic "Hoover man" to enter the Eisenhower Administration at the top — may become the determining factor in the whole affair.

He has not come into the Cabinet merely to "get along." He is quite rich enough not to have to keep any job. And he has a passionate belief in fiscal solidity — however outdated many may believe this concept to be. In short, his influence will be cast, always and without a tremor, toward holding the line.

It would be an odd irony if this old Hoover admirer — the trusted friend of the late Senator Robert A. Taft, Mr. Eisenhower's great rival for the 1952 Presidential nomination — should more nearly than any other personify the Eisenhower Administration in this, its last phase.

No firm answer can possibly be given at this stage, because the decisive factor will be simply the factor of Presidential determination and Presidential will to fight.

Trojans Fret, Seek Lifting Of Penalty

 LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The University of Southern California walked a tight-rope today with a stricter policy on recruitment of student athletes but fretted under NCAA penalties and hoped for a partial pardon.

The university, hamstrung in its quest for national honors because of NCAA sanctions, said in effect, "Look, what a good boy am I!" But at the same time asserted it was never a really bad boy.

Two paid Trojan recruiters were wrist-slapped for recruiting NCAA wrath with over-zealous approaches to two football prospects in the East, the SC alumni organization was requested to refrain from contacting prospective

student athletes, and the university administration in regard to student affairs including athletics was "reorganized."

Asks Ban Be Lifted

These developments were announced at a press conference Wednesday by SC President Dr. Norman Topping who said he would present a formal appeal for alleviation of penalties to the NCAA Executive Committee meeting in April.

Dr. Topping said he hoped the NCAA would lift a ban on participation by Trojan athletes in national championship events for one year and would allow strong SC teams in tennis (led by Davis Cupper Alex Olmedo), baseball and track and field to compete for national honors.

Topping also said he hoped that

the expiration date of this ban, Jan. 1, 1950, would be pulled back to the first of the year so that the Trojan football team could become eligible to compete in the New Year's Day Rose Bowl game.

Topping appeared uninterested in alleviation of other NCAA penalties such as ban on appearance of any Trojan athletes in NCAA-sponsored televised events and financial receipts thereof. This penalty was set at two years.

Recruiters Reprimanded

Topping went on to say Al Davis, an assistant football coach, and Nick Pappas, alumni field secretary, "have been reprimanded, placed on probation, and taken out of all recruitment activities. Other assignments in the university will be offered them so their loyal interest and energies can be utilized."

Pappas and Davis, both former Trojan football players, later issued statements saying they felt they had "not committed any violations of the NCAA code." Davis will revert to his status as strictly a football coach and Pappas will be offered a job in the university administration, the nature of which Topping declined to disclose.

The administrative reorganization Topping spoke of, will be headed by Francis Tappan, a football end in the Howard Jones era of the 1930s, who will become a university vice president July 1. He will oversee all student activities including the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics and relations with the alumni, apparently relegated to a back seat in recruitment of athletes.

Lee, who could not be located for comment yesterday, said there was no community estate which had accumulated the five years they were married because of "extremely large" living expenses. Miss Lamarr is now living at Beverly Hills, Calif. "For a period of many months prior to the time that defendant separated from plaintiff, she was guilty of such excesses, cruel treatment and outrages as to seriously affect and endanger plaintiff's health and to render living together insupportable," the petition said. Miss Lamarr filed a federal suit against Lee Jan. 21, complaining that she virtually was without funds and charging Lee failed to comply with a separation agreement they signed. She asked for \$31,000 damages from her estranged husband.

'Rights' Testimony Taken Under Study

NEW YORK (UPI)—The U.S. Commission on civil rights took under consideration today reports of testimony on racial discrimination in housing presented by more than 25 witnesses at a two-day hearing in New York. Acting chairman of the commission, the Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, president of Notre Dame University, said the housing situation is a national problem which must be solved on a national basis. "We are working toward a national policy," he declared.

Father Hesburgh said the commission, which is investigating the issues of equal protection of laws in housing, voting and education, will submit its findings and recommendations to President Eisenhower and to the Congress in a report expected to be ready next September. The hearing just concluded, according to Father Hesburgh, had one important effect—it "dramatized" the housing situation. Among those who testified were former baseball star Jackie Robinson; Sen. Jacob Javits, (N.Y.); Francis Cardinal Spellman, Roman Catholic archbishop of New York; Dr. Gardner C. Taylor, president of the Protestant Council of the City of New York; Irving M. Engel, president of the American Jewish Committee, and Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Negro Loses Plea, Will Die In Chair

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Supreme Court yesterday upheld a death sentence given a Columbia County Negro for the death of a Negro woman in March, 1957. E. C. Daniels was found guilty in Columbia County Circuit Court for the death of Clara Mae Ward. The jury made no recommendation for mercy, which makes the death sentence mandatory. Daniels and the woman were on a date and were drinking when a fight started. Daniels claimed he hit her several times with a jack handle, then pushed her, causing her to fall against a truck, hitting her head. He said he drove her around a while to revive her, but when she stopped breathing, he left her body in some woods. Her body was not found for 12 days. Daniels didn't claim he was not responsible for the woman's death, but contended there wasn't enough evidence to prove he planned to kill her. In an opinion by Justice Stephen O'Connell, the court ruled there was sufficient evidence for the jury to find him guilty of premeditated murder.

No Need To Fear, Secret Police Say

MOSCOW (UPI)—Alexander Shelepin, the new Soviet security chief, yesterday told the 21st Soviet Communist Party congress that "shameful" police excesses are a thing of the past in the Soviet Union. Shelepin spoke at the eighth session of the congress, presided over by Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev. Shelepin replaced Gen. Ivan Serov as chairman of the state security committee last year. He told the delegates that the "elimination" of former Security Chief Lavrenti Beria and his "acolytes" meant "there will never be any further violation of revolutionary legality." "Revolutionary legality has been restored and those guilty of violating it have been punished," he said, according to the official Soviet news agency Tass. "Every Soviet citizen can rest assured that nothing like that shameful business will ever repeat itself. Neither our party nor our central committee will tolerate that," he added.

Gagers Purchase Celery City Grill

Mr. and Mrs. Carey Gager are the new owners of the Celery City Grill. They purchased the establishment from Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Witt. The Gagers came here from Nebraska, by way of Miami, where Carey worked as a cook. The Gagers live at 217 Oak. They have a small son, Wayne. Witt sold the eating establishment due to the lack of time to supervise its operation. For the past year, he has been employed in the engineering department at the Martin Co. plant. The Gagers said they plan to change the name of the firm. Details of a "name our business" contest will be announced.

Man Found Dead; Suicide Is Ruled

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Harry Nachman, 65, shot himself to death at his home here early Wednesday, police reported. The victim was found by his wife, Helen. Nachman was shot through the temple with a .25 caliber automatic pistol. Police said he left a note indicating he was despondent. Industry sources estimate that U. Florida Awaiting Report On Harrison's Activities

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—Florida authorities awaited new reports from Arizona today on the baffling disappearance of an alleged amnesia victim who turned up alive last month after a convict confessed killing him.

The bizarre case took on new aspects Wednesday when a secretary told police in Phoenix, Ariz. that James E. Harrison, 32, had been on a bus from Los Angeles the same day he regained his memory in Phoenix.

Harrison, of Indian River City, disappeared on a business trip to Jacksonville Oct. 7. He turned up Jan. 23 saying he had been suffering from amnesia and had no idea what had happened to him during the three lost months.

However, during that time, a California convict, Roy V. Olson, confessed to murdering Harrison while another man looked on. Olson, who later repudiated his story, said Harrison had picked him up hitchhiking.

In Arizona, Detective L. Herbert Neal said Mrs. Judith Schenid, a secretary for a legal firm, reported Wednesday that she talked to Harrison on a bus en route to Phoenix only a few hours before his memory returned. She

State Race Tracks To Keep Six-Day Running Program

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Florida's race tracks will continue to operate on a six-day basis instead of changing to a proposed five-day week.

Racing Commission Chairman John Ring of Miami told legislators Wednesday that knocking off one day of racing a week would stretch the racing period out to compete with Northern tracks, costing Florida tracks heavily.

Rep. W. C. Herrell of Miami Springs, who questioned Ring during hearings on the Commission budget here, said he heartily backed the commissioner's views.

Ring said Miami's mild weather this winter has hurt attendance at Hialeah. The cool weather drives tourists from the beaches to tracks. Ring said he pointed out that in the first days of the Hialeah meet, revenue fell \$37,000 under the same period last winter when Southern Florida experienced unusually cold weather.

Ring added that attendance at the dog tracks, which run at night, is good.

Murder Charged To Army Private

SEOUL, Korea (UPI)—The U.S. Army announced it has preferred court-martial charges of premeditated murder and attempted murder against Pfc. Kenneth M. Burke, 21, of Del Rio, Tex.

The Army said Burke is alleged to have shot and killed Pvt. Frank Galgano, 23, of Miami, and to have severely wounded SP-4 Philip B. Mead, 18, of Lancaster, Pa.

The shootings occurred Jan. 23 while Burke was standing guard at 8th Army Headquarters.

According to the Army, Burke fired five bullets from his .45 caliber pistol at point-blank range into the cab of a truck in which Galgano and Mead were riding.

"Burke reportedly shot Mead because of a previous dispute between the two men," the Army said.

Federal Government Files Suit Against Alabama Vote Officials

Board Is Charged On Negro Voting

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department filed suit today charging Macon County, Alabama, registration officials with discriminating against Negro voters and maintaining separate segregated registration facilities.

The civil complaint was filed in federal district court at Montgomery, Ala.

It named as defendants the board of registrars of Macon County and Grady Rogers and E. P. Livingston, the two registrars who resigned after refusing to testify last December before the Civil Rights Commission hearing.

The department said Rogers and Livingston were named as defendants because, under the law, they are required to continue to perform their duties until their successors are appointed.

It is the second voting right suit brought by the department in a new civil rights division since it was set up last year. The first suit charged Terrell County, Georgia, registrars with refusal to register "fully qualified" Negroes, four of whom were school teachers. Trial is pending in this case at Columbus, Ga.

In today's action, announced here by Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers, the Justice Department seeks an injunction to bar permanently alleged discrimination in the registration process.

The suit complained that in Macon County while citizens registered to vote numbered 3,016 out of about 3,100 of voting age or approximately 97 per cent. On the other hand, the suit said, the Negro citizens who registered to vote numbered 1,110 out of approximately 14,000 of voting age, or about eight per cent.

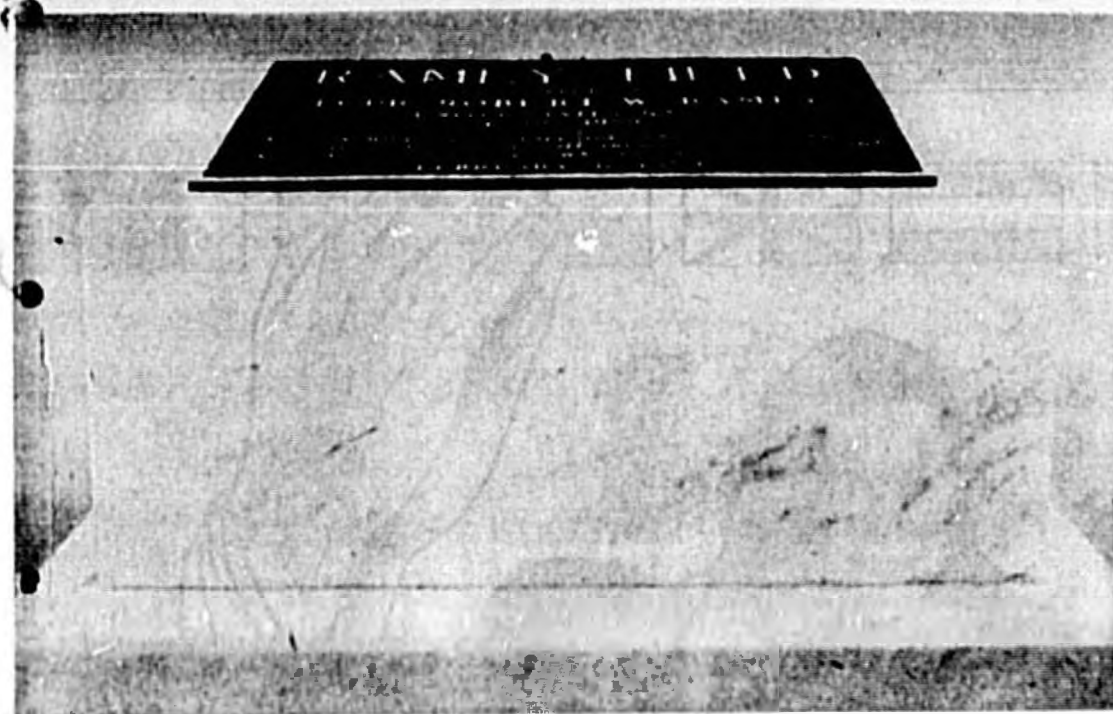

Southerners Irked By 'Rights' Planks
