COMMISSION MEN COMING

BUYERS ARE SWELLING THE WINTER COLONY AT SANFORD

LIST OF THE MEN WHO BUY AND SELL. DEMONSTRATES THE SCOPE OF WINTER VEGETABLES

Secretary Bates of the Sanford Commercial Club has compiled facts and figures concerning the produce business and the commission men as related to Sanford and a large colony of these jolly people who make Sanford headquarters during the winter months is a good advertisement for the city as a winter resort and also as the center of winter vegetable growing.

That the vegetable season is on in full blast in the Sanford celery delta is attested by the fact that members of Sanford's vegetable buyers' winter colony along with their families, are beginning to arrive here and prepare for their winter and spring sojourn.

Many of these buyers bring their children along with them and set up house-keeping in regulation style and place their children in the Sanford school for the term, all of which attests to the fact that Sanford as a vegetable producer during the winter season has passed far beyond the experimental stage and has become a fixed element in the nation's food supply.

Among the arrivals who are now on the ground looking after their patrons are C. E. Henry wife and four children Mr. Henry, represents William Wolbert & Co. of Philadelphia, M. Fleischer wife and three children. Mr. Fleischer is an independent buyer and usually pays spot cash for everything he ships.

The local buyers who are on the ground all the time are many and active. C. C. Woodruff is an independent local buyer. Gwynn Fox buys for local trade and express patrons; Chase & Co. who have headquarters in Jacksonville and Miami as well as in Sanford are large factors and have a well organized force of men; G. W. Spencer one of Sanford's active mercantile men also buys locally for express trade; N. O. Garner a Sanford boy buys for local and express trade; C. R. Walker a producer will enter the buying list this season; W. L. Milteer buys car lots and pays spot cash; J. E. Pace one of the largest producers in Florida will buy crops or sell his own.

Some of the many who have advised the Commercial club that they will arrive here during the next few weeks are Charles Feeder of St. Louis who represents William Feeder and is a spot cash user; A. H. Moses and wife of New York have spent the past three seasons here. Mr. Moses operates for himself and will buy one crate ten thousand crates of the crop in the field; John Russell an independent broker of Pontiac Mich. is active in annexing any desirable stuff offered him; J. H. Maples and wife of Chicago. Mr. Maples represents E. L. Hasker & Co. of Chicago and is considered one of the active members of the colony; W. H. Michael and wife of Philadelphia.

MAKING PERMANENT HIGHWAY FROM TAMPA TO JACKSONVILLE

SANFORD COMMERCIAL CLUB WILL FOSTER THE IDEA

BIG MEETING WILL BE HELD

ALL THE COUNTIES INTERESTED IN THE GREAT HIGHWAY WILL BE INVITED TO ATTEND

A special meeting of the Commercial Club held this afternoon the question of securing a permanent state highway north and south through Seminole county crossing the St. Johns river at Monroe ferry was taken up and given a most thorough discussion. There is a direct route already laid out leading from Tampa on through Plant City Lakeland Kissimmee Orlando Sanford DeLand Crescent City Palatka Green Cove Springs into Jacksonville. This is a very direct route north and south and much of the road is in first class condition but there are stretches that are badly in need of hard surfacing and it is the intention of the move made here today to work up an interest in the unfinished stretches and use the influence with the counties through which they pass to have them placed in good traveling condition.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

The Indianapolis Traction and Terminal Co. whose men went on strike Friday night attempted to run its cars but gave up when notified by Superintendent of Police Hyland that the police would be unable to prevent bloodshed unless the cars were withdrawn. Joseph Johnson, a striking motorist was shot and wounded by a policeman who fired into the crowd that surged around the first car sent out. Two cars were taken from the burns, each filled with policemen but the crowds packed around them so tightly that they could not be moved. Soon after the shooting of Johnson the cars were ordered back to the sheds. Governor Ralston, in a statement tonight charged that the city authorities are not doing their duty in failing to provide police protection. He refused to call out the State militia at Mayor Shank's request, and declared that the mayor has full authority and power to provide protection to run the cars.

Congress this week will mark time awaiting the report of the Senate Banking and Currency Committee on the administration currency bill. Even the currency committee will stop work until Wednesday, because of the various local elections. The members of Congress, called away from the capitol because of elections at home, today began leaving and until Wednesday, and hardly a handful of legislators will be in Washington. The House will not meet until Wednesday and the Senate will meet tomorrow to adjourn Thursday. Several members of the banking committee decided to go home for the elections and the committee, involved in a tangle over the administration bill, yesterday adjourned until Wednesday. In the meantime the members of the committee awaiting in Washington will devote their time to individual study of the disputed points of the measure.

Though every official of the United States government has been cautioned to maintain absolute silence while the plans of the Washington administration for solving the Mexican problem are worked out, today it became known that a supreme effort is being made to bring about General Huerta's retirement from the presidency of Mexico. Acceptance of any plan for a constitutional election which may be tendered, insofar as it might contemplate participation of the Constitutionalists, depends in the view of the United States government, on the elimination of Huerta. Since he pledged himself to turn over the executive power after an election, the United States government is waiting for some declaration on his part.

The County Commissioners will meet today and all the members are in the city ready for business.
