

Adopts Formal Procedure

Lake Mary: Sworn Complaints On Police

Complaints against individual Lake Mary police officers will no longer be recognized by the city council unless they are included in sworn statements, according to a formal complaint procedure adopted Thursday night.

Both Councilman Cliff Nelson and Edith Griffin opposed the sworn statement requirement. But, while Nelson voted against that portion of the procedure, Mrs. Griffin voted for it.

"We're country people here and almost all of us know each other," Mrs. Griffin said, adding she could see no reason she or anyone else should have to sign a sworn statement.

"I could talk with the chief of

police and could go to the state prosecuting attorney and give him a sworn statement," said Mrs. Griffin.

Councilman Pat Southward responded that she agreed with what Mrs. Griffin said and that all citizens have the right to go to the state attorney.

"It would be ideal and more harmonious by talking out the complaints or if persons would not go to the state attorney. But, there seems to be some pressure, originating either inside or outside the city, for some intermediate steps," Mrs. Southward said.

And city attorney Gary Hensley said the state attorney would not do anything about police harassment, as an

example, and would only do something if a crime was involved.

"Citizens only know they have a gripe against a police officer," Nelson said, insisting the procedure of a sworn statement is not completed. Nelson said oral complaints would permit a preliminary and summary for summary, Page 2A

informal investigation to determine merit before formal steps were taken.

Councilman Bert Partridge, Southward and Harry Terry pointed out that sworn statements against individual officers are required under state law in the police bill of rights.

"We have to recognize state law," said Partridge.

The council, at the same time, included within the procedure that complaints from citizens against the police department as a whole can be directed orally or in any manner citizens wish to the mayor, council men, city clerk, city attorney or any officer of the police department.

The official receiving the report would have the responsibility of reducing the complaint to writing.

The procedure requires that a letter of acknowledgment be sent to citizens for other type complaints and reports on final disposition of the complaint would be made to the mayor, the council and the citizen.

Carter Warning To Soviets: We'll Increase Our Arsenal

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. (UPI) — President Carter today warned the Soviet Union against using its military might for "political blackmail" and said America is prepared to spend more on its own arsenal if necessary.

In what was billed as an "unprecedented" defense statement, the president also told the Soviet Union its stepped-up military activities may erode "popular support" in the United States for joint ventures by the two nations.

The president made his address at Wake Forest University before leaving for a nuclear carrier for a demonstration cruise off the Georgia coast, where he will spend the weekend.

Carter pointed to the Russian arms buildup and an "ominous" intensification on the part of the Soviet Union to use its military power "to intervene in Africa and other crisis spots."

Soviets Blast Back: 'Patience Is Limited'

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union today accused the Carter administration of making contradictory statements on the second round of Strategic Arms Limitation talks and warned that Moscow's patience "is not without limit."

An editorial in the Communist Party newspaper Pravda called on Washington to "give more serious thought to the problems that arise in connection with the strategic offensive arms limitation talks and truly realize how much is at stake."

Pravda said the Soviet Union had enough patience to "get to the essence of the problem" of SALT and find a "mutually acceptable solution."

"But its patience however, is not without limit," it said.

The editorial was one of a series in recent weeks attempting to prod the United States toward concluding a second SALT agreement.

Pravda said Washington's "unilateral policy" blocked implementation of the preliminary agreement reached at Vladivostok in 1974 by then President Gerald Ford and Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev.

K-Mart Plaza Approved, 200 New Jobs Anticipated

A new K-Mart shopping plaza is coming to Sanford. The shopping plaza will be open for business by March, 1979, the plaza's planners said at Thursday night's Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission meeting.

The shopping plaza, to be located on the southeast corner of U.S. 17-92 and Airport Boulevard, will create about 200 new jobs for Sanfordites, said Phil Holmberg, president of Holmberg Construction Co., based in Jacksonville.

The company will build the shopping plaza, Holmberg said. "It should be open in about a year," the builder said.

The planning and zoning commission Thursday night voted an unanimous approval for the project's site plan. The plan indicates there will be 118,000 square feet of retail business space at the plaza and parking spaces for 647 cars.

The plan shows a K-Mart store with 68,327 square feet of retail space, 39,228-square-foot food store and 13,000 square feet for other retail businesses.

Ex-Longwood Mayor Dead

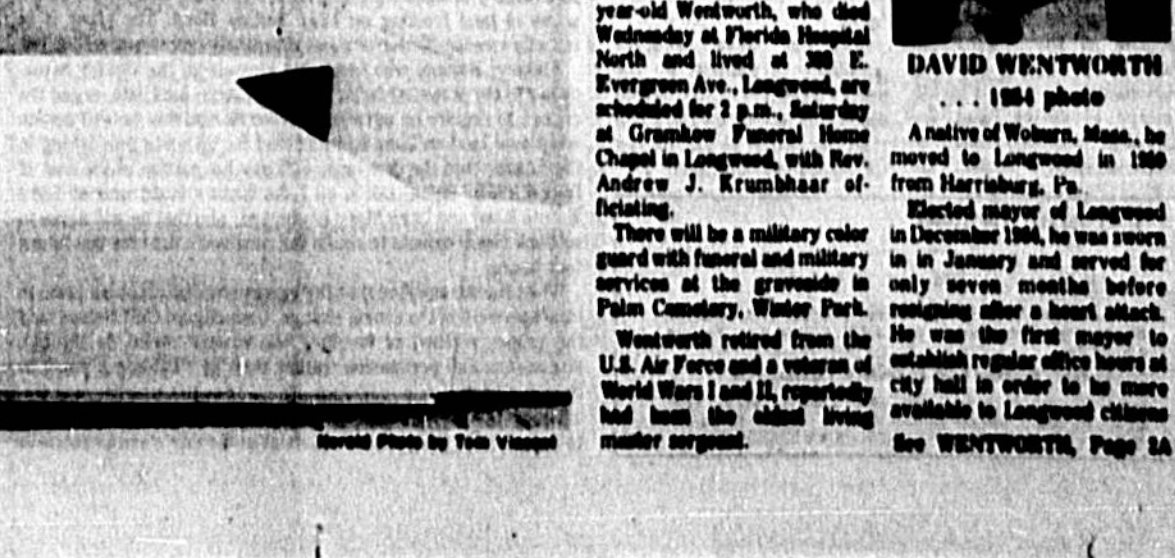
Saturday has been declared a day of mourning in Longwood by Mayor Gerard Connel for former mayor and municipal judge David Westworth (Pappy) Westworth.

Nationwide Manhunt For Italian Terrorists

ROME (UPI) — The kidnapping of Aldo Moro, Italy's foremost statesman, and the slaying of his five bodyguards touched off a manhunt from Sicily to the Alps today for a dozen Red Brigades terrorists. Some politicians declared "civil war" and threatened martial law.

Police in Bologna were alerted to hunt for a man named "Mario" who had been seen at all over Rome and throughout the nation and seized Italian suspects in the attempt to find the trail five-time premier and president of the ruling Christian Democratic Party.

The killers, one of whom a woman and four disguised as airline pilots wearing wigs and false mustaches, plied out of three cars and ambushed Moro as he was driving from early morning mass TV. He was taken to a Communist hideout in a farmhouse near the town of Fossano, where he was held for 55 days.

Guerrillas Strike Back

Palestinian guerrillas said today they struck back at Israeli forces occupying southern Lebanon and repelled an attempted sea invasion near Tyre. The guerrillas said Israeli commandos killed 50 civilians, including 10 children.

Israel said resistance to its invasion had all but collapsed in a 6-mile deep defense corridor and Defense Minister Ezer Weizman said he would consider a U.S. proposal to withdraw in favor of a U.N. peace-keeping force.

Supertanker Breaks In Two

BREIT, France (UPI) — The 320,000-ton supertanker Amoco Cadiz breaks in two in a storm today three miles off Cape Finisterre and all oiling from its ruptured hull polluted nearby beaches for miles.

French navy helicopters removed 45 of the 46 crewmen aboard during the night. The last two were rescued in Spain today. Two in the Amoco Cadiz were rescued at dawn. Nobody was hurt.

13 Executed in Zaire

KINSHASA, Zaire (UPI) — Thirteen people sentenced to death by a court martial on charges of plotting against the security of the state were executed in Zaire today. President Mobutu Sese Sese announced in a message to the nation.

Beginning Sunday, beer and wine can be purchased at 116 licensed convenience stores between 1 and 11 p.m.

An ordinance approving such sales was passed by the Sanford City Commission this week. But not before opponents - principally spokesmen of the Sanford Ministerial Association - expressed their doubts for the plan.

Their main argument - presumably reflecting the feelings of many of their parishioners - is that such an ordinance would be just another example of the continuing moral decay of the community.

There is enough of a divergence of opinion on the issue of Sunday beer and wine sales (the 9-3 cliff-hanging vote of the commission is a reflection of this) that the people should get the chance to decide the matter.

If they want the sales, so be it. The action would be consistent with policy adopted in neighboring areas. If the people vote to abstain off such Sunday sales, then the city should abstain accordingly.

The arguments for and against Sunday beer and wine sales are well known and have been voiced often. We see no need to rehearse them here.

But we do see a need for the city to do what is the people's will, and cease any lingering controversy about what the people really want or don't want. Only their vote can tell us that.

New Gardening Aids Arrive For Spring

CHICAGO (UPI) - Tired of chasing up the bushes after every forgotten or watering hose?

Now you can buy a special drip tray to contain the mess. The tray is perforated on one end to drain excess water into the dish while holding back soil or other planting mediums.

The tray was among products for indoor and outdoor gardening shown to retail store buyers at the 65th annual Home Watering Aids Show in Chicago. They are expected to be in retail stores and garden centers this spring.

Among other remarkable drip trays for hanging planters are those that have a built-in watering device that can be used to water plants in a hanging tray.

The manufacturer says the new watering device provides controlled moisture balance for plants for two or more weeks, and is best suited to plants four to eight inches in diameter.

A Brooklyn manufacturer of commercial hydroponic or soilless gardening systems showed modular retail systems for home use indoors or out, with natural or artificial light.

The pipe-shaped plastic units use water with nutrient solutions instead of soil. A timer automatically adds fertilizer and runs on air pump.

Growth and germination are the only growing mediums required, the manufacturer said. The units are available in 16, 32 and 64-inch long sizes with two or four plants per unit.

The manufacturer says the units are easy to use and require the user and water control.

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Casselberry Councilman Got It \$192 Utility Credit Sparks Queries

Casselberry Mayor Bill Grier, in a memo issued Thursday, has questioned City Finance Director Milton Kast's authority to grant Councilman Don Wilson a \$192 credit on Wilson's water and sewer utility bill more than a year ago.

Kast said today he responded to the memo Friday, stating he has authority not only to issue credits, but also to handle many other financial matters on the city's behalf.

Wilson said the credit was approved by Kast to reimburse him for sewer charges he paid the city for service he did not receive, subsequent to a 1976 settlement from the city's insurers on a lawsuit he filed against the city because raw sewage had leaked up into his Triplet Drive home.

And, he may sue the city again, this time for embarrassment, Wilson said today.

Former Mayor Gerald Christensen said that, although the credit to Wilson apparently was given while he was the city's chief executive, it was never brought to his attention.

Why would Wilson be entitled to an adjustment?

"Why would Wilson be entitled to an adjustment when the bill had already been settled?" he asked.

"I assume this is something Mayor Grier is handling as an administrative function," said Council Chairman Owen Sheppard today. "Until it comes under the jurisdiction of the council, I am not concerning myself with it."

Grier issued the memo to Kast pointing to an adjustment record signed by Kast indicating that on March 2, 1977 a credit in the amount of \$192 was issued to Wilson.

"I do not understand why this credit was issued as the only statement on the record says 'Credit issued per Finance Director and Information on file,'" the memo said.

"I would like a complete explanation of this adjustment along with the source of your authority for such action. It has always been my understanding that the city council has complete and

total control of the city funds and nowhere in the city records can I find authorization given by the council for this credit.

"Your explanation in writing will be expected immediately," Grier's memo said.

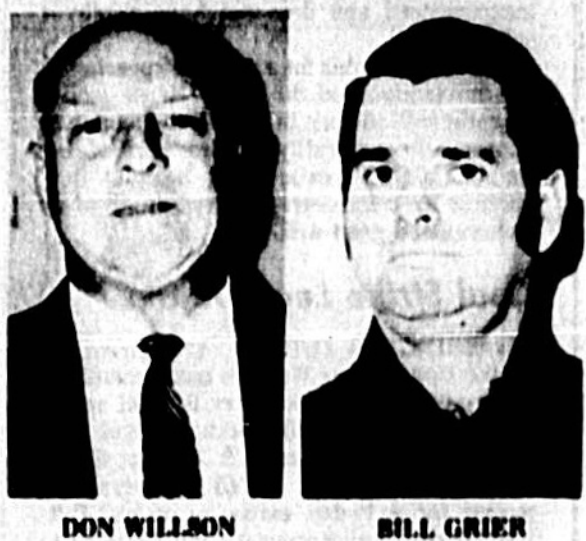
Kast said today he responded with a sharply worded memo Friday.

Sheppard said today he has not seen a response from Kast. "I don't know what Kast's explanation is. I would like to make a fuss over something when perhaps there is a good explanation for it," Sheppard said.

Sheppard noted that the city has no written policy or resolution designating Kast's specific authority as financial matters.

Kast said that he related the facts of the case and his investigation of the matter in his responding memo to Grier. He said that while it is true that Wilson recovered on an insurance claim from the damage to his home caused by its flooding with raw sewage, the city had continued billing Wilson for sewer service.

He said there were serious interruptions in the service to the

Dealing With Age: Give Them Reality

DEAR DR. LAMB — My husband is a severe problem. He is 55 and has always been a very hard worker and still is on his feet, taking care of the garden, mowing the yard and we have a big porch. He is not fat at all and only weighs 150 pounds. He eats well.

His problem is he's so forgetful. He forgets where he put his keys and sets furniture when I don't agree with him that people come and steal them.

What should I do to help him get over this? I'm at my wit's end sometimes. He wants me to agree with him and I just can't when I know it's not true.

DEAR DR. LAMB — I am a 17-year-old boy. My hair is receding at the temples. The doctors don't run in our family, is this because I am lacking something in my diet? DEAR READER — If every case of baldness were caused by a dietary deficiency there would be a lot of dietary problems around. Diet — particularly lack of protein — can cause baldness. Hair will fall out in people who are on a overly restricted calorie intake and crash diets to lose weight. Baldness is a symptom. Think about that for a minute. It is not a diagnosis. It occurs with no logical reason — such as age or hereditary pattern — but it can be a dermatological. You should see a dermatologist. He can examine your scalp and be sure you don't have a medical problem that may be a factor in losing hair. I might add that hair can fall out from a recent illness, after childbirth — you don't need to worry about that — surgery and sometimes in patches from the scalp as an indication of emotional stress.

Many young men do start having male pattern baldness early in life. It is thought to be related to hormone balances and how the hormones affect the hair follicles in the scalp.

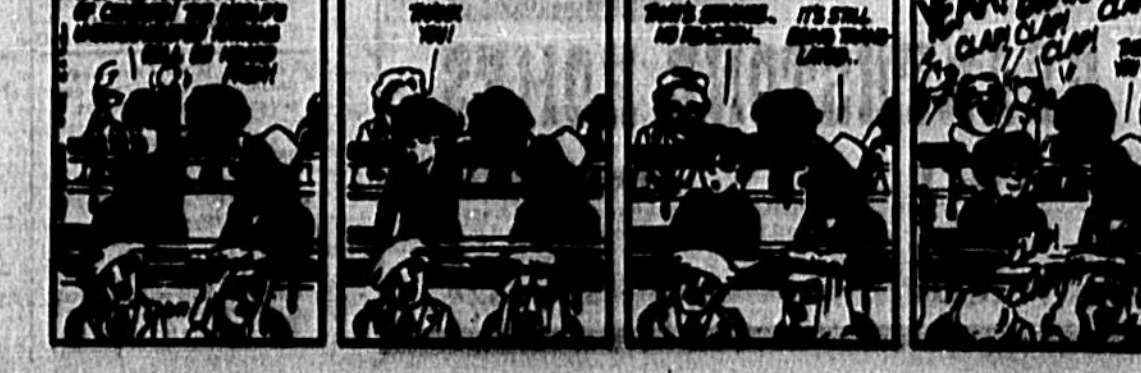

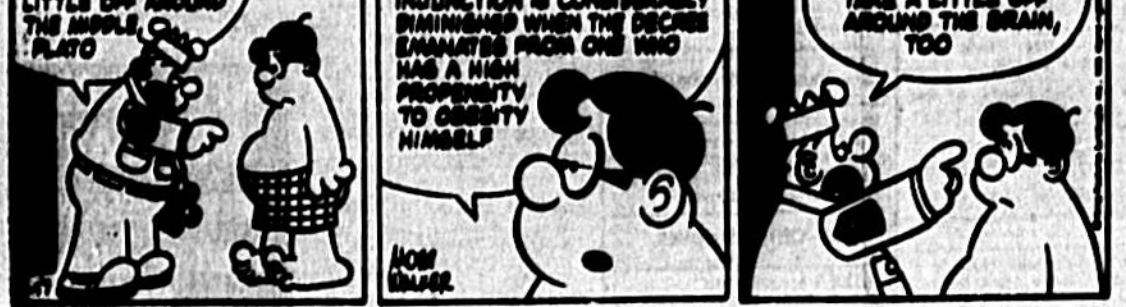

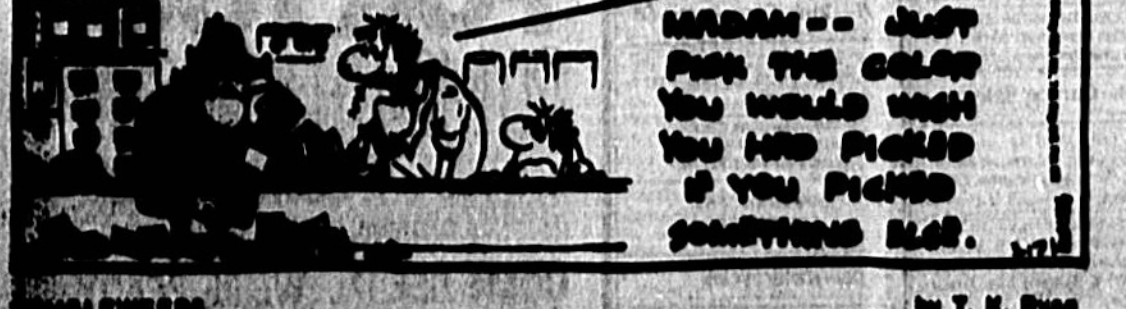
