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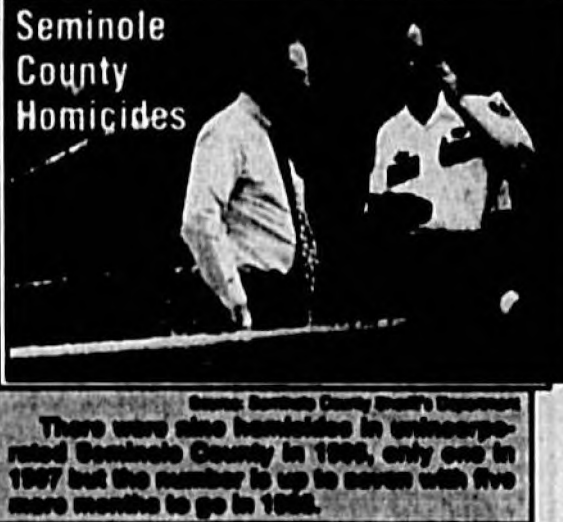

## County homicide numbers up

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Crime statistics - particularly homicides - have a way of fluctuating from year to year either giving people shivers or giving them a feeling of security.

There were 9 homicides in unincorporated Seminole County in 1998, only 1 in 1997 but the number is up to 7 with five more months to go in 1998.

The horrible killings of a couple and their 11-year-old daughter came two weeks after Sheriff's Deputy Eugene Gregory was killed in a shoot-out. His assailant eventu-

ally was gunned to death. Five dead in or near the town of Geneva.

"Life won't ever be back to normal for the Privett and Razor families or for many others," Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett said. "Loved ones have been lost. Naturally, people are affected. Our office is still affected by the loss of Gene Gregory."

As chilling as the deaths themselves is the fear that goes with them. Will there be more killings? How much caution should everyone take? What can law enforcement do?

Although investigators have not charged anyone for the three murders at Clekk Circle, career criminal Michael Reynolds is in

a Hillborough County jail and is suspected of having killed the family which lived on the same street as he did. Harriett said on Wednesday that the case remains open.

"It's important to recognize that this was not a random act of any kind," Harriett said. "There is no serial killer out there. There is no reason that people should feel terrorized. They should use good common sense and employ basic personal safety."

Statistically, Seminole County rates as one of the safest communities in Florida. The 1996 crime index for the county (crimes per 100,000 people) was 3,128 as of June 30. Please See Crime, Page 3A

## Father, son commended for rescue efforts

CASSELBERRY - A father and son were commended this week for their heroic efforts in the lake rescue of three boys. Sadly, however, one of them later died in the hospital.

Mayor Bruce Pronovost and Fire Chief Paul Algeri on Monday presented letters of commendation to Russell Hummel and his 11-year-old son, Jeffrey.

"I felt strongly that they extended themselves beyond the call of duty," said Battalion Chief Harry Klinger, who was on call July 16 when the incident occurred.

According to Klinger's report, Hummel was working in his yard, which backs up to North Lake Triplet, when he heard the cries for help from two boys. The pre-teen boys, who had attempted to swim across the lake, were holding 19-year old Keith Jones by the wrists but were unable to bring him to the surface.

"They tried to hold on to him but couldn't keep his head above water," Klinger said.

Hummel and his son then rowed their boat about 300 feet into the lake where they pulled the apparent drowning victim into the boat. Hummel began to administer CPR while Jeffrey paddled to shore. The two young boys held on to the side of the boat. Unfortunately, Klinger said, Jones died in the hospital on July 21.

The route the boys chose to swim originally was not insurmountable, Klinger said, adding that it was probably a leg cramp that caused the drowning. Without proper training, many swimmers don't know how to react when they get a cramp.

Klinger said he could not think of another drowning in the city's lakes during the 22 years he has served with the Sanford Fire Department. Please See Rescue, Page 4A

## Firefighters fighting for fair wages



Seminole County Firefighters picketed the county services building on Tuesday and Wednesday over fair wages. More than 60 off-duty firefighters marched seeking the public recognition as passers-by honked and waved in support of the demonstrators. Firefighter Robert Kreinbring and his 10-month-old daughter, Ashley, were among the protesters.

County officials said they were surprised by the timing of the demonstration because the firefighters' union is currently reviewing an offer by the county, which gives across-the-board increases ranging from \$2,000 to \$4,393, in addition, starting pay would rise from \$21,607 to \$26,000. According to union officials, Seminole County ranks 82nd in pay out of 134 reporting fire departments in the state.

## Gold: Thanks but no thanks to Republicans

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Former prosecutor and assistant state attorney Jeanne Gold has notified the Republican Executive Committee of Seminole County that she declines consideration for, and participation in "the unlawful candidate endorsement process" proposed and approved by the committee on July 16.

Citing Florida Statute 105.071, Gold said that it is illegal for any judicial candidate's identification as a member of any political party, and for a judicial candidate to participate in a political party endorsement activity or accept contributions from any political party.

The Seminole County Republicans have sued the state for not allowing it to endorse candidates but there has been no ruling and may not be one before the Sept. 1 election that pits Gold against incumbent County Judge John B. Sloop. Executive Committee Chairman Jim Stelling said that voters know little about those running for judicial positions and that an endorsement process is a way of identifying who's who.

Gold vehemently disagrees. "Despite what certain members of your leadership have represented, your partisan endorsement process is clearly unlawful," Gold informed the Republican Executive Committee. "I would, consistent with the law and my oath as an attorney and former prosecutor, decline to participate."

"I would also take this opportunity to strongly caution your membership to refrain from participation in this criminal enterprise," Gold notified the committee.

Altamonte Springs attorney Harry Jacobs has accused the area Republican honchos of trying to throw the weight of the party behind the candidate they support - John Sloop. And he says they are flagrantly breaking the law. "Jim Stelling and Ken Wright (legal committee chairman) are known Sloop supporters," Jacobs said.

Stelling did not see Gold's notification until this morning and said, "It sounds silly to me." He said the committee had no intention to interview either Gold or Sloop but to investigate their qualifications. Please See Endorse, Page 4A

## Mayor hosts House committee chairman on transportation tour

SANFORD - Mayor Larry Dale flew a light aircraft to Jacksonville this morning to bring State Representative Jim Fuller to Sanford. Fuller is chairman of the House Transportation Committee.

Dale said he wants to give Fuller a tour of Sanford and obtain his impressions and suggestions regarding the city's transportation needs.

They were scheduled to return to Sanford, arriving at the Orlando-Sanford Airport at approximately 10:30 this morning, after which the transportation tour will encompass the airport area.

Following lunch at Otters Restaurant, Dale and Port of

Sanford Executive Director Dennis Dolgner will take Fuller on a tour of the port area. Of major focus will be Vantare, a division of Featherlight Manufacturing. Dolgner said the company, presently located in an 80,000 square foot building at the port, is planning on an expansion.

Vantare manufactures custom motor home coaches, and is one of the major tenants at the Port of Sanford.

The Mayor said the intention of bringing Rep. Fuller to Sanford was to hear his comments regarding the city's transportation at the present time, what might be improved and/or added, and hear suggestions regarding possible financial assistance from the state level.

## Morris, Henley top Oviedo chamber hobnob straw vote

OVIEDO - Do members of the Oviedo Chamber of Commerce reflect the feelings of the average Seminole County residents? The answer will have to wait until election time.

But to reflect the feelings of how the election campaigning is progressing thus far, the chamber members braved a raging downpour of rain to attend a political hobnob Wednesday night, and make their preferences known in a straw vote.

In the District 2 race for

Seminole County commissioners, incumbent Randy Morris beat challenger Bob West by a vote of 85 to 35. In the District 4 straw poll, Carlton Henley won over incumbent Win Adams by 61 to 43.

### Campaign '98

Henley said he was very pleased by the turnout. "My wife and I were only able to spend about 25 minutes at the hobnob," he explained this morning. "We are involved in a very busy campaign scheduled and had another appointment."

He added that he enjoyed the gathering, where the chamber members had the opportunity to meet the candidates for the various positions, and the candidates had the opportunity to hand out literature.

The other straw ballot winner, Randy Morris, who is the present chairman of the board, was unavailable for comment this morning.

Three seats on the Seminole County School Board were on the Oviedo chamber's straw poll. For District 1, Diane Bauer collected 61 votes over Terry Patten, who received 31. Please See Ballot, Page 4A

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# McCollum honored by food trade group with Thomas Jefferson Award

U.S. Representative Bill McCollum (R-Florida) was honored recently at a ceremony hosted by Food Distributors International, a trade group representing more than 260 companies. McCollum was presented with the food distribution industry's 1998 Thomas Jefferson Award.

According to the industry, the award is given "to members of Congress who have voted consistently in support of sound fiscal policy, minimal government regulation, and other free-market principles crucial to the health and food distribution industry, and the nation's economy as a whole."

Of the several hundred votes cast during the 105th Congress in 1997/98, Food Distributors International selected nine votes it considers critical to the interests of the food distribution industry. Recipients of the award were said to have voted favorably on at least 75 percent of the matters. Among the key issues were the balanced budget, tax limitation amendment to make it more difficult for Congress to raise taxes, and legislation to grant inside sales employees an exemption from the overtime requirements.

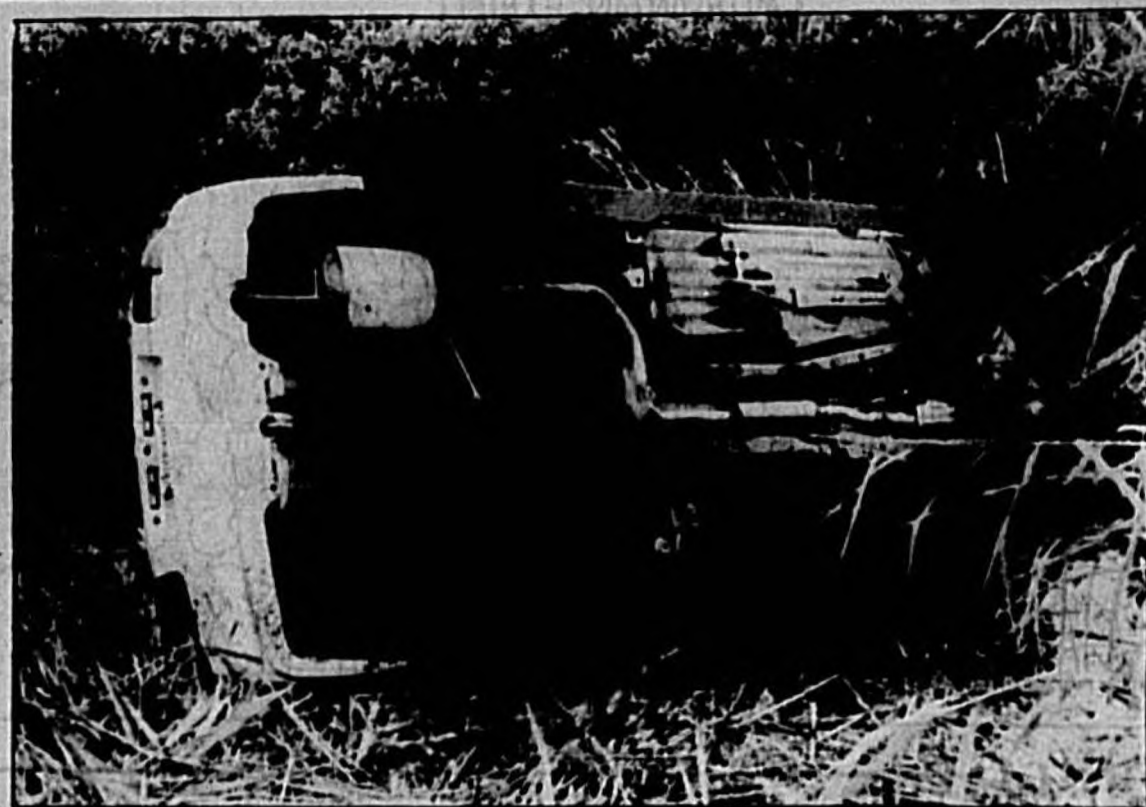
In addition to McCollum, 214 other members of the House of Representatives received the 1998 Thomas Jefferson Award.

Bob Gatty, spokesman for the Food Distribution Industry said the award program was inspired by the philosophies and writings of Thomas Jefferson, who, in his first inaugural address noted that "a wise and frugal government (is one) which shall leave men otherwise free to regulate their own pursuits of industry and improvement, and shall not take from the mouth of labor the bread it has earned. This is the sum of good government."

The award received by McCollum was constructed in pewter and walnut, featuring a replica of Thomas Jefferson framed by four "pillars of prosperity": agriculture, commerce, navigation and manufacturers, which Jefferson felt were crucial to the success of the American economy.

compared to 7,298 average for the state. "You have to take in account that big cities and urban areas play into the state equation," Harriett said.

"Homicides," Harriett said, "are the most difficult stats to project. Many are crimes of passion, domestic crimes within the home or family. People who know each other and kill each other. Law enforcement can not know when

they might occur."

Some bigger cities have become a haven for road rage crimes with angry motorists climbing out of cars to shoot and kill others simple because they didn't move fast enough or stalled at an intersection. This type of behavior hasn't happened in the county but as more people arrive and the roads get more crowded, Harriett said it would be a concern.

To prevent crimes such as

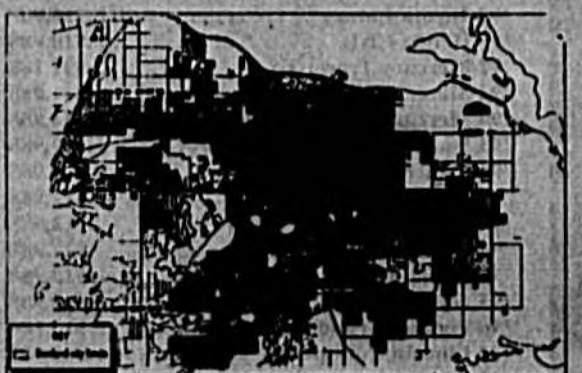

# Lake Mary commission to discuss purchase of church property

**LAKE MARY** - The city is proposing to purchase property, which is currently a church site, to use for a new police headquarters. The city commission tonight will hear the first reading for the purchase of the property at 171 E. Crystal Lake Ave., owned by the Lake Mary First Church of the Nazarene. The price has been determined of \$220,000. Additionally, if the church elects to rebuild within the city in the next five years, the city is promising to waive building fees of up to \$10,000. City Manager John Litton said financing for the project should come from the General Fund balance, but an additional \$1,715,000 will have to be taken from the 1996 Community Bond Improvement Issue, to construct the actual building. Originally, there was discussion toward refurbishing the existing police station on Rinehart Road, but a number of expensive problems were determined, that the subsequent resolution became the purchase of new property. The matter is scheduled on the agenda for tonight's meeting of the Lake Mary City Commission, but is listed as the last item on the agenda to be considered.

## Being religious is fine, but it should be kept out of the locker room

**SANFORD** The Jacksonville Jaguars are being assaulted for being good guys. Is that so bad?

The big news out of Jaguar training camp should be about the battle for the top mail carrier, Fred Taylor or James Stewart.

Instead, the big concern is whether or not the Jags are too religious.

The whole controversy started when the *York Times* and *The Chicago Tribune* wrote last weekend that the Jaguars were one of two teams (the Chicago Bears being the other) that asked NFL Security, an organization with slightly more intensity than the Gestapo, to investigate the Champions for Christ organization, a Christian group that involves a large number of NFL players including several Jaguars.

Among the Jaguars involved are pro-bowlers Tony Boselli and Mark Brunell, along with starters Brian Schwartz and Joel Smeenge.

Brunell has said openly that he hosts meetings every week - away from Alltel Stadium or Jaguar-owned facilities - and that he distributes leaflets throughout the locker room.

No wonder the Rangers have been one of the league's under-achievers for the past several years.

## Hunting Permits for fall set to go on sale

Special to the Herald

ORLANDO - Permits go on sale Friday, August 14th to allow hunting this fall in five type II wildlife management areas (WMA).

The five areas are:

- Upper St. Johns River Marsh Type II WMA (Brevard, Indian River and Ocala counties).
- Emerald Marsh Type II WMA (Lake County).
- Dunns Creek Type II WMA (Putnam County).
- Bayard Type II WMA (Clay County).
- Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest, formerly known as St. Marys River State Forest Type II WMA, (Nassau County).

Permits to hunt at the Emerald Marsh, Dunns Creek, Bayard and the Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest are \$25 plus a \$1 handling fee. Permits for the Upper St. Johns River Marsh cost \$15 plus a \$1 handling fee.

Purchased with the ultimate goal of protecting the state's water resources, these properties continue to provide public opportunities for quality hunts and other outdoor recreation.

Recent wildfires on the wildlife management areas have not damaged the hunting areas. The District's aggressive controlled-burning program improves wildlife habitat and helps prevent catastrophic wildfires.

In the Emerald Marsh, the Lake Griffin Flow-Way Project (Area 3) is drawn down, which should improve habitat for waterfowl. Water levels within Area 3 should be restored during the latter portions of the duck season.

All other areas will have adequate water levels for waterfowl hunting. The District is also taking precautions to not spray herbicides on sensitive aquatic areas immediately before or during the duck hunting season.

Mobility impaired hunters can qualify for special access. Contact District Public Use Coordinator

This year, Baker isn't settling for excuses.

Quality quota hunts are established at Dunns Creek, Bayard and the Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest Type II WMAs by limiting the number of permits issued for each area. The permits are distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Twenty permits will be issued for each hunting period at the Bayard WMA, while 18 permits are available for each hunting period at Dunns Creek WMA.

The hunting dates include Archery I (September 26-October 11), Archery II (November 21-November 29) and Muzzleloading Gun (October 31-November 8). At Bayard, a hunter can buy one permit per fall hunt period at the Clay County Tax Collector's Office in Green Cove Springs.

To hunt Dunns Creek, a person can purchase one permit and a second permit for an additional person at the Putnam County Tax Collector's Office in Palatka.

Thirty permits will be issued for each hunting period at the Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest WMA, which includes: Archery (September 26-October 4), General Gun for the mobility impaired (October 17-October 20), Muzzleloading Gun (October 21-November 8), General Gun (November 21-November 29), Small Game I (December 21-January 3) and Small Game II (February 6-February 14).

To hunt at the Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest WMA, a hunter can purchase one permit per fall hunt period at the Nassau County Tax Collector's Office in Fernandina Beach.

No hunt quotas are in place in the Upper St. Johns River Marsh and the Emeralds Marsh WMAs.

Hunting dates in the Upper St. Johns River Marsh are: Archery (September 26-October 20), Muzzleloading Gun (October 31-November 8), General Gun (November 14-January 24), Small Game (January 25-March 7). Hunting hogs with dogs, (January 27-January 31).

Specific waterfowl hunting dates for the Emeralds Marsh will be published by the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission later this month.

Applications for the Upper St. Johns River Marsh are available at tax collector's offices in Bradford, Indian River, Ocala, Orange and St. Lucie counties. Applications for the

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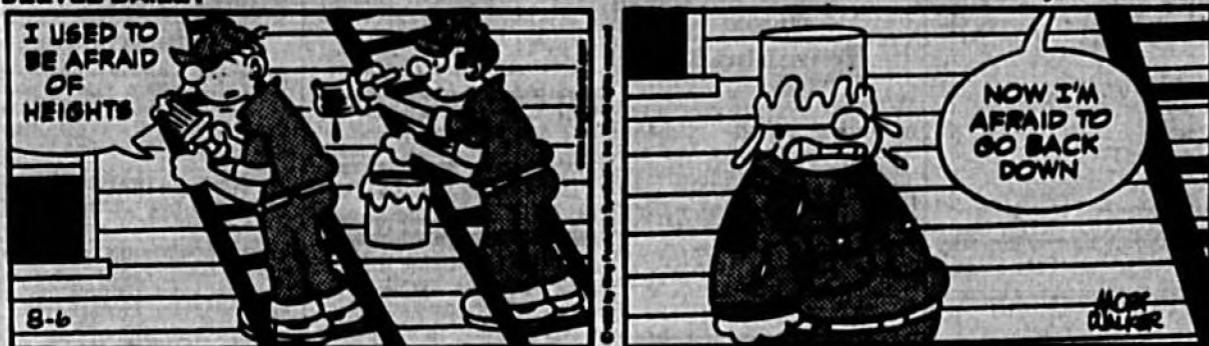

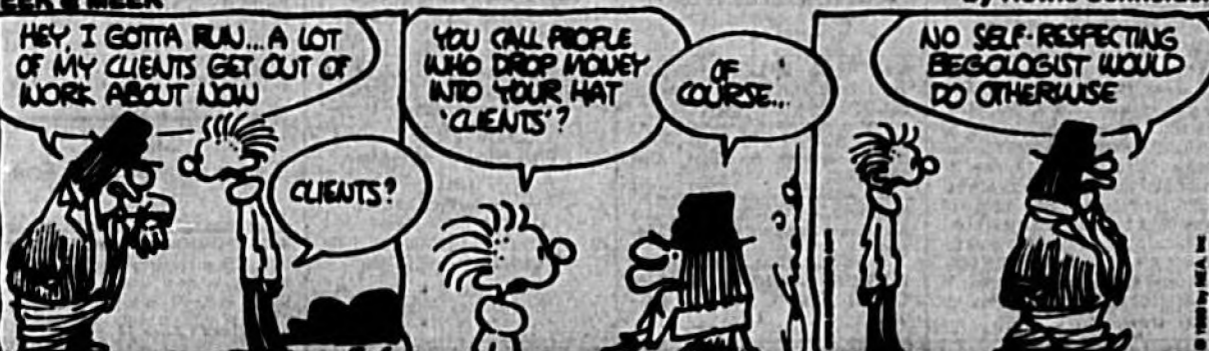

**Should Medicare cover blood test?**

DEAR DR. GOTT: My ophthalmologist recently diagnosed a retinal hemorrhage and recommended that my family doctor obtain tests to investigate the cause of my visual problem. Although Medicare did not balk at covering a cardiac ultrasound and carotid Doppler studies (to search for the source of a possible clot that traveled to my eye), the authorities refused to pay for a glycosylated hemoglobin, ruling that it was not "reasonable and necessary." Was this decision correct?

DEAR DR. GOTT: Because of a history of breast cancer, I cannot take female hormones. Nonetheless,

menopause has resulted in incapacitating hot flashes. Do I have other options for treatment?

DEAR READER: Unfortunately, no. Your body is reacting to the deficiency of female hormones. However, the addition of supplemental hormones could lead to an activation of the breast cancer. Therefore, you're stuck.

You will have to endure the hot flashes until, over time, they disappear — usually within a year or two. The use of supplemental hormones could be dangerous for you. I advise you to be patient. Wait for the hot flashes to diminish, and follow your gynecologist's advice.

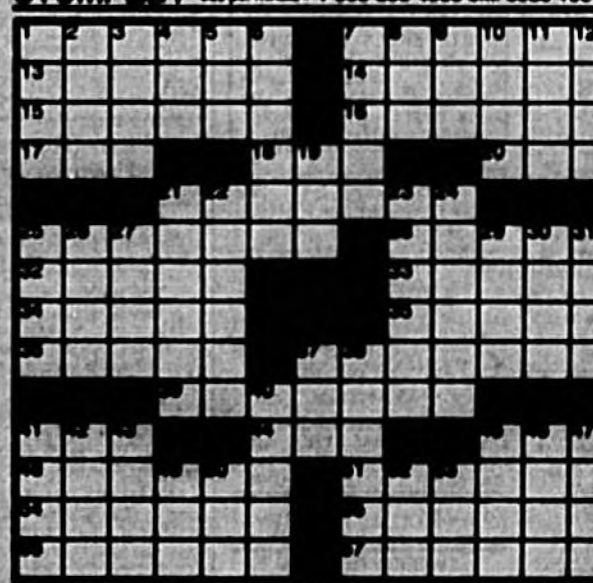

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**The third didn't happen**

Here is the third interesting deal I watched during my brief visit to the TGR Bridge Club in London last spring. How will the play go if East-West defeat South's contract of three spades?

Note North's good pass over three spades. Despite 18 high-card points, his spade fit wasn't wonderful and his lack of aces was worrisome. (If North does bid, it must be four spades, not three no-trump.)

At the time, West led the heart king. Declarer won with dummy's ace and called for the spade king. When the defenders didn't find their diamond ruff, declarer lost only three tricks: one spade, one heart and one diamond.

To keep the defense alive, West must lead his singleton diamond. Having little choice but to assume it is a singleton, East wins with the ace and returns a diamond — but which one?

It is here that the infamous and oft-misunderstood suit-preference signal occurs. You disregard both the trump suit and the suit being led for the ruff. That leaves two other suits, hearts and clubs here. If East returns his highest diamond, he is showing an entry (or potential entry) in the higher-ranking suit (hearts). However, if he returns his lowest diamond, he is suggesting an entry in the lower-ranking suit (clubs). Yet, as he has no side-suit entry, East must take his middle diamond, the six.

After ruffing, West will switch to the heart king. (If he tries a club, hoping partner has the ace, declarer can get home.) Now the defenders can take five tricks: the spade ace, the heart queen, the diamond ace and two diamond ruffs.
