These agencies are the American Relief Administration, the American Red Cross, the American Friends' Service Committee (Quakers), the Jewish Relief Distribution Committee, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, the Knights of Columbus, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A.

30,000 YOUNGSTERS VICTIMS OF RICKETS

Of all diseases that are taking a deadly toll among the children of Vienna as the result of under-feeding rickets is proving the most serious and widespread menace. Not less than 30,000 children are suffering from this painful affliction, according to official estimates. To rescue these through providing proper food, clothing and medical attention that otherwise they cannot obtain the European Relief Council, composed of eight leading American relief agencies, is making a joint appeal for \$33,000,000 for the relief of 3,500,000 destitute and suffering European children.

1,500,000 POLISH CHILDREN SICK.

One million five hundred thousand children in Poland today need medical attention. Their condition has been caused by hunger and want. To save them the European Relief Council is appealing to the people of the United States for \$33,000,000 to carry on relief work in stricken Europe.

LAND IRRIGATED BY INDIANS

Before the Advent of the Spaniards the System Was in Vogue Among the Aborigines.

Irrigation began in Texas many years before the lands embraced within its boundaries became a part of the United States, years before those same lands made up what was known as the Lone Star republic, writes James R. Freddy in the American Forestry Magazine.

To bring the time down to a more tangible date, the first irrigation work was done—according to tradition—when the Pueblo Indians constructed the peculiar ditches about El Paso and the Pecos country, which authorities of today claim were built for irrigation purposes. Another tradition coming out of the past tells that these ditches were built by the Yuma Indians when they were driven westward by the Comanches and Apaches, and not by the Pueblos.

When Coronado, the roving explorer, opened this country to the Spaniards he found well-worked irrigation systems among the Indians; this was in 1540 when he was pushing toward the north. The practice of irrigation was continued under the Franciscan fathers, who constructed the five mission ditches that were found near the present city of San Antonio. Even under Mexican rule the work did not stop, and grants by the Mexican government often read as follows:

"In the name of the Mexican nation, grants him one day of water with its corresponding labor of land."

FROM LOWLY TOIL TO FAME

Edwin Dallin, Ranked as Great Sculptor, Was Once Wheelbarrow Boy in Mine in Utah.

One of America's greatest sculptors, Edwin Dallin, was once a wheelbarrow boy in a mine in Utah, where he toiled all day for less than a dollar. The miners uncovered a stratum of white clay one morning, and Dallin, forgetting his work, sat down and began to model a likeness of one of the workmen. So lifelike was it that his teacher, when he returned to school in the fall, sent it and some of his drawings to a state fair being held in Salt Lake City. A rich mine owner had his attention called to the little clay bust and he offered to furnish the boy transportation to Boston where he could enter an art school.

The boy worked long and hard, and by the time he was twenty-one he had a studio of his own, the Detroit News recalls. He went to Paris shortly afterward and began a series of Indian poses, using the Indians from the Buffalo Bill show at that time in France. His first masterpiece, "The Signal of Peace," was finished at that time and he was recognized thereafter as one of the world's greatest sculptors. His "Ann Hutchinson," made for the Boston state house; "The Medicine Man" in Fairmount park, Philadelphia, and the great golden angel on the Mormon temple in Salt Lake City are among his best known works.

Formerly Our Superiors.

Is Capital's Best Speller.

Frank B. Willis, Ohio's successor to Warren G. Harding in the United States senate, qualified as Washington's champion speller during his term in the house. The National Press club staged an old-fashioned spelling bee at the Willard hotel, with the nation's famous statesmen and rising young journalists as contenders for first honors. Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington, then, like Willis, a member of the house, stood to the end, groggy but dogged. "Ogee" was the word on which he finally went down. He thought it meant something like "ouch" and he couldn't define it nor spell it. Willis' years at Ada had taught him much, among other things how to spell "ogee." He bowled Poindexter out and stood alone.—Gus J. Karger in the Cincinnati Times-Star.

Relief in Pictures.

Following an idea which first developed in France, pictures have been printed which, when viewed through spectacles, appear in stereoscopic relief. The object pictured is first photographed from two points like an ordinary stereoscopic view. Then the two pictures are printed in two complementary colors nearly but not quite overlapping. The glasses of the viewing spectacles are also of complementary colors corresponding to those used in the printing, and when the picture is seen through these glasses, it stands forth with startling appearance of solidity.

PLIGHT OF EUROPE'S CHILDREN STAGGERS

3,500,000 Facing Starvation Can Only Be Saved by America's Response to Joint Appeal.

It is utterly impossible for one who has not actually seen the misery of the early Autumn in Europe to visualize what the children of the Eastern and Central portions of the continent face this winter. To say that 3,500,000 children have no alternative to starvation or death from disease except American aid, is startling, but independent observers by the score and careful scientific surveys of the economic and crop conditions overseas brand the figure as conservative.

In Poland, for instance, where 1,308,000 youngsters last year subsisted at most entirely on the one free American meal a day that they received, conditions as winter closes down, are worse than ever before. The Bolshevik invasion stripped large portions of the country of all grain. Professor E. D. Durand, Food Advisor to the Polish government, after an exhaustive survey, has reported that only forty per cent is available of the food necessary to carry the population through the winter.

In the city of Vienna tests conducted in the American Relief Administration food kitchens showed that 52 per cent of the children between the ages of 6 and 14 were "seriously under-nourished." Thirty-three per cent were markedly under-nourished, 11 per cent were slightly subnormal and only 4 per cent approached the state of a normal American child. The American Relief Administration is feeding 300,000 Austrian children every day now, and there is no chance of diminution of need before next harvest.

The spectacle of the medical needs of Europe's children is equally appalling. Estimates reaching the American Red Cross to needs for medical service in the destitute areas this winter include: Old Austria-Hungary, 750,000; new Poland, 1,500,000; Czechoslovakia, 200,000; Serbia, 150,000, and Roumania, 100,000. In the fiscal year of 1919-20 the Red Cross has reached with the veritable gift of life 1,500,000 children in the affected areas. Tuberculosis is prevalent to a terrific degree. Five children out of seven in the city of Warsaw, for instance, have been found to be tubercular. Typhus is widespread; rickets, the right-hand of under-nourishment is almost universal and cholera lifts its grim head constantly in one place and another.

The European Relief Council, comprising the American Relief Administration, the American Red Cross, the American Friends Service Committee (Quakers), the Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, the Knights of Columbus, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A., seeks \$33,000,000 with which to meet the situation. It has estimated that at least \$23,000,000 must be had for food and \$10,000,000 for medical service to avert absolute disaster among the three need children. A CITIZEN.

Two Atomic Theories.

An atom is a part so small as not to be divisible. It is an ultimate particle of matter. Two opinions, directly opposite to each other, have long had currency with regard to the constituent particles of material things; the one, that matter is composed of an assemblage of minute particles, or atoms, incapable of further division; the other, that there is no limit to its divisibility, the smallest conceivable particle still consisting of an infinity of parts. The first of these theories, which is commonly distinguished by the name of atomic philosophy, was originated in Greece by Leucippus; it was supported by Democritus and subsequently improved by Epicurus and his disciples. The Epicureans professed to account for the origin and formation of all things by supposing that these atoms were endued with gravity and motion, and thus came together into the different organized bodies.

Whence Electric Lamps Come.

A little consideration of the materials that enter into the making of lamps would be a revelation to the large majority of electric lamp users. California, Colorado, Nevada and South Dakota lead in the production of tungsten ore, the important material of which the filament of the modern electric lamp is made.

First, there is the filament of tungsten, then the glass bulb into which enter silica, soda, nitre from Chile, potash, manganese from Russia, arsenic, borax, feldspar, lead, aluminum, cryolite from Greenland, cobalt from Canada. The base of the lamp is made of copper and zinc from Utah and Missouri, while the basing cement is a mixture of marble dust from Vermont, whiting from Ohio, shellac from India, and glass rosin from Georgia.

Wonderful Is Human Skin.

The human skin, which forms a protective covering over the whole of the body, consists of two layers, an outer one and an inner one. The epidermis, or outer skin, is so constructed that no moisture from outside can penetrate it so long as the skin itself is not torn or cut. At the same time the pores of the skin are so formed that the sweat is freely discharged through the skin, thus ventilating the body and keeping it at an even temperature. If someone could invent a material possessing the properties of the human skin, a material which would keep out all moisture, however heavy the down-pour of rain, and yet allow the free escape of the heat and moisture of the body, his fortune would be made.

PLIGHT OF REFUGEE CHILDREN TERRIBLE

One hundred thousand Russian refugees in Poland are absolutely destitute according to official estimates. The majority of them are women and children. The condition of the latter particularly is pitiful and they will be among the beneficiaries from the \$33,000,000 fund being raised by the European Relief Council, composed of eight leading American relief agencies for a joint appeal in behalf of the millions of little Europeans who can look only to America for the food, clothing and medical care that will make it possible for them to survive the winter.

CONTRIBUTION'S EXEMPT FROM TAXATION.

Contributions to the collection of the European Relief Council for the European children's relief fund are exempt from taxation and may be deducted from income tax returns, according to a ruling that has been made by the office of Internal Revenue in Washington.
