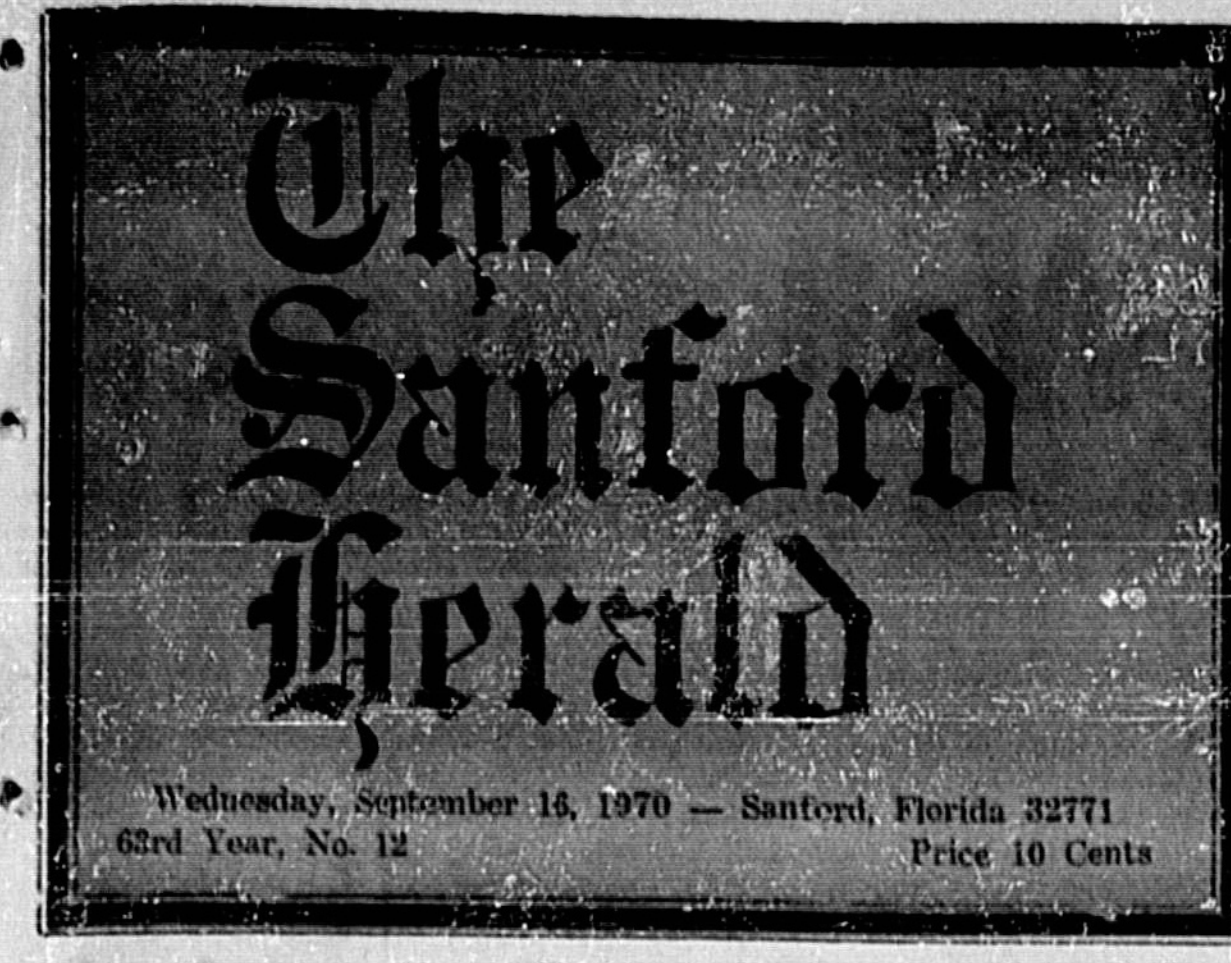

## Guilty As Charged In Radiator Theft

Ben Posey was found guilty Tuesday afternoon by a six person Circuit Court jury of grand larceny in the theft of radiators from Ratliff and Sons Auto Parts in Sanford. The case was heard in Courtroom "B" before the honorable Roger F. Dykes.

The auto parts shop is owned by Thomas Ratliff Jr. and B. E. Ratliff. Tried by Orlando Attorney Jack Nantz for the defense, and prosecuted by Assistant State Attorney Fred Looze, Posey was acquitted of the first count of the indictment: breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony.

Count two of the indictment resulted in the imprisonment of the defendant to the county jail. The maximum punishment for this felony is five years in the state penitentiary.

The judge has ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

In other court action this week Veronica Washington, 28, 400 Pine St., Sanford, pleaded guilty to murder in the third degree, withdrawing her previous plea of not guilty to first degree murder.

Mrs. Washington is accused of murdering Edsel Morse with a revolver on 31 May, 1970.

Judge Dykes ordered a pre-sentence investigation in this case too.

Also, Odessa Delopina Oliver pleaded guilty to a violation of probation and was sentenced by the Honorable Volie A. Williams Jr., Circuit Court Judge, to four months in the county jail.

In breaking her probation, Mrs. Oliver stabbed Bernice Davis with an ice pick.

Mrs. Oliver was on two years probation at the time following six months imprisonment for the assault and battery of Willie Barrett with a butcher knife. She had pleaded guilty to that assault and battery on December 17, 1968.

Closing arguments will be heard today in the trial of Zayne E. Clark, accused by the state of the sale of narcotics. Assistant State Attorney Tom Spoor is prosecuting Clark, with South Seminole Attorney Gene Stephenson providing the defense.

The case expected to go to the jury around noon today.

## Schools Changed In Many Ways

### 'Patriotism Is Passe'

The supreme court has ruled that prayer in the schools is unconstitutional. Perhaps the youngsters have gained "civil liberties," but, in my opinion, they've lost a great deal more in a sense of security.

In my school era, the day began with a prayer for guidance through the day and ended in one class, I remember, by the children joining hands and repeating "The Lord watch between me and thee . . . I think perhaps this went a long way in giving the assurance needed in those days of uncertainty in the depression and war years. Later, and instilled in each of us for all time, a sense of security in knowing that we were never alone, come what may.

Patriotism is passe in schools now . . . sure, a patriotic pledge of allegiance is given each morning, but teaching of patriotism is a lost art, and I think a little bit of Americanism went with it.

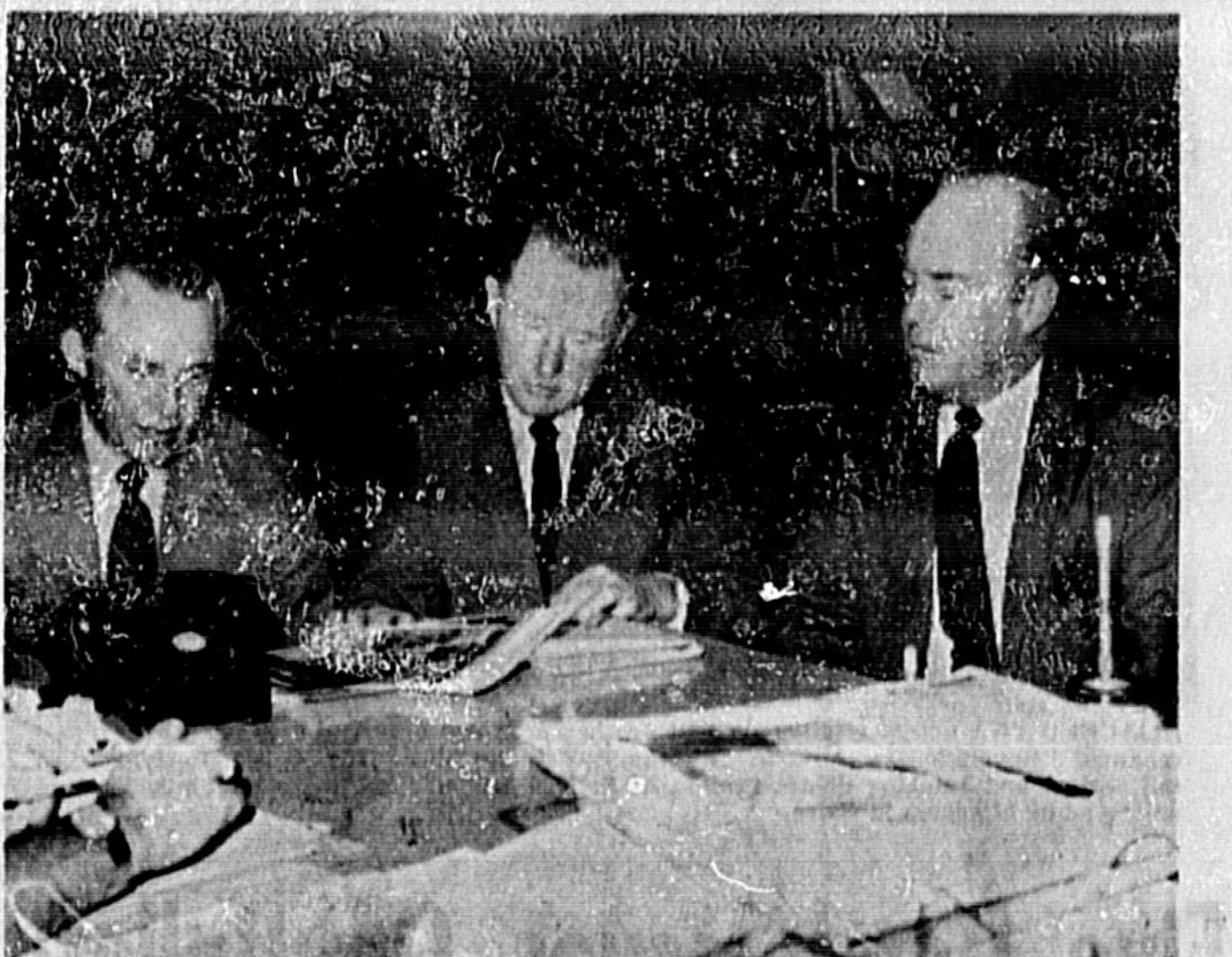
It was mandatory in my school days for students to recite the Pledge of Allegiance to the country's history, and the curriculum taught from "primary" through secondary school included American history. Now, it is buried in an ambiguous amalgam of events called "social studies." Teachers, in those days, made history "live" . . . today, students read it, mostly at home, and do not comprehend their heritage of government.

NOT TAUGHT

Children today are not taught to commit to memory Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, the preamble to the Constitution, the Declaration of Independence or Washington's farewell address to his troops. Nor is there imparted a pride in their country by the exploits of our nation's heroes. In fact, perhaps that's what is wrong with today's "cool out" kids . . . they've never had anyone to admire . . . look up to . . . hero worship . . . and they're the losers in that bargain.

In my opinion the draft card burners and flag desecrators are products of a system of downgrading our country and its heroes. In fact, but by not emphasizing its magnificent history. Any young person in my day would have had to have his water in his veins not to be proud in their country by

## Lake Mary Is Selected By Major Manufacturer

ABOUT THEIR MOVE INTO the Lake Mary plant of General Dynamics was made by (left to right) Clyde A. Ford, Vice President — Plant Operations, Thomas R. Redington — Plant Manager, and Tom Cawley — Manager of Industrial Relations for General Dynamics at Lake Mary.

Stromberg-Carlson Corporation, a subsidiary of General Dynamics, will start production operations in the Lake Mary plant later this month. The company plans to manufacture its new line of electronic telephone switching systems here.

Clyde A. Ford, Vice President, Plant Operations, said that the company plans a gradual build-up of production over the next several years. The system assembled here is scheduled for shipment in March of 1971.

Stromberg-Carlson is a leading manufacturer of telephone switching, transmission and control equipment for the nation's 1,800 independent (non-Bell) telephone companies. Industry and users of private communications systems. The company, which has served the telephone industry for more than 75 years, has its headquarters in Rochester, N.Y. More than 6,000 persons are employed by Stromberg-Carlson at its plants in Rochester, Charlotteville, Va., Ardmore, Okla., and Camden, Ark.

Initially, Stromberg-Carlson will share the General Dynamics-owned facility at Lake Mary with General Dynamics, Dynatronics operation. Dynatronics will continue its operations specializing in long production runs of radio and data communications equipment, said Sam L. Ackerman, Vice President and Manager of the Dynatronics operation. Dynatronics' work force is now stabilized at about 800 employees and will remain constant throughout the rest of the year. He added that the company is currently negotiating contracts to provide for a sound business operation in 1971.

"Stromberg-Carlson is currently experiencing significant business growth," Mr. Ford said. "This new operation is needed to meet the growing demand for our new CROSSREED electronic switching line. We feel we are indeed fortunate to have manufacturing space made available to us here in Central Florida."

Heading up Lake Mary operations for Stromberg-Carlson will be Thomas R. Redington. Mr. Redington is a 25 year veteran of the telephone business and has held a variety of engineering and operations management positions with Stromberg-Carlson. He was most recently director of Rochester plant operations.

COMPANY'S PLANS

Redington detailed the company's plans for the Lake Mary operation. Initial production, he said, will begin this month with a starting work force of 15 production employees. "We expect to increase employment to about 80 by the end of this year," he said, "and we plan to continue a build-up of employment along with production during 1971 and beyond." He added that employment should reach 350 to 400 by the end of 1971.

## 197 Signatures School Board Gets Petition On Holder

Seminole County School Board last night received a petition bearing 197 signatures asking for the removal of Oviedo High School Principal Clyde Holder. The petition was hand-submitted by Dr. James Palmer, of Chuluota, who addressed the document to the school board and Supt. John Angel.

The board meeting room was crowded with parents, some supporting and others opposing the controversial action of a teacher whose handling of school situations four years previous brought out an outcry from angry parents over desegregation.

Integration was not mentioned as the cause of last night's demand that Holder be removed from office as Dr. Palmer and Betty, his wife, explained their reasons for wanting to remove Holder.

Palmer accused Holder of showing preference to a number of students and using unethical actions like not accepting doctor's statements to excuse students from physical education participation.

A woman identifying herself as Mrs. Herring of Chuluota told the board Jimmy, her son, had a leg disease and was told by a doctor not to take physical exercise for a year.

She said she phoned this to Holder and the principal "just laughed" and her son was sent to physical education the next day. She said her husband had to go to the school and threaten to "take Holder behind the woodshed" before anything was done about the situation.

Joseph Ruffo, another father, told the board his son had a leg disease and was told by a doctor not to take physical exercise for a year.

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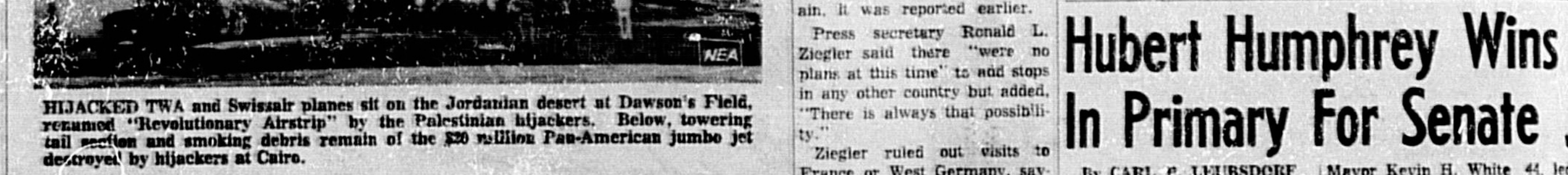

# Nixon's Trip Expanded; Yugoslavia Is Included

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon's European trip later this month is being expanded to include a visit to Communist Yugoslavia—the first trip there by an American president.  
The White House announced today that Nixon will leave Washington Sept. 27, also will meet with leaders in Italy, Spain and Britain. It was reported earlier.  
Press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said there "were no plans at this time" to add stops in any other country but added, "There is always that possibility."

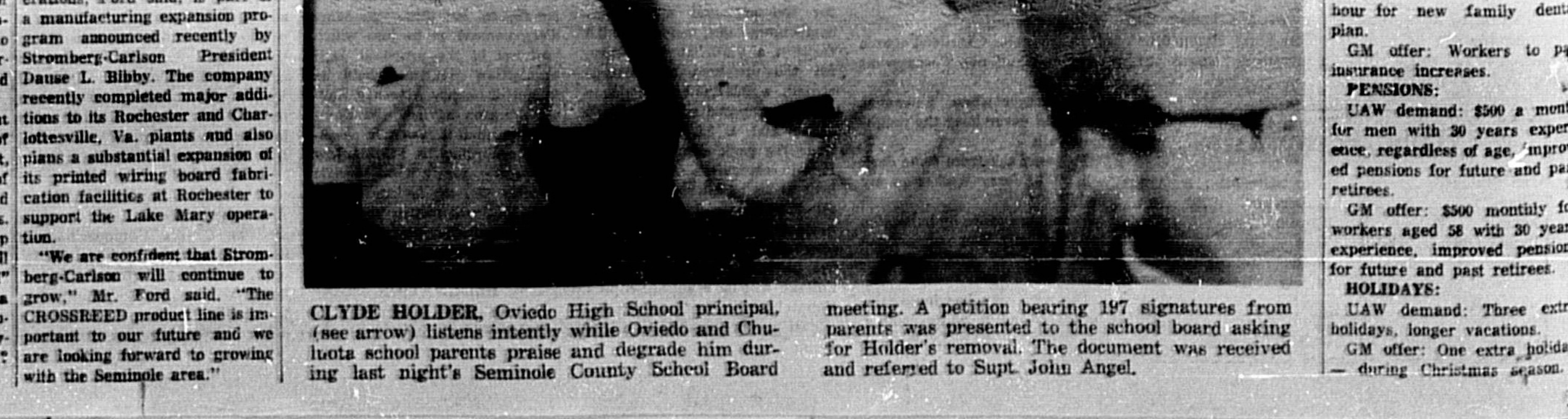

Set Oct. 6 as the date for public hearings on zoning changes and the proposed land use plan. Also on Oct. 6 heard the appeal of a decision of the Board of Adjustment concerning a sewerage treatment facility.  
Approved the transfer of \$1,207 from the expenses other than salary to capital outlay in the Sheriff's budget.  
Passed a resolution to request the Department of Transportation to study the ecological feasibility of the Lake Jessup Causeway with equal payment coming from primary and secondary road funds.  
Approved the bonding of two Sheriff's Deputies.  
Decided not to change the number of voting machines for the second primary due to the possibility of breakdowns at precincts with only two voting machines and due to the rungs in both of the major political parties.  
The spokesman said Nixon accepted a "long-standing invitation" from Yugoslav President Josip Broz Tito and that the two men looked forward to "a full exchange of views on the international situation."  
Ziegler ruled out visits to France or West Germany, saying Nixon would not extend his trip because of commitments on his October calendar.  
Asked to be more specific about October plans, Ziegler spoke of "commitments that we are not prepared to tell you at this time."

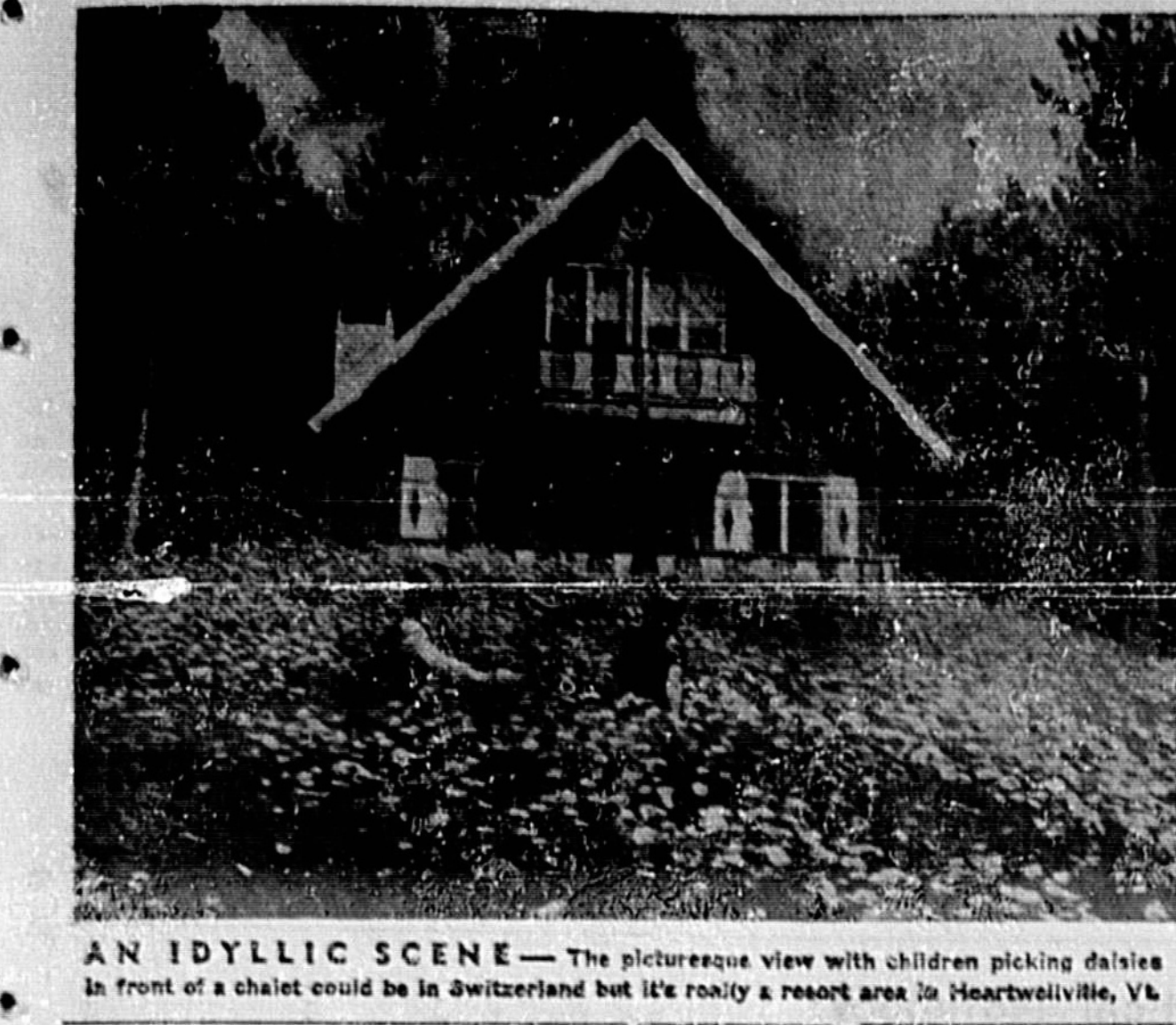

Professional practices investigation of the charges and then a public hearing if needed.  
Supt. John Angel said "I am obligated to the principals of the county schools, but will listen to what people with a grievance have to say. He stated his preference for settling the problem without a petition by solving it at the school level and then a recourse to the administrative office.

# Racial Housing Lines Government Considers Quota-Like Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nixon administration, faced with the continued division of the nation's housing along racial lines, is considering adoption of a quota-like system of standards for federally aided housing.  
The standards or goals would be designed to discourage erection of further all-white or all-black developments built with or insured by federal funds.  
"You would say to a developer... 'Whatever you do, it isn't going to be all white or all black,'" said one official in explaining the approach under study. "Unless you come up with that, it's no deal."  
The approach, under discussion in the upper levels of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, would be similar to that taken by the Labor Department in its Philadelphia Plan for increased minority employment in the building trades.  
Despite passage of a national open housing law, Negroes comprised no more than 3 per cent of the U.S. suburban population in 1968—the same percentage as in 1960.  
At the same time, there has been a mass exodus of both industry and whites into the suburbs—an exodus that has deepened the social and economic isolation of Negroes left behind in the central city.  
HUD officials, including Secretary George Romney, have long acknowledged that past HUD and Federal Housing Administration policies helped create the situation, which Romney has described as "the most sensitive and explosive domestic problem of our time."  
The compliance standards under discussion would be an attempt to begin eliminating effects of previous discrimination as well as laying guidelines to assure equal access to federally assisted housing built in the future.  
HUD Assistant Secretary Samuel J. Simmons, one of the ranking Negro officials in the administration, is advocating the imposition of the minority goal.  
"The minimum goal to shoot at would be a situation where the composition of the project would pretty well reflect the social composition of the total population in a housing market area," said Simmons.  
Compliance would be judged, necessarily on the numbers of Negroes actually buying homes in the development.

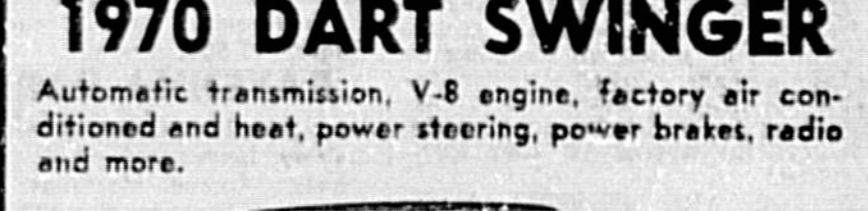

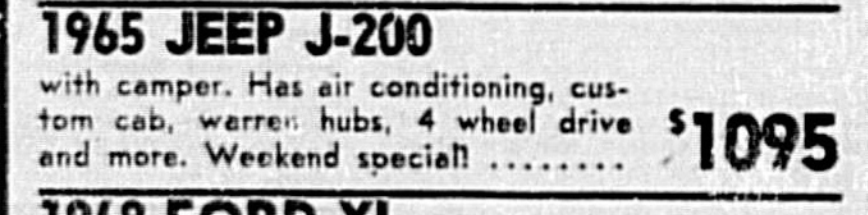

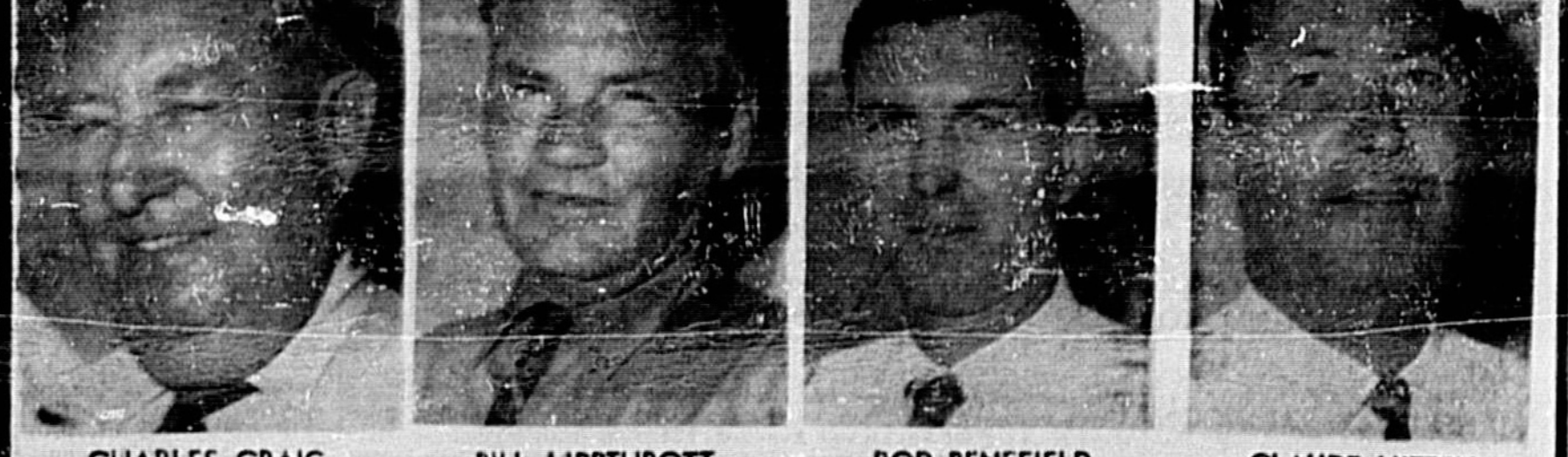

# Children Returned To Charlene Powers

The three children of Charlene Powers were returned to her custody Monday and are now enrolled in a South Seminole elementary school.

They were removed from her care on February 26, shortly after she was accused, with her husband, Ronald, of the second degree murder of her 2½ year old daughter, Jana.

Lana, who died Feb. 6, had been admitted to the Orange Memorial Hospital in Orlando by her mother a few days before her death. Autopsy reports showed the child died as the result of trauma (injury) caused by a blunt instrument.

The children were retained by the office of Juvenile Judge Wallace H. Hall. It was Judge Hall who originally had the children removed from the Powers' custody and placed under the care of the Division of Family Services.

Rather than go through the expense of a habeas corpus hearing, which would most likely have resulted in the return of the children to their mother's care, the children were released by Judge's order, explained Judge Hall.

The case is being prosecuted by Assistant State Attorney Tom Speer, and defended by Winter Park attorney Clark Jennings. Mrs. Powers is the wife's secretary.

Before Monday's release of the children, which coincided with the ninth birthday of the oldest child, (the other two are six and seven years old) a petition for a writ of habeas corpus had been issued by Circuit Court Judge Richard McDrew. The writ required that the children appear in court Friday so that the criminal judge could determine whether or not to return the children to the custody of the mother.

Motion for severance of the trials for the husband and wife, which is set for Nov. 30, will be heard in the future, but the date for that motion for Severance has not yet been set, claims Jennings.

## Commission Petitioned

Residents of Prairie Lake Heights in South Seminole are petitioning for a commission to investigate a recurrence of flooding problems that followed Hurricane Donna in 1960 when 12 inches of water stood in their yards, petitioned the county commission Tuesday regarding drainage plans for the Laurel wood subdivision being built by Laurel Homes.

County Engineer William Bush contended there would be less water draining into their area, which forms a natural basin, rather than more as a result of FHA drainage requirements and the fact that the subdivision would be on sanitary sewers.

Representing the residents were Mr. and Mrs. Donald K. Bush and Mr. and Mrs. Dallas Baker. Alexander said the commission would take the information submitted for analysis by the county engineer and would make certain the builders were proceeding according to the plans submitted.

Requests for school crossing guards at four additional locations were denied for the following reasons: not needed at Lake Mary Boulevard until it is opened as a through street; low traffic volume and low number of children at 20th Street and Hayes for Goldboro students; cannot move guard at Third and French to Seventh and French until this change of crossing approved by State Department of Transportation; and at U. S. Highway 17-92 at Orange Street in Longwood, student count low, but other solution such as busing recommended due to hazard of four-lane highway.

General Water Works was granted a use permit to install water and sewer pipes at High Street and Linden Road extending to Winter Woods in Southwest Seminole.

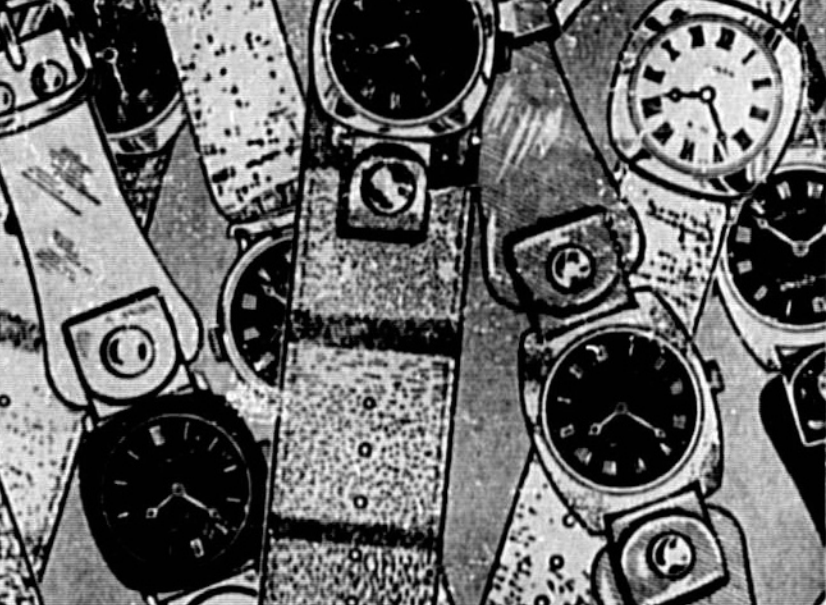

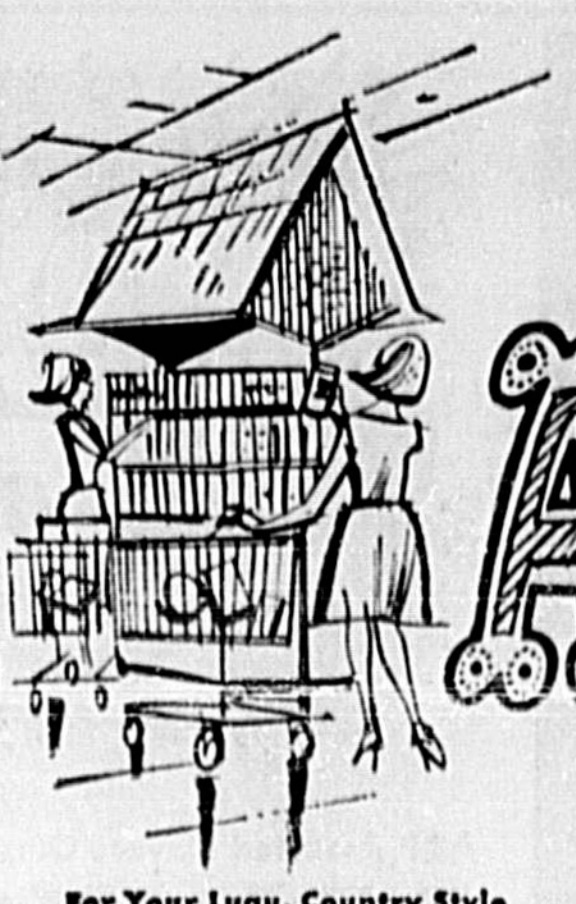

### Cold Dish, Salad Easy Luncheon

The best thing about summer eating is that it takes so little cooking. Most salads and cold dishes are easy to prepare and the simplest meal can, with a little imagination, be transformed into a masterpiece.

From the apartment terraces of Manhattan to the storehouse cottages of Maine, normally hesitant hosts are paying off their social debts with party pizzas and backyard barbecues.

Summer is also the time for high wines. The cool vintages of Bordeaux, for example, can turn a snack into a memorable occasion, provided the snack has attractive ingredients.

Start with a main hearty soup, serve the wine with generous helpings of gravy, cheddar and mushroom cheeses on crisp French bread. Wind up with a bowl of colorful fruit, and your guests will part with contentment.

Feeding four or forty is easy with this sort of fare, and the food bill won't bankrupt you.

The first course we have in mind is called le Soufflé d'été d'été, the soup of summer and winter, and it is easily made beforehand.

Hot in the winter and cold in the summer, this variety of meats, not a garbache and not a minestrone, it is something like both and comes from Bordeaux, the region near the Bordeaux wine country.

Robust in cold weather and soothing during warm spells depending on how you prepare it, this soup provides an ideal curtain raiser for an elegant lunch.

A good wine to serve with such a soup and the cheese that follows is Graves, a dry white wine from Bordeaux. It is light, refreshing and fills a role both as an aperitif and an accompaniment to a cold meal.

Cheese is usually served with a robust red wine, which is fine in chilly weather. But in the mild and warm months Graves gives cheese a refreshing new lightness and your guests a well-earned lift.

Whether it's a brunch or a midday banquet, there is no reason for anyone to get so loaded with heavy food and strong drink that they spend the rest of the day feeling sore and glassy-eyed.

Desserts can be the key to such a meal. Avoid the tall cream-topped parfaits, tempting as they are, and use a trimming bowl of fruit as your centerpiece. Not only will your table look attractive, but it will be a boon for dieting dainties and their overweight escorts. On a hot day, there is nothing like a few grapes or sliced peaches with a glass of chilled white wine.

**SOUP BORDELAISE**  
(Summer Variety)  
2 slices bacon  
1 clove garlic  
1 onion  
1 leek  
2 stalks celery  
1 tbsp. olive oil  
1/2 cup Medoc wine  
4 tomatoes  
1 medium can chicken stock  
1 cup peas  
1 cup red kidney beans  
1 cup chick peas  
1 cup mushrooms  
Mince bacon, garlic, onion, leek and celery. Sauté in oil several minutes. Add Medoc and stir until liquid has simmered down at which point alcohol will have evaporated. Add tomatoes and simmer together for five minutes. Add chicken stock, peas, beans and onion. Allow to simmer together for 30 minutes. Add mushrooms 10 minutes before taking off the heat. Chill. Can be prepared several days ahead of time. Serves four.

# Colache Version Of Succotash

One good cook we know uses frozen vegetables in an interesting way. She treats frozen corn, succotini and onions with fresh tomatoes, butter and seasonings and serves the combination with chicken, meat or poultry.

She tells us she borrowed the idea from "Black's Success of Success" Cooking" by Elma Zelaya, published by Prentice-Hall. Elma calls the dish "Colache" and says it's the Mexican version of succotash; she adds that it was probably learned from the Indians, as was the New England variety of succotash.

**COLACHE** (Mexican Succotash)  
1 medium tomato  
2 tablespoons butter  
1/2 cup frozen chopped onion  
1 package (16 ounces) frozen whole-kernel corn  
1 package (10 ounces) frozen sliced succotini squash  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2-1/3 teaspoon pepper  
Freeze tomatoes by holding each one on a fork over a gas flame until skin wrinkles and splits; pull off skin. Or cover tomatoes with boiling water for about a minute, drain and with the help of a paring knife pull off skin. Cut off blossom ends of tomatoes and cut each tomato in half; gently squeeze each half to remove liquid and seeds. Coarsely chop; you should have about 1 cup.

In a 1 1/2-quart skillet over moderate heat, melt the butter. Add onion and cook, stirring often, until thawed and tender—about 10 minutes. Add chopped tomatoes and bring to a boil. Add corn, succotini, salt and pepper. Cover and cook over moderate heat, stirring occasionally until corn and succotini are tender—about 8 minutes. Serve at once.  
Makes 4 to 5 servings.
