

Accused Prowler Released On Bond Following Arrest

Free on a bond of \$202 is Lowry B. Miller, a 27-year-old DeLand resident who was booked Monday night by City police on a charge of vagrancy as a common night walker and pilferer after being accused of taking undergarments from a clothes line at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley H. Petty, 111 Cedar Ave.

Mrs. Petty says that she and her husband saw Miller circle the block several times before parking some 100 yards down the street. They watched him as he searched the clothes lines and then peer into the window of a room which

Miller's two children occupy. "He then came and looked into our room," Mrs. Petty said, "and then I called the police."

Apparently fearing being caught she went on, he ran for his car. "But Mr. Petty took off after him and eventually stopped him at the Motors Inn," she said.

Stop Order Issued On City Contract 3

Engineer Halts Work on Project Because Of Type Of Water Mains

A stop-work order has been issued by David Newman field representative of Robert M. Angus and Associates consulting engineers for Sanford's water and sewer program on contract No. 3, which is held by E. H. Holcombe, Clearwater.

The City manager, Warren Knowlgs, revealed this action today and cited the reason behind Newman's order. The pipe which is being used in the project, laying of water main extensions, is of an inferior quality, he said, and does not meet contract specifications.

The contract let at a cost of \$644,21, calls for a covering which will prevent rust, whereas the material which Holcombe is using does not have the proper coverings and will rust in a relatively short time, he said.

Knowlgs, who is vacationing in California, while the chief superintendent had not been contacted, "We have been informed since Mr. Newman made his report, some 24-hours ago, that there is still a foreman in charge here and, of course, we can do little to rectify the problem," the City manager stated.

The work, which began last Saturday and was supposed to be completed within 60 working days, is currently halted just north of Forest Dr. on Summerlin Ave. Knowlgs pointed out that the penalty clause of the contract calls for payment of \$50 for each extra day before the work is completed.

Court Says Stamp Sufficient To Bring Gambling Charge

TALLAHASSEE, Fla.—Possession of a federal gambling tax stamp is enough evidence to sustain a holder on charges of state gambling law violations, the Florida state Supreme Court has ruled.

It upheld validity of two sections of the 1953 law making possession of a federal stamp evidence of violation of state gambling laws.

The decision upheld the Leon County Circuit Court's ruling in the case of Amos Jefferson who was arrested in August on gambling charges.

Jefferson's case has not come to trial so there was no ruling on the validity of the stamp evidence sufficient to conflict for gambling charges.

City Manager Gives Schedule Of New Charges

MACCLENNY, Fla.—A 29-year-old mother of eight children was shot to death at her home near here about eight after a family argument. Her husband, Earl Thornton, 32, was being held in Baker County jail pending a coroner's inquest.

Sheriff Asa Coleman Jr. said Thornton clashed his neck after telling Mrs. Thornton with a shot gun blast. An 11-year-old daughter survived the killing, the sheriff said.

Thornton was taken to Jacksonville, treated and released to Baker County officers. His condition was not believed serious. Sheriff Coleman said Thornton had been drinking before the shooting.

After his arrest, Miller told of a story of his wife having committed suicide a year or more ago and produced newspaper clipping reporting his life. Calls today from this town to the Deland Police Department, Volusia County Sheriff's Office failed to substantiate either of those accounts.

Knowles emphasized that this is a monthly sewer charge and has no effect upon the water cost.

Ike Declares United States Intends To Defend Its Rights

Rhee Proposes Making Attack On Red China

WASHINGTON, D.C.—South Korean President Syngman Rhee proposed today that an Asian army of more than two million men backed by U.S. aircraft planes and ships, launch a counterattack on Communist China.

In a speech prepared for delivery before a joint session of Congress, the 79-year-old Korean leader said:

"Let us remember that peace cannot be restored in the world half Communist and half democratic."

"Your momentous decision is needed now to make Asia safe for freedom, for that will automatically solve the world Communist problem in Europe, Africa and America."

Rhee told Congress the essence of Soviet strategy for world conquest is to pull Americans into a sleep of death by taking peace until the Soviet Union possesses enough hydrogen bombs and incendiary bombs to pulverize the airfields and productive centers of the United States by sudden attack.

Rhee has long advocated resuming hostilities in Korea to drive the Communists out of the northern half of his divided land. But this appeared to be the first time he proposed an all-out attack on the Chinese mainland itself.

He did not call for the use of U.S. foot soldiers.

Rhee's call to arms ran counter to U.S. policy, expressed by both President Eisenhower and Secretary of State Dulles. Both said publicly last week the United States should favor reumption of the Korea War.

"The American Air Force as well as the Navy would be needed to insure the success of the counterattack on the Red Chinese regime," Rhee said, adding: (Continued on Page Three)

Korean Vets Face Deadline For GI Bill

The Korean GI Bill deadline faces all veterans separated from active service before Aug. 20, 1952. Those who left active service after that date have to turn to the VA for separation which is to begin on June 2. The VA announced adoption of a new enrollment procedure to eliminate delays.

In the past, service-disabled veterans were required to take the VA's vocational counseling before they were allowed to begin training under the Korean GI program.

Reason was to find out whether they had need for training under another law created specifically for disabled veterans—Public Law 16.

Under the new system, these veterans will be permitted to start Korean GI training before they undergo counseling, rather than wait until after it has been completed.





Senator Predicts Substantial Boost In Housing Because Of Legislation

According to a letter received by The Herald from Senator John A. McClellan, he has been appointed educational director for the Florida State Alcoholics Rehabilitation Program which was created by the 1953 legislature to work for the control, treatment and prevention of alcoholism. We hope to have in construction by next year, a 35-50 bed hospital at Alton Park. Our state office will also move. We are temporarily located in the city hall. The hospital will serve as a treatment center and focal point for out-patient clinics throughout the state. We are, of course, unable to offer rehabilitation or clinical services at present. We have no particular brief for or against drinking. Our entire program is based toward the reducing of so-called problem drinkers—the alcoholic (there are an estimated 60,000 alcoholics in Florida). People will enter our program voluntarily and pay according to their ability to pay. They must have one year's residence in the state to be eligible for care. Treatment center will offer an opportunity for individual, group and group counseling, as well as psychiatric, social, religious. A—In an attempt to help each patient bring his particular drinking problem under control."

Reception Cool

To Suggestion

WASHINGTON (AP)—Syngman Rhee neared the end of his White House talks today after winning personal acclaim but cool reception for his plea to Congress for war against Red China.

After staying with the Tom of the Unknown Soldier, the South Korean President was to have his fourth and perhaps last session with President Eisenhower since arriving in Washington Monday.

So far neither American nor Korean sources have given out word on how the conferences are progressing. Rhee is said to seek more time to help him help his war-ravaged country and U.S. backing of his ambition to unify it with North Korea. Eisenhower reportedly wants Rhee to go easy on his unite-Korea-by-force plan and to adopt a more friendly policy toward neighboring Japan. A joint statement is expected at the end of talks.
