### Civic Assn. To Ask For Custody Of Building

The North Orlando Civic Assn. Monday night voted to approach the North Orlando Co. with a plan wherein complete custody of the Community Building in the Recreation Area would be turned over to the association.

F. Stewart Helmly, president, will talk with company officials and Art Rhodes, Roy Burke and Bill Harris will draw up estimates on what costs would be involved to reopen and repair the building.

The auditing committee Rhodes and Bob Derum reported that the books had been found in perfect condition with no unpaid bills before turning them over to Mrs. James Grinstead, treasurer. Members voted to transfer the bank account to South Seminole Bank in Fern Park and approved the execution of the bank resolution authorizing the association to file signatures.

Rhodes, who also is ways and means chairman, included in his report a suggestion that an active welcoming committee be formed immediately to greet new residents and to invite them to become members of the association.

He proposed that the group sponsor a Spring Carnival pointing out that this would provide entertainment and fun for adults and children alike and also would provide stimulus for further summer programs.

Helmly and Derum agreed to contact all committee heads in an effort to get the various committees on an active working basis and asked that reports from each be ready for the next executive board meeting to be held on the fourth Monday of the month. All future meetings of the board will be held on this schedule with the next month's to be at Helmly's office in the North Orlando Co. Building.

Another suggestion from Rhodes called for installation of a bulletin board near the general store as a convenience for residents and organizations of the village to post meeting notices and items of interest to the community.

Bill Harris and Roy Burke were appointed to complete the project.

The group also voted to begin work immediately on publishing a local newspaper to be delivered to all village residents. A committee of five will be organized and

cooperation will be asked for other groups in providing monthly news items. Membership lists will be

drawn up by Mrs. Grinstead and distributed to all active participants before the March meeting in order that per-

sonal contacts can be made with each person on the membership roster in advance. At the March meeting a

nominating committee will be elected to prepare and present a list of two candidates for each office at the April meeting. Plans for monthly programs will be discussed at the next executive board meeting.

### Foundation Completed For New Water Tank

Casselberry Utilities Co. completed work this week on the foundation for a 116,000 gallon prefabricated metal water tank in the first phase of its \$27,000 major improvement program to provide some 800 customers with better water and service.

An aeration tank to be constructed by Jack Sharpe of Orlando adjacent to the present water tower and facilities at the Queens Mirror South Well also will be improved.

### EDITORIAL COMMENT Double Duty

A county fire report for the month of January was released today by Ranger Albert Harris of the Florida Forestry Dept. at Longwood.

Rangers, called out to 25 wild fires and eight miscellaneous fires, issued 17 warning tickets and filed three court cases.

Percentage breakdown shows that 60 per cent of the fires resulted from escaped trash fires, 15 per cent were deliberately set, 15 per cent were caused by children playing with matches and 10 per cent were attributed to carelessness of smokers, campers and other persons.

The Forestry Service presently is engaged in an intensive educational program through which rangers visit various youth clubs, school groups and other organizations to present lectures and films on fire control.

Company Superintendent Paul Bates said today that he hopes to have the new tank in operation by the end of the month.

Actual work on the improvement program was started some two weeks ago by the company after it was given the go ahead on a long debated water rate raise at a Jan. 21 meeting of the Casselberry Board of Aldermen.

Approval of the raise was given at that time by a 3-2 vote of the board which saw Alderman L. E. Woodhams and Board Chairman Ed Lunn voting against the proposal and Alderman Art Lego, Cliff Overman and George Howard for it.

The raise, without which the company said it would be unable to carry out the improvements called for by the State Board of Health, sets the minimum at \$3.50 up to 7,000 gallons; 25 cents per thousand up to 20,000 gallons and 22 cents per thousand thereafter.

# Cleveland Quits House; Frederick To Run

## Dunn: A Question Mark

Hats were being tossed into the political arena today for the special Legislature election on March 26.

Mack Cleveland Jr. telegraphed Gov. Farris Bryant his resignation as Seminole County Representative in the House. At the same time he formally announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Seminole County's new seat in the Senate under the new reapportionment law.

Former Rep. Gordon Frederick immediately announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination to fill Cleveland's unexpired term in the House.

Vernon W. Dunn, former County Commissioner, said he still is undecided whether he will oppose Frederick in the party primary Feb. 26.

Don Willson, Republican county executive committee chairman, also stated the GOP will have candidates in the ring. He added the committee will meet within the next few days, at which time it is expected candidates will announce their intention to seek the Republican party nominations for Senate and House seats.

Candidates have until noon next Friday to qualify with the Secretary of State.

Frederick said he already has requested qualifying blanks from the State Secretary's office. He also said his campaign fund still is intact and it will not be necessary for him to re-establish it.

# Federal-Okayed Apportionment Will Go To Supreme Court

MIAMI (UPI)—A federal court accepted Florida's reapportionment plan Thursday, temporarily ending the state's eight-year-old redistricting hassle.

Reaction ran the gamut from relief to disappointment, with some opponents protesting the 43-senator, 112-representative formula passed by a special session of the Legislature last Friday does not break the small-county "stranglehold" on the Senate.

Miami attorneys Richard H. Max Swann and Peter Sobel, who filed the original suit bringing the reapportionment struggle into federal court, said they were disappointed and made plans to appeal the decision to the U. S. Supreme Court. Swann said he would file his appeal "as soon as I can."

The three-judge federal panel announced its acceptance Thursday after hearing two hours of arguments for and against the plan.

The opposing sides clashed over whether the new plan was an improvement over the 40-Senator, 135-Representative formula turned down at the polls last November.

Sobel called the plan "a turn for the worse."

Atty. Gen. Richard E. Levin, on the other hand, called the formula "truly representative" of all the people.

The court ruled the new formula "does not in any way violate the Constitution of the United States."

The court in its ruling, said: "Although we would not have directed multiple senatorial representation for any county, we certainly should not prohibit it if the state desires it. Our function begins and ends with the determination of rationality and whether there is invidious discrimination."

The Chamber unanimously voted to recommend to the County Commission that an interchange to new Interstate 4 be located on Lake Mary Blvd.

Members also signed a petition addressed to the Seminole County Legislative Delegation expressing opposition to any annexation in the State of Florida without a referendum vote of the property owners involved.

Officers and directors will meet next Thursday night to name a chairman.

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# Revolt Hits Iraq

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI)—Army and air force units rebelled in Iraq today, overthrowing the government and announced that Premier Abdel Karim Kassem was slain.

Word of the revolt came from rebel radio broadcasts and diplomatic dispatches to capitals throughout the Middle East.

Reports reaching Ankara Turkey, said Kassem's headquarters in the Defense Ministry building were bombed at 8:30 a. m. and the structure reduced to rubble, with Kassem possibly buried in the wreckage. Rebel broadcasts indicated his body may have been dragged into the streets for the public to see.

Brigadier Abdel Karim Mustafa was named leader of the new ruling junta. He was identified as commander of the Erramadi garrison in the suburbs of Baghdad, but little else was known about him.

The revolt apparently had its focal point in the capital of Baghdad, legendary Arabian Nights city. The rebels also claimed military support throughout the country. They indicated they were in control of the situation and that officers and officials loyal to Kassem had been arrested or were in flight.

There were reports of gunfire in Baghdad, but there was no information available on casualties. The borders were sealed, all airports closed and all radio stations in rebel hands. A 3 p. m. curfew was imposed.

## Pressure Put On Cuba Buildup

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy was reported today to be stepping up pressure on Russia to pull its military forces out of Cuba.

Informed sources said the President planned to send a personal message to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev asking him just when he was going to keep his promise to remove these armed units from the doorstep of the United States. These sources said they did not know whether the message had actually been dispatched as yet.

The President said Thursday the continued presence in Cuba of an estimated 17,000 Soviet military personnel, including about 6,000 organized into regular combat units, was a "matter of concern to us."

## U. S. Navigator Found Safe

SAIGON (UPI)—The American navigator of a B26 bomber which crashed Wednesday while on a strafing mission against Viet Cong guerrillas was rescued "in good shape" today, a U. S. Military spokesman reported.

The navigator was identified as 1st Lt. James E. Johnson of Mary Esther, Fla.

The spokesman said Johnson was picked up near the crash site, about 250 miles north of here.

Two others aboard the plane—a U. S. officer and a Vietnamese—were believed to have been killed in the crash.

## Longwood Paves Way For New Light Industry

The way was cleared in Longwood Thursday night for a new light industry when the City Council unanimously approved an ordinance changing zoning from commercial to industrial on an area adjacent to the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad off Molnar Ave.

The zoning variance was requested some two months ago by Russell Bass, owner-manager of Master Door Co. Inc., of Orlando, who at that time advised the council he would permanently locate his plant in Longwood.

First steps in a plan to revamp the city's street marking system to have all streets run north and south and all avenues run east and west were taken by voting to change the designations on a number of each. Avenues to be changed to streets include Highland, Wayman, Myrtle, E. Lake, Wilma, W. Lake, Sarah and Charles. Streets to be changed to avenues are 14th, 13th, Ninth, Eighth, Seventh, Jessup, Church, Warren, Bay, Pine, Short, Evergreen, Milne, Lake and Tullis.

Portions of avenues to be changed to streets are located on Grant, Oak and Oleander and portions of streets to be changed to avenues are on 12th, Orange, Palmetto and Magnolia.

Molnar Ave. will be renamed Sanlando Springs Drive and Florida Ave. will be changed to Land Ave.

The city voted to go head with repairs on Markham Rd., both in and out of the city limits, setting a \$100 maximum for material expenditures. Although the final vote was unanimous, Chairman R. C. Carlson was strongly opposed to making any repairs on the county's part of the road, however, at the insistence of Councilman John Reams, at least two areas which are not in the city were included in the motion. Mayor Al Lormann agreed with Carlson while Jim Reiter agreed with Reams pointing out that if the county's part is not repaired, the city repairs will not last more than six months.

Clay for the work and for other jobs through the year will be bought through bid with the delivery to be made in Longwood as it is needed.

## Resident Hurt In Car Mishap

Kyle S. McMillan, 41, of 2403 Orange Avenue, suffered severe lacerations of the scalp at about 7:30 a. m. today when he was forced off Highway 17-92 at Fern Park by another automobile.

Trooper Bill Stringfield reported McMillan swerved his car to avoid an unidentified automobile which pulled in front of him. His car left the road and overturned.

McMillan was treated at Seminole Memorial Hospital and released.

The trooper also reported that J. McKay Truluck, 411 Elliott Avenue, suffered a broken jaw and lacerations Thursday afternoon in a freak accident. He is confined to Seminole Memorial Hospital.

Stringfield, who charged Truluck with driving too fast for road conditions, said Truluck's car, when it struck the railroad tracks on Beardall Avenue, went into the ditch and overturned. Damage to the car was estimated at \$900.

## New Industry A Year Away

The fact that locating Master Door Co. in Longwood is a long range project, still probably at least a year away, was stressed today by Russell Bass, owner-manager of the plant.

Bass said that the Longwood action last Thursday night in approving the necessary zoning change actually only cleared the way for negotiations towards an agreement between his company and Atlantic Coast Line.

Investigation and consideration of county and city tax structures also will play a large part in moving the plant, Bass said.

The company, presently located in Orlando, is a light manufacturing operation similar to that of a small lumber yard.

# All-Out Hunt For Tanker, 39 Aboard

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (UPI)—An air search was launched today in the Atlantic and Gulf for a missing tanker carrying 39 crewmen and a cargo of molten sulphur overdue on a voyage from Beaumont, Tex., to Norfolk, Va.

Coast Guard 5th District Headquarters here said the 523-foot American tanker Marine Sulphur Queen left Beaumont Saturday night and was due in Norfolk at noon Thursday.

It should have contacted its Norfolk agent by radio at noon Tuesday and again Wednesday but the Coast Guard said there had been no word from the ship since it left Beaumont.

Four Coast Guard planes began covering the vessel's route early today. The Coast Guard said the entire route would be searched twice.

The Coast Guard said the 7,240-ton ship, built in 1944, was carrying a cargo of molten sulphur kept at a constant temperature of 265 degrees.

The Coast Guard tried to contact the ship by radio and sent an "urgent broadcast" to all ships in the vicinity of the tanker's course to watch for it.

A Coast Guard search plane reported sighting a tanker thought to be the missing vessel 60 miles south of Cape Lookout, N. C. However, the Coast Guard said this ship was the Marine Dow-Chem, not the missing tanker.

A Coast Guard spokesman said it was possible the Sulphur Queen changed course to avoid a storm that hampered the southeast Atlantic Coast earlier in the week. This could delay the ship by a day or two.

The ship was supposed to have radiocoded Hovler Co., its agent at Norfolk, Va. 48 hours before reaching the Virginia Capes and again 24 hours before arrival.

The vessel, built at Chester, Pa., originally was known as the Esso New Haven. Its name was changed in 1960. It is owned by Marine Sulphur Transport Co. of New York.

A Coast Guard plane from Elizabeth City, N. C., was searching from the Chesapeake Bay south to Cape Lookout. Planes from Miami, Biloxi, Miss., New Orleans and Corpus Christi, Tex., searched the South Atlantic and the Gulf area.

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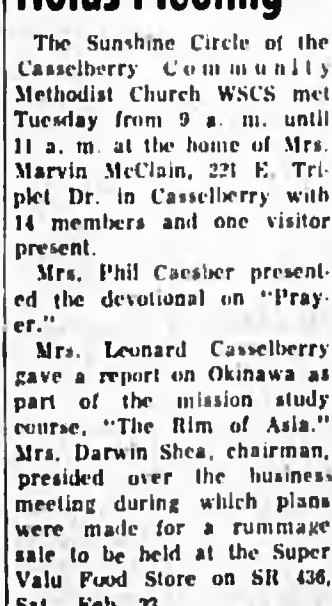
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## Rain Shelter To Protect Patrons At Passion Play

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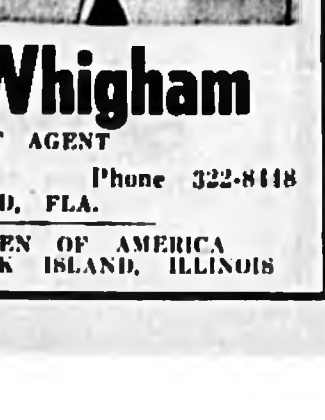
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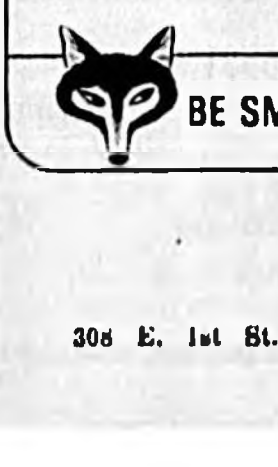

### Jacoby On Bridge By Oswald Jacoby

Today's hand caused a mild argument between Edgar Kaplan of the Card School of New York and myself. He claims the hand is simple, but I contend it is far from it, even when you see all the cards.

We agree that the hand belongs in four spades and probably most pairs will get there. I am sure they would find several ways of doing the actual bidding.

West's king of clubs opening is normal and declarer must grab that first trick right away. If he stays off

trick, declarer will want to lead his singleton diamond and East may take his ace right away. If East shifts to a heart South will go up with the ace, play three rounds of trumps stopping in dummy and discard four losers on the diamonds to wind up with an overtrick.

If East leads a club and West shifts to a heart South will also make an overtrick. The best defense is for West to play two clubs. At this point, South can ruff in dummy and make his contract, but a better play is for South to discard a low heart from dummy and ruff the club continuation in his own hand. Once more he will be able to draw trumps and get rid of his losers, but he will only make four odd because the defense will have three tricks.

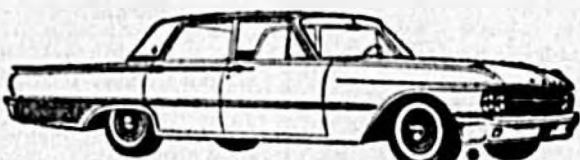
