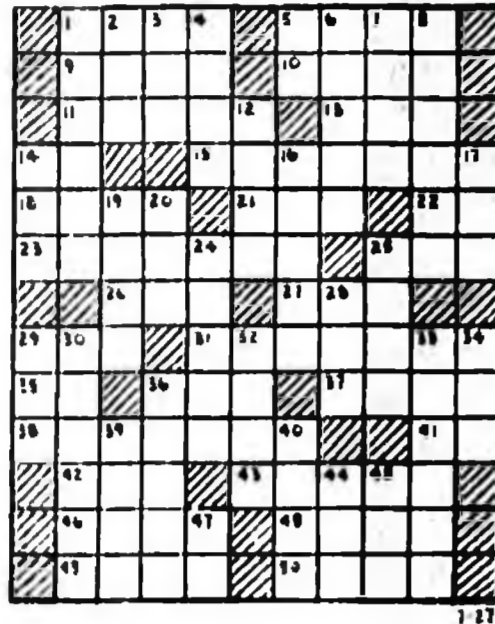

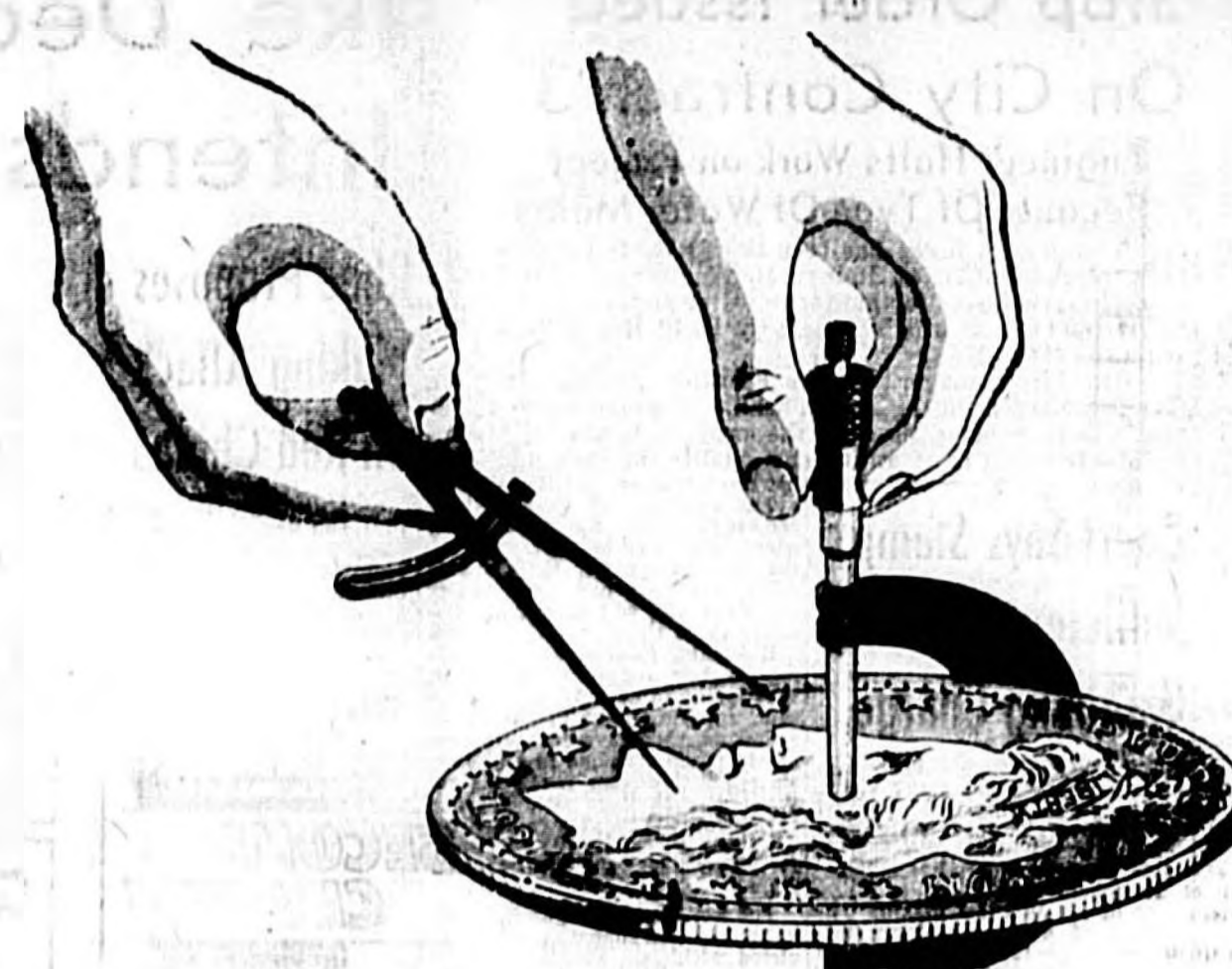

 to work for a freer flow of world trade, even though he found it necessary to hike the tariff on certain imported watches up to 50 per cent.

Eisenhower ordered the increase yesterday, Switzerland, which supplies the country with most of its imported watch movements, said he tariff hike dealt a serious blow not only to existing trade relations between Switzerland and the United States, but also to the very principle of freedom of trade.

The President said he made a long study of whether to increase the duty on imported watches and concluded that from the standpoint of national defense it was imperative to preserve certain skilled industries in this country. He was referring, he said, to fine tolerance precision instruments.

GERMAN SOVEREIGNTY—The President said he is not ready to announce just what steps he might take toward granting sovereignty to West Germany. He made that reply when asked for his views on a resolution approved yesterday by the Senate Foreign Relations committee. The resolution in effect supports sovereignty for direct presidential action unless France ratifies the European Defense Community Treaty.

Eisenhower said he thoroughly approves the resolution, but that the matter of just what steps might be taken will have to be left to further study.

TEXAS DEMOCRATS—A reporter told Eisenhower that Gov. Allan Shivers, a Democrat who supported Eisenhower in 1952, ran into stiff opposition in last Saturday's primary. The reporter said that five Democratic congressmen from Texas had either voluntarily retired from the House or were voted out at the polls.

After noting that Shivers' support of Eisenhower was one of the issues in the primary, the reporter asked whether Eisenhower had had time to analyze the outcome of the voting.

No, the President replied, a smile on his face. He added that after all it was the other party—meaning the Democrats and not the Republicans—who were involved in the Texas situation.

Eisenhower went on to say Shivers is a friend of his—a friend he likes and admires.

He said Shivers has been a good governor, and that he (Eisenhower) is pleased that he had Shivers' support in the presidential election.

Foundation Advises Care With Poisons Around Livestock

Even on the best-managed farms carelessness with poisonous materials used in farming may exact a costly toll among livestock, the American Foundation for Animal Health warned animal owners today.

"In fact, the risks may be even greater on well-managed farms because of their greater use of chemical products, as in weed and insect control," says the foundation.

"For example, cattle readily eat plants treated with sodium chlorate, and the results are often fatal. They will bypass plants treated with arsenic, but may be poisoned by drinking from puddles in fields recently treated. Various other weed killers are in themselves harmless to animals, but may cause chemical changes in plants, which when eaten, produce ill effects."

Fertilizers containing nitrogen should be placed well out of reach of livestock. So should discarded paint cans, old storage batteries, and other products containing lead. An animal may be poisoned after just a few licks, the foundation says.

Certain chemical compounds are effective worming agents, but should never be left where animals can get at them. Similarly, salt is vital to animals, but when it becomes a brine it may be toxic to pigs.

"Prompt treatment is the key to saving animals that are poisoned," the foundation advises. "The veterinarian should be called the moment the first poisoning symptoms are noticed."

NEW YORK—Facts, fancies and figures from an oddity almanac in a modern world. Let's start off with the girls, since they interest everyone. Are "falsies" really necessary? The encyclopedias are chary of saying how often the average human heart beats. They don't want to worry you, but mine checks 75 when I am not worried, and 100 plus when the boss is looking. But they will tell you that a horse heart beats 30 times a minute, these are the ones I bet and lose on; and a mouse races his pumper 560 to 1,000 times every 60 seconds. Names not only make news they also make you wonder. The town of Smackover, Ark., for example, came from the French term, Chemin Couvert, meaning covered road, and I can't find out why. Too Late To Classify

Says Fight Took Two Directions

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate fight, made by Democrats and a couple of others on the Eisenhower administration bill to change the atomic energy law, centered mainly on the question of public versus private power. The Democrats' fight took two directions: one involved the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) and the other the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC). The TVA supplies electric power to a wide area of the Middle South, and to an AEC plant at Paducah, Ky. If it had not been pumping some of its juice into Paducah, TVA would have some of it in reserve for the growing power needs of its area. To meet those needs, it asked the administration that it be allowed to build another plant. The administration didn't let it. And on June 17 President Eisenhower told the AEC—TVA—to negotiate a contract with a private utility group to build a 107 million dollar steam plant at West Memphis, Ark., to supply TVA with about 600,000 kilowatts of power. This power would not be for AEC use—AEC would only be acting as a government broker in the deal—but for TVA. The administration, dedicated to more free enterprise, has spoken in favor of more private development of power. The private utility group in this case—Middle South Utilities, Inc., and the Southern Company—is known as the Dixon-Yates group after E. H. Dixon, president of the former, and E. A. Yates, chairman of the latter. Democrats accused the administration of trying to block further TVA development and of using the AEC as an instrument for doing it. They argued it would cost the government, over 20 years, 90 million dollars more for the private power than if TVA had built its own plant. And the Eisenhower administration "contemplated" paying all the federal, state and local taxes for the Dixon-Yates group on any profits from supplying power to the TVA. This was mentioned by Rowland Hughes, director of the budget, who told AEC the President wanted the negotiation carried out. The Democrats weren't able to block the administration from going ahead with this deal but they did get enough votes—on an amendment proposed by Sen. Gore (D-Tenn)—to keep the federal government from paying the private utility group's federal taxes, if the deal goes through. But the House passed a similar bill without this provision. Now the House and Senate must compromise their differences on the slightly different bills. So the final law may not contain the Gore amendment. Both houses will have to approve the compromise, whatever it is, before it can become law. If the Gore amendment is dropped from the final draft, the Democrats may start fighting all over again. The basic law on atomic energy was passed in 1946. But there have been changes since then in foreign relations, technological developments, and progress in realizing development of atomic energy for peaceful purposes is closer than it seemed eight years ago. Salt Removed from Milk For Low-Sodium Diets

MANY people must be on a strict low salt diet to compensate for either a heart or kidney disturbance. Also many who suffer from severe high blood pressure are placed on a diet that is low in salt. There are many specially prepared salt-free foods for those who are on special diets, but fresh whole milk has been missing from the list. Milk in Special Diets Ordinary milk is not advised for such people since it contains a high amount of sodium, the constituent of salt, an excess of which is detrimental to their health. However, the other food values of milk are important to proper nutrition. Therefore, many heart sufferers, up to a short time ago, depended on powdered milk products from which the salt was removed. They had to add water to these powdered products in order to drink them. But a new process, however, 90 per cent of the salt that is contained in milk can now be removed without otherwise altering it. None of the other food values are destroyed. Besides being low in salt, the milk is fresh. This new process makes milk far more drinkable than the powdered substitutes. This new type of milk, to which the American Heart Association has called attention, is now found only in certain parts of the country but it is expected to be available to heart sufferers on a national basis within a short period of time. The physician will advise when this type of preparation may be of value. QUESTION AND ANSWER Mr. G. 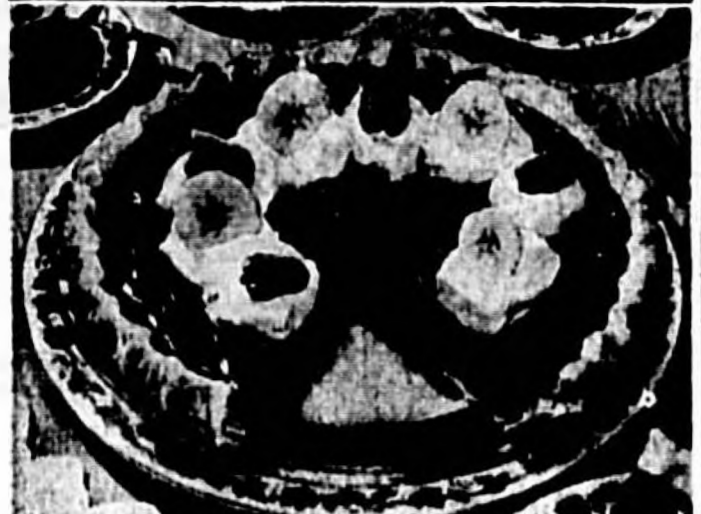
