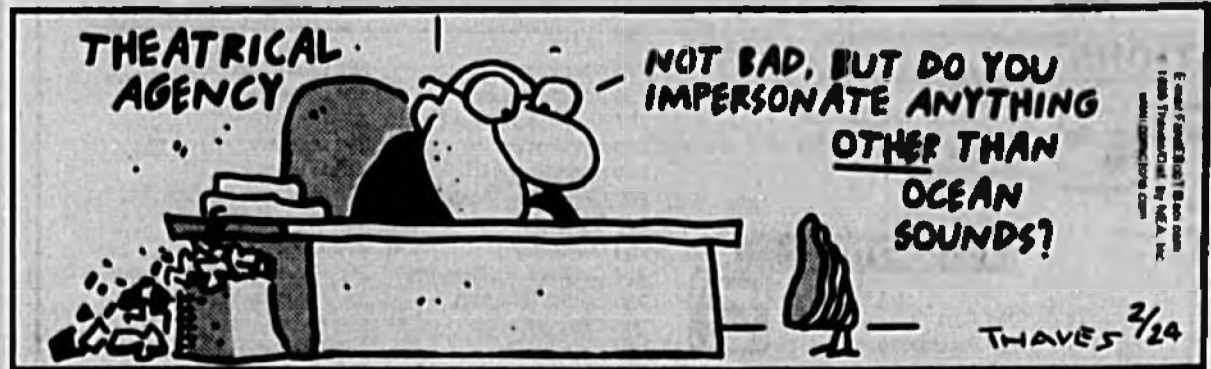

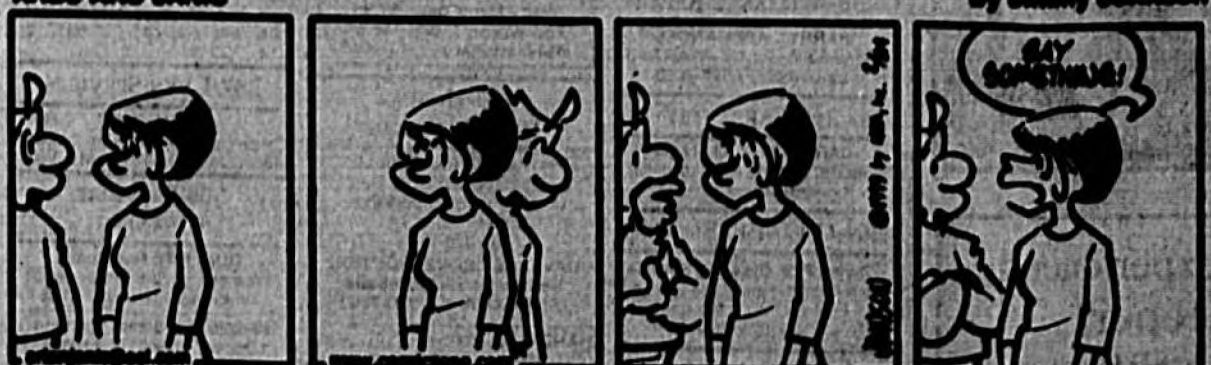

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## WIN AT BRIDGE

### One more time around the bush

We are continuing our look at the inter-venor's options when he holds 5-5-2-3 distribution, a doubleton in the opener's suit, and a five-card minor. I've recommended making a takeout double in preference to overcalling in the minor. Yet bidding one no-trump is even better. But you need the cards for it. You require a hand that would have opened one no-trump and has at least one stopper — preferably two — in the opener's suit — the South's collection here.

Also, note North's use of Stayman, followed by the invitational two no-trump. This looks aggressive, but usually you collect at least one extra trick in the play when you know where most or all of the opposition's high

cards lie. You can read the cards much more easily than when they haven't bid.

After a club lead into your ace-queen tenace, how would you continue?

You have six top tricks: one spade, two hearts, one diamond and two clubs. The best play in diamonds is to take two finesses, but that requires two dummy entries. Yet you don't have time to take a losing spade finesse (and it rates to fail) to build those two entries. The defenders will win the race.

There are two choices: Lead a low diamond, planning to finesse through East on the second round; or cross to the spade ace and run the diamond suit, intending if it loses to an honor in the West hand, to cash the ace next. I think the latter is the better approach, but as you can see, both these plans are successful with this layout — I'm in a friendly mood!

### Questions about Synthroid

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I am 78 years old. My lowest cholesterol has gone from a 200 up to a 250 mg. Why, at my age, should my lowest cholesterol? I asked my doctor, but he is puzzled. He made a great pass," Steve Kohn said.

Kohn brought the ball downcourt, made a move to his right, then found Hoffar wide open.

Hoffar, who missed some key free throws in the Deland loss, made amends, hitting nothing but net.

"I had to fade away, but I felt good about it," Hoffar said. "We hit a wall early tonight, but I can't believe we came back."

As Hoffar's shot went in, the Lake Howell fans who packed the gym stormed the court as the buzzer sounded, but the game wasn't quite over.

The way everyone was talking Tuesday at the Seminole County Commissioners meeting, there's little chance of Good ole Gator Rail service for a long, long time. There's too much bickering. Too many negative engineers.

A nice fellow named Barley - Harry Barley of Metro Plan - is the one the others should be listening to about light rail. He tried to make sense of the issue Tuesday, and asked everyone to work together.

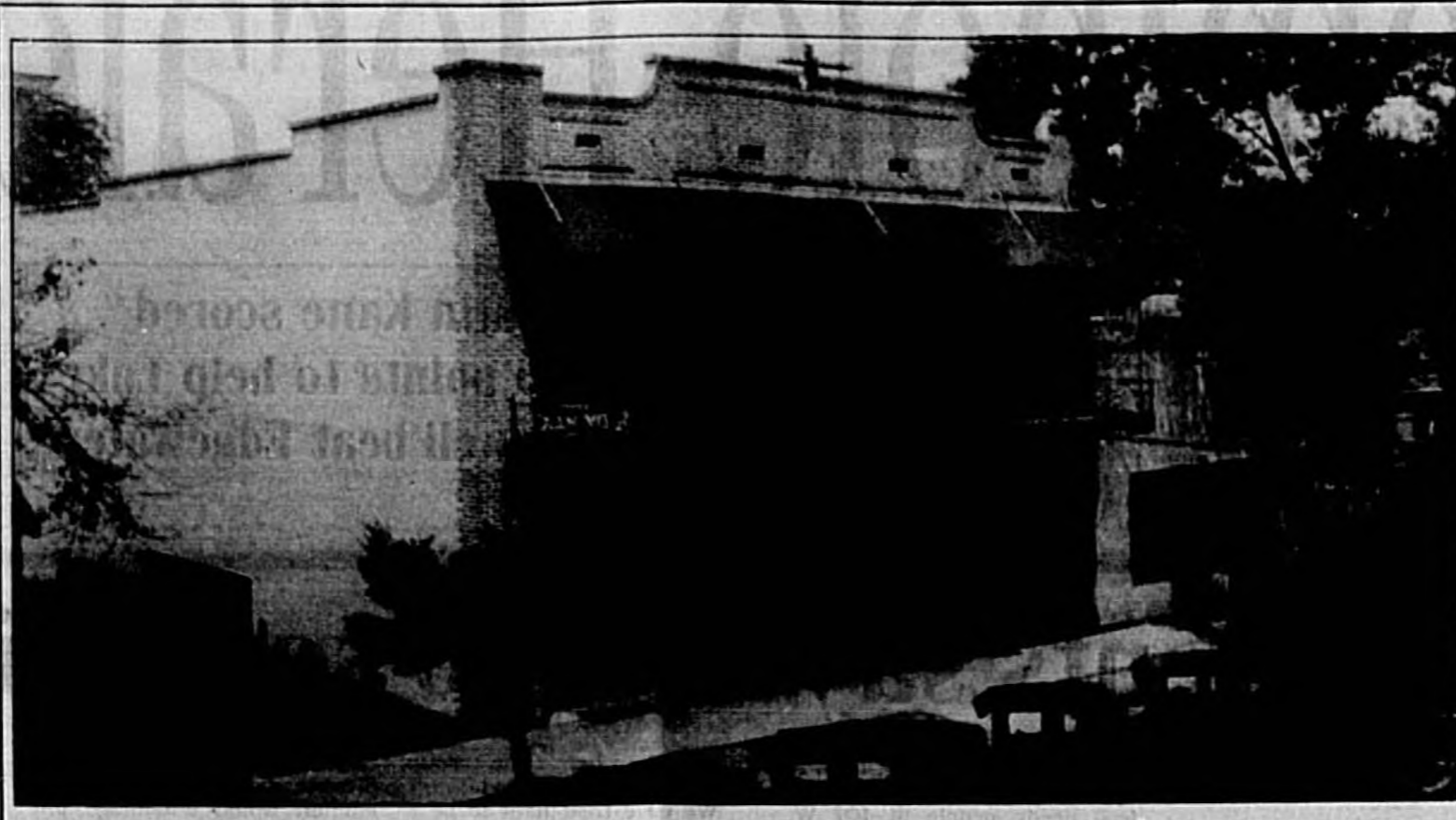

**Agency offer tips on how to avoid termite troubles**

TALLAHASSEE - Florida Agriculture and Consumer Services Commissioner Bob Crawford is warning homeowners that this is the time of year when termites begin to "swarm," or leave their colonies to search for new nesting sites. Many homeowners discover that they have a termite problem when they find termite swarms (winged, black insects about 1/4-inch long) in their homes. But homebuilders and homeowners can take steps to avoid termite problems.

This requires two things: proper construction techniques and proper termite protection application. Construction features that increase chances of termite infestation include wood-to-soil contact (siding, steps, porches), short overhangs that allow rainwater to wash soil at base of foundation, soil-filled planters against the side of a house, stucco on wire lath extending below grade, and wooden porches or steps that come into contact with the house.

Most protection chemicals can only be used by state licensed pest control applicators. Application of these chemicals also requires specialized equipment and is not something that homeowners can easily do. Termite control companies have this equipment.

"It's well worth the time and expense to prevent a termite infestation," Crawford said. "An infestation can cause thousands of dollars in damage before a homeowner even knows there's a problem."

The best time to do an effective treatment is during construction. State law requires a termite contract with a warranty when treatment during construction is rendered. Home buyers can buy a damage replacement warranty that will protect them financially should the treatment fail. Usually, the contract is for one year, followed by four annual re-inspections. The contract usually requires the contractor to re-treat any termite damage that occurs during the contract annually.

There are also easy steps you can take to reduce your risk of termite infestation.

- \*Don't pile wood against the house or in the garage.
- \*Maintain your termite contract and renew annually.
- \*Maintain gutters and downspouts so that rainwater is discharged 18 inches to 24 inches from the foundation.
- \*Channel air-conditioning drainage away from house.
- \*Keep roof in good repair; stop leaks immediately.
- \*Keep mulch and landscaping away from siding.
- \*Keep irrigation away from siding and foundation.

Shop around for a well-respected termite control company. Get referrals from friends and relatives and check the complaint history of a business by calling the Department's Consumer Hotline at 1-800 HELP FLA. If you have questions about termite control or a complaint against a termite company, call 1-800 HELP FLA. For more information, visit our web site at: <http://doacs.state.fl.us/-acs-ent/>.

The Department investigates complaints against pest control companies and is in the process of conducting inspections of termite control treatments. Administrative action can be taken against companies that do not perform termite treatments properly.

Termites can cause extensive damage, so it's wise to spend a little up front to avoid costly problems later.

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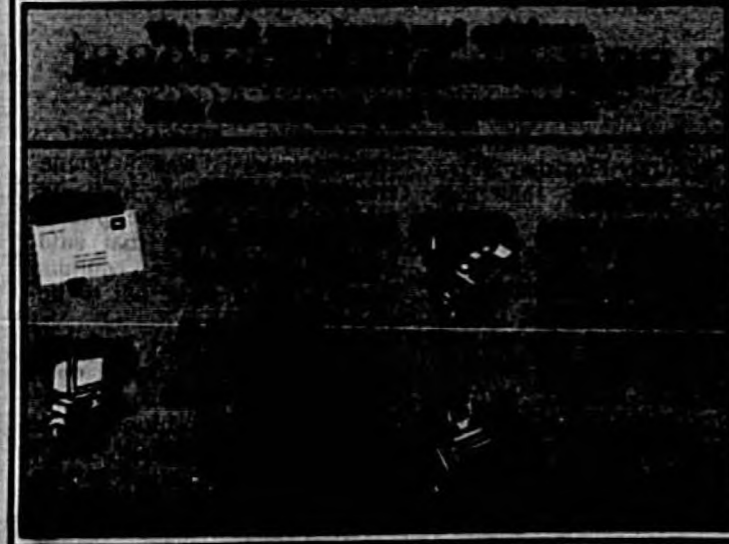

be fed," Rush said. "But, those people do not need to be fed in this neighborhood."

Rush said soup kitchens today are more dangerous than soup kitchens were 20 years ago.

"There are fights and drug deals in soup kitchens of today," Rush said.

Linda Walter, a historic district resident, said she is concerned that the soup kitchen would lower property values in the district.

Jay Marder, director of planning and development for Sanford, said that while Seminole Volunteer Enterprises does have a site plan on file, they do not have a permit to operate a soup kitchen. The stove in the kitchen has not been connected.

Mayor Larry Dale said Sanford should tighten zoning regulations throughout the city.

"We should sit down and have a total overhaul of our entire zoning classifications," Dale said to the applause of the historic district residents in attendance.

Commissioners Kerry Lyons and Brady Lessard said they agreed with the statements of the historic district residents.

"Sanford can't handle the entire county's problems," Lessard said. "I think providing food in this atmosphere, and studies have proven this, fosters dependence and hopelessness."

Commissioner Velma Williams said she did not agree that a soup kitchen promotes joblessness. But, she said she would not oppose tighter zoning regulations if they are enforced equally throughout the city.

"We must face the fact that we have pockets of poverty here," Williams said. "The people are going to be here. I am concerned when I hear the leaders focus on the fact that it's not the federal, state, county, or city's responsibility to care for these people. These people are here. You cannot push them into the St. Johns River."

Metts said that she would work with police to ensure that people do not loiter at the soup kitchen.

The soup kitchen would offer meals from 5-7 p.m., Metts said.

The families would get to keep the computers once they complete the program.

"We're hoping to have enough business partners involved that every family can take home a computer," Moon said. "This will improve their opportunity to have technology in their home."

The program would include after school tutoring for students. Teachers and staff would work with parents on reading, math and technology skills.

The purpose of the program is to use the school building to provide after school activities

and safe havens for children," Moon said. "We will have recreational and academic activities. We'll design the recreational activities to be fun teaching activities."

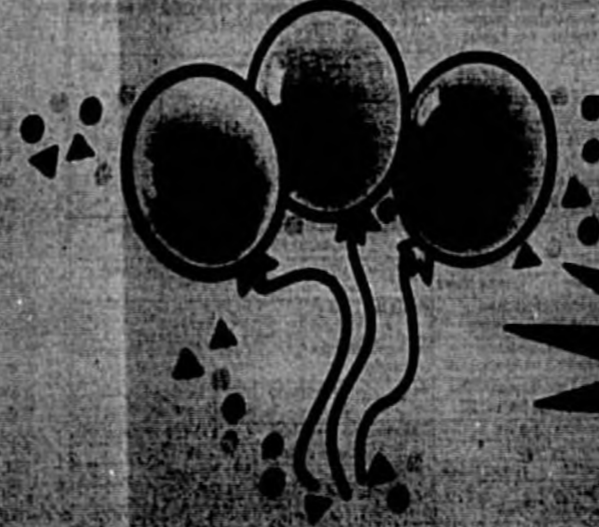
If the school district does not receive the grant, the program may still be implemented with a limited amount of after school tutoring and training for parents, Moon said.

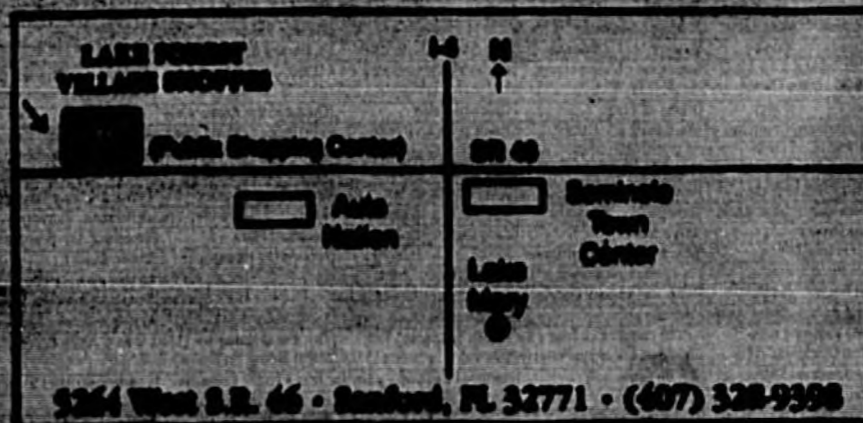

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## Residents say 'no' to soup kitchen

SANFORD - The battle lines  
are drawn over the possibility  
of a nonprofit soup kitchen for  
the needy opening in Sanford's  
historic district.

Seven residents of the his-  
toric district told the City Com-  
mission Monday that they will  
fight against plans by Seminole

Volunteer Enterprises Inc. to  
open a soup kitchen that will  
feed needy people at 407 W.  
Fourth Street.

Jean Metts, executive director  
of Seminole Volunteer Enter-  
prises, said a date has not been  
set for opening the soup  
kitchen. She said the agency  
has spent \$172,000 in Com-  
munity Development Block  
Grant money to restore the two

buildings where the soup  
kitchen would be located.

"We have tried hard to be a  
good neighbor," Metts said.  
"The people we hope to help  
are not just homeless. Many of  
the seniors who volunteer with  
us are short of money at the  
end of the month. I want to help  
working mothers who struggle  
to feed their family."

Linda Kuhn, director of Main

Street Inc. and a resident of the  
historic district, said the soup  
kitchen would encourage job-  
lessness by offering "a hand-  
out, not a handup." She said  
the soup kitchen would foster  
crime in the historic district.

"We seem to have become a  
dumping ground for the un-  
savory individuals who other  
communities won't take," Kuhn  
said. "A handout simply pro-

motes joblessness, crime and  
helplessness."

Bart Ruah, a downtown mer-  
chant and resident of the his-  
toric district, said he would  
fight as hard to prevent the  
soup kitchen from opening in  
the historic district as he did to  
promote the hotel-conference  
center at Fort Mellon Park.

"I think those people need to

Currently, Bond is a Disting-  
uished Professor in Residence  
at American University in  
Washington, DC, a professor in  
the History Department at the  
University of Virginia, and  
Chairman of the Board of Di-  
rectors of the National Asso-  
ciation for the Advancement  
of Colored People (NAACP).

Bond regularly appears on  
"America's Black Forum," the  
oldest black-owned show in  
television syndication. He has  
authored a nationally distrib-

## School makes computer technology a family affair

SANFORD - Next school year Hamilton Ele-  
mentary School is hoping to host a pilot after-  
school program that will provide learning ac-  
tivities for children and their families.

The Seminole County school district is re-  
questing about \$200,000 per year from the U.S.  
Department of Education to open The Family  
TLC (Technology, Literacy, Communications)  
Center at Hamilton Elementary School.

The Family TLC Center would provide family  
technology activities two nights per week and  
one Saturday per month. The program would  
be coordinated with the Extended Day Care

program currently operating at the school. The  
grant would need to be renewed annually.

"We're really excited about the opportunity to  
provide this type of program," Marion Daly, ex-  
ecutive director of Instructional Support Ser-  
vices for the school district, said. "This is a  
great opportunity to get the community and par-

after the Family Technology Resource Center in

60 hours of training in technology using do-
