

Inquires About Talk Site Hanoi Seeking Peace?

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — North Vietnam has asked the governments of Laos, Cambodia and Burma if their capitals are available for preliminary Vietnam peace talks, a well-known London source said today.

U.S. Embassy sources admitted they had heard of the request but said they were not sure if it was serious.

High Laotian officials said they did not know how firm the North Vietnamese were and that the Laotians were adopting a "wait and see" attitude.

The London source who received the North Vietnamese message said it was made on New Year's Day by Nguyen Chan, the North Vietnamese Foreign Minister, to Prime Phouma of Laos.

The premier reportedly agreed that Vietnam could be the site for any talks that might be held in the region.

But London officials expressed doubt that Phouma would be a likely site.

Nguyen Chan is scheduled to fly to Hanoi Friday to report to his government.

Pinned Between Hammer and Anvil

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New Polar Invasion Threatens Midwest

Severe cold—some of the worst of the season—numbered the Northern Plains today while freezing drizzle again plagued the country from Oklahoma to the Appalachians.

The latest in a rapid succession of Arctic cold snaps pushed the mercury down to 33 below zero at Williston, in western North Dakota, before dawn. The Weather Bureau indicated readings lower than 40 below were likely.

The new polar invasion was expected to overgrip the entire Midwest by Friday.

Driving remained hazardous for residents of Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kentucky and Tennessee as the result of an onslaught of freezing drizzle, sleet and light snow which has plagued the region since New Year's Day.

Heavy snow warnings were issued for states east of the ice storm belt. The Weather Bureau forecast accumulations of more than 4 inches for mountain sections of the Virginia and Maryland, already coated with ice after Wednesday's sleet and freezing rain.

The Christmas-New Year's holiday continued for many school children in Oklahoma, Kentucky and Tennessee due to ice-coated highways which perked bus and auto traffic. Kentucky officials reported at least 10 county school systems shut down. Several county school systems also remained closed for the third day in Tennessee, including Nashville.

Business places in some communities in middle Tennessee cut off some work shifts Wednesday due to the ice storm. Kentucky State Police posted hazardous driving warnings throughout their state and closed down more than 135 miles of U.S. 31W to and from Bowling Green Wednesday night due to severe icing. Three highway out of the city were blocked by jackknifed tractor-trailer trucks. An added hazard was a forecast of an inch of snow with incoming cold weather.

Dr. Bialberg received Tuesday the heart of a young boy, who had no solid foods yet.

Dr. Jacobus Burger, medical superintendent of the hospital, said the chances were "very good" that the 38-year-old patient's body would reject the heart.

Human Sexual Behavior In New Study
NEW YORK (AP) — Scientists today presented findings from new studies of human sexual behavior, listing among general conclusions:

"There has been 'no sexual revolution' strictly speaking, rather more a continuation of long existing trends.

"College coeds continue to equate their first sexual intercourse with love, whereas men continue to be opportunistic.

"Newer contraceptive devices do NOT seem to have prompted any rise in the percentage of women having intercourse before marriage.

"Use of birth control devices doesn't seem to lead to increased sexual activity much as to increased enjoyment.

The scientists addressed sessions of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. Paul H. Gebhard, director of the Institute for Sex Research at Indiana University founded by the late Dr. Alfred C. Kinsey, described first results from a 1967 survey among nearly 1,200 men and women, in colleges across the nation, compared with findings from similar questioning of about a million college students in the 1940's and early 1950's — a generation or nearly 20 years ago.

So far, he said, "all this sounds like a continuation of the trend toward sexual equality with the female being regarded both by males and by herself as less a sexual object to be exploited, and more as a fellow human with her own needs, expectations, and rights."

Last-Born Quint Dies; Others OK

BRISBANE, Australia (AP)—The last-born of a quintuplet died today in the age of four days. There was no indication that any of the other four babies were threatened.

The attending obstetrician announced that Geoffrey, the youngest of the quintuplets, died in mid-afternoon. A hospital bulletin earlier today had reported all five babies in satisfactory condition.

The quint, Australia's first, were born within one hour and 15 minutes Sunday. Mrs. Irene M. gave birth six weeks and a few days prematurely but until today the quint had been progressing so well it was thought they might leave the hospital before the anticipated six to eight weeks.

Geoffrey, who weighed 2 1/2 pounds 10 ounces, the same as his brother Richard Gibson and sister Faith Elizabeth, when the babies were first weighed 30 hours after birth. Annabel Dorothy then was the largest of the five at 3 pounds 14 ounces and Caroline Jean the smallest at 2 pounds 5 1/2 ounces.

The fraternal, who live in Footscray, 200 miles from Brisbane, have four other children, including twins born a year ago. Their father, Roger Ibrahim, a 34-year-old lawyer, had his first look at the tiny quintuplets Wednesday. Their pediatrician reduced the humidity concentration in the babies' incubator, after the attending physician, Dr. Ibrahim, revealed Wednesday that after the birth of his twins, he had insured his wife's latest pregnancy against a multiple birth. But because of a clause stipulating no payment in case of a birth more than six weeks before the stipulated date, he did not know whether he would receive the \$400.

The birth of quintuplets has become more frequent since the development of hormone fertility treatments which also are liable to produce multiple births.

But Mrs. Ibrahim took no such treatments, and three American doctors writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association in 1964 concluded that for such mothers quintuplet pregnancies occur once in every 15 to 20 million births.

Despite this rarity, a 25-year-old Indian woman gave birth to quintuplets in Motere, Oklahoma, at a government hospital there reported Monday, but one of the babies—a girl—died. Three girls and a boy survived.

Gas-Wracked Village Returns To Normalcy

DUNREITH, Ind. (AP)—Residents of this explosion-riddled community were back in their homes today for the first time since a New Year's night train crash left the threat of deadly chemical fumes.

All 226 residents were evacuated shortly after two Pennsylvania Railroad freight trains derailed, wrecking tank cars filled with ammonia and gasoline.

Authorities said a broken piece of rail caused cars from one train to jump the track and smash into the other. Explosions in the molten ammonia spread flames through the wreckage, destroyed three homes and the town's only industry and shattered windows in homes for blocks around.

Roads townspeople returned Wednesday night to begin clearing blast-hurled debris from yards and repairing homes.

However, other residents remained at homes of relatives and friends until completely assured of no further threat from fumes.

State police said the last threat ended Wednesday when crews drained 20,000 gallons of crystals from a damaged tank car.

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FSU Student Freed In Friend's Death

TAILAHASSEE (AP)—A Florida State University student has been released after shooting to death a close friend and fraternity brother with the victim's own gun, according to Leon County Sheriff William Joyce.

Joyce said the death Wednesday of Theodore Franklin Lane, 21, of Miami Beach, was "very possibly an accident."

He said fraternity brother David L. Kout, also 21 of Miami Beach, admitted the shooting and was released without any charges being filed against him after he and five or six eyewitnesses were questioned.

Another fraternity brother, Ed Lerner of Miami, did not see the shooting but said he understood it was an accident.

Lane and Kout, both seniors in the school of social welfare, "had been good friends for many years," said Lerner.

Lane was slung in the shoulder and he and Kout were "messing around" when Lane was shot with his own .32 caliber pistol, Lerner said. He said Lane usually kept blanks in the gun.

A coroner's jury was called in to view the scene and the body late Wednesday afternoon, the sheriff said, and a hearing to determine the official cause of death will be held later.

Booze Builds N. C. Town

JAMESTOWN, N.C. (AP)—High Point, a city with a population of more than 25,000, twice in recent years High Point, voted for its many bars to close its doors against establishing ABC liquor stores.

"It's a tiny place with no police force and only 1,300 residents, but in six years it has received profits of more than \$1.5 million from its alcoholic Beverage Control store," says Carl Wester, administrator of the North Carolina ABC system. "I don't know of a retail liquor outlet in America for the size of the town that sells as much liquor. During the past fiscal year the Jamestown store had sales totaling more than \$2.3 million."

The store, which has six clerks, is only a stone's throw from the corporate limits of High Point, a city with a population of more than 25,000.

Wester estimated that 95 per cent of the business at the Jamestown store comes from High Point.

"Let's face it," said one Jamestown merchant, "the store was built to get High Point business."

Mayor Thomas C. Baggett said, "The store hasn't caused us any trouble. The funds have enabled us to get some projects that we wouldn't have had otherwise."

The progressive industrial community has a new \$750,000 colonial-style town hall, a new five track, a \$250,000 sewage system and has spent \$200,000 for street improvements. In addition, the town has a tax rate of only 43 cents per \$100 property valuation.

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13 GIs Trapped 'But Lord Was With Us'

LANDING ZONE BURT, Vietnam (AP) — Sgt. Mark Ridley and his 12 men were caught in the middle, 40 yards from their lines, when 2,000 enemy soldiers burst through at this American infantry post in the bloodiest Communist violation of the New Year's truce.

"The Lord was with us. I can think of no other reason that we came through," said Ridley, a soft-spoken Texan from San Antonio. Six of his men were wounded, but none was killed. Ridley led his 12-man patrol

out of the landing zone perimeter near the Cambodian border at 8 p.m. Monday night, 10 hours before the allied cease-fire expired and five hours before the end of the Viet Cong truce period to set up an ambush against any enemy offensive that might develop.

Three hours later, four battalions of North Vietnamese regulars and Viet Cong guerrillas began repeated attacks against this field position of the U.S. 25th Infantry Division's 3rd Brigade.

The first charge came two hours before the Viet Cong truce ended at 1 a.m. Tuesday, and the enemy assaults continued until after dawn.

The U.S. commanders said 374 of the enemy were killed and five captured, while American casualties were 23 killed and 150 wounded.

"We got set up in our ambush position about 450 meters east of the perimeter and then I heard their rounds hitting the brigade," Ridley said.

The enemy followed the mortar barrage with a ground attack, right past Ridley.

"We saw three NVA (North Vietnamese soldiers) coming from the direction of the perimeter and I gave the order to open up. We got them," the sergeant continued.

"Then I saw another two heading toward the perimeter. I threw a grenade and blew them apart."

Sanford Peace Justice W. Hook Ingram was given a similar choice in November and also was suspended when he refused to step down.

Kirk's advisory committee will meet within the next three days to discuss a replacement for Kelsey.

Port Gets Go-Ahead

Check in the amount of \$71,630 was deposited today by the Seminole County Port Authority with the Circuit Court clerk to insure payment for 80 acres of land being acquired through the right of eminent domain for the Port of Sanford on the St. Johns River.

The deposit is double the appraisal of the privately owned property. Actual price will be determined by a jury in condemnation proceedings at a later date.

The check was deposited after Circuit Court Judge Tom Wadley approved a "order of taking" for the 80 acres. This permits the Port Authority to take the land until title is acquired under the condemnation proceedings.

Administrator Francis Bounhall III said also today that the finalized buildings plans for the port will be received from the engineers in time for the authority's Jan. 15 meeting.

Copies of the plans also will be submitted to the U. S. Office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for its approval. HUD has agreed to submit a bid of 4 1/2 per cent on the Port Authority's \$300,000 bond issue, revenue from which will be used for the payment of construction costs.

With approval of the plans by HUD the Port Authority will be authorized to borrow from local banks to finance construction.

It is expected the Port of Sanford will be in operation by October.

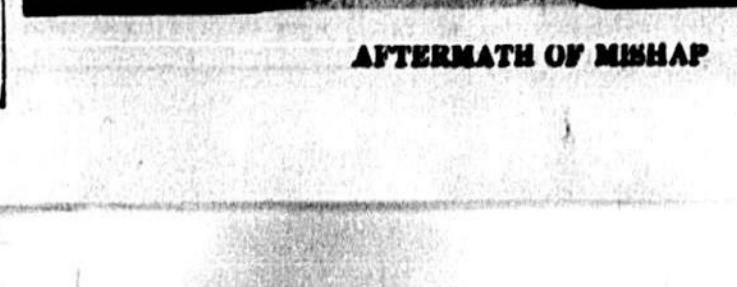
