A New York reader wants to know what a forcing pass is.

A typical forcing pass occurs on a sequence such as one heart-one spade-two spades-double pass.

The two-spade call was a cue bid and when fourth hand doubled the opening bidder elected to pass to tell his partner to show something more about his hand. Lots of other passes are supposed to be forcing but take care. Some partners forget and fail to respond.

Hormones Can Affect Behavior

DEAR DR. LAMB—I would like to know if a hormone imbalance can cause emotional disturbances in a woman under 30 years of age. I know this can occur during the menopause and patients are given hormone pills. If this is true, how could I go about finding out if a hormone imbalance exists. Can you tell by a pap smear? Please let me know because I believe I have a hormone imbalance.

The problem is complicated by the inadvisable practice of giving female hormones to women with emotional disturbances which are not really related to the menopause at all. Many menopausal symptoms overlap the kind of symptoms associated with anxiety and depression problems. The clinician must be alert to separate the two conditions and treat the one that is really giving the difficulty.

Women can have a very early premature menopause. There are cases on record younger than 30 years of age. One can't tell if there is a deficiency of female hormone by special stains done on cells obtained with the Pap smear. One can also get some idea of a hormone deficiency by testing the urine and blood.

Since you have raised this question I am sure you will not be satisfied until it is answered. The solution then is to go see your obstetrician and gynecologist specialist and tell him what you really want to know. He can do or have the proper tests done. However, I think that if he tells you that your hormone balance is quite normal, the next step is to see about getting some help for what you have labeled as an emotional disturbance and that does not mean hormone therapy.

City Hall Location Decided; Park Ave. Site Is Retained

The issue of where to locate Sanford's new city hall was effectively settled Monday night after a rapid-fire series of motions by City Commissioner John Morris. The new structure will be placed on the present Park Avenue site.

The additional cost would be for the acquisition and preparation of a 2.6 acre parcel immediately west of the present city hall.

The 2.6 acres, owned by the Florida State Bank, (Flagship Bank of Sanford) will be used to complement the city-owned 2.4 acre site in providing enough space for the new city hall, according to a report to the city commission by City Manager W.E. Knowles.

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In September, the city commission voted

Ford, Carter Win Statewide
Reagan, Carter Win Seminole Victories

Seminole County voters — nearly 99 per cent strong — marched to their own tune Tuesday, backing state-wide trends to give the Republican nod to former California Gov. Ronald Reagan and turn down the constitutional amendment on taxation for water management.

Reagan carried 29 of the county's 54 precincts to 24 for Ford. They tied in one precinct. The election turnout was little more than one percentage point less than Seminole Supervisor of Elections Camilla Bruce had predicted.

For the November general election, according to Mrs. Bruce's office, persons can register during all these times but those qualifying after cut-off dates for the various elections will not be permitted to vote in those specific elections.
