UCF student jailed for lewd acts

OVIEDO - An Oviedo man is facing life in prison after investigators say he committed sexual acts on two 11-year old girls.

Investigators said Jeffrey Allan McSweeney, 31, committed the acts during the past year while living in the home of one of the victims. He was renting the bedroom of a home in Oviedo while attending the University of Central Florida, and investigators said the parents were not aware of the acts that were taking place in their own home.

One of the victims said the parents were downstairs sometimes when it happened," said

William McNett, major crimes investigator for the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "They had no idea whatsoever this was going on. They were shocked and horrified."

McSweeney was helping the parents remodel the home in lieu of rent, McNett said.

This is not McSweeney's first McSweeney was arrest for a sex crime. In 1994, he was arrested in Volusia County arrested in Volusia for lewd and lascivious acts on a County for a sex crime child. "I hope not, but it is possible," McNett said. "It wouldn't surprise me."

Commission OKs rezoning

By a 4-0 vote, Board allows development to move forward

SANFORD — Commissioner Daryl McLain, saying he was a fourth generation Seminole County resident, told a group of land owners that it was time for them to negotiate rather than dog development plans in an area

near Sanford. In a 4-hour meeting Tuesday night, the Board of Commissioners moved forward on plans to rezone rural areas from A-I (Agriculture) to PUD (Planned Unit Development.)

As District 5 commissioner, McLain made the motion to approve staff plans, but he told a developer and those protesting development "to sit down together" and resolve what differences

they might have.

"Work out something in good faith," McLain said. "It's a fact of life that people want to have nice houses on smaller lots. There's enough for everyone. Certainly, you want to protect your homes."

The land owners, who formed an organization named WATCH DOG (Worried and Terribly Concerned Homeowners Disgusted Over Government), were trying to defend their rural See Rezoning, Page 3A

SANFORD - One day the Central Florida Zoo may be known as Zoo Orlando at Sanford.

That day isn't today. One day Seminole County may make a \$3 million contribution (\$600,000 annually for 5

years) to the zoo. That day wasn't Tuesday. The Board of County Commissioners listened to an

appeal by Ed Posey, executive director of the zoo but postponed a vote to approve Posey's request.

"I'm hesitant to commit just yet," County Chairman Carlton Henley told Posey and

the others who had helped make the presentation.

Henley said county staff needed time to designate how much there was in the general fund to make the zoo contribution. He said the commission also had to find funds to build a Criminal Justice Center, expand the county jail and take care of waste water problems.

"Give the zoo the commitment

now - it is a high priority," Commissioner Daryl McLain said, "save some of the money on the courthouse (Criminal Justice Center)."

Turning to Posey, McLain said, "You have my full support right

"We need to support the zoo, and we will," Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide said. "I'd like to see Orange and Volusia counties join us. Children from those counties will be educated and enjoy the zoo, also. This is

for everyone." Posey detailed the expansion plans for the zoo, which would come in

Dick Van Der Weide Seminole County Commissioner said that-Wayne Densch, Inc. has

three phases. The total cost would be \$38 million - \$11.5 million for the first phase. He

made a \$1 million contribution. Other private donations were expected and there would be federal and state grants.

The zoo has operated at its current 109-acre location since July 1975. Posey said the zoo was home to 400 animals - many of them among the "rarest on the planet."

State may close Ridgewood Villas for code violations



The State Division of Hotels and Restaurants is threatening to close the

SANFORD - The owners of Ridgewood Villas, a condominium and apartment complex near Seminole High School. say they intend to renovate the complex despite facing a closure notice from the State's Division of Hotels and Restaurants because of code violations.

During an inspection on July 7, the State Division of Hotels and Restaurants cited Ridgewood Villas for code violations, including inadequate fire extinguisher and smoke alarm systems and a lack of

maintenance to the grounds. The State issued closure

notices to owners James Shirkey, a Lakeland developer, and John Siriani, President of Ridgewood Villas, Inc.


Siriani said he questions whether the Division of Hotels and Restaurants has jurisdiction to enforce the notice because he said the complex is made up of condominiums, not apartments. Thirty of the 60 units in the complex have been sold to individuals or other entities, Siriani said. The remaining units will be renovated and sold.

"At worst, they (Division of

Hotels and Restaurants) would only have jurisdiction over 30 units that have not been sold," Siriani said.

On Tuesday, Sanford's Code Enforcement Board postponed action against Ridgewood Villas for violations of city codes for 30 days. Ridgewood Villas was cited by the Sanford Fire Department for lack of a functional fire alarm system. Code Enforcement officers also said they were also concerned about upkeep to the grounds and electrical wiring.

"There will be a continuous need for upgrading and repairs See Ridgewood, Page 3A



ous acts upon a child, which carries a possible life sentence. He also faces multiple counts of child pornography and computer pornography for downloading pictures of minors on his computer, investigators said.

McSweeney was sharing the Oviedo home with the victim's grandfather and mother, plus two nephews from Spain.

The second victim lived in the same neighborhood, with her parents and a younger brother. The two girls were friends, investigators said. The second victim let her parents know about McSweeney's alleged actions Tuesday, and the parents

contacted law enforcement.

According to the arrest report, the victim told her parents that McSweeney had her remove her shorts and perform oral sex on him. McSweeney also fondled her breasts, the victim said.

The victim said McSweeney sat at his computer and watched pictures of animals

having sexual intercourse with females and of young children having sexual intercourse, according to the report.

Sun and Moon

McNett said the victim he has spoken to blames herself for what has happened.

"She thinks it's not his fault, it's her fault," McNett said. "That's typical in these types of situations."

Investigators are confiscating McSweeney's computer systems and any recording equipment that may have been used to download child pornography.

McSweeney is being held in the John E. Polk Correctional Facility in Sanford without bail.



Mayor Breaux on the mother of all boulevards

The drive from his home in Maltland to the Seminole County Services Building in downtown Sanford took Robert Breaux exactly 20 minutes on Tuesday.

"That's not bad," said the Mayor of all Maitland, "At this time of the day (shortly after 9 a.m.) U.S. Highway 17-92 can handle the traffic. Most of the time It can't."

Seminole County has asked Breaux's help on U.S. Highway 17-92. The city and the county have formed a **Gateway Entrance** partnership. Winter Park is the third partner.

The idea is to spruce up the Gateway Entrance — agreeing on what kind of trees and shrubs to plant and on what types of structures to be built.

In other words, give the mother of all area roads the mother of all makeovers.

"Commissioner Randy Morris challenged us a couple of years ago," Breaux said Tuesday. "He showed up a one of our council meetings. I had no idea why he was there. As a courtesy - and curiosity - I asked if he wanted to tell us something.

"Sure enough, he wanted to talk about a Gateway Entrance plan. We thought that was a great challenge and we accepted it," Breaux said. "I came over today to thank the county and to pledge our continued support."

Breaux said the city and county also partnered the interchange at Maitland Boulevard

Greater Maitland is an idvilic community of 10,022 residents. The city itself stretches well beyond the town center either west across I-4 or east loward Semoran Blvd. City Hall, the Fire Station and Culture Corridor are located in a four block area off U.S. Highway 1

Those living in Maitland are residents of Orange County although 2,375 Seminole County residents have Maitland Post Office addresses.

Thousands go through Maitland daily on their way toward Seminole County. Going over the Orange-Seminole border is a culture shock to many. The nudie bars spring up on each side of the road. So does the Jai Alai fronton and the dog track.

"It spells out what we allow


in the way of schemes or structures and what we won't allow," he said.

"Developers won't have to go before Planning & Zoning or the Council for approval," he said. "They'll know first hand. It's all in the Pattern Book."

When Breaux finished his Seminole County visit, he was smiling. If traffic wasn't too bad, he'd be home in time for lunch with the First Lady of Maitland.

official Dan Florian. Siriani said his company

would work with Shirkey to address code violations and renovate the complex. "It's too bad because

Ridgewood Villas used to be one of the finest apartments in the city," said Code Enforcement Board member Paul Legge.

Ridgewood Villas will need to report progress to the board at the next hearing on Aug. 10.

"We've had some on-going problems there financially and otherwise," Siriani said. "We would like to come into compli-

ance immediately." One key financial problem was solved June 16 when Ridgewood Villas, Inc. sold 30 of the 60 units in the complex to Shirkey, ending a year-long dispute between the developers

that paralyzed funding for upkeep, Siriani said.

"We're going to fix it up," Siriani said.

During the dispute between the developers, a freeze was placed on selling Ridgewood Villas units. Without the income from sales, Ridgewood Villas, Inc. lacked the income to maintain the units in the condition that Siriani said he would like to see the complex attain.

"We were kind of in limbo,"

In addition, the complex suffered under poor management, Siriani said.

"Part of it is our fault," Siriani said. "We had managers who weren't doing a good job." Siriani said that security

guards will be hired for the complex beginning next week to prevent the vandalism. Last year, Ridgewood Villas had

Lovestrand's World

Longwood's mayor used the democratic system to get elected. Now that he's in office. he doesn't have much use for democracy.

History has provided us with plenty of lessons about dictators and bullies. Longwood residents need only to attend one of their commission meetings to see a contemporary version in action.

The latest utterances of his honor, Mayor Paul Lovestrand, are beginning to make us wonder what exactly his political agenda is. It's obvious by some of the ill-reasoned remarks he's made at commission meetings lately that he adores controversy and plays the role of lightning rod well. His statements at this week's special meeting to consider proposed changes to the city's charter were not only inflammatory, they were down right insulting to the residents he purports to serve.

In arguing against specific changes to Longwood's governing document, Lovestrand held the position that there can be too much democracy and that the commissioners could decide what is in the best interest of Longwood residents better than the voters can. Or as he put it, "We can do a better job than the average Joe on the street."


Read between the lines and watch his actions and rhetoric carefully. Lovestrand is a dinosaur. A throw-back to the 50s and 60s when towns and cities were tight-fistedly run by "strong" mayors who micro-managed every department with heavy overtones of political flavoring.


What Lovestrand really fears is that Longwood appears ready to join countless other municipalities across the United States in transferring the majority of power to run the city on a day-to-day basis away from the political machines and into the hands of a business manager who carries the title of city administrator or city manager.

That sticks squarely in Lovestrand's craw and he makes no bones about it in subliminal and overt ways. On countless occasions in the past two months, Lovestrand has treated fellow commissioners with verbal disdain and outright contempt if they dare to differ with his opinion. wielding his gavel like a battle ax. He's welcome to his opinion, but not at the expense of fellow commissioners and Longwood residents who attempt to take part in public hearings and other city business.

We all know what eventually happens to most dictators and bullies. Sooner or later get their noses bloodied and slink home. The majority of Longwood's board delivered its punch to his nose with a 3-1 vote.

Longwood residents will have their say in November as they should. Despite the "World According to Lovestrand," at least the majority of commissioners believe Longwood voters have the right to make that decision.

I don't know about you, but I am tired of books that tell me how to get healthy by avoiding certain foods, books that stress the harmful effects of sugar "addiction," of carbohydrate "overload," of protein "toxicity" or what-have-you in short, I am tired of the "food can kill you" approach to

That's why I was thrilled to welcome a new cookbook, "A Spoonful of Ginger," into my kitchen. Its subtitle says it all: "Irresistible, Health-Giving Recipes from Asian Kitchens." It is a book about the joy of eating, about the healing power of food, and about how people need certain nutrients at certain times in their lives. It is not a book that promises eternal life or eternal thinness. It is a book about making friends with food. And with food, as with people, making friends requires a little bit of work to understand and appreciate.

HOT AND SOUR SALMON WITH GREENS

For the dressing:

6 tablespoons soy sauce 3-1/2 tablespoons Chinese black

vinegar or Worcestershire sauce 1/4 cup sugar, or to taste

For the greens and salmon: 2-1/2 pounds bok choy (preferably beby bok choy), stem ends and leef tips trimmed

8 to 9 whole scallions, ends trimmed, cut into thin slices on

the diagonal 3 heaping tablespoons fresh ginger, peeled and cut into very thin

d salmon steaks, about 6 ounces

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Mix together the dressing ingredients in a bowl and set aside

Trim the tough outer leaves of the bok choy and discard. Rinse the stalks and leaves and drain. Cut the stalks in half lengthwise. Cut the halves diagonally into 2-inch sections. Toss the scallions, ginger and bok choy in a bowl. Arrange the greens on a heatproof platter that will fit on top of a

steamer tray over a masting pan. Place the salmon steaks on top of the greens.

DEAR ABBY: I worked for civil rights in the '60s. My 10-year-old daughter grew up in a racially mixed church, a racially mixed neighborhood and a racially mixed school. She has studied the history of slavery, Hitler, and other examples of what bigotry can do to a society, a country and the world. I have taught her from a very young age that bigutry is wrong, period. At the tender age of 10, she has already lost friends because she will not tolerate racist remarks. I have nationally tried to explain why racism was tolerated in the past in various societies.

A few days ago my daughter asked me a question I could not answer. "Mom, why is it OK to be a racist if you're black?" She went on to cite examples of racist remarks at her school, in the media, by politicians and on TV.

As I thought about it, she is correct. Today's America does tolerate, and in a few cases, even encourages blacks to be racist against whites. We wonder why there is violence in our schools. We despair over the white supremacist movement. We call for closer family support and guidance. Why do we not cry out against racism wherever it may be found? How can we move forward as a country, as a world, if we have not learned by our mistakes?

Please, Abby, help me out here! What can I tell her? MY KID'S MOM

DEAR MOM: Let's not point the finger only at black Ameri-


