McKechnie Leaves For The East Few Hours After Team Loses An Rumors Float About That He Is Through

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—It was less than 24 hours after the St. Louis Cardinals had taken it full on the contender for the fourth, the final and funniest time Tuesday afternoon that Mr. Will McKechnie, ever had, that the rising, young bug-holder, was riding eastward from a bustling such as no man or man ever before had sustained in a World Series. He was a dispenser so hoary that the customary "poling" of the premises, the sweeping up of post-season assignments usually awaiting a managerial whisk broom, was allowed to go by default and this occasion some comment.

From McKechnie's viewpoint however, it was Harty that the book nature of his leave taking was a perfectly natural one. McKechnie may or may not be a good manager but it would seem that his audience at least might be open to reason on this point, in view of the fact that he had managed his team to win two pennants and one World's championship during the last four seasons. The fact that he is no longer in with one of the clubs and may be about to start the other, by the emergency rule, need in case of fire, and by those who have heard this news in the recent past, indicates that he is a good salesman of his own ideas.

He was kicked downsize by Harry Dryfus only a year after he had managed the Pirates to the world championship, in the National League, and a title in the World Series. The obvious reason was supposed to have been the inherent fact that they outwitted the manager of Fred Clarke, Carey Pendergast, Adams and others involved. McKechnie's regime, however, had been under fire from several sources for some time. Apparently McKechnie's even like the way he had done it.

It was the same this year when he thought the Cardinals, down to the wire in a great stretch run, were to win the National League. The Cardinals still were making that when an apparently well authenticated report reached the writer that Frank Frisch, second baseman, had been fired. 

GLOOM REIGNS IN GATOR YEARLING FOOTBALL CAMP

First Year Team Is Not Very Well Prepared For Auburn

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA, GAINESVILLE, Oct. 11.—(Athletic News Bureau)—There is considerable gloom in the freshman football camp as Brady Cowell prepares his "Baby Gators" for the start of the seventh season of University of Florida football. The Auburn Cubs, who faced the opposition next Saturday at Columbus, Ga., in the curtain-raiser, have broadcasted that they, before their freshman football prospects been so rosy, while down here in Gatorland, Mentors Cowell and Pierson see little chance for the 1934 ranks that resemble freshman grid squads of former years. Horace Marsh, the All-Southern prep guard of last season, has rejoined his mates, but absence from practice for three weeks has placed him considerably behind in training. Don Forsyth, of Pennsylvania, has been showing up nicely, and seems certain to start at one of the guards.

"Monk" Durrett, triple-threat back, looms as one of the most promising athletes to enter the University since the immortal Jones, Goldstein and Williams, but he suffered a slight injury last week and is not scheduled to scrimmage before the Auburn clash, though he should be able to start against the Cubs Saturday.

The return of Earl Hinch, end, after nearly three weeks absence from practice, strengthens the situation at end, but he too is not in top physical condition, and somewhat behind in his pre-season training. Installation of the Weir Dame system by the freshman coaches is making their job more difficult than ever this year, but the tutoring they receive this fall should serve them well when they graduate to varsity ranks.

Carlin Frantz and Jimmy White, from Tampa, who are far from strangers to state football fans; Big Ed Farrell, from St. Lawrence, always and Leo Worrick, who played colorful high school ball up in Jacksonville last fall; Delana Draw from Clearwater, and Bob Adams from Indiana, loom as the best of the present backfield crop.

cross-winds and later, head winds to impede the ship's progress.
In passing over Madeira the zepplin was aided by a southeast wind. There are no indications of bad weather in the Bermuda region. Later, the Arlington station picked up a radiogram that the airship had passed over Madeira in the direction of the Azores.
By turning southward beyond the southern steamer lane, the arrival of the zepplin will be delayed. It may not reach Lakshar until Sunday evening or Monday morning, all depending upon the nature of the weather encountered after reaching the western side of the Atlantic.
Passing over Gibraltar at midnight, Eastern Standard Time, the zepplin left the Spanish coast an hour and 30 minutes later and headed southward along the Spanish-Moroccan coast.
Ships in the vicinity reported fine, clear weather with light wind flying conditions were called ideal.
While passing Gibraltar the ship exchanged radio messages with the Gibraltar station. For long periods the ship's wireless was silent, indicating heavy static conditions.
All the way from Lyons to Gibraltar the great air liner fought strong headwinds and some times her speed was reduced to a bare 50 miles an hour.
After leaving Marseille the zepplin drove out over the Mediterranean passing the French and Spanish coasts and soaring over Barcelona at 6:30 P. M., Thursday, just after darkness had fallen.

Famed Church Leader Dies After Illness

The State Of Florida

The Boston Transcript has been one of Florida's best friends in dissipating the reports in the North that the entire state had been wiped out by the hurricane.

The Transcript points out that Florida is as far from north to south along the Atlantic as Boston is from Baltimore.

The State of Florida, continues the Transcript, "is in reality a vast domain. It is greatly needed as a part of the productive territory of the United States."

The Transcript has depicted the state of Florida exactly as it exists. In the southern portion of the state there is a vast fertile tract of some five million acres capable of such productivity as to feed the entire nation.

Values of Florida's principal farm crops, for the year ending July 1, 1928, are reported as follows by state and federal agricultural agencies:

Staple crops—Corn, \$7,226,000; cotton, \$1,624,000; cow-peas, \$130,000; hay, \$1,308,000; oats, \$97,000; peanuts, \$1,042,000; sugar cane, \$1,400,000; sweet potatoes, \$2,268,000; Irish potatoes, \$5,633,000; tobacco, \$2,880,000. Total value \$23,808,000.

Truck crops—Snap beans, \$3,683,000; cabbage, \$459,000; cantaloupes, \$76,000; celery, \$3,969,000; cucumbers, \$1,928,000; eggplant, \$255,000; lettuce, \$576,000; green peas, \$119,000; peppers, \$1,292,000; strawberries, \$2,001,000; tomatoes, \$7,284,000; watermelons, \$2,524,000. Total value \$24,066,000.

Fruit crops—Oranges, \$30,360,000; grapefruit, \$14,045,000; peaches, \$121,000; pears, \$51,000; pineapples, \$25,000. Total value, \$44,602,000.

Miscellaneous—Livestock, \$5,350,000; poultry, \$4,208,000; eggs, \$6,466,000; milk, butter, \$11,472,000; miscellaneous, \$5,842,000. Total value, \$33,338,000. Grand total, \$125,814,000.


