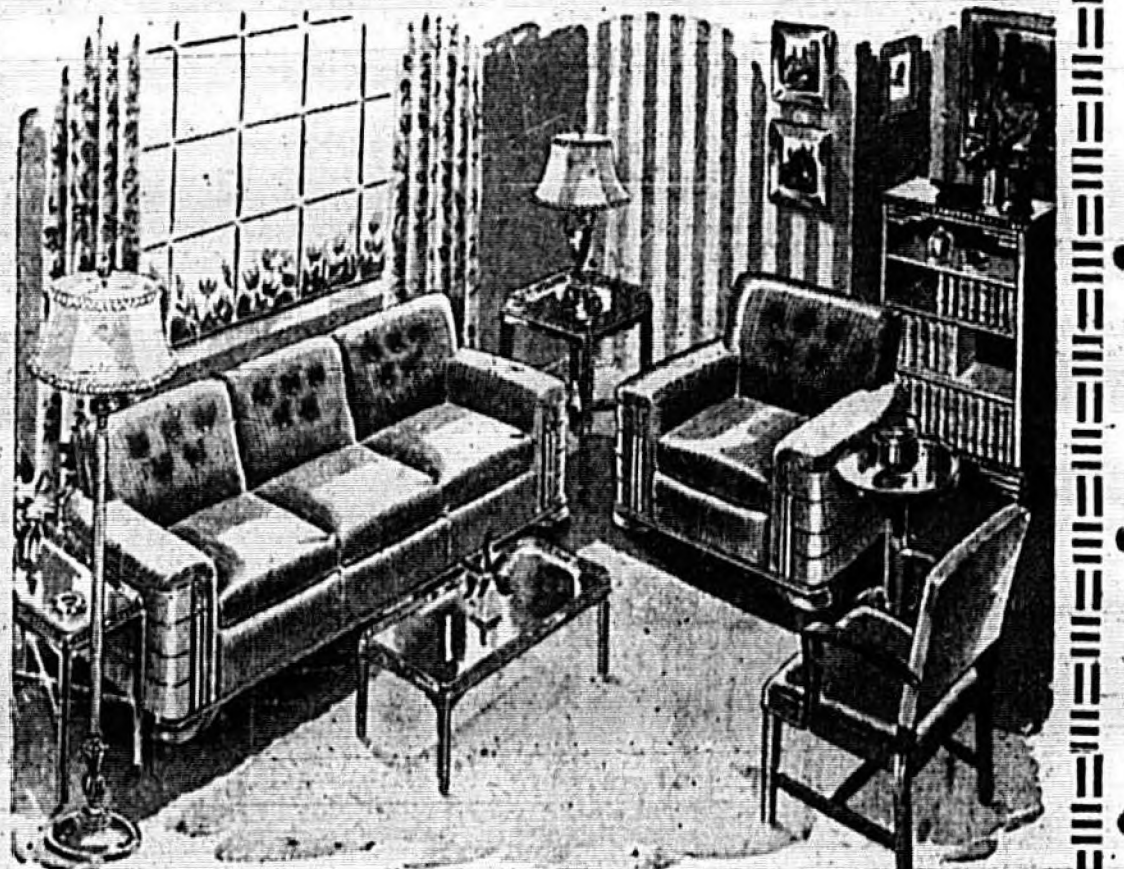

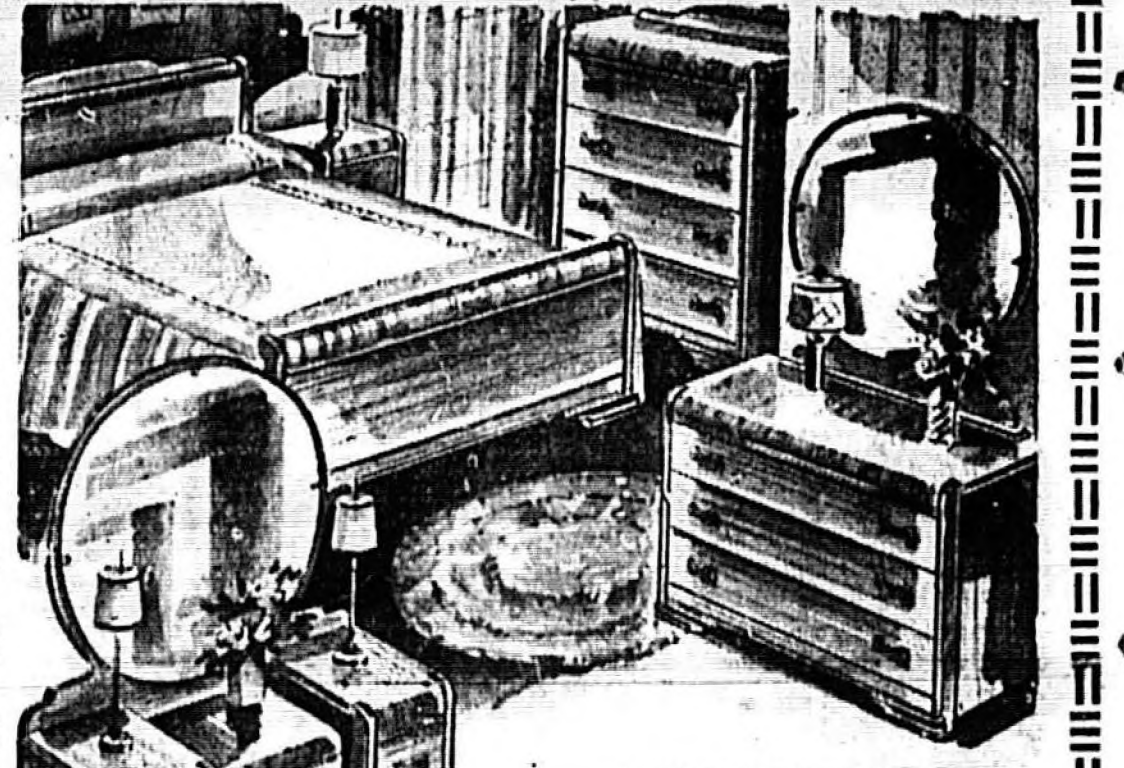

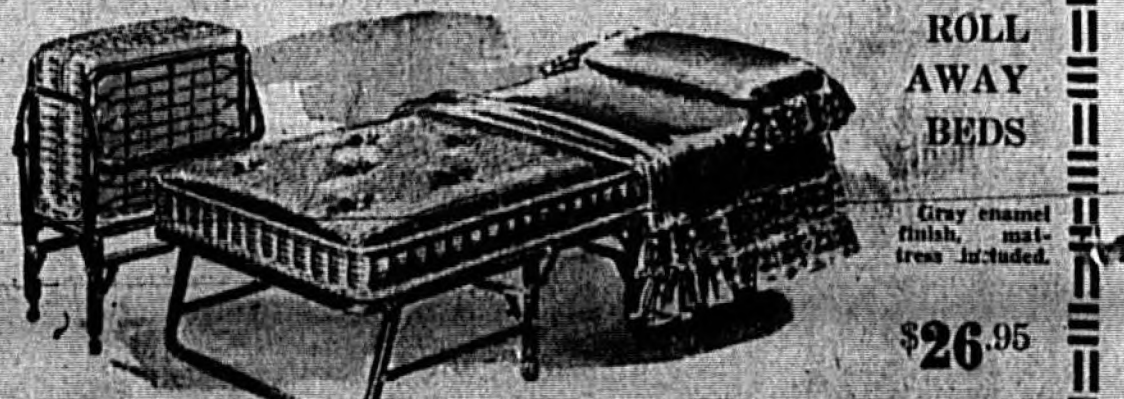

## New Testimony Given At Trial Of U.S. Officer

### Soldiers Claim They Were Ordered Beaten By Lieutenant At Lichfield Camp

BAD NAUHEIM, Germany, June 10, (AP)—New and startling testimony was given today at the trial of 16 United States Army soldiers accused of mistreating GI prisoners at the Army's Lichfield detention camp in England. The trial is being held at Bad Nauheim (David town-hime) in Germany.

One of the soldier witnesses told the court he had been "beaten by the guards at Lichfield and had been beaten unmercifully. He declared that on his third visit to the office of Lieutenant Grange, who said "I possess the only way to keep you safe from here is to beat you all up. The place I guarantee you won't be back here after tonight."

Five other GI prisoners were recalled to the stand. All of them had been beaten by the presence of Lieutenant Grange.

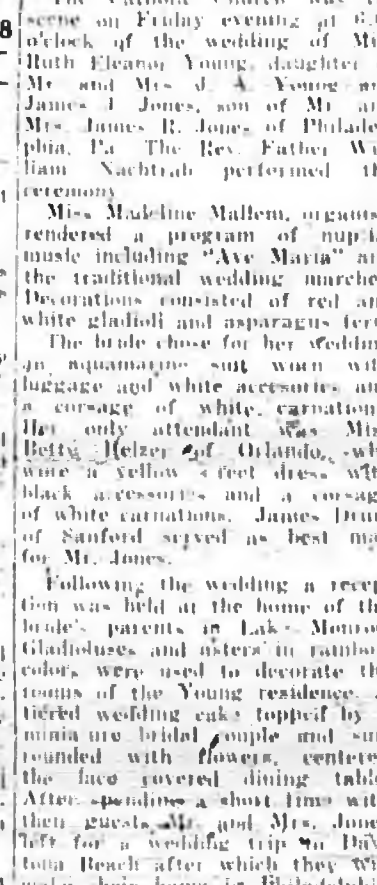

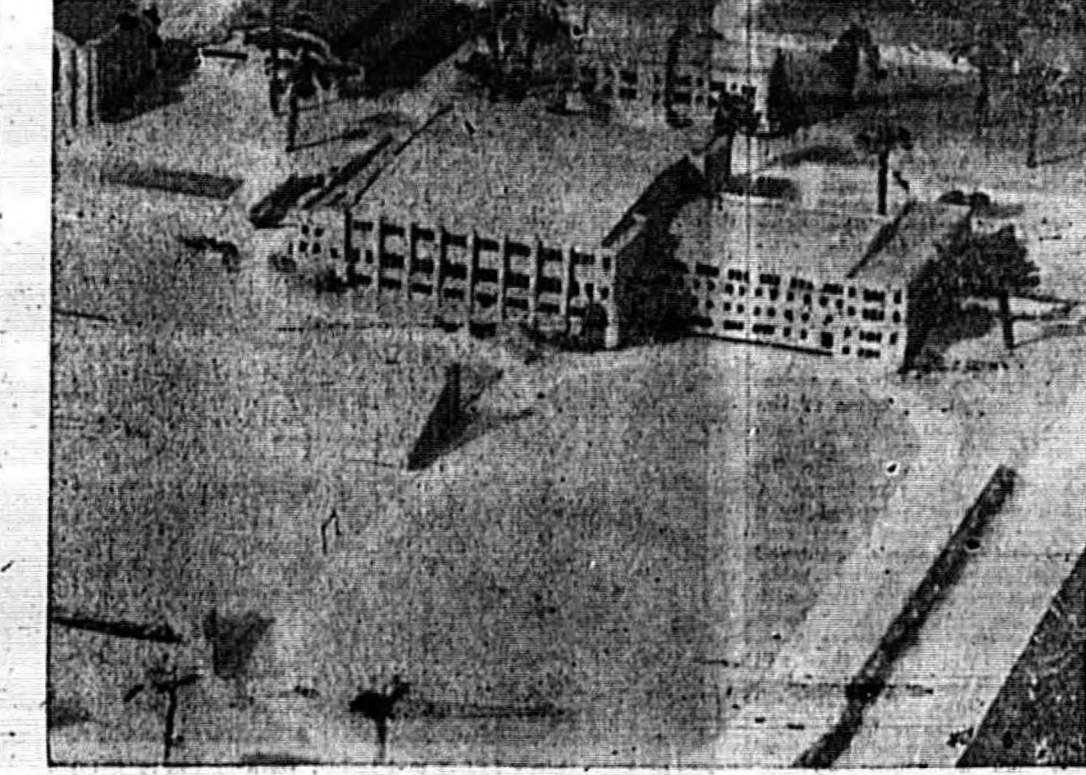
In the first half of the seventh, Howington pitched to satisfy the hundred or so DeLand fans, the Red Hats managed to punch over a single tally to run their total up to five.

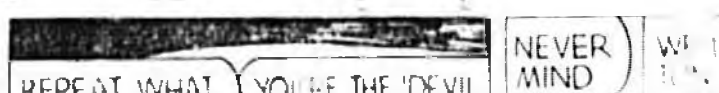

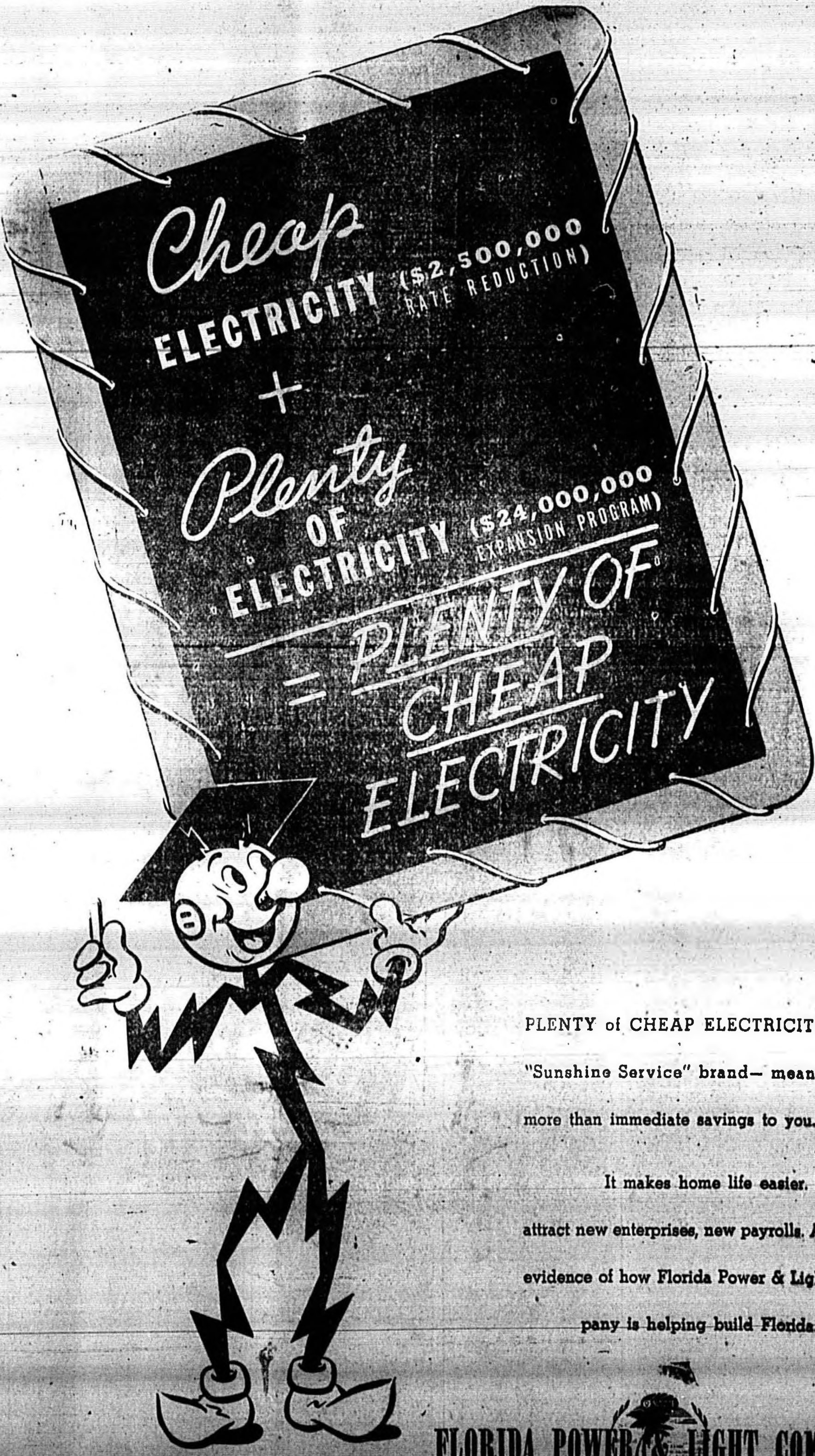

## Mihailovic Admits Meeting With Nazis

### Chetnik Leader Says Parley Followed German Offensive Against His Troops

BELGRADE, June 11. (AP)—The treason trial of General Draza Mihailovic moved into its second day with an admission from the Chetnik leader that he had met with the Germans in 1941. The meeting, he said, occurred in the second half of November, and followed a German attack against him with five divisions.

When asked by the court whether he pleaded guilty or not guilty, Mihailovic refused to answer, instead repeating over and over: "I do not feel guilty."

In contrast to yesterday's session, which was taken up almost entirely by the lengthy reading of the indictment, today's session was marked by numerous clashes between the court and the defense attorneys. Mihailovic acknowledged that he had received a message from the British asking him to fight for Yugoslavia and not for the Communists. He also confirmed that his forces had attacked partisan groups because, he said, the partisans were plundering villages.

While the Belgrade trial proceeded, the international war crime tribunal in Nuremberg heard former Nazi High Commissioner for the Netherlands, Arthur Seyss-Inquart, attempt to defend his actions in the low countries. Seyss-Inquart declared that if he had not refused to carry out orders for the annihilation of Jews, the whole country would have been submerged.

In Japan, meanwhile, defense lawyers for former Premier Hideki Tojo and his associates are preparing their case for the opening of the Tokyo trials on Thursday. Tojo's attorney says the wartime premier will accept full responsibility for starting the Pacific war, and will argue international custom grants Emperor Hirohito and his war cabinet full immunity.

## City Hikes Real Estate Assessments

### Commissioners Ask Contract For Installation of 275 Parking Meters

Increase in assessed valuations for the 1946 City tax roll were approved by the City Commission at its meeting Monday evening. H. N. Sayer, City manager and tax assessor pointed out that the assessments should be in line with increases in property values.

The increase in assessments will be 10 percent on business property, 20 percent on residential property and 150 percent on vacant property, said Mr. Sayer.

Availability of an all-time downtown parking meters, the inclusion of girls and little children in the City recreation program; the selection of a site for a negro recreation center, and the granting of permission to real dealers to state freshly slaughtered meat between inspection dates, were the principal topics discussed at the meeting.

A representative of M. H. Rhodes Inc. was instructed to draw up a contract for installation of 275 parking meters in the downtown section. The contract will be taken up for approval at the next meeting on June 24. City Attorney Fred R. Wilson was instructed to draw up an ordinance for control of parking meters.

The Rhodes agent outlined a plan whereby the meters would be installed for a 12-month trial to determine if they are needed, come on the meters, particularly by the Post Office, would operate for 12 months on a one-cent basis. Other meters would allow long-term parking, with 10 minutes for five cents, or five cents for 20 minutes, or five cents for 30 minutes. Each meter installed would cost \$58 on a self-paying basis of 50 percent of the parking revenue going to the company until paid for, after which revenues estimated at from \$100 to \$150 a year would go to the City.

It was pointed out that the present police practice of marking cars was laborious and only partially effective due to lack of maintenance to each individual, and that revenue coming to the City would be for the benefit of all citizens.

A proposition to include girls and small children, as well as boys, in the City recreation program was presented to the commission by Jack Rutigan in behalf of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of which he is president. The J.C.C. has had a program over and above what the City had already budgeted for the purpose. The Commissioner decided to call a meeting of the City Recreation Committee, C. Kettler, recreation director, to get with J.C.C. in order to make up this program.

Among sites considered for a new recreation center was the property acquired for this purpose by the City at the square bounded by Laurel and Hay Aves. and between Fourth and Sixth Streets.

At the request of R. R. Beck the Monday Thursday inspection schedule for freshly slaughtered meat was changed to Tuesday and Thursday, and dealers are now permitted to store meat between inspection dates. Butchers are instructed in such cases to get a permit at the City Hall, and show when and where the meat was placed in storage, said Mr. Sayer.

The inspection of inspection days will not require a permit.

W. S. Earle was employed to register sites designated as spoil areas by U. S. engineers in connection with the deepening of the St. John's River, and to contact local owners regarding the same. All local districts were reported by Grady Duncan to be meeting Grade A milk requirements.

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## Iranian Foreign Office Reveals Settlement Of Azerbaijan Dispute

### Problem Which Once Threatened To Plunge Iran Into Civil War Is Ended Under Agreement Of Seven-Point Program

TEHRAN, June 11. (AP)—An Iranian Foreign Office spokesman has announced settlement of the Azerbaijan problem—a problem which at one time threatened to plunge Iran into civil war.

According to the Foreign Office spokesman, the question was settled on the basis of a seven-point program advanced some weeks ago by Iranian Premier Ahmed Qavam. Under the settlement, the so-called premier of Azerbaijan, Jafar Pishavari, will become Governor General of the province. The Azerbaijan Army and people's militias will be taken into the Iranian Army and Generalissimo.

A government commission headed by Propaganda Minister H. Frouzi is said to have left Tehran for Tabriz to work out details for accepting Azerbaijan, which proclaimed its autonomy last November—back into the national government. Prince Frouzi is said to be traveling in a Soviet plane.

The Foreign Office spokesman says that the agreement for accepting Azerbaijan back into the national government was reached in secret conversations between commissions representing Azerbaijan and Iran.

## Paper Firm Asks I.C.C. To Reopen F.E.C. Hearings

TAMPA, June 11. (AP)—Reorganization of the Florida East Coast Railroad came up for discussion again. The St. Joe Paper Company has filed a petition with the Interstate Commerce Commission in Washington for reopening of the record and hearing in the F.E.C. railroad reorganization proceeding.

The paper company made this move for the purpose of taking official notice of East Coast and Atlantic Coast Line Railroad net operating income reports for the first four months of 1946. The statistical reports were not available until after the close of the hearing the commission held some time ago.

In presenting its petition, attorneys for the St. Joe paper company whose plan for operation of the East Coast Railroad is being opposed by the Atlantic Coast Line, filed financial statements of those lines along with reports of the Seaboard railway and the Southern Railway.

The petition added that some past war evidence has not been available until after the close of the hearings.

The Interstate Commerce Commission has not announced what action it will take on the petition.

## Commerce Group Urged To Approve 12-Foot Channel

Chamber of Commerce, Civic and City officials of Sanford and Orlando have telegraphed members of the Senate Commerce Committee in Washington urging approval of the 12 foot deep St. John's River channel project, which was included in H. R. 6047, a bill recently passed by the House, said Chamber of Commerce Manager Edward Higgins this morning.

The project may be taken up soon now by the Senate committee, he stated.

The telegram reads: "The 12 foot project of the St. John's River, Palatka to Sanford, Florida, now in H. R. 6047 under consideration by the Commerce Committee is most important to this section. ## First Meeting For Peace Held In China Today

### Effort Being Made To End Strife During 15-Day Truce

NANKING, June 11. (AP)—Chinese government and Communist leaders held their first direct meeting in many weeks today in continuing efforts to work out a permanent peace during the 15-day truce in the Chinese civil war.

The number was announced by Chou En-lai, Chinese premier, and Chinese minister of Communications Yu Tsi-wei following a previous conference between Chou and American envoy General George Marshall. Progress was indicated at today's meeting, between the two Chinese, but there was no definite announcement.

However, the fact that the Communications Minister conferred with Chou was regarded as significant. Restoration of communications between the two Chinese is one of Chou's "basic conditions for a peace agreement" between the Nationalist Government and the Chinese Communists.

Meanwhile, both sides renewed charges of true violations in Manchuria and north central China. Observers in Nanking were inclined to blame the violations on lack of adequate communications facilities to inform opposing factions of the truce arranged in Nanking.

## U. S. MAY AID BRITAIN

WASHINGTON, June 11. (AP)—Secretary of State James F. Byrnes has disclosed that the United States is preparing to discuss with Britain what military help it might offer in Palestine. The American troops would be sent to Palestine to help maintain order during the period of Jewish immigration. British sources have suggested that if the two countries adopt the Anglo-American Committee recommendation that 100,000 Jews be admitted to Palestine, this country should provide military help for maintaining order.

## House Passes Bill For Furlough Pay For Enlisted Men

WASHINGTON, June 11. (AP)—The House has passed another bill today to benefit ex-servicemen and women. It would give all enlisted personnel, including those discharged, pay for any furlough time they did not receive while in service. Congressmen estimate that 15,000,000 veterans would receive an average of \$250 under the legislation—if it is passed by the Senate and signed by President Truman.

The measure sets as a standard, two and a half days of furlough time each month up to a total of 120 days.

Payments are figured at the rate of base pay received, at the time of discharge, plus allowances of not less than 70c a day.

## SETTLEMENT PREDICTED

WASHINGTON, June 11. (AP)—Labor Department conciliators are working against time in an effort to prevent a tieup of the nation's shipping by a strike set for Friday midnight. While Labor Department officials sought a compromise to break the deadlock, a high government official predicted settlement. The government official War Shipping Administrator Granville Conway said eastern ship owners are planning an offer and he added that he hoped to see something clear up today.

## FRENCH TEAM UPSET

PARIS, June 11. (AP)—Yugoslavia upset France in Davis Cup tennis play today, 3 matches to 2. In the deciding match, Franja Puncic defeated Yvan Petra of France, 6-3, 3-6, 6-4, 7-5, 6-0. The Yugoslavs will meet the winners of the Sweden-Belgium match in the European Zone final.

## BERLIN CONFERENCE

BERLIN, June 11. (AP)—A conference will be held in Berlin Thursday and Friday to discuss exchange of raw materials and other products between the American occupation zones. The conference will be attended by German Economic officials of the two zones. At the same time, the German food ministers of the American and British zones will meet at Hamburg to discuss their common food problems.
