Andy Sheblein, education officer of the Seminole Power Squadron, said he has more openings for anyone interested in the sailing school course to be held at the Longwood Elementary School



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'Thanks, Canada' Congress Commends 'Act Of Courage'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A grateful Congress has given its thanks to Canada for the daring escape from Iran and safe return home of six Americans who will use the privacy of Dover Air Force Base in Delaware to have their first meeting with their loved ones.

Air Force Maj. Robert Groom, base information officer, said the six Americans arrived at Dover from West Germany Wednesday afternoon. After an overnight stay at the base, they will meet their families who came to Delaware for the reunion.

On Friday, the six will travel to Washington, and at a news conference scheduled for 4 p.m. EST at the State Department tell the story of how they hid for nearly three months in the Canadian Embassy and used forged documents to escape.

Detroit Signals Its Gratitude

DETROIT (UPI) — With Canada so close, it was the neighborly thing to do.

Roy Leinweber, president of Eller Outdoor Advertising Co., set up billboards and electronic signs to flash thanks to neighboring Canada for rescuing six Americans from Iran.

"It came up on a local radio show this morning," Leinweber said Wednesday. "When they called me, I said, 'Great. Let's do it. Right now.'"

"It was a great idea. With Canada so close, it was the neighborly thing to do."

They set up the flash lighting on area freeways and a billboard at the bridge linking Detroit with Windsor, Ontario. The public expression of gratitude was for the rescue of six members of the U.S. Embassy staff in Tehran. The diplomats took refuge in the Canadian Embassy and were spirited out of Iran with false passports.

The message, "Thank You Canada," is borne on two electronic boards overlooking major freeways, both with the blessing of the sponsor, General Tire Co., said Leinweber.

According to what some members of the group have told relatives in the United States, they sneaked out the back door of the U.S. Embassy shortly after the Nov. 4 takeover and made it safely to the Canadian Embassy.

There, they were integrated into the Canadian diplomatic workforce while hiding from Iranian authorities. Apparently carrying forged Iranian visas and Canadian passports, they finally left Tehran last weekend, Canada then closed its embassy in Iran to avoid retribution.

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Utah Declares 'Friendship Days'

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — Gov. Scott Matheson hoisted the Canadian flag in front of the Utah Capitol to show appreciation to Canada for helping six American diplomats escape from Iran.

The governor also declared Wednesday through Friday "Canadian Friendship Days" in Utah.

Matheson's proclamation thanked the people of Canada for demonstrating "sincere friendship and good will towards the United States; by hiding six American diplomats and assisting them to escape from Iran.

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Reaction To Escape Shows Iranian Split

Foreign Minister Saideh Ghotbzadeh says the Canadians who smuggled six Americans out of Iran "risked the lives" of the 50 American captives in the "best" U.S. Embassy.

The hostages' keepers dare they will be any change in their treatment.

It was the latest sign of discord between Modern militants holding the captives for 82 days and government officials. Earlier this week, President-elect Abolhasan Bani-Sadr warned the militants they could not be a separate "government."

Also Wednesday, internal unrest broke out again in Iran — in the western Kurdish and Azerbaijan areas — both ethnically apart from the Persians.

The clashes between revolutionary guards and guerrilla troops in Kurdistan

took the lives of 25 guards, the official Pars news agency said in a report carried by Tehran Radio and monitored in London. Iran Radio said five revolutionary guards were killed in the clashes.

Tehran Radio also said three guards were killed in the fighting in Turkish-speaking Azerbaijan in the northwest.

Ghotbzadeh, in a telephone interview Wednesday with the Canadian Broadcasting Corp. in Toronto, said the Canadians "have taken great risks for the other hostages."

"They saved lives? No unfortunately, they didn't. They risked the lives of the other hostages. You don't understand the repercussion."

He refused to speculate what might happen to the American hostages.

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Geneva To Aid Coma Patient

Jessie Jacobs, 17-year-old son of Johnny and Sharon Jacobs, was admitted to Florida Hospital-Orlando three weeks ago today. At the time of his admission, he was in a coma and is still listed in critical condition, being kept alive by life support systems.

His mother is with him constantly, searching for a flicker of life although doctors have given her little hope that her son will get well, according to the boy's uncle, Jimmy Jacobs. But, hope remains and the hospital bills keep piling up at the rate of \$900 a day, just for the life support systems, said LeLan Tindall, a family friend.

The family had no medical insurance. The young worker with his father in the logging and lumber business before he was stricken with spinal meningitis on Jan. 10.

Mrs. Tindall said she and a dozen other families in the community of Geneva have organized a fund-raising

barbecue dinner beginning at 4 p.m. Saturday to assist the family financially with its medical bills.

Not only will a barbecue dinner be served at the Geneva Community Hall, but homemade cakes, pies and pastries will also be on sale. Tickets can be purchased at the door or at the Mechanics Saw and Mower Shop on Elm Avenue, Sanford, Mrs. Tindall said.

The young people of the community are also involved in the effort to help the family, Mrs. Tindall said. The youths are having a car wash at the Nazareth Church in the community Saturday to raise money.

"We hope these efforts will be a big success and somehow express our love and concern for the entire Jacobs family," Mrs. Tindall said. She said the family have been Geneva residents for many years. — DONNA ESTES.

Complaints have been filed with the National Credit Union Administration in Washington, D.C., said he was told he faced repossession of his car because he could not produce an insurance policy and had an "attitude problem" after taking out loans to purchase both a car and insurance.

Having a baby is not like buying a doll for personal enjoyment, nor is fathering a child limited to a moment of sex.

The father has certain responsibilities for every child he fathers, and a child has every right to expect that those responsibilities will be fulfilled.

DEAR ABBY: I do not go along with your reply to FREEDOM FOR ALL—the unmarried woman who desperately wanted a child—no matter from whom. (You told her to "scrub" the idea.)

May I give you my side of the story, from my own experience? Several years ago, I met, through my business connections, a young married woman who was childless. Her husband was (and still is), confined to a mental institution, unable to father any children. While still in the childbearing age, this lady desperately wanted a child, knowing that she could never have one from her husband.

We like each other rather well, but were never "in love." Both as us being mature, we discussed her situation quite frankly, and to

the late Martin Luther King Jr. showed us that hate generates love. In his "Stride Toward Freedom" (New York: Harper & Brothers, 1958), he wrote: "I can only close the gap in the broken community by meeting hate with love. If I meet hate with hate, I become dehumanized, because creation is so designed that my personality can only be fulfilled in the context of community. When I love, I restore community."

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WORLD IN BRIEF

Vietnam Takes Supply Base As Cambodia Fighting Begins

BANGKOK, Thailand (UPI) — Vietnamese troops captured a strategic Khmer Rouge supply base today during fierce fighting diplomats say may mark the start of the long-awaited Vietnamese dry season offensive.

Tai military sources said Vietnamese soldiers fighting side-by-side with troops loyal to Heng Samrin, president of the Vietnamese-installed Phnom Penh regime, stormed the Phnom Chat hilltop and seized control of the former Khmer Rouge stronghold.

Phnom Chat was used by guerrillas loyal to Pol Pot to pick up international aid, food and medical supplies. International agencies delivered 300 tons of food to refugee settlements near Phnom Chat each week and much of the rice filtered back to the mountain base.

Baez Leaves To Help Asians

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Folk singer Joan Baez is en route to Southeast Asia today to join a "March for Survival" to the Thailand-Cambodian border.

She left San Francisco Wednesday to join a group carrying food and medical supplies for starving and sick Cambodians. They hope to get permission to cross the border from Thailand to deliver their supplies.

"We plan to wait a few days at the border," said Baez. "Accompanying Baez are actress Liv Ullmann, Corita Scott King, and Alvin Karpis. Also with her are 1000, Vietnam Veterans' Union, and other activists.

Sakharov Said Still Fighting

NEW YORK (UPI) — The stepdaughter of Russian dissident Andrei Sakharov says the physicist, who has been exiled from Moscow to the closed city of Gorky, has not "reconciled" himself to the government's decision and might take action that would force the Soviet government to take further steps.

"The most important thing is to demand information about Sakharov from the Soviet authorities, to insist on personal visits from friends and telephone conversations with him," Tanya Yankelovich said Wednesday.

She appeared with her husband Yefrem at a news conference in New York City. Mrs. Yankelovich said the decision to exile Sakharov from Moscow, where he had issued statements critical of Soviet policy, "was made in haste" by the government.

Gold Falls, Dollar Rallies

LONDON (UPI) — The price of gold fell slightly and the dollar rallied today in light trading on world money markets.

"With no fresh news, gold remained quiet and cautious today," said a spokesman for Johnson Matthey bullion brokers in London.

The price of an ounce of gold fell 48p on the Hong Kong market overnight, closing at \$800. Gold also fell in London and Zurich, opening on the London market at \$800 an ounce, down from Wednesday's close of \$800 an ounce. It started the day in Zurich at \$877 an ounce, down from \$898 an ounce.

Does Brain Emit Radiation?

MOSCOW (UPI) — The behavior of miles that live in the Kaashib desert of Asia has convinced a Soviet entomologist the human brain emits radiation.

The Texas news agency reports.

"Lengthy observations showed that the blood-sucking insects always stopped their advance toward a traveler if his head was screened by metal," Tass said Wednesday.

The researcher, entomology professor Pavel Markov of Alma Ata, described his experiments in a new book, "Mysterious Radiation," Tass said.

NATIONAL REPORT: A massive winter storm, dumping snow in the north and freezing rain in the south, headed for the East Coast today, leaving behind at least 30 persons dead and communities buried or flooded. Three persons were killed in Oklahoma and Chicago. Two persons were missing and presumed lost when a private plane skidded off a slick runway at Chicago's Meigs Field and plunged into Lake Michigan. In Chicago, a steady snow caused a rash of accidents Wednesday and police put an emergency traffic plan into effect to help handle the problem. Officials at O'Hare International Airport said flights were delayed between five and 10 minutes. Six inches of snow in southern Indiana snarled traffic and forced many schools to cancel classes.

On Jan. 17, Hilton allegedly broke into the home of Edna Cowart at 1115 Orange Ave., Sanford. According to police, he awakened Mrs. Cowart, held a switchblade knife against her throat and forced her to lie on the floor.

Cowart was not injured in the attack, nor did he attack her property taking anything from her home.

It took two attempts Wednesday to arrest Hilton, who managed to run from his house during the first arrest attempt, police said.

While he is only charged with the one armed burglary and one assault charge at this time, police say they suspect he was involved in at least one similar assault in December.

SANFORD MAN INNOCENT
A Sanford man was found innocent this morning of charges he set fire to his house trailer, located on a lot at the corner of Miller Street and Sanford Avenue this summer.

The fire effectively destroyed the mobile home and its contents, forcing Hudson, his wife and one of his sons to move into a travel trailer, and then into their current apartment.

A circuit court jury found Hudson innocent, following a three-day trial defense attorney Jim West originally expected to take only a day-and-a-half.

"The prosecution's case was entirely circumstantial," West said, explaining it centered around the fact Hudson was in the trailer shortly before the fire started, and that he had locked the trailer, preventing anyone else from starting it.

This was what might happen if the street is not paved, Commissioner William Mitchell told the commission Tuesday night, saying "it is unsafe for any vehicle and we should withdraw the police patrol."

Although plans are in the works to pave the street by property owners (City Administrator David Cheney anticipates work will begin in 90 days) Mitchell insisted temporary fill be used to make the street more passable for city emergency vehicles.

"I've not the city's fault," said Commissioner J. R. Grant. "The street was built illegally."

Property owners in the industrial park have agreed to share the cost of paving the street.

City Attorney Rod Jones Jr. told the commission the property owners must submit an estimate for the city attorney to review and some evidence that the people signing it are actually the property owners.

"You don't want to open the need, you want it open to the public, but you don't want the additional responsibility," Julian added.

Cheney said he hoped to have the necessary documents by the next commission meeting.

The commission also appointed a Charter Advisory Committee to review the year-old city charter and make any recommendations for changes they feel are needed.

"The charter requires the commission to be formed prior to Feb. 1 and members will serve for one year. Each com-

missioner appointed three persons to the 13 member committee.

NATION IN BRIEF

FBI Probes Possible Attempt To Sabotage Soviet's Plane

NEW YORK (UPI) — The FBI is investigating allegations someone sabotaged the computer system that guided the landing of an Aeroflot jet carrying Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin into New York's Kennedy International Airport.

"We are investigating the possibility a federal law was broken," an FBI spokesman said Wednesday night. Dobrynin's plane landed safely the afternoon of Jan. 18. He was returning to the United States from Moscow.

Sources close to the inquiry said one or more people operating Kennedy's traffic system may have electronically deleted indicators that identified a radar signal as the Aeroflot aircraft.

The alleged tampering occurred when the local chapter of the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Association was objecting to the handling of Soviet aircraft as a protest to Russia's intervention in Afghanistan.

Lance Trial Postponed

ATLANTA (UPI) — Inclement weather across north Georgia forced the postponement today of the bank fraud trial of former federal budget director Bert Lance and three co-defendants.

Gary Drake, a U.S. District Judge Charles A. Moyer Jr., said today a "bad situation" exists in many north Georgia counties where some of the defendants, witnesses and jurors live. In co-defendant Richard T. Carr's hometown of Ringgold, near the Tennessee border, Drake said there were reports of no water, no heat and icing along residential streets.

Carr and one juror have been commuting to the trial, about 100 miles each day.

Judge Moyer had told Carr and juror James C. Collins, who lives in Blue Ridge, to call him with a weather report early today.

Crisis Grips Chicago Schools

CHICAGO (UPI) — The school board is threatened with a long teachers' strike if budget cuts aren't restored but it must find a way to trim more from the budget by Friday or schools might close anyway.

The board, which was to meet today, has cut \$5.3 million from its budget so far and must slice \$43.7 million more.

The city council was expected to vote today on a proposed ordinance that would make possible the sale of \$25 million in bonds to pay the teachers and other board employees in full on Friday.

The teachers, angry over payless paychecks, walked off the job Monday. Schools have been open but virtually empty with very few teachers and students reporting for classes.

Carter: No Kennedy Debate

A new attempt to arrange a Democratic debate has died.

Democratic Sen. Edward Kennedy, in a letter to President Carter, Wednesday suggested that scheduled separate appearances of the two candidates at a Consumer Federation of America conference in Washington Feb. 7 be converted to a face-to-face debate.

But the White House took no time to think it over. Deputy press secretary Rex Granum said: "The president has said all along he would not participate in partisan political debates (during the Iran crisis) and that would preclude a debate with the senator."

Army Deserter Gets 1 Year

FORT BRAGG, N. C. (UPI) — The Army has ordered Michael Pearce dismissed from the military and imprisoned for one year for desertion, but the reasons why Pearce fled to Cuba almost 13 years ago remained a mystery Wednesday.

Pearce was sentenced Wednesday after he pleaded guilty to deserting the Army by flying himself to Cuba in May 1967. He gave no evidence in his own defense and shed no light on the reasons for his departure.

"I prefer to remain silent," Pearce said before the sentencing procedure began. Earlier, he said he left the United States "for personal reasons" and never elaborated.

Ed Jones Arrested in Rape

DALLAS (UPI) — Ed "Too Tall" Jones, who quit the Dallas Cowboys to begin a professional boxing career, was charged today with raping his girlfriend's roommate.

The 6-foot-9, 250-pound former all-pro defensive end for the Cowboys reportedly had spent the night at the apartment of a woman friend. Her roommate told police she woke up early today to find Jones attacking her.

Jones, 38, was arraigned today on the rape charge by Judge Joe Loving and bond was set at \$2,500.

Mexican Flood Waters Kill 10, Strand Thousands

TIJUANA, Mexico (UPI) — A Mexican dam that threatened to burst and pour torrents of water over the border into San Diego held fast today despite the strain of flood waters that drove thousands of Mexicans and some Americans from their homes and killed at least 10 people.

Some 12,000 Mexican refugees spent the night in emergency shelters.

Most of the refugees were from low-lying neighborhoods inundated when the floodgates of the Rodriguez Dam were opened Wednesday to ease the pressure after cracks appeared in its side walls and water spurted through.

To the south, the flood waters washed away highway bridges and roadbeds, isolating the port city of Ensenada.

Baja California bore the brunt of the torrent of water into the Tinajuna River, which crosses the border and flows through southern San Diego for 4 miles to the Pacific.

The San Diego Disaster Preparedness Committee set up a command post and prepared to order the evacuation of residents of the river valley. But by nightfall, engineers said the danger appeared to be past, as long as the rain did not resume. The forecast was for cloudy skies or possible light showers.

When the floodgates were opened Wednesday, water poured into the river, flooding parts of eastern San Ysidro, the U.S. border crossing point, and some riverfront homes were evacuated in the Imperial Beach area.

Tijuana police and Mexican Army troops, racing to assist residents of low-lying shantytowns in the pre-dawn darkness, evacuated about 1,500 people in trucks and buses.

Reagan: Send Pakistan Planes

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — Ronald Reagan has suggested sending a squadron of American fighter planes and support personnel to Pakistan as a warning to the Soviet Union that further aggression in the area will not be tolerated.

The Republican presidential candidate said Wednesday President Carter's "indecision" in the Iranian hostage crisis and the presence of Soviet troops in Cuba is risking nuclear war.

"The danger of war comes from the fact that if we continue the weak signals we're sending to the Soviet Union, they are going to get more and more reckless in their aggression," Reagan said.

The former California governor told reporters at a news conference Wednesday in Huntsville, Ala., he recommends an American military presence in the Middle East and Persian Gulf, with bases in Oman, Saudi Arabia, and the United Arab Emirates in Pakistan.

A presence could be a squadron of fighter planes that would include support personnel, Reagan said.

He said he "never thought of actually stationing a group of troops" in Pakistan.

Dollar Must Be Strengthened, Too

International events have pushed America's domestic problems off the front page. Probably no one is more aware of this than President Carter.

His resurgence in the polls has reflected sympathy and support for his efforts to deal with the Iranian hostage crisis and the new Soviet threat in the Middle East.

Yet those concerns have not diminished at all in terms of their own threat to the welfare of our country and its future.

We cannot fault the president for his sense of priorities, even if enunciating a new "Carter Doctrine" in foreign policy amounts to playing his strong suit politically.

Looking at the State of the Union minus the distraction of a foreign crisis, we see the president's economists forecasting an inflation rate of 11 percent for 1980 — only scant relief from the 13 percent rate of 1979.

We hear the president saying his "most immediate legislative priority" is the passage of a windfall profits tax on the oil industry which may inhibit rather than stimulate the domestic oil production the country sorely needs.

The State of the Union is that America needs to shore up its own defenses and provide new military aid to its allies while managing economic and energy problems that are staggering enough in their own right.

If a "Carter Doctrine" is to succeed in mobilizing resistance to the Soviet threat, the leadership must come from a country that has the economic strength as well as the military strength to lead.

Republicans Hope 1980 Is Big Year

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The Grand Old Party may really believe 1980 is its year, because party strategists are predicting substantial gains in the Senate, either, where the Republicans have a good chance of capturing control.

Along with that hoped-for gain, party strategists are saying that, with a little luck, as many as 35 Democratic seats in the House of Representatives will go to the GOP come November.

This more than Senate control or a return to White House power, will mean Republican progress to the pro polls behind the scenes. That's because House seats are won on local levels, congressional district by congressional district.

The relative numbers of Democrats and Republicans in the House have changed little in the last six years. They currently stand at 276 Democrats and 199 Republicans.

W. Paul Tippet, in an interview in New York, charged that Japanese car makers are not only "exporting unemployment" to the United States, one-third of the U.S. trade deficit is caused by Japanese-American automobile imbalance.

Republican planners say the Democratic Party will lose much of its strength in the House if its share of representatives drops to 240.
