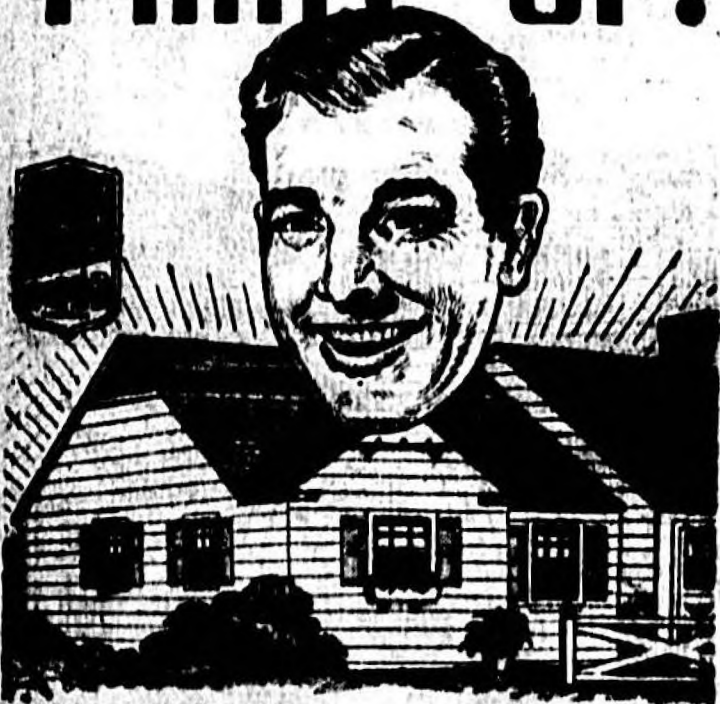

fying at a public hearing. He had understood it was to be at a closed session, the Senator said. Huber was to have testified in support of earlier statements made by Louis F. Budenz against Owen Lattimore, McCarthy said. Huber failed to appear yesterday when called to the stand by the Senate inquiry committee.

A search disclosed a note in his hotel room to Larry Kerley, a former FBI man who had accompanied McCarthy and Huber on the same flight.

It read:
"Larry—I have gone for a haircut and I have."
Although there had been some talk of foul play, McCarthy and Kerley both said the disappearance may have been only due to Huber's nervousness about a large assembly.

The committee took no action yesterday to charge Huber with contempt of Congress in ignoring his subpoena.

Meanwhile, Dr. Bella V. Dodd, ousted Communist Party official, accused Louis Budenz of having given "dishonest testimony" to Senators investigating charges of Communism in government.

Dr. Dodd made the statements under oath to the Senate foreign relations subcommittee looking into the contents of Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) that Communists and Red sympathizers have infiltrated the State Department.

She took sharp issue with the sworn testimony of Budenz, also a former Communist, that high party officials had told him Owen Lattimore was a member of a Communist cell.

Dr. Dodd said she never knew Lattimore as a Communist, a fellow traveler "or even as a friend of the party."

While Dr. Dodd spoke, Earl Browder, one time American Communist Party chief, today was subpoenaed to testify before Senate investigators what he knows about Owen Lattimore. Browder will testify at a public hearing tomorrow.

ed after it was sunk by Nationalist planes, will lead the invasion armada, it is at Dairen, Russian-occupied Manchurian port.

(The Communist one month ago set up "sea crossing headquarters" at Chapu, halfway between Shanghai and Hangchow. Since Apr. 1 only persons with special passes have been allowed in the area. Russian advisors have moved into all hotels.)

Nationalist warplanes yesterday attacked 80 small craft in the Red-held section of the Chushan group. Air headquarters said many vessels were destroyed.

Meanwhile, in Jakarta, the newly born Indonesian Central government is faced with another revolt. Reliable sources in the federal capital, said separatists on the island of Amboin in east Indonesia have proclaimed an independent state of the south Moluccas.

The Amboinese have long been the most loyal and fiercest fighters enrolled in the Netherlands East Indies army. This was the federal government's fourth revolt in its few months of existence and from all accounts it may prove the most stubborn.

Hong Kong, the U. S. Consulate said the American President Line's Gen. W. H. Gordon will evacuate between 800 and 1,000 foreigners Saturday from Red China.

The Gordon left Okinawa yesterday for Taku Bar, the port of Tientsin. It is scheduled to arrive there Friday.

The consulate said the evacuation will bring out about 50 State Department personnel, the last in Communist China. It also will cut in half the number of foreign stragglers in Shanghai since the Reds won that city last May.

An attempt last month to evacuate 1,600 foreigners including more than 300 Americans on the Lushan was blocked by the Communists. U. S. Secretary of State Acheson said the effort cost \$500,000.

In Tokyo, a Japanese who escaped recently from Russian-controlled Sakhalin was quoted today as saying the Soviets are building airfields and training pilots on that island north of Japan.

Fumio Machida told the "Nichi Shunpo" that Japanese airmen were teaching the Russians there how to fly.

Machida added: there are about 15,000 Japanese on Sakhalin "waiting a chance to return home."

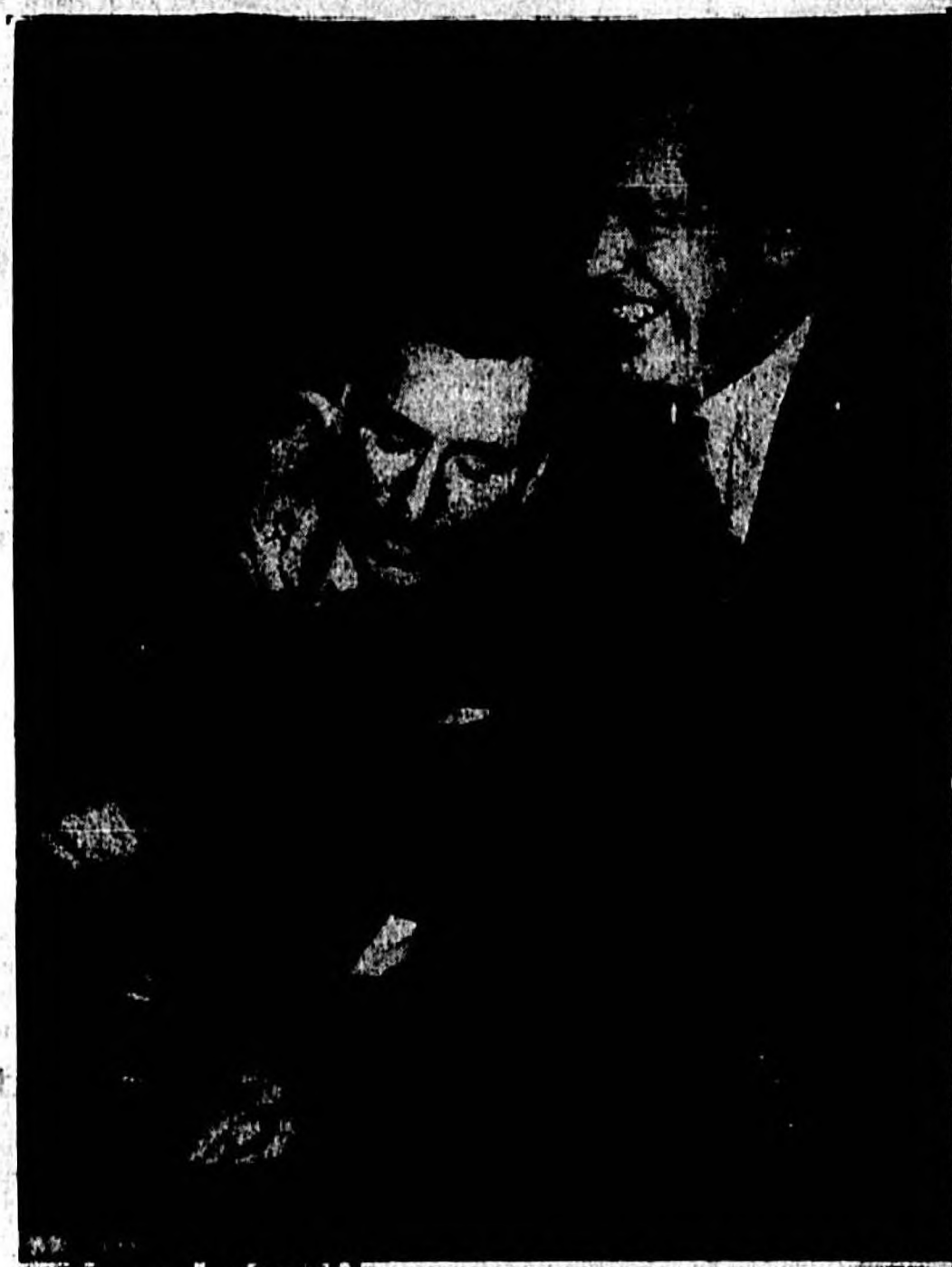

Costello Claims No Knowledge Of Gangland Tactics

Reputed King Of Underworld Says He Is Not Qualified To Help Senators

BRIDGETON, N. J., Apr. 27 (AP) — The State of New Jersey cracked down on the Western Union Telegraph Company here today to halt the transmission of money order bets on horse races.

Nelson B. Stamler, deputy attorney general, said he would obtain a warrant for the arrest of the executive in charge of Western Union's New Jersey operations in order to plug a loophole in the state's anti-gambling laws.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 27 (AP) — Frank Costello, a reputed king pin of the gambling world, testified under oath today that he is "not qualified or equipped" to give Senators information about big-time wagers in the United States.

"At the present time I'm not qualified," the Italian-born Costello said with a heavy accent.

"Why?" asked Senator McFarland (D-Ariz.).

"Maybe I don't know about it," Costello said.

The neatly-dressed Costello appeared voluntarily before a Senate Commerce subcommittee which is studying a bill designed to ban the movement of gambling information across state lines. McFarland is chairman of the group.

The subcommittee kept Costello and his attorneys, George Wolf waiting in an ante-room for more than an hour while they heard testimony from Police Chief Edward J. Allen, Jr. of Youngstown, O.

Allen told Costello "nothing more than a glorified bookmaker."

Costello was called to testify about his 1948 drive against bookmakers in which he said his force closed down 15 bookshops and a city town chief differed with previous witnesses in saying he doesn't believe local authorities are "helpless" in fighting organized gambling.

He said he resented such an "implication," but he said federal laws could help.

McFarland asked Costello if he had any more to say.

Hutchison Says Smathers Is Best Man For Senate

Record Of Candidate In Pacific Praised By "Dixie" Veteran

J. C. Hutchison, president of J. C. Hutchison & Co., commission merchants, and assistant divisional commander of the 31st (Dixie) Division which served in the Pacific Theater of Operations during the recent war, in a radio broadcast last night, announced his support of George Smathers for the United States Senate.

Declaring that the time has come for every American to stand up and be counted, Mr. Hutchison expressed his concern over the international situation and the possibility of a third World War and outlined the qualifications of Mr. Smathers which make him the best choice at this time for the office of senator.

"As a veteran of both the first and second World Wars, I am becoming increasingly concerned over the danger of a third World War," Mr. Hutchison said. "The showing down of an untrained American plane by Soviet fighters has recently caused Secretary of State Acheson to say, 'We are faced with a threat not only to our country but also to the civilization in which we live,' and only last Monday President Truman warned that the Communists are preparing to sweep up the remaining free nations of Western Europe and strengthen Russia for the ultimate attack upon the United States."

In this hour of crisis it is our duty as freedom loving Americans to re-inforce our political institutions with statements and representatives in the halls of Congress. It is our duty to uphold a traditional way of life to not open to the slightest doubt and whose concept of Americanism is above suspicion. As Washington Valley, Va., said, 'Let stand the Americans stand guard to night.'

Declaring that George Smathers is such a man, Mr. Hutchison recalled that he came from a pioneer North Carolina family who settled in Florida more than 30 years ago. Smathers was educated in the Miami public schools and the University of Florida where he was an outstanding scholar and athlete and was elected in 1906 to the University.

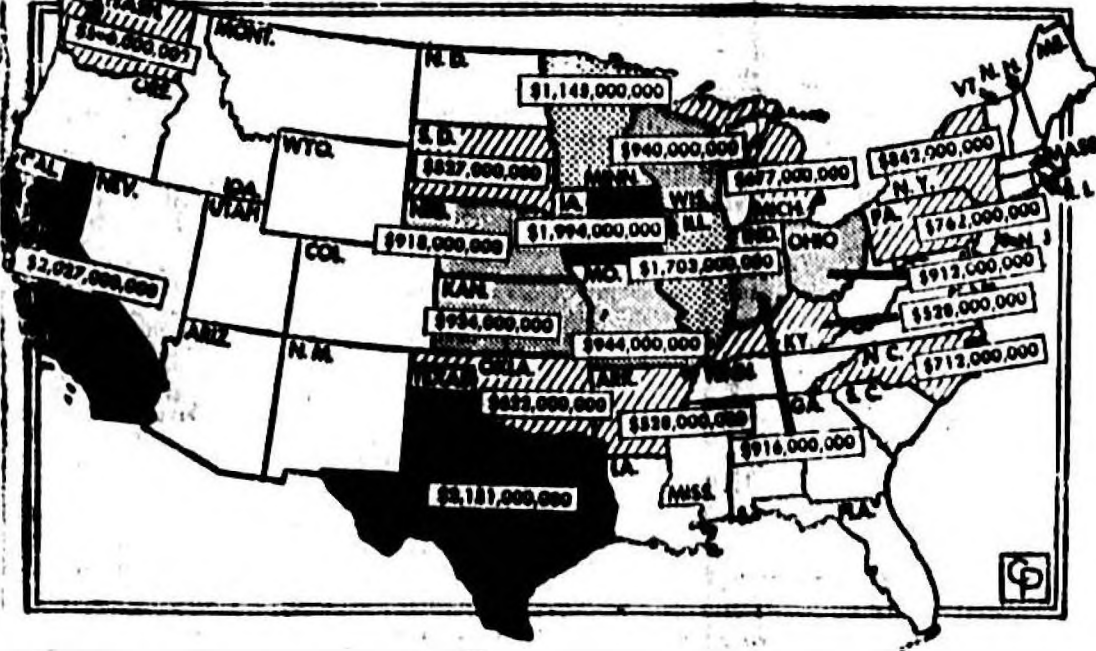
On Monday, Dr. Ruprecht will have completed 30 years of service with Florida agricultural experiment stations.

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No Commies In State Department, Declares Ex-Red Earl Browder

Red Party May Be Outlawed By Aussie Leaders

CANBERRA, Australia, Apr. 27 (AP) — Prime Minister Robert G. Menzies introduced a bill in the House of Representatives today to outlaw the Communist Party in Australia.

The sweeping measure under the Party dissolved, provides punishment for Communists who refuse to cease party activities and ban Reds from holding jobs in the government or in private firms vital to the nation's security.

Labour Party leaders, swept power in the December election, will meet May 1 to decide whether to support or oppose the bill submitted by the Liberal-Country Party coalition government. The Communist Party is strong in several Australian unions.

Meanwhile, from National headquarters in Formosa came word that the invasion of Chusan Island by Chinese Communists was expected momentarily. The island, nine miles off the China coast, is the key Nationalist blockade base for Shanghai. Reports from Chusan say the Chinese Communist Red army are massed on the island and coastal islands ready for the invasion.

The Chinese Communist radio, through the American broadcaster, California Bear, "ignored" maritime blockade in Panama, a Chinese ship off Cuba Bar Port of Panama, but Thursday, it said 20 Chinese dived as their vessel sank. The American owners of the ship said the captain made intensive and exhaustive rescue efforts for nine hours over an area of 50 square miles. The ship was carrying 200 Chinese.

While in Bangkok, Thailand, King Phumiphon, King of Thailand, will wed tomorrow a lovely young princess in a royal style blue dress.

The 22-year-old ruler of the kingdom, King Bhumibol, is the queen Sirikit Kittikarn, 17, a distant cousin. They met in Switzerland, where Phumiphon studied. They plan to return there after his coronation May 5 at Bang Pa-In.

Seminole High School Students Hear Talk By Agent Of Miami FBI

More than 100 boys and about 12 girls listened with rapt attention this morning to J. B. Fitzgerald, agent from the Miami office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation as he outlined the requirements of becoming a special agent of the FBI at a salary of \$5,000 a year.

Mr. Fitzgerald was one of 30 representatives of various professions who between 10:00 o'clock and noon, spoke in the various classrooms of Seminole High School to pupils who had chosen to be informed regarding various types of work.

The students were enthusiastic over the talk, judging from their excited conversation afterwards. Accompanying Mr. Fitzgerald here from Orlando, where he had arrived by plane from Miami, was H. W. Swinney, resident agent of the FBI with headquarters in Orlando.

Former Party Chief Clears Lattimore; Hollywood Investigation Is Off

WASHINGTON, Apr. 27 (AP) — Earl Browder added new confusion today to the conflicting versions of testimony in the Senate Communist investigation.

Browder contradicted previous testimony by Louis F. Budenz that Owen Lattimore belonged to a "Communist cell," and that Communist leaders agreed at a meeting in October, 1947, that Lattimore was to direct an organization of writers in putting across the idea that Chinese Communists were merely a bunch of agrarian reformers.

It was one former Communist leader's word against another's. Browder once was the head of the Communist Party in the United States but was kicked out in 1946 on the ground that he showed capitalist leanings. Budenz, former editor of the Communist Daily Worker in New York, renounced Communism a few years ago and rejoined the Catholic Church.

Lattimore is a professor at Johns Hopkins University, rated in expert on Far Eastern affairs. He occasionally has advised the State Department on matters affecting the Orient. Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) has called him a top Kremlin agent and described him as the chief architect of U. S. policy in the Far East. Lattimore has been in the East since 1945.

The "Free" Mail

When the Post Office Department is brought into discussion of federal economy, the amount of unstamped mail carried for the government is usually mentioned. There is likely to be sharp comment on the amazing amount of this mail, and its cost to the Department, but there the matter is left. Any suggestion that government offices should pay for their mail is met with the argument that it would be taking money from one pocket to put it into another; the government would be paying itself for carrying its own mail.

Arkansas Notables
