## School choice angers some parents

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The angry calls and visitors to the Seminole County School Administration Building Monday came as no surprise to Sherry O'Leary, Consent Degree facilitator.

"It was the luck of the draw," said O'Leary. "This was the fairest way," explaining the lottery type system for assigning Sanford area

children to an elementary school for the 1998-99 school year.

O'Leary quickly points out that the number of parents who did not receive their first school choice is relatively small. According to O'Leary 82 percent of the parents in the Northeast cluster (Hamilton, Midway and Pine Crest Elementary Schools) and 85 percent of those in the Northwest cluster (Idyllwilde, Wicklow and Wilson Elementary Schools) did receive the school of

their choice.

But for some parents the new Choices Program was no choice at all. That is the feeling expressed by parents like Justine Robinson who received her last choice. "What choice did I have?" asked Robinson, who like most parents, learned of her son's school assignment through a letter she received Saturday.

"I bought my house specifically because of the school my children

would attend," explained Robinson.

Parents unhappy with their school assignment expressed concerns about their children being bused longer distances, having to leave schools they had already been attending, and going to a different school than other neighborhood children. Some parents will encounter problems with before and after school care.

Parents also felt misled about Please See Choice, Page 3A

## Kicking their way to soccer championship

LAKE MARY - They came, they saw, they kicked...

...their way to a state championship. Saturday, the Lake Mary girls soccer team not only won the second state championship in school history, but also made state history.

With a 1-0 win over University High Saturday in Tallahassee, the Lake Mary girls won the state championship and joined the Lake Mary girls' basketball team as the first same-gender teams to win state titles during the same season in Florida history.

Aly Benitez scored from 15 yards for her county-leading 40th goal of the season for the only score of the game. From there, it was up to Lake Mary's defense which has been nearly unbeatable since a loss to Oviedo in the district finals.

Goaltender Jordan Kellgren, bound for the University of Florida, recorded her 20th shutout of the season and third straight in the playoffs.

She wasn't the only star as defenders Jackie Vanlooven, Kristin Hoyle and Adrienne Elker found the right time to play their best soccer of the season.

## Fire guts Sanford cop's home

SANFORD - A Sanford police officer lost his home and belongings to a fire that gutted the Elm Avenue structure Monday.

Police are launching a fund drive to help Officer Jody Smith, his wife and two children obtain clothing and find temporary shelter.

When the fire was first detected Monday, Smith was the only person in the structure. Firemen arrived shortly after 9:30 a.m. but were unable to prevent the fire from totally destroying the frame structure, at 214 Elm Avenue in the city's historic district.

Smith was not injured in the fire and managed to escape from the burning building.

Sanford Deputy Police Chief Dennis Whitmore said the department has placed officer Ed Manning, who serves as police chaplain, in charge of a fund-raising project.

"We are looking for all kind of donations, especially clothing," Manning said. "As of this morning, between the police department and FOP (Fraternal Order of Police), we have turned Please See Fire, Page 3A

## Adult entertainment: Right to bare arms?

### County, club may fight in court

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The county appears ready to take on another strip club.

Denied a license to sell beer and wine, the House of Babes in Fern Park filed a petition for writ of certiorari with the Circuit Court challenging the Board of County Com-

missioners' decision.

Deputy County Attorney Lonnie Groot will ask the commission this afternoon for authorization to defend.

The case will be handled by the county's legal staff - not Shultz & Bowen, the Orlando firm that was hired to handle cases against Sassy Merlot's and VIP Gold, two adult clubs which unlawfully opened in 1997.

Attorney Steve LaBret says the House of Babes, which operates lawfully, has done everything the county asked for to be granted the alcohol license. The owners are even willing to change the name of the club to Risky Business and had Please See Court, Page 3A

### City OKs ordinance

SANFORD - The Sanford City Commission has fulfilled its part of a joint agreement pertaining to adult entertainment establishments. Monday night, the commission approved, on second and final reading, an ordinance relating to "Multi-Jurisdictional Land Use."

It deals with permitting, locating and siting of adult entertainment establishments and sexually oriented businesses.

Seminole County proposed the joint land use agreement and urged the city to adopt it. There were some relatively minor differences in the wording suggested by the county and deemed appropriate by the city. These matters were resolved, and the first and second readings of the ordinance passed through the city commission with unanimous approvals.

While County Commission Chairman Randy Morris' signature is on the document, the county is only expected to finalize its portion Please See Sanford, Page 3A

## Lake Mary cops trade weapons for technology

LAKE MARY - Lake Mary is trading weapons for technology.

Police Capt. Sam Belfiore suggested to city commissioners that the department not purchase the budgeted MP5 tactical weapons and transfer the \$7,000 allowed for the rifles to the purchase of laptop computers.

The commission approved Belfiore's request at the March 19 meeting, setting aside money for the purchase of a total of 9 laptops computers for a price not to exceed \$29,259.

The laptops will be purchased off of the Seminole County bid, through IKON Office Solutions in Matland.

Police Chief Rick Beary told the commission that the computers, being used by the cities of Sanford, Altamonte Springs and Winter Park as well as the county, are state-of-the-art and

"ruggedized". City manager John Litton said, "They can actually get run over by a car and keep running."

Belfiore's report stated, "The use of laptop computers reduces the time it takes an officer to write a report, gives a professional appearance to all written documents and allows the officer more time for proactive patrol activities." Litton added, "It keeps him out where he belongs."

In a separate agenda item, commissioners voted to replace 4 in-car video systems that are approximately 5 years old.

The police department has been using the video systems to record evidence at the scene of traffic accidents, DUI cases and other types of investigations. In Belfiore's report, he stated "the State Attorney's office requests the on-scene in-car video on DUI cases. The video has assisted in a number Please See Laptops, Page 3A

# Diabetes alert making headway after 10 years

The American Diabetes Association has announced that the number of people undiagnosed with diabetes has dropped by two million. Although the decrease in the undiagnosed is significant, there are still millions of people unaware of the presence of this silent killer.

A silent killer is sneaking up on millions of American adults. Its devastating and permanent effects can be prevented if caught in time. This is not a screenplay for a new movie. It is diabetes and is too serious to ignore.

Tuesday, March 24, could become a critical day for many of the people (including 330,000 right here in Florida) who are unaware that they have diabetes. That's because the American Diabetes Association is holding the American Diabetes Alert, our one-day effort to encourage people to take a simple seven-question diabetes risk test. Consider why finding those afflicted with diabetes is so challenging and critical:

Diabetes can lead to heart

attacks, stroke, blindness and kidney failure if left untreated. Early detection is crucial.

Less than 25 percent of people with diabetes show obvious symptoms, hence its name--the Silent Killer. Others are diagnosed only after seeking treatment for one of its complications.

People who are overweight, don't exercise, and age 45 and older are at high risk for this serious disease. As baby boomers age, more are expected to develop diabetes.

"It is especially crucial to alert people to the dangers of diabetes because it can be a silent killer--gradually causing your body's blood vessels and nerves to deteriorate with no warning signs or symptoms," said Victor Lawrence Roberts, M.C. "It's no wonder 1 out of 3 Americans who have diabetes don't know it."

The goal of the American Diabetes Alert is to inform people of the deadly link that exists between diabetes, age, inactivity, being overweight and having a family history of the disease. The centerpiece of the Alert is a simple, paper and pencil test people can take to assess their individual risk for the disease. The test is risk free and available by calling the Association at 1-800-DIABETES (342-2383) or by visiting the Association's website at [www.diabetes.org](http://www.diabetes.org).

Diabetes is a serious disease in which the body either does not produce insulin (type 1) or does not effectively use or produce adequate amounts of insulin (type 2). Insulin is a hormone that allows blood sugar to enter the cells of the body and be used for energy. Diabetes can lead to severely debilitating or fatal complications, such as blindness, kidney and heart disease, stroke and lower-extremity amputations. It is the seventh leading cause of death in the U.S. Currently, there is no cure.

# Sanford Fire Department to get additional firemen

SANFORD - The Sanford Fire Department is overworked. Fire Chief Tom Hickson says the overtime load is currently at 113 percent of the budget, and fire fighters are being overworked.

During Monday afternoon's Sanford City Commission meeting, Hickson formally requested he be allowed to hire six additional firefighters. "I'm beating my men to death these days," he said, observing that he had not added any new line personnel to the department since 1991.

Members of the city commission appeared to be in agreement with the need for additional personnel requested by Hickson.

"The primary response of government," said Commissioner Brady Lessard, "is to protect the public and promote the safety of the people. I can't think of a more important way than through improving the fire department operation."

Hickson explained that the money to be used for the additional officers was actually approved in this year's budget. "It was sort of a Public Safety Contingency Fund," he said, "to be considered later in the fiscal year, which is now being done because of our need for additional personnel."

Hickson said the depart-

ment's calls for service have increased from 1991 to 1997 by 91 percent. "We used to have eight to ten runs per day," he told the commission. "Now we are up to 20 to 24 runs a day, and we have to add at least one extra hour to each of those for paper work to be completed."

In Sanford Fire Department statistics, the department responded to 3,757 9-1-1 calls in 1991, and 7,174 in 1997. All of the calls were handled with a total of only 48 line personnel.

He estimated that the hiring of six additional firefighters will reduce the overtime load impact on the budget. If approved by the city, Hickson said the hiring process could be completed for all six to the point where the new firefighters would be on the job within 30 days.

With a general consensus agreement on the need for the additional firefighters, an ordinance is to be drawn up for presentation before a formal commission meeting, possibly by the next meeting.

City Manager Bill Simmons noted that this would be an early approval. "I expect with our next year's budget preparation hearings we'll be hearing from other departments wanting additional personnel, so we'll be taking that up in the near future," he said.

"It seems as though we are continuously discussing adding to the police department," commented Commissioner Whitley Eckstein. "Now it's time to pay the piper and help out our fire department."

of the joint agreement at this evening's meeting.

Under guidelines pertaining to zoning, each government is required to provide a certain amount of area for all types of businesses including adult entertainment. The amount of space however, is limited, and county officials believe that by combining the number of sites available in the total county with those which would be available within the city limits, the overall numbers would be lower. Nevertheless, the total number of sites are expected to be in sufficient numbers to avoid any lawsuits regarding a violation of these land requirements.

When the matter was brought up for first reading, there was a question regarding whether the five existing adult entertainment establishments would be grandfathered into the land development approvals.

As a result, the proposal was rejected by the city's Planning

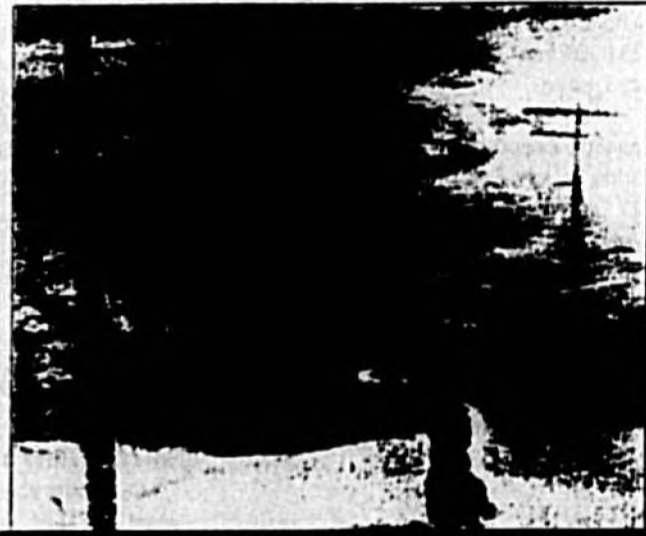

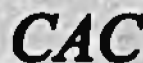

## Here are some correct ways to practice catch-and-release

**SANFORD** - More and more anglers are releasing the fish they catch. For some species, or during specific seasons, this may be mandatory. But catch-and-release makes sense in nearly all situations, and it may be the single most important factor in preserving Florida's fisheries.

To reduce injury to the fish, use a barbless hook. Some stores sell these, but you can make your own by pinching the barb down on a standard hook and filing it off.

Fish that swallow the hook are more difficult to successfully release. To help prevent swallowed hooks, set the hook quickly when the fish bites. If the hook was swallowed, it will be easier to remove if it is barbless. Carry a de-hooking device in your tackle box.

As a last resort, if the hook is hopelessly stuck cut the line and leave the hook in the fish. This may not save the fish, but it gives it a fighting change. Get the hook out if you can.

Play a caught fish quickly--don't let it fight to exhaustion. Once you get the fish to the boat or the shore, leave it in the water. If you must handle the fish, use a gloved hand or a wet towel to grab the fish. Avoid a landing net if possible. Keep your fingers off the fish's gills and eyes. Remove the hook and get the fish back in the water as quickly as possible. If you want a picture, have the camera ready ahead of time.

To release the fish place it carefully in the water. Don't toss it back in with a splash. Hold the fish from underneath and gently by the tail. Wait for the fish to swim away from you. If the fish can't swim normally wait for it to recover. If the fish is weak or lethargic, gently resuscitate it by slowly moving it back and forth in the water to force water through its gills. Some anglers that I know have spent a half an hour or more helping a big snook or tarpon recover. Every one of them says that it was time well spent.

Offshore anglers that bring fish up from deep water may have to contend with distended air bladders. Fish have these organs to control their buoyancy under water. When an angler brings a fish to the surface too fast the bladder distends and bloats the fish. Before releasing a fish with an expanded air bladder, use a pin, sharp hook or for very large fish an ice pick, and puncture the air bladder. If you don't do this the fish will be unable to return to the deep water it came from and it will most likely die.

### SHUPE'S SCOOP

Many really big bass are lost when they jump or toss their heads above the surface of the water. They get a lot of momentum with these antics, and I always put my rod down in the water to keep big bass from shaking the hook. The downward angle of the line prevents the fish from reaching the water's surface.

### FISHING FORECAST

The river is almost impossible to fish due to high water. Stick to local lakes and the Wekiva River, where the water is somewhat contained. Bass will be active until the summer months. Large shiners are the best bet this time of year for lunker bass.

Sebastian Inlet is featuring fair snook action with fish to 15 pounds being caught on live shrimp. A few large flounder are still hitting finger mullet bounced slowly across the bottom. Bluefish, jack crevalle, ladyfish and a few trout can also be caught.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports spotty offshore action due to high seas. Pay careful attention to the marine forecast before planning a trip offshore. Inside the Port, look for sheepshead and flounder to provide fair action. Trout and redfish will be hard to locate with the recent cold weather. They may be in the deeper holes.

Bluefish and sheepshead reign at Ponce Inlet. Both species are around the rocks in good numbers. Drum, redfish, jack crevalle and ladyfish are mixed in the catches. Trout and redfish may be a little slow in Mosquito Lagoon due to the recent cold snap.

The Lake Mary selections were just the latest accolades to come to the team which won the state championship with a win over Boone in the state finals last

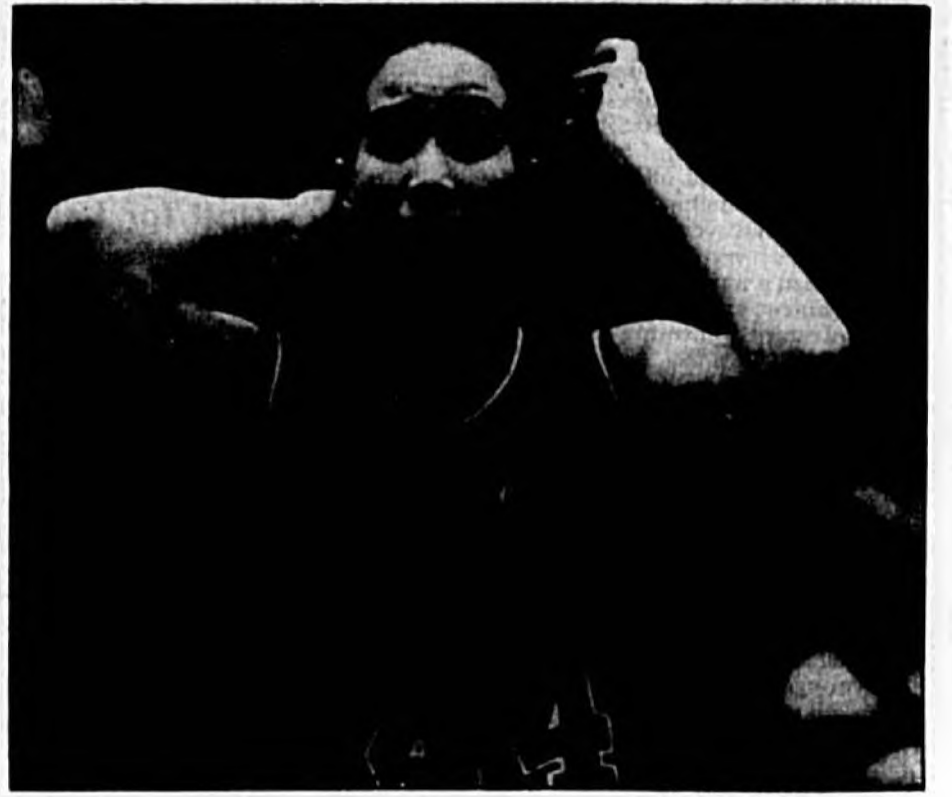
month to cap off an undefeated season.

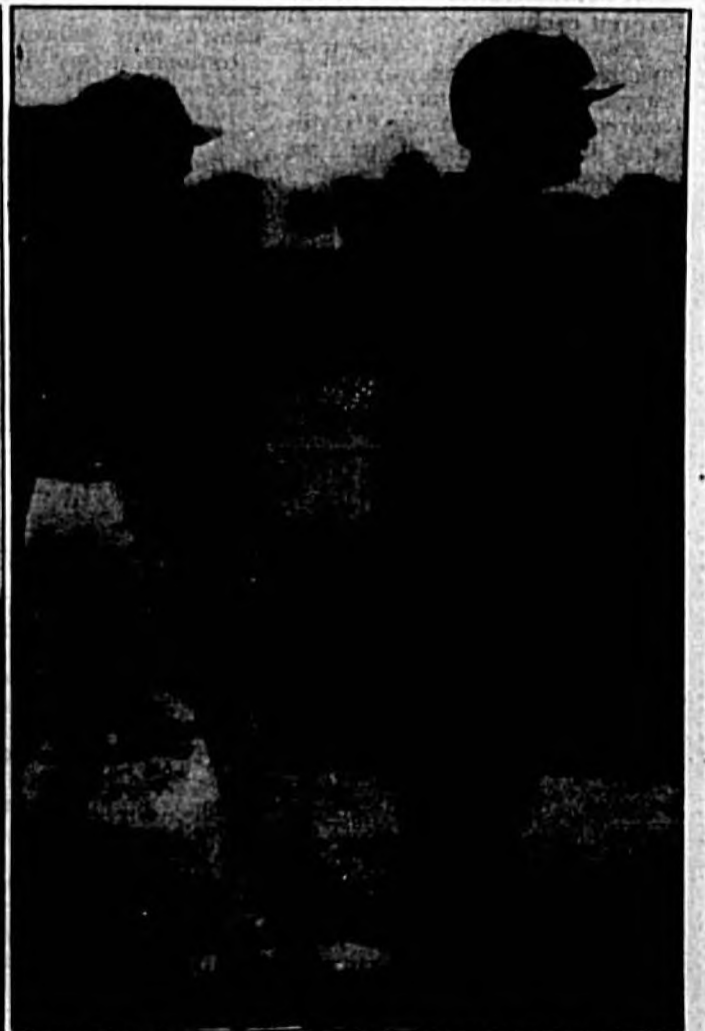

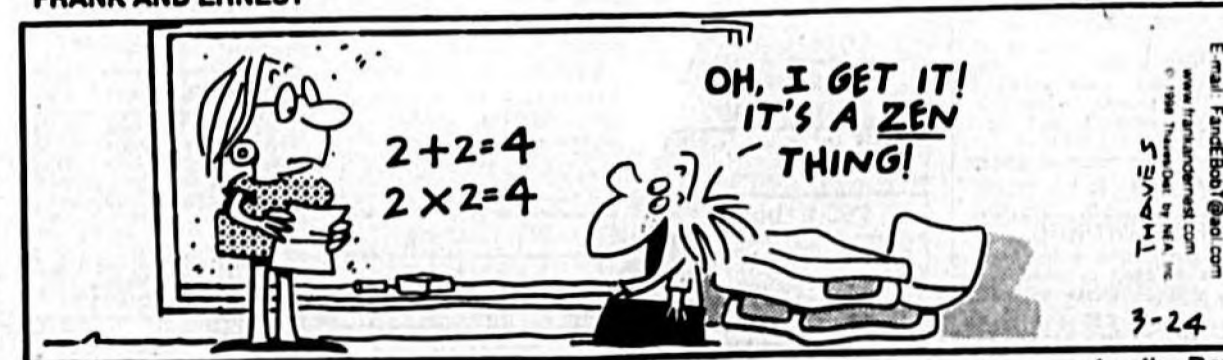

# Can male hot flashes be cured?

DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband underwent castration several years ago for prostate cancer. He is now 87 and, despite a variety of herbal and prescription drugs, continues to have severe hot flashes. He is very bothered by these sudden attacks, but the doctors say that nothing can be done. Can you help him?

DEAR READER: I'm afraid not. Many prostate cancers are fueled by male hormone, which is produced in the testicles. Although most modern urologists prefer "chemical castration" (using medicines to neutralize the hormone in men with prostate malignancy), actual castration was previously widely used to accomplish the same purpose. The surgery is now limited primarily to the very elderly. Unfortunately, hot flashes — identical to those suffered by postmenopausal women — are a common consequence of such surgery. While hot flashes (and associated symptoms such as moodiness and depression) are annoying, they do not represent a health hazard. Treating them would entail administering the very hormone that could stimulate the prostate cancer.

Therefore, I advise your husband to put up with the flashes, secure in the knowledge that his previous surgery has offered him many demonstrable benefits.

DEAR DR. GOTT: A few years ago, my elderly father was diagnosed with cerebellar degeneration. We were told that nothing could be done. Now he is confined to a wheelchair and has impaired speech. Do you know of any medication that could help him? We're afraid he will soon end up in a nursing home.

DEAR READER: Cerebellar degeneration is a serious neurological disorder marked by shrinkage of the cerebellum, a part of the brain that controls movement and coordination. The affliction is often a consequence of various cancers, notably of the breast, ovary and lung. Also, it is commonly the result of nutritional deficiencies and alcohol abuse. Symptoms include progressive difficulty in walking, speaking and moving, as well as dementia. The diagnosis is made by CT scanning of the brain. The illness usually progresses over weeks or months and leaves the patient profoundly disabled.

Although cerebellar degeneration may improve when it is related to cancer and the malignancy is treated, most cases are untreatable. Therefore, your father's prognosis is, for all practical purposes, essentially hopeless. He will probably require nursing home care when his disability reaches the point at which the family no longer can cope in a home situation, even with home health aides. I

side effect of Altace. What do you think?

DEAR READER: I disagree with the dermatologist. When anyone on any medication develops an unexplained rash with or without hair loss, the prudent physician always suspects that the medicine may be to blame.

According to its manufacturer, Altace can cause this reaction, although it is admittedly rare.

Here's how I'd handle the situation. Ask your primary care physician to discontinue the Altace and substitute another drug. For example, Lopressor, Verelan or Cozaar would be suitable alternatives. If Altace is the cause of your scalp problem, you should notice an improvement in symptoms within a couple of weeks.

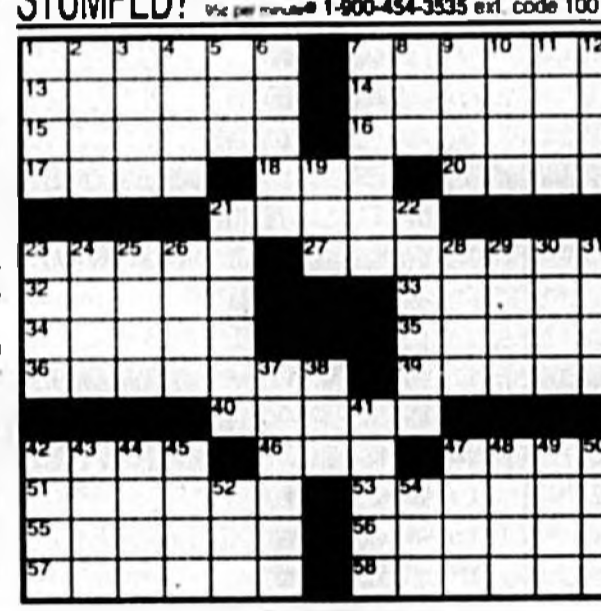

Bridge time! Here is a deal from the Bulletin, which features that unpopular topic of counting.

You reach seven no trump by a speedy route. Partner is expecting you to claim at trick one, but the duplication of distribution means that play must continue. Obviously, if the diamonds are splitting 3-2 or the jack is a singleton, you have no problem. But what if one opponent has jack-fourth? You are still all right if you can work out which opponent it is.

When in this sort of position, leave the key suit until last. Cash your nine winners in spades, hearts and clubs first, watching the opponents' cards like a turkey buzzard. Here, West shows up with five spades, two hearts and two clubs. So, he must have four diamonds. It's time to show off! Cash the diamond king, then play a diamond to dummy's nine.
