According to Klinger's report. Hummel was working in his yard, which backs up to North Lake Triplet, when he heard the cries for help from two boys. The pre-teen boys, who had attempted to swim across the lake, were holding 19-year old Keith Jones by the wrists but were unable to bring him to the surface.

They tried to hold on to him but couldn't keep his head above water," Klinger said.

Hummel and his son then rowed their boat about 300 feet into the lake where they pulled the apparent drowning victim into the boat. Hummel began to administer CPR while Jeffrey paddled to shore. The two young boys held on to the side of the boat. Unfortunately, Klinger said, Jones died in the hospital on July 21.

The route the boys chose to swim originally was not insurmountable, Klinger said, adding that it was probably a leg cramp that caused the drowning. Without proper training. many swimmers don't know how to react when they get a cramp.

Klinger said he could not think of another drowning in the city's lakes during the 22 years he has served with the Piesse See Rescue, Page 4A

OVIEDO - Do members of the **Oviedo Chamber of Commerce** reflect the feelings of the average Seminole County residenta? The answer will have to wait until election time.

But to reflect the feelings of how the election campaigning is progressing thus far, the chamber members braved a raging downpour of rain to attend a political hobnob Wednesday night, and make their preferences known in a straw vote. in the District 2 race for

Seminoic County commissioners, incumbent Randy Morris beat challenger Bob West by a vote of 65 to 35. in the District 4 straw poll, Cariton Heniey won over incumbent Win Adams by 61 to 43.

Campaign '98

Henley said he was very pleased by the turnout. My wife and I were only able to spend about 25 minutes at the hobnob," he explained this morning. "We are involved in a very busy campaign acheduled and had another appointment."

The Seminole County Re-publicans have sued the state for not allowing it to endorse candidates but there has been no ruling and may not be one before the Sept. 1 election that pits Gold against incumbent County Judge John B. Sloop. **Executive Committee Chairman** Jim Stelling said that voters know little about those running for judicial positions and that an endorsement process is a way of identifying who's who.

Gold vehemently disagrees. Despite what certain members of your leadership have represented, your partisan endorsement process is clearly unlawful," Gold informed the Republican Executive Committee. "I would, consistent with the law and my oath as an attorney and former prosecutor, decline to participate.

"I would also take this oppor tunity to strongly caution ye membership to refrain by participation in this criminal enterprise," Gold notified the committee.

Altamonte Springs attorney Harry Jacobs has accused the area Republican honchos of trying to throw the weight of the party behind the cand date they support - John Sloop. And he says they are flagrantly breaking the law. 'Jim Stelling and Ken Wright (legal committee chairman) are known Sloop supporters," Jacobs said.



Sanford Elks Lodge helps to shape national policy



McCollum honored by food trade group with Thomas Jefferson Award

U.S. Representative Bill McCollum (R-Florida) was honored recently at a ceremony hosted by Food Distributors International, a trade group representing more than 260 companies. McCollum was presented with the food distribution industry's 1998 Thomas Jefferson Award.

According to the industry, the award is given, to members of Congress who have voted con-sistently in support of sound fiscal policy, minimal government regulation, and other freemarket principles crucial to the health and food distribution industry, and the nation's economy as a whole."

Of the several hundred votes cast during the 105th Congress in 1997/98, Food Distributors International selected nine votes it considers critical to the interests of the food distribution industry. Recipients of the award were said to have voted favorably on at least 75 percent of the matters. Among the key issues were the balanced budget, tax limitation amendment to make it more difficult for Congress to raise taxes, and legislation to grant inside sales employees an exemption from the overtime requirements.

In addition to McCollum, 214 other members of the House of Representatives received the 1998 Thomas Jefferson Award.

Bob Gatty, spokesman for the Food Distribution industry said the award program was in-spired by the philosophies and writings of Thomas Jefferson, who, in his first inaugural address noted that "a wise and frugal govern-ment (is one) which shall leave men otherwise free to regulate their own pursuits of industry and improvement, and shall not take from the mouth of labor the bread it has earned. City Manager John Litton said financing for the project should come from the General Fund balance, but an additional \$1.715,000 will have to be taken from the 1995 Community Bond improvement issue, to construct the actual building.




Child's residential choice sometimes considered

Shared parental responsibility

Most parents who separate or whose marriage is dissolved are awarded shared parental responsibility of the minor child(ren). This means that parents have the opportunity to share in the making of deci-sion that affect their child(ren)'s welfare such as de-cisions over their child(ren)'s education, religious upbring-ing, and health. Shared parental responsibil-

ity however can be frustrating or impeded by a child who prefers to live with one parent prefers to live with one parent when there has been a deter-mination by the Court, by agreement of the parents or otherwise, that the child live with the other parent. This may become evident after a child starts expressing a desire to go live with the secondary residential parent.

A child's desire to live with the secondary residential par-ent is oftentimes one of the main reasons a parent seeks to modify residential responsibil-ity, the determination of with whom the child lives. In de-



ciding whether to proceed with a modification action a parent should be careful and try to ensure that the child is not playing the parents against each other or that the child is asking to live with the other parent solely because of the privileges, or the lack thereof, iving with a particular parent may offer.

Once a parent determines that the child's choice to live with the secondary residential with the secondary residential parent is genuine, the parent should determine whether any other factors warrant the modification of residential re-sponsibility. If there are no other factors the modification action will most likely fail.

The Courts give great weight to a child's preference to live with one parent over the other. However, as discussed back in May, a modification requires a substantial change in circum-stances. Additionally, for the Court to order a modification of residential responsibility the Court has to find that the best interest of the child would be promoted by the change in residential responsibility. These two requirements establish that a parent seeking to modify residential responsibil-ity carries what the Courts describe as "an extraordinary burden." This burden is rarely, if ever, overcome solely by a child's desire to live with the secondary residential parent. This holds true even in cases of boys who have been residing with their mother and desire to go live with their father even though it is a generally held opinion that boys 14 years of age or older benefit more from living with their father than with their mother. scribe as "an extraordinary

Shared parental responsibil-ity provides parents the oppor-tunity to share in the making of the decisions that affect their child(ren)'s welfare. Howtheir child(ren)'s welfare. How-ever, shared parenting can be thwarted by the desire of a child to live with the secondary residential parent. Therefore, a secondary residential parent would be vise to determine why the child is seeking the change while at the same time realizing that the preference of the child alone is not enough to warrant a modification. This will enable a secondary resi-dential parent to make an in-formed decision as to whether that parent should proceed with a modification action. In the coming weeks we will fur-ther discuss modifications as well as other aspects of family law.
