Rangers, called out to 25 wild fires and eight miscellaneous fires, issued 17 warning tickets and filed three court cases.

Percentage breakdown shows that 60 per cent of the fires resulted from escaped trash fires, 15 per cent were deliberately set, 15 per cent were caused by children playing with matches and 10 per cent were attributed to carelessness of smokers, campers and other per-

The Forestry Service presently is engaged in an intensive educational program through which rangers visit various youth clubs, school groups and other organizations to present lectures and films on fire control.

# Cleveland Quits Frederick To

Hats were being tossed into the political arena today for the special Legislature election on March

Mack Cleveland Jr. telegraphed Gov. Farris Bryant his resignation as Seminole County Representative in the House. At the same time he formally announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Seminole County's new seat in the Senate under the new reapportionment law.

Former Rep. Gordon Frederick immediately announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination to fill Cleveland's unexpired term in the House.

Vernon W. Dunn, former County Commissioner, said he still is undecided whether he will oppose Frederick in the party primary Feb. 26.

Don Willson, Republican county executive committee chairman, also stated the GOP will have candidates in the ring. He added the committee will meet within the next few days, at which time it is expected candidates will announce their intention to seek the Republican

Senate and House seats. Candidates have until noon next Friday to qualify with the Secretary of

Frederick said he already has requested qualifying blanks from the State Secretary's office. He also said his campaign fund still is intact and it will not be necessary for him to re-establish it.

# **All-Out** Search **Continues**

JACKSON VILLE (UPI)-Planes and ships fanned out over the Atlantic today in an effort to solve the deepening mystery of a tanker missing for eight days with 39 crewmen aboard.

There was no clue to whether the 524-foot Marine Sulphur Queen, carrying a cargo of molten sulphur, had exploded and sunk or was lost or disabled.

A Coast Guard officer speculated that if the hot sulphur had come in contact with the water a steam explosion would follow, causing "the whole thing to go up like an atom bomb."

The World War II Merchant Marine vessel sailed from Beaumout, Tex., nine days ago bound for Norfolk, Va.

The ship transports sulphur in heavily insulated steel tanks that are kept at 265 degrees by steel coils. The ship's operators, Marine Transport Corp. of New York, said hauling sulphur is no more dangerous than bauling

other cargoes. The Coast Guard rushed two ships to check what appeared to be floating debris Sunday night but hours of searching a 200-square mile area east of here produced no trace of the ship. The Coast Guard reported the flotsam did not appear to be from the yessel, last heard from when it dispatched a radio

The disappearance of the ship recalled another great lantic-the U. S. Navy supply ship Cyclops which vanished in 1918 with 809 men abourd.

The Cyclops, carrying a cargo of manganese, took on coul at Barbados, then sailed, never to be heard from again. The last radio message from the Marine Sulphur Queen gave no hint anything
