**APALACHICOLA (UPI)**—The eye of Hurricane Alma collided with the Florida panhandle; it hammered the coastline with high winds and tides, carrying heavy rains through Florida and into Alabama and Georgia.

Alma, which claimed a total of 11 lives in a pass over Cuba and glancing blows at the Florida Gulf Coast, finally plunged directly ashore on the U. S. mainland at noon when its 10-mile-an-hour central winds were felt at this fishing city.

The Weather Bureau warned that the storm would be severe in 10 feet could be expected to storm the shore as far south as Sarasota, Fla. "Our main concern is water damage," said Mayor James Dwyer of Apalachicola as the eye struck. "If the wind shifts drastically and brings in a flood tide, we've had it."

Alma sent 75 mph winds northward and caused spinning debris during the night as it churned steadily northward, approximately 35-45 miles offshore on Florida's west coast.

Hurricane Alma caused 2.51 inches of rain to be dumped on the Sanford area Wednesday night and early today. Winds were recorded at 23 mph, with gusts up to 40 mph. Little or no damage was reported in the area, excepting tree branches blown down. Aircraft at Sanford Naval Air Station were evacuated as a precautionary measure. Minor power lines were knocked down in Sanford and Cassberry for a short time. Eight Red Cross shelters were opened during the night but only about 15 persons took refuge.

The incoming tides and waves were viewed with apprehension.

These were the cause of Alma's worst destruction in its path through the Caribbean.

Backlash floods in Honduras and fishing villages with a possible loss of 100 lives. Two men died and 4,000 persons sought refuge from flood waters in Nicaragua.

The hurricane killed four persons in Cuba and 20,000 persons were evacuated in four provinces in the Havana area. At least 54 persons were injured.

A 16-year-old Miami youth, Raymond Willis, was electrocuted when he walked into a downed power line, and a companion was injured by the same hot wire.

A tornado spawned by the hurricane struck the Coral Gables, spinning a police car around like a top but not hurting the driver.

Winds of 90 mph raked Sanibel and Captiva islands, knocking a teacher and principal, it can be said.

# Road Question Still Considered

County Attorney Harold Johnson was instructed to advise developers of the Johns River Estates the county commission is considering permitting them to construct streets in the subdivision, with modifications of the 1958 agreement and provisions for adequate drainage.

A representative of the area appeared at commission meeting, urging "some action be taken as early as possible," advising residents would receive 100 feet of the entrance road being paved as proposed by the developer instead of the 200 feet originally planned. The county commission will see to it the job is done.

County Road Supt. J. C. Lavender reported the work could not commence for at least four to six months if the county does the job.

In other issues before the board, Johnson gave the commission the county has jurisdiction to compel a logging company to cease operations on the West River, jurisdiction would be either with the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission or the trustees of the Internal Improvement Fund.

The attorney was authorized to write the Long Range Planning Committee of the Chamber of Commerce stating the commission's support of game management sites in the Black Hammock area with conference of the property owners.

The commission agreed to ask County Engineer R. J. Bush to review the request of Sanford City Manager Peter Knowles that blinker traffic lights be installed at 2315 Street and Old Lake Mary Road; decided to grant permission to the North Orlando Volunteer Fire Department to use the portable voting booth until the November elections and ordered the one in Geneva and two in the Sanford area be picked up; delayed further discussion on obtaining microfilm equipment until vacationing County Clerk Arthur Beckwith can be present.

Took under advisement a request of Civil Defense Director Herbert Johnson that CD units be shown to city employees during working hours; authorized purchase of several pieces of equipment for agricultural laboratory from Camp Bleeding Military Surplus Equipment Outlet at recommendation of County Agent Cecil Tucker.

Agreed to remove plot of land lying between Lake Harney and 314 46 from A-1 to R-1, and the Turkey Farm from A-1 to R-3, and a section near the intersection of I-4 and SR 424 from R-1 to C-2. All changes were at recommendation of the county zoning board.

**HURRICANE TOOK FIVE VICTIMS**  
MIAMI (UPI) — Hurricane Alma, moving up the Gulf of Mexico, reached a new Florida and took its fifth victim Wednesday night, electrocuting a 17-year-old boy.

Raymond Willis and a companion were struck by a hot wire, broken down by Alma's strong winds. Willis was killed instantly by the electric line and his friend, unidentified, was reported in "fair" condition at a hospital here today.

Alma had earlier killed four persons in a slashing march across Cuba.

**ALMA WAS AN EARLY BIRD**  
MIAMI (UPI) — Hurricane Alma was a real early bird compared to Alma in 1965, which didn't form until Aug. 21 and worked its way to the north Atlantic without doing any harm to land.

The next storm of 1965, however, was the deadly Betty which blew up on Aug. 27 and struck Florida and Louisiana before reaching an end Sept. 16. Betty left 73 dead and caused more than \$1.4 billion in damage.

The other storms of 1965 were Carol, beginning Sept. 16; Debbie, beginning Sept. 22, and Elena, beginning Oct. 22. All disappeared without causing significant damage to land areas.

Lo and behold, she sneezed her last at 3 a. m. on Wednesday.

The fan who plunks his money down at the gate benefited additionally by the merger when it was agreed all existing franchise would be retained and never be shifted to the other cities. Baseball fans: please take note: Four new franchises are to be added, but they won't disturb the old ones. That's another bonus for pro football fans.

Davis and David (Sonny) Werblin, owner of the New York Jets, died the hardest. They were all for continuing the fight, believing they could ultimately bring the NFL to its knees.

If there is any hero in the whole business, it has to be Davis, who still isn't completely happy. He wants to see the AFL paying that \$18 million to the NFL.

But he was smiling most of the time Wednesday in his New York office and had a right to as the freshly-named commissioner of the AFL whose reputation for recruiting struck fear into the hearts of the NFL owners, and caused them many second thoughts about continuing the fight.

The goal? Oh, yes, there was one of those too. Most of the fingers, even in his own league pointed at Wellington Mara of the New York Giants. The general grumbling about Mara boiled down to this oft-repeated phrase:

"Him and his Pete Gop-lak."

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# Aaron Even With Maris In Homer Derby

Frank Aaron, the newest entry in baseball's homer derby, is running in some pretty fast company. With the race on third over, he is head-and-head with Roger Maris and four length ahead of Hack Wilson.

The 21-year-old Aaron, who entered the season with the highest batting average among active National League players, never has been regarded as a super slugger in the tradition of Ruth, Foy and Williams, Etc. That is, until this year.

Aaron, a slim 176 pounds, has slammed 20 home runs in the first 46 games, an average that puts him dead even with Maris, whose 61 homers in 1961 is the all-time major league mark, and four games ahead of Wilson, who set the National League standard of 56 in 1950.

It's not that Aaron has ignored the home run ball in past years. His 418 career blows is the 10th best in baseball annals and he twice led the N.L. in that department with personal highs of 44.

But the Braves' rightfielder never had chased the ghost of Ruth through the summer prior to this year. Aaron edged Maris 4-3 in the 14th inning before their second game was halted by curfew.

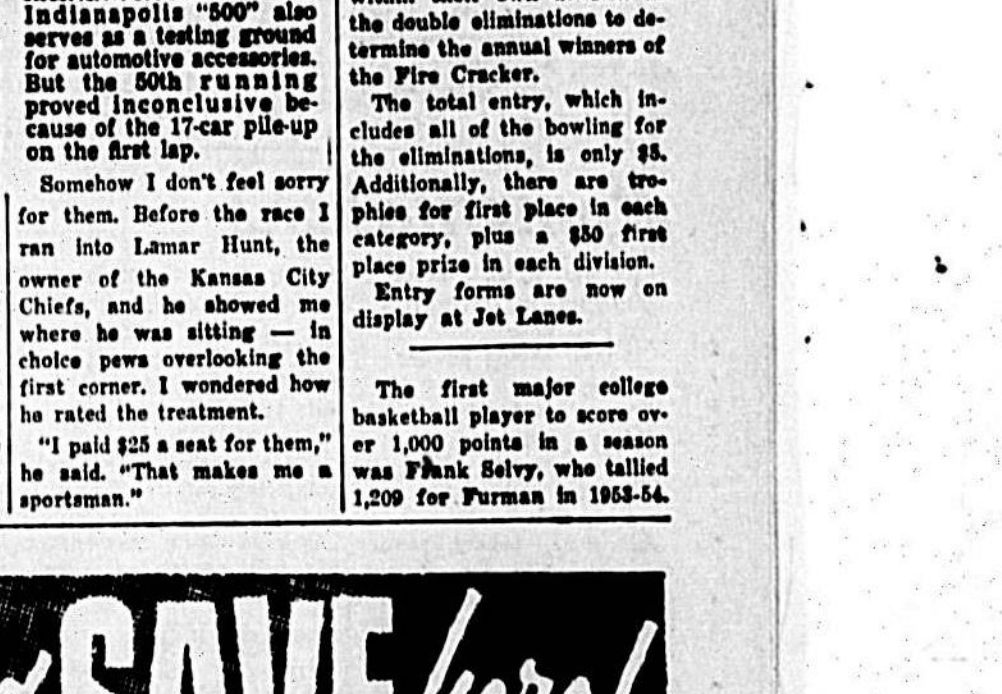

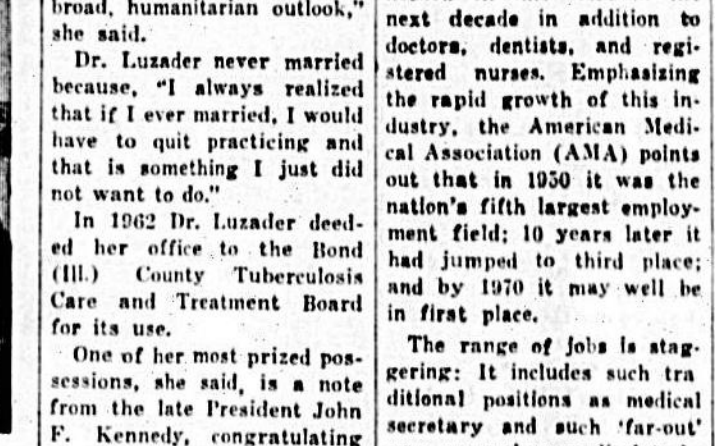
# Becky Tanner Awarded National Piano Honor

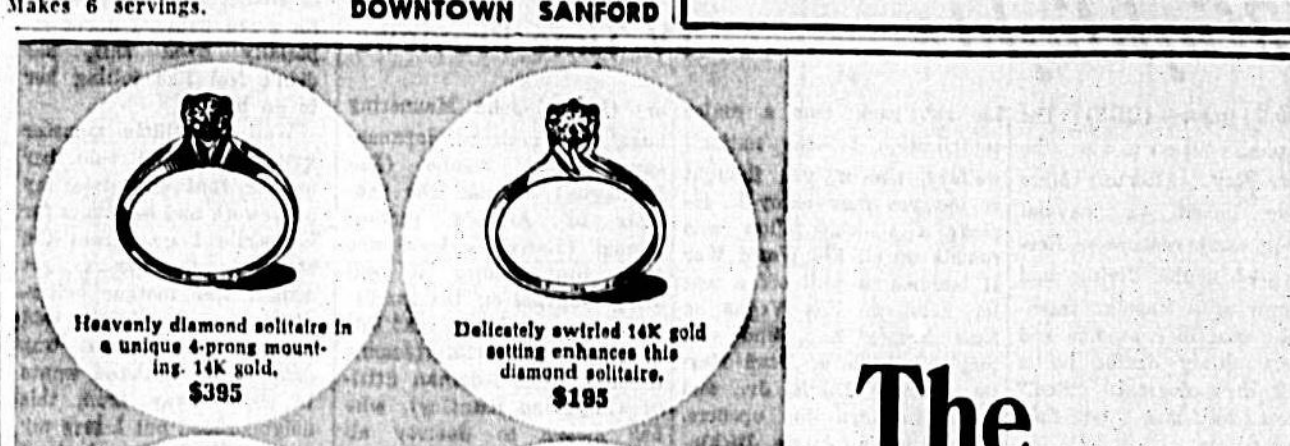
