Horatio Alger, George Jenkins Stories Similar

Modern day educators may sneer at Horatio Alger stories but they find it hard to eat aside the story of George W. Jenkins, a Georgia boy, who started as a \$15 a week grocery clerk and today heads the Publix Food Stores Corporation which he formed. Jenkins possessed ambition which he coupled with hard work and an uncanny ability to please and hold customers. In 1928 he became manager of the largest store of a chain. With money he saved he later opened his own store. And it grew from there. Jenkins, who can come up with a new idea on the hour, believed customers would respond to service and showmanship as well as comfort and convenience. He beautified stores inside and out and provided landscaped parking areas. His ideas revolutionized the grocery business. His competition followed but he managed to remain in front. Trade journals and the Saturday Evening Post told the Publix story. Another condensed article appears in the current issue of Reader's Digest. Jenkins set out to make "shopping a pleasure" and adopted that slogan. Every inducement was offered — trading stamps, gimmicks, give-aways and hidden treasures. How successful he was is evidenced by the steady increase in gross sales to a point where they hit over \$200 million in 1968, with 99 stores in operation and a dozen more under construction. Today, more than 6,200 Publix employees wear the company's emblem.

FEC Blast Derails 27 Cars, Five Locomotives

ST. AUGUSTINE (UPI) — An explosion, apparently triggered by saboteurs, derailed today five diesel locomotives and 27 cars of a freight train operated by the strike-plagued Florida East Coast Railway.

No one was seriously hurt, authorities said. An engineer suffered a cut on the head from flying glass shattered by the blast.

The names of the Miami-based train crew were withheld.

Contrary to first reports after the explosion, there was no fire, authorities said.

The explosion occurred right at a crossing on State Road 200 near the community of Dupont Center 10 miles south of this city which houses executive offices of the railroad.

Harvey Lopez, managing editor of the St. Augustine Record, reported from the scene that the blast derailed the first four of five diesel locomotives and completely shattered the fifth. He said

he counted at least 20 cars derailed.

"They are shattered and piled up in such a jumble that it is difficult to count them but it looks like about half the train left the tracks," the newsmen reported.

Ray Bishop, a motorist, had stopped his automobile at the crossing to await passage of the train. He said the first four Diesels passed over the crossing then the explosion went off directly under the fifth

locomotive unit with "a terrific blast."

"It felt like my car left the pavement for a couple of feet straight up," Bishop said.

When he saw the rail cars begin leaving the track, he quickly put his automobile in reverse to get out of the way.

Some of the shattered rail cars were carrying citrus and wood. Others were empty. The train also contained tank cars but none caught fire.

The explosion was the third such blast on the FEC line this month. Another attempt earlier this month failed near Titusville when four boys derailed a big dynamite bomb placed under the tracks by pulling the wires loose just before a freight train passed.

There have been two explosions in the Miami area and the most recent derailed a freight train at New Smyrna Beach south of here.

Today's ill-fated freight was northbound out of Miami.

Cassius Clay Black Muslim, 'Elijah' Says

CHICAGO (UPI) — The leader of the Black Muslims Wednesday night said heavyweight champion Cassius Clay had admitted he was a member of the black supremacy sect but did not say where he got his information.

"I am glad that Cassius Clay was brave enough to say he was a Muslim," Elijah Muhammad told a cheering crowd of almost 5,000 Negroes at the group's annual national convention. "I am happy that he confessed he is a believer."

Clay did not make any statement about Black Muslim membership in Miami Beach, where he won the crown from Sonny Liston Tuesday night.

Attempts were made to reach Clay for comment on Muhammad's claim but the new champion was not available. He said recently he would explain his position after the fight was over but failed to do so Wednesday.

Rudolph Valentino Clay, the champion's younger brother and a heavyweight boxer also, told an impromptu news conference here Wednesday that he was a Black Muslim.

Russia Admits Top Scientist Sent To Cuba

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union has sent a leading Russian scientist to establish a satellite observation station in Cuba.

The island is less than 250 miles from the U.S. missile base at Cape Kennedy.

The official press agency Tass identified the scientist as Nikolai Verplev, scientific secretary of the Soviet Academy of Science.

In Washington, a U. S. space expert said such a station in Cuba would help the Soviets keep more precise track of their own manned and unmanned craft in orbit.

He said he doubted that the Russians needed a Cuban to keep watch on U.S. launches from Cape Kennedy, adding that Soviet newsmen in Florida and Russian travelers which frequent U.S. East Coast waters can perform this function.

The official deduced that the Soviets would use the Cuban station as a camera observation post for obtaining precise information about satellite orbits, such data, he said, is particularly useful in bringing astronauts back to earth from space.

Gulf Dockers Load Wheat

HOUSTON (UPI) — Longshoremen at three Gulf of Mexico ports today loaded foreign ships with wheat for the Soviet Union. At least four more vessels waited to get into the docks.

The loadings ended a week-long boycott of foreign ships by the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA). Workers at Houston stopped briefly Wednesday when they saw a small group of anti-Communist pickets, but proceeded to load the Turkish vessel Umran on orders from a foreman.

In New Orleans, workers were scheduled to begin loading the Dutch freighter Astrop today and the Greek ship Kyntinos later this week.

At Galveston, Tex., the Greek vessel Sirota and the British London Craftman stood by. A spokesman said loading of the London Craftman may begin today or Friday.

State Acts To Get Bond Sales Going

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — A suit to validate \$15 million in college construction bonds was filed in Leon County Circuit Court today — just one day after the bonds were given the final okay of state boards.

Circuit Judge W. May Walker set April 3 at 10 a. m. for a hearing in the suit.

Atty. Gen. James W. Kynes Jr. moved fast in filing the suit in hopes of getting a speedy decision so the bonds can be sold while the market is so favorable.

The money will be used to build \$15 million in classrooms and other buildings at state universities, including a new university in Pensacola and planning for another university at Orlando, and \$30 million for buildings at public junior colleges.

Assistant Atty. Gen. Ralph Odum, who filed the suit, said the state expects to put on extensive testimony on feasibility and need for the bonds in order to build up a strong record.

The extradition demand was delivered Wednesday and was turned over to the government departments concerned for study, the sources said.

On Tuesday the sister-in-law of the late South Vietnamese president ridiculed the idea of her extradition as "ridiculous."

She fired off a communique when she read press reports of the extradition.

"Is it because they are so beaten on all sides that, to save face, they can do nothing else but attack a widow and orphans?" she wrote.

of construction of a 107-mile barge canal that will cost some \$158 million before it is completed in an estimated eight to 10 years.

The first family took off from Andrews Air Force Base near Washington for the overnight trip. At Jacksonville Naval Air Station, Johnson switched to a helicopter for the short flight to the canal site near here.

After detonating a dynamite charge to start construction of the cross-Florida barge canal, Johnson was flying to Miami Beach where tonight he will address a 1000-plate fund raising dinner given by the Florida State Democratic Committee.

Johnson and his family will spend the night at the hotel and fly back to Washington Friday morning.

Johnson's appearance at the fund-raising dinner, which is expected to attract 3,500 persons, opens a Democratic drive to carry the presidential ticket in the State this November. The last Democratic presidential candidate to win Florida's 14 electoral votes was Harry S. Truman in 1948.

The canal dedication ceremonies drew 15,000 persons, including Gov. Farris Bryant and Democratic Sens. George A. Smathers and Spessard L. Holland.

The First Lady and two Johnson daughters, Lynda Bird, 10, and Lucy Baines, 10, are not expected to make any speeches. They are making the one-day trip, according to a White House spokesman, because Johnson "loves to have the ladies in his life with him."

During his Naval career he spent 15 years as an enlisted man and was a chief petty officer when commissioned an ensign in July 1958. He has attended a number of Naval schools and correspondence schools.

Talmadge has opened the Seminole Publishing Company and his first publication, "Crazy Karl Marx," is reported a good seller throughout the country. It is a small booklet exposing Communism for the 8-14 age group.

Talmadge said he aspires to serve the 5th District as representative in the U. S. Congress some day.

The pipeline not only proved to be another factor in the overall \$15 million expansion program at the Sanford Naval Air Station, but the fuel transported by barge for the Station added from 25 to 30 million gallons of fuel to the tonnage previously transported on the river. This is important in the promotion of the canal which will eventually link the St. Johns with the Indian River.

"Another Chamber project, the first industrial show ever held in Seminole County, was such a huge success that this is to become a part of the regular program of the Chamber. Between 35 and 40 business and industrial firms participated in the event, and it is expected that there will be a substantial increase in the number of exhibitors this year.

The District, composed of Seminole, Brevard, Orange and Volusia, was successful in obtaining a loan of \$40,000 from the State Internal Improvement Fund for preliminary engineering and survey design . . . the culmination of many years of work by your Chamber.

"This report could not be complete without some mention of the tremendous increase in inquiries resulting from the Chamber's expanded activities in 1963. This has required the replacement of practically all mailing pieces used in our promotional program with material that is attractive, factual and a credit to Seminole County.

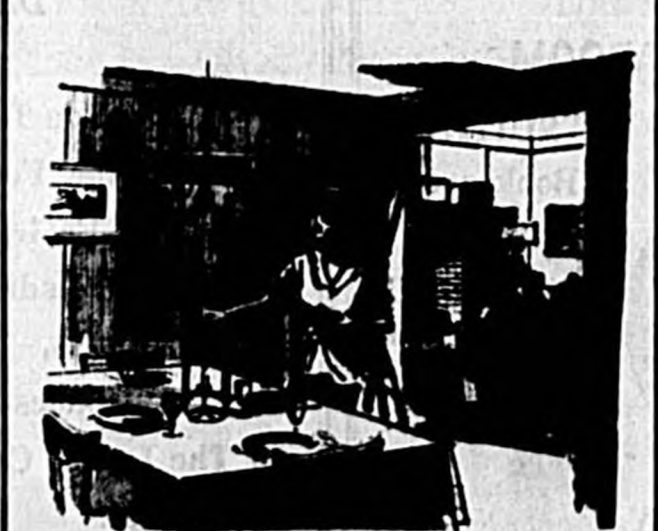

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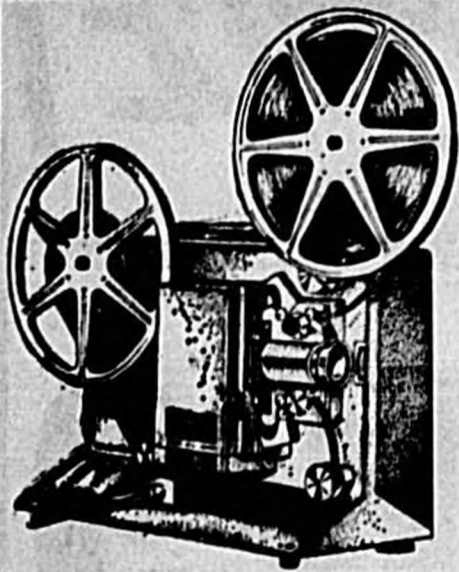

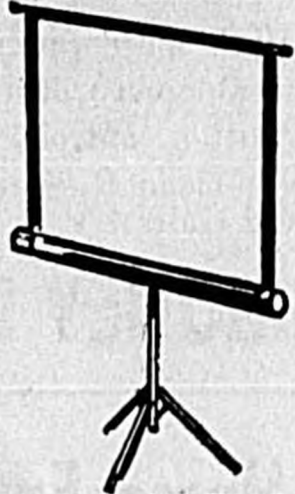

Chances For Baseball Slight
The chances of Sanford landing an entry in the Florida State League for the 1964 diamond season are so slight now to even be called a possibility.

About the only way it could be done would be for someone or some organization to post the required \$3,000 with the Florida State League and the National Association guarantees, plus an equal share to one-eighth of what is now in the circuit's treasury and put \$10,000 in escrow to guarantee the completion of the season.

And, Peter Schaal, former Herald Sports Editor, FSL secretary-statistician, etc., says all of this would have to be done within a week or so.

In addition, Pete reminds us that the "angel" would have to provide a bus (or at least a couple of station wagons) in addition to uniforms, or other equipment, and a ball park. We don't believe the latter would pose any problem. But the rest of it sure would.

"About 10 days ago," Pete says, "league directors voted five to three to go with the same eight clubs that comprised the loop last year."
Apparently all this talk about baseball returning to Sanford stemmed from efforts by the Houston Colts to place a farm system outfit in Cocoa and put the entry in the FSL. "Cocoa wanted it like mad," declared Pete, "and they used a lot of pressure. However, the 10th club couldn't be promoted, and Detroit said it would not operate its club anywhere except at Lakeland."

We have reason to believe that efforts to put a club in Sanford came from the need for a 10th city to enter the loop along with Cocoa.

Therefore, schedules that had been ready since mid-January were ordered released and the league aims to open on April 20 with eight teams.

Pete, along with many other Sanford baseball fans, says he is convinced "Sanford is 'readier' than ever for the return of professional baseball."

Schaal also revealed that he heard by the proverbial grapevine that "The Braves, Cardinals, Indians and the Mets might supply working agreements. However, none of the clubs will agree to operation a club outright anywhere this year."

"A working agreement," says Pete, is worth today nearly \$20,000 to any community. Unless it's been changed in the last month, an agreement means the major league club will supply the manager and pay his salary, supply the players, pay workmen's compensation and other insurance items, pay all phone tabs and transportation costs involving player arrivals and departures plus all training expenses."

Now that's not bad—in any language.
"Unlike years ago," Pete goes on to say, "four players would be finely screened with the usual drafters completely weeded out. Most of the youngsters would be bonus players, many with college educations—at least in part—and, except for a few at the start and a few brought in later, all would be personnel owners believed to be major league potential."

So unless something could be done right soon it's highly unlikely that Sanford will have professional baseball this summer. However, there's no better time than now for someone or some group to get organized to help arrange a Sanford entry into the FSL — along with Cocoa — next season.

Who knows, perhaps the Mets—once they see our layout here—will consent to sponsor the Sanford club in 1965. At any rate, let's hope something can be done. The response we got from the items in The Herald's "Clock" item was overwhelming.

There's no doubt but that Pete's right when he says Sanford is ready to return to the Florida State League.

Drysdale Gets \$71,000; Now What's For Koufax?

Now that the Los Angeles Dodgers have agreed to pay Don Drysdale a club high of \$71,000 this season, how much cash are they offering Sandy Koufax?

Drysdale and Juan Marchal of the San Francisco Giants, two of the most feared right-handed pitchers in baseball, both wound up with healthy raises when they signed their 1964 contracts Wednesday.

Drysdale, a 19-game winner last season, was given a \$25,000 hike to about \$71,000. Marchal reportedly settled for \$40,000, which represented a \$16,000 raise over his salary last year when he posted a 25-9 record and pitched a no-hitter against Houston.

Drysdale was "very reasonable" in his salary talks, according to Dodgers General Manager E. J. (Burrus) Bevens. Koufax, though, might be a little tougher to deal with. The fast-balling southpaw was paid about \$35,000 last year when he emerged as the National League's most valuable player after winning 25 games and beating the New York Yankees twice in the World Series. He, too, will expect at least a \$25,000 raise.

Mrs. W. R. Meade sends us her recipe for Pork and Noodle Casserole. Sounds very good. Try it soon.

- 2 lb. ground pork
- 1/2 cup diced onion
- 1 cup diced celery
- 2 tps. salt
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 can condensed tomato soup
- 1 pkg. (8 oz.) medium noodles, cooked
- 1 cup grated cheddar cheese
- 1 slice bread, cut in small pieces and toasted
- 1 tbs. butter or margarine, melted

Cook pork until lightly browned. Pour off drippings. Add onion, celery, salt and water. Cover tightly and continue cooking slowly for five minutes. Add soup and noodles and mix well. Place in a 2 1/2 quart casserole. Cover with grated cheese. Mix toasted bread with melted butter or margarine and sprinkle over cheese. Bake in a moderate oven 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Serves 6 to 8.

Prune Bread and Gingerbread are two breads that Grace Arnold likes to prepare. Let's try them.

PRUNE BREAD

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup finely chopped dried prunes
- 1 tsp. soda
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1/2 cup lard, melted
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Line the bottom of a 9" by 5" loaf pan with double thickness of waxed paper. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Combine prunes, soda and boiling water. Add lard, sugar and egg. Mix well. Add vanilla and nuts. Add sifted dry ingredients, stirring only until dry ingredients are moistened. Pour into loaf pan and let stand for 30 minutes. Bake in moderate oven 350 degrees 50 to 60 minutes or until done. Makes 1 loaf.

And now her GINGERSNAPS

- 3 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1 tbs. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tbs. ginger
- 1 cup lard
- 2 cups light brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp. vinegar
- 1/2 cup dark molasses

Sift together flour, soda, salt and ginger. Cream lard

and sugar. Add eggs and beat well. Add vinegar and molasses. Mix in dry ingredients and roll in balls about the size of a walnut. Place 2 inches apart on ungreased baking sheet. Bake in hot oven 400 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes or until done. Makes 6 dozen.

Lamb Ribs seem to be a big favorite in the household of Martha Thomas. Here is her way for preparing them:

- 4 lbs. lamb ribs
- 1 tbs. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 1/2 cups water
- 6 small onions
- 6 medium carrots
- 2 pkgs. (9 oz. each) frozen green beans

Trim excess fat from lamb ribs, if desired. Arrange ribs in open roasting pan and cook in slow oven 300 degrees 1 1/2 hours. Remove ribs to Dutch oven. Season with salt and pepper. Add water, onions and carrots. Cover tightly and simmer on top of range 45 minutes to 1 hour or until meat is tender and vegetables are done. Remove meat and vegetables and make gravy, if desired. Serve with green beans cooked according to package directions. Serves 6.

- 2 1-oz. squares unsweetened chocolate

- 1/2 cup sifted confectioners sugar
- 1 1/2 cups shredded coconut
- 1/2 gallon vanilla ice milk
- 4-8 tbsps. instant coffee
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans

Set ice milk in bowl to soften enough to stir instant coffee into it. Melt chocolate and margarine over hot water. Stir milk into confectioners sugar, add to chocolate mixture, stir in coconut. Press on bottom and sides of lightly buttered 9" pie plate. Thoroughly stir coffee into ice milk and place into pie plate, sprinkle with chopped nuts. Place in freezer until serving time. This is thick enough to cut 8 servings.

Signing Of Tax Bill Gets Immediate Response

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A \$11.5 billion tax cut, designed to put an average of \$4 or \$5 more a week into pockets of most U. S. wage earners this year, begins taking effect next week and President Johnson wants Americans to make the most of it.

Even before the ink was dry on the landmark legislation Wednesday it had performed its first feat, spurring the stock market to its best gain in two weeks.

One year, one month and two days after the late John F. Kennedy's urgent appeal, the Senate put the final stamp of approval on the biggest tax cut in the nation's history by a 74-19 vote with generous Republican support.

Johnson promptly signed it into law at a White House ceremony, then told a nationwide radio-television audience that it would strengthen the United States by bolstering the economy when U. S. taxpayers and corporations start spending the extra cash.

"No one can bury us — or bluff us — or beat us — so long as our economy remains strong," said the President in an obvious reference to Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's oft-quoted promise to "bury" capitalism.

For his part, the Chief executive promised to make new inroads against federal spending, including a new goal to eliminate an additional 7,500 government jobs "in the very next few months."

While Johnson forecast good days ahead, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) announced

that some workers should notice the first effects of the tax cut next Thursday, March 5. That is when a lower payroll withholding rate goes into effect, meaning higher paychecks.

The IRS said it would follow a "rule of reason" in enforcing the March 5 changeover. "We will not find fault with employers who are delayed a day or two in putting the lower rate into effect by problems encountered in converting their payroll systems," a spokesman said.

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Control Brings Problems

The successes enjoyed in the control of infectious diseases in this and other counties has been the result of a combination of increased scientific knowledge, the efforts of private individuals, and the programs of official health agencies.

No modern state is willing to forego the advantages accruing from the continued control of such diseases. We must maintain our community immunization levels at points high enough to minimize the danger of diphtheria, tetanus, smallpox, polio, whooping cough and typhoid, among others.

The very fact, however, that the control of infectious diseases has been so successful has brought about some of the problems with which the health department must now deal. For example, maternal and child deaths have been drastically reduced which means not only that more children are living to maturity but that the population is increasing relatively rapidly and that more people are living into the later years of life.

While modern medications have improved longevity, we have as yet no adequate means to combat the physiological time clock which governs the age process. This gives rise to the problem of more people living to need nursing care in the home.

Improved methods of treatment are making it possible to send many persons home who otherwise would spend much of their life in mental and tubercular institutions. This places additional responsibilities on

the communities to provide some method of home supervision.

A part of every medical care program includes taking care of patients who are not acutely ill enough to be in a hospital but in need of part time professional nursing service in the home. These services include assisting in the rehabilitation of stroke victims, teaching diabetics how to give themselves injections, changing surgical dressings, teaching mothers how to care for young children and many other simple bedside nursing measures. The trend toward home care leaves hospitals better able to care for the acutely ill and injured.

Seminole County is meeting this home nursing need through the Health Department and the Home Nursing Service which is available to all who need it in this area. Much has been done since this service has been established and more and more the services are being called for by our citizens. Our health department and its officials are to be commended for making these services available to our citizens.

Worry Clinic

CASE R-494: Don Bleitz is the versatile head of a large pharmaceutical firm in California.

But his absorbing hobby is birds. He is a superb ornithologist who photographs birds in color and writes a textbook thereon.

Mrs. Crane and I visited Don and his lovely Spanish wife, Elvira, when we were in Los Angeles two years ago.

And Don's enthusiasm for birds was so contagious that we got infected with the same virus.

So when we returned home and headed down to our farm abode in Indiana, Mrs. Crane asked me to stop at the butcher shop for some large hunkers of suet.

Then I nailed these to several tree trunks outside the dining room.

But she also has bird feeders that are full of sunflower seeds, cracked corn, etc.

In addition, one of our sons got some long spike nails and had the heads snipped off.

These are now inserted into the tree trunks and we then slip ears of yellow corn on the spikes.

As a result, Mrs. Crane now has scores of birds of various species, plus chipmunks and

fox squirrels, which come out for their tree lunch.

We are not scientific bird specialists like Don Bleitz, but we have purchased some books showing color plates of various native birds.

Indeed, we have identified 11 species of birds at one time at our "free lunch stand."

But in the summer the chipmunks take the feed and store it in their burrows.

One little chipmunk will fill his cheek pouches with corn and then dart to his den.

By stopwatch I have timed him. He will empty his pouches and be back on the ear of corn within 60 seconds.

But the chipmunks scare away the birds, so last summer Mrs. Crane decided we must do something to eliminate the chipmunks.

She didn't want to hurt them but she knew that our daughter Judy was soon to arrive from West Orange, N. J., with her four youngsters.

So Mrs. Crane felt the kiddies would prefer to watch the birds.

In her dilemma, she bought a wire rat trap that has a trap door and catches the animals whole, without injury.

She put a nubbin of corn inside and set the trap out by the tree.

Within five minutes she gleefully called to me, where I was pounding the typewriter in my upstairs office.

"Oh, I've caught one already," she cried.

By the time I got downstairs, she had the cage in the kitchen, but was looking mournful.

"I'm weakening fast," she admitted, dolefully. "I thought we could take him a mile away and release him in the woods."

"But he looks so cute, I think maybe Judy's children would just as soon watch the chipmunks as the birds. What do you think?"

Well, I decided we could trap for a few weeks our trapping the chipmunks, so we turned this little fellow loose.

Judy's children did enjoy the chipmunks, so I squandered another bushel of corn feeding them.

Spending Pressure On

Popular opinion polls showing a remarkable enthusiasm for President Johnson are lagging somewhat behind the political facts of this campaign year.

This week a poll by Louis Harris in the Washington (D. C.) Post reported that 81 percent of voters questioned believed Johnson was effective in keeping government spending under control. Thus, the voters appear to find Johnson not guilty of the Republican charge that he is a typical big time Democratic spender.

Spending, the national debt and deficits are the domestic issues on which the Republicans expect to hit hardest this year. Republicans need those issues to win.

The polls are more favorable to Johnson than are the political facts of life. The voters are saluting mere promises. For example, the Kennedy administration's big spending trend has not been checked since Johnson took office three months ago.

Neelan of the Chamber of Commerce and George Meany of AFL-CIO are beginning to represent utterly opposing

points of view on Johnson, each supported by some millions of like-minded voters. For Johnson, that spells out in simple terms a decision he must make.

Shall we join with congressional conservatives in a drive for real government economy or with congressional liberals in a drive for more spending, bigger annual deficits and a steadily increasing national debt? Not merely a tough decision to make. That will be a tough decision to reveal to one side and to conceal from the other.

Political Notebook

CHICAGO — (NEA) — The prospect now arises that in early May the national headquarters for Sen. Barry Goldwater's field operations — devoted to the vital business of rustling delegates — may be shifted from the East to California.

A bold departure from past presidential campaigns, this plan would have the wisdom of permitting easier concentration on the key primaries in Oregon and California in late spring, on nine western state conventions set for May 8 or later and on the July 13 national convention at San Francisco.

Should this major shift occur, it would serve as a striking symbol of the West Coast's importance not only in the 1964 GOP nomination fight but in national politics generally.

Moreover, on top of the practical advantage of putting key Goldwater field men near the scene of final battle, the move would tend once and for all to put a western stamp on Goldwater's campaign.

It would be the most concrete recognition to date that the Arizona senator is trying to win the Republican nomination with a Western-South-central-Midwestern coalition

which might box in—if it does not ignore—the party's established eastern power centers.

Placing the field command post in California would not, of course, affect all the other general headquarters activities presently gathered in Washington.

But this highly original idea is perhaps representative of the inventive, aggressive spirit which characterized the unprecedented Feb. 10 Chicago meeting of some 100 Goldwater managers and organizers from 42 states and the national campaign staff.

Seemingly undaunted by new public opinion polls showing Goldwater dropping farther behind 1960 nominee Richard Nixon, the conferees here and there behaved and talked almost like victory celebrants.

Some, however, appeared to be stung by reports that the Goldwater camp is struggling against inner conflict, incompetent management, timidity and even gloom.

One leader, exuding confidence at what was mainly a workshop meeting, nevertheless blurted out his annoyance:

"We wanted to prove to these field people that even

though we're a bunch of yahoos from Arizona we have some competence."

This was a reference to reports that Goldwater's newly chosen Arizona-oriented campaign managers were regarded by the earlier Draft Goldwater organizers as too green for the job.

Another top man scoffed at the notion the Chicago conference was called to smooth over major dissension:

"You don't wash your dirty linen at a meeting of a hundred people."

Goldwater leaders in Chicago made no pretense that all was perfect. But they say they have done a remarkable job of cranking up in the six weeks since the senator became a candidate.

If they are not genuinely confident, if they do not in their hearts believe Goldwater or his makings of victory in July and beyond, then they are the best traveling show since Britain's famous Old Vic troupe last toured the United States.

The only other possibility is that they are now caught up in a massive enterprise in self-delusion of the sort that sometimes afflicts politicians engaged in presidential combat.

Greek Vote Noteworthy

Traditionally, Greek voters have been more interested in personalities than in party labels.

And in their just-concluded national elections, the Greeks selected not only a personality but a professional politician who held his first political post at the age of 23 and now at 73 will take over as premier.

As a personality, tall and nearly bald George Papandreu has sharpened his tongue against Greek royalty and in 11 years of opposition to the National Radical Union led by former Premier Constantine Caramanlis.

He has administered Greek royalty to "reign but not attempt to rule," and understandably is disliked by King Paul.

To a Caramanlis boast that Greece was prospering materially, he replied:

"Numbers prosper; the people suffer."

Last November, Papandreu's Center Union party won a hairline victory over Caramanlis's National Radical Union and Papandreu ruled for 47 days.

He quit rather than rely on the pro-Communist United Democratic left to support, thus forcing the country into new elections which this week gave him a landslide victory at the expense of both the political left and right.

The vote was noteworthy in a number of respects.

First, the fact that the government pressed ahead with

despite the shadow of the Cyprus crisis and a possible conflict with Turkey was a tribute to Greek democratic processes.

Second, it continued the steady decline of Communist voting strength in Greece and the growing political voice of a middle age class emerging with the new strength of the Greek economy. It probably also was reflective of the fact that Caramanlis had deserted his own party leadership to take up self-imposed exile in Paris.

At any rate, Papandreu's victory gave the country a much-needed stable government and assured continuation of a strong pro-NATO and pro-Western government policy.

It also should ease any threat of a Greek-Turkish clash over Cyprus since Papandreu is a strong advocate of a peaceful settlement of the dispute dividing Turks and Greeks.

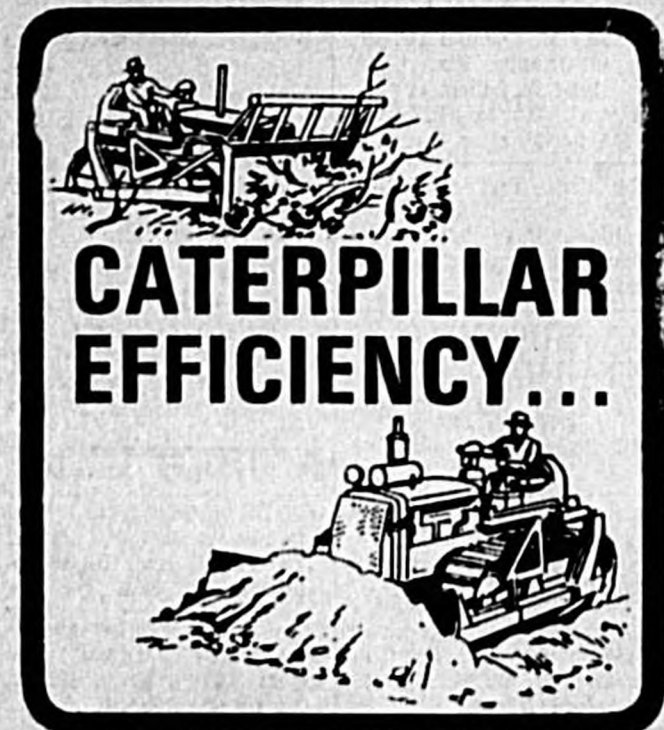

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant said today he talked with U. S. Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz about new efforts to settle the strike against the Florida East Coast Railroad. Bryant's office said President Johnson suggested in Miami Thursday that the governor talk with Wirtz about the strike. In a brief statement, Bryant said, "The Secretary of Labor called me this morning about 9 o'clock and we engaged in a discussion as to the mechanics of carrying out the President's suggestion. We expect to be back in touch with each other during the day and will be contacting interested parties to see if we can develop some progress toward settling the strike."

ST. AUGUSTINE (UPI) — The Federal Bureau of Investigation was under the direct orders of President Johnson today to halt the sabotage that has plagued the strike-bound Florida East Coast (FEC) Railway. Johnson issued the order Thursday night at a Democratic fund raising dinner at 21st and Beach just hours after the latest dynamiting derailed seven cars of a 103-car freight. The President was just 25 miles away at Palatka dedicating the start of construction of the cross-Florida barge canal when the second of Thursday's two blasts took place.
