# Graham And Cabinet Snub Creationists, Approve Texts

"Creationists" have threatened to make Gov. Bob Graham suffer at the polls this fall for voting with the Cabinet to approve 22 high school blology textbooks over protests they promote evolution.

Graham is running against Republican Sen. Paula Hawkins.

Attorney General Jim Smith and Insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter were not present for

According to a Seminole County school administrator, the approved texts will be

considered for use in district classrooms. "Any book that is adopted at the state level is considered for adoption in Seminole County," said Nancy Haigh, district Coordinator of Instructional Media Services. She said decision on the books will be made by April 1.

The advocates of "creation science" - a belief that science supports the Biblical account of earth's beginnings - also pledged to reverse Graham and the Cabinet in the Legislature. which meets next month.

They said after Tuesday's vote that they will try to find a lawmaker to introduce legislation to mandate the presentation of scientific evidence against evolution in schools that teach the theory that life, including humans, evolved from

simpler forms through a process of natural selection.

"And then we'll see how folks who were so concerned about creation science being in schools ... what they think about that," said James Brady, a book warehouse clerk for the Escambia County school system who helped mobilize the opposition to the texts.

Martin Roeder, a biology professor at Florida State University, said the National Academy of

# Paulucci Suit On 7th Judge

Seminole-Brevard Chief Justice Clarence Johnson has assigned himself to the \$28 million civil suit Jeno Paulucci Tuesday's recusal of the sixth judge who received the case.

The city's condemnation suit to invalidate Panhicci's sale of the land to Seminele County went through five judges before being assigned to Melbourne Judge Tom Waddell Jr., who dismissed it on Feb. 3. On March 26. Sanford attorneys will argue for Waddell's reconsideration of the dismissal. Paulucci's suit. plans to build. which maintains that the city's condemnation effort interfered with his sale of the land, is now on its seventh judge.

Johnson said today he was "up next on the roster" for the excused himself Tuesday.

Goshorn "noted the identities of the parties involved," and said he felt "a question might arise". as to whether he could have listened to the suit "in a purely impartial manner."

Johnson said Sanford's five circuit judges experessed the same sentiments in the oral and written recusals they offered himlast month.

Johnson assigned the case to Goshorn less than a week ago and Sanford attorneys had in-

tended to request that he set a date this month for hearing of

## **Aquino Frees** Rebels Despite **U.S.** Warnings

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) -The Aguino administration today unconditionally freed four top rebel leaders, including the founders of the Communist Party and its armed wing, despite U.S. warnings the movecould assist the nation's leftist insurgency

Meanwhile, Rep. Stephen Solarz, D.N.Y., chairman of the House subcommittee on Asian and Pacific affairs, and a delegation arrived in Manila today to meet with Philippine officials to help recover government assets deposed President Ferdinand Marcos is believed to have hidden in the United States.

Defense Minister Juan Ponce Enrile said lines of communication were being opened with leaders of the outlawed Communist Party of the Philippines and its military wing, the 16,000 member New People's Army. He said the rebels would be granted safe conduct to the hills where their forces are based.

Freed today were alleged CPP founder Jose Maria Sison, 47. Bernabe Buscayno, 42, who is said to have organized the NPA. and field commanders Ruben Alegre and Alex Birondo, Buseavno was arrested in 1976 and Sison was captured a year later.

# Developers Revise Plans For Wekiva Homes

Herald Staff Writer Developers who had hoped to build a 1.600-unit residential area along the Wekiya River have revised their plan in hopes that it will meet with the approval of the Seminole County Planning and Zoning Commission

tonight. One of those changes includes a "substantial" reduction in the density of the proposed Plantation project, said Mark Voigt, senior vice president of land development for Ameor Investments Corporation.

The Phoenix, Arizona-based company recently purchased the property from Richmond American Homes Inc., which applied for the rezoning of 573 acres to the west of Markham Woods Road from agriculture to planned unit devel-

opment. County staff and local citizens

continue to oppose the construction. however it appears the P&Z could look more favorably upon the planwith a reduction in density.

The board continued the case from its January meeting, giving developers time to further study the effects of the development on traffic, sewage disposal and drainage in the area.

Both the county and the Friends of the Wekiya River, a citizen's group. have raised concerns over the density of the project and its environmental impact on the area.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -- A federal safety study says states that raised the legal nitnimum drinking age reduced the number of young drivers involved in fatal auto accidents by 13 percent.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, an agency of the Transportation Department, reported Tuesday the conclusion was drunken driving at all levels, sis of 13 states that raised the drinking age to 19, 20 or 21.

An estimated 44,000 people are killed in auto accidents each year half of them alcohol-related.

He falled to get a second to his motion from the other commissioners, who favored having Manning continue in both posts until replaced. Sunday the commission voted to hire Ronald Lee Waller as city administrator, but it may be as long as 60 days before he can report to work because of his employment contract with the

#### Officials Say Plutonium Release From Shuttle Poses Some Risk

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A launch pad explosion of a space shuttle carrying a plutonium powered satellite could release the cancer-causing substance.

Officials from NASA and the Department of Energy, while terming the potential effect "minor," declined Tuesday at a meeting of two House Science and Technology subcommittees to discuss the possible health risks. Inhaling plutonium particles can cause lung cancer.

The Jan. 28 Challenger explosion delayed for at least 13 months two planned May launches of planetary exploration satellites - the Galileo to look over Jupiter and the Ulysses to study the sun.

Each satellite would get its electrical power from plutonium-based generators that take the heat of decaying radioactive matter and convert it to electricity. The generator uses four blocks of plutonium, each encased in iridium. The entire package is encased in aluminium.

The satellites sit atop a Centaur rocket motor loaded with highly explosive fuel designed to loft them into the proper direction. It is the explosion of that motor in a shuttle blast that concerns engineers because of the proximity of the motor to the generators.

NASA's top engineer, Dr. Milton Silveira, concurred with an Energy Department official at the hearing that plutonium could be released in a launch pad explosion.

#### Police Give RFK Slaying Report

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - Critics of the police handling of the investigation into Robert F. Kennedy's assassination say release of a summary of the massive probe is too little.

The 1.453-page summary was released Tuesday almost 18 years after the New York senator was gunned down in a crowded hotel pantry after winning the California Democratic presidential primary.

A summary section on conclusions reached during the investigation says Sirhan Bishara Sirhan acted alone when he shot Kennedy June 5, 1968, and "There was no evidence of conspiracy in the crime."

The summary, about 5 percent of which was censored. was gleaned from more than 50,000 pages of documents and more than 17,000 photographs - only a few of which were released.

#### **Drug Test Proposal Criticized**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Democrats in Congress are urging President Reagan to ignore a proposal for drug testing of millions of federal employees and Attorney General Edwin Meese's claim that such tests would be

At a news conference Tuesday on the President's Commission on Organized Crime report, Meese said a proposal that all federal employees, and anyone working for federal contractors, submit to mandatory drug tests as a condition of employment would not violate an employee's Fourth Amendment right against unlawful search and

"By definition, it's not an unreasonable seizure, because it's something the employee consents to as a condition (of employment)," Meese said.

Rep. Pat Schroeder, D-Colo., wrote Reagan Tuesday urging he not adopt any such plan. "It reflects a basic ignorance of government management, civil liberties and drug testing technology."

#### lacocca Firing Defended

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Interior Secretary Donald Hodel. defending his firing of auto executive Lee Jacocca from a Statue of Liberty renovation panel, says they both agree the restoration must not turn into a "commercial mockery" of history.

In a speech Tuesday to panel members. Hodel praised lacocca for staying on as chairman of a private fund-raising group that has collected more than \$233 million to renovate the statue and nearby Ellis Island, where millions of immigrants entered the United States.

"While we have had some obvious differences." Hodel said. "I emphasize again that Mr. Jacocca is to be commended for his guidance and fund-raising efforts."

#### Reagan, O'Neill Push Irish Aid

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan and House Speaker Thomas O'Neill, political adversaries with common Irish roots, have placed their collective clout behind a \$290 million economic aid package for Northern Ireland

Acting 13 days before St. Patrick's Day on an idea O'Neill hoped to see in place before his retirement later this year. Reagan asked Congress Tuesday to approve the aid in reconstruction and conciliation support, such as jobs in Northern Ireland.

The five-year aid package, which would provide \$250 million in development and economic assistance as well as \$40 million in contributions to an international fund for economic and social development, was the subject of a hearing today before the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

#### Parental Leave Bill Supported

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A group of House members has introduced a bill that would provide 18 weeks of unpaid leave and job guarantees for men and women when their children are born, adopted or seriously ill.

Saying the days of stav-at-home moms are gone, the group Tuesday called for a national parental leave policy to give men and women in the workforce up to 18 weeks of unpaid parental leave.

"It is no longer 'Leave it to Beaver' time," said Rep. Patricia Schroeder, D-Colo., referring to the classic television series which portrayed the family model of the working father and mother at home.

Rep. William Clay, D-Mo., chairman of a House subcommittee on labor-management relations, said the Parental and Medical Leave Act of 1986 fills a critical gap for Americans in the workplace.

# Keeping Weapons Out Of Courthouse

"Between a rock and a hard place," may describe the problem some Seminole County officials face today in determining how to keep weapons out of the open-to-the-public courthouse in Sanford.

The sheriff's department has submitted three plans to increase security at the courthouse, augmenting measures already in place. Scheduled to meet at noon to discuss the plans were Circuit Judge Kenneth M. Leffler. County Administrator Ken Hooper and Sheriff John Polk. Since Polk is ill with the flu. Lt. Robert Kunkler. head of the sheriff's department's judicial division at the courthouse, was scheduled to attended the meeting. Also expected at the meeting Montye Beamer, assistant county administrator, who has been studying the problems and solution proposals. Up for discussion is what equipment should be

installed, how long it will take to install the equipment - complicated by courthouse renovations - and what security measures should be implemented between now and the future installation.

Bailiffs with hand-held metal detectors now monitor entrances to the courthouse and routinely ask people if they are carrying weapons or if they or the articles they are carrying can be searched. Since that program went into effect in October, deputies stationed at the courthouse have made numerous arrests of people carrying knives. stun guns and other weapons. Some drug arrests have also evolved from the encounter when bailiffs spot contraband. usually in a purse.

The security measures were instituted to forestall the type of courthouse shootout that occurred in January, 1984, in Orange County. In that incident one person was killed and two permanently injured when a

lone gunman summoned to court on a traffic citation opened fire.

The security plans under review today for the Seminole County are similar to each other save for the amount of equipment;

Hooper said the optimum plan to tighten; security calls for cameras, in and outside the building, walk-through metal detectors, X-ray scanners for hand-carried articles such as at airports, armor plating about the witness chair and judge's bench and an alarm system connecting various rooms with the security office.

The "minimum" plan, an alarm system, armor and cameras, would cost about \$44,000. The "second level" of security would include the first plan and include more cameras. That plan would cost \$84,000. The third plan, incorporating the first two and the X-ray machines, totals

## Parents: Listen, Talk To Children

In January 1985, Emmy Award winner Bruce Weitz, who portrays Det. Mick Belker on NBC's "Hill Street Blues," went to Chicago to launch a National PTA campaign called "Write Bruce."

The actor has donated much of his time since 1984 as Honorary Chairman of the PTA's Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Project.

He asked young people in the Chicago area under the age of 18 to write to him about

He did the same thing in Los Angeles in September. While you wouldn't think teenagers would be eager to talk to an adult about drugs, Mr. Weltz' request was answered by more than 13,000 young people.

What he and the PTA learned from those letters was that children are crying out for guidance when it comes to the question of whether or not to use drugs, including

Most of the Chicago letters were from 11- to 13-year-olds who had not yet tried drugs, but who felt they would some day be asked to and didn't know how to handle the situation.

At the same time, PTAs report that parents generally deny that their children could possibly be exposed to drugs.

That means that while children wish they could discuss drugs with their parents, the adults are reluctant to discuss the issue or take a "just don't do it" approach, which doesn't give young people much guidance.

The National PTA has designated March 2-8, 1986, as Drug and Alcohol Awareness Week. Its theme is "Prevention: A Positive Approach.'

And while there is no specific district-wide schedule of programs in Seminole County in confunction with the drug and alcohol awareness week project, various Seminole County schools are conducting different kinds of programs to make students aware of the dangers of substance use and abuse.

Drug and alcohol abuse among the young continues to be of epidemic proportions.

It's time for parents to stop burying their heads in the sand and listen to what their children are saying. The time to stop drug abuse is before it starts. That means parents must start listening to and talking to their children about alcohol and other drugs ...

# Where'd Dinosaurs Go? The Shadow Knows

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A new fossil site in any more than ignorance and stupidity are. Canada is reported to provide the best evidence yet that many animal species were wiped out by catastrophes occurring during the Dinosaur Age. But maybe it's only the best evidence vet that human scientists have been extraordinarily slow in learning what happened to the dino-

I have long contended there is a big difference between being ignorant and being stupid. One (ignorance) implies a lack of knowledge. The other (stupidity) implies a mental inability to grasp that knowledge in the first place.

Everybody is ignorant of something, either through accident or design. The sum of knowledge simply has become too large for any one brain to grasp, regardless of how well informed a person might be. There hasn't been a true Renaissance man since the Renaissance.

We all have to forgo learning something, and I am convinced that dinosaurs have been short-

Oh, sure, there have been all sorts of theories about why the giant reptiles disappeared. But theory and proof aren't synonyms, you know,

The most recent theory I've come across postulates that dinosaurs vanished after a meteor shower kicked up climate-changing dust

To give science the benefit of the doubt, that theory was advanced more in Ignorance than stupidity.

Although I am totally ignorant insofar as biology, geology and paleontology are concerned, that doesn't keep me from offering my own theory.

I theorize that dinosaurs simply didn't survive the separation of Earth's continental plates.

Consider the discovery in Nova Scotia of North America's richest fossil site. Sedimentary rocks, of the type previously overlooked by scientists. are estimated to contain more than 100,000 fragments of fossilized bone.

True, the fossils include primative crocodiles and sharks, but other prehistoric creatures will have to fend for themselves. At the moment, I'm on the trail of missing dinosaurs.

Short of putting their pictures on plastic milk cartons, I have nowhere to turn but to the National Geographic Society.

Let's examine what caused all those rifts in Earth's crust.

According to a Geographic news release. valleys from Canada all the way down to the Carolinas were created "when the North American and African continental plates, which were once a part of one giant landmass, started to pull apart.

It stands to reason that a dinosaur accustomed to an African-like climate would be more than a little dismayed to find itself in Canada instead. Particularly in winter.

Even the weather as far south as Virginia might have been a bit rigorous for the giant reptiles. So they crawled into the valleys to keep

To me, that seems more rational than speculation that Earth was pelted by objects from outer space.

Dinosaurs aren't groundhogs, you know. Once they saw their shadows, they may have assumed the weather was like that all year round and suffered heart attacks.

# On That Pain In Your Jaw

NEW YORK (UPI) - Perhaps one fourth of all Americans hear a telltale click when they "open wide" that signals their jaws are not working perfectly, doctors say. For some, there is pain as well as noise.

"Jaw dysfunction is characterized by headaches, pains in the face, stiff neck and shoulders," said Annette Iglarsh, who teaches physical therapy of the law at the University of Maryland, "For many years it seemed to be misdiagnosed as migraine or tooth problems, but doctors are more attuned to the importance of the jaw now."

The two joints of the jaw are the only ones in the body that must work in perfect balance, say health officials. When one side of the jaw is favored over the other, the jawbones create stress in their sockets, grinding against the disks that are supposed to cushion the joints.

If the disks are damaged, the bones case out of their sockets with the telltale click whenever the mouth is opened wide.

For most people the matter ends there. But for some, the unbalanced jaw puts a strain on muscles that ache in turn. The pain can be occasional and fleeting - or chronic.

"We lump everything under the label TMJ (temporomandibular joint dysfunction) but really almost every case is different for every individual," said Dr. Arthur S. North, surgeon at Johns Hopkins University Hospital and a leading researcher on jaw disorders.

There is a lengthy list of reasons the jaw joints of an estimated 50 million Americans do not function in harmony. Automobile accidents and sports injuries account for many of the problems, but so does

Some people tense the muscles on one side of their face when they are angry or distressed, said Dr. Daniel M. Laskin, a surgeon at the Medical College of Virginia. Over time, the tensed muscles pull the whole jaw off kilter, he said.

For others, poor posture can account for TMJ. Slouching or hanging the head to one side can eventually cause the jaw to become permanently unbalanced, said Ig-

Perhaps the major cause of TMJ is malocclusion of the teeth, say the doctors. A person whose teeth donot meet properly will compensate either by chewing on only one side of the mouth or shifting the lower jaw until their teeth do meet.

# Manned Flights Damaged

WASHINGTON (NEA) - The and land like an airplane but reach damaged the space agency's hopes for manned space exploration. which consumed most of its energy for the past 10 years.

For the last decade, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration concentrated almost solely on the manned space program, nearly ignoring all unmanned programs except those for deep-space exploration. Its single-minded concentration on the shuttle, to the exclusion of all other launch vehicles, had already opened it up to criticism.

At the time of the Challenger explosion, the shuttle program was gearing up for its busiest year. Meanwhile, a presidential commission made up of NASA and Pentagon officials, plus nongovernment experts, was reassessing the overall space program and planning the next generation of space vehicles. This National Commission on Space plans to have its report on President Reagan's desk by the year's end, possibly

Sources close to the commission say that early drafts of the report recommend research to investigate three kinds of boosters: unmanned systems: a radically different manned space vehicle; and shuttles like the present ones, but with major design changes.

The major unanswered question is: How much should each program be emphasized?

Proponents of unmanned vehicles are pushing a new-generation heavy-lift booster based on the Saturn V rocket that sent man to the moon. The military likes the "spaceplane," which could take off

Challenger tragedy has severely altitudes of 20 to 100 miles and put people and payloads into orbit. NASA remains committed to a second-generation space shuttle with improved technology, but following the present design.

NASA officials have argued that abandoning the shuttle would be a waste of time, money and effort. The space program, they say, can't rely on unmanned vehicles, since people are needed to do research and repairs in space. "There are a lot of expensive satellites up there that need, or will need, to be repaired by a man with a screwdriver, for at least the foreseeable future," said one NASA official, "and that requires the shuttle."

Many space scientists, especially those outside government, believe that NASA's total focus on manned missions has taken too much money from space exploration in general. They claim that the shuttle has sapped funding and momentum from successful missions like Voyager 2. For years, the Pentagon -

primarily the Air Force - has pushed for alternatives to the shuttle. These include reviving proven-"throwaway rocket" technology (such as Saturn) and developing completely new systems for putting payloads into orbit.

The most promising of these may be the trans-atmospheric vehicle (TAV), which, in his State of the Union Address, President Reagan cited as a top priority for research. Concepts for the TAV include a version that could take off from conventional airport runways, deliver satellites and astronauts into orbit, and then return under its own

# **About** Heroes, **Villains**

Watching the Reagan-nurtured Marcos tyranny go down the tubes was a carnival diversion for the American people. But we have more pressing concerns at home - the safety of Tylenol capsules.

Both crises and how this nation has responded to the horror of the unknowable without resorting to scapegoating exalt the uniqueness of our character.

Some critics - and I have been one - have contended erroncously that American history taught Ferdinand Marcos about democracy especially how to steal elections. Southern post-bellum guiles for denying black votes. Tammany Hall appointments of corrupt judges, a vote-stealing Hague machine in Jersey City, N.J., and a Chicago prescription for electoral success -"vote early and often" — must have impressed Marcos. But none of these were representative of America's "character." Even the greatest national scandals - from Teapot Dome to Watergate - were individual aberrations.

I confess that I cannot declare with certainty that Johnson & Johnson's decision to discontinue selling Tylenol capsules ton which my hiatal hernia and ulcer have relied for years) was an example of genuine concern over a tragic death and not simple marketing strategy (to restore consumer confidence). But there was no mistaking the sincerity of Johnson & Johnson's chairman, James E. Burke, when he said in a quivering voice, "While this decision is a financial burden to us (a possible loss of \$100 million to \$150 million after taxes), it does not begin to compare with the loss suffered by the family and friends of Diane Elsroth.

WASHINGTON — In his first public comment on his daughter Patti's "autobiographical novel," President Reagan told us a few days ago that it's "interesting fiction." He said it with an actor's barely detectable emphasis on the word "fiction."

There's no doubt whatever that the novel, "Home Front," is being enthusiastically portrayed as autobiographical by the publisher, Crown. The breathless tribute on the book's dust jacket says: "Patti-Davis, the actress daughter of Ronald and Nancy Reagan, has written a surprising, moving and candidly autobiographical novel about growing up in the public eye

There's also no doubt that the novel bears a resemblance to the life of the 33-year-old Ms. Davis, who uses her mother's maiden name in her acting career.

The novel at least spares the First Family the use of real names. The heroine/narrator is Beth Canfield. rebellious daughter of Robert, who is elected California governor and then president, and Harriet, described on the book jacket as "a strong-willed woman fiercely loyal to her husband's dream: the pre-

Robert Canfield's background sounds familiar, too: Because of his "hardy good looks and persuasive voice," he is hired as spokesman/huckster for "National Motors." In time, "men in important positions saw that my father's homespun likability could sell a great deal more than the latest model station wagon," Patti - er. Beth tells the reader.

Generally, the novel isn't unkind to the ficitonal parents, though there are some unflattering descriprelationship.

Someone identified as a Reagan family friend was quoted in People magazine as saying: "Of course there's bound to be some hurt. Would you want to see all your warts in public, exposed by somebody in your family?"

But when we asked the president his opinion of the book, his response betrayed neither irritation nor bitterness: "Well, I will just say it very simply. I thought it was interesting fiction. And as to any effort of anyone to portray it as autobiographical, I will cite that line that appears at the bottom or at the end of every movie: 'Any relationship or resemblance to persons living or dead is purely coincidental."

The president's four children have always tended to go their own ways. but Patti, the older of his second marriage's two children, put the greatest distance between herself and her parents a decade ago. tions of the Canfields' parent-child During her father's unsuccessful

race for the presidency in 1976, Patti was living with a pop guitarist and avoided most press interviews.

But when she did speak out, it was often to express views that were poles apart from her father's. She demonstrated against the Vietnam War and nuclear energy, and supported the right of a woman to have an abortion, the recreational use of marijuana and cohabitation before marriage.

In her own autobiography, Nancy Reagan barely mentions her daughter or the estrangement. But when someone once asked the first lady about Patti's politics, she replied in exasperation: "Who would want a clone for a child?"

Patti hopes to star as Beth in a TV version of her book. Would a retired politician named Ronald Reagan play Robert Canfield? Years ago. Patti told a reporter, "I always had this fantasy that I could do a film with him someday."

For \$3,900, Celestis Group, Inc. says it will take the cremated remains of a loved one, pack them into a gold-plated lipstick-sized capsule inscribed with the deceased's name, and launch them into orbit around the Earth. Lewis said. For \$700 more - that is. \$4,600 -Celestis will send the remains hurtling out of orbit and off

Celestis plans to make its first launch some time next year, but Lewis says they must get a license first. Company owners John Cherry of Cape Canaveral, James Kuhl of Melbourne and Beauford Franklin of Melbourne have 21 days to respond to the complaint. Lewis says.

#### Rock Musician Hangs Self

WINTER PARK (UPI) - Richard Manuel, planist for the rock group. The Band, hanged himself in a motel hours after performing with the quintet at a lounge in suburban Orlando, police said.

Manuel 42, was found by his wife. Arlie, in a bathroom at the Quality Inn Motel about noon Tuesday, Winter Park police spokesman Rick Nuss said.

Nuss said police were treating Manuel's death as a suicide, but Manuel apparently left no note. Police had no information about why Manuel might have committed

Manuel's wife left the motel to get some food and found her husband's body five or 10 minutes later, when she returned, Nuss said.

She called for paramedics, but they were unable to save him. Nuss said.

Manuel was a native of Stratford, Ont. He performed with the five-piece rock group Monday night at the Cheek to Cheek Lounge at the Villa Nova Restaurant in Winter Park. next door to the motel where he died.

#### Abortion Squeal Bill Proposed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A House subcommittee Tuesday adopted a bill requiring physicians to inform parents before performing an abortion on any woman younger than 18.

Any doctor who performed an abortion on a minor without telling her parents or legal guardian would automatically be guilty of "interference with family relations" and open to civil suit.

The law allows emergency abortions without first telling parents, and sets out a procedure by which a minor could ask a court to grant her doctor an exemption.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Jim Watt, R-Lake Park. passed the Health and Rehabilitative Services subcommittee for Health and Economic Services by a vote of 3-2. Voting for the bill were Reps. George Crady. D-Yulee, Rodolfo Garcia Jr., R-Hialeah, and D.L. Thomas, R-Englewood, Reps. Irma Rochlin, D-Hallandale, and Steve Press, D-Delray Beach, voted against the bill,

#### Condemned Murder To Get Exam

STARKE (UPI) - A death warrant for Aubrey Dennis Adams will be allowed to expire today so the condemned murderer can undergo psychiatric examination to determine if he is sane enough to be executed, a lawyer for Gov. Bob Graham said.

Adams's lawyers also filed two separate applications with U.S. Supreme Court Justice Lewis Powell earlier Tuesday. saying he is "incompetent to be executed," because he is mentally unable to appreciate the nature and purpose of the punishment to be inflicted.

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
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# Brantley Girls Win On Depth





One thing for certain, if he's a Blake he has talent. The same is true of Ron Blake. who played on a Sanford Little Major League fifth-place team in the state tournament as a 12-year-old. Later, he had a couple of productive years for Rotary in the Sanford Junior League.

A well built young man. Blake is one of those unique combinations of a left-handed thrower and a right-handed hitter. Last year, he got a late start due to difficulty in the classroom. He joined the Seminoles near the end of the season.

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# 'Unwritten, Misused, Abused Rules Of Tennis'

Tennis is a game of many rules, a complicated scoring system and many very subtle situations that a player must learn if they are to enjoy the game and get the very most out of it.

Several of the rules are unwritten and vague but are still very important to know. Often we learn them hard way and pay the price of embarrassment or ridicule.

Some provoke tense, unusual or even funny situations. Through the years I have seen them all and been involved in most of them. I would like to share some with you. I call them "Unwritten, Misused and Abused Rules of Tennis." See if some of these sound familiar to you.

•1. Who furnishes the balls? Did you ever go out to play a doubles match and all four players stand around, tshifting their weight from side to side) waiting to see who will

"pop" that new can of balls. Lonce played with a gov who carried the same "new" can of balls around for months. He never opened the balls. he just acted like he was going to. His timing was perfect. He would fiddle with his racket or string and just as someone would open their new can of balls he would reach for his and say "Let Me..." Get the picture?

Anyway, if you play with the same group on a regular basis you should take turns furnishing new balls. Otherwise, the person that formed the match should furnish them.

•2. The play by play announcer some player feels compelled to give a running dialogue on each point. Often this is the result of tension but still it is very annoying to most players.

Here are some examples: "Your cross-court passing shot was hit well, but I got to it with my top spin-

"Too had that dog harked and distracted me.

"Love-15, Ready?"

For most people it is a giant turn off to have Howard Cosell across the net from them. It's better to move your mind and feet and not your mouth.

•3. The Excuse-Maker, From the time you start warming up this player

has been making excuses. "I was up all night."

"I have a sore back."

"My enrings are too tight," " The wind is bad."

"My moon is not in its proper orbit." No matter how well you are playing the excuse maker will not give you credit. He'll say you are lucky, or playing over your head, or he just has so many problems he can't play. If you happen to play a player like this you should be glad because they are

usually easy to beat. •4. Lesser player never asks the better player to play. Unless it's in the family or your best triend, you should never ask a player several levels higher than you to play.

Nothing is less appealing for a good player than to have to play a match against someone several levels below them. It's boring and the better player does not get any practice or have any

Exceptions to this are, of course, family, good friends, giving lessons or trying to get a date with a certain someone. Trying to win the favor of your boss could certainly qualify here.

●5. The Warm-Up All-American. Some people start hitting the ball as hard as they can as soon as the warm-up starts. They put balls away.

Warm-up time is to get your rhythm. your feel. You need to hit balls and ger the juices flowing. If your opponent won't keep any balls in play you can't get ready to play. Warm up smoothly and with control - give your opponent a break.

•6. The "Let's Make a Day of It Player." The USTA rules say 30 seconds between points, and one minute on change-overs. Some people take so much time between points and/or odd games that you forget the score or even cool off.

Unless both players want to chat or rest you should adhere to the rules.

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



# Easy White Sauce Enhances Crab, Artichoke Casserole

Now is a good time to focus our attention on Florida scafood. It is abundant and because of that the prices are usually the best. You may want to travel to Great Florida and attend the Seafood Festival or maybe just buy locally and prepare some at home. All of these recipes contain 2 cups of crab meat or other scafood, but can serve six or more servings because of the other ingredients in the casseroles. I find it less timeconsuming to buy crab meat that is already picked and pas-

Part of this recipe is a white sauce that you make in the micorwave oven. If you have never done that before, you will be amazed at how easy it is.

#### CRAB AND ARTICHOKE CASSEROLE

3 tbsp. butter 3 thsp. flour

11/2 cups milk l tsp. salt

⅓ tsp. pepper 1/2 tsp. worcestershire sauce 1/2 cup cheddar cheese

1/3 cup parmesan cheese 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

14 tsp. tabasco sauce

4 hard-cooked eggs, chopped 2 cups crab meat 4 cup or more parmesan cheese

As is so often the case when examples are taken from world' championship play, the bidding deserves some explanation. The two-club opening bid by South was natural, showing a minimum opening with at least five clubs. The three-spade bid by West was intermediate. showing good playing strength. 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#### **Angolan Guerrillas Taking** Captives On 700-Mile March

LISBON, Portugal (UPI) - Anti-Marxist Angolan rebels were taking some 150 European and Asian captives on a two-month. 700-mile march across war-torn southern Africa to their headquarters for release, a guerrilla

"But we worry the government may send MiG jet fighters and helicopters to attack the columns," spokesman Alcides Simoes told United Press International Tuesday.

He said the guerrillas had taken "every precaution" to protect the hostages on the long march to their southeastern headquarters at Jamba.

The more than 150 prisoners — British, West German, Portuguese, Romanian and Filipino mining technicians and dependents - were seized Saturday by UNITA, the rebel Union for the Total Independence of Angola, in an attack on the Andrada mines. Angola's second-largest diamond mining complex.

The report could not be independently confirmed. Simoes, contacted in Lisbon, said the captives were "well" and would be released through the International Red Cross "once they reach our headquarters in about two months."

#### More Violence In S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - Police surrounded Alexandra today when thousands of blacks streamed toward a sports stadium in the riot-torn township for the funeral of 17 people killed in anti-apartheid violence last month.

The funeral came a day after President Pieter Botha said in Parliament he will lift South Africa's 7-month-old state of emergency soon but planned to grant security forces additional powers to "protect lives and property."

More than 1.100 people - the overwhelming majority of them black - have been killed since a wave of violence over the white minority government's policies of racial separation, known as apartheid, began in September 1984.

In Pretoria, police said today officers shot and killed a man throwing a gasoline bomb. A woman was killed in a hand-grenade blast near Pretoria, and a private security guard was stabbed to death near East London, police said.

Two helicopters swooped low over the squalid Alexandra houses, and armored trucks patrolled the perimeter of the township, where at least 23 people were killed in anti-apartheid rioting last month.

Almuradov Shamil Gadji Ogly was found guilty in a one-day trial Tuesday in the Intermediate People's Court in Harbin, a court official said.

He has 10 days in which to appeal. "It he does not appeal, then the court will uphold his prison sentence. which is between three and 10 years," a court official said. The official declined to elaborate.

A Soviet diplomat, who asked not to be named, said Ogly was sentenced to eight years in prison.

Doesn't Protect 'Crude' Speech

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The First Amendment guarantee of freedom of speech was not intended to protect a crude and vulgar speech nominating a teenager for student government, a school district lawyer told the Supreme Court.

William Coats, representing the Bethel School District near Tacoma, Wash., acknowledged past high court rulings have maintained students do not shed their constitutional rights at the schoolhouse door, but told the justices that schools can regulate "indecent speech."

"There was no political issue being discussed. It was a crude joke." he said of the student's campaign speech.

The school district brought the case before the justices to try and overturn a March 1984 ruling by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals that the punishment, including a three-day suspension, meted out to student Matthew Fraser for giving the speech was unconstitutional.

Lawyer Jeffrey Haley, representing Fraser, argued the speech was protected by the First Amendment and noted that "sex is not a forbidden topic for students" and is, in fact, of great interest to teenagers.

Fraser, who plans to become a lawyer and attended the high court hearing, said after the argument Monday he hopes the court will guarantee high school students the same free speech rights as everyone else. A ruling in the case is expected by July.

"If sexual innuendo can be limited, what cannot be?" asked Fraser, 20, who is now a political science major at the University of California at Berkeley, "We need to make sure students can give speeches some might find inappropriate."

The case began April 26. 1983, when Fraser, then a 17-year-old senior at Bethel High School, nominated a friend for Publish February 26 & March 5. school office at an assembly attended by about 600 students. | DEO 171

The four-paragraph speech used no obscenitites, but school officials concluded it was sexually suggestive and disruptive.

Typical of the speech was a portion promoting the candidate by saying he "is a man who will go to the very end, even the climax, for each and every one of you.'

The speech was met by hoots and hollers from the students and some students simulated sexual acts.

Shortly after the speech. Fraser was suspended for three days and his name was removed from a list of candidates for graduation speaker.

Fraser, the two-year recipient of the "Top Speaker" award in statewide debate championships, complained, but officials refused to lift his suspension. Then, along with his father, he brought suit in federal court charging his rights had been violated.

The court agreed, lifting the suspension and ordering he be allowed to speak at commencement, where he had been elected graduation speaker on a write-in vote. The ruling was upheld by the appeals court.

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
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# Calcium For Health

# Today's Health-Oriented Society Expects Food That Is Good For You

party guests expect more than food that looks good and tastes gredient required by our health-oriented society - food that is good for you.

For women especially, one of healthy eating is calcium intake.

The best sources of calcium are found in dairy products among which is the "all-American" processed cheese food slice such as singles featured in these delicious reci-

Calcium is essential for building bones, muscle contraction, blood clotting and nerve function. If the body does not get enough, hormones will cause calcium to be released from the skeleton into the bloodstream to make it available for nerves and muscles. Long-term inadequate intakes of calcium have been associated with the development of osteoporosis — porous, brittle, breakable bones. For approximately one out of every four women over the age of 65, this disorder is all too well-known.

Although osteoporosis is most commonly observed in persons in their sixties, the disorder may actually begin in the mid 30's. The key to reducting potential risk is to build maximum bone mass before age 35. But no matter what the age, steps can be taken today to insure an adequate calcium intake.

I) EXAMINE YOUR DIET: The Recommended Dietary Allowance (RDA) for calcium is 800 mg for adults. However, getting the RDA for calcium is not always easy, especially for women. In fact, two out of every three women over the age of 17 do not consume the RDA for calcium - most are getting only about 600 mg per day. But according to some experts, even this may not be enough for the average woman. These experts suggest the RDA be raised to 1,000 mg before menopause and 1,500 mg after menopause.

2)BE AWARE OF CALCIUM LOSS FACTORS: Coffee, alcohol and nicotine from any source may increase calcium loss.

3) EXERCISE: Exercise involving movement and muscle pull is recommended. Interestingly. NASA medical consultants have noted an immediate loss of bone mass in astronauts spending even a short amount of time in zero gravity. Likewise, people who require complete bed rest for long periods of time lose calcium from the bone. Hence, walking, Jogging, aerobic dancing, gymnastics, tennis and weight lifting all work on behalf of the bones. Exercising outdoors in the sun allows the body to make vitamin D.

To achieve an all around good dlet which provides plenty of calcium, learn the best food sources of calcium and then incorporate these foods into your daily diet. (Milk and American cheese are convenient sources of

Todag's brunch or luncheon calcium.) Incorporating these dairy products into the three meals of the day is an easy way great. There's an additional in- to help you get the recommended allowance for calcium.

Other suggestions include: 1) adding cheese in sandwiches and salads; 2) snacking on the many important factors in cheese and crackers; and 3) using milk and cheese in casser9les.

# If You Can Fix Just One Dish, Then Let It Be A Masterpiece

Many years ago a writer friend of mine mastered his mother's recipe for baked beans.

The secret is in the use of maple syrup and the long, slow cooking time.

In the United States, succulent mushrooms are a popular favorite, and mushroom growers are providing all regions with this fungus. Mushrooms are very good raw, as an appetizer or marinated in salads. They also can make a meal when sauteed and served on crusty bread (a French favorite). Another way to serve mushrooms is to stuff them. For the adventuresome, large mushroom caps stuffed with escargot, available in cans. make a great appetizer.

For the escargot-shy, mushroom caps stuffed with chopped mushrooms, bread crumbs and seasonings are just as delicious.

#### **ESCARGOTS** DES BOIS (Snails In Mushroom Caps)

12 large fresh mushrooms 2 tablespoons lemon juice

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
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


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
