NAS Expansion Program Up \$500,000

Liberal Montini Elected Pope

Favorite Wins; Will Rule As Paul VI

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Giovanni Battista Cardinal Montini today was elected pope of the Roman Catholic Church. He chose the name Paul VI.

Montini was a favored candidate before the election here. He has been the Archbishop of Milan.

The Sacred College of Cardinals elected Montini on the second day of balloting in their secret conclave inside the 16th-century Vatican Palace.

The new pontiff, a 65-year-old "liberal" intellectual and close friend of the late Pope John, is the 262nd successor to the throne of St. Peter.

Montini is considered forward-looking and Vatican observers believed he would continue supporting the movements started by Pope John toward church reforms, Christian unity and improved relations with the Communist governments.

The big bronze bells of St. Peter's Basilica tolled out the news as a vast crowd of more than 40,000 persons raised a cheer of "viva il papa" — long live the pope — in sun-lit St. Peter's Square.

As Pope Paul VI, Montini appeared on the central balcony of the basilica for the first time in the white robes of pontiff.

Eighty of the 82 living cardinals had entered the conclave. One emerged as pope in the third round of voting.

The coronation of the new Pope probably will be held within the next 10 days.

Pope Paul VI, a slight dark-eyed man, was a favorite of Pope Pius XII, who preceded Pope John, as well as of John. The Milan archbishop was considered a likely candidate to succeed Pius in 1958 when John was elected.

Regarded by his colleagues as unusually intelligent and complete, Pope Paul VI has wide experience earned by 39 years with the Vatican secretariat of state and nine years as Archbishop of Milan, a booming industrial city.

He has been active against the Communists in the Milan region, and the Reds consider him so "dangerous" that they have tried to scare him with bombs.

She was reported in fair condition today at Hazleton State General Hospital where she was admitted with a fractured hip and lacerations of the head.

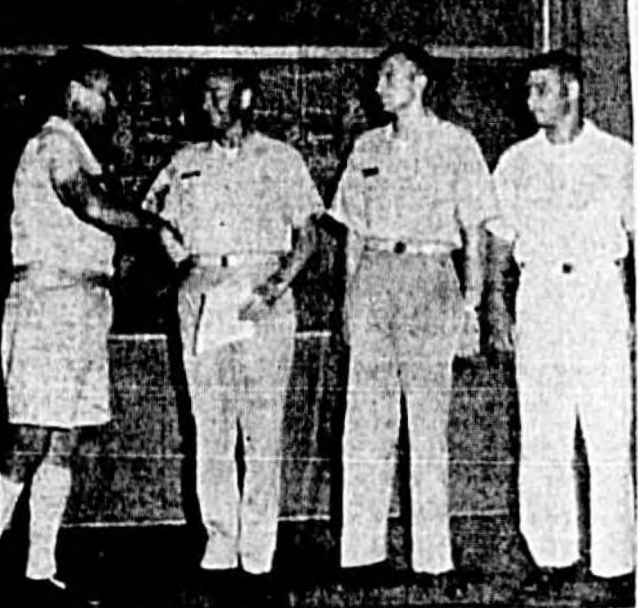

VAH-5 Wins Monthly Bomber Competition

Heavy Attack Squadron Five (VAH-5) capitalized on consistency to win the Heavy Attack Wing One monthly bomber stream for June, the Navy announced today.

The "Savage Sons of Sanford" placed all three of their entries in the top five to take a slim 76-point advantage over Heavy Attack Squadron Eleven's Detachment Eight, 108-1252. The Detachment won the May competition.

Points are awarded in the important bombing competition on the basis of scores on local training targets and the ability of flight crews to adhere to a prescribed route and time schedule.

VAH-5 also grabbed top individual honors as executive officer Cdr. Paul F. Werner and his crew of Lt. (jg) Dick McEntyre, bombardier navigator, and crewman Ronald Manning, AMH2, flew their A-3H Skywarrior to victory over 11 other flight crews.

Two flight crews tied for second place: VAH-14's Vigilante flight crew composed of Lt. Cdr. Jack Young, blade and bombardier navigator Lt. Dufty Hutton, and an A-3H piloted by VAH-14 Detachment Eight's Lt. Cdr. Ray Fox. His bombardier navigator was Lt. (jg) Joel Wassmann.

Fourth and fifth places went to VAH-3: Lt. Cdr. David Fall and bombardier Lt. Nick Merzo flew an A-3H to fourth place. Another A-3H flight crew, Cdr. Lyle H. Sette, commanding officer, and Lt. Vince Monroe, finished fifth.

Behind VAH-5 and VAH-11 Detachment Eight, were VAH-3, VAH-11 and VAH-1 in that order.

Competition involved four practice bomb drops on the Pinecastle impact target, located 34 air miles northwest of Sanford, using two modes of delivery.

JFK Canal View Is 'Encouraging'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Gov. Farris Bryant conferred with President Kennedy on a variety of subjects Thursday and said he was "encouraged" by the chief executive's reaction to the barge canal.

The governor said Kennedy was well-informed on the controversial waterway linking the east and west coasts of Florida.

"He was sympathetic and I would say even encouraging," Bryant said.

The governor, along with Rep. Robert Sikes and Sen. George A. Smathers, asked President Kennedy to seek a \$1 million appropriation from Congress to begin construction of the proposed canal.

On other subjects, Bryant said he told the President there was no racial problem in Florida, despite recent picketing at the state capital and several other cities.

The President asked Bryant to return to Washington again in the near future for another series of meetings with Southern governors to discuss civil rights problems.

Earlier Thursday, Bryant appeared before the House Appropriations Public Works subcommittee.

He told the congressmen there were three projects that Florida vitally needed—the barge canal, the Central and South Florida Flood Control District project and the Four Rivers Basin study.

Bryant, noting the congressional trend toward economy, said the state Legislature was aware of the importance of the three projects and had more than doubled appropriations to match federal funds for the projects.

Steel Contract Agreed On With No Pay Raises

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — The steel industry and United Steelworkers union stepped forth today as the epitome of collective bargaining.

Climaxing six months of informal negotiations, the parties announced agreement Thursday on a 21-month contract which features a unique extended vacation plan the union says will create up to 25,000 new jobs.

And for the second consecutive year the steelworkers passed up a straight wage increase for job security.

The contract becomes effective Aug. 1. It can be reopened upon 120 days' notice anytime after Jan. 1, 1965.

The union said contracts should be signed by next week.

The vacation plan becomes effective Jan. 1, 1964, for half the industry's 423,000 workers. Workers at each of the respective "big 125 steel companies ranked on the upper 30 per cent of the seniority list will receive 13 weeks extra vacation every five years.

Those workers retiring before the plan takes effect will receive a comparable cash payoff, a bonus week and their regular vacation time pay.

The other 30 per cent of the workers will get up to three additional weeks of paid vacation in the next five years.

Total Is Now \$1.3 Million

A half-million-dollar boost to the already announced expansion program of the San-

ford Naval Air Station was reported today by the Bureau of Yards and Docks, Department of the Navy.

This announcement increases to \$1.3 million in planned construction at SNAS.

Bids were asked today for a barracks of 308-man capacity, three-story, of reinforced concrete frame with exterior of precast concrete wall panels. The building will include heating and air conditioning.

Estimated cost of this new barracks is \$500,000. Bids will be received until 2:30 p.m. July 19 at the Bureau of Yards and Docks, U. S. Naval Base, Charleston, S. C.

At the same time, it was announced bids were opened last Wednesday at Charleston for a new avionics building and a new surface systems building, both estimated to cost \$800,000.

Low bidder for this contract was Peacock Construction, of Fort Myers. This contract has not been let, as yet.

Also in the planning for SNAS is a \$5 million north-south runway. This project is in the survey-design stage, and is planned for the 1964 budget with construction in 1965.

DeGaulle Pulls Ships Out NATO

PARIS (UPI) — France has notified the North Atlantic Treaty Organization it is pulling some naval units out of the unified (NATO) command, an American (NATO) source said today.

The move appeared to be in line with President Charles de Gaulle's policy of increasing French national autonomy. It came as a blow to United States efforts to build a tight-knit NATO force.

The source said French naval units guarding the English Channel and the Bay of Biscay would be removed from the unified command.

This will not affect French units serving under unified NATO command in the Atlantic, however, the source said.

The forces involved are reported to include one aircraft carrier, six destroyers and 21 destroyer escorts.

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — The missing daughter of ex-Venezuelan strongman Marcos Perez Jimenez and her young American boy friend were found Thursday night in a hideaway less than 15 miles from Perez' waterfront mansion.

Hazel-eyed Marzotta Perez Jimenez, 17, and Lee Brook, 20, were located in a hotel in suburban Hialeah around 43 hours after they were reported to have eloped.

Cdr. deLorenzi, his wife, Betty, and their four children will leave soon for California where he has been assigned to the Navy's Postgraduate School at Monterey.

Refugees Await 'Attack' Details

MIAMI (UPI) — Exile commandos were believed to have joined up today with anti-Castro forces in Cuba where a multi-point landing successfully penetrated the island's Communist defenses.

Miami's huge Cuban refugee colony, still throbbing with excitement over Thursday's surprise announcement by the Cuban Revolutionary Council, were eagerly waiting radio reports from the commandos.

A radio broadcast from Cuba late Thursday night reported that militiamen fought with a group of eight heavily armed anti-Castroites in the vicinity of "El Camino."

The broadcast did not say if the rebels were of the invading commandos or guerrillas operating in the mountains of Oriente, Las Villas and Pinar Del Rio provinces.

University Site Procedures To Be Adopted Today

GAINESVILLE (UPI) — Procedures for selecting a site in East Central Florida for a new university and extension of the University of Florida Engineering School are expected to be adopted at the Board of Control meeting here today.

The engineering extension will be built during the coming biennium under a \$1 million sum included in the Legislature's bond program for colleges.

The Legislature authorized for the same area a new university or branch of an existing state university but provided no construction funds. The bond program includes \$200,000 to plan the facility.

The bill authorizing the university requires that it be located in the nine-county area embracing Flagler, Orange, Seminole, Lake, Brevard, Volusia, Osceola, Indian River and St. Lucie, with the Board of Control to pick the exact site.

Dr. J. Broward Culpepper, board director, said the engineering school will be located on the same site as the university and ultimately the two would probably be merged.

At the meeting, first since the Legislature adjourned on Wednesday, the board also will discuss implementation of other new legislation, including the bill giving legal status to the Florida Institute for Continuing University Studies (FICUS), but clippings (its wings somewhat).

It also is expected to discuss in general terms the bond program which, subject to approval of the people in November, provides \$45 million in new construction projects at the universities.

One of the projects, a new two-year college at Pensacola for which a site already has been selected, is down for \$1.6 million of the bond money, Culpepper said there may be some follow-up discussions on this institution.

He also expects the board to start reviewing operating

budgets for the new fiscal year starting July 1, including key administrative salaries in the university system.

This will be the last meeting at which the board handles business of the State Deaf and Blind School at St. Augustine. Under a new law, effective July 1, affairs of this school will be handled by a separate seven-member board of trustees, to be named by the Governor. It will work under the Cabinet Board of Education.

This will leave the Board of Control for the first time solely the administrator of the state universities. Past legislatures took from under its supervision the Ringling Art Museum and plant board.

In other business, the board will act on proposals for establishment of a doctoral in philosophy at Florida State

and a doctoral in international relations at the University of Florida.

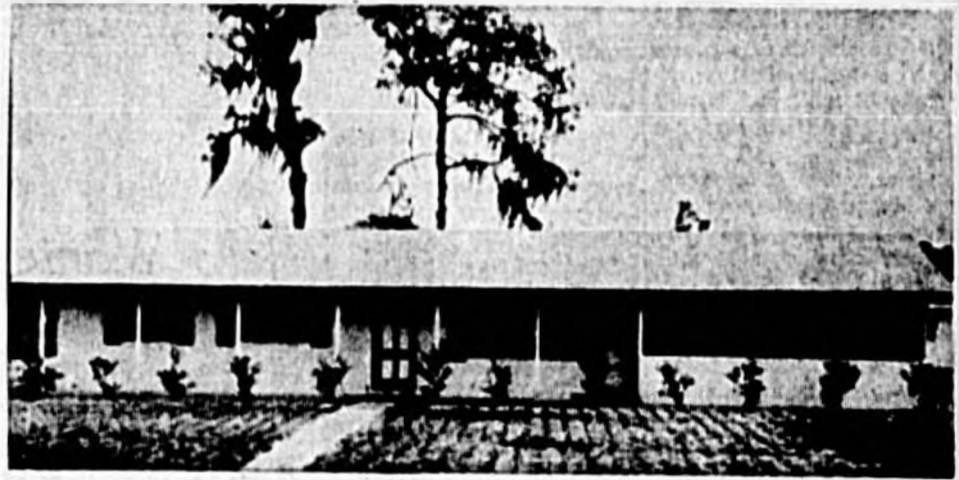

BROOKLINE, Mass. (UPI) — Bob Gajda, who decided to become a professional after he won a caddy championship and hasn't won anything since, led the field into the second round of the U. S. Open golf championship today ahead of such favorites as Arnold Palmer, Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player.

Gajda, a perennial also-ran, surprised everyone, including himself, when he shot a two-under-par 68 over the exacting Country Club course of Brookline to take the first round lead by one stroke over Jack Cupit. They were the only players in the star-studded field of 150 who were able to break Brookline's par of 72-71.

One of the reasons was that they were able to play the treacherous back nine better than most of the others. A lot of them faltered in that 3,445-yard stretch of a course which most of the field considers one of the worst layouts on which the Open ever has been played.

Palmer, whose driving approaching and putting was off, carded a two-over-par 73. Nicklaus scored to a 76 while Cupit had a 74.

Two strokes off Gajda's pace, with even par 71's were two of the pre-tourney favorites—Tony Lama and Julius Boros—along with 29-year-old Dave Love and former PGA champion Lionel Hebert.

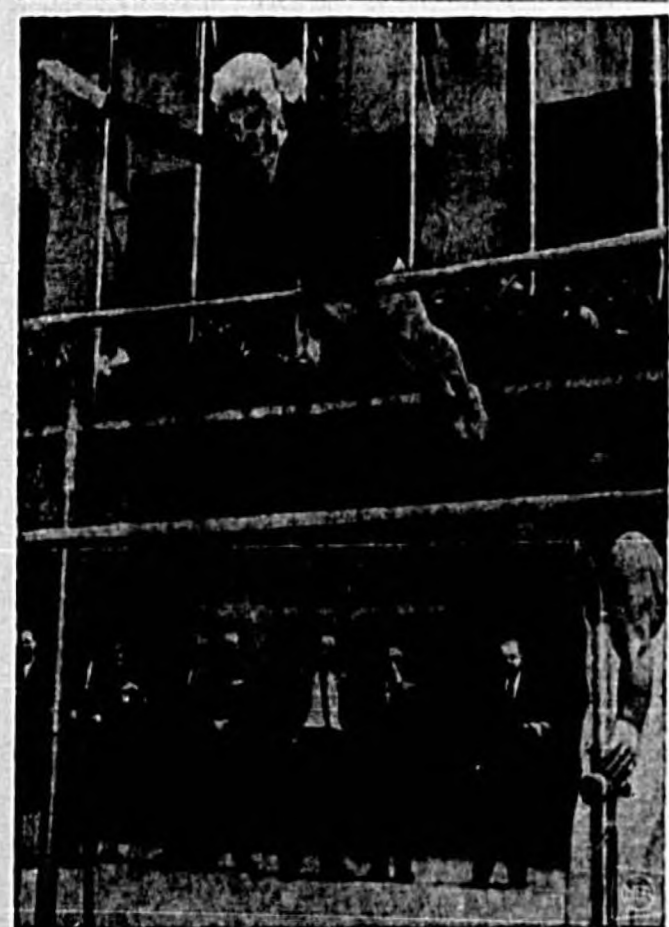

O'Toole In 13th Win For Reds

Cocky Jim O'Toole, who once won 20 games without even bothering to run, figures to do it again this year without any sweat.

The swaggering Cincinnati southpaw reeled off his 13th victory of the season and his seventh in a row Thursday night by beating Philadelphia 11-1 to boost the Reds within three and a half games of the National League lead.

O'Toole struck out six batters and gave up only five hits but developed blisters on his pitching hand after eight innings and gave way to Jim Owens in the ninth.

Although his 19 wins for the Reds in 1961 represent his top one-season total in the majors, O'Toole won 20 games for Nashville in the Southern Association during 1958 and was rather proud of the accomplishment when he reported to Cincinnati the following spring.

One of his teammates prodded him about not doing any running in spring training that year and O'Toole blithely replied:

"I've got news for you. I won 20 at Nashville last year without running at all."

O'Toole does some occasional running now but he certainly has nothing to sweat about with a 13-3 record that makes him the biggest winner in the majors so far.

He was the beneficiary of a three-run homer by John Edwards Thursday night and another solo homer by Bob Skinner.

The Reds had only a 2-1 lead until the fifth inning when Edwards' homer featured a five-run rally at the expense of Art Mahaffey, who suffered his ninth loss in 12 decisions.

The Milwaukee Braves defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates 2-1 and the Chicago Cubs blanked the Houston Colts 5-0 in the only other NL game scheduled.

Help Wanted Kaline Could Carry Club If He Had One To Carry

NEW YORK (NEA) This was to have been Detroit's year with the incomparable Al Kaline out in front as per usual.

"Kaline is one of the mighty few ballplayers capable of carrying a club, but that is difficult to do when the supposed big hitters behind you, in this case Rocky Colavito and Norm Cash, are batting .220 or less.

This is the year when Kaline, the complete ballplayer seems most likely to live up to his early billing.

With an added roll of muscle around his rounding shoulders and openly awing for the seats, Kaline roared into Yankee Stadium the foremost candidate for the American League's Triple Crown. He was showing the way in batting and runs-batted-in and tied with Leon Wagner of the Los Angeles Angels and the Minnesota Twins' Bob Allison in home runs. His spirit now shows through the in-born grace which for several years made him appear nonchalant.

Now that he is fully matured, Kaline evinces interest in many things, especially baseball in Detroit, and is outspoken.

Kaline remains modest, however, for it was in training in the spring that he remarked in answer to a question: "I don't think I've ever achieved my potential, but it could be that people think I have more ability than I actually have.

The afternoon Kaline collected three hits, including his 15th home run, to take over the league batting leadership from Frank Matson.

With .352, the Tigers lost again and Al asked what the Boston third baseman had done.

"Matson had one hit, a three-run homer that beat Washington," he was advised.

"I wish," said Kaline, "that I could trade my three hits for Matson's winning one."

It's difficult to believe that Kaline is only 28. It seems that he has been around that long. Actually this is his 10th campaign. He was 18 when he first showed up in late June, 1955, a \$39,000 bonus baby off Baltimore sandlots and scared to death.

Steve Souzak was to play right field for the Tigers the next spring but injured a wrist playing winter ball in Cuba. Fred Hutchinson, then the manager, stuck young Kaline in the vacant spot and he's been there since.

Doing what comes very naturally, Kaline at 20 became the youngest major league batting champion in history with .340 in his second season. While Al has been a model player ever since, he never has quite lived up to his early performance. He has been retarded by slow starts and at times a stiff back which hampered his beautiful swing.

While nothing comparable to his Yankee counterpart, Mickey Mantle, Kaline has suffered a full share of injuries, a broken cheekbone in 1958, for example, and the broken collarbone and inflamed chest muscles which kept him out of 61 games last season.

Giving you a rough idea of Kaline's value to the Tigers, when he broke the collarbone in his 20th game last year, the club was third, only three-and-a-half games out of the lead. When Al returned July 23, only to go out for four more games with the inflamed chest muscle 10 days later, the Bengals were seventh and 11½ lengths off the pace.

With Kaline back, the Tigers bagged 18 of 28 the final month, 12 of the last 15.

That's what the Tigers need now—a little more to go with Al Kaline.

Somebody goofed on Jose Azcue, who might have wound up his career in the minors had he not been given one more chance by the Cleveland Indians a month ago.

Azcue had previous trials with the Cincinnati Reds and Kansas City A's, both of whom had written him off as weak hitter with only triple-A potential.

But the Indians acquired him from Portland of the Pacific Coast League in a trade with Kansas City a month ago and have been congratulating them selves ever since.

Haking over as Cleveland's No. 1 catcher when receiver Johnny Romano broke a finger in late May, the 23-year-old Azcue has fashioned a solid .300 batting mark that has helped make the Indians the hottest club in the majors for the month of June.

Azcue helped the Indians to their 18th victory in their last 21 games Thursday night when he drove in four runs with a pair of homers in an 11-8 decision over the Baltimore Orioles.

With Azcue behind the plate in practically all their games the last three weeks, the Indians have spurred from ninth place to fourth, only 3½ games off the pace.

Even with Azcue's two homers Thursday night, however, the Indians still needed another grand slam homer by Max Alvis during a six-run seventh inning to overcome the Orioles. Woodie Held of the Orioles and losing pitcher Dick Hall also hit homers during the contest.

Jerry Walker, who relieved starter Dick Donovan in the seventh inning, was credited with his sixth victory against one loss.

The Yankees rolled to their seventh win in a row by whipping Washington 3-4, the Minnesota Twins beat the Chicago White Sox 5-4, and the Boston Red Sox handed the Detroit Tigers their 10th straight defeat 5-3 in the only other American League games played.

They are so far apart that in a sharp turn the boat banking severely — the additional pull of a tow line on the inner handle can upset the towing craft.

Making a shallow water or dock start, the driver should aim his boat in the same direction the skier faces. A skier is at the mercy of the driver at the start, since he cannot turn his skis until he is planing on the water.

The driver should make sure that tow lines are not tangled or worn.

Attaching tow lines to the boat is very important, both from a standpoint of sking pleasure and safety. A towing pylon, attached several feet forward of the motor and high enough to clear it is a satisfactory rigging.

The simplest method of rigging to an outboard is to attach two rings or hooks a few inches from the top of the transom and just to the sides of the motor cut-out. A V-shaped bridle is attached to these hooks and the actual tow line fixed to the center of the bridle.

Attaching tow lines to the lifting handles on the transoms of most outboards is a dangerous practice.

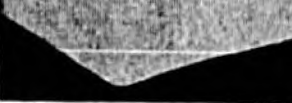

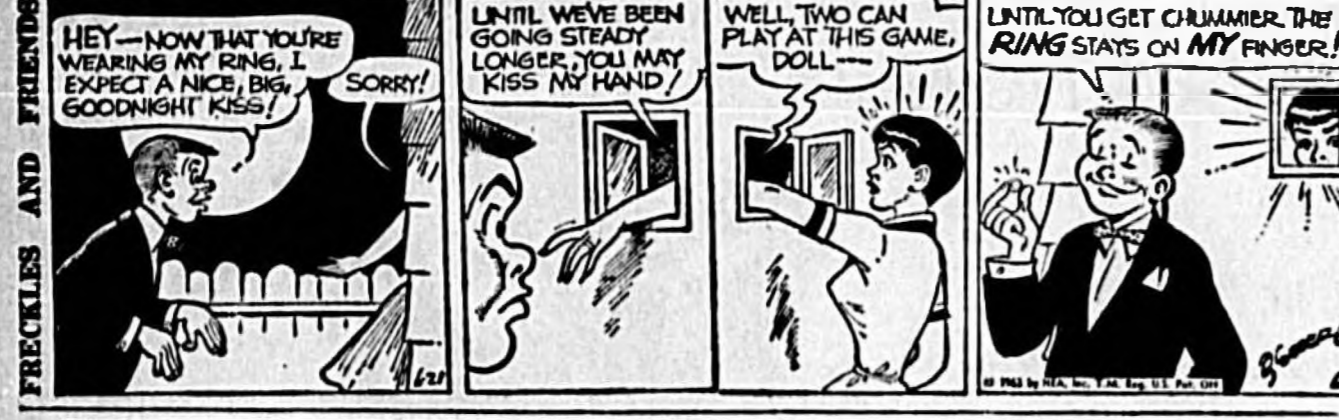
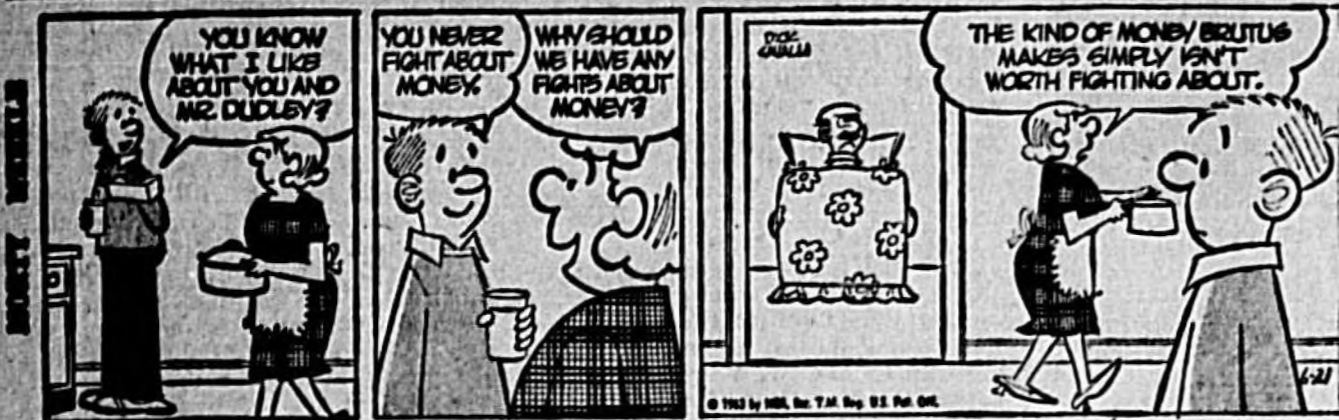

Vegetable Crop In May Grosses \$3 Million

In spite of old Jack Frost, Seminole County is experiencing one of its biggest spring vegetable shipments since 1957, according to County Agricultural Agent, Cecil Tucker.

During the month of May Seminole County growers in the San-O-Zell area (Sanford-Oviedo-Zellwood) shipped more than a million and a half crates grossing over \$3 million. This staggering figure, says County Agent Tucker, should give some idea as to the extent to which we are in the vegetable business here.

To the average person this volume of vegetables for one month is probably hard to visualize, but when it's loaded into trucks it would make a convoy of 2,358 trucks some 45 miles long, reaching from Sanford to Wildwood. Bumper to bumper they would reach to Mt. Dora and beyond.

In light of our citrus losses, although they were greatly offset by higher prices, this bumper crop of vegetables couldn't come at a better time.

It is times like these that we see how much more fortunate we are in Seminole County with our diversified production than are some of our neighboring counties without it.

Tucker pointed out that, unlike many industries which buy raw materials outside of the area and thereby send dollars out of the county, Seminole County farmers not only bring money into the area for their product, but also spend the majority, probably more than two thirds of this gross income, with businesses and employes within the county.

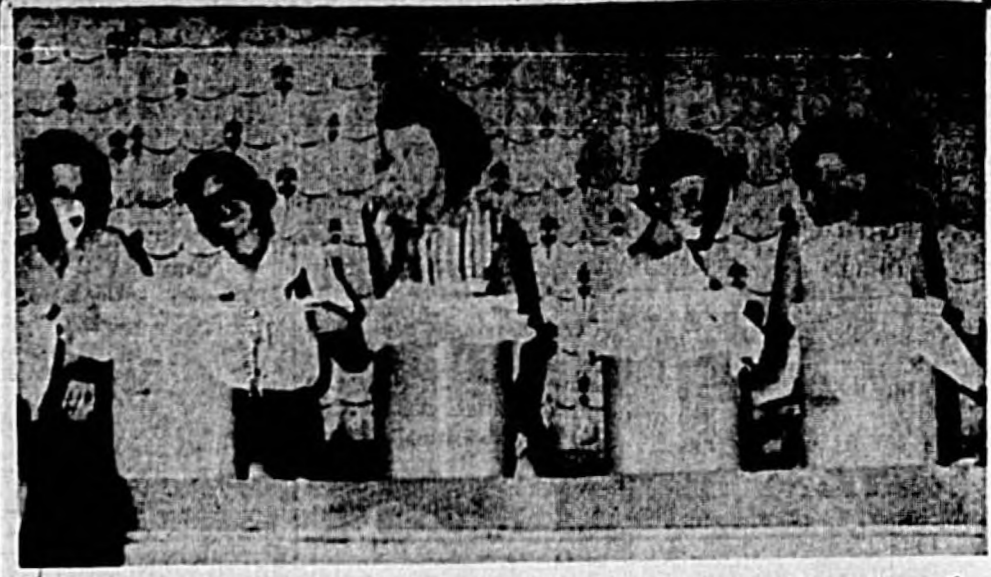
