BIBLE VERSE FOR TODAY

The American Army in Europe fired a billion rounds of small arms ammunition after arriving in Normandy, not to mention 48,322,839 artillery shells, and threw 4,853,888 hand grenades.

Byron Price, director of censorship, said a mouthful of the other day when he declared that the schools should teach "the art of understanding definitely and exactly what the newspapers and the radio broadcasters are saying."

Senators and Congressmen making ten thousand dollars a year, should be given a pay boost in line with the "Little Steel" formula, says President Truman.

The Chamber of Commerce deserves a lot of credit for securing a more accurate census report for Sanford.

Big Ships

When this war ends, we shall have not only the biggest and most effective navy in human history, but the greatest individual ships.

That makes her the queen of transports. It raises the natural question, how far ships of any-kind can profitably go in the matter of combined size and speed.

Such vessels, however, will require tremendous power, and it will be questioned whether such an expenditure of energy is justified.

White And Dark Men

It seems "long ago and far away" that Rudyard Kipling was chanting "Take up the white man's burden," and preaching the sacred duty of leadership and control among nations that, by the standards prevailing at the start of this century, were not competent to govern themselves.

There is still a good deal of that attitude left; and indeed there remain numerous breeds, in various parts of the world, that might profit by lessons from the Caucasian race.

The general spread of knowledge helps in this process. But still more effective, perhaps, is the growing realization that the colored races are needed in the general scheme of things—that they possess better qualities and abilities than they have usually been credited with.

Their progress, however, depends largely on wise leadership among their own people. The most effective line of progress among them is education and the cultivation of mutual tolerance and good will.

Good Gangs

Police in a large midwestern city have analyzed the boy gang problem on a basis of neighborhood factors. As constructive factors they consider playgrounds, churches, canteens, Boytowns.

Meanwhile a juvenile court judge in the southwest has cut his bench business to a fraction by tracing parents of delinquents, telling them what their children were doing while Mother and Father were away from home, and holding the parents responsible thereafter.

In Texas the criminal investigator in a sheriff's office organized the town's most powerful gang leaders and their followers as junior policemen, which gave them the sense of power they craved, but on the side of the law, instead of against it.

Licking the gang problem seems to be largely a matter of directing the kids' energy, of keeping them so busy with the right sort of business that they don't have time to think of petty crime, and of enlisting their parents in the project.

Unfinished Cathedral

Anyone with \$10,000,000 to spare is invited to give it for the completion of New York's great cathedral, that of St. John the Divine. Lesser amounts, however, will be cheerfully accepted.

St. John the Divine has long been one of New York's great sights. It was started in 1892, and like most other cathedrals is a long time in building.

When finished, according to the Bishop, it will be the second largest cathedral in the world, surpassed only by St. Peter's; a third larger than London's St. Paul's or Notre Dame in Paris.

Too Late To Classify

From authoritative sources I am informed that certain groups in this country are protesting to President Truman and General Marshall against the type of warfare we are waging against Japan.

They speak of Christianity and say that our bombing of whole cities is wrong, that the Japanese people are a good and kindly lot and that our conduct of the war will kill the efforts of years of missionary work and Christian teaching in the Orient.

It is extremely difficult for the normal person to grasp such a viewpoint and the only answer I found in learning it, shows religious fanaticism, as silly and dangerous as is that of the people of Japan itself.

I doubt if any of those bird-brained individuals making such complaint would hesitate to kill a mad-dog should one attack them, regardless of how good and lovable a companion it may have been or how much they may have loved it prior to its madness.

Japan has assumed the role of a mad-dog and so long as she persists in adhering to it we have no other course than to make every effort in our power to destroy her. Christianity had its chance and the result was the dastardly attack on Pearl Harbor.

Japanese attended Christian missionary schools to learn English and secure information that was later used against us with telling effect.

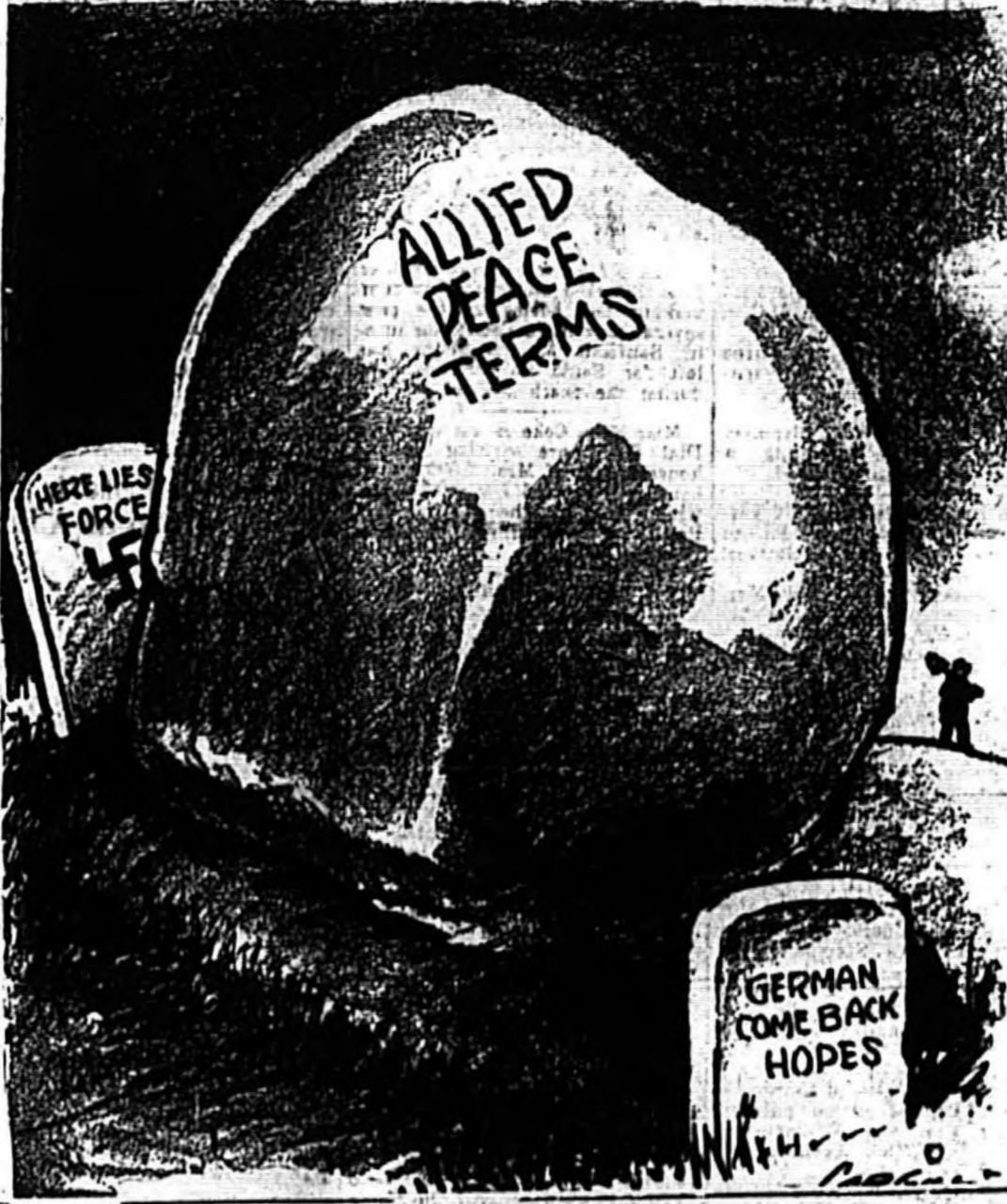
They even accepted the generous gifts of the American Red Cross and instead of using this material to relieve the suffering of their own people, carried it with them to the Philippines as captured supplies since since disclosed.

The Good Book tells us that "those who take up the sword shall perish by the sword." Japan took up the sword, by her own choice. The sword by which they must perish is wielded by America and any person who seeks to stay that sword would thwart the will of Divine justice.

It is unfortunate that in war many innocent souls, helplessly carried by the tide, are made victims of the brutality and injustice that follows in the wake of the "Four Horsemen," yet as long as we insist on maintaining our present system of selfish nationalism with its greed, hate, intolerance and selfishness, we must look for wars and rumors of wars and each combat race to convert a few isolates into more helpless victims and broaden its scope of destruction.

The attitude expressed by these who make these silly protests today are largely responsible for the widespread death and destruction that has visited the world in the last few years.

Fund Created For Advanced Planning Of Public Works

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 15, (Special)—Senator Claude Pepper today announced that more than \$216,000 has been allocated to Florida by the Federal Works Agency for advance planning of public works projects.

The purpose of these funds, Senator Pepper stated, is to enable state and local public agencies to finance the preparation of plans and specifications for state or local public works which are to be constructed within three years after the end of the war.

### Infantry Day Is Observed Today At Camp Blanding

CAMP BLANDING, June 15. (Special) — Two heroes, one an officer, the other an enlisted man of the Infantry Replacement Training Center at Camp Blanding, will be decorated for their battle achievements at today's Infantry Day celebration.

Capt. George R. Mitchell of the 66th Infantry Training Regiment will be awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

1/Sgt. William R. Daniels of

Company F, 212th Infantry Training Battalion, will be presented the Legion of Merit award.

Capt. Mitchell, a native of Luzerne, Pa., who received his commission as a Second Lieutenant at Ft. Benning, Ga., in August 1942, will be decorated for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against the enemy on July 26, 1944, near the French town of Bois de la Roche when he was serving as a First Lieutenant with the 23rd Infantry.

As Company Commander he led his men through extremely fierce machine gun, artillery and mortar fire against superior numbers of Germans to seize their objective,

a strongly fortified wooded sector. Lieut. Mitchell moved among his men, urging them on, with disregard for his personal safety, although there were heavy casualties to his unit. He single handedly silenced one enemy machine gun with five shots of his rifle and fearlessly advanced alone toward a second machine gun emplacement in the face of withering fire. He fired his full cartridge clip into the dugout and again silenced a German gun. He turned back and waved his men forward and led them through the woods where they captured 40

prisoners.

He had landed on Normandy's bloody Omaha Beach on D-Day plus 4 and was in the front lines for 70 days. He was wounded on Aug. 2, 1944, just after his outfit had crossed the Vire river.

First Sergeant Daniels is like a good musician—he's good at doubling in brass. When on two occasions in battle he was forced to fill the role of officers, he so distinguished himself that he was cited by his commanding officer.

A resident of Anson, Tex., he went overseas as a First Sergeant and landed in Sicily on D-Day.

He battled through Salerno, Anzio, Italy and Southern France. When his company lost all of its officers, he acted as a platoon leader for an entire month. Another time, with but two officers left in the company, he was forced to assume the role of platoon leader again.

Sergeant Daniels was presented the Bronze Star medal last July for leading a light machine gun platoon during a counter-attack on Anzio. He was the only platoon to remain intact without losing a man. He also holds the Combat Infantryman's Badge and

four battle stars.

With his platoon, Sergeant Daniels plans soon to go home. Before entering the Army he worked for a mining and smelting company in Colorado. Now he wants to go to business school.

"I'm going to shop around a bit," he said. "I think it's going to be harder to learn to be a civilian again than it was to be a soldier."

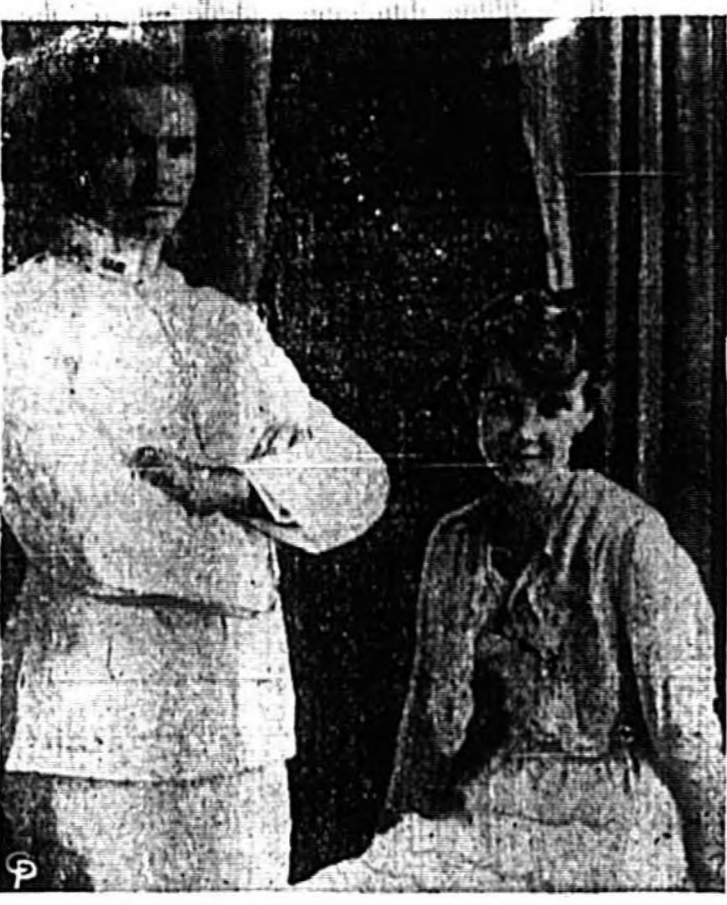
