THE TENDENCY TO KNOCK

An editor started out the other morning to ask his friends for suggestions for a few editorials. He interviewed six of them, and asked each what he should write about the next day. Five of them suggested that he "take a fall" out of something meaning in the language that he write scathing criticisms of this or that. One fellow suggested that he say something about the advantages of a thing in which he was himself interested.

Five-sixths of the people interviewed wanted to knock something. Not one out of the six had a helpful suggestion to offer. The editor who wanted something honest knew it would be to his interest to boost it. So the editor went back to his office somewhat disgusted with the tendency of people to knock, and he opened his mail.

There were eight letters addressed to him, some of them in praise of the editor. One of them was not. Those intended for publication without exception contained a knock, and in a few in-

stances the knocks were so radical, so personal, so abusive that the letters could not be printed. The balance of the letters were condemnations of certain statements which the editor had made during the past few days. And still no hint but everybody in the world wanted to knock.

Then the editor did as he pleased to do. He wrote several little articles of pleasantness, never a knock being in evidence. He felt good from top to bottom, saw much of charity in the world, much of happiness, much of beauty—and told about it. He didn't allow the tendency to knock to affect him in his writings. And while folks didn't take the trouble to write to him, he felt and knew that his efforts to brighten the world a little were appreciated. So he came to the conclusion that the tendency to knock is only superficial that people speak that way without serious thought that at heart most men are kindly but the heart lies deep in the body like the pure water that flows beneath the surface of the earth. You must bore for it but it is worth boring for.—Clearwater Sun.

FULL VALUE ASSESSMENT NOT MADE

GOV. TRAMMELL NOTES HARDSHIPS ON THE TAX PAYERS

Tallahassee, Fla., Feb. 28, 1916. It is very apparent that the attitude of Governor Park Trammell, regarding the basis upon which the 1916 tax assessment should be made is going to result in the assessment being made upon a fifty per cent basis, instead of being raised to a full cash value basis as recently ordered by the State Tax Commission.

The Governor has already received replies from a majority of the tax assessors agreeing to his position upon the subject. To have raised the assessment to a full cash value basis would, as pointed out by the Governor, have resulted in the taxpayers of the state having to pay a very much increased state and county tax.

The increase for 1916 in the state taxes alone would have amounted to four hundred and fifty thousand dollars on account of millages the Governor had no authority to reduce, and the county tax in some of the more populous counties would have amounted to not less than two or three million dollars.

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ALLIES HEED THE REQUEST OF AMERICA

WAR CLOUD WILL DISAPPEAR FROM OUR HORIZON

Washington, Feb. 28.—With the apparent quieting down of the situation in Congress the submarine crisis shifts back to the negotiations between Secretary Lansing and Count von Bernstorff.

Mr. Lansing said today there was no intention of transferring the negotiations to Berlin to be conducted between Ambassador Gerard and the Berlin foreign office, as was intimated in dispatches published abroad.

While the situation in Congress apparently is being held in check by the administration leaders, the state department continues to await receipt of certain appendices to the Austro-German notice, which are intended to demonstrate that British armed ships have used their guns offensively against submarines.

On the situation as it now stands President Wilson is to be seen in the White House tomorrow to his deM. Secretary Lansing to travel on ships armed for defense only.

From German sources come suggestions that the Teutonic governments were inspired to issue their new notice to the American consular agents to the allied powers proposing a compromise of neutral rights and a limitation of submarine warfare.

Though technically an entirely separate question from that of the right of merchant ships to carry defensive armament, the Lusitania case remains in abeyance because the state department fears that the German pledges to refrain from attacking liners without warning may not extend to future operations.

Therefore, the department has called upon the German government for information on that point and is now awaiting a response.
