#### Brown expresses concern

Congresswoman Corrine Brown (3rd District, Florida) has expressed her concern over two Americans missing in Europe.

In a press release from her Washington office,

"I am saddened by the detained status of Jacksonville resident David Daliberti and am closely monitoring this situation. I have spoken with the wife of Mr. Daliberti to convey my strong support for her in this difficult time."

Brown continued, "I know that the family is anxious and the entire Jacksonville community is following this."

"I am in contact with the White House where President Clinton has been meeting with advisors. I am told there is confirmation that the two detained Americans are David Daliberti and Bill Barloon, and the White House has been in touch with the families of the two Americans."

Brown said the administration is working with Polish authorities and through other channels to obtain information on a possible release of the

"All indications are that the incident was entirely a result of innocent mistakes," Brown

She said she will continue to monitor the situation and urge the President to do all he can to resolve the situation.

# Congressman tours local school to see how it's done

SANFORD - The Pre-Kindergarten students at All Souls Catholic School in downtown Sanford get a steady diet of fingerpainting, story time, play and rest. Earlier this week, they got a dose of politics

For several months, the City Commission, staff members, and consultants have been working diligently on preparing a prioritized list of community improvement projects.



# Delicate balance: Phone rates and service

SANFORD - A group of deregulation-minded lawmakers hung up on several attempts to tighten controls on local telephone competition as cable television and long-distance companies get into

If the state ends local telephone service monopolies by July 1, it should stop regulating telephone company profits at the same time, a House panel decided Tuesday.

Larry Strickler, vice president of external affairs for Southern Bell, said the debate is focused on the need to balance competition with the needs of the consumers.

Strickler said. Legislators are walking the fine line, he said, at both the state and

"It's a very delicate balance,"

national levels.

"If we're going to have unencumbered competition and encourage small entrepreneurs to come into the market we ought not to interomanage what they can and should do to participate," said Rep. Robert Starks, R-Casselberry.

The group rejected an attempt by Rep. John Warner, R-Smart, to leave regulation unchanged for a year while competition starts up.

"This is an on-going debate," Strickler said, "We need to ensure universal service while keeping residential rates affordable. Until it becomes heated, competi-

tion alone won't keep customers' bills down, Warner said. "There will not be real or effective competition within that one year, and the consumer should be protected."

"I can tell you my cable company is foaming at the mouth. I think

there will be competition right away," argued Rep. Jack Tobin, D-Margate, chairman of the telecommunications industry subcommittee.

Strickler insists that it is "an interesting, healthy process" and that it will not turn into a dog-fight. Warner's amendment failed on a

voice vote. It was one of more than 150 the group is considering this week as it prepares to send a bill to the full Utilities and Telecommunications Committee.

Customers fear lawmakers won't do enough to make sure baste telephone service stays affordable and easy to obtain, said Monte Belote, executive director of the Florida Consumer Action Network.

The 13 companies that hold local service monopolies in Florida have their rates of return regulated by the state Public Service Commission.

The present version of the bill would end that as cable and longdistance companies move in to offer local service. Companies would be able to price most services according to their own marketing strategies.

But to keep basic residential service from getting too expensive, the bill would limit those rates to present levels for three years, then bar them from rising faster than inflation after that.

Belote said that would mean windfall profits because the telephone industry cuts costs of providing service as technology improves.

"This is a declining cost industry. Phone bills should be going down, not up," he told the panel.

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#### Audit finds failing officers armed

TAMPA - An audit has criticized police for keeping their firing range failures on the streets, saying it could cost the city money in court if a questionable shooting occurred.

The March 8 audit found that, in some instances, officers were allowed three attempts in five days to pass the shooting test, bypassing the department's rules of yanking officers off the street after the first round until they requalified.

Affording officers multiple chances to qualify on the same day does not stress the importance of firearm proficiency, the audit sald.

Over three years, the audit found, 139 officers failed to meet the minimum shooting skills on their first attempts. Of those, five could not qualify on their initial try for three straight years. and 19 failed for two consecutive years.

Tampa police responded to the audit by vowing to follow procedure and reroute officers who fail their annual shooting tests to desk jobs until they prove they can hit the targets.

#### Product recall

DUBUQUE, Iowa - F.D.L. Foods, Inc. is recalling about 8,600 canned hams because some may contain small pieces of glass, the U.S. Department of Agriculture said.

The company decided on the recall after consumers in lowa and Wisconsin reported finding glass in cans of "Dubuque Royal Buffet Ham, Water Added.

The company is recalling all product cans with the code "2234D" or "2234N" on the label.

The product mainly was distributed to stores in Arizona, Illinois, Iowa and Wisconsin. A small number of the canned hams also were distributed in California, Florida, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia.

#### Chocolate lover nabbed in candy heist

TAMPA - A woman is charged with a heist that gives new meaning to "choco-haulic."

Authorities say Geneva Kosh hauled away from a discount warehouse a tasty assortment of sweet delights - \$5,000

"We've never had a major candy rip off," said Hillsborough Sheriff's detective Curtis Cooke. Deputies said Kosh, a local chocolate company repre-

sentative for Hershey Foods Corp., conned a Sam's Club out of \$2,700 worth of Snickers, \$1,500 in Milky Ways, \$1,300 in Hershey's nuggets, \$1,200 worth of Kisses, \$1,200 in M&Ms, \$100 in Reese's Pieces and \$68 of Reese's Peanut Butter Cups. Her job as a Hershey representative is to ensure old candy

isn't sold, Cooke said. It is supposed to be destroyed. Cooke said employees questioned why Kosh also asked to take Nestle's products, but they didn't stop her.

Kosh, 39, turned herself in on Friday, was charged with two counts of grand theft and was released on her own

Hershey spokesman John Long declined comment.

# Bank president tied to gunrunning

MIAMI — The former president of Miami's failed Bayshore Bank was sentenced to federal prison over messy ties to gunrunning for Nicaragua's Contra rebels.

Louis Petrillo was ordered to spend a year in prison and pay \$2 hillion restitution for advancing an arms broker the same amount of money without bank approval.

Petrilio was sentenced by U.S. District Judge C. Clyde Atkins on a guilty plea to charges of bank fraud and misapplication of

He issued a \$1.5 million cashier's check from Bayshore in 1986 to cover a letter of credit he wrote without bank approval to Barbara Studiey, president of GeoMiliTech Consultants Corp., while working at Florida National Bank in 1965.

Petrillo later moved credits totaling \$500,000 from Bayshore to benefit the same customer.

# Attornevs establish law endowment

PENSACOLA — High-profile attorney Fred Levin, his brother David Levin and one of their law partners have given more than \$1 million to establish the University of Florida's largest law professorship endowment.

The Levins and Lefferts Mable Jr., partners in Pensacola's largest law firm, are graduates of Florida's law school.

In the mid 1980s they gave the University of Florida Foundation property in Franklin County south of Tallahassee with more than three miles of frontage on the Gulf of Mexico.

The gift stipulated that whenever the foundation decided to sell the property the proceeds would be used as the benefactors saw fit. The property is in the process of being sold and the three attorneys have directed the money be used to establish an endowment known as The Levin, Mabie & Levin Professorships in Law.

# **Environmentalists:** FPL wetlands plan is a 'shell game'

MAMI - A Morida Power & ight plan to restore damaged wetlands in South Dade is a "shell game" giving developers the right to wipe out important marshes in other areas, an environmental group

The FPL plan revives a debate over Florida's practice of requiring developers to have done something good for nature in wetlands in one place in order to build in others. "This is just a shell game

that allows industry to make it appear they are restoring something, when in fact, they are doing little or nothing so developers can destroy other wetlands," Nancy Brown, president of Friends of the Everglades, said Tuesday. in the FPL case, the state's

largest utility says it will restore 13,367 acres of its wetlands in South Dade by removing non-native trees. Some of the credits FPL gets they can buy credits.

for doing this could be sold to developers, towns and the state Department of Transportation for projects in Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, Lee, Hendry, Collier and Monroe countles.

And some of the credits will be used by FPL to work in wetlands from Martin County southward, FPL spokesman Bill Swank said Tuesday. He said the south Dade area has about a dozen threatened species of birds and animals, including panthers and American crocodiles.

He said the restoration would start with 4,000 acres and would be complete in 10

Accumulating credits for wetlands work is called mitigation banking. The bank is actually just the good deeds themselves, which can be traded for doing work in other wetlands.

Developers who destroy an acre of wetlands must restore another acre. If they don't restore the land themselves.

# House panel approves charter school bill

TALLAHASSEE - A bill to let private groups run public schools got unanimous backing by a House panel, but some lawmakers warned they weren't satisfied with parts of it.

A handful of states have permitted charter schools in recent years, and Florida is among several states now considering them. Under the legislation approved

Tuesday, school districts with more than 50,000 students could have three charter schools. Smaller districts could each have one. "I think this is a good start,"

**Education Commissioner Frank** Brogan said after the bill (CS-HB 1191) was unanimously approved by the Education Accountability & Governance Subcommittee.

The bill goes next to the full Education Committee. Companion measures in the Senate have not yet been heard in committee.

A charter school is run by a business, a group of teachers, parents or an existing school under a contract with a school board or state. Taxes that would go to a public school are instead diverted to a charter school on a per-student basis.

Enrollment is nondiscriminatory, but charter schools can get contracts to target students who need special help for academic, social or other ns. Except requirements related to the health, weifare and safety of students, charter schools are not bound by the statutes and rules? that public schools must live under.

"You really come up with a sense of accountability that you don't find in your normal school today," said Rep. Joe Tedder, D-Lakeland, one of the bill's: sponsors.

One of the issues that wasn't settled Tuesday has to do with whether religious and other private schools should be allowed to apply for charters. Currently, the legislation doesn't apply to them.

Rep. Cynthia Chestnut, a Gainesville Democrat who chairs the full Education Committee, said she strongly backs the exclusion.

Rep. Jeff Stabins, a Spring Hill Republican who co-sponsored the bill, and Rep. J. Keith Arnold, D-Fort Myers, said they would work on dropping the exclusion.

# Air bags saving ives

DETROIT - Cars with air bags had a 14 percent lower driver death rate in crashes than cars without them, a study says.

The insurance institute for Highway Safety, which is financed by the auto insurance industry, looked at crash data on more than 7,000 accidents from 1985-93.

The analysis found that air bags appear to be most effective in the largest cars, reducing deaths by 30 percent in crashes. The reduction was 11 percent in midsize cars and 14 percent in small cars.

The study didn't specify whether the drivers wore seat

But it did break down figures for crashes in which authorities reported that no seat belt was used, finding that the death rate was 32 percent lower for drivers who had an air bag.

But the researchers cautioned that information on seat belt use in crashes isn't totally reliable.

"Police are pretty busy at crash scenes," said the institute's Chuck Hurley. "And at fatal crashes there's no incentive for them to add to the tragedy by telling parents, for instance, that their children weren't wearing belts."

The nonprofit institute, based in Arlington, Va., also looked at injuries caused by air bags as they burst open. Researchers estimated that about 43 percent of 209,000 air bag deployments caused injuries, based on a sample of crashes from 1969 to 1993.

More than 96 percent of the injuries were minor, "abrasions, soreness, that sort of thing," Brian O'Neill, the institute's president, said Tuesday.

Since the 1987 model year, about 33 million cars have been sold in this country with driver air bags. About 15 million also have passenger air bags.

Federal regulations require new cars to have driver and passenger air bags by the 1996 model year and all vehicles to have them by 1999 models.

# Official: drug war

MIAMI - Remember the war on drugs? A Clinton administration official says it isn't over it's just been forgotten as Americans and the media accept drug trafficking as an everyday evil.

"The public has gotten used to the fact that a lot of drugs come into the United States," H. Allen Holmes, assistant secretary of defense for special operations, and Tuesday. Since February 1994, the Department of Defense's anti-drug operations have been his responsibility.

Ten years ago, he recalled, the seizure of 500 pounds of cocaine was worthy of reporting. Now, he figures 300 metric tons of the drug are intercepted annually in the Caribbean and northern Latin America.

"The problem is that there was probably a like amount that got into the U.S.," he said.

"Critics might ask 'If you're successful, why are there still all these drugs on the street?" Holmes said. "The answer is we haven't won yet."

Holmes was in Florida on Tuesday, visiting with government and non-governmental agencies involved in the fight against drugs. He looked in on a meeting of the Young Marines, a character-building organization sponsored by the Marine Corps League.

Outreach programs like the Young Marines, along with testing of military and civilian Defense employees, account for about 15 percent of the Drug Enforcement Policy and Support's \$720 million budget, he said. Forty-two percent is spent on direct support to law enforcement.


It's illegal for active-duty military personnel to work directly in law enforcement, but Holmes' job is to see to it that the military's resources are used in

the fight against drugs. That happens mostly in detection, "monitoring, intelligence - passing information along in hopes of stopping drugs at the source," he said. "What we've worked on a lot in the last three or four years is pulling all that together," so the information can be shared quickly.


# No one for merger

# Talking trash on the public airwaves

The blood of Scott Amedure is on Jenny Jones' hands. The 32-year-old Michigan man would be alive today had he not appeared on her tawdry TV talk show.

Jones used Amedure to humiliate another Michigan man, 24-year-old Jeffrey Schmitz, for the amusement of her national television audience. Schmitz was lured to her Chicago-based talk show under the pretext that he was to meet his ecret admirer. He was shocked when Jones informed him that this admirer was not a woman, as he fully expected, but the homosexual Amedure.

Schmitz says he tried to put the traumatizing matter behind him, but was driven over the edge when he received an unsigned sexually suggestive note on his door. He confronted Amedure, who confessed that he had authored

Schmitz went out to his ear, pulled out a 12-gauge shotgun he purchased for the occasion. went back to Amedure's home and shot him dead.

Meanwhile, back in Chicago, the folks at "The Jenny Jones Show" were covering their posteriors. "There was no wrongdoing on anyone's part connected with the show," declared Jim Paratore, president of Time Warner subsidiary Telepictures Productions, which produces Jones.

"No one was lied to; no one was misled."

This is the standard defense by talk-show executives when their programming goes too far (which is often). They are just as shocked as we are when violence or mayhem results from the trash they put over the airwaves. But, of course. there's no wrongdoing on their part.

Jenny Jones is hardly the only of-fender. All the talk shows pander to the basest instincts of the unwashed viewing public, putting before them in highly emotional and

combustible televised settings, the mentally unstable, the sexually deviant, the intellectually impaired and the socially unredeeming. Consider a sampling of the TV talk show topics

for just one day this week. Ricki Lake did a show on women pursuing married men. Maury Povich countered with a show on family secrets exposed. Leeza Gibbons weighed in on sex and friendship. Sally Jessy Raphael went with repentant cheating lovers. And Montel Williams scored with a woman in love with a scrial killer.

Of all the possible subjects that TV talk shows could explore on air, and of all the possible guests Ricki, Maury, Leeza, Sally Jessy, Montel, et al. could line up, why these? Because these amoral hosts have sold their souls to that demon

With the glut of talk shows on the air (some 100 hours of programming each week), the 25 competing hosts are battling check by jowl to win audience share. With an estimated 50 million viewers up for grabs, the talk shows are waging a "Schlock War" to see who will stoop lowest to get the highest ratings and command the biggest advertising dollars.

Not even the death of Scott Amedure, and the destruction of Jeffrey Schmitz's life, has deterred the talk-show producers. They continue to feature incestuous dads, transvestite strippers and serial killer lovers as if nothing has happened.

# In communication with God

WASHINGTON — Describing Iyanla Vanzant by the obvious labels - child rape victim. ex-battered wife, welfare mother turned lawyer turned minister turned successful author impresses people, even as it sells her short.

The words rightly suggest a rising: an ascent from some dim, dank place into light and legitimacy. But defying such odds suggests a woman of intimidating strength and wisdom. A superwoman.

The labels don't conjure the petite woman sitting at her dining-room table in suburban Maryland, laughing over such everyday challenges as men, children and the pesky "Haagen-Daza Demon."

Listening to Vanzant, author of "Acts of Paith: Daily Meditations for People of Color," which spent several weeks on The Washington Post best-seller list, you're grateful that this woman who encourages African Americans to meditate and find power within is so - well.

It suggests that anyone - even those who. like her, had a child at 16 and a nervous breakdown at 22 - can do amazing things. 'I am the same person who was raped at 9,

who had an abusive childhood ... who was on welfare for 11 years, who hated getting in line for cheese and peanut butter," says Vanzant,

"But I think differently now ... with my heart, not my head."

Not thinking precipitated her greatest leap. In 1978, Vanzant was waiting in a New York welfare office when she overheard a caseworker say, "These welfare mothers make me sick. ... We should start shooting them like

Her reaction was instantaneous " "I'm out of here. On the bus home, she saw a sign: "If you're

ready to change your life, come to Medgar Evers College. She enrolled that day, got the necessary

loans and grants. "I never had time for fear," she says, "never

even thought about it." Thinking and its results fuscinate the Brooklyn-born Vanzant. In fact, a chief reason she went to law school at age 34 was "to learn how to think ... critically, analytically.'

After graduation, Vanzant practiced in the Manhattan district attorney's office and as a public defender in Philadelphia.

frontcally, her greatest lesson was "the fallacy and irrationality of thinking alone," she says. "Thinking had created my biggest problems. I always thought I was doing the right thing. ..

But what's important isn't the ability to think, but to integrate it with feeling ... with the feminine, intuitive sense that society discounts.

Today, Vanzant says she knows that God is

found in the intuitive, and is guided by what it tells her. When intuition suggested that she abandon the law for writing — her new book. "The Value in the Valleys," is scheduled for a

June release — Vanzant listened.

# Feminism: Don't believe the hype

I'm so glad I took women's studies classes in college. If I hadn't, I would believe all the new books, now being published faster than O.J. Simpson tell-alis, that say women's studies departments are filled with flakes and weirdoes. I would swallow whole their assertions that campus women's meetings are nothing more than big group-therapy sessions, where students and teachers hold hands and cry and whine about their various brushes with victimhood. I would believe Katle Rolphe's assertion in "The Morning After" that college women's fear of rape is a result of campus feminism's fear-mongering tactics, such as Take Back the Night marches, where students revel in the spotlight their alleged victimization provides.

I might even be so gullible to as buy some of Rene Denfeld's extremely muddled thesis in "The New Victorians." Denfeld says that even though young women appreciate the gains their mothers and grandmothers have made for them -- no, really they do -- the old brand of feminism doesn't work anymore. I was a member of the campus women's group, and not once did I ever see anyone cry or get hugged. Not once did I hear anyone discuss their date-rape experience. Not once did I hear the word "ouch."

I don't doubt that these authors' anecdotes are true; the Catholic college I attended was relatively low on this kind of activism, so we may well have had different experiences. And these books do make some good points. Women are debilitated when they blame men for all of their problems. And there ARE flakes and dittoheads in the feminist movement who do just that.

But there are flakes and dittoheads EV-ERYWHERE. What I can't understand is why women who call themselves feminists would go out of their way to promote such

Ultimately, I decided to remain an oldfashioned liberal feminist, focusing on what I consider the most basic issues: How to get fair pay, keep reproductive freedoms and shirk as much housework as humanly possible.



Continued from Page 1A While the list reduction has not eliminated any massive project, the scope of the work has been trimmed down from the original higher cost. Initial suggestions for \$208,000 for tennis facilities at the sports complex, and \$351,000 for a parks/rec complex, have been trimmed at the present time.

During a recent commission work session, commissioners gave a concensus vote to separate the six remaining projects into just three propositions. which is the way they are expected to appear on the ballot when the matter comes to a

The first combination is (1 Roadway & Stormwater, (2) Rinehart Road irrigation, (3) Downtown stormwater. The combined estimated cost for the three items, to be considered now as one, is \$1,879,918.

The second proposal combines work on the police station and fire facility for an expected cost of \$1.1 million.

The third, standing alone, is the proposed Community Center expansion plan estimated at \$694,000.

How to pay for this work is the big question. During various discussions, and by hearing suggestions form consultants, money for the work has been suggested from city tax income with or without raising the miliage rate, obtaining revenue bonds, splitting the cost between the city and affected property owners on a percentage basis, as well as combinations of these. The method of financing is so


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

#### Saving money or the poor?

WASHINGTON - House Republicans say their welfare reform proposal would free the needlest Americans from the shackles of Democratic programs that have succeeded only in enslaving them. Democrats say Republicans are out to save money, not the poor.

On the eve of the first floor votes on the legislative centerpiece of the Republican social agenda, verbal fireworks exploded during House debate Tuesday.

'They're coming for our children, they're coming for the poor, they're coming for the sick, the elderly, the disabled. This is the 'Contract With America.'" Rep. John Lewis, D.Ga., said in an impassioned speech in which he alluded to Nazi persecution during World War II.

One of the chief architects of the reform bill, Rep. Clay Shaw. R-Fla., fired back, saying mention of the Nazi Holocaust was an "absolute outrage.

#### Scaling back principal tax cut

WASHINGTON - Seeking to exploit a rupture in Republican ranks, the Clinton administration is praising GOP lawmakers who want to scale back the principal tax cut in the "Contract

White House Chief of Staff Leon Panetta said Tuesday that a letter signed by 102 House Republicans calling for limiting a \$500-per-child tax credit to families earning \$95,000 or less moved the Republican package in the right direction.

House Speaker Newt Gingrich's reaction to the letter was mild. He said it was "helpful," that scaling back the credit was "not out of the question." However, in an opinion page piece in The Wall Street Journal on Tuesday, Gingrich, R.Ga., referred to the tax cut legislation as "the crown jewel in the contract."

The GOP tax bill, as approved last week by the House Ways and Means Committee, would grant the full credit to families earning up to \$200,000 and a partial credit to households with as much as \$250,000 income.

#### Kaelin takes the stand

LOS ANGELES - Sporting a longer bleached-blond mane. houseguest Brian "Kato" Kaelin crashed the O.J. Simpson trial and fidgeted his way toward a second 15 minutes of fame.

The unlikely pop culture symbol - last seen rubbing elbows with Clinton cabinet officials and Dan Rather at a D.C. bash brought comic relief to the trial, his manic mannerisms in bold contrast to the sober testimony of the detectives who preceded

But Kaelin's testimony, which began Tuesday and continues today, is nothing to laugh at.

He is a critical witness — the last person to see Simpson before the June 12 killings and one of the few to see him shortly afterward.

Kaelin testified about how he came to live with Simpson. about Simpson's broken marriage and new romance and about Simpson's plans the day Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman were slashed to death.

#### Clinton under attack

WASHINGTON - President Clinton, under attack for deciding to go to Moscow for the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II in Europe, also is drawing fire for his plans for observing the end of the war against Japan.

Observances to mark what traditionally is known as "V-J Day," for Victory Over Japan, have been renamed the "End of the Pacilic War" in recent administration pronounce Furthermore, a planned ceremony at Pearl Harbor in Hawall has been scaled back, reportedly at the beheat of the Japanese government.

It is not the first time the White House has stirred controversy for appearing to appease Japanese sensitivities in terms of how the 50th anniversary of the end of the war is to be observed.

# Kmart's future still uncertain

DETROIT - Now comes the hard part. Kmart Corp., whose blue-light specials drew customers in droves to its outlets throughout middle America, is looking for a new leader who can restore it to some semblance of its former glory - in the eyes of both stockholders and customers.

Joseph Antonini. Kmart's president and chief executive and a 31-year company veteran, quit Tuesday under pressure from disgruntled shareholders. Chairman Donald Perkins said he didn't expect to name a permanent president to succeed Antonini before Kmart's May 23 annual meeting.

But expectations for new leadership will run high. The company's major stockholders pressed the board for months to fire Antonini. The California Public Employees Retirement System, one of the largest shareholders, wants to

see some innovation from the nation's third-largest retailer. The problems facing Kmart are similar to those that plagued Sears, Roebuck & Co. a few years ago. Sears stores were outdated, more efficient competitors were stealing customers with lower prices and more up-to-date merchandise, and the company had grown too big for its own good.

# Robbery at post office leaves four dead

MONTCLAIR. N.J. - An after-hours hold-up at a post office Tuesday left four people shot to death and a fifth critically wounded. Police searched the quiet suburban town door-todoor for suspects.

Two of the victims were employees and two were customers, as was the wounded man, Police Chief Thomas Russo said.

The victims were found after a postal worker entered the Upper Montclair post office just before 5 p.m. and saw a body on the floor. He left and called police, who arrived to find the carnage, and the attacker or attackers gone.

The post office is in the Watchung Plaza shopping district, and rush hour commuters from New York City arrived at the nearby New Jersey Transit train station to find police and panic.



# Cops stage simultaneous raids

TOKYO - Police wearing gas masks and carrying canaries as poison gas detectors staged simultaneous nationwide raids today against a shadowy sect, confiscating chemicals that could yield clues in the nerve-gas attack on Tokyo's subways.

But authorities refused to link the raids directly to the subway attack in which at least 10 people died and 5,000 were injured. Instead, they cited the unsolved kidnapping of a public

About two dozen buildings and compounds of the Aum Shinri Kyo sect were raided in a dawn sweep by more than 2,500 police. Several people were arrested and charged in the kidnapping.

At one compound they found about 50 sect members dazed or unconscious. A doctor said they might have been suffering from mainutrition.

Police confiscated bottles of chemicals at the same compound, and Kyodo News Service said the chemicals were similar to those used in the Tokyo attack Monday.

# Cholesterol lowering: Good sense

By DANIEL Q. HANEY AP Science Writer

NEW ORLEANS - A \$2-a-day pill that lowers cholesterol can also lower the hospital bills of heart disease patients by cutting their risk of heart attacks and other expensive health problems, a study concludes.

The results, released Tuesday, show that giving the drug simvastatin to heart patients reduced their hospital admissions by one-third during five years of treatment.

It also reduced the number of the hospital and reduced the need for bypass surgery and angloplasty.

This is both good medicine and good economics," said Dr. Sanford Schwartz, a physician and economist at the University of Pennsylvania.

The findings are the latest to be presented from the Scandinavian Simvastatin Survival Study, a landmark examination of the health effects of lowering cholesterol.

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The study was conducted on days that they had to spend in 4,444 volunteers. Its Initial results, presented last November, showed that the treatment reduced the risk of death by 30 percent in patients who already had suffered heart attacks or

angina pain. At this week's meeting of the American College of Cardiology. the same team showed that the treatment also can have a major impact on hospital costs.

But like most medical treatments, this one does not actually save money. Hospital costs were . \$8 million lower among the 2,221 volunteers who got simvastatin rather than dummy pills - but the medicine itself cost \$11 million, Schwartz said,

Nonetheless, Schwartz said the treatment is highly "costeffective" compared to other widely accepted therapies and tests.





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

# Dietary changes help irregularity

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a great deal of trouble with constipation. Nothing I use seems to help. What can I do to get back on track?

DEAR READER: Difficult or infrequent evacuation is a common malady that may be helped by dietary changes: Eat bran with your breakfast, drink more fluids (an additional three 8-ounce glasses of water a day). try hot prune juice once a day, eat more salads and roughage. Resistant cases may require occasional use of mild laxatives, such as Milk of Magnesia, or prescription stool-softeners, such as Colace.

Remember that changes in bowel function, such as the development of new constipation, can reflect serious problems, including colon cancer and thyroid disorders.

Therefore, if you have recently experienced constipation, you should be examined by your doctor. Otherwise, try the dietary modifications 1 mentioned.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from coms and calluses. Is there an answer to my dilemma?

DEARREADER: Corns/calluses are merely accumulations of hard, dry, dead skin that appear over pressure points between the bones of the feet and footwear. In simple terms, calluses form in locations where the skin is irritated. usually from shoes that are too tight.

As the layers of dead skin build up, they exert pressure on the underlying tissue (usually the toe bones), leading to pain. Corns can also form between toes, from ill-fitting shoes that squeeze the toe bones together.

These common afflictions are easy to cure.

Use fine sandpaper, an emery board, or a pumice stone to reduce the size of the callus or corn. Sand away the dead skin until the soft, underlying. healthy skin appears. This will take care of the discomfort.




