Official Seeks Law Banning Closed Shop

Chrysler Executive Asks Congress To Break Up Industry-Wide Bargaining

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Vice president B. E. Hutchinson of Chrysler Corporation today called on congress to break up industry-wide collective bargaining and outlaw the closed shop. The executive also asked Congress to remove the administration of health and welfare funds from the hands of both unions and industry.

Hutchinson presented his views in testimony prepared for the Senate Labor Committee. The committee is studying several bills which would do just what Hutchinson asked.

The Chrysler official accused labor unions of yearning toward monopolistic control. He also said he couldn't see how any reasonable person could object to changes in the law to "curb monopoly."

The A. F. of L. executive council today let it be known that it is not unalterably opposed to any changes in labor laws. The council hinted, in fact, that it would support some changes which would not interfere with union liberties and freedoms.

The 15-member council will be busy today and tomorrow studying proposed legislation dealing with labor questions. A. F. of L. president William Green said that if any of the bills met the group's standards, they would be supported by the union leaders.

At least one bill, however, has been put on the A. F. of L. blacklist. That is the so-called Ball-Smith-Taft bill, which is sponsored by the three Republican senators. Green said that the objectives of this measure are "far less hypocritical." He described it as a "modified version of the Case bill," which was vetoed by President Truman last year.

Green said "It should be understood that it should be defeated by Congress."

Verdict Is Returned For Manslaughter

A verdict of manslaughter against John Troutman, negro, was returned this morning by a Circuit Court Jury which, after the morning trial session, yesterday voted the site west of Lake Monroe where Roosevelt Drane, negro, was found dead in a clump of palmetto bushes, a pen knife clutched in his hand.

The State, represented by Assistant State Attorney George McCotter, had entered a charge of first degree murder against Troutman in connection with the alleged shooting. Today, another negro, Robert Wilder, is on trial on a charge of murder in the second degree in connection with the fatal stabbing of Wilma Melts, negro, on Nov. 4, 1946, in a juke joint known as the Zenabur Inn.

Allen Offers New Plan For Tax Reduction

Compromise Proposal Would Give More Relief To Lower Income Brackets

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Republican leaders are studying a tax relief proposal today which was presented as a compromise by the chairman of the House Rules Committee, Republican Leo Allen of Illinois.

Briefly, Allen's idea is to give the most tax relief to those making the least amount of money and lesser tax relief to persons in the upper income brackets.

Allen suggests that taxes on income up to \$2,000 should be paid at that 20 percent rate but incomes of \$10,000 or more, Allen would reduce taxes only 10 percent.

The Illinois Republican estimates that the plan would mean a total tax reduction of \$2,750,000,000. This compares to the estimated 200,000,000,000 under the 50 percent plan—the board, 50 in all—associated by the House Ways and Means Committee chairman, Republican Harold Knutson of Minnesota.

Knutson has declared repeatedly that he intends to stick by his plan even though his plan has been attacked by other Republicans as giving the greatest share of relief to persons making the most money.

But the Republican leader has indicated that if he formulates something along the lines now advocated by Allen eventually may be adopted. Speaker of the House Joe Martin says that the GOP favors cutting taxes by 20 percent, but not necessarily by slashing them across the board.

The largest of the four weighed eleven pounds. An aggregate weight for the four was 80 pounds. The fish were centered at Hill Haulway Company.

Last week Elton Moughlin, Jr., Robert Newman, Jr. and Lloyd Hatch pulled 14 speckled perch from the cool waters of the upper St. Johns. The largest member of the finny tribe weighed 2 pounds 11 ounces. None of these fish were entered in the contest.

Announce New Rules On Black Bass Fishing

New closed season rules regarding fishing of black bass have been announced by the state fish and game commission as follows:

"That in all districts of the State of Florida except the Third District (except north west corner of the state), no person shall take or be in possession of any black bass during the month of March of each and every year."

"That in the Third District of the State of Florida, no person shall take or be in possession of any black bass during the month of March and April of each and every year."

Group Plans 2 Term Limit For President

House Committee Approves Measure To Restrict Tenure Of President's Office

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—The House Judiciary Committee today passed a Constitutional amendment today which would limit the tenure of any president to two terms of four years each. The amendment is expected to come before the House on Thursday.

Fifteen Republicans and five Democrats supported it. The measure would restrict the tenure of the presidency to two terms, whether they be full four-year terms or only parts of a term, such as President Truman now is serving. Before approving the amendment, the House committee turned down proposals to limit the tenure to a single term of four years.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—A new plan for revising the Constitution was offered today by Senator John Sparkman of Alabama. Sparkman suggested that Congress set up a committee to study the "responsibility" of the president to pass on rent control applications.

The Alabama legislator said he is flatly opposed to any action on the board rent increase, as proposed by the Republican senators. But he declared that existing rent regulations need to be loosened up and made flexible. Sparkman said: "The situation is frozen now. We must thaw it out."

He is a member of the Senate Banking Committee, which will hear from rent administrator Ivan Carson today. Carson has been asked to tell how the present control program works.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—A British government source today said that Prime Minister Atlee's cabinet has decided to try to impose a settlement on troubled Palestine. The new plan, he said, would divide Palestine into Arab and Jewish territories with the control held in trust temporarily by Britain.

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High School Pupils To Study Aeronautics

H. W. Morris, principal of the Seminole High School and H. H. Browning of the Sanford School of Aviation have initiated an aeronautical ground school course for qualified high school students.

The students selected will obtain a complete ground school course, consisting of a total of 60 hours covering Meteorology, Aerial Navigation, Civil Air Regulations, General Service of Aircraft, Fundamentals of Flight and Radio for Airmen.

Those who qualify will be given private pilots ground school training as well as high school credit. Qualified high school students will also receive link training and two flight lessons in a Piper Cub and five glider lessons sponsored by the Gliding & Soaring Service, a new glider school at the airport, managed by Steve and Virginia Bemis. These courses are given free of cost by the respective schools.

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
