It doesn't matter if you bought a \$75 Christmas tree or a \$15 tree, you can dispose of it for free if you live in unincorporated Seminole County.

Nate Ferguson, senior analyst in Environmental Services, said that residents who receive trash and waste collection from the county may leave the trees with their regular yard waste for free until Jan. 18.

Even residents in the affected area who do not subscribe to the residential yard waste collection service will have their trees collected, if they wish.

Sanford residents who have city trash service can dispose of their trees with their regular yard waste collection on any Wednesday.

The Oviedo City Council will meet Monday at 5:30 p.m. (Note the time change.) Items on the agenda include requests for variances. New business items will include Domestic Air Service at the Orlando Sanford International Airport, Interlocal Agreement with Seminole County for Transportation Improvements, and update of Land Development Code.

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## Time running out on health benefits deal

SANFORD - Starting Jan. 15, city employees may not be able to receive full Prudential insurance coverage for non-emergency treatment at the Central Florida Regional Hospital.

Negotiations between the hospital and Prudential are at an impasse over rates paid to the hospital. If Prudential's contract with CFRH is allowed to expire, city employees would not receive full coverage from Prudential for non-emergency treatment.

Prudential and Central Florida Regional Hospital up-dated the Sanford City Commission on the on-going negotiations at Monday's work session.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said the city would search for a different primary insurance company, if the contract dispute between CFRH and Prudential cannot be resolved.

"It looks bad for us to be dealing with a company that will not deal with our local hospital," Dale said. "I have a political problem with this. I want to look at all the avenues."

The benefits paid to employees receiving service at CFRH would be substantially reduced. South Seminole Hospital in Longwood would be the only hospital in the Columbia Healthcare system in Seminole County still fully covered by Prudential.

From July 1997 to September 1998, there were 12 city em-

ployees admitted for point-of-service coverage by Prudential. Tim Skeldon, vice president and chief financial officer of Central Florida Regional Hospital, said.

The hospital is seeking an increase in payments from Prudential for services such as open heart surgeries. Skeldon said. The hospital wants a separate contract for cardiac patients. The hospital also wants to be included in Prudential's directory, with to 235,000 members.

"Our contract is written so we get paid per diem," Skeldon said. "It evens out for the insurance company, but not for us."

Dave Queller, representing Prudential at the work session, said the company is not able to increase the benefits paid to the hospital.

Prudential is negotiating to merge with Aetna. Queller said that if the merger takes place, as expected, in 5-6 months the company may be able to meet the hospital's requests.

Only 12 percent of city employees live within city limits, city commissioner Kerry Lyons said.

"They're going elsewhere," Lyons said. "They're not going to the Sanford hospital."

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said he does not want to see city employees referred to South Seminole Hospital.

"They treated me so well in this hospital when I had a stroke," Eckstein said. "They've treated people I know so well. I would hate to go to another hospital."

Eckstein also urged caution before the city changes primary insurance providers.

"Prudential has saved us a lot of money," Eckstein said. "When other companies were increasing their rates by double digits, they came back with single digit increases. Prudential was there for us."

## City may seek conservation funds to buy boulevard land

LAKE MARY - Land along Lake Mary Boulevard could be used for conservation and recreation if commissioners decide to move forward with a Preservation 2000 grant application.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board has asked the city commission to consider applying for the grant to purchase several acres on the boulevard, east of the railroad tracks and adjacent to Big Lake Mary.

"On the eve of build-out (in Lake Mary), we should start addressing our long range plans," said Laura Mylrea-Morris, chairman of the advisory board. Mylrea-Morris said she feels parks and conservation should be at the top of the list as the city plans for the future. Lake Mary recently completed an evaluation of its comprehensive land plan and Mylrea-Morris said this could be the last and best opportunity to provide for some of the requirements of the plan.


"I think it would be a wonderful thing," said Mylrea-Morris.

The advisory board is proposing that funds from the grant be used to buy up to five parcels from property owners that have been impacted by the widening of the boulevard. The largest piece is eight acres, owned by Dr. Lou Peace, currently occupied by a two-story house.

According to Mylrea-Morris, Peace has been seeking a zoning change to use the land in another manner. But Mylrea-Morris thinks the land and other contiguous pieces could better serve the residents of the city as a conservation area and passive park.

Seminole County had purchased one tract on the boulevard when the road was widened. Parks and Recreation Director John Holland said the county has "indicated" a willingness to cooperate with the city's plans for the conservation area.

This could be the city's last chance to qualify for the grant

which is administered by the Florida Communities Trust, under the Florida Department of Community Affairs.


"This grant would fund 100 percent of the purchase without any matching requirement as long as the city population is under 10,000 residents," Holland told the commission in a memorandum.

Neither Mylrea-Morris or Holland could be specific as to the total number of acres or value of the land, but Mylrea-Morris said she knew Peace was seeking at least \$750,000 for his property.

"What I'm suggesting," said Mylrea-Morris, "is a natural buffer conservation area and small passive park."

The land is close to Lake Mary Elementary and students could walk to the park to study water and land environments. She said she has seen eagles.

## Who's afraid of Y2K? Not Seminole County

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Al Hill, the county's Y2K coordinator, says he isn't losing sleep over the Armageddon-like fear that is befuddling many private corporations and 50 percent of the National Association of Counties.

Hill, 43, says Seminole County will enter the year 2000 with total confidence in its geographical information services and computer systems.

"While many counties are regarding Y2K as a threatening situation, we regard it as a tremendous opportunity to be prepared and a step ahead," Hill said. "The majority of our internal systems are already compliant and those that aren't will be."

For the next 12 months, experts predict a good deal of panic that the world's computers will fall at midnight on Jan. 1, 2000, leading to anarchy, blackouts and global chaos. Preparedness Y2K books are expected to be best sellers. "Beat the Beast" is one of those already out.

Chris Grasso, the director of information and technology, said that Seminole County got itself a headstart of "the Beast" by forming a Y2K Committee in 1996. Hill is the chairman of that committee and responsible for getting all agencies in the county in computer compliance for the year 2000.

"We've been at this almost three years and we're in good shape and we're working to make it even better," Grasso said. "Each system we have been Please see Computer, Page 3A

## Company announces waste collection days

SANFORD - Some Sanford residents will have different waste collection days starting Jan. 4, under the city's new contract with Florida Recycling Services to provide garbage, yard waste, and bulk pick-up services.

"The level of service will increase," Bob Raggett, Orlando area operations manager for

Florida Recycling, said. "We have an excellent service record in the cities we serve. We are passing out fliers to each resident to make sure everyone knows of the changes."

Residents east of U.S. Highway 17-92 and north of 20th Street will have garbage service on Monday and Thursday, with recycling service on Monday.

Residents east of U.S. 17-92 and south of 20th Street will have garbage service Monday

and Thursday, and recycling service Thursday.

Residents west of U.S. 17-92 and north of 25th Street will have garbage service Tuesday and Friday, and recycling service Tuesday. Residents west of U.S. 17-92 and south of 25th Street will have garbage service Tuesday and Friday, and recycling service Friday.

The yard waste collection day for all residents will be Wednesday.

Four free bulk collection pick-ups will be available each year. To schedule requests, residents can call Florida Recycling at (407) 328-8211.

"We are asking people to properly contain, bundle and tie all waste, and put it out by 7 a.m.," Raggett said.

The city will continue to bill residents for services on the monthly water and sewer bill. Florida Recycling also has

service contracts in Longwood, Oviedo, Daytona, and Maitland. It is a 30-year old company with roots in Chicago, Raggett said.

Under the rate schedule, residential rates will decrease 13.74 percent. Commercial rates will decrease by 10.03 percent.

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## Endangered Species Act marks 25 years of success

WASHINGTON - The Environmental Defense Fund (EDF) marked the 25th anniversary of the signing of the Endangered Species Act (ESA) by releasing a state-by-state summary of progress being made to recover once-imperiled wild animals and plants. The well-known legislation, which President Richard M. Nixon signed into law on Dec. 28, 1973, was approved nearly unanimously by both Houses of Congress.

"Citizens of every state in this nation can see firsthand in their own state examples of the progress being made in bringing wildlife back from the brink of extinction," said EDF senior ecologist Dr. David S. Wilcove. Examples of recovering wildlife in the illustrative, but not exhaustive, report range from little-known Hawaiian plants to gray wolves howling in Yellowstone and majestic bald eagles, which again soar over nearly every state.

In Florida, bald eagles are increasing in number, where 874 pairs occupied territories in 1997, up from 535 in 1990. On July 12, 1995, the bald eagle was reclassified from endangered to threatened in the lower 48 states. The once endangered American alligator has fully recovered and was removed from the endangered species list June 4, 1987. The Florida population of brown pelicans has recovered and was removed from the endangered species list February 4, 1985. Creation of the 20,000-acre Ten Thousand Island National Wildlife Refuge in 1997 protects habitat for endangered wood storks and sea turtles. Long-term nesting trends for the subpopulation of loggerhead sea turtles in Florida (about 90 percent of the US population) indicate that the species is improving in status. Green sea turtles' nesting numbers in Florida have increased over the last ten years. Endangered Schaus' swallowtail butterflies have increased in number after captive breeding. Following Hurricane Andrew, only 17 were left in the wild, in late 1997, there were approximately 1,200.

The accomplishments of the Endangered Species Act involve many Americans among them the intrepid biologists who scoured

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

## Adult clubs appeal judge's ruling

**SEMINOLE COUNTY** - In the final tug of the 1998 tug-of-war by the county and the adult entertainment industry, an attorney representing three formerly all-nude dancing clubs in Casselberry has appealed a Dec. 3 decision Circuit Court in favor of the county.

On Tuesday, Attorney David Wasserman appealed Judge Nancy Alley's denial of a temporary injunction to the Fifth District Court of Appeals. Wasserman represents the owners of Club Juana, Cabaret and Racheles.

The owners are arguing that

Seminole County's Public Decency Ordinance is in conflict with the Casselberry Adult Entertainment Ordinance. In her ruling Dec. 3, Alley said the ordinance is not in conflict but rather "supplemental" to the Casselberry Adult Entertainment Ordinance.

"We feel very confident about defending the appeal," Deputy County Attorney Lonnie Groot said today. "This has been an extremely active year in the courts - and we expect this issue will be argued for the next two years."

Wasserman said the adult club owners are prepared to

keep going to court in an effort to save their businesses, which have thrived for several decades. Club Juana owner Mike Pinter recently staged a gala party for his club's 35th anniversary.

Groot said that the county has paid \$292,746.32 to the law firm of Shutts & Bowen for services the past two fiscal years and has \$265,000 budgeted for adult entertainment cases in 1999-2000. He said that attorney Rick Nelson from American Liberty Institute is not charging the county for defending the Public Decency Ordinance, adopted in November.

otters, heron and ibis on or near the lake.

"Conserving areas certainly has a reciprocal benefit," said Holland.

The city must complete the application soon. Mylrea-Morris said the deadline is April. She and Holland said the application process is fairly lengthy and involves ranking the benefits of the purchase by a point system.

Holland said the commission will consider moving forward with the application process at its strategic planning session, scheduled after the first of the year.

or is being checked. We're 'throwing out what doesn't work.'

One of the changes to be made this year, Grasso said, will be converting from Windows 95 to Windows NT. Another issue concerns imbedded chips - making sure the county and those it does business with are in compliance.

Upgrading the county's software and hardware was not as expensive as people may have thought it would be. Hill says the cost has been not much more than \$50,000. One of the moves the county made was to outsource information services to ITE of Lake Mary. It also conducted a system-wide audit of all its computers.

All of the county's agencies need computer compliance to function properly. The public safety and sheriff's office operations are obviously crucial to protect the county. There can be no room for error in the E-911 function. The system must be fail-safe.

"We don't intend to have a ton of bricks come down on us," said Hill, a former Army Captain with a Masters Degree in Geography from the University of Tennessee. "We're going to stay way ahead of the Beast."

The "Beast" has folks all over the U.S. in a dither. Bob Rutz, an engineer in Kingston,

Ark. is building on the Y2K survivalism scene. He is constructing a 700-acre Christian community in the hills of Northwest, Ark. He's trying to get 100 families to buy 3-acre lots and simply get ready for Judgment Day.

trees and cliffs to return bald eagles and peregrine falcons to states from which they had vanished, determined scientists and volunteers who protected sea turtles nesting on the nation's beaches, the Nez Perce tribe which is overseeing the return of the wolf to Idaho forests, and a young man in California who turned back from a life on the streets to aid a rare butterfly," said EDF's Margaret McMillan, who compiled the report.

Though hailing the many successes achieved thus far, the EDF report also noted a critical need to improve conservation efforts on privately owned land. "Because most endangered species have most of their habitat on private land, it is essential that new approaches be found to enlist more landowners as active partners in conservation

efforts," said EDF economist Robert Bonnie. EDF itself has been instrumental in designing one successful new approach, "safe harbor" agreements. Under these, landowners restore or improve habitat, but do not incur additional land use restrictions as a result of endangered species taking up residence on their property as a result of the improvements.

Over a million acres of private land has been entered into safe harbor agreements since the novel idea was embraced by Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt three years ago.

## Warm up to winter nights Spicy gingerbread sweetens the rest of season

Gingerbread — and by that I mean gingerbread cake and gingerbread cookies — is probably the quintessential Christmas food. It makes great gifts, tree decorations and desserts. On top of that, baking it makes your whole house smell like Christmas.

But a few good gingerbread recipes will help sweeten the rest of your winter as well. There's nothing like a serving of gingerbread cake with lemon curd to warm a winter night (you can buy lemon curd in jars, or make your own; most basic cookbooks have the recipe). We make small gingerbread houses at Christmas every year. We also make them on Valentine's Day, decorating them with candy hearts and Red Hots. You can make gingerbread figures at other times of the year, too. Our Thanksgiving tradition includes baking gingerbread turkeys, writing our guests' names on them in icing, and using them as place cards at the table. (The guests get to take them home, but they usually eat them on the spot.) I'm thinking of gingerbread rabbits for Easter, decorated with jelly beans. How about gingerbread Uncle Sams for the Fourth of July? Well, perhaps that's going too far.

But in my book, it's hard to go too far with gingerbread. I hope you enjoy the recipes below. The cake-like gingerbread recipe comes from Chef Peter Kelly of the New England Culinary Institute in Montpelier, Vt. It's from his grandmother, and can be made in a cake pan or muffin tin. The other two recipes are from a delightful book entitled "Great Gingerbread," by Sara Perry.

You can whip these up for Christmas, but they'll also bring you happily into the new year.

Bonus baking tip: Gingersnaps — homemade or store bought — make excellent pie crust. Crush them as you would graham crackers, add melted butter and some powdered ginger, and proceed as you would for a graham cracker crust. This is an excellent crust for pumpkin pie, squash pie, or cheesecake. If you are feeling energetic, finely chop some crystallized ginger and add that to the crumbs.

In 1 cup very hot (almost boiling) coffee  
lemon curd or whipped cream, for serving

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease an 8 by 8 inch cake pan or a muffin tin with 1/2 medium size (3 inch) muffin cups (if you can line them with paper baking cups).

In a large bowl, cream together the sugar and shortening. Add the egg and mix. Add the molasses and mix again. In another bowl, stir together the salt, flour, cloves, cinnamon and ginger. Add to molasses mixture and stir well.

Add the hot coffee and baking soda mixture and mix well again. Spoon into prepared pan (fill muffin cups about 3/4 full) and bake about 20 minutes (for muffins) to 30 minutes (for cake) or until a tester inserted in the middle comes out clean.

Note: If making muffins, you may have enough batter for one or two extra. You can bake them in small Pyrex cups or ramekins.

Serve warm, with lemon curd or whipped cream. Yield: 12 servings.

## GINGERBREAD SUGAR COOKIES

1/2 cup vegetable shortening, cut into small pieces  
1/4 cup unsalted butter, cut into small pieces  
3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1/4 cup dark or blackstrap molasses  
1 large egg  
2-1/2 cups all-purpose flour  
2 teaspoons baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon ground cloves  
1/2 teaspoon ground white pepper  
1-1/2 teaspoons ground ginger  
1/2 cup granulated sugar

In a large bowl, beat together the shortening, butter and brown sugar, using an electric mixer, until light and creamy. Beat in the molasses and egg. Sift the flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, cloves, pepper and 1 teaspoon of the ginger into the molasses mixture, and beat until well blended. Cover the bowl with plastic wrap and chill for at least 2 hours. The batter will keep in the refrigerator for up to 1 week.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Position a rack in the center of the oven. Grease 2 baking sheets or line them with parchment paper, and set aside. Combine the remaining 1/2 teaspoon

ginger with the granulated sugar in a small bowl. With clean hands, form the chilled batter into 1-inch balls (the size of large malted milk balls). Dip the top of each ball into the ginger-sugar mixture and place, sugar-side up, on the prepared sheets, about 2-1/2 inches apart. Flatten each ball with the bottom of a glass. Sprinkle with drops of water or mist with a fine sprayer.

Bake until the tops are firm when lightly touched, 6 to 8 minutes. Let the cookies cool slightly on the baking sheets before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely. Store in an airtight container. Yield: 5 dozen cookies.

## CHOCOLATE SOUR-CREAM GINGERBREAD

1/2 cup vegetable shortening, cut into small pieces  
1 cup granulated sugar  
2 large eggs, at room temperature  
1 cup sour cream, at room temperature

1/2 cup light molasses  
1-3/4 cup all-purpose flour  
1/4 cup unbleached cocoa  
1-1/2 teaspoons ground ginger  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
For the icing:  
1 cup sifted powdered sugar  
1 tablespoon milk or water

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Position a rack in the center of the oven. Lightly grease a 13 by 9-inch cake pan and set aside.

In a large bowl, beat together the shortening and sugar, using an electric mixer, until light and creamy. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, until well blended. Stir in the sour cream and molasses. Sift the flour, cocoa, ginger, cinnamon, cloves, baking soda and salt into the molasses mixture and gently fold in. Pour into the prepared pan. Bake until a toothpick inserted in the middle comes out clean, 35 to 40 minutes. Cool the pan on a wire rack.

To make the icing: In a small bowl, whisk the powdered sugar and milk until well blended. Brush over the top of the cake.

Failure to file a petition within this time period shall constitute a waiver of any right(s) such person(s) may have to request an administrative determination (hearing) under section 120.569 and 120.57, F.S., concerning the subject permit. Petitions which are not filed in accordance with the above provisions are subject to dismissal.

Because the administrative hearing process is designed to formulate final agency action, the filing of a petition means that the District's final action may be different from the position taken by it in this notice of intent. Persons whose substantial interests will be affected by any such final decision of the District on the application have the right to petition to become a party to the proceeding, in accordance with the requirements set forth above.

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# Dementia has two primary causes

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** What causes dementia, and how is it treated?

**DEAR READER:** Dementia is a term that describes a constellation of symptoms that interfere with daily function. These include loss of intellectual ability and the appearance of cognitive impairment. Dementia is chronic and, in most cases, progressive.

There are two major causes in the elderly: vascular disorders and Alzheimer's disease.

Accounting for an estimated 13 percent of dementia, vascular disorders consist primarily of small- to medium-sized strokes. Treatment involves physical therapy, anticoagulant drugs and — eventually — nursing care.

Alzheimer's disease is estimated to cause up to 60 percent of dementia cases. The cause is unknown and, until recently, these patients eventually became totally dependent. Even with powerful drugs to control confusion, disorganized thinking and outbursts of physical violence, Alzheimer's patients usually survive an average of 10 years and — for most of that time — require 24-hour supervision, ordinarily in a skilled nursing facility.

In the past few years, however, two new drugs have become available; both appear to slow the progression of dementia. Cognex (tacrine) and Aricept (donepezil) have been shown favorably to delay the need for nursing home placement. Other medications are currently under development.

In addition, studies have shown that the progression of Alzheimer's symptoms can be slowed by ginkgo biloba extract; vitamin E; ibuprofen; and, in women, estrogen replacement therapy.

Unfortunately, there are — as yet — no drugs to reverse the consequences of late dementia.

Thus, the treatment of dementia is slowly improving but is far from perfect. Best results are seen before profound mental changes appear. Late-stage dementia patients are still most appropriately cared for in nursing

facilities, where 24-hour supervision and the use of behavior-modifying drugs can help to improve the quality of life for these unfortunate souls.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** How can I get rid of stretch marks?

**DEAR READER:** Caused by rapid expansion of the skin (as in pregnancy or sudden weight gain), stretch marks can be troublesome to treat. Surgery has been the standard therapy.

However, Retin A, a compound commonly used to treat acne, has been reported to improve unsightly stretch marks, if applied daily. The prescription cream or lotion may have to be used for at least six months to be effective.

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



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## WIN AT BRIDGE

### The toughest contest

By far the toughest competition in Lille was the Par Contest. Over two days, 34 humans (4 women and 30 men) and one computer program tried to solve 12 single-dummy problems. In each of the four two-hour sessions, the players, sitting at Compaq computer terminals, had to solve three incredibly difficult problems. There were 2,000 points available for each deal. Every error cost points. After three errors, the player scored zero. And if play was still in progress after 40 minutes, the computer awarded zero and moved to the next deal.

The tournament ended in a sweep for the United States, with Michael Rosenberg, of Scarsdale, N.Y., scoring 70.2 percent and winning \$35,000,

ahead of Bart Bramley, of Chicago, Ill. (\$17,500), and Eric Rodwell, of Napier, Ill. (\$10,000).

The computer program, Professor Matt Ginsberg's GIB, led at the halfway stage, but eventually finished 12th. Still, that is an impressive result.

This double-dummy problem would be far too simple for the Lille contest. Yet, do you see how to make seven no-trump after the annoying spade lead? (Yes, seven diamonds is much easier.)

Clearly, you mustn't win a trick in the South hand, otherwise, you will lose a club trick.

The answer involves unblocking four high honors. After winning with the spade king, cash the spade ace and jettison the heart ace. Now take dummy's three heart winners, discarding the three top diamonds. The last eight tricks are won by dummy's diamond sequence.
